## COUNCIL MEETING ON TUESDAY EVENING

### Delegations Heard Before Council. Grants Given Recruiting Committee and Town Band

A meeting of the town council was held on Tuesday evening in the council chambers. His Worship Mayor Andrew presiding. Councillors present were Messrs. Goss, Ellsworth, Miller, Quins, Patterson, and Alexander.  
 The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.  
 On motion Mr. W. J. McNeil was heard before the council. Mr. McNeil desired to place before the council the position of tenants on the Christopher property in Ward 3, who had been without water since last Friday morning. Up till this time the residents had been getting water from a free tap, but this had now been taken away, and as he could get no satisfaction from the town engineer, he wished to bring the matter to the attention of the council.  
 Councillor Alexander stated that the people in this neighbourhood had been getting water from a free tap up till last Friday, but the valve and apparatus had been broken and was not yet repaired. This tap had been broken several times and during the last two years had cost something in the neighbourhood of \$80.00 for repairs. He wanted the matter to come before the council as the town was deriving no benefit from this and the breakages were costly.  
 Councillor Goss thought the tap should be fixed as it was unfair to the other people in this district to keep them without water because one person was malicious.  
 Councillor Patterson asked how many houses would be affected by this shutting off and suggested that a small fee be charged to each one to cover the costs of repairing.  
 Mr. McNeil offered to find out who would be willing to pay and how much and inform Councillor Alexander, and the matter was left in the hands of the committee to deal with.  
 Mr. McNeil then thanked the council and withdrew.  
 Letter was read from Aug. Stevens asking the town to give him assistance to go to Montreal and have an operation performed on one of his eyes. Mr. Stevens appeared in support of his petition and after discussion on the matter it was referred to Public Charities committee with power to arrange.  
 A delegation consisting of Mr. A. G. Adams and Mr. M. A. Kelly from the Town Recruiting committee was received and heard before the council. Mr. M. A. Kelly said they had been asked by the committee to appear before the council and request a grant of \$450 from the civic funds for the purposes of recruiting. It was thought that this was the best way to raise necessary funds to cover legitimate expenses and had been done in many other towns and found successful. The money would be required for hall rents and advertising, and the money would remain in the hands of the town treasurer and would be paid out only on bills certified by the chairman and secretary of the committee. The council could rest assured the committee would carry on their work as economically as possible. Mr. A. G. Adams concurred in Mr. Kelly's remarks and added that no doubt there would be some outside speakers here for some meetings and travelling expenses

## RECRUIT WITH HISTORY ENLISTS HERE

### Young Dane Who Served in the German Army Now to Fight Against Them

Among the recruits enlisted here is Charlie Vertig, a Dane, who has had an interesting military history.  
 He was born in Copenhagen and at the age of four years removed with his people to Germany, where his parents established themselves in business. His first recollection of Prussianism was when he was attending German public school. He would be about ten years of age and was fined two pennies for speaking his native tongue (Danish), as the Germans insist that their language only be spoken in the British Empire.  
 At the age of seventeen he was ordered to appear before a military commission when he was examined and passed for military service. At eighteen he was called upon to perform this service and served two years in a German regiment, doing duty on the French frontier. In 1897, after serving the prescribed two years he was placed on the reserve list, with orders to report every six months, but he slipped across the border into France, thence to England and later to Canada, where he has since resided.  
 He had two younger brothers who he expects are now serving in the German army, if not already killed.  
 He has enlisted in the hope that he will be able to get near enough the Germans to repay many of the old scores for the oppression and hardships imposed upon him when a German soldier.

### WORK ON BUILDINGS NOW BEGUN

### Alterations at the International Station Premises Being Pushed Forward

Arrangements are now well under way for getting the old International buildings put in proper shape for the billeting of troops for the 132nd battalion. The military engineer had an interview with the town officials last Friday regarding water and sewerage work to be done and instructions were given for the fitting up of the various buildings for the soldiers use.  
 Mr. D. A. Stewart will do all the carpented work necessary; H. P. Marquis, the plumbing work; A. H. English, the heating and Marquis & Co. Ltd. will do the Electric lighting and wiring.  
 The buildings are said to be eminently suitable for the use to which they will be put and the work will be hurried along under the supervision of an army inspector.  
 The town will make the necessary sewer connections and the water main is already in one of the buildings so that only a few connections will be needed to meet the requirements of the Militia authorities. The Water and Sewerage department are now engaged in this work.  
 It is expected that all the alterations will be completed in from three to four weeks and ready for occupation by the troops.

## RECRUITING OFFICERS MAKING GOOD PROGRESS

### Names Are Now Well on the Hundred and Fifty Mark, and Good Average is Being Maintained. Recruits Now Supplied with Uniforms

The recruiting officers here are making a bold endeavour to carry out the idea of having the 132nd Battalion raised and equipped by the first of January, 1916. The number wanted in Campbellton is 300 and so far about half that number has been signed on. Quartermaster Duncan of Chatham was in town this week looking after the issuing of uniforms, etc., and the volunteers on parade now look a splendid body of men. About 120 men have now received their equipment and recruiting has been maintained at an average of eight recruits per day. Keeping this record up there will be no difficulty in raising our full quota and we can feel proud that in no town in the province has such a record been made as what Campbellton has the honour to maintain. Some cities make quite a boast of having one family send four sons to the front, but that is common here. We have no less than three families who have given four sons to the army and one family gave five, the father of those boys being as anxious to go as any of the authorities would take him. IRISH MOTHER SENT TEN SONS TO WAR

Five Have Fallen—Nine Brothers of an English Family Enlisted, and Six Were Killed

This is a very plain tale (says James Douglas in the London Daily News). It is told in orders that every man, woman and child in these little islands and in their sister-lands all over the world may admire and emulate its ardor of matchless self-sacrifice and simple duty simply done by obscure and humble souls. It is told in order that the English people, the Welsh people and the Scottish people may with a common gesture of reverence salute the Irish people, that has bred a woman so very great and men so very gallant.

In the little town of Loughrea, County Galway, there lives an Irish mother whose heart is peopled with many sorrows. Her name is Mrs. Fury. She is a mourning widow, who deserves to be chieftain in marble like the mourning widows of the great Serbian sculptor, Stepanovic. This is her incredible story, a story the like of which I have never heard or read in all the annals of war. Her husband, now dead, was a soldier in the Connaught Rangers, one John Fury. He served in the famous regiment for twenty-one years, and died, full of years and honor, in 1905. A year ago, on the second of August, Mrs. Fury gave all her sons to the cause of the Allies—no fewer than ten strong men. The story of her ten heroic sons—five of whom have fallen on the field of battle—is without precedent—or parallel in the records of war, ancient or modern. Homer himself never had such a story to sing.

Private William Clarke, of the East Lancashire Regiment, is one of nine brothers who were mobilized on the outbreak of the war, all in the same regiment, and of whom six have been killed, another is without his right arm as the result of wounds, and the youngest is still in the trenches.



SUPREME SACRIFICE MADE BY CYRIL VIGOT

Large Number Of The Brave Young Man's Friends Stunned by the News that he was Killed in Action.

Gloucester county has sent many of its finest young men to the war, some of whom it knew would be sacrificed to the holiest cause yet espoused by the greatest nation in the world, and it has fallen to the lot of Cyril Vigot to mark his name first on the list of martyrdom heroes.

Born in the parish of Grouville on the island of Jersey, an island that has contributed some of the best blood which has been infused into citizenship of this county, Mr. Vigot came



to this country about ten years ago, being then seventeen years old, and for over four years was employed by the Wm. Fruing Co. at their Lanouette establishment. Since that time he was engaged by the W. S. Loggie Co., first at their Shippegan store for four years, and then for two years preceding his departure to join the 26th Battalion, at Lower Caraqueet, where he occupied the responsible position of manager of the Loggie interests there. His splendid physique and frank, open countenance were true indices of the soul of a man, for no one who ever made his acquaintance found him other than clean of life and upright of character. Bright of disposition, with an engaging manner that made him friends everywhere, and energetic in business affairs, Cyril Vigot was an example of the best that Gloucester could offer of its young manhood, and the terrible tragedy of war seemed accentuated by the sudden and complete snuffing out of a life of such promise. The details of the circumstances under which Mr. Vigot met his death have not yet been received, the first



**THE PARLIAMENTARY TERM**  
(Charles Marcell in Montreal Herald.)  
If the reports from London about the intentions of the Imperial Government are correct, the period of the war is not to count in the time of duration of the British Parliament. As the British Parliament had sixteen or seventeen months to live when war was declared, it will still have that time ahead of it when peace is signed. During these sixteen or seventeen months the usual constitutional law will apply. That is to say, Parliament can then be dissolved or allowed to run its whole time, after the war to allow soldiers time to return and registration to be completed. No doubt this precedent, if it is made, will also be mouthed by some in Canada who will want to apply it to the Canadian Parliament. If that were done Canada would not be obliged to hold a general election until two years and two months after the war as our Parliament had that lifetime before it when hostilities opened. Providing that the war will still last for another year or year and a half the adoption of the British precedent would practically mean another term for the Conservatives without the people being consulted. This principle cannot be adopted. The conditions are not the same here as in England, where they have a truly national government by coalition and the whole people are represented at the council board. Here the war and all that follows in its wake is being run by one party, the Opposition merely giving its support and exercising its rightful duties in the public interest. The wisest thing to be done here is to ask the Imperial Parliament to amend the British North America Act so as to extend the life of the present Parliament for one year. During that time Parliament can meet again and

renew the demand for a further extension if public opinion requires it. If not, then an election would have to be held before October, 1917. It is safe to say that peace will have been secured long before that time. If our soldiers are not all returned by then they can vote wherever they are under our legislation. This could not be done by the British troops, as no such legislation has been enacted in England.

The Chatham World says:—  
It is proposed in Germany that prisoners of war be killed if the food supply should become short. The proposal is entirely in harmony with the philosophy of the German military mind. No one need be surprised if the Germans not only kill their prisoners but eat them.

A striking cartoon in Monday's New York World showed the members of Congress gathering for the session. In letters of light over the Congress building blazed the words, America First. Would not safety first have been more appropriate?

**CASE OF INTEREST TO LUMBERMEN CLOSED**  
Judgements Handed Down in Quebec Court in Bonaventure Lumber Case

Quebec, November 30th, 1915.—A number of judgments were handed down in the Court of Review this morning, among others a case of Mr. R. N. LeBlanc, of Bonaventure, against Mr. Angus McLean, which has been before the Courts for some years past.

In 1907, R. N. LeBlanc sold out his mill and operations at Bonaventure to Angus McLean. After selling to McLean, the latter engaged LeBlanc as his manager at Bonaventure. In 1911, the 1st of June, LeBlanc's management ceased, and in September 1912, he sued McLean claiming from him the sum of \$5,318.00, Honorable Senator Edwards, McLean's partner, was made a co-defendant in the action.

Mr. LeBlanc was represented by the Office of the Honorable L. P. Pelletier, since appointed Judge, then Postmaster General and a member of the firm of Pelletier, Baillargeon, Belleau & Belleau.

The amount claimed by LeBlanc was made out as follows:—  
\$1600.00 representing the balance of salary, because LeBlanc claimed that he was dismissed by McLean without cause;

\$1087.50 for the use of LeBlanc's bookkeeper;  
For having used LeBlanc's offices and premises, \$240.00 per year was charged;  
For the use of his horses, \$226.00;  
For the use of a gasoline boat, \$100.00;  
For work in assorting logs, \$200.00.  
Also \$15.00 for a saddle, and \$20.00 for certain fence rails belonging to LeBlanc that one of the employees of the defendant had removed, also some other items.

The defendants, Mr. McLean and Senator Edwards retained the services of the Honorable John Hall Kelly, Legislative Councillor and King's Counsel, of New Carlisle, and the latter advised his clients that LeBlanc's claim was not founded in law.

In view, however, of the fact that the defendants could not say whether one of their men had unwares to them, taken a part of LeBlanc's fence or not, for which he claimed \$20.00, so as to avoid the costs of action, Honorable Mr. Kelly advised his clients to offer LeBlanc the sum of \$20.00, and the costs of an action in settlement of his claim for \$5,318.00.

This offer was refused. The case was then proceeded with at New Carlisle, in the District of Gaspé. After a very lengthy trial lasting over a week, the Superior Court at New Carlisle declared that the offer of \$20.00 made by the defendants was not sufficient, and gave judgment in LeBlanc's favor for \$485.00.

As LeBlanc, by his action, was claiming \$5,318.00, he was not satisfied with the judgment of \$485.00 in his favor. As the defendants, McLean and Edwards, had only offered \$20.00, they, in turn, were not satisfied with the judgment commending them to pay \$485.00 and costs.

Both parties therefore appealed from the judgment rendered by the Superior Court, LeBlanc to have it increased, and McLean to have it decreased.

The case was pleaded in Quebec in April last, in the Court of Appeal, before Justices Malouin, Cannon & Dorion. In appeal Mr. LeBlanc was represented by Mr. Baillargeon, of the firm of Pelletier & Baillargeon, and McLean and Edwards by the Honorable J. H. Kelly.

By the judgment handed down this morning, it was declared that the appeal taken by R. N. LeBlanc was dismissed with costs; the appeal taken by McLean and Edwards is maintained with costs against LeBlanc. The Court of appeal decided that the amount of \$20.00 offered by LeBlanc by McLean was sufficient in law, that they did not owe the said sum of \$5,318.00 to LeBlanc, and moreover, reversed the judgment rendered in LeBlanc's favor for \$485.00, and declared that he was only entitled to the \$20.00 offered him as aforesaid.

All costs from the time the offer was made, that is to say, the costs of the Superior Court at New Carlisle, and the costs of the two appeals were also against LeBlanc.
