### Sailors Roasted In Alcohol Fire.

An Explosion on U. S. Cruiser Olympia Kills Two and Injures Others.

Lieut. Commander Van Dozer, executive officer of the cruiser Olympia today gave out an official statement of the facts attending the explosion of a barrel of alcohol at Notre Dame Hospital. on the cruiser's deck last night, Yerkes, U. S. M. C. of Philadelphia, and of Apprentice Seifert, and the serious injury of Third-Class-Master-at-Arms Caster and Apprentice Shavey. The explosion resulted indirectly from the smuggling of alcohol into the navy yard He was discovered and brought to by members of the cruiser's crew. Lieut.-Commander Van Dozer

"The entire crew of the Olympia were returning aboard after forty hours shore liberty, when a five gallon water breaker full of alcohol was discovered in the forward turret. The executive officer at once ordered a thorough search of the ship and yard in her vicinity. Between two of the boats two men were discovered, with a full barrel of alcohol. It was, by order, carried aboard the Olympia, to be emptied into the alcohol tank on the aft deck.

"This tank being full the barrel was carried forward by Corporal Yerkes' Seifert, Shavey and Caster. In the meantime the crew was called to quarters and every man accounted for.

t of Prison With Joy After Long Terms, They Soon Find Themselves Back Again -A Burglar's Story That May Have More han a Germ of Truth in It-Society's Doing and Undoing.

The guards of the Kingston Penitentiary say that the emotion be-trayed by men who have just com-pleted 'long terms is betrayed by throwing up their hats for pure joy and shouting on reaching the big outside gate.

In some cases the very men, who, after a cell experience of fifteen or twenty years, and the most profound protestations of good resolutions, are under arrest in a few months again for similar offences, writes G.C. Porter in Toronto Sunday World. Not infrequently they are returned to this prison. Then they tell the guards they are glad to get back; that they were unable to earn a living honestly on the outside; that they had been so long immured that they could so long immured that they could not compete with the world of which they had not been a part for so long. Here is a typical experience, as related by a man who had spent 11
years of a 15-years' sentence for
shooting a man while robbing his

"I was 37 years of age when I was released; could read, write and had a common school education. I
h. ' pan ical knowledge of boilermaking. This I had acquired in the prison. A young man when I enter-ed prison, I had resolved to starve before I would live a criminal life when released. My early training had not been good, and I had become burglar before I was 18. I first rob-bed drunken men around saloons and then began bolder work. It was in trying to escape from a residence one night I shot a man. He would have killed me had I not fired. I believe this is the rule with burglars—not to shoot to avoid arrest, but to use revolver when their victim is about t. Anyway, that was my left the prison in the winter with \$15, a ticket to Windsor. was well clothed, but did not have an overcoat. My first thought was to go to the far west, change my name and apply for work, I stopped in Kingston at a cheap boarding house. While looking around I secured work for two weeks in the local discharged convict, but they needed men. Attal as soon as the rush was over, I was discharged. Concluding to cross into the States, where I was to cross into the States, where I was less likely to meet police officers who knew me, I sold my ticket for \$4. I went to Syracuse, N. Y. I had \$14 when I got there. The first week I got a position paying \$2.75 a day in the car shops, operating a nut and bolt machine. I got along well. My boss asked me where I had worked before employing me. I had a story all prepared.

### THE ARTIST AND WIT

ECCENTRIC OF ECCENTRICS WAS THE LATE J. A. M'NEIL WHISTLER.

A Three-Ring Circus, as Artist, Wit and Mountebank He Enjoyed Equal Fame -A Student in Trilby's Time-The Master Lithographer-Sued Ruskin for Libel-His "The Gentle Art of Making

James Abbott McNeil Whistler, who died in London the other day, was a remarkable character. He was a chree-ring circus. As an artist, a wit and a mountebank he enjoyed equal fame. He dazzled bystanders, so that few of them to-day are able to tell much about Whistler, the man. Everything about him was apparently external. His art, instead parently external. His art, instead of revealing the man, concealed it, or rather what his art revealed his actions denied. In studying him one realizes the pathetic truth in the story of the tourist who couldn't see the forest for the trees. This is how it is with Whistler. Studied in "irilby's" Time.

Like other people, he was born in a certain year, of certain parents, at a certain place, the year 1834, and Lowell, Mass., having been used by him for this purpose. His early objection was acquired at West Point, where he went a mere boy. Before entering the Military College he had decided to become an artist. THE SOMALILAND MESS.

Uninviting Task of Winding It Up Has Been Given to Gen. Egerton.

Major-General Sir Charles Comyn Egerton, K.C.B., D.S.O., who has been given the uninviting task of winding up the Somaliland mess, is fitty-five years of age, and is a member of an old Cheshire family, the Grey-Egertons, of Egerton and Outton, of which Sir Philip Grey-Egerton is the head. Born in 1848, General Egerton joined the 31st Foot as an ensign in 1867. In 1871 he exchanged into the Bengal Staff Corps and he saw his first active service during the Afghan War of 1880. He took part in the famous march to Kandahar and in the battle of Sep-Been Given to Gen. Egerton Kandahar and in the battle of September 1st, being mentioned in despatches. Eight years afterwards he began a long experience of frontier scrimmaging in the Hazara expedi-tion of 1888, in which he was again mentioned. In 1891 he did good work in the second Hazara expedition, and in two campaigns against the Miranzai, in which he received a severe wound and won the D. S. O. Three years later he commanded column in the operations against the Waziri. In 1896 he was selected for the difficult duty of commandant of the Indian contingent at Suakim, during Kitchener's expedition, which during Kitchener's expedition, which ended in the occupation of the Dongela province. During the Tirah campaign of 1897-8 he commanded the 1st Brigade of the Tochi Field Force, and in April, 1899, was appointed to a first-class command in the Punjab. army. A Novel Kite Competition. An interesting competition is to be carried out under the auspices of the Aeronautical Society of Great Brit-tain, to ascertain the maximum height to which it is possible to fly kites. The trials will take place on the Sussex Downs. The contest is of an international character, so as to obtain considerable data relative to the utility of kites for meteoro-logical operations, and the best type of kites with which to attain high altitudes. There is no stipulation regarding the size of the kites, but only single kites must be employed, and a height of 3,000 feet is fixed as the minimum. The duration of as the minimum. The duration of flight must be one hour. Each kite will carry a weight of two pounds to represent scientific instruments. Several enthusiastic kite flyers have Several enthusiastic kite hyers have decided to participate in the contest. Various materials in the manufacture of the kites will be employed. Most of them will be made of canvas, but one will be flown constructed of alominum. This is a decided novelty, but it is anticipated that it will work satisfactorily. The that it will work satisfactorily. The string is steel wire wound upon a big reel, and weighing fifteen pounds to the mile, so that at an elevation of 15,840 feet the kite will have to support a weight of 45 pounds. There will also be an exhibition flight by Mr. Patrick Alexander of almost every kind of kite used by man, inclusive of the Japanese and Chinese. In the event of there being insufficient wind to lift the kites from a stationary position, it is proposed to employ motor cars to give them a flying start, in precisely the them a flying start, in precisely the same manuer in which a boy runs, dragging his kite behind him in order to obtain sufficient atmospheric resistance to cause the kite to rice.

Watering Plants. Watering is an exacting labor, and yet half of it is usually unnecessary. The reasons why it is unnecessary are two—the soil is so shallowly prepared that the roots do not strike deep enough; we waste the moisture by allowing the soil to become hard, thereby setting up capillary connection with the atmosphere and letting the water escape.

See how moist the soil is in spring.

Mulch it so that the moisture will not evaporate. Mulch it with a garden rake, by keeping the soil loose and dry on top. This loose, dry soil is the mulch. There will be the moisture underneath. Save water rather than add it. Then when you do have to water the plants go at it as if you meant it. Do not dribble. Wet the soil clear through. Wet it at dusk or in cloudy weather. Before the hot sun strikes it renew your mulch or supply a mulch of fine litter. More plants are spoiled by sprinkling than by drought. Bear in mind that watering is only a special practice; the general practice to so fit and maintain the ground that the plants will not need watering .-Country Life In America.


