

HOSPITAL AFFAIRS.

Some criticism as to Victoria Hospital may be ventured without disparaging that institution, which is an excellent one from every standpoint but that of the taxpayer.

The fact that the city's share of the cost of maintaining it has increased from \$7,500 in 1898 to over \$30,000 this year, or four-fold, is a fair matter for comment and inquiry. The hospital has been greatly enlarged during this period, but its usefulness to the poorer class of citizens, who should be the main concern, is not so much more apparent now than ten years ago as to justify so rapid a growth of exture. Evidently there is no attempt to visitors. make the private wards self-supportleges of Victoria Hospital, and a portion of the cost of their maintenance comes out of the pockets of the ratepayers of London.

The other day a citizen and taxpayhe could not secure admission to Victoria Hospital for a member of his family, because the private wards were He had been contributing for years toward the cost of maintaining the hospital, but was denied the use of it, while at the same time non-resident patients were being cared for, partly at the expense of the ratepayers, including himself. Surely there was some justice in his complaint. The city hospital should be primarily for the citizens of London. Non-residents should be required to pay a self-supporting rate, and the number admitted should be so regulated that residents would not be refused accommodation on their account.

The soaring hospital expenditure of the past few years has not been a warning to civic administrators. Buildings are in course of erection which will cost \$75,000, while members of the medical profession claim that the amount is far in excess of the require-Necessarily the expense of maintaining the new buildings will add considerably to the ratepayers' burden. And with this enormous outlay for hospital purposes, and this great pile of buildings, there is no shelter for the poor consumptive!

CANADA AND THE STATES.

Commenting on the result of the Dominion elections, which it regards as an assurance that the policy of the Liberal Government will be continued the New York Journal of Commerce finds cause for regret in the stubborn attitude of the United States towards the Dominion in international trade matters. The obstinacy of Congress, it says, has given impetus to the preferential trade policy. The paper

tures for more neighborly trade relations were contemptuously rejected. they are being persecuted.

That the blunder then made can ever! be retrieved it does not believe; the United States can never recover the advantage Great Britain has gained. It is convinced, however, that the United States have much to gain by freer trade with Canada. "Will our statesmen," it asks, "persist in being obstinately blind to the opportunity of extending some part of the acknowledged benefit of unrestricted intercourse between the States to territory of like character adjoining them on the north?"

Evidently the press and people of the United States are awakening to the fact that the Laurier policy is the settled trade policy of Canada, and that we on this side of the internacarry it out, no matter what the views of our neighbors may be. We are enabled to do that because, having directed our trade into British channels; we are becoming increasingly independent of the United States in com mercial matters, though the trade between the two countries is bound to grow, from natural causes, in spite of tariff obstructions.




Eleven Killed in a Railway Accident Near New Orleans.
