The Fight for the Water.

Che Foo, Oct. 3, 3:30 p.m.-A private letter received here today from Port Arthur, dated Sept. 23, gives further details of the fighting from Sept. 19 to Sept. 22. The attack began with a heavy bombardment directed against nearly all the Russian outposts and List of Those Appointed for Western many of the forts. The shelling of the redoubts protecting the water supply of Port Arthur was tremendous. Nightfall Sept. 19 found the waterworks Ottawa, Oct. 3.—All but seventeen of redoubts reduced to mere heaps of debris. The garrisons of the redoubts thereupon retreated safely to the main fortifications under the cover of the

> At 4 o'clock the same afternoon (Sept. 19) the Japanese assault on High Hill began. The Japanese plan of attack never varied. First a bombardment and then assault, and when repulsed a bombardment again and then another assault. The desperate determination of the Japanese to capture this position amounted to fanaticism, their efforts never ceasing during four days. One battalion of Japanese, having retreated into a valley, were exposed to the Russian shrapnel fire, and were almost annihilated. Eventually the Japanese succeeded in placing one field gun and two machine guns in position behind hastily made barriers. Their tenure of the position, owing to the fire from the inner forts, was very insecure, and when Lieut. Poggorsky and the volunteers charged, the tide turned again, One battalion, composed of the remnants of two companies, was annihilated in the trenches, which refused to desert. Another detachment was driven into the Russian entanglements, where Capt. Sychaff's force was waiting, and completed its route. Two other attempts made by the Japanese to retake the positions failed.

CHANGES IN GOLF RULES

St. Andrew's Club Clears Up Several + Disputed Points.

London, Oct. 4.-New rules of golf were adopted at the meeting of the Royal and Ancient Club at St. Andrews last week. The new reading of rule 14 provides: First-If the ball lie or be lost in water or in casual water in a hazard, the ball may be dropped in or as far behind the hazard as the players may please, under hazard as the players may please, under penalty of one stroke, but if it be impossible from want of space in which to play, or from any other cause to drop the ball behind the hazard, the player may drop the ball at the side of the hazard as near as possible to where the ball lay, but not nearer to the hole, under penalty of one stroke.


Second—If a ball lie or be lost in casual water through the green, and thus interferes with the player's stance, the player eres with the player's stance, the player may drop the ball without penalty two club lengths from the margin directly behind the place where the ball lay, or behind the place where the ball lay, or from the margin nearest the place where the ball lay, but not nearer to the hole. If the ball when dropped roll into the water, or rest so that the water interferes

water, or rest so that the water interferes with the player's stance, it may be redropped without penalty, as near to the margin as the nature of the ground permits, but not nearer to the hole.

Three—In dropping the ball behind the spot from which the ball was lifted, the player shall keep that soot or in case of player shall keep that spot, or, in case of water, the spot at which the ball entered in a line between himself and the hole. Wherever it is impossible to drop the ball as prescribed in sections 1 and 2 the ball as prescribed in sections 1 and 2, it shall be dropped as near as possible to the place where it lay, but not nearer to the hole. The penalty for breach of this rule shall be the loss of the hole. Rule 15—The ball shall be dropped in the following manner: The player himself shall drop it. He shall face the hole, stand erect, and drop the ball behind him from his head.
