## BAN ON EXPORT OF PULP WOOD NOT LIKED

Uncle Sam Will Endeavor to Retaliate By Increasing Pulp Duty.

### AMENDMENT IN SENATE

A Washington despatch to the Boston Transcript says—  
This country will be prepared to meet the move made by Canada looking to the prohibition of the exportation of her logs into the United States, if the amendment suggested by the Committee on Finance to the wood pulp paragraph of the tariff bill shall be agreed to. As soon as the Senate had for the time disposed of the income tax question at the beginning of today's session, Senator Aldrich presented the committee's amendment on pulp. The House bill provides a graduated scale of duty for the various kinds of pulp when imported from countries making an export charge but admits free of duty mechanically ground pulp coming from a country in which no charge is made. The Senate substitute accepted the House provisions, but adds a proviso, intended to be a response to the recently announced decision of Canada not to permit the further exportation of logs from that country, the evident intention being to compel the manufacture of such logs in the region of their origin. Following is the text of the committee's proviso:  
That in case any country, dependency, province or sub-division thereof, shall forbid directly or indirectly the exportation of any wood pulp, logs or wood for use in the manufacture of wood pulp, an additional duty equal to the rates of duties imposed by this paragraph upon wood pulp shall be imposed upon any wood pulp imported from such a country or dependency.  
The amendment was not pressed at the time it was presented as several senators expressed a desire for time to give it consideration before voting on it. Senator Clark briefly expressed the opinion that the retaliatory restrictions proposed by the amendment would unfavorably affect the United States by causing a higher price of paper. Mr. Aldrich declared that the proviso was only intended to apply a higher duty on paper exported from Canada to the United States in case that country should forbid the exportation of logs and wood pulp. "We simply say to the people of Canada," he said, "if you refuse to allow logs or wood pulp to be sent to the United States and still would send the products of them here you will have to pay a little higher duty."

## THE MYSTERY OF THE DEATH OF ELSIE SEIGEL STILL LEADING TOPIC

Many New Developments in the Case But the Murder is Still Among The Missing.

### THREATENING LETTERS.

NEW YORK, June 24—Rumors and conjectures as to the whereabouts of Leon Ling, who is sought by the detectives in charge of the Elsie Seigel case, continuing in abundance today. White District Attorney Jerome considers this case extremely simple, there are many who look upon it as one of the most mysterious ever brought to light. The theory of Quee Yick Wen, that the girl had died from an overdose of chloroform administered by Leon cannot be confirmed, as the landlubber, which his roommate, Chung Sing, declares he saw over her mouth, has disappeared. The finding of the two letters written by Leon to Chu Gai, whom he regarded as his rival in the affections of the Seigel girl, in which Leon threatens the life of both Chu Gai and the young woman, is the best evidence obtainable as yet to show the motive of the crime. The actual text of these letters has not been revealed, but it is known that in them Chu Gai is threatened with violent death unless he discontinues his attentions to Miss Seigel. Chu Gai has also said that his own brother brought him oral warning emanating from Leon that he must cease his visits at the Seigel home and that on one occasion when he called at the home of the young woman, Leon, who was already there, left the house in a passion.

## FRENCH NAVY IS IN ROTTEN STATE

Parliamentary Commission Finds Gens on Battleship Obsolete.

### NO AMMUNITION.

PARIS, June 22—The report of the parliamentary commission which investigated the naval scandal in France has been turned in. It is a scathing condemnation of the naval administration for the past ten years and it makes an astounding exposure of the deplorable condition of the fleet for which France has spent \$700,000,000 since 1899.

The 350 pages of the report are filled with details of the inefficiency resulting from confusion and red tape conditions that make French naval construction cost twenty five per cent more than English or German. As an evidence of these methods it is pointed out that cast iron shells of large caliber, condemned after the accident to the battleship Iena, continued to be manufactured in larger quantities than ever for two whole years. The Patrie, the Republic and other sheets of this class were equipped with secondary guns of a model of 1885 instead of 1902 as the specifications required. Neither the ammunition nor the guns for the six ships of the Danton type, to be completed in 1912, will be ready before 1914 and France has not a single dry dock capable of accommodating these vessels when they are finished.

Perhaps the gravest feature of the exposure is the lack of reserve coal and ammunition supplies, the various ports and arsenals. One officer testified before the commission that at the end of a naval battle of six hours the ship would find it impossible to replenish and would be virtually out of commission.

The commission recommends the complete reorganization of the department, the elimination of red tape and the distribution of responsibility. It insists especially upon the creation of a department of construction, and equipment entirely separate from the general staff.



 prived of his liberty for three months,
