London, June 30. - The Belggide correspondent of the Times, says M. Petroff, the Bulgarian Premier, has given an interview in which he declared that the Sultan of Turkey and the Bulgarian Government were both opposed to war, but the situation was worse than at any time since the delivery of the Turkish note last spring. Though most of the prisoners at Salonica had been released, 400 fresh arrests have been made and 3.000 refugees have arrived at Adrianople. The aim of the Turks, the Premier is reported as saying, is the deliberate extermination of the Bulgarians in Macedonia by methods scarcely short of massacre, and the high officials in Turkey are pro-





Ottawa, June 29. - In the House of Commons today Mr. Fitzpatrick introduced a bill to amend the criminal code. He explained that it embodied them important, but not involving any general principle. 

The Fiscal Question Debated in the

House of Lords.

London, June 30 .- The fiscal question was again the subject of debate in the House of Lords last night and brought out a statement from Earl of Selborne, first lord of the admiralty, that an inquiry would first be conducted by the cabinet for its own information, but that finally there


