# France Orders Into **Effect** Penalties Against Germany

Quick Order by Poincare on Receipt of German Answer to Demand for Full Payment of Instalments on Pre-War Debts.

(Canadian Press Cable.) Paris, Aug. 5—The French government today ordered into ef-lect the penalties against Germany for failure to pay in full the in-stalments on the pre-war debts to French citizens. Germany's reply to the latest French note demanding payment was delivered to the foreign office at noon today. Premier Poin-care, after a quick perusal of the document, gave his order. The penalties concern German properties sequestred in France. Certain payments that were being made to Germans on account of war losses are suspended in Alsace and Lorraine, as are also the in-demnities under the arbitration agreements reached between France and Germany in August and September, 1921. No military action is involved.





wave length and coupling. Adjustment to the exact wave length desired is obtained by varying the condenser "VC."
The filament may be lighted from an alternating current source of suitable voltage usually a step down transformer designed for the purpose.
In high voltage direct current is applied to the plate, the radio frequency currents radiated in the antenna system will be unmodulated and inaudible at the receiving station unless heterdyned. If alternating current of high voltage is applied to the plate, the characteristic tone of the alternating current frequency used will be reproduced at the receiving station.
It is therefore apparent that direct current or rectified alternating current must be employed on the plate where the radio frequency output is to be voice modulated as in the case of the radio telephone transmitter.
A milli-ammeter is inserted in the plate and grid taps "P" and "G."
Standard practice is to rate vacuum tubes, for transmission purposes on their output under given conditions of plate voltage and flament current. Tubes, are now made in 5 watt, 50 watt and 250 watt sizes.


IN MAKING STEEL



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
Northeast Harbor Chauffeurs Make Raid and the Owner Weeps.

Island Where Naroleon Spent His Last Days Boasts a Delightuu Climate.

Napoleon Bonaparte drew public attention to a hitherto little known island in mid-Atlantic, almost opposite the in mid-Atlantic, almost opposite the southern extremity of the Portuguese settlement of Angola, next door to what used to be German Southwest Africa. Few of the general public of that day knew of Elba, not far from Leghorn, where the French emperor was first se-questered; and when, after Waterloo, he went to St. Helena people looked in vain upon most of the maps for that tropical dot, with an area of only forty-seven square miles and with but few Inhabit-ants.


ants. After the Boer war the English turned to St. Helena as a safe spot to send Boer prisoners of war, and so many thousands were transported there that the inhabit-ants of Jamestown—the only town then on the island—became suddenly enriched, for British soldiers and sailors brought money, and their prisoners were rarely poor men.

Next to the Red Sea ports along the African coast, St. Helena probably en-tertains in its waters the greatest ag-gregation of sharks in the world, but the Boer prisoners discovered that these sharks always slept when the sun reached the meridian; and many of these prisoners were rescued by their friends, who brought small vessels, ap-parently laden with provender, but steamed rapidly away when their con-federates had swum a few yards from beneath the towering cliffs to the await-ing boat.

These Boers ascertained that the up-land glades of this volcanic island were covered with verdure, and though less than a thousand miles from the Equator possessed air of distinct salubrity. Now the island is being recognized as a health resort, somewhat after the style of Cuba in relation to North America. St. Helena is something like 1,200 miles from Cape Town, and twelve-knot


