We are told that assisted immigration has ceased, and the workingmen, who for years agitated for the reform, are asked to thwarting of honest inquiry may well believe that it is "a mean cowardly kind of make friend as well as foe more than susying" to say that public money is expended o aid in bringing penniless men and women and waifs and strays from the old world poorhouses to Canada. That is the assertion of the Stratford Herald. Any. one who takes up the last Auditor-General's report on payments of Dominion money will see that instead of the payment of public funds for coaxing immigrants to the Dominion having entirely ceased, the practice is continued in several of its spicetionable forms. In the first place there is the bonus to adults. Agents are subsidized by offers of public money to beat men and women arriving in the country.

The collectors of these unfortunate children, crime and disease tainted as many of them are, can hardly point to the fact that Canada does not already have a large enough population of this description and to spare. Not only that, but thousands of the best class of our young men and women annually cross the border to look for employment, at remunerative rates, denied them here. Now we have no objection to immigration. We have no objection to the Government at Ottawa expending a resonable sum to set forth the merits of Canada, though we would have greater faith in a trade policy that rendered it easy for the people to earn a living, and thus made every newcomer an advertising agent. But we do protest against public money being taken to pay bonuses for the shipment to Canada of either pauper men and women or their offspring, collected from the slums of old world cities. We have a country good enough to command the best class of immigrants if it is rightly governed, and such a class, self-supporting, frugal, able to pay their own way, will always be wel-come in any part of the Dominion where they may choose to cast their lot.

Men and women of the description that require to be bonused and are so povertystricken that they need to have meals bought for them while en route, are not wanted here, and under no consideration should the professional philanthropists be subsidized, as is the habit at present, to send their collections of pauper and crime tainted children into the country.



THE SEWAGE PROBLEM.

As chairman of the Board of Health, Ald. Ivey brought in a statement from Engineer Chipman as to the result of his recent visit here. Mr. Chipman said his work had been handicapped owing to the fact that the levels of the street intersections had not been previously taken. He thought, however, that the sewage could be deposited on the sand flats near the Cove without being pumped. The cost of the system, with the two main trunk lines, he would roughly estimate at about \$90,000, exclusive of the right of way. The soil at the Cove seemed admirably adapted to the disposal of sewage. One acre, he considered, would suffice for 1,000 people. Mr. Chipman took occasion to comment on the present system as very defective,—constructed with no regard for future extensions. He would recommend that the levels of all street intersections in No. 6 ward, and also the land lying south of the Pipe Line road be taken. The report was only preliminary.

Ald. Gartshore moved that the acting engineer take the required levels and be empowered to employ assistance. Ald Taylor moved that No. 2 deal with the matter and have the levels taken as soon as possible.

SUNDAY SCRIMMAGE

At a Summer Resert Near Mentreal— Conflict Between Catholic and Protestant Guests.

Montreal, July 21.—There was quite a disturbance on Sunday at the Hotel de Lotbiniere at Vaudreuil, one of the popular summer resorts in the vicinity of Montreal. The difficulty arose out of religious differences between the French Catholic and English Protestant guests at the hotel. The greater number of the guests are prominent French-Canadian Catholics, but there is a good sprinkling of English Protestants. French-Canadian Catholics, but there is a good sprinkling of English Protestants. The hotel is run by a stock company, which is controlled by French-Canadians, but the manager is Edwin J. Fenton, an American. It seems the Catholic guesta have been contributing \$10 weekly as rent for a building in the village in which their service is held, and Sunday nights they have apart in avaning them. in which their service is held, and Sunday nights they have spent in amusing themselves with a dance in the hotel parlors. Sunday, a week ago, when they assembled for their customary dance they found the Protestant guests in possession of the parlor, where a clergyman was holding zervice, the Catholics withdrawing. On Sunday the latter, determined not to be done out of their dance, assembled early, when they found the following placard hung in the parlor:

This was torn down and dancing commenced. Then Mrs. Fenton turned out the lights, only to find them re-lighted. Mr. J. M. Fortier, of Montreal, one of the proprietors of the hotel, was sent for, who ordered the lights to be turned on again and a lively fracas ensued. Manager Fenton had by this time put in an appearance and took his wife's part. The manager and his wife were abused by the French-Canadian guests, who jeered and hooted them, and there was every appearance of a free fight, when the mayor and hooted them, and there was every appearance of a free fight, when the mayor appearance in his insignia of office and succeeded in quelling the disturbance. The firm stand taken by the manager and his wife in support of the sanctity of the Sabbath is widely praised. Several Protestant guests left the hotel and there are rumors of others going. The head waiter and head cook with their staff, numbering about twenty, declared that if Mr. Fenton were to leave they would leave with him. Monday afternoon Mr. Fortier left with a complete new staff for the hotel; and, fearing trouble, he took sufficient protection with him to clear out the old staff from the house.



Differing Views, But the "Drink" Habit Comes in for Severe Condemnation -The Expenditure for "Hard Stuff" in the States.

At the opening meeting of the International Medical Corgress at the national prohibition camp grounds in Pore Richmond, L. I., Dr. N. S. Davis, of Chicago, spoke on "The Nature had Effects of Alcoholic Liquor," in part as fc!lows: "During 1890, 80,000,000 gallons of distilled spirits, 40,000,000 gallons of wine, 800,000,000 gallons of malt liquors, making a total of 920,000,000 gallons, were consumed in the United States. They cost the consumers \$800,000,000, or \$13 per head on the total population of the country. The time lost from work, sickness and crimes due to drinking cost as much more, and it is estimated that yum cost the people of the

is estimated that rum cost the people of the United States in this period \$1,600,000,-'What does the consumer get for this enormous expenditure? He does not get health, strength, clothing, food or happiness, but wasted fortunes, ruined lives and homes, homeless children, poorhouses, asylums and jails. Men who do not driuk can work better and lose fewer days from sickness than those who drink. People drink because of the erroneous ideas as to the nature and effects of alcoholic beverages.

"The man who drank this amount of beer would swallow a barrel of alcohol. In beer

vessets and nervous tissue, and lessens the natural duration of life from ten to fifteen years."

Prof. William H. Porter, of the New York Post Graduate School, followed with a paper on "The Physiological Relation of Alcehol to Food." He did not agree entirely with Chairman Davis, and said that there are cases in which alcehol can be given with benefit. Prof. Porter had several charts showing the constituent parts of various articles of food and their value as nutritive agents. Starch, sugars and fats are stimulating, and are transformed into alcehol before they can be taken up by the system. Those used to eating food of this nature have a desire for stimulants.

Alcohol, being pleasant to the taste, is preferred to stimulating foods, and the alcoholic habit is gradually acquired. Albuminous food, such as meat, eggs and milk, seimulate the body without giving the desire for alcehol. The common practice of using vegetables and cereals to the exclusion of milk and meats often arouses a desire for alceholic beverages. To get rid of the alceholic habit fats, starch and sugar should be avoided. Alcohol is useful as a medicine, but must not be classed as a food.

Prof Axel Gustafson told what he knew about "Some of the Effects of Alcohol on the Brain." He said that alcohol holds a pre-eminent place as a blood poison. This, he thinks, is shown in the crimes of alcoholists and drunkards. Suicide, invanity, idiocy and moral manias are traceable to the influence of alcohol, on the brain. The minimum poisonous dose of alcohol, for minimum poisonous dose of alcohol for adults is from four to six tablespoonfuls of

Dr. M. L. Holbrook, of New York, made an effort to show by insurance tables and other statistics that alcohol shortens life and spreads disease. Dr. L. M. Green, supported by a large number of tabulated cases, argued that the habit of moderate drinking greatly increases the danger of a patient attacked by disease. This is because alcohol reduces the vitality and the power of resistance of disease.

Prof. E. P. Thwing, of Brooklyn, who recently established an asylum for the insance at Canton, China, entertained the audience with a few remarks on "Climatic Influences as Related to Inebriety." He said that it had been shown that climate has changed not only the complexion but the animal development of men. The United States is in the "intemperate belt." Climatic influences intensify the feverish rush of life by extreme thermal changes, and the peculiarly dry and electric quality of the air which stimulates the nervous system. A neurotic diathesis is the result, and man cannot bear the added strong drink. The average criminal is more susceptible to meteorological changes than the honest man.


