PRESENCE OF MIND.

After receiving his rents Lord C. was in the habit of retiring with his steward to his study; and there after settling his accounts, of depositing the money in his strong box.

The next day, when the steward was sent with it to the bank, this man had lived with his lord's father, and was beloved by the family that they placed implicit confidence in his integrity and worth.

For some time the banker's book, and upon reference to his private account found that the sum they credited him was always short of that he sent. This being continued, led to severe investigations; but no result came out, satisfied him how the deficiency could happen. Some of the servants came under his displeasure, and they were at various periods dismissed.

On one particular day he placed the money in a different room, still having for his confidence the old steward, who of course joined with his lord in regretting his late losses. On the same night the housemaid went to this room to see that the shutters were safe; and recollecting that she had to clean it out very early, she thought it not worth while to go to bed, but determined to lay herself down and sleep on the sofa.

She did so, and not long after she awoke with a noise at the door, and she was just going to start up and ring the bell, thinking it was thieves, when it slowly opened and in walked the old steward. He looked cautiously around and hesitated; but seeing no object went to the escritoire, where his lord had locked his rents up—after opening the lock, he took out what he pleased—and then he looked at the document, was going out, when the reflection of the candle upon the servant's clothes caught his eye. He started; but he might be asleep, and his transgressions not witnessed.

To be assured of this he went to the sofa, and dashed the candle back and forwards before her eyes. The girl lay still. He put his hand into his pocket, drew out a clasp knife, and opened it. He then put it to the door—did not see it across and across it—till she could feel the edge almost at her.

She was now aware that silence could murder her life; if she moved he would murder her. She had presence of mind to the still as death. Satisfied after this terrible trial that she must be fast asleep, he closed the knife and walked out of the room.

The astonished old maid still lay there with her footsteped die away; and then she rushed to the chamber of her lord, and awakened him, she detailed the whole of the scene, begging his lordship to satisfy himself of the truth. She had no sooner told her story than she fainted. Lord C. hardly credited her; but he arose, leaving lady C. to the care of the girl; and after raising up his valet and other servants, proceeded to search for the steward.

His apartments being in a different wing of the house, they looked all about, and then cautiously made their way to his room. One of the men climbed up to the window and saw the old man counting money. He descended and told this, and then they rushed into the room, and before the thief could hide his prize, he had him prisoner. His Lordship identified the bank notes upon him, and he was going out, then he was examined and sent to prison.

Afraid of being executed, and dreading to see his injured lord and various other gentlemen who had placed confidence in him, he put an end to his life, by cutting his own throat; not before he left a letter detailing the sums he had purloined, and where his master could find them. Justice being frustrated by his not being taken an example of, his Lordship was not sorry to be spared accusing his old and dishonest faithful servant, and the whole was hushed up as much as possible.

We return to the poor girl. After a great deal of care, she recovered so as again to repeat before the steward her evidence; but when she came to that part where the knife touched her throat, the horror of the circumstances threw her into convulsions, and she went mad.

The Steam Furnace Niagara.

The New York Tribune contains the following account of the new Steam Furnace Niagara.

The new Steam Furnace Niagara, which was to be used in the manufacture of gunpowder, has been erected by the great Atlantic and Pacific Iron Works.

The boiler is of iron cast, varying in width and thickness from 22 inches at the top to 20 inches at the bottom. The length is 300 feet, and the diameter is 24 inches. It is supported on four cast-iron columns, each 22 inches in diameter, and 20 feet high. The boiler is surrounded by a brick chimney, and is connected to a large horizontal cylinder of 1,000 horse power, which is used for the purpose of driving the machinery.

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FROM OUR LONDON CORRESPONDENT.

London, Friday, 17th, 1857.

One or two estimates come in from Ireland, but we can not estimate with tolerable accuracy the composition of the new House of Commons. One account makes the number of Liberals 309, of Conservatives 275, this calculation embracing the double returns from Kentingtonshire, where the two candidates have polled the same number of votes, and consequently there must be a new election when the House meets. Among the 275 Conservatives, we would be of a doubtful complexion, men who are likely to vote with the Ministers as well as the opposition. All things considered therefore, the liberal party must have a triumphant majority in the coming session. Another classification is as follows:—Palmerstonian, 274; Derbyites, 229; Reformers, 91; Liberal Conservatives, 46. From this list it is evident that "the stipulation of parties" is not free, and that a coalition between the Opposition, the Reformers and the Liberal Conservatives would, as heretofore, be the Ministry. This, however, is a contingency which is not likely to arise upon any question connected with domestic policy. One singular fact is the number of new faces that will be seen in, and of old faces that will be missed from St. Stephen's. There have been 180 from members elected, and as the speaker will be new to his duties, there cannot fail to be at first starting, something of freshness and novelty in the proceedings.

As regards the Speakership, many envious eyes are turned in that direction, but a new candidate, whose name has been mentioned before, is now in the field, and will, it is thought, be nominated as the government man. Mr. J. Evelyn Denison, not to be confounded with Mr. Beckford Denison, is the lucky fellow destined apparently to receive the £5,000 per annum, to live in the splendid residence provided in the Palace of Westminster, and to enjoy the future pension and perquisites. Mr. Denison formerly represented Malton, and now sits for North Nottinghamshire. He is 57 years old, is tall and good-looking, has a fine presence, and a loud sonorous voice, which will inspire awe in all the young men from the country who hear him for the first time cry "order at the bar!"

Talking of birds, it may be interesting to many to know that Madame Otto Goldschmidt (Jenny Lind) presented her husband with a girl at Dresden, on the 31st ult.

An anecdote of the Grand Duke, the celebrated General Dabedien, the defender of Sebastopol, is now in Paris, and will shortly visit London, where he is to be entertained at a grand banquet by the officers of our engineers. An interesting conversation is reported to have taken place between the General and the Emperor at the Tuileries. The question was put to Dabedien—could the French and English have taken Sebastopol had they marched straight upon after the battle of the Alma? To which the reply was there could be no doubt of it as there were but two or three battalions in the place at the time. So much for this episode in the Crimean campaign. To descend from great warriors to small, we notice that Lieut. Fretz, of Windsor, and his wife, who have embraced the stage as a profession, and recently appeared in Melbourne in London Assurance. The price was one in which he was probably well able to shine.

Private letters from France inform us that there is much disturbance in Paris. There has been an attempt, or a projected attempt to assassinate the Emperor. This was alluded to by the Morning Advertiser this week, and information dropped, while other journals had no information on the matter. From all we can gather it would seem that some of the refugees here give information of an attempt on having occurred, which was meant to occur, but was anticipated by the vigilance of the French police. There was a plot, and some French gentlemen, hoping it would succeed, announced it accordingly. Be this as it may it is quite certain that a very large number of persons have been arrested in Paris within a few days, and there is excitement.

London, April 24.—The rumours which gave out that parliament would not assemble until the middle of May are silenced by Mr. Hayter's circular, announcing that the 10th of May will be closed on the 30th inst., the very day on which the writs are made returnable. This circular confirms (if confirmation were necessary) the fact of Mr. Evelyn Denison's candidature, and government support. After the Speaker is elected and approved of by the Queen, the swearing-in of members commences, which will occupy a week. The 7th of May is fixed upon for the Royal Speech, and it is just possible, though unlikely, that the members may have recovered sufficiently to allow of his addressing the assembled Lords and Commons in person, instead of through the mouth of her Lord Chancellor. Conventions have strengthened that Lord Palmerston will not resign his office until the end of the year. By the time the members are sworn and have settled down to their work the Whitsunday holidays will intervene, and will put a stop to business for a time. What chance, then, is there of a Reform bill being introduced at the end of May? It is said, however, that should the Premier not of his own motion, announce that he will next session bring forward such a bill, Lord John Russell will be prepared with a motion declaratory of the opinion of the House that the franchise should be extended. To prevent defeat this must be accepted by the ministry, who will then be pledged for 1858 at any rate. But one statement now made is that the Cabinet have determined upon administrative and social reform, will have nothing to do with any Reform bill, and some arrangements must be made in the minor ministerial offices. The four members of the government who were thrown out at the late election will be probably either resign, or Mr. Peel, it is reported, will have the borough of Colas, the hero Kars, Sir W. F. Williams, who will not yet have achieved any parliamentary victories, who in fact during the last debate made rather a lamentable exhibition, retiring in his favor. Mr. Admiral Berkeley, Viscount Monk, and Mr. Ball will be not known.

The money market is rather easier, and the Barings have taken advantage of this to launch the Russian Railway scheme, of which they are the English agents. But some singular disclosures have been made of attempts to buy subscribers (these practices having their origin on the Continent) by putting respectable persons as decoy ducks, and the English dealers are consequently very shy of the whole affair.
