A Number of Passengers Cut and Bruised as G. T. R. Toronto-Montreal Train Crashes Into a Stalled Freight.

Toronto, Ont., March 5.—The G. T. R. express for Montreal, leaving here It 9 o'clock this morning, crashed into a stalled freight at York and a dozen passengers were injured, while a score had miraculous escapes from The engines were completely wrecked by the force of the impact. There is no explanation as to why the engineer of the express ran into the freight. The train was 40 minutes late and was traveling about 30 miles

Charlotte Bronte's handwriting seemed to have been traced with a needle, and the penmanship of Bryant was aggressive, well formed and decidedly pleasing to the eye. microscopic eyes were needed to read it. Longfellow wrote a bold, open black hand, which was the delight of printers.

Joaquin Miller writes such a bad hand that he often becomes puzzled over his own work. The handwriting of Capt. Marryatt letters from Germany to the Empress Josephine were at first taken for rough maps of the seat of war.

Much of Carlyle's temperament may be read in his handwriting. He wrote a patient, crabbed, oddly emphasized hand. The chirography of Walter Scott, Leigh the author's habit of writing with blue ures and interlineations, made his copy a burden to his published. Byron's handwriting was a mere scrawl. His additions in his proofs often exceeded in volume the original copy. To one of his poems, which contained only 400 lines in the original,

> Dr. Evans left the witness-stand today, subject to recall, for re-direct and re-cross-examination, but he may not be called for either. He protected the interests of the defense quite keenly throughout his cross-examination and at all times appeared a match for the district attorney, who displayed so much expert medical knowledge during his famous grilling of Dr. Wiley, the Pittsburg alienist. Dr. Evans admitted today that Thaw had an insane knowledge of what was doing on Madison Square Roof Garden the night he shot and killed Stanford White. The New York statutes prescribe that to be exempt from punishment for crime an insane person must have been so demented as not to know the nature or quality of his act, or to know that the

act is wrong. In explaining Thaw's actions subsequent to the shooting-his quiet demeanor, his directions as to what should be done with his wife, and who should be sent for-Dr. Evans declared that as soon as the defendant shot Stanford White the "brain storm" subsided and his senses began to reorganize themselves, so that the man knew quite well what he was about. He also knew he was attacking Stanford White when he shot the revolver, Dr. Evans admitted, but the knowledge was that of an insane man and the act was the

result of insane reasoning. Dr. Wagner also declared that Thaw had irrational knowledge of what was transpiring on the roof garden. He believed the prisoner's insanity dated from the time Evelyn Nesbit told him her story in Paris, in 1903. Dr. Wagner caused quite a stir in court by using the present tense in responding

to a question by Jerome, as to what form of insanity Thaw "has or had." Dr. Wagner testified that Thaw "is suffering" from symptoms which lead toward a melancholia and a state of dementia praecox. When asked to describe the latter phrase Dr. Wagner, said it covered such a wide field as to be difficult of strict definition. The condition of the prison's mind at the time of the shooting was the result of one of the insanities of adolescence. He would not further classify the next

The district attorney today continued his somewhat puzzling tactics. His questioning of Dr. Evans seemed to have the purpose of showing that Thaw never was insane to the extent contemplated by the criminal statutes of this state. Again, with Dr. Wagner as the witness, he worked toward the same end at one time, and another toward having Dr. Wagner admit that Thaw was suffering from forms of insanity which might be curable. The Canadian postoffice takes the I view that the time has come for reconsideration of the whole question of postal relations with the United States. especially as regards second and thirdclass matter. This country has been carrying 10,000 tons of newspapers and periodicals from the United States to every 1,000 sent from this country. But our grievance is not so much in this disproportion of things as in the fact that under cover of second-class matter the United States is sending in all manner of publications that are not entitled to the privilege. Canada takes the natural view under the circumstances that this is an unfair arrangement. Until now American publishers have been free to send into Canada all classes of papers and magazines without let or hindrance until they came under the ban as immeral or scurrilous. The effect has been an unjust dis-

The new policy of the postoffice department is to insist that Canada will not, in future, give any better treatment to United States publishers than to those of her own country; in brief, that there must be a square deal all around. Canada will also demand the right to exclude any matter from the mails which her postoffice department sees fit. 
