MISSIONER PREACHES POWERFUL SERMON ON LAST DAY AND HELL

Father Scully Addresses Great Gathering of Men in St. Peter's

"Depart from me, ye cursed, into everlasting fire. This was the keynote of the sermon delivered last evening in St. Peter's church by Rev. Edward Scully, C. S. R., of Toronto, in the men's mission. That there was no reason to doubt the existence of a hell, Rev. Father Scully asserted beyond question. "Only the scold for or those steeped in sin and crime," he said, "doubt that there is a hell, or rather say there is no hell. But there must be such a place for common sense will tell us that, as there is a place of reward for the good, so there must be a place of punishment for the bad. And from the Bible we learn in several passages wherein God spoke of the hereafter with reference to the horrible place of eternal torment, where the damned must suffer for their sins, not for a year, not for a thousand years, but for all eternity. Common sense should tell us, Father Scully continued, that there must be a hell. What is it that troubles us after we have committed a sin? Is it not our conscience stricken with the fear of something to follow in the hereafter if we do not wipe that stain of guilt from our souls by the sacrament of penance? Does it seem in reason that the drunkard who through life has led a wicked, sinful career, and who on his dying bed blasphemes the Maker and scorns the prayers of God who has come to minister unto him in his last agony—does it seem reasonable that he should enjoy the same happiness and blessings when he has departed into the beyond, as the man who on his death-bed can look back upon a life well spent in God's service, and who welcomes the minister of God to aid him prepare to meet the Supreme Judge in the world he is about to enter?"

Will you, who are spending your hard-earned wages in drink, who in your drunken condition commit crimes unmentionable, who scorn the mercy of God—will you hear pronounced upon you upon the last day the pleasing words, "Come ye blessed of my father, enter into the kingdom prepared for you," or would you for a moment expect it? Do you not merit, you drunkard, when you stain your soul with mortal sin in your heathen indulgence in drink, the awful sentence, "Into everlasting fire for all eternity," and could you expect that when you should no inclination to amend your life upon earth and take advantage of God's kindness, that you should be shown any more consideration than your companion in crime who is also damned to Hell for all eternity. But some hardened sinner will say, "Well, I won't be alone in Hell. There will be many others with me." Yes, my dear Catholic men, that is the terrible truth. You who are leading a life of sin and shame, and who die without repentance, you will not be alone in Hell. But who will be your companions? Their presence will be a source of torment to you. You will see about you friends of yours in crime upon earth who will heap curses upon you for having led them into mortal sin, and instead of being a comfort to you to have them with you they will only embitter your agonizing torments when the fires of hell are raging all about you.

And how long must you suffer after you have heard that dreadful sentence? For all eternity, and who can explain to me the meaning of that word? Who knows what eternity is? Or down to the very depths of hell for a brief moment in thought, and call upon Jesus to tell you, tell you, him, who has been in Hell for more than 1800 years, question him in his bitter misery, "How long must you continue to suffer the torments of the damned?" And Jesus will make answer from the boiling pit of fire, "As long as it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end." Go still deeper and ask of Cain, the first murderer, who must be in Hell for thousands of years. Ask of him the same question, and what will he answer come? "As long as it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end."

The drunkard, the impure man, the unjust man, in short, all who die in mortal sin, will bear the same penalty, and according to their sins upon earth, accordingly shall the offending members of their body or their senses be the objects of special torments in the everlasting pains of hell.

Are you going to be one of those, who are listening to me tonight, who will hear the sentence of God upon the last day that awful sentence, "Depart from me into everlasting fire," with all that the sentence implies, or are you intending to amend your life, to give up your favorite passion, to remain away from the bar-room, that home of infamy, that sinful companion, to lead an industrious, sober, christian career, pleasing in the sight of God, so that when the faithful and the unfaithful from the days of Adam to the end of time will have gathered together at the beginning of the world, you will hear pronounced those welcome words: "Enter into the kingdom of thy father, prepared for you and the angels and saints," for all eternity, to enjoy the comforts of the blessed, the happiness of Heaven as it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be, world without end.

ANGLICAN SYNOD FINANCES; OTHER MATTERS OF INTEREST

The quarterly meeting of the Anglican Church Synod boards and committees were finished yesterday. At the executive committee meeting there was an attendance of about twenty-five clergymen and laymen. The bishop presided and Archbishop Raymond held the position of secretary. Archbishop Newham presented a report from the board of missions. The report showed that the finances are in a better state than last year by about \$1,000 but funds are needed as several parishes are temporarily vacant and both men and money are needed.

During the past year the following clergymen who had served in the diocese have passed away: Rev. N. M. Hansen, Rev. R. W. Colson, Rev. W. LeB. McKel, Rev. E. J. A. Francis, Rev. Joseph Smith and Rev. D. C. Haviland. Appointments have lately been made as follows: Rev. H. T. Buckland to Greenwood, Kings county, Rev. J. E. Hand to Grand Falls, Rev. H. Waterton to Ludlow.

The work performed by the student missionaries during their vacation was very much appreciated. The board of finance reported the sale of several lots of land owned by the synod situated on and near Haymarket Square for the sum of \$2,800 to Messrs. Armstrong & Bruce. Satisfactory investments of \$18,500 and \$8,000 respectively had been made by the board.

The board had taken steps whereby it had made the widow of the late J. W. Byles would receive the income during her lifetime of the money bequeathed by him for an ecclesiastical purpose.

The report of the board of education showed that the Robtsey school was in an excellent condition, the attendance being larger than at any time since the institution came under its present management. Improvements are being made in the accommodation provided and the school has an excellent staff.

The Provincial Anglican Synod of Canada, covering the civil provinces of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, will meet in Montreal on Thursday, the 17th of October. MACHINISTS' PAY. The machinists of the city notified their employers yesterday of a request for the establishment of a standard rate of pay of \$3 a day and some minor changes in working conditions. Some of the men are already receiving this amount and some of the employers who have not paid that much have expressed their willingness to do so. The men ask for an answer before the fifteenth of the month.

SMUGGLING DIAMONDS FROM CANADA IS CHARGED

New York, Oct. 4.—As the outcome of information received by the federal authorities relative to the smuggling of diamonds across the Canadian border at Rouss's Point, Herman Sagman, connected with the Jewellery firm of Friedlander and Bartowski, this city, was arraigned before a United States Commissioner and held in \$2,500 bail for the grand jury.

The government charges that Sagman, a reputedly well known smuggler, had worth of diamonds across the border. They have been seized.

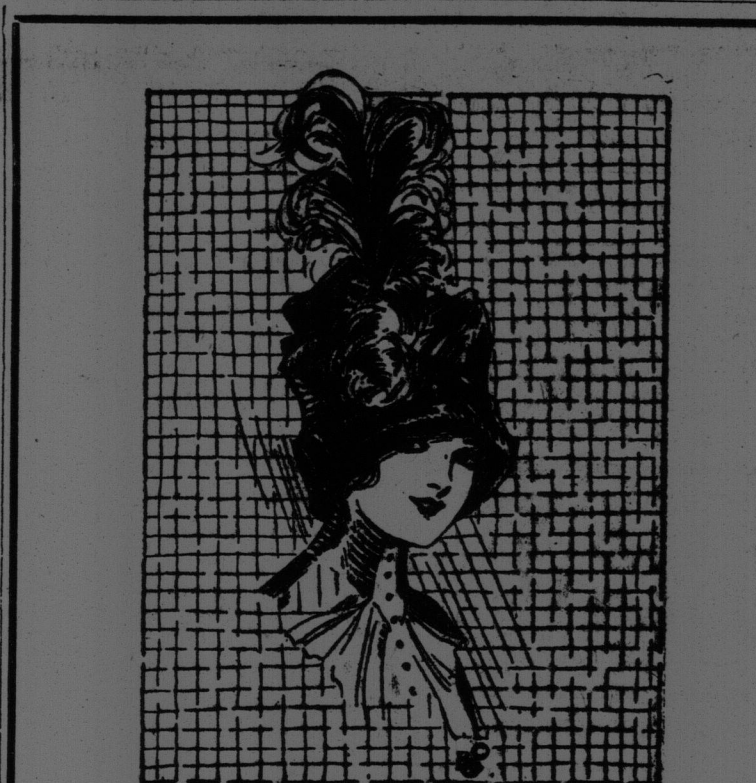

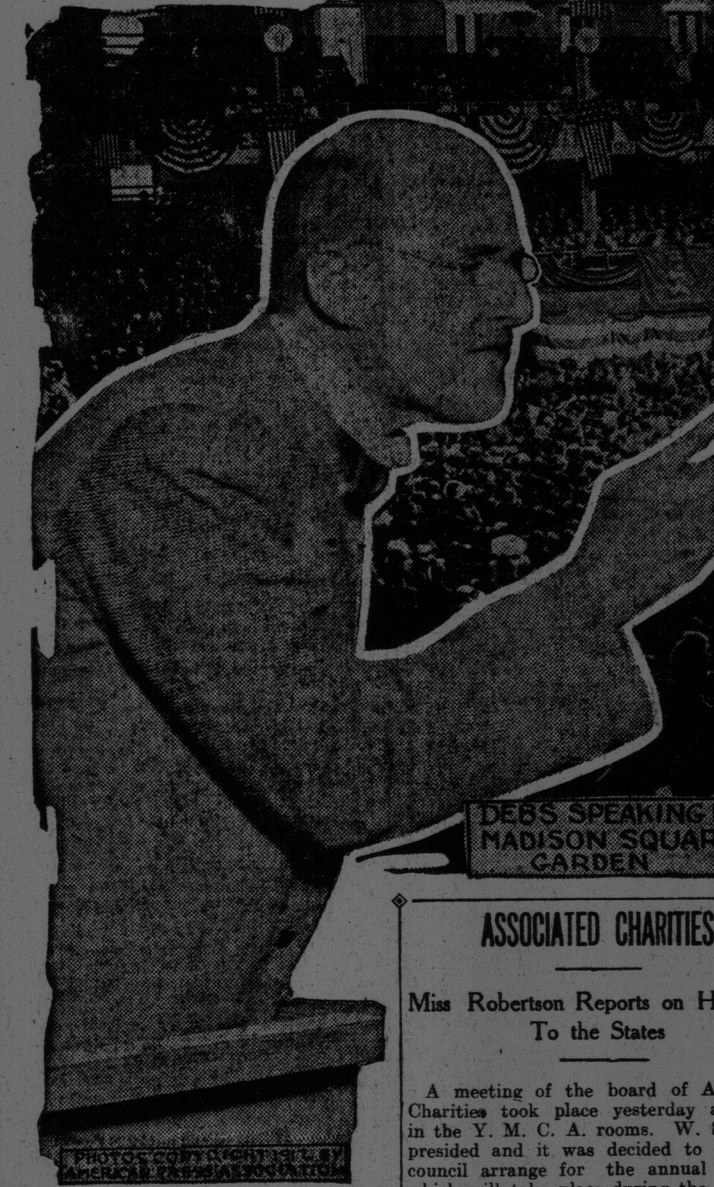

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 3.—Not only evidence of the alleged illegal interstate shipment of dynamite and nitro-glycerine, but also evidence as to what was done with the explosives, will be adduced at the trial of the forty-five men accused of complicity in the "dynamite plot" which wrecked the Los Angeles Times building Oct. 1, 1910, followed the expanding conspiracy in the history of this country, in which during more than five years property of incalculable value had been destroyed and many lives had been lost.

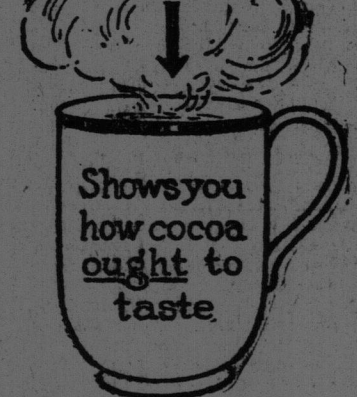
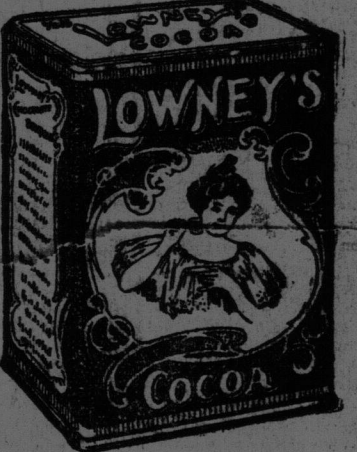
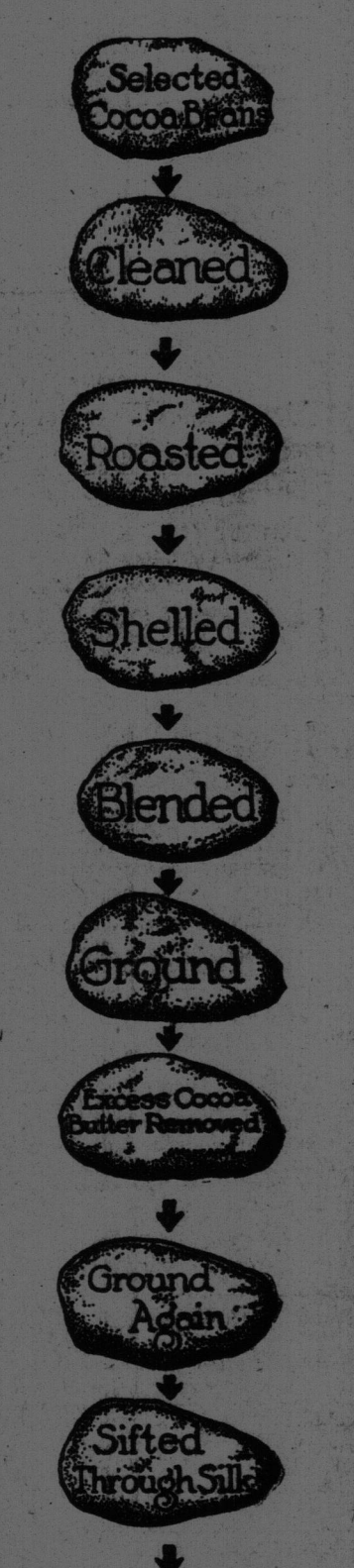

SPEAKER AND DOYLE WIN THE AUTOS

Chicago, Oct. 4.—Tris Speaker, center fielder for the Boston Americans, and Larry Doyle, captain and second baseman of the New York Nationals, are the recipients this year of the automobile awarded annually by a Detroit manufacturer to the two best players adjudged to have been the most useful to their respective teams.

Speaker took part in 130 American league games and in 699 times at bat made 218 hits for a total of 325 bases, scoring 133 runs. On extra base hitting his record shows fifty-two doubles, eleven triples and eleven home runs. He was credited with eight sacrifice hits and stole fifty-three bases for a percentage of 37.

Doyle, batting fifth in the National League, with an average of .255, engaged in 199 games, went to the plate 541 times, scored 100 runs and made 177 hits for a total of 253 bases. He made thirty-one doubles, nine triples and ten homers. He is credited with nine sacrifice hits and thirty-five stolen bases.

The prizes will be presented to the winners during the world's series. Last time the winners were Tom Cobb, of Detroit, and Frank Schulte of the Chicago Nationals.

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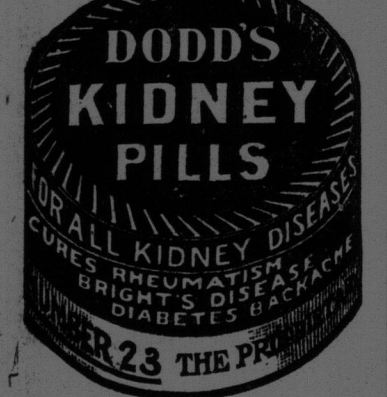

BAROMETER SHOWS BOOM IN ST. JOHN

Bank Clearings Show Increase of 12 1/2 per Cent. in First Ten Months of Year

An increase of twelve and half per cent. in the St. John bank clearings for the first ten months of the year is one of the soundest proofs of improvement in local conditions and of the larger amount of business which is being transacted here.

From January 1 to October 1 the bank clearings totalled \$93,883,072 as compared with \$83,728,238 for the same period last year. This is an increase of \$10,154,834 or 12 1/2 per cent.

While part of the growth may be due to the great amount of construction work which is going on in the way of harbor improvements, etc., the bulk of the increase seems to have come from a natural and steady growth of the business carried on in the city and indicates greater prosperity and better times than St. John has known for years.

LOCAL NEWS

THE MILK PRICE.
The milk dealers in the city have not yet decided to advance the price of milk from seven to eight cents a quart. Some say that an agitation is on foot among the farmers to raise the price to the merchants, but until they take action, the price will remain the same.

B., when Mrs. Daniel Bergine of that place gave birth to a boy who weighed nineteen and a half pounds. It has a healthy appearance and both the youngster and the mother are doing well. Mrs. Bergine was attended by Dr. Keith of Harvey Junction.

LIKELY FINISH TODAY.
When hearing in the case of Elizabeth McCowan and Mary R. Warner was continued in the circuit court this morning. Mr. Mallin K. C. for the plaintiff resumed his address to the jury. Mr. Taylor for the defendant, then commenced his address, and at one o'clock adjournment was made until this afternoon. The case will likely be finished today.

ARE BACK AT WORK.
The messenger service of the Western Union Telegraph Company, was somewhat discontinued on Wednesday and for a time some of the boys threatened to go out on strike. One of them had a misunderstanding with the boss, and the other boys stood by their companion and said that they would go out if their fellow employees were discharged. Matters were smoothed over, however, and the boys are back on the job.

IS CARLETON LAD.
Local friends were pleased today to learn that the scholarship for St. John county at the University of New Brunswick has been won by a Carleton boy, C. Leonard Emerson, son of John Emerson of Watson street, west end. He graduated from the local high school a year ago and in his examinations for entrance to the university made excellent marks. He is about sixteen years of age and has had a good school record.

BOXES ON SIDEWALK.
H. G. Marr, reported for obstructing the sidewalk in Union street with boxes, admitted having the boxes in the street, but said that he was doing the best he could to have them removed when a policeman came along and reported him. He told the court that he would donate \$1,000 to any charitable institution in St. John if anyone could get the boxes off the street any quicker than he did on the day he was reported. A fine of \$2 was struck against him.


