## WINDSOR WILL FIGHT ATTEMPT TO RAISE PRICE OF NATURAL GAS

Mayor Winter Declares Companies Have Made Big Profits.

INADEQUATE

Border Official Urges Government Not To Take Any Action.

Windsor, Feb. 12.—Inasmuch as it is a natural product and as such should belong to the people, the city of Windsor will fight any attempt on the part of the natural gas companies to raise the price, said Mayor Winter today, commenting upon the request of a delegation of natural gas company officials that waited upon Premier Drury on Tuesday.

The city's franchise calls for gas at 30c per thousand, which, his worship believes, is sufficient to cover operating expenses and pay a reasonable profit upon investments.

"When the supply was adequate the companies made huge profits," he said, "and now when the supply is inadequate, they desire to raise the price to the consumers to provide money to drill other wells. This work should be done out of the profits reaped in the past."

His worship welcomed the announcement that a series of investigation meetings are to be held at different points within the natural gas area and expressed a hope that Windsor would be favored.





LONDON, Feb. 11.-After considerable discussion of the question of nationalization of mines, the conference of manufacturers and producers convoked by the federation of British industries, today passed a resolution against state ownership and state managership of any branch of

Sir Adam Nimmo, vice-president of the Mining Association of Great Britain, who presented the resolution, said that the meaning of the demand of the miners for nationalization was an effort to seize the vitals of the community and force out of the community conditions as to wages and employment which the miners believed they ought to

Lloyd George Definitely Announces His Opposition To Plan.

DELAY DEVELOPMENT

Charges That the Miners Are Endeavoring To Gain Control.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—In outlining his scheme for nationalization of mines in the House of Commons, William Brace said there would be a committee to manage each pit and a committee for each of the fourteen districts into which Great Britain would be divided. Finally, there would be a body with a president of mines as chairman, to supervise all the coal fields of the country. The miners, the officials and the general public would be represented and each would be in the minority.

ARMY RETREATING.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—The remnants of the army of General Denikine, former anti-Bolshevik leader in Southern Russia, are retreating southward, accordsented and each would be in the minority.

Mr. Brace declared that his plan was not one of confiscation, but of fair purchase. The Government would give the shareholders bonds for their present shares. He asked that a tribunal be established to fix a fair price for such shares and he would favor even a generous price. 

### THE NUTHATCH.

Perhaps of all the winter bird friends the authatch is most interesting, not because he wants to be chums as does the friendly little chickadee, but owing to the unique and distinclive manner in which he roams where he will, ap or down the trunks of trees, or under and over its branches. There is impudence and faring in the very length of his bill and the tilt of his head as he lifts it on a downward purney of a tree to peer at one with inquisieness and disinterested curiosity. He is id about accepting the hospitality of the

window feeding board, and makes many experimental visits before he decides to partake of the feast outspread. His food consists largely of eggs and larvae of insects and spiders which he seeks on parts of trees that cannot be reached by other birds. His claws are provided with sharp little hooks that catch in the rough bark and make it quite as possible for him to run down the trunk of a tree as to climb upward, and very cleverly he avoids snow or ice on the limbs of the trees by running nimbly along underneath.

The nuthatch is a wise provider for a hungry day and has a most surprising habit of carrying food to a nearby tree and in the holes and crevices of the bark he hides his unneeded food against times of want. This is the origin of his name. He hides nuts in tree trunks and often in hammering his treasure securely into its hiding place, he breaks the nutshell with his! strong sharp beak and perhaps as a reward of his labor tastes a morsel of the meat. It is interesting to note a tree hiding-place of a home nuthatch, with the bark pierced in so many places with bits of food. The colder the day the busier and happier he is and though there is nothing appealing in his queer little chatter he has an interest of action and a striking beauty of plumage that make the winning of his notice well worth while. The whitebreasted nuthatch has a glossy black crown strongly contrasting the snow-white of his breast and blue-grey upper body and wings, the latter beautifully touched with lines of black, and the red-breasted nuthatch, also one of Canada's winter birds, has a rusty tint over his breast and curiously pencilled black lines extending little winter friends are ours to help us pass the grey days of the shut-in season. He and Lettow-Vorbeck were the only two German generals who retained favor after the surrender. Now Karl Kautsky, the Independent Socialist, who searched the archives of the foreign office and exposed the German-Austrian conspiracy to start the war, says that Hindenburg is likely to be elected president of the German Republic. "His popularity," says Kautsky, "is increasing im-

Here is something of a mystery. Hindenburg ingratiated himself with the people when he resolved to stick with the army after the armistice He acquiesced in the revolution. Of a passive and patient temperament, he phlegmatically accepted defeat and its consequences. He criticised nobody. He never manifested any desire to write a book Ludendorff became the scapegoat for all the mistakes made at the grand headquarters. The field marshal has always shown equanimity. Perhaps the people have come to regard him as a human

being rather than as a military autocrat. After 1870 the present French Republic elected Marshal MacMahon president, although his republicanism was hardly skin deep. The German Republic may follow that example by electing Hindenburg president. It would be a queer climax to the Max of Baden-Scheidemann revolution. But Hindenburg would come much nearer German ideals than Ebert does. He would never for instance, allow himself to be photographed in a bathing suit.





Dear Miss Grey.—As I haven't seen an answer to some requests that were help. One wanted to know how to care for a leopard plant. Give it new earth in the spring and leave in dark till roots get established. (I always soak off all the old earth.) Soak well with water after potting. It should be kept outdoors in the summer, but not in the sum. In winter it needs light, but not strong sun, and should be in a cool room. Most of them die from dry, hot atmosphere. Keep well watered.
