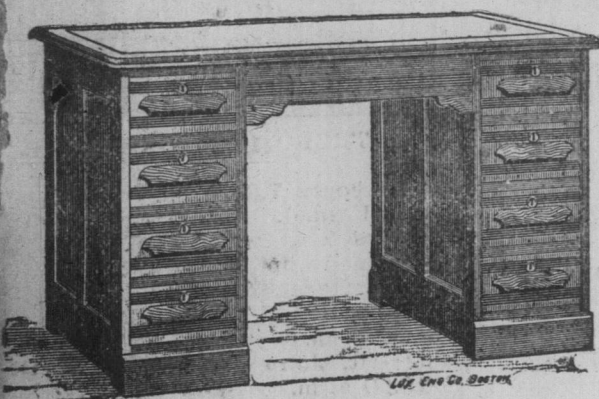

CIVIC REFORM.

Our Merchants and Civic Reform.

Those who read the report of the Cambridge, Mass., "No-License Campaign in recent issue of 'News,' must have been struck with the general good results that followed in the increase of population, trade, etc.

These results, however, were but natural, and what were to be expected, and yet, how many may be heard to say that the closing of the saloon would be injurious to business, that the liquor traffic fosters trade. The result in the increase of trade, the sales of boots and shoes, and clothes and groceries, upon the closing of the saloon in Cambridge, proves the fallacy of such a theory.

When men cease to spend their money for drink, it necessarily follows that they have more money with which to pay their rents, feed and clothe themselves, and their families. If our merchants would only reflect upon this, we think they would be more urgent in requiring the removal of the open saloon which puts temptation to drink, in the way of the weak who cannot resist it.

Unfortunately there are too many men in business, perhaps they ought not to be called business men, who, when a moral issue is at stake, such as seeing to the enforcement of a liquor law, where it exists, think nothing of sacrificing the best interests of the community, rather than offend, and thereby lose the trade of one or two of those whose living and patronage is dependent upon a traffic, which they as business men and good citizens should help to abolish. A striking illustration of this occurred some time ago in a neighboring town.

The ministers and temperance people, reinforced by the merchants and citizens generally, waited upon the hotel and saloon keepers, requesting them to close their bars, and go out of the traffic, which was corrupting so many of the youth of that place, demoralizing society, breaking hearts and ruining homes (the record is everywhere and always the same) with the understanding that they meant business, and that if their request was not conceded, then more stringent and effective measures would be employed. Well, what was the result? Simply this, that seeing the people meant business, or appeared to mean business, the bars were closed, but not for long. A system of boycotting was immediately instituted by the hotel men, who began to buy their supplies in other towns and cities, with the results anticipated—that one, and then another of the weak-kneed merchants and would-be citizens, as soon as this was done, and they began to feel the thing a little, caved in, and offered compromises, forgetting that "they" enslave their children's children who make compromises with sin."

These, however, took the risk, and are now taking the consequence of their mean and cowardly conduct, which today finds rum flowing in that town as freely as ever, blasting and withering everything in its course.

How weak the faith and dim the vision of men who cannot see that trade lost in such a way, must eventually return through proper and more legitimate channels, the only thing needed on their part being the courage to endure a little temporary loss for the cause of truth and temperance.

Lowell must surely have had such men in view, when he penned the words:

Then to side with truth is noble,
When we share her wretched crust,
Ere her cause bring fame and profit
And 'tis prosperous to be just.

Then it is the brave man chooses
While the coward stands aside,
Doubting in his abject spirit
Till his Lord is crucified;
And the multitude make virtue
Of the faith they 'had denied."

Truro is one of the most centrally located towns in the Maritime Provinces, and has many attractive features, and were it not for the undeniable reputation which it has in the matter of intemperance, would be much more of a residential centre than it is.

The educational advantages are such that many would like to bring their children here to be educated, but they are deterred by their fear of the open saloon.

Remove this objection, which is a very real one to those who have the moral welfare of their children at heart, and give the town a name for sobriety, cleanliness and good society, and its desirability as a place of residence, will be very greatly enhanced.

People drawn to the town by such considerations as these, from the most desirable class our town could wish to have.

Hence, we believe, that if on no higher ground than the increasing of population, and the advancement of the town's material interests, our business men should unite in trying to make our town morally, what it is already physically and educationally, the most beautiful and attractive in the Provinces, and there is no better way to do this than by closing the saloon.

Cambridge is in evidence, and what Cambridge did, Truro can do. Why not give it a test?

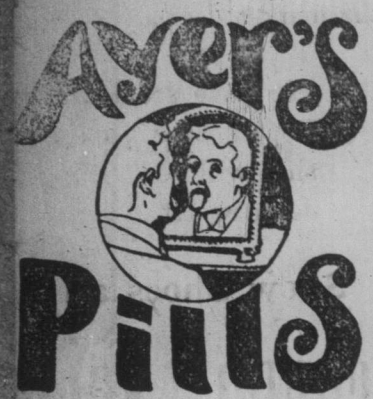

In the physical department we
have had three evening gymnasium
classes, conducted by Mr. McDouell, i.
e., one class meeting three evenings
a week, with an average attendance
of 15; our young ladies' class meet-
ing once a week, with an average
of 17.

One boy's class meeting twice each
week, and a students' class meeting
twice a week, making four classes in
all, meeting nine times a week, with
an average of about 85.

In our educational work, our read-
ing room has been well attended.

One mechanical drawing class meet-
ing once a week, and conducted by Mr.
Moshier, has had an attendance of 10.

Our book-keeping class meeting once
a week, conducted by J. D. McKay,
has had an attendance of 25.

Two addresses on Civics were given,
one by Rev. H. R. Grant, on "Good
Citizenship," the other by F. Mc-
Clure, Esq., on "Labor and Law." These
were given in connection with
monthly receptions, and had a
good attendance.

Religious Department.
A boys' Sunday afternoon meeting
and prayer circle, has been con-
ducted under the leadership of Mr.
Hatfield.

A Religious History Class conducted
by Rev. Mr. Falconer, and meeting
once a week, has had an average of
78. Mr. Falconer was assisted in
these lectures by Revs. McDonald
and Strathie. The course, which is
closed at present, will re-open again
in January.

The young men's Bible class meet-
ing on Sunday afternoon, has had an
average of 14, and the young men's
meeting an average of 88. Addresses
at this meeting were given by such
outside men as Revs. Dobson, Mc-
Kinnon, Carruthers and McLean, to-
gether with some of our own min-
isters.

It is needless to say to those of
you who were here, that these ad-
dresses were all of a thoughtful and
helpful character. For the same
period last year we had only one
Bible class session, and our men's
meetings were not half so large.

A number of socials, committee meet-
ings, etc., were held, and an average
of about 15 classes and meetings a
week, of one kind and another,
convened in our rooms since the
beginning of the year.

Carrying out the instructions of the
last Board meeting I prepared cir-
culars and had them printed, and
secured the service of the Young
Ladies' League in their distribution,
with the result that about \$150.00,
mostly of new money, has been
added to the treasury. The League
are deserving of our thanks in this
matter.

Since our last Board meeting, Mrs.
Crowe, who for 14 years has graced
the Presidency of the Women's
Auxiliary, resigned that position,
Mrs. McElhinney being appointed in
her place. The Auxiliary at their
last meeting read Mrs. Crowe an ad-
dress expressive of their appreciation
of her services, and presented her
with a chair.

Anything like a detailed report
would not be in order now, but in
brief outline the foregoing will help
to give some idea of the work of the
last two months.

I trust that while members of the
Board may commend anything that
to them may appear worthy of com-
mendation, that they will also not
fail to criticize, or make any sug-
gestion that may seem necessary,
and for the best interest of this
work.

There are many things to give
pleasure and encouragement and a
few that tend sometimes to discour-
age. Among the latter may be
mentioned the failure of Committees
to meet, or assume responsibility for
work appointed them, and the notice-
able absence of members of the Board
from our rooms, and especially from
our Sunday afternoon meetings. This
was particularly noticeable the last
few Sundays, when the attendance
was not quite so large, and the
need of help was greater.

Prayerful that mistakes and fail-
ures may be forgiven, and that the
efforts intended for good may not
be without the Master's approval and
blessing, this report is respectfully sub-

CHAPLAIN'S LECTURE ON SOUTH AFRICA.

Chaplain Lane has captured Tor-
onto with his splendid lecture on
South Africa. While Mr. Lane has a
subject of absorbing interest, great
credit is due to him for the manner in
which it is presented. The Chaplain
is a right manly man. The pathos,
as well as the humor, the horrors, as
well as the glory of the war, appeal
to him. In straightforward words
he sets forth his experiences, now on
the boat, then on rail; now in bivouac,
then on field. In the hollow square
we see him conducting his eight-
minute service ere the soldiers are
marched into battle; with tears we
bow beside him to hear the dying
message of a soldier to his mother.
With joy we accompany him to re-
lease a Boer father in order to send
him home in company with his little
girl, who pleads, "oh, don't kill my
papa." The march of men, the re-
veille, the ping of bullets, and the
boom of guns seem not far away dur-
ing the Chaplain's descriptions. The
vividness of his word pictures is in-
creased by several excellent maps,
which he displays, as well as some
sketches of the war, such as rifles,
shells, blitong, and other things,
which he secured in South Africa, and
which he exhibits to the audience.

Above all, the Chaplain is a preach-
er of peace. His noble patriotic heart
is thrilled at the courage and bravery
shown by Canadian troops, and their
faithful service to maintain the unity
of the British Empire, but he detects
a rising tide of unholy, un-Christian
feeling, and with warning he says:
"We must not lose our Christian re-
ligion over this war." Then, as he
stands over fields of carnage, where
noble men have been shot by brave
men, where foemen mangled their
blood with each other, and beside
each other lay still in death, with
him we could not but utter the pray-
er that the day might come when
men shall learn war no more, and
when peace should reign.

It was a rare treat to hear such an
admirable lecture, and we hope that
many throughout Canada will hear
Chaplain Lane ere he goes back to
Parrsboro to resume his pastoral

CANADIAN SOLDIERS' DASHING
DEEDS.

Corp R. B. Eaton's brave act under
fire—"mentioned in despatches."

Lieut. Col. Evans commanding the
Canadian Mounted Rifles, sends a re-
port to the Department of Militia at
Ottawa, in reference to the fight at
Belfast on Nov. 2nd, in which Lieut
Chalmers was killed.

It was a very hot time indeed for
our men and their deeds were those
of brave men throughout the whole
action. It will be noted that Col-
chester has had a valiant and brave
son, that she may well be proud of,
in the person of Corp. R. B. Eaton,
of Salmon River, (one of that fight-
ing family of Eatons that we know so
well) who did one of the most daring
feats of the day.

Lieut. Col. Evans says of this battle at
Belfast: the advance guard, consist-
ing of sixty of the Canadian Rifles
under the command of Major Sanders
The advance party was commanded
by Lieut. Chalmers and was accom-
panied by a guide who had given them
the wrong direction.

When the advance party came in-
to touch with the enemy the main
column had branched off to the right
and was nearly two miles away.
Lieut. Chalmers' troops engaged the
enemy from a spur projecting from
the main ridge. The advance guard,
although largely outnumbered and
in a most dangerous position, held
its place under severe rifle fire.

An order came from the G. O. C. to
retire. The retirement of the advance
party to support was conducted by
Lieut. Chalmers in a most skillful
manner under a severe fire. During
further retirement carried out steady-
ly by successive groups Corporal
Schell's horse was killed and fell up-
on him injuring his ankle.

Sgt. Tryon gave him his horse and
Major Sanders noticing Sgt. Tryon
dismounted rode back to him, and
took him on his horse. The saddle
turned and threw both to the ground,
the horse bolting, Major Sanders
was slightly wounded in the left side
and partially stunned by the fall.
Lieut. Chalmers went to Mr. Sander's
assistance, and endeavored to bring
him back with him, but could not.
Chalmers then joined the firing line
and sent Pte J. G. Smith back with a
spare horse for Mr. Sanders, but the
latter could not mount.

Lieut. Chalmers would not retire
any further until he brought Sanders
with him, and while taking steps to
secure men for a support to enable
him to carry out his intention he
was shot through the body and died
a few minutes later. About this time
a shell was dropped in the ranks of
the enemy and made them retire.

Killed—Lieut. Chalmers Wound-
ed—Mr. Sanders, Pte. R. J. Northway
(slightly); Pte. F. E. Pratt (severely).
Lieut. Col. Evans refers to the courage dis-
played by Chalmers and the skillful
way he handled the advance guard.
When Chalmers was shot he had left
cover to warn an orderly to dis-
mount, as he was in a dangerous spot.
Gen. Smith-Dorrien attended the
funeral.
