

Telegraphic News.

Ottawa, April 27. After recess in the House yesterday, Mr. Pope submitted the census returns, after which a debate on the resolutions for promotion of the third class, or junior second class to any other class or rank of civil service, was resumed by Tilley. The resolution passed through committee and a bill founded on it was introduced and read a first time. An act respecting security to be given by officers of Canada passed second reading. The bill to amend Government Savings Banks act passed second reading.

Motion of Sir Francis Hincks for a second reading of the bill to amend the act respecting the issue of Dominion notes a long debate ensued. Sir John A. McDonald has given notice that on Tuesday next he will introduce a bill to give effect to the Treaty of Washington as far as it relates to Canada.

Mr. Langevin submitted the report on his visit to British Columbia, whither he had gone at the desire of the Privy Council, with the view of acquiring a knowledge of the new Province in relation to the Pacific Railway and its Western terminus, and to study the requirements of that country.

Naples, April 25. Eruptions of Vesuvius are increasing and becoming more serious. Two hundred persons have been burned by the lava. The flames burst from the earth under the feet of the inhabitants. Torre Del Greco is in danger of destruction and the people are flying from town. Temporary provision is made for them by the authorities.

Boston, April 27. The Executive Committee have decided to rebuild the Coliseum, which was demolished by the great fire last night, on the plan of 1850, and are confident of completing the building in season for the Jubilee.

New York, April 27. Gold 112 1/2. The village of South China, Maine, was destroyed by fire last night, all except four houses.

London, April 28. The correspondence between Granville Minister Thornton and Minister Schenck, concerning the British counter case, is printed this morning. The reply of Fish to Granville's note of March 20th, will reach Schenck to day, and be handed to Granville on Monday or Tuesday.

London, April 29. Later advices state that two thousand lives were lost at Antioch and in the vicinity by the recent earthquake.

The answer of Secretary Fish to Earl Granville's second note on the arbitration has been received, and will probably be presented in the House of Lords to night.

London, April 28. Vesuvius is still blazing, but less fiercely, and the flowing lava has slackened its speed and begun to cool. Two villages have been nearly destroyed, and the devastation has been very great. The loss of life must be heavy, but it is impossible to ascertain the number.

New York, April 29. The navigation of Lake Champlain begins to-day. Lake Superior is already open.

A Masonic Relic. Lt Col. W. Lacy, late of the 46th Regiment of the English Army, has just sent to the Secretary of Antiquity Lodge of Montreal, a most interesting Masonic relic, being five small pieces of the Bible, belonging to Lodge No. 247, under the Grand Lodge of Ireland, and called the Lodge of Social and Military Virtues, whose warrants afterwards passed to the hands of Antiquity Lodge of the Grand Register of Canada. The Bible bears date 1812 and it contains on its page some most interesting relics of the lodge, and of the persons connected with it; and it is said to have been that on which Washington received a degree of masonry. During the war of independence it was taken by the enemy, and returned to the lodge by the officers, who returned it with the lodge jewels under a flag of truce, keeping the message. The Bible has had a most eventful career, travelling with the regiment into all quarters of the world, and sharing its vicissitudes. Col Lacy has been at the pains to have facsimiles printed of some of the prayers, and of all the records in the original verse writing, and bound in blue, with the title, "The Masonic Bible of the 46th Regiment."

Col. Lacy was commandant of this garrison in 1845, while with his company, and was a favorite with the residents of the Town, some of whom have pleasing recollections of his sojourn among them.—Ed. Standard.

SALE OF WOMBWELL'S ROYAL MENAGERIE.—One of the most remarkable sales ever witnessed in Great Britain took place on the 9th inst., in the Waverley Market, Edinburgh. Wombwell's Royal No. 1 menagerie was dispersed at the hands of Mr. R. Buiset, auctioneer; and the collection of wild beasts, birds, and reptiles which has delighted the youth of the United Kingdom for four generations is now no more. Its late proprietor, George Wombwell, was born in 1777 at Dudnored, near Saffron Waldon, Essex, and soon displayed a great fondness for animals and birds.—His entrance upon the showman's life was effected by the successful exhibition of a pair of bon constrictors which he purchased for £75. After this he spared no trouble, and as fortune poured in upon him, no expense in making his menagerie the most perfect and largest in the world. On his death in 1850, his widow carried on one of the three shows which he left for about sixteen years, when it was handed

over to her nephew and niece—Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Fairgrieve, Edinburgh,—by whom it was conducted till its recent dispersal. Under its later proprietorship, the collection lost none of its reputation—the beauty, variety, and number of the specimens being in variously maintained; and it may be mentioned as an interesting fact that almost every animal exhibited, except the elephant and rhinoceros, was bred within the show. In the course of its existence the menagerie was four times patronised by the royal family. The total amount realised was about £2,900, the best prices being brought by the black maned lion "Hannibal" £270, and the performing elephant £680. Mr. Rice, London, purchased from Mr. Fairgrieve the goodwill of the menagerie.

On the 9th inst., a nephew of Robert Burns, Mr. Robert Burns Begg—who has for fifty years been parochial schoolmaster of Kinross, was presented with his portrait by several of his old pupils. A dinner was also given in celebration of Mr. Begg's jubilee. The presentation took place in the Town Hall, Kinross, previous to the dinner, in the presence of from 800 to 1000 ladies and gentlemen. The presentation was made by Mr. George Miller.

SAINT ANDREWS, MAY 1, 1872.

The School Examinations were held yesterday by the Trustees, and visitors No. 1 Intermediate School, for boys and girls, Mr. Davis and Miss Algar, teachers, and No. 2 Intermediate, Mr. Meagher, teacher, are largely attended. The reading, history and geography classes, acquitted themselves with much credit, evincing a knowledge of those studies by their excellent reading, and ready and correct answers.

No. 1 Intermediate for girls, Miss Anne Smith, teacher, is quite full. The compositions, reading, and knowledge of the various branches shown by the girls, was highly creditable to their application, and the industry and attention of their teacher. No. 2 Intermediate, for girls, taught by Miss Morrison, is making excellent progress. The Primary School, under Mrs. Rodger's tuition also passed a creditable examination in the elementary branches.

The Grammar School, taught by Mr. Sills, is also largely attended; several of the boys are rather small, but are quick and ready in answering. The dictation was very good; the 2d Reading, spelling, fair; the 3d Grammar and 1st History, very good; the 2d Geography and 1st Greek, (Homer) very fair; 1st English, was good; 1st reading, fair; the English Grammar and 3d Latin Classes also acquitted themselves very well.

Included all the Schools are doing their work admirably, considering the great delay there was in obtaining the proper books. The Trustees may feel proud of their management. What is now wanted are large and airy school rooms. The last that could be had have been obtained, but new school houses are becoming daily more necessary, and will sooner or later be built.

The Alabama Controversy

has been the principal topic for the past week; and it was generally believed in well informed circles, that the American claims for indirect damages would be withdrawn from the Geneva Arbitration; in addition to these unheard of claims, the working of the original United States case was considered offensive in Britain, and a large and increasing Opposition in Parliament were resolved to force a division upon the Government's policy with reference to the Washington Treaty, which Mr. Gladstone and his party were anxious to avoid; indeed on this side of the Atlantic the feeling against some provisions of the Treaty are very unpopular. It is generally believed that the policy of the Commissioners was Imperial and not Colonial, and that they had not the constitutional right to give up the Fisheries. This matter will be fully and ably discussed in the Dominion Parliament, as the Premier has given notice that he will introduce a bill this week, to give effect to the Treaty of Washington, so far as it relates to Canada. The discussion is looked forward to with much interest by the people of the Maritime Provinces.

The most pleasing information with reference to the Alabama "indirect claims" is furnished by the "Daily Telegraph," which says, that Sir John A. McDonald received a telegram from Sir John Rose, on the 26th, announcing that these claims are to be withdrawn, and that the British and United States Governments had reached an amicable settlement in the matter. This is good news.

PUBLIC HALL.—There is great want felt here of a large, well ventilated Public Hall; several persons who have Companies which give public entertainments have regretted the want of accommodation has prevented them visiting the Town. The old Town Hall is out of repair and totally unfit for any kind of entertainment, and the only Hall worthy of the name, is the Masonic Hall, which answers for small gatherings, but is not adapted for large entertainments. It has been hinted, that a gentleman of means proposes erecting a large building, the upper flat to be fitted up for a commodious hall, suitable for Concerts, Lectures and Theatrical entertainments. We trust that circumstances will move him to commence the building ere long. That a large hall would pay, is admitted by every one.

We regret to state that Mr. S. F. Friable, proprietor of Friable's Hotel, St. George, died suddenly on Friday night last. He went to bed apparently in good health, but awoke during the

night with a choking sensation, and expired before any remedy could be applied. His death it is said resulted from apoplexy. Mr. Friable was a popular landlord, and generally respected. His remains were brought here, and sent by the "Queen" to St. Stephen, for transmission by rail to Houlton, for interment.

WHAT'S UP.—We learn that some of the Railway officials are to be removed to St. Stephen, and that Mr. Osburn has engaged rooms in the Watson House, for offices. The Manager and the clerks will remain in the old offices at the Depot, Indian Point. We have not heard the reason for the change, but await information. One change we look forward to which will be a benefit, and that is, when the Dominion Government will have control of all the Railway lines in the Province, and the day will come sooner or later. They want connections with the sea, and St. John and St. Andrews will meet the requirements.

It is currently reported that an energetic and efficient officer has been appointed to collect the "Export Duty" at St. Stephen. Should the terms of the Washington Treaty be adopted by the Dominion Parliament, it is likely that the export duty will be repealed; until which time, the newly appointed official will perform his duties to the satisfaction of the Government and people.

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PUBLIC DOCUMENTS.—We have received by mail the Reports for 1871 of the Minister of Public Works, Postmaster General, Message, Despatches and Minutes of the Privy Council relating to the Treaty of Washington, Tables of Trade and Navigation, Public Accounts, Inland Revenue, and Statistics of Canada. We will refer to them in another issue.

The St. John "Freeman" has been enlarged, and is published on new type, presenting a neat appearance. It contains a large amount of reading matter original and selected. Such enterprise will meet with success.

THE NEW DOMINION MONTHLY for May is received, and has a variety of interesting articles, useful and entertaining. The various departments are well filled. A paper on "An important point in the study of History is well worth perusal.

QUICK WORK.—The "John Clinch," Capt. H. Maloney, commenced taking in a cargo of flour on Saturday at Portland, Maine, and on Monday, 46 hours afterwards was discharging the cargo at her wharf in this Town. This is undoubtedly what may be fairly called "quick work."

I have no "axe to grind," nor has any one ever known me to abuse the confidence reposed in me. Neither, as you are aware, am I an office seeker, parochial or otherwise. The acts of public men are public property, and I will not be deterred from announcing upon them. I do not profess to be more amiable than my friends, and can be goaded to give a return, feeling that I have a clear record. I may have some facts to give the public with reference to the school fund, which will add to the catalogue of delinquencies. My voice is still for peace, but not at the sacrifice of honor. From one who is in very deed a heavy TAX PAYER.

NOTE.—In our remarks last week we did not "palpate or explain" our correspondent's letter. We are aware that he is "capable of defending" himself. Our object was to show that he did not accuse, but asked information for the public. Whether he was "pleased or annoyed" is a matter that does not concern us.—[Ed. Standard.]

The fair weather has set people to work in their gardens; there is little vegetation yet, the mornings and evenings are so cool.

Spotted fever is terribly prevalent in Brooklyn and Williamburg.

Ground will soon be broken in Washington for the erection of a large and handsome building for the British Embassy. When completed it will be an ornament to the city.

The proposed Russian canal, intended to connect the Black Sea with the Caspian, is favored by the government. It would be nearly 500 miles long, and would cost the nice sum of £11,000,000.

QUICK DISPATCH.—The schr. Anna, Simpson, arrived here on the 24th and was loaded and left for Boston on the 27th, with a full load of cedar posts, and arrived in Boston on the 30th April.

NAVIGATION RESUMED.—A telegram announces that the river St. Lawrence is free of ice, and navigation for the season has been resumed.

—It is seldom that a man shoots himself in splitting wood, but a Kentuckian, accomplished the feat, successfully, the other day, by hitting a pit-rod in his pocket with the axe-handle.

A rag-picker died in New York last week, leaving \$4,700, every cent of which she had saved from the proceeds of rags gathered in the streets, besides at the same time supporting her family.

"MURDER MOST FOUL" is the somewhat sensational heading of an article in the last issue of the "Liverpool Advertiser." The circumstances connected with finding of a box, in which were the mutilated remains of a mulatto boy and the appearance of the remains are minutely described. It appears that a mulatto boy named Cornelius Matthews aged about seven years, suddenly disappeared from his home on the 23d of February last; and although the fact was advertised at the time, he had not been found and no tidings concerning him had been heard, until Thursday last, when a box labeled "Moirs Wine Biscuit," containing his body was thrown upon the beach. An inquest was held, and steps are being taken to unravel the mystery.

OTTAWA, April 26. The Report of the Marine and Fisheries for the last fiscal year, submitted to Parliament yesterday, shows the number of Light houses managed by Trinity House, Montreal, to be 251 requiring 235 keepers, who have in addition assistants paid by themselves whose names in consequence do not appear in the book of the Department. Four new Ottawa wharves are under contract for the River St. Lawrence, making eight altogether for that River. The total amount of petroleum consumed in the light-houses of the Dominion during the year was seventy thousand gallons, costing the Department \$11,914. The general condition of the Fisheries throughout the Dominion has been prosperous, especially in Nova Scotia. The actual value of the Fisheries for the purpose of trade during last year was \$7,573,200, being an excess over the preceding year of nearly one million dollars.

The estimated amount used for domestic supply is \$900,000. The amount of capital employed in Fisheries of the United-Province is estimated at fifteen million dollars, the number of persons employed about eighty-seven thousand.

In making comparison with the preceding year, it must be remembered that the prices of certain kind of fish were much lower than in 1870. Although the quantity of fish taken in '71 was about three times greater than in the preceding year, the total value is actually less. The fishery collections for rents, licenses, fines, etc., during fiscal year, were \$12,408, expenditures for same period, \$42,551. The whole expense of the marine police \$84,000.

The several claims of Canada in respect of the definition of her headland-boundaries and her right to exclude all foreign vessels from her ports and harbors for bait, supplies, &c., were put in abeyance. The report goes on to say that it is extremely desirable, pending the treaty, that no uncertainty may exist as to necessary measures of protection which, in the meantime, will be adopted and enforced in Canada. The total expenditure by the Department for last fiscal year was \$375,916 against \$408,150 of previous year. The increase is partly owing to new log wharves, principally in Fisheries of the United-Province, principally day after that the meeting of Parliament was deferred at the request of Lord Kimberley.

In the House last night, after the recess, the debate on Colby's bill to repeal the insolvency law, with Hilliard Cameron's motion to refer the whole matter to the Committee on Banking and Commerce, was resumed.

The debate occupied the entire evening. Bellenger moved an adjournment of the debate to the 9th of May. The motion was lost. Cameron's amendment was then rejected, and the bill passed second reading—yeas 77, nays 61.

All the members of the Government, excepting Peop, voted in the negative.

—Dread of small pox has induced the people to do a great many atrocious things. In Beth-hem, Pa, not long ago, a man fell a victim to the terrible disease, and was taken in charge by the authorities. Secretly he had become unconscious when he was hurriedly put under ground, least the infection should spread. A few days ago the parents of the young man removed the remains, and found that he had revived in his coffin and struggled in his agony that he had kicked out the footboard and torn himself out of the coffin.

We do not care to attempt to fancy the man's feelings when he became conscious and found himself buried.

—English emigrants to the South Sea Islands are frequently murdered, robbed and eaten by the natives. The people of the New Hebrides group have always been addicted to roasting white men.

—Chinese advices state that on March 3 an explosion of a magazine at Tien-tsin destroyed eighty houses and many lives. A riot among the Chinese laborers in the tin mines at Takoot, northern China, also resulted in the loss of many lives.

A SECRET TREATY.—A few days ago, the United States Senate in Executive Session ratified a Treaty which had been negotiated between the United States Government and that of the Orange Free State in South Africa. The importance of this Treaty has not been made publicly known, and its terms are to be kept secret until an exchange of ratifications shall be effected. The secrecy observed in relation to this matter is a little remarkable. The Orange Free State borders on the British possessions in South Africa.

QUICK TRIP.—The schooner "Nettie," Andrews, master, which arrived at this port last evening, from New York, was only seventy hours making her trip.—Telegraph.

LAMBING EXTRAORDINARY.—A Cheviot ewe belonging to Mr. Davidson, Lochielhill, near Forres, dropped a lamb on Sunday week, and on the Friday following the same ewe dropped other two, and all are doing well.—Mr. Davidson appears to have a prolific stock, for we are informed that several of his ewes have given birth to triplets. These instances have, however, been entirely cast into the shade by a Leicester ewe belonging to Captain Warrand, Ryehill, which gave birth on Saturday last to the extraordinary number of six lambs.

—Mr. Beecher started his congregation on Sunday morning by asking a collection of \$1500 for a Universalist congregation in Kansas.

—A smart young fellow of this town wants to engage himself as a 'feller' to some handsome sewing machine—one about eighteen years old preferred.—[Ex.]

—The police of Bangor on Tuesday seized a large quantity of liquors at the residence of A. B. Robinson, a dealer in soda and small beer, who is said to have been in the habit of mixing liquors with his other beverages and dealing them to his customers. A large amount of compounds used, in the manufacture and adulteration of liquors was also seized, and Robinson was fined \$50 and costs on a search and seizure process, and held in \$3,000 bail for a further appearance on Wednesday, to answer to the charge of fraudulently adulterating liquors for the purpose of sale.

There is somewhat of the romantic in the life of a miser, being so different from the common course of human experience and everybody likes to read of the strange freaks and wretched deaths of these distorted human beings.—One has died at San Francisco, known as Dr. William Hewer. He was found on a pile of rags in a room that had not been swept for fourteen years, with £12,000 sterling in his possession.

SIXTEEN iron steamers were launched in the Clyde during the last month of 1870, 17,703 tons. Among them is included the "California," an iron screw steamer of 3,400 tons and 500 horse power, built by Alex. Stephen & Sons, Linthouse, for Huddyside & Henderson, of the anchor line.

PROFESSOR RAINY has been presented with 500 guineas and silver plate in acknowledgment of the invaluable services rendered to the cause of Presbyterianism by his reply to Dean Stanley, and by his defence of the truth against the dangerous tendencies of much of our modern teaching. His presentation has been made by letter from Lord Ardmillan, in name of himself and various friends.
