VISITED IN DEVASTATED LAND

Mr. Joseph Pinault Here After Interesting Journey in Europe.

An interesting visitor in town is Mr. Joseph Pinault, Building Contractor of Minneapolis. Mr. Pinault has been in Italy, France and Lucania since September last and is now enroute to his home. He arrived at St. John last week on the C.P.P. S.S. *Luzerne* of France and reports the trip as across the pond as a very rough one, so much so that the liner was a day overdue on arrival at St. John.

In an interview with the *Moncton Times* Mr. Pinault said conditions in Italy are very much similar to other countries in regard to labor unrest. In Italy, however, while prices have gone soaring, wages have not increased in the same proportion as they have in this country. Asked about the political situation in Italy, Mr. Pinault stated that one does not hear politics discussed much there among the people as a whole. Discussion of politics seems to be confined to official circles. He stated there are very many Englishmen and Americans in all the large cities of Italy, and on one occasion when he entered a restaurant in Rome he met no less than 78 Americans who were frequenters of the place.

Asked as to the food situation Mr. Pinault stated there seemed to be plenty of food in Italy for those who are able to pay. He found that a meal, served in American style, and for which one would have to pay from \$1.50 to \$2.00 on this side of the water, could be bought for the equivalent, of from 50 to 65 cents. While in Italy he received 25 lire per dollar for his American money, which is about 5 1/2 times better than pre war value of American money.

In France, states Mr. Pinault, conditions as to the cost of living are much worse than here. The prices of commodities there are about 2 1/2 times higher than here in comparison. While in France Mr. Pinault visited the southern portion of the war zone, in the vicinity of Lyons, Soissons, Aux and Douaumont, and also saw the Chemin des Dames, Berry au Bac and many other places of interest. He says that a good deal of reconstruction work has already taken place but what has been done at that line is but a mere comparison with the huge amount of work necessary to put the country in shape again.

"After seeing the damage done to beautiful Rheims cathedral," he stated, "I would judge from my experience as a builder that it would take a couple of hundred years to put the cathedral in the state of its former glory."

Mr. Pinault states that while in Europe he had met many Russians and others who had lately come from Russia. They claimed Russia was in a distressing state of chaos. The Bolsheviks have a grip on everything and the whole country is full of their spies. He met a British officer who had just come from Russia and who had a great deal of interesting information concerning the country, and who told him that there were several Canadian prisoners still under restraint there.

In both Italy and France, stated Mr. Pinault, the people are very eager for information about this side of the Atlantic and everywhere seems to get over to Canada and the United States.

Mr. Pinault states he is pleased to get back to the home country, and that he has seen those European countries at this time.

Mr. Pinault is a brother of Dr. L. G. Pinault of Campbellton.

JUDGMENT IN AUTO SUIT

Contention of Defendant Upheld By Judge In This Case.

At St. John, December 24th, 1920, a judgment of costs in a case of *Aspirot vs. Ross*. The facts are as follows:

John Daniel Ross, of Loppetown, is the registered owner of an automobile. One Aspirot, who is his daughter who had a claim against him, was driving his car, an accident took place under the following circumstances: Mrs. Aspirot, the plaintiff's wife, was driving the automobile on a highway, going from east to west. The automobile came up behind, going in the same direction, and therefore when the automobile came to pass the plaintiff's automobile, the plaintiff's automobile was on the left of the wagon. Mrs. Aspirot, who should have gone to the right of the road where it should have gone at first and the collision took place, and Mrs. Aspirot claimed that she had been severely injured and had to keep to her bed.

Aspirot then sued Ross for two thousand dollars damage. He based his action on Article 106, of Revised Statutes of Quebec, which made the owner of the automobile responsible for all accidents whatsoever caused by his car whether he was in the car or not. This article reads: "The owner of a motor vehicle for which a certificate is issued under this section, shall be held responsible for any violation thereof or of any regulation provided thereunder by order of the Lieutenant-Governor in Council; and shall be responsible for all accidents or damages caused by his motor vehicle upon a highway or public square."

The plaintiff Aspirot was represented by the firm of Bernard & Rheame of Montreal, and Mr. Emile Cote of New Carlisle. The defendant represented by Honorable John Hall Kelly, who read the following: "The defendant failed to take her proper side of the road that the automobile driver was justified in passing on the part of the road left vacant by the driver of the wagon. He also pleaded that the action should have been taken against the driver of the automobile, and not against the owner. The law above quoted has been amended and now reads as follows:

"106. The owner of a motor vehicle shall be held responsible for any violation of this section or any regulation made thereunder by order of the Lieutenant-Governor in Council. Whenever loss or damage is sustained by any person by reason of a motor vehicle on a highway, the burden of proof that such loss or damage did not arise through the negligence or improper conduct of the owner of such a motor vehicle shall be placed upon the owner of the vehicle."

The defendant claimed that the violation made under the automobile act, but that the act of the plaintiff was no longer responsible under the Automobile Act for civil damages by his car, when driven by another person. The defendant claimed that under the law as it now reads "at the burden of proof is shifted to the owner of the auto in all cases, but of the Civil Code, and that the owner of the automobile can no longer be held responsible in all cases for all accidents caused by his car."

The judgment upheld the pretensions of the defendant and dismissed the plaintiff's action with costs.

THE PROFITABLE SKUNK

The advantages of the artificial training of the fox, beaver, and muskrat, specifically, have been often pointed out and here it is proposed to devote a few words to that much abused animal, the skunk. The fact that the animal is to be found in practically every part of the American continent, and that he is so plentiful as to be worth a few dollars, is sufficient to attract the attention of fur traders and induce a study in the feasibility and advantages of the industry.

Many years ago Ernest Thompson Seton, the well known nature writer and naturalist to the Manitoba Government, advocated a more extensive artificial propagation of the skunk, and himself operated a most successful ranch of this kind. Because, largely of a prejudice against the little animal and its method of defense, skunk farming has never been established in Canada as an industry although the advantages and possibilities are obviously so great. Success on other parts of the American continent and elsewhere have demonstrated the feasibility of establishing the industry firmly and profitably in the Dominion.

The skunk is widely found over the Canadian Dominion in every corner and nook where it can find food suited to its needs, and notwithstanding the fact that it is persistently hunted and trapped and worried by dogs, it continues to thrive and multiply in close proximity to settlements. The animal is neither timid nor vicious and is practically tame and friendly with those handling them and never brings into play the powerful weapon nature has given them except when badly frightened by some intruder.

Skunk ranching could be successfully carried on in practically every section of Canada; for the animal is indigenous to every part and would find his natural conditions wherever a farm was located. The wife and children of a farmer could be employed in the care of the animals and the period of gestation being slight weeks descending may be performed when the animals are five weeks old and all possibility of future subsistence may be estimated, but in domestic raising this is not really necessary contrary to general belief.



NEW GUINEA

Little Known Part of the British Empire.

A fine or full sentence for wearing clothes. That's what happens to a native of New Guinea should he be decked himself in anything more elaborate than a loin cloth, says Bishop Sharpe. After ten years' service in the Antipodes, Bishop Sharpe has returned. He attended the conference of bishops of the Church of England Down in P. M. (the British section of the island) there's a law against a native wearing anything more than the traditional loincloth. Should the Papuan swim who degrades himself into a pair of trousers it means a visit to the magistrate for \$10. If the guilty one is shirking the law, he goes to the strait.

The Anglican Church has always been good for the natives, says Bishop Sharpe. "We don't think it's good for the natives to attire themselves in our style of raiment. They're not used to it. We've always encouraged it, and now the British Government has taken up the matter and enacted a law against it."

Even though the inhabitants of the largest island in the world are not troubled with taxes on costly attire, the cleric stated. In order to encourage industry and incidentally add to the revenue, the Government now requires that all male Papuans over sixteen years of age pay a poll tax of from 10 shillings to £1 a year.

The Papuans are quite amenable, and when taken into the plantation, prove good workmen. Those not employed on the plantations work for themselves and add to their scanty income by producing copra, etc., said the bishop.

British New Guinea boasts two automobiles, and their owners regard themselves on a 17-mile road, which is the only highway in the island. All travel and the transportation of supplies is done on foot along native tracks through dense tropical vegetation. A number of launches are used to reach points along the coast.

A Royal Concert Singer.

With a voice of the most melodious and powerful, the staff of the Princess Obolensky, Yonkers, N. Y., of the murdered czar's household, has made a debut as a concert singer at the Queen's Hall, London, a few weeks ago.

A tall brunette, with hair braided across her forehead, and with a typical Russian look, she is a daughter of Alexander II by a second marriage late in life, and is still a comparatively young woman. Her husband, head of the princely Obolensky house, a rich mezzo-soprano, she gave a recital of English, French and Russian songs, and a critical audience enthusiastically applauded her singing rather than a fallen princess of royal blood struggling to earn a living.

"Both my husband and myself lost everything in the revolution," she said to a reporter. "I devoted myself entirely to music. I hope however I am to be regarded as an artist and not a beggar."

During the war the princess worked for our living like most people. And we are very happy, too."

When the revolution broke out she was in the Crimea. "The Revolution devastated everything except the clothes we wore," she said. "My husband was in Moscow and volunteered to serve in the White Army, so his arrest was ordered, though he successfully hid in the city. During this period I had to wait on the Bolsheviks who called. I was also put to farm work. Afterwards I was allowed to work as a governess in a boarding-house. Eventually I got away to Moscow and joined my husband in hiding for four months, until eventually, disguising ourselves as workers in a sugar factory, we managed to escape from the country with a Red Cross mission."







A DIFFICULT VOYAGE

Crossing the Atlantic Ocean in the Seventeenth Century.

A strikingly picturesque account of an Atlantic voyage in the days of small sailing craft came from the pen of John Henry Helfrich, who emigrated to Pennsylvania in 1771-72. It is quoted in "The Romance of Old Philadelphia," by Mr. John T. Paris.

"The first days out were so stormy that it was impossible to make fire on the ship, and the captain cooked soup for a child over candle light. The sailors had to stand in water on the deck up to the calves of their legs. One morning a wave came through a window to a cabin of a passenger, and he was nearly drowned in his bunk. The waves came rolling like mountains; and now we were high up, now deep down, now lying on one side and then again on the other. Many chickens and ducks perished on deck because of the quantities of sea water there."

Another interesting entry that Helfrich made in his journal is as follows:

"A rat tried to take the comforter away from the child, and, as it did not want to give it up, it was bitten on the finger. The child screamed, the mother awoke, and the rat ran off. All sails were taken in during a heavy downpour. We passengers helped to haul the sails in. Our terror was still more increased when the captain called to us to load our rifles. The danger was this, the water around us here and there was drawn up in the form of an arrow. When it falls, it comes down with such force that, if it hits a ship, it breaks it to pieces, and even if it touches the ship but slightly it smashes the deck. It follows the ship. The English call it a water spout. The only means to scatter the rising water is to break it up by shooting."

The Soplane.

Phenomenal as has been the development of the soplane since Curtiss first rose from and landed on water, in 1911, little attention has been devoted to the incidental but important problem of mooring and handling these craft, says Popular Mechanics. Recently, however, the problem has been attacked by a prominent British airplane manufacturer, with the result that patents have been issued for an interesting floating drydock. The dock consists basically of four air-tight pontoons which form the corners of a flat, rectangular steel structure.

In the Badger Dying Out?

It is believed that the badger is dying out, but proof of the presence of badgers in a tract of woods that lies about midway between two Cheviot streams was unexpectedly provided recently. A local pack of foxhounds, out out-hunting, were led to an "earth" where a fox had taken refuge. Digging operations showed that the hole formed the entrance to two separate chambers, from one of which a couple of foxes were drawn while the other held four badgers, all of which were captured.

A Scientific Note.

An important contribution to scientific achievement has been made by Sister Mauda Dwyer, of the convent of Notre Dame in Glasgow, whose work has attracted notable attention in the world of science. She has discovered what many have sought, the method of breeding sturgeon, fertilizing those which Molokai sturgeons are set to study costs to \$1.00 per egg.
