### JAPS PEACE MOVE FAILS

But It Brings Intervention Within Measurable Distance.

Waited States, Great Britain and France May Mre Long, After the Fall of Port Arthur, Propose Arbitration Settlement -Bussia Not Pavorable to Outside Interference, But Might Consider a Direct

London, Nov. 11.—Japan unofficially has made representations to Russia looking to peace. This action has resulted in failure and such representations even privately are not likely to be repeated by Japan. Although the suggestion of a pacific settlement was made unofficially, it actually had behind it all the weight of an offer by the Japanese Government. It was made direct to Russian and the settlement was made under the set of an offer by the Japanese Government. It was made direct to Russia. No power acted as an intermediary. The proposition was put forward tentatively and unofficially, so that the Japanese Government would be in a position to deny any report that it was suing for peace. The failure of these direct negotiations, however, resulted in bringing intervention within a measurable distance. Foreign Secretary Lanswows's plea for arbitration Wednesday evening at the Guildhall banquet is taken here to be a pointed suggestien to the United States and

suggestion to the United States and France that the time is approaching when the powers must take some ac tion. It can be definitely stated that Lord Lansdowne made his speech with full knowledge that Japan will not resent a proposition looking to beace from the three powers—the United States, France and Great Bri-

Baren Hayashi's View.

In an interview regarding the fore-going, Baron Hayashi, the Japanse Minister, said:

"I should not be surprised to see the three powers named, or two of them, take the action suggested. Exactly upon what basis of a settle-ment peace could be secured it is at present impossible to see, but there is not the slightest doubt that comis not the slightest doubt that com-bined representations, especially if led by President Roosevelt, would have a far-reaching result between two countries, one of which was thoroughly defeated. It is compara-tively easy to make peace in this case, as neither side is thoroughly de-feated yet. The prospects for the success of friendly intervention have vastly increased since the commencesuccess of Friendly intervention have wastly increased since the commencement of the war. The two nations now respect each other to a degree never greamed of before they met in battle. That mutual respect is the most hopeful factor for peace. Japan does not want to go on fighting an does not want to go on fighting forever: Yet, even with all the vic-tories won during this war her statesmen would render themselves liable to be most seriously misunder-stood, especially in Russia, if they openly suggested in the name of humanity some method whereby the humanity some method whereby the war could be stopped. It would be altogether different, however, at this stage of the war, should a friendly offer, prompted by that sense of humanity which Japan cannot voice for fear of being misunderstood, emanates from the United States and Great Britain, but nothing can be done until the fall of Port Arthur."

Fall of Port Arthur. Baron Hayashi intimated that he thought that the fall of the fortress would not long be delayed, and

"In the meantime, I have no doubt that the powers who are now so willing to express their desire for peace will confidentially exchange views in the hope of arriving at some suggestion practical to both belligerents."

Has Not Found Favor.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 11.—In official circles Lord Lansdowne's veiled suggestion, that the Russo-Japanese conflict might be settled by arbitrations. tion finds an unfavorable echo. The sentiment prevails stronger than ever that Russia's prestige must be vin-dicated before the idea of peace can be entertained. The mere fact that the suggestion comes from Great Britain's Foreign Secretary does not tend to its kindly reception here. The firm conviction is expressed that have been privy to such a move. The general opinion is that Lord Lansdowne's suggestion was in the nature of a personal trial balloon.

Did Tekio Inspire Lansdowne? Hopeless as is the idea of bringing the war to a conclusion it seems, however, that there are those in high quarters who consider that there is a bare possibility of bringing the conflict to a close on the basis of arbitration if such a proposition came directly from Japan. Indeed, it is even intimated that Lord Lansdowne's suggestion may have been inspired from Tokio. Russia has announced again and again that no proposition from an uninterested power would even be answered, but that any proposition from Japan direct, no matter through what in-termediary, would be considered. A proposal from Japan to arbitrate the controversy would appeal strongly to Emperor Nicholas. He is extremely proud of being the author of The Hague conference, and, in spite of the difficult position in which Russian

sian military prestige would be left by a cessation of hostilities at this juncture, those competent to judge actually entertain the belief that such an offer on the part of the Japanese would not be in vain.

No Intervention For Russia. Washington, Nov. 11.—Emphatically, but with all courtesy. Russia, through her Ambassadors abroad has several times informed the neutral powers that she will brook no mediation at this time with her war with Japan. It can be announced that Russia expects her wishes will be respected by all the powers to which she has communicated her

views.

### STORSSEL ASKS ARMISTICE.

If Port Arthur Holds Out Till Captured

Tokio, Nov. 11.—It is reported that Gen. Stoessel, commanding at Port Arthur, has asked the Japanese for an armistice, the purpose of which is not stated. A confirmation of the rean armistice, the purpose of which is not stated. A confirmation of the report is unobtainable. It is hoped here that Gen. Stoessel will capitulate before the city proper is taken. The Japanese soldiers are angry and inflamed on account of the alleged abuse of their wounded by the Russians. They believe they will be murdered if captured. Under these conditions it will possibly be difficult to avoid a massacre when the troops meet in the final combat.

A report from General Nogi's head-quarters before Port Arthur, dated November 9, says: "The enemy's military warehouse, situated in the northern part of Port Arthur, was bombarded November 6 with heavy siege and naval guns. The bombardment caused a conflagration. On the

ment caused a confiagration. On the afternoon of November 6 the magazine of an old battery on Sungenow Mountain was exploded by our shells."

Herrers At Pert Arthur.

London, Nov. 11.—Special despatches from Port Arthur and Che Foo printed in yesterday morning's newspapers give terrible descriptions of the condition of the besieged. The Daily Mail's correspondent before Port Arthur describes the Russian killed and those taken prisoners as greatly emaciated and asserts that the men subsist entirely on a daily ration of less than two pounds of black bread. black bread.

The Daily Telegraph's Che Foe correspondent declares that the task of burying the bodies of the slain at Port Arthur is now beyond control and that the corpses are simply pitched into the new dock excava-tions near Golden Hill and where there is only a few feet of water. The condition of the helpless women

The condition of the helpless women is heartrending. Several groups of them going to market have been blown to pieces. The street scenes there are said to be sickening. Bennett Burleigh also sends to The Daily Telegraph a harrowing picture of the condition of the wounded in Port Arthur, of whom great numbers are lying unattended within the inner forts. In the name of common humanity he thinks some effort should be made in behalf of these helpless sufferers. He suggests that as soon as possible they should be taken upon neutral vessels flying the taken upon neutral vessels flying Red Cross and transferred to hospitals at Che Foo and Shanghai.

Mukden, Nov. 11.—The Japanese yesterday assumed the offensive on the left bank of the Hun River, and occupied three villages. The Russians, however, attacked, drove them out and again established their original lines of defence. Vice-Admiral Skrydloff arrived here yesterday.

To Bury the Dend. St. Petersburg, Nov. 11.—The War Office has no late advices from Port Arthur, and nothing is known here of the report that Gen. Stoessel has asked for an armistice, but if so, it is considered that it must have been to bury the dead, and not in view of a capitulation.

After Half An Hour. Gen. Oku's Headquarters, Nov. 11. (4 p. m.)—Via Fusan, Nov. 11.—A spirited Russian attack on an ad-vance post Tuesday night was re-pulsed after a half hour of musketry

fire. The scouting of positions is progressing.
Laid Villages in Ruins.

London, Nov. 11.—The Daily Tele-graph's correspondent with General Oku cables under date of Nov. 9: "Last night the Russians made several determined attacks upon Lamunting and Sinchingpo, but were repulsed with heavy losses. The artillery laid the villages in ruins."

For North Sea Inquiry. St. Petersburg, Nov. 11.-The following have been appointed assessors of the North Sea Commission: Lieut.-Col. Stenger of the Ministry of Marine, Lieut.-Col. Wolkoff and Dr. Maudelstam, the latter dragomañ of the Russian embassy at Con-stantinople, and an authority on in-ternational law.

POLITICS AND THE CIVIL SER-VICE.

The position of the civil service in case of a change of government in Ontario has been the subject of a good deal of discussion, Mr. Whitney has never declared himself as in favor of the spoils system in politics. but a definite declaration against it would be reassuring to those electors who have not quite made up their minds. In a party excluded from power for a third of a century the pressure is likely to be pretty strong, and should be strongly resisted. In Canada the party system is applied to the extent of favoring the dominant party in appointments and in promotions. Neither the Mackenzie Government in 1874, nor the Macdonald Government in 1878, nor the Laurier Government in 1896, adopted the system of turning out the officials appointed by their opponents, and replacing them by their own friends. In the case of the Laurier Government a distinction was made between the ordinary Conservative and the "offensive partisan," which is good enough when applied in reason, and not made a ground for discharging a postmaster who indulges in a little chuckling over the elec-tion of a party friend. The general rule is that the civil servant should keep out of active politics, and should be protected so long as he does his duty and is loval to his chief. The civil service of Ontario con-

tains many members whose dismissal would be a loss to the public, and to the efficiency of the Government of the day, whatever its politics may be. In the discharge of their duties they show not only fidelity but enthusiasm, making a study of their work as a lawyer or a doctor does of his profession. A Government which discharged an official of that kind would be working against its own interests, as well as against those of the Province. There are others whose places could be more easily filled, but who have grown up in the service, and become unfitted for any other occupation. To turn them out would mean not only hardship but injustice, for they have been encouraged by the general practice of the country to regard their positions as permanent. Their successors, while they might be gratified for the moment, would be marked out for similar treatment by the opposite party. Nobody would benefit in the long run, and the public service would be disorganized.

Nothing could be said against the weeding out of the inefficient and the dishonest, provided they are replaced by better men. But we do not think that these faults will be found to prevail on so large a scale as to justify sweeping changes. The scandals attaching to this Government have been connected with elections rather than with the work of the departments, and have been due ainly to a determination to keep the Government in power after it nas lost its hold upon the people. reat faults might, of course, be reealed by a change of Government; ad these cases could be dealt with they arose. But an indiscriminate slaught on the officials would undo ch of the good that may be exted from a change of government.



# **BID FOR INTERVENTION**

Arbitration of Russ-Jap War Pleaded By Lord Lansdewne.

At Lord Mayor's Banquet in London, in the Absence of Premier Ballour, He Speaks On Behalf of the British Government For Peace-Utterances Are Regarded As Almost a Plea For Russia and Are Received in Silence.

and Are Received in Silence.

London, Nov. 10.— Lord Lansdowne, in the absence of Premier Balfour, at the historic Lord Mayor's banquet, held last night, made a strong plea for peace and arbitration on behalf of the British Government. Lord Lansdowne pointed out to a large and rather unsympathetic audience that arbitration was the only way in which the North sea dispute with Russia could have been equitably settled, and almost in the same breath drew a vivid picture of the horrors of the struggle now proceeding in the Far East. Between the lines of every reference the Foreign Minister made to the Russian-Japanesse war was an urgent plea, amounting almost to a demand, that it might be settled by arbitration.

It was a carefully prepared statement before what is considered the most representative gathering of leading men of Great Britain. As such it was generally interpreted as a bolder bid for intervention than has yet emanated from any neutral power. America was writ large in his speech, for which Great Britain has been waiting for many days. The Foreign Minister prefaced all his remarks by saying: "That great statesman, John Hay, recently remarked that war was the most futile and fallacious of human follies."

Although Lord Lansdowne was unable to announce the signing of the convention, he emphatically confirmed statements he emphatically confirmed statements made in these despatches, namely, that Great Britain had found "no difficulty in arriving at a solution in principle of the dispute," and only supplemented what is already known by the statement that Russia has guaranteed the punishment of any other officers in addition to those already detached from Admiral Rojestrensky's squadron, who might be

other officers in addition to those already detached from Admiral Rojestvensky's squadron, who might be proved to have been implicated.

By most of his hearers, Lord Lansdowne's utterances were regarded almost as a plea for Russia. A dead silence greeted him, as after pointing out that the two Governments in good faith believed in contradictory statements of facts, he asked: "Could we have done better than get full apology and compensation and leave the question of facts to an international tribunal with a guarantee of punishment of any who may be found guilty."

Lord Lansdowne, in connection with the question of contraband, seriously reminded the audience that Great Britain, as the greatest naval power, might some day be the greatest sufferer by a restriction of belligerent rights on the high seas.

"At this moment," said Lord Lansdowne, "contemplating the terrible struggle between two brave and gallant nations in the Far East, can one of us contemplate without regret the legion after legion of brave men teing led forth to meet their fate and the ruined homes and broken hearts? We can conceive no more terrible punishment than the remorse of any Minister or body of Ministers who from loss of temper or desire of popularity brought upon the country the scourge and calamity of needless war.

At this auspicious moment I am able to announce to you that not only the peace of the country is unbroken, but so far as I am able to foresee, there is no reason why it should not remain unbroken. Not only have we had the good fortune to avoid war, but by the strict neutrality and wise international arrangements we have done something to restrict the area of hostilities. The country, however, has not altogether escaped anxieties. For the last few days we have been face to face with an incident which moved the people of this country as few other incidents have done. The incident of October 21 in the North Sea was an attack on our citizens and an affront to the British flag which, if intentional, I would rather not contemplate the consequences. It was a deplorable and unaccountable blunder, but I am bound to add that recent evidence have satisfied the British Government that the Russian Government believed that the facts were different from what we supposed, and that each party was convinced of the justice of its own cause. After detailing what would be the procedure of the court, Lord Lansdowne referred to the smallness of the number of Russian officers left at Vigo and said: "It was not for us to assume the responsibility for the selection of the officers. That rested with Russia, and it would be a great mistake to relieve her of the responsibility."

Weuld Punish All.

Great Britain had received a full expression of regret a promise of ample compensa-

Great Britain had received a full expression of regret, a promise of ample compensation and a guarantee against a recurrence, with security for all neutral commerce and promise of the punishment of the guilty persons. Was it possible to secure more? Continuing, Lord Lansdowne, referred to other questions which have arisen during the war, especially that of contraband, which had been largely cleared up, and since July there had been no case of seizing a British skip by Russian vessels. "I am sanguine enough to say," Lord Lansdowne remarked, "that good is likely to come from this struggle in the Far East. It is my hope and belief that this terrible war will give a stimulus to the existing desire for some less clumsy and brutal method of adjusting international differences. I myself have tional differences. I myself have signed no less than five treaties of arbitration.

Do Away With Wars.

"Only yesterday the American Ambassador, Mr. Choate, asked me if we were prepared to sign a similar treaty with America. I have also lately been asked by President Roosevelt, to whom we may offer congratulations on his return to party to party. power by a vast majority, to participate in a second international peace conference. While reserving the right to censider what subjects and the terms of reference, we did not hesitate to say that we were ready to participate and to tell the presi-dent that we wished him Godspeed in the useful work he has undertaken. Is not there a better way than this? Is it not better to so arrange

Lord Lansdowne then referred to the Anglo-French arbitration and said he hoped it would be adopted by a large majority of the Chamber of Deputies and that it would be effectual in removing dangerous and difficult questions from international controversy. He saw something of this in the assistance Great Britain had received during the last few days from the French Government in bringing about an amicable settlement between Great Britain and Russia.

Toronto, Nov. 10.—The trial of Alexander Martin and his wife, Ethel, was commenced in the Criminal Assize Court yesterday, before Chief Justice Falconbridge. Hassard for the husband. Both prisoners pleaded "not guilty." Court adjourned at 5 p.m., and the jurors were locked up over night.

### DID THEY KILL BABY?

Crewn Argues That Martins Premeditated Murder.

ounsel For Defence Advances Theories of sonable Doubt For Woman's Part of the Crime-Martin's Counsel Pleads That a Little Child's Life Is Not So Valuable That Accuseds' Lives Should Be Taken From Them.

Toronto, Nov. 11.-The trial of the Martins on the charge of murdering their child on Aug. 3, last, will be esumed at 10 a. m. to-day, when Chief Justice Falconbridge will make his charge to the jury. The court-room was crowded all day yesterday. The prisoners were more downcast than on the day before, and seemed to cling to one another for sympathy and protection. They realized more fully the awful position they have placed themselves in.

Confession Not Evidence.

The principal witness of the day was Mrs. Whidden, the police matron, to whom Mrs. Martin made a confession the night she was arrested. His Lordship informed the jury that this confession could not be used as evidence against the husband. Mrs. Martin's confession was that she and her husband went out in a boat. Her husband complained that she was husband complained that she was taking too long to find a place for the child. He wanted to go to the fort, but could not, as long as they were burdened with the child. They quarreled, and Martin reached over, snatched the child from her, struck it en the head with something (it was not an oar), and threw it into the lake. Then she fainted. When she revived they were some distance for the war over distance that was not an oar). vived, they were some distance from the spot. She saw the child floating in the water. She said to her hus-band, "Oh, Alex! Oh, Alex! Row back! Row back!" They did so, but the baby had sank. Mrs. Martin did not say whether the crime had been planned or not in advance. After the confession, Mrs. Martin had asked if she might have a rattle that was found on the body of the child as a

nound on the body of the child as a memento.

During the recital of the confession by Mrs. Whidden, the prisoners were both much affected.

This closed the Crown's case, and the defence did not call any witness-

Counsels' Addresses.

Mr. Robinette, counsel for the wo-man prisoner, was the first to ad-dress the jury. He argued that what-ever took place in the boat, Mrs. dress the jury. He argued that whatever took place in the boat, Mrs. Martin was not a party to it. Her confession to Mrs. Whidden was the whole and the true story. Before a verdict of guilty of murder could be found against the woman, the jury must find that she aided and abetted the crime. There was no evidence to show that she was anxious to get rid of her child. That she had not told of the deed was due to the fact that she wished to shield her husband, the man she married and loved. The jury might find her guilty of the concealment of the murder, but a further imprisonment would add to her punishment. She had already suffered great anguish and trouble. Counsel spoke for 45 minutes.

For over two hours Mr. Hassard spoke on behalf of Martin. He said there was no evidence te show that the prisoners had plotted the crime, or that they had made any efforts to get rid of the baby.

It was possible that the child may have been irritable, and Mrs. Martin, while trying to soothe it by swaying it to and fro in her arms, dropped it, the head striking on the edge of the boat, the body falling into the

it to and fro in her arms, dropped it, the head striking on the edge of the boat, the body falling into the water. In order to avoid paying for a funeral, which would be expensive, they decided upon telling the story that the child had been taken to Port Hope.

Port Hope.

If murder had been planned, they would not have gone to such a public place as Munro Park. They would lic place as Munro Park. They would not have returned to the place where they had been stopping. They would have removed the clething, so that identification would have been impossible. The jury must not find that a murder had been committed. Was it possible that it was a case of manslaughter? The life of that little child was not so valuable that the lives of the two prigoners should be lives of the two prisoners should be taken from them. Counsel closed with an impassioned appeal to hand him back the prisoners with a ver-dict of "not guilty."

Same Verdict For Both.

Crown Prosecutor Proudfoot explained to the jury that it was only his duty to lay before them the evidence, and not to make an appeal for the conviction of the prisoners. He argued that the crime was premeditated, that their coming to Toronto and engaging rooms under false names showed that there was a crime intended. When they hired the boat at Munro Park, they had the child with them. When they came back on the ferry boat it was not with them. Where was it? When they left the ferry, why did they not go to their room instead of remaining away until all in the house had retired? It was to give credence to the story that they had been to Port Hope and left the child there. It showed that the woman was willing to cover up what had taken place. Her sorrow on the street car going to the park showed that she knew what the journey was for. The jury must not let sorrow for the prisoners obscure their vision of justice. It was always difficult in murder cases to Crown Prosecutor Proudfoot exmust not let sorrow for the prisoners obscure their vision of justice. It was always difficult in murder cases to obtain direct evidence of the commission of the crime, and in most murder cases something was forgotten that led to the conviction of the guilty. In this case Martin had forgotten that the body of an infant would float. If the woman did know that it was her husband's intention to murder the child, she was as guilty as he. If she loved the child, what was to prevent her making known his intentions? The jury must find the same verdict for both.



### THE QUESTION OF

DOCTORS' FEES

The question of doctors' fees is one of great and vital interest to the public at large. Yet it is one which is little understood and less appreci-

ated.

The writer was brought up in the gloomy atmosphere of Harley Street and the inner circle of the professions and can speak with knowledge of the fees of the specialist, who must be divided into two distinct classes—the surgeon proper and the pure physicsurgeon proper and the pure physician. The former unquestionably gets big fees in ration to his reputation. Sir Frederick Treves has only to name his fee to the millionaire with appendicitis. With the fear of death name his fee to the millionaire with appendictis. With the fear of death before his eyes he will write his check gladly. When he has recovered he often grumble, if he does not boast. A younger and less-known man will perform the same operation for a tithe of the cost; but the public, with death staring them in the face, will have the man with the big name, regardless of expense. They feel, often wrongly, that it will only serve to swell the death duties if they do not. But the pure physician is an entirely different matter. His fees are standardised, not by act of parliament, but by that autocratic body the Royal College of Physicians, His fees for consultation at his own house are fixed at two guineas the first visit and a guinea for each subsequent one. For consultations away from home he receives a fee at the

from home he receives a fee at the calculated rate of two-thirds of a

guinea a mile.

Elstree, twelve miles out of town, is ipso facto 8 guineas; Tonbridge, 30 miles, is 20 guineas; Liverpool, 201 miles, is 134 guineas; and so on pro rata. But it must be remember-

If the physician should accept more, he transgresses that professional fetish, "medical etiquet," and is branded a quack by his less lucky brethren.

Moreover, when he arrives at a sufficient standing in the ranks of his profession, the Royal College of Physicians will not elect him to their all-important fellowship, the crowning qualification and highwater mark of his calling. Often he takes considerably less out of charity, or from fear of losing the badly-needed fee, For instance, a prepaid telegram will often save a considerable sum in the case of a consultation out of town. His only advantage is that he gets cash "on the nail." Compare these fees with the retainer and refreshers of our leading counsel, and the inequality becomes obvious. The cheapness of it becomes absurd.

"But what do we get for our two guineas?" asks the public. Only an opinion—a quarter of an hour in the consulting-room. True, often enough but what is that opinion built up of? Firstly, a brilliant career at the university and the hospitals; for no man can get up as a specialist without first-class qualifications. Secondly half the day spent voluntarily at the hospitals, seeing cases, often a hundred in an afternoon, free of charge, to qualify himself to arrive at and express that opinion—killing work, which weeds out the weaklings before name, fame or fortune is reached. To arrive at success, is, above everything, the sign of an extraordinary tough constitution.

Further, no man in Harley Street can make two ends meet for many long years: and the waiting breaks many hearts and pockets. It is a weary struggle to keep up appearances, to pay a big rent and a bigger rate, to run a carriage, and to stimulate prosperity. Therefore, it means of necessity either a considerable private income to start with or marriage with a rich woman. The pub-

rate, to run a carriage, and to stimulate prosperity. Therefore, it means of necessity either a considerable private income to start with or marriage with a rich woman. The public who talk about big fees would be astonished if they could examine the books in Harley street.

Then, after years of struggling without enough money to enjoy the compulsory leisure of waiting, if success comes, the poor harassed consultant has no time to spend or enjoy the money he does make. All his return for it is a baronetcy and a comfortable fortune for his son to squandor. His dinnner is as often as not eaten in his carriage or in the train, and all his wife sees of him is his sleeping head, on the pillow beside her. The writer once heard the wife of one of the leading men in the profession say that she was far happier in the struggling days! Yet his fees, however, big his reputation, must always adhere to the one standard. It is nonsense to talk of any "physician with a reputation demanding from ten to twenty guineas for scribbling out a prescription of gentian and sodawater as a remedy for indigestion."

Thus it is with the Sir William Broadbents, the Sir Thomas Barlows, the Sir Richard Douglas-Powells of the profession, who earn large incomes and have no leisure to enjoy them, Does it not prove that this standardised system is wrong? If the College of Physicians would consider a suggestion from a layman, it seems to the writer that a graduated system is not only more logical, but would show better results all round.


