THE AMERICAN RUSH ACROSS THE BORDER—VALUE OF SUCH SETTLERS—WELCOME INVASION

This article is from a special Winnipeg correspondent of the Daily Mail, London, England: The American immigration into Canada, because of its increasing volume and the aggressive character of the people, has aroused misgivings in many quarters.

A conservative estimate of the value of the stock and cash which the immigrants from the United States will bring with them this year places the amount at over £14,000,000; but Mr. Bruce Walker, the Commissioner of Immigration, believes it will even run as high as £20,000,000.

A little incident here a few days ago illustrated one class of home-seekers who are coming from the south. An old Idaho farmer walked into the immigration office and, after declaring that he was a stranger, knowing nothing of Canadian banks or of Canadian people, "I reckon, though," he added, "I wish you would take charge of my old wallet until I get my claim located."

The Americans spend their money freely where they intend to make their homes. To use one of their slang expressions, the believe in "getting in right."

Is it any wonder then, that the American immigrants are welcomed by those interested in the development of Canada? It is not necessary to provide them with seed grain or food when they come from the States, as in the case of immigrants from other countries.

During the current year the total immigration to Canada is estimated at 200,000, of which number about 70,000 came from the United States and nearly 75,000 from the British Isles.

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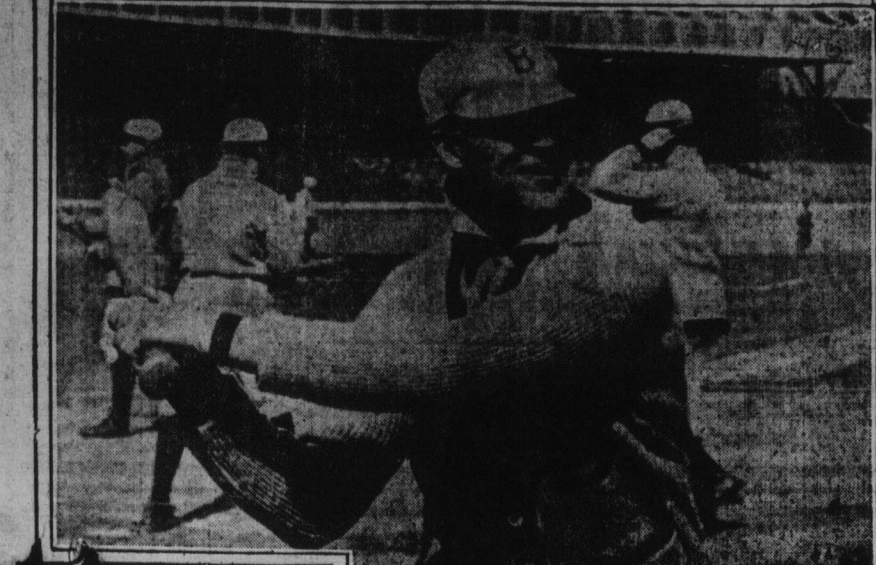

When interviewed at the Royal Hotel last night by a Standard reporter Mr. Hebert stated that he had spent the day at St. Andrews where he had conferred with Lady Tilley who expressed herself as delighted with the model. The pose and expression given the figure she considered most striking and the likeness as lifelike.

The right hand is thrust within the breast of the coat, the left which holds a rolled manuscript is raised, the gesture being one which might be employed in the delivery of a speech. The whole figure represents Sir Leonard in an attitude characteristic of the dead statesman.

Murray and Gregory received by far the greater portion of the logs rafted down river during the week. Their quota was 1813 joints. Randolph and Baker got 387 joints; A. Cushing and Co., 691; Stetson, Cutler and Co., 679; Hillyard Bros., 150; Charles Miller, 292 and John E. Moore, 75.
