The British steamed.

commander of the foreign troops at that place requested the consular there to invite the insurgent leaders in that vicinity to enter the town to confer. The Turkish Gover-nor vetoed the proposition, refusing to allow the entry of the rebels, where-upon it was decided to meet the leaders at Coube, a village in the vicinity of Retimo. A delegation of the insurgents arrived at Coube on Sunday, and there awaited the coming of the Russian consul, who had been select ed as a deputy to represent his col-leagues. The Turkish officials had

undertaken to inform the consul of the arrival of the rebel chiefs at Coube, but they did not do so.
When the chiefs found that the con sul was not coming they retired. Thereupon the Turkish soldiers fired upon the isurgents in the vicinity of The Turks then fired again, with a result that they had not anticipated A large force of infuriated rebels swarmed down from the hills, and would probably have annihilated the Moslems had it not been for a strong detachment of bashi-bazouks, who were dispatched from Retimo to the aid of their endangered co-religionists. A general engagement took place, which lasted until darkness rendered

surgents withdrew to the hills. FIGHTING AT RETIMO. Athens, March 30.—A dispatch re-ceived here from Retimo, Island of Crete, says that several British and Russian officers, with a strong detachment of marines, arrived there for the purpose of potifying the insurgents of the decision of the powers to grant autonomy to the island. Campbell, Niven, Roome, Moorhouse, Wishart and Gardiner, who were appointed to investigate the relative merits of constructing a new hospital or remodeling the old. There were present: Drs. Cl. T. Campbell, Moorhouse, Niven, J. B. Campbell, Waugh, Graham, Teasdall, Roome, W. J. Weekes, Wishart, Hodge, Meek, Ferguson, Eccles, E. C. Weekes, Wm. J. Stevenson, H. Several Towns Damaged - Houses in Ruins and Many Persons Injured.

Austin, Tex., March 30 .- For twenty minutes on Sunday afternoon the wind whistled through this city and section at the rate of 60 miles an hour, doing great damage to property. Large trees were split like kindling wood, electric light towers leveled and several houses wrecked. 

The talents of Mr. Ratz were very soon recognized by his new neighbors, and in 1879 he was prevailed upon to present himself as a candidate for the township council of Stephen. He was returned. In the following year he was elected as deputy reeve of the township. He served one year in this capacity, and in 1881 was returned by acclamation as reeve. For fifteen years he was chosen without opposition as head of the township rulers. The New Tariff

It Should Be Framed With a Single Eye to Canada's Welfare.

The Chances of Reciprocity With the United States.

How a Good Opportunity Was Let Slip by the Late Government.

Let Us Have a Low Tax on Standard British Goods.

Our Revenue Will Be Much Increased and No Tax Can Prevent the United States People from Buying Them.

Special Editorial Correspondence from the Capital.]

Ottawa, March 30 .- The future of our trade relations with other countries is much discussed in parliamentary circles these days, in view of the early passage of the new Canadian tariff. Senator David Mills today chatted freely on the question of whether or not an early betterment of our trade relations with the United States is probable.

"I have no special knowledge upon the subject," the honorable gentleman said to me, "and can only speak as any other private citizen from what I have noticed of the proceedings in Congress and the sentiments expressed in the newspapers which may be regarded as organs of the Republican party. Unfortunately, the two countries have not for some time been of one mind on trade questions. In 1891 the leaders of the Conservative party in Canada declared that they were about to negotiate a treaty of reciprocity with the United States Government; that Mr. Blaine and others had approached them on the subject, and that they had dissolved Parliament in order to obtain a mandate from the people in favor of reciprocity, so that they might speak with more authority when negotiations expressed himself ready to consider a liberal measure of reciprocity. But the Government of Canada had no intention to negotiate a treaty. They entered into communication for the purpose of putting an end to any chance of a trade arrangement between the two countries

"Since then the Democratic party have been in power and have gone out again. The present President of the United States is one of the most extreme school of protectionists, and seems to regard the United States as a close preserve for the exclusive use of the American capitalist. One can scarcely doubt the honesty of Mr. McKinley. He is a protectionist from conviction, and were it not for the popular representative for North Midpecuniary interests of his Government ne would perhaps contend that absolute prohibition of foreign intercourse in respect to every article of consumption that can be produced in the United States would be an advantage to the Republic. That, with one at the head of the Government holding such views of trade and commerce, a treaty of reciprocity can be negotiated. I cannot say; but I think the inference is that the chances are altogether against

> success in that direction.' "What course," I asked, "do you think the Parliament of Canada should pursue in case no reciprocity treaty is

"Your question is one," replied the Senator, "which would be more appropriate if put to a member of the House of Commons. But my impression is that you cannot altogether ignore the views on economic questions entertained by the people on the other side of the border. We sometimes confound economic reasons with reasons of state. I do not think that protection can ever be defended on economic grounds, though there may be reasons of state which sometimes justify its recognition. I notice that the Dingley Bill now before the Congress proposes many radical changes in the United States tariff, and that a great number of these changes are directly pointed against the trade of this country. In taking this course, the United States legislators do not profess to be actuated by any ill-will towards us, but assert that they have wholly their own interests in view. Now we may do the same thing. Let us carefully examine the proposed tariff. Let us notice the special articles that Congress is legislating to exclude And let us alter our tariff in respec to all these articles in such a way that Canada may become the field in which the purchases by individual consumer of the United States would be made In my opinion a very moderate Cana dian duty on cutlery, West of England broadcloths, on silks, gloves and a number of other articles, would give our Government a much larger revenue from these sources than they would derive from a very high tariff, because the wealthier classes of the Republic would purchase their goods in all our border towns and cities. "There is another consideration: The United States law against smuggling is very severe, and persons who are suspected are frequently detained for ity of being tried. In fact, the less evidence there is to convict, the more ikely are the authorities to deny a prompt trial. The temptation to engage in smuggling would lead to a great many commitments, and these cannot take place without making the law very unpopular. If the Canadian tariff is prepared from this point of view, it is not improbable that at the next congressional elections a Democratic House of Representatives will

succeed the present Republican House. "I am not, of course, expressing any opinion but my own; but when we find people undertaking to use their legislative powers to damage our trade and to restrict our intercourse with their people, we have most assuredly the right to legislate so as to extend that trade, even if it has the effect of rendering the efforts of the restrictionists abortive. I have never for a moment supposed that we were at any time commercially at the mercy of our neighbors, or that if we earnestly set ourselves about it we could not indefinitely extend our trade with the mother country, with the West Indies, with other portions of the world, and with people of the United States. in spite of the action of Congress to the contrary.

"I have heard it stated that President McKinley is prepared to consider the question of reciprocity, notwithstanding his tariff legislation. If so, no doubt the Canadian Government will be ready to entertain any proposition which he may make. But as he is not delaying his fiscal legislation on account of his readiness to negotiate a treaty, neither should we. Let us legislate, as he is doing, in the way most likely to make that legislation harmless, and, having done so, we will be the better prepared to consider any proposals for a more liberal commer-

Ottawa. March 30 .- The House reassembled yesterday after its three days' adjournment. Mr. J. F. 




