THINKS ESKIMOS CAME FROM JAPAN

Rev. E. J. Peck's Interesting Address on Missionary Work in the Far North.

WORK IN HONAN, CHINA

No Easy Task, Said Rev. Principal Waller at Woman's Auxiliary Meeting Last Night.

A rare treat was last night's session of the Huron Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in Bishop Cronyn Hall, when an interesting map talk was given by Rev. Principal Waller, of Huron College, on the new Diocese of Honan, China, under the control of the Canadian Anglican Church.

The speaker opened with a geographical description of the Province of Honan, It is 465 miles from north to south, and 430 miles from east to west. This province contains a population equal to that of England and Wales, only 10,000,000 less than that of Japan, and eighteen times that of Ontario, although it is only one-third its size. It is the most densely popu-

lated country in the world. The evil of infanticide is one of the greatest difficulties which the missionaries have to contend with Orphan-ages and foundling homes have been established to counteract this evil.

Social Problems.
There are social problems. They are not educated, and do not consider it in the least necessary to educate their women. For years the horrible practice of foot-binding has been heard of, and Chinese literature is full of it. After seven years of age, the sexes to not mingle. Husbands never ear with their wives. 



THIRTEENTH CENSUS FOR UNCLE SAMUEL

Seventy Thousand Interrogators Will Take It and 90,000,000 Is the Estimate.

Washington, April 14.-Next Friday morning about 70,000 interrogators, men and women, will start taking the thirteenth census of the United

About 90,000,000 persons is the esti-mated population and the Government already has employed and will then put to work a body of enumerators considerably greater than the standing army.

The law provides that the enumeration shall begin April 15, but it is not so peremptory about the beginning as about the closing time.

The enumeration will cover all of the 45 states and 2 territories of the Union proper and also Hawaii and Porto Rico. Alaska, the Philippine Islands and Guam will not be included, as especial arrangements are made for numbering the people of

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NEW YOR State law fixing the tax operations in this state by foreign banks, is explained by R. Y.
