Vessel Had Canadians on Board and Number Missing ----Only American on Steamer Saved---Many Other Vessels Sunk by Germans.

> Strange Vessel Resembling Submarine Sighted by Tugboat off Marblehead, Mass.-Thought Possibly Vessel was German Undersea Piratical Craft.

The ruthless German submarine warfare continues unabated. The despatches indicate that at least fifteen additional vessels have been torpedoed, including the big armored Anchor line steamer California, which went down off the Irish coast with some of her passengers and crew Quite a number of Canadians were on board.

A strange craft, possibly a German submarine has been sighted off the Massachusetts coast.

Germany is destroying British tonnage at rate of 8,000 tons daily, or 3,000,000 tons annually. At that rate it would take seven years to wipe out the English merchant marine of approximately 21,000,000 tons. It is evident that Germany has practically declared war on neutrals, for the latest submarine sinkings the neutral tonnage loss is just about onehalf of the entire loss. It is suggested that if the neutrals arm their ships the losses may be smaller .. As it now is they are absolutely help-

Entente Determined to Terminate War by End of Summer -Canadians Again Cover Themselves with Glory and Honor.


London, Feb. 7 .- "As a result of our continuous pressure on both banks of the Ancre river, the enemy has been forced to evacuate the village of Grandecourt, which is now entirely in our possession," says the British official communication, issued this evening, "together with a defensive work adjoining it. We secured a few prisoners. During the operations of the last few days the enemy suffered heavy

losses in the neighborhood. "A hostile raid attempted during the night in the neighborhood of Gueudecourt broke down under our barrage. Early last night we entered the enemy's lines south-west of Labassee and killed a number of Germans and destroyed several dugouts; we took a few prisoners.

Artillery Activity. "The mutual artillery activity was most marked north of the Somme, in the neighborhood of Courcelete, and between Armentieres and Ypres. Eff fective counter-battery work was car-ried out by us during the day at a number of places on our front. "Bombing operations by our air-planes continued yesterday with suc-cess. Gentlemen:—
We have the honor to place before you our Report for the financial year
1916, and to submit the accounts for your approval.
We have no doubt that the Profitand Loss Account and the figures of the Annual Statement are satisfactory to you. In 1910 the Bank's assets amounted to Nine Millions, today they exceed Eighteen Million Dollars, while its obligations to the public, deposit, etc., reach the sum of Sixteen Million Six Hundred Thousand Dollars, being an increase of more than Four Million Pollars over last year.
Following the prudent course of which you have always approved, and in order readily to meet all demands, your Directors have endeavored to maintain the different items of the Bank's assets in the highest degree of liquidity and to have as large an amount of cash on hand as possible; the liquid assets appearing in the statement, amounting to over Eleven Million Dollars, are proof of this. This method of administration is of considerable advantage and deserves the public confidence shown by the constant and notable increase in deposits made with the Bank.
Like all other banks in Canada during the last year, your Bank has been called upon to purchase Dominion Treasury Bonds in connection with the Imperial Munitions Loan, and its subscriptions amount in all to the sum of (\$2.440,000) two million four hundred and forty thousand dollars. The net profits earned (\$203,823.31) two hundred and three thousand ine hundred and eighty-three dollars and eighty-one cents, amount to more than twenty per cent. of the paid-up capital, showing the profits that the management has been able to realize from the increased deposits. Thanks are due to the public, and particularly to the depositors for the confidence manifested in the Bank.

are due to the public, and particularly to the depositors for the confidence manifested in the Bank. From the profits of the year fifty thousand dollars have been added to the Reserve, which now amounts to seven hundred thousand dollars; there has also been reserved a sum of twenty-dive thousand dollars to create a Pension Fund for the Bank's officers and employes. We are convinced as to the correctness of this course, because you will feel as we do that there is an obligation on the part of every fivportant institution to recognize the faithful and valuable service of employes whose life-occupation is given ex-clusively to it. It is therefore a duty henceforward to contribute our share for the support of the Bank's employes in their oid age. During the past year five thousand dollars was subscribed to the Patriotic Fund, and we are confident you will approve of this contribution in the light of national duty. Finally, a sum of sixteen thousand dollars was written off the cost of fur-niture, bank premises and other real estate of the Bank; this is a measure of prudence adopted by all banks. The Bank has now eighty-see franches, fourteen of which are in the City of Montreal and sixty-seven in the cities, towns and villages of the Provinces of Quebec, Ontario and New Brunswick. Nine new offices were opened during the course of last year, at Brownsburg, Fraserville, Gentiliy, in the Province of Ontario, and at Bathurst and Norton in the Pro-vince of New Brunswick. We closed three offices last year. The head office and all the branch offices were visited by the Inspec-tions of New Brunswick.

The head office and all the branch offices were visited by the Inspec-tors during the year, and a special report as to each office was made to the Directors. Moreover, as required by law, the two Auditors named by the Shareholders at the last meeting, Messrs, J. A. Larue and Alexandre Des-marteau, have examined and compared the Annual Statement with the hooks of the Head Office and the certified reports of the Branch offices. The copy of their certificate, forming part of the present report, expresses their entire satisfaction as to the business of the Bank. Notwithstanding the succession of extraordinary events since the war troke out, the year 1916 like the preceding year must be considered on the whole as quite satisfactory, from an agricultural, commercial and industrial point of view. The period of high prices through which we are passing is exceptionally favorable to the farmers; our foreign trade has never been better, exports exceeding all anticipations, our industries are most pros-perous, and labor is well faid.
