THE NORTH WEST.

A RATHER important announcement has been made by the Minister of the Interior with reference to the North West lands and southern reserve lying between the Canada Pacific Railway belt and the International boundary, consisting of some five millions of acres withdrawn from settlement in July of last year.

The town lots at Regina, which fell within the tract to be opened, are to be sold at public auction in April next, at a upset price of \$5 per acre, and are to be sold at time of sale.

Soudan.

HOW THE MAHDI BEGAN HIS WAR ON THE EGYPTIAN GOVERNMENT.

Five years ago the Arab Chief now known as El Mahdi, a native of the North Africa with a web of Moslem Fraternity, withdrew himself from his followers and became a hermit, thus seeking to involve his very existence in mystery.

THE HEREBLION.

The first active rebellion broke out on the 12th of August, 1881, at the Island of Abba. On this occasion, thanks to the incredible stupidity of the British troops, the Egyptian troops who were sent to arrest the Mahdi not only failed in their object, but lost 120 men.

THE SICKENED ONE'S PREDICTION.

The Vienna Press publishes a recent letter from Major Seckendorff, who was with Hicks Pasha and his 10,000 men when they were annihilated. In the letter he writes that the Egyptian army was completely defeated, and the loss of 8,600 men and all his guns.

AN UNFOUNDED REPORT.

CAIRO, Nov. 28.—The report of the capture of Khartoum by El Mahdi is unfounded. Most of the Turkish officers detailed to accompany Baker Pasha to the Soudan have consented to go.

PARIS, Nov. 28.—There is great agitation among the natives in Algeria.

THE FIELD OF OPERATIONS.

The region now in successful rebellion extends from the first cataract of the Nile, in about latitude 24 deg. north, to the Equator. This whole region of Northern and Eastern Africa, with the exception of Abyssinia, is nothing but a desert.

THE SITUATION NOW.

Speaking with a thorough knowledge of this country, it may be said authoritatively that the course remained open to the Egyptian troops, or such of them as survive, and that is precipitate flight and an effort to escape to Abyssinia.

THE THREATENED TOWN.

Khartoum, which has been placed in imminent danger by the success of the False Prophet, is now in jeopardy. Some forty thousand inhabitants, made up of Berbers, Soudan negroes, Bishareen and other Arabs, are fleeing from lower Egypt and are flocking to Khartoum.

EL MAHDI'S ADHERENTS.

The city has been threatened by the False Prophet since October of last year, and preparations were made to meet him by throwing up forts and digging a ditch around the town.

THE DEATH OF CHAS. F. WETMORE.

The death is announced, at Fredericton, at the advanced age of 85 years, of Charles F. Wetmore, Esq., late Clerk of the Assembly of this Province.

Dr. Talmage on Evacuation Day.

Will you allow me space in your wide-spread paper to say a few words with reference to something I saw in your issue of the 14th Nov., headed, Maple Green, concerning diphtheria in our settlement last September. It is a pity that I have never heard the reality of the case that might give it credence, am bound to contradict part and rectify some of its statements. My wife and four children were taken by the disease, and I am glad to say they were not so forsaken as your correspondent represented them to have been. Besides being supplied freely with whiskey by an illegitimate trader, I was brought home close by what I called the "Bible," the Medical Dr., when wanted, and going two and three times daily to the hospital, I was able to receive every assistance possible. Your writer informed the public that "one of her children sickened when the whole family was in the hospital, and she died within a short time of each other. If the coffin was in the house before the child was dead, it was the poor terrified mother's prayer that she might be ordered her to have it coffined and buried as quickly as possible after its death, to better secure the recovery of the others, as he pronounced it diphtheria of the worst form. The writing of such pieces is surely not going to become an epidemic for I see in your same paper, where the Rev. J. C. Quinn, of Bathurst, corrected some errors published, concerning his church affairs. Now my opinion is, that there are some individuals who will place their own private correction if they don't turn a new leaf shortly.
