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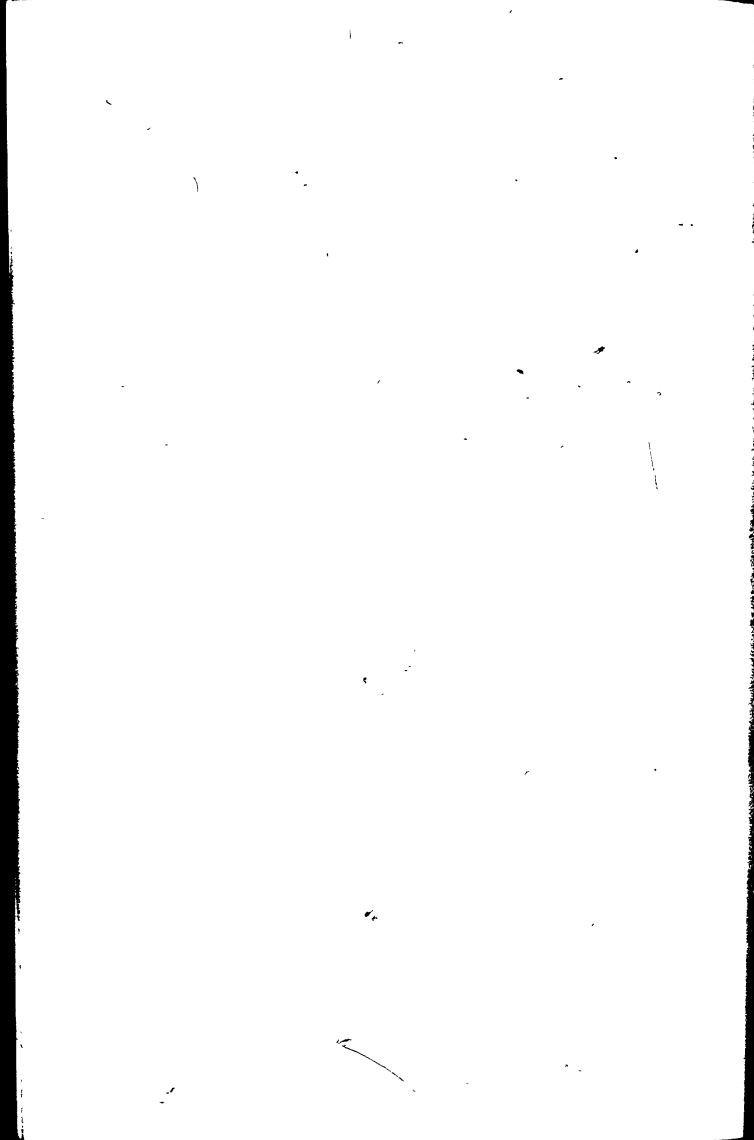

The Supreme Court of the Dominion of
Canada.

Chief Justice: The Hon. WILLIAM JOHNSTON RITCHIE. S. of the late Hon Justice Ritchie, of N.S. B at Annapolis, N.S. Ed. at Pictou. M. 1st Miss Strang, of St. Andrews, N.B. (she d.); 2nd. 1854. Grace Vernon, dau. of the late Thos. L. Nicholson, Esq., of St John, and step-dau of the late Admiral Hon W F. W. Owen, R.N., of Campobello. Studied law with his brother, the present Chief Judge in Equity for N. S., and was called to the Bar, N.B. 1838. Created a Q.C. 1854. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, N.B. from Oct. 1854 until apptd. a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of N.B., 17th Aug. 1855. in which position he remained until he succeeded the late Hon Robert Parker as Chief Justice of N.B., 6 Dec. 1865. Apptd. a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of the Dominion, 8

Oct. 1875. Apptd. Chief Justice 11 Jan. 1879. (*Salary* \$8,000). Sat for the City and County of St. John in N.B. Assembly from 1846 until 1851, when he retired, and from 1854 until his elevation to the Bench.—*Beechwood, New Edinburgh.*

PUISNE JUDGES.

The Hon. SAMUEL HENRY STRONG. S. of Rev. Dr. Strong, formerly Minister of the Church of Eng. at Hull, P.Q., and now of Toronto. B. in Eng. 1826. Called to the Bar, U.C., Hilary Term, 1849. Created a Q.C. 1863. Apptd. a Vice-Chancellor for Ont. 27 Dec. 1869; transferred to the Court of Error and Appeal, 27 May 1874; apptd. a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court, 8 Oct. 1875. (*Salary* \$7,000).—*Ottawa.*

The Hon. TELESOPHORE FOURNIER. B. at St. François, Rivière du Sud, Montmagny, P.Q. 1824. Ed. at Nicolet College. M. 1857, Miss Demers. Called to the Bar, L.C. 1846. Created a Q.C. 1863. Has been *Batonnier* of the Quebec Bar, and Presdt. of the General Council of the Bar of the Province of Quebec. Was one of the Editors of *Le National* newspaper (Quebec) 1856-7-8. Sworn of the Privy Council, 7 Nov. 1873, and was Minister of Inland Revenue from that date until 8 July 1874, when apptd. to succeed Hon. A. A. [now Chief Justice] Dorion as Minister of Justice, in which office he remained until transferred to the Post Office Department, 19 May 1875. Apptd. a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court, 8 Oct. same year. (*Salary* \$7,000). Sat for Bellechasse in House of Commons from Aug. 1870 until his elevation to the Bench, and represented Montmagny in Quebec Assembly from g.e. 1871 until 7 Nov. 1873, when he resigned on his taking office. The Supreme Court Act and the Insolvency Act, 1875, were introduced and carried through Parlt. by Mr. Fournier, as Minister of Justice.—*Daly street, Ottawa.*

The Hon. WILLIAM ALEXANDER HENRY. B. in Halifax, N.S. 30 Dec. 1816. Ed. there. M. the dau. of Hugh McDonald, Esq., of Antigonish, N.S. Called to the Bar, N.S. 1841. Created a Q.C. 1849. Has been Mayor of Halifax. Became a mem. of the Ex. Council 1849, and subsequently held office as Solicitor Genl. [three times]; Provl. Secy. and Atty.-Genl. Was a delegate to Eng. on public business in 1858 and 1865, and to Washington on Reciprocity Treaty, in conjunction with Hon. Messrs. Galt [now

Sir A. T.], A. J. Smith [now Sir A. J.], and Howland [now Sir W. H.], late Lieut.-Gov. of Ont., 1866. Sat in the Charlottetown Union Conference, in that at Quebec, and in the final Conference then assembled in London, 1866, to complete terms of Union of B. N. Provinces. Was a mem. of the N. S. Assembly for many years from the date of his first election, 1841. An unsuccessful candidate for Antigonish in House of Commons at g.e. 1867, and for Richmond in the same Chamber, March 1869. An *ad hoc* Judge in the trial of election cases in N.S. 1874. Apptd. to Supreme Court, 8 Oct. 1875. (*Salary* \$7,000.)—*Ottawa*.

The Hon. HENRI ELZEAR TASCHEREAU. Eldest s. of the late Pierre Elzear Taschereau, Esq., a mem. of the Assembly of L. C. and subsequently of that of the U. P., by Catherine Hénédine, daughter of the late Hon. Amable Dionne, M.L.C. B. at St. Marys, Beauce, P.Q. 7 Oct. 1836. Is co-proprietor of the Seigniorie of Ste. Marie de la Beauce, conceded to his great-grandfather in 1744. Ed. at the Quebec Seminary. M. 27 May 1857, a dau. of the late Hon. R. U. Harwood, M.L.C. Called to the Bar in Oct. 1857. Created a Q.C. 1867; practiced in Quebec with the late Wm. Duval, Esq., and later on with Jean Blanchet, Esq. Q.C. Sat in Beauce in Can. Assembly from g.e. 1861, until the Union of 1867, when defeated for the House of Commons. Apptd. a Clerk of the Peace for the Dis. of Quebec, 30 Sept. 1868, an office he shortly afterwards resigned. Apptd. a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court for the Pro. of Quebec, 12 Jan. 1871. Apptd. a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of the Dominion, Oct. 1878 [as successor to his cousin the Hon. J. T. Tachereau.] (*Salary*, \$7000.) Hon. M. Tachereau is author of *The Criminal Law for the Dominion of Canada, with Notes, Commentaries, Precedents of Indictments, &c.*, vols. 8 vo.; and of *Le Code de Procedure Civile du Bas Canada, with Annotations*.

The Hon. JOHN WELLINGTON GWYNNE—B. at Castle Knock, the County of Dublin, Ireland, on the 30 March 1814. S. of the late Rev. William Gwynne, D.D., and of Eliza, his wife, daughter of the Rev. Hugh Nelson, of Dunshaughlin, County of Meath. Entered Trinity College, Dublin, in July 1828. Came to Canada, and was admitted a mem. of the Law Society at Toronto as a student in law in June 1832. Studied first in the office of the late Thomas Kirkpatrick, Esq., of Kingston, Q.C., and M.P., for County Frontenac, and afterwards in that of the late Mr. Justice Hagerman and Chief

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Justice Draper, then practising in partnership at Toronto. Was called to the Bar in June 1837. Contested unsuccessfully the Co. of Huron at the g. e. in 1847 in the interest of the party of which the late Hon. Robert Baldwin was the leader. Was made a Q. C. in 1850. From 1845 to 1852 devoted himself to the formation and maintenance of a company, for which he obtained an Act of Incorporation in 1847, for the construction, as part of a scheme of colonization, of a railway from Toronto, westward to Lake Huron through the then waste lands of the Crown, which, after much opposition, eventuated in the Toronto and Guelph Railway Co., and was amalgamated with the Grand Trunk Railway Co. in 1853. In July 1852 m. Julia, youngest dau. of the late Dr. Durie, K. H., of Craigluscar. In Nov. 1868 was made a Judge of the Court of Common Pleas at Toronto. In May 1874 was nominated by the then Minister of Justice, the Hon. A. A. Dorion, as one of the permanent Judges of the Court of Appeal in Ontario, under a clause in the Provincial Statute, 37 Vic., chap. 7, providing for the appointment of three additional Judges to the Court of Appeal, of which Court he was then a Mem. but was obliged to decline the appointment after accepting it in consequence of the Government, after the retirement of Mr. Dorion, having assumed (as appeared to him in violation of all precedent) to deprive him of his precedence, conferred by the commission in virtue of which he then already was a Judge of the Court. In Jan. 1879, he was transferred from the Court of Common Pleas to the Supreme Court, vice the Hon. William Johnston Ritchie promoted to be Chief Justice of the Court. (*Salary* \$7,000.)

Registrar—ROBERT CASSELS, JR. Called to the Bar, L. C. 1864; called to the Bar, U. C. Trinity Term, 1866, Grad. as B. A. with 1st rank honors as student at Morin College, affiliated with McGill University. Was a mem. of the firm of Walker, Cassells & Pennock, Ottawa, when apptd. to present office, 8 Oct. 1875. (*Salary*, \$2,600.)—*Ottawa; Parliament House, Senate Wing.*

Precis Writer and Secretary to the Chief Justice and Judges of the Supreme Court of Canada—GEORGE DUVAL, ESQ. S. of the late Jos. Duval, Esq., of Quebec, by Adelaide Dubuc, now married to Hon. J. F. Duval, late Chief Justice of the Province of Quebec. B. at Quebec, 19 Dec. 1843. Ed. at the Jesuits' College, Montreal. Called to the Bar, L. C. 1865. M. 1872, Isabella, fourth dau. of the late Hon. William Power, one of the Judges of the Superior Court of

Lower Canada, and of Suzanne Aubert De Gaspé. Practised at the Quebec Bar until 1874, when he was apptd. Private Secretary to the Hon. A. A. Dorion, Minister of Justice. Afterwards was apptd. Private Secretary to Hon. T. Fournier, Minister of Justice, and Chief Clerk in the Department of Justice. In Jan. 1876, was apptd. to his present position in the Supreme Court. A Commissioner for administering oaths in the Supreme and Exchequer Court of Canada.—241 Nicholas street; Parliament House, Senate Wing.

The General Officer Commanding the Militia of Canada.

Lieut.-General Sir EDWARD SELBY SMYTH, K.C.M.G. Only son of late Colonel John Selby Smyth, Royal Scots. B. 1820. Educated at Putney College. M. 1848, Lucy Sophia Julia, dau. of Major-General Sir Guy Campbell, Bart., and grand-dau. of the late Lord Edward Fitzgerald. Entered the army, 26 Jan. 1841; promoted a Major-General, 6 March 1868. Apptd. Apptd. to command the Militia of Canada, with the rank of Major-General in the Militia, 1 Oct. 1874. Is President of the Dominion of Canada Artillery Assn. Lieut.-General Sir Edward Selby Smyth's military record is as follows:—Served as brigade-major to the forces in the Southern Concan and Sawant War in the country during the campaign of 1844-45, and was present at the attack and capture of several strong stockades, as well as in the operations before the mountain forts of Monohur, and at their final assault; also at the forcing of the Kirwattee Pass, and subsequent occupation of the country below the Ghats; served also in the Kaffir War of 1851-2 (médal), and mentioned in general orders for his conduct in command of a column in action in the Fish River Bush (brevet-major); with the expedition north of the Orange River in 1852-53, afterwards as Depy. Asst. Q.M. Genl. of the 2nd Division and subsequently as Depy. Adj. Genl. and Depy. Q.M. Genl. of the forces in South Africa, from Jan. 1854 till July 1860; commanded the troops in Mauritius, from 13 April 1870; assumed the administration of the Government there 3 June 1870; and from

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August till September, 1871, was acting Secy. to the Govt. in the Western Provinces, Cape of Good Hope, in 1859, whilst employed there as Q.M. Genl. to the army; and was Inspector-General of the Militia from 1861 till Oct. 1867; apptd. a special magistrate of the County and City of Dublin, 1867. Made a journey of inspection across the continent to British Columbia, 1875.—*Manor House, James Ditton, Surrey; United Service Club; Rideau Club, Wellington Street, Ottawa; Western Departmental Building.*

Aide-de-Camp.—Major HENRY ROBERT SMITH, 47th Regiment, 5th Militia. Eld. son of the late Hon. Sir Henry Smith, of Selwyn, Kingston. B. 1845. Is Deputy Sergeant-at-Arms of the House of Commons, and was specially employed in 1877 on the staff of the present Lieut.-General Commanding the Militia. Apptd. to present position, 6 Sept. 1879.

Engineer in Chief of the Pacific Railway.

SANDFORD FLEMING, *C.M.G., C.E.*, etc. B. 1827. Was on the engineering staff of the Northern Railway of Canada from 1852 to 1863, during the greater portion of which time he was Chief Engineer of the road. Was Chief Engineer of other important works about that period. Was a delegate to Eng., 1863, as the bearer of a memorial to the Imperial Government in the interest of the people of Red River Settlement. Apptd., same year, by the Govts. of Can., N.S. and N.B., and also by the Imperial Govt., to conduct the preliminary survey of the Intercolonial Railway; made all the location surveys, and as Chief Engineer superintended the construction of the Intercolonial Railway until its completion in 1876. Was apptd., 5 May 1871, Engineer-in-Chief to carry on the Pacific Railway Surveys; in 1872 successfully conducted an expedition from the Atlantic to the Pacific Ocean, through Canadian Territory, for the most part along the general route of the proposed Railway. While engaged in the construction of the Intercolonial, and in the exploring operations between Ottawa and British Columbia for the Pacific Railway, was charged by the Government of Newfoundland to conduct a Railway Survey from John's Bay to St. George's Bay. Created, May 1877, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George. Is the

author of many printed reports on Railways and Public Works.—
 Author of *The Intercolonial: a Historical Sketch of the inception and
 completion of the line of railway uniting the Inland and Atlantic Pro-
 vinces of the Dominion; Time-Reckoning and the establishment of

The Deputy Heads and Chief Officers of the Civil Service.

Clerk of the Queen's Privy Council.—JOSEPH OLIVIER COTE, N.P. (see ante.)

Assistant Clerk of the Queen's Privy Council.—JOHN J. MCGEE. A native of Ireland. B. in Wexford 1845. Ed. at St. Peter's College, Wexford, which is affiliated with the Catholic Univ., Dublin. Having completed his course of studies, he came to Canada in 1863 pursuant to the advice of his brother, the late Hon. Thomas D'Arcy McGee. Immediately after his arrival, he devoted himself to the study of engineering and surveying, and passed a highly creditable examination before the U. C. Board of Examiners for P.L.S. in 1866. He was at once employed by the Govt. of United Can. on special service in the District of Algoma and on various surveys, upon the completion of which he pursued a course of scientific studies at McGill Univ., Montreal. Subsequently he was professionally engaged under the Dominion Govt. in the construction of the Intercolonial R.R., and in connection with the House of Commons. After having spent thirteen years in the outside service of the Govt. Mr. McGee entered the Civil Service in 1879, as a First Class Clerk in the Dominion Lands Branch of the Dept. of the Interior. Apptd. to present office 17 Jan. 1880.—383 *Daly street*.

Deputy of the Minister of Justice.—ZEBULON AITON LASH. B. Sept. 1846. Called to Bar, Prov. Ont., May 1863. Practised his profession in Toronto. Apptd. Lecturer and Examiner on Commercial and Criminal Law to Law Society, Ont., Nov. 1872. Held that office till apptd. Deputy Minister of Justice, Sept. 1876.—(Salary \$4,000.)—*Metcalfe street, Ottawa*.

Deputy of the Minister of Militia and Defence.—Lieut.-Col. Hon. CHARLES EUGENE PANET. B. in the City of Quebec, 17 Nov. 1830. Called to the Bar, L.C. 1854. Is Lieut.-Col. commanding the

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9th Batt. V.M. or *Voltigeurs de Québec*; a mem. of the Council of the Dominion Rifle Assn.; and a Vice-Presdt. of the Dominion Artillery Assn. Was Coroner for the City of Quebec for fourteen years. Sat in the Senate for "La Salle" division from 2 March 1874, until 5 Feb. 1875, when appointed to present office. (*Salary* \$3,200)—*Daly street, Ottawa; Western Departmental Building.*

Adjutant-General of Militia.—Col. WALKER POWELL. B. 20 May 1828. First apptd. an officer in the Norfolk Regt. of Militia, 14 Dec. 1847; promoted Colonel in the service, 1873. Sat for Norfolk in Can. Assembly from 1857 to 1861. Has also been Warden of Norfolk. Apptd. Deputy Adjt.-Genl. U.C 19 Aug. 1862; Deputy Adjt.-Genl. for Dominion at Headquarters, 1 Oct. 1868; Acting Adjt.-Genl., 22 Aug. 1873; and Adjt.-Genl. 21 April 1875. (*Salary* \$2,600).—133 *Daly street; Western Departmental Building.*

Accountant to Department of Militia and Defence.—Lt.-Col. JOHN MACPHERSON. Was early brought up to mercantile pursuits in the City of Montreal. In 1849 he received a commission in the 3rd Battalion Montreal Militia; and in 1856 organized the first Highland Company in the Province of Quebec, of which he was appointed Captain. This Company was afterwards attached to the 1st, or "Prince of Wales" Regiment, Montreal, and formed one of the guards of honor during the visit of H.R.H. the Prince of Wales in 1860. He retained this command until his promotion to the rank of Major in 1861. Was appointed Brigade-Major to the Active Force of Montreal in the same year. In 1862 was selected by His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief to fill the post of Brigade-Major of Military District No. 11 Lower Canada. In 1865 was promoted to the rank of Lt.-Colonel in the Militia; served with the Staff of Major-General Lindsay, at Montreal, during the Fenian troubles in 1866. The same year was appointed Deputy Assistant Adjutant-General of Militia, commanding one of the Military Districts in Lower Canada. In 1869 acted as Deputy Adjutant-General, commanding Military District No. 3, in Ontario. In 1870 appointed Acting Superintendent of Military Schools in the Dominion, until the threatened Fenian troubles in April of same year, when he was again selected by His Excellency the Governor-General for appointment on the Staff of Lt-General Lindsay, as Assistant Adjutant-General, and assumed command of the Active Militia Brigades concentrated in Montreal; accompanied the Staff of H.R.H. Prince Arthur to the scenes of action on the

Missisquoi and Huntingdon frontiers. On the termination of this service, joined the Staff at Headquarters, and for some time acted as Deputy of the Minister of Militia and Defence; and at present is in charge of the Finance Branch of the Militia Department.—219 *Daly street*; *Western Departmental Building*.

Chief Clerk, Adjutant-General's Office.—WILLIAM RICHARD WRIGHT. B. 26 May 1822, at Lewisham, Kent, England. Second s. of Captain William Elliot Wright, Royal Navy. Emigrated to Canada with his father and family, June 1833. Entered the Civil Service at Kingston, November 1843, in Board of Works Office, joined Provincial Secretary's Office, 22 April 1844; afterwards served in the Bureau of Agriculture and Department of Crown Lands. Chief Clerk of the Department of the Secretary of State.—GRANT HOWELL. B. in Toronto, September 1819. Ed. at Upper Canada College. Entered the office of the Civil Secretary of Upper Canada in May 1839, and has continued since then in the Civil Service of Canada. Is a Major on the retired list in the Canadian Militia. Queen's Printer.—Lieut.-Col. BROWN CHAMBERLIN, C.M.G., D.C.L. B. 1827. Called to the Bar, L.C. 1850. Was for many years one of the conductors of the *Montreal Gazette*; Secy. to the Board of Arts and Manufactures, L.C. from 1857 to 1862; Presdt. of that body from latter date to 1865; a Commr. on behalf of Can. to the London Universal Exhibition, 1862. Sat for Missisquoi in House of Commons from the Union until apptd. Queen's Printer, 7 June 1870. Has been Col. of the 60th Batt. (Missisquoi Volunteer) Light Infantry, and a Fellow of McGill Univ., from which he obtained degree of D.C.L. 1867. Created by the Queen, in Sept. 1870, a Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, for his services in repelling Fenian invaders at Eccles' Hill, May, same year. Clerk in Corresponding Branch Dept. of Public Works, and Private Secy. to Minister, 1872 until 21 Oct. 1873, when apptd. to present office. A Major in the Militia. Organized Quebec Volunteer Rifle Assn. at the time of the "Trent" affair. Won first prize medal of Literary and Historical Society, Quebec, for best *Essay on Canada*, 1853. Author of *Canadian Minerals and Mining Interests*, 1857; *Gold Fields of Canada*, in 1858; *Notes on Immigration*, and *Mining and Agricultural Labor in Canada*, 1859. (Salary, \$2,000.)—*House of Commons: 503 King street, Corner of Wilbrod street.*

Deputy of the Minister of the Interior.—Lieut.-Col. JOHN STOCINGTON DENNIS, P. L.S. B. 1820. Commissioned as Surveyor of Lands, U.C., 1842, and in that capacity practised extensively for many years, being employed on many public surveys and explorations. Raised Volunteer Battery of Artillery in Toronto, 1856, and from that time up to quite recently has been permanently connected with the Can. Active Militia Force. Apptd. Major of Brigade to Toronto Force, with rank of Major, 1857; and Brigade-Major of 5th Military District, on reorganization of the Militia, with rank of Lieut.-Col., 1862. In 1854 and 1859, respectively, by special request of the Govts. of Tasmania and Australia, Mr. S. examined and reported upon the coal-fields and gold-fields of those Colonies; apptd. one of the Victorian Commissioners of Mines in 1856; mem. of the Board of Science and of the Prospecting Board in 1858; Commr. for the Victoria International Exhibition, 1861. Was also a mem. of the Govt. Tender Board, and mem. of the Councils of the Board of Agriculture, of the Royal Society, and of the Acclimatization Society, up to 1869, when he left Australia for Can., to succeed Sir W. E. Apptd. 1 August, 1878, under 41 Vic., c. 7., to be Deputy Minister of Finance; is *ex-officio* Deputy Receiver General and Secy. of the Treasury Board; a mem. of the Civil Service Board and a Director of the Civil Service Building and Savings Society. (*Salary*, \$4,200)—245 *Theodore street*, *Eastern Departmental Building*.

Auditor-General.—JOHN LORNE McDougall. S. of the late J. L. McDougall, Esq., who sat for Renfrew, in Can. Assembly for a short period in 1858, when he resigned. B in Renfrew, 1838. Ed. at High School, Montreal, and at Toronto Univ., where he took gold medal in Mathematics, and silver medal in Modern Languages, and graduated B.A. 1859. M. Sept. 1870, Miss Marion E. Morris, of Ottawa. Has been Warden of Renfrew and President of the South Renfrew Agricultural Society. Sat for South Renfrew in Ont. Assembly, from g.e. 1867, until g.e. 1871, and in House of Com-

mons from Sept. 1869, until g.e. 1872, when defeated; again elected at g.e. 1873. Unseated on petition, 9th Sept. 1874; re-elected by acclamation, 24 Oct 1874. Again unseated on petition, 21 Jan. 1875, re-elected 20 Feb. 1875, and resigned the seat on being apptd. to present office, 11 Aug. 1878. (*Salary, \$3,200.*)—*Rochesterville.*

Financial Inspector.—THOMAS DILLON TIMS. B. in Castle Pollard, Ire., 6 Jan. 1825. Engaged for many years in commercial pursuits. Entered Civil Service in 1858 as 1st class clerk in audit branch of Inspector Genl. Dept; 1860 to 1866, chiefly employed upon Inspection duty, and in the preparation of Public Accounts and Estimates for Parl.; 1863, apptd. a Commr. to enquire into prison management at Montreal; 1865, appt. Govt. Supt. of the engraving and printing of the first issue of Legal Tender Notes: visited Washington same year upon official business; 1867, reported upon a financial system for the new Province of Quebec; same year placed in charge of Dominion affairs at Halifax; 1868, apptd. with other Commrs. to enquire into the management of Govt. railways in N.S.; 1868 to 1872, engaged in the organization of Financial Depts. and Savings Banks in N.S. and N.B.; 1872 and 1873 visited British Columbia and Manitoba, and established branches of the Finance Dept. and Savings Bank in both Provinces. Apptd. Financial Inspector, 1870. Superintends in the Finance Dept. at Ottawa, the financial business of the outlying Provinces of

Commissioner of Customs.—JAMES JOHNSON. B. 1817. Was accountant of construction of the European and North American Railway of N.B. (Government Road), from Aug. 1857, until its completion in Nov. 1860, when apptd. Chief Clerk of the Provincial office of Audit, N.B. Became acting Auditor-Genl. of N.B., Jan. 1865, and appointed Auditor-Genl. 1866, which office he resigned Nov. 1867, to accept the Asst. Commissionership of Customs at Ottawa. Conjointly with the Auditor-Generalship, held the offices of Asst. Provl. Secy. and Registrar of the Records of N.B. Was previous to entering Govt. service, Mayor of Moncton. (which was on duty during the whole Fenian troubles), until he resigned, retaining his rank, 1871. Inspector of Customs, Excise and Canals, 1863; Asst. Commr. of Inland Revenue, 1869, and to his present office, 1871. Proceeded to Eng. on public business, 1871. Deputy of the Minister of Railways and Canals.—**TOUISSANT TRUDEAU, C.E.** B. 1826. Apptd. to present office, May 1868. Was previously, for a short period, Secretary to the Department of Public Works, Can.; subsequently Chief Engineer to do.; and from March 1864, to the Union, Deputy Commissioner of Public Works. Apptd. a Commissioner of the Intercolonial Railway, 1874. Is Secretary to Railway Committee of Privy Council. (*Salary \$4,400*)—66 *Stewart street; Western Departmental Building.*

Chief Engineer to Department of Railways and Canals.—**JOHN PAGE, C.E.** B. in Scot., 1815. Served under the late Robert Stephenson, as Engineer of the Northern Lighthouse Board. Came to the U.S. 1838, and was engaged on the Erie Canal until 1842 when he entered the service of Can. Government on the Welland Canal. Apptd. Chief Engineer to Department, 1853. Declined the Deputy Ministership of Public Works, 1863. (*Salary \$4,000.*)—*Russell House; Western Departmental Building.*

Secretary to the Department of Railways and Canals.—**FREDERICK BRAUN.** B. 1826. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1848. Entered Civil Service 1854. Apptd. Secretary to Public Works, 1864. (*Salary \$2,400.*)—*Corrier Bay and Queen streets; Western Departmental Buildings.*

Deputy of the Minister of Public Works.—**GEORGE FREDERIC BAILLAIRGE, C.E.** Family one of the oldest in the City of Quebec. Paternal ancestors from Poitou and St. Germain en Laye, France, were the architects and sculptors of the French-Cathedral, and numerous other churches in the Province of Quebec. B. in Quebec 16 Oct. 1824. El. s. of the late Théophile Baillairgé, Asst. Surveyor and Engineer of that city, by Charlotte Zanvrin, of Shorrel, Isle of Wight, dau. of the late Lieut. Richard Horsley, of the Royal Navy, who served under Nelson on board of the *Victory* at the battle of Trafalgar. Ed. by the late Lieut. Shadgett, of the British army, and afterwards in the Laval Seminary of Quebec. M. Miss Charlotte Rachel, second eld. dau. of the late P. Giroux, Esq., of Cedars Village, Co. of Soulanges, in 1852. Law student from 1843 until 1844. Entered public service as French and English translator and asst. draughtsman of engineering branch, under the late Hon. H. H. Killaly, President of the Board of Works, 22nd Sept. 1844, at Montreal. Commissioned as P.L.S. in 1847, and afterwards acted in this capacity and as Asst. Engineer on the

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various public works of Can. Declined the position of Superintending Engineer of the Canals and other works of the Province of Quebec in 1852. The appendices of the Public Works Report of 1867, containing the history of the same prior to and since the conquest of Canada until the time of Confederation, 1 July 1867, were published in both languages under his direction. Was apptd. asst. Engineer-in-Chief of the Department of Public Works in 1871. The first who submitted in 1872-73 to John Page, Esq., Engineer-in-Chief of Canada, a practicable scheme, and located a line for the construction of a Ship Canal to connect the waters of the Bay of Fundy with those of the Gulf of St. Lawrence at Baie Verte, although the project had been studied and reported on as being next to impracticable by Telford in 1826, and Capt. Crawley, R.E., in 1843. Apptd. Superintending Engineer of Canals in the Province of Quebec, vice the late Z. G. Sippell, who resigned, in 1877. Apptd. Deputy of the Minister of Public Works of Canada, 4 Oct. 1879.—*Western Departmental Building.*

Chief Engineer to Department of Public Works.—HENRY F. PERLEY, C.E. B. in St. John, N.B., 1831. Entered the service of the Govt. of New Brunswick in 1848, continuing until the summer of 1852 on exploratory surveys for proposed system of railways. In 1852 was engaged by Messrs. Peto, Betts & Brassey on surveys in N.B., and during 1853 on surveys in Nova Scotia; and for the same firm was employed during 1854-5-6 on the construction of the Grand Trunk Railway between Montreal and Brockville. In Aug. 1856, again entered the service of New Brunswick as Resident Engineer on the construction of the E. & W. A. Railway, between St. John and Shediac, remaining until the completion of that line in Dec. 1860. Between 1861 and 1863 was engaged in private practice. In May 1861, entered the service of the Government of Nova Scotia, continuing as Provincial Engineer until Aug. 1865, then resigning to fill the position of Agent for Messrs. Kelk, Waring Bros. & Lucas, contractors for the construction of the Metropolitan Extension (underground) Railway, London, Eng. At the completion of this engagement in 1870, returned to New Brunswick, and took charge of the works in connection with the improvement of the freighting facilities of the Government Railways in that Province, and the construction of the Deep-water Terminus and extension line thereto, at St. John. In May 1872, was appointed Engineer-in-Charge of Harbours, etc., in the Mari-

time Provinces for the Dept. Pub. Works, holding that position until the close of 1879, when was apptd. Chief Engineer.—*Western Departmental Building, Ottawa.*

Secretary to the Department of Public Works.—SAMUEL EDMORE STONGE CHAPLEAU. B. at Syracuse, N.Y. Ed. at Terrebonne College, Can. M. Caroline Kirby, third dau. of Col. Geo. W. Patten, United States Regular Army. Went to the U.S. in 1860. Was engaged in commercial pursuits at the breaking out of the war of secession. Joined the 16th Infantry Regular Army, in 1861, in his own name, but omitting surname, *Chapleau*. Served from that time to Jan. 1871 in the capacities of 2nd Lieut., 1st Lieut., Captain and Brevet Major. Was promoted twice by brevet for gallant services on the field of battle. Was at Shiloh, siege of Corinth, Murfreesboro, Chickamauga, Chattanooga, and the Atlanta campaign. Was at Memphis in 1866, and Augusta, Ga., in 1868, during the riots. Had command of the troops at the latter place, and was highly complimented by the citizens of the town for his coolness and promptness in quelling the riot. Apptd. to Dept. P.W. in Sept. 1873. Apptd. Secy. in Sept. 1879.—*Russell House.*

Deputy Postmaster General.—WILLIAM HENRY GRIFFIN. B. Aug. 1812. Entered Imperial public service as a clerk in the Office of the Deputy Postmaster General, 21 April 1831; promoted to be Surveyor of Post Offices east of Kingston, 1 May 1835; apptd. Secretary of Post Office Department on its transfer to Provincial control, 1851; Deputy Postmaster General, Can., 12 June 1857; Deputy Postmaster General of the Dominion, 30 May 1868. Apptd. a Commissioner for the re-organization of the Civil Service 1868. Was also a mem. of the Civil Service Commission, 1862. Has been a mem. of the Board of Audit since its first establishment, 1858, and of the Board of Customs, Excise and Stamps, since 1864. Negotiated the Postal Convention with the U.S., 1875. Is Vice-Presdt. of the Civil Service Building and Savings Society. (*Salary \$3,200.*)—300 Sparks street; *Western Departmental Building.*

Accountant Post Office Department.—HORATIO ASPREY WICKSTED. B. July 1811. Entered Imperial public service, May 1839. Specially apptd., at the instance of Lord Sydenham (Governor-General) to re-organize the Montreal Post Office; promoted, 1841, Chief Clerk Account-branch General Post Office. On transfer of the Department, in 1851, from Imperial to Provincial control, was

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aptd. Inspector of the Kingston Postal Division, then comprising between counties. In 1857 was promoted to the Accountantship of the Department. (*Salary* \$2,400.) Military Service.—1st Lieut. Quebec Artillery, 1837. Served during the whole campaign, 1837-8. 1st Capt., 1846, Montreal Regiment of Artillery; 1st Capt., same Regiment, 1851. Served during the "Trent" difficulty, 1861, and the Fenian raid, 1865. On formation of the Civil Service Rifle Regiment, 1866, was gazetted Paymaster, with rank of Capt., and continued until the regiment was disbanded, Dec. 1868. Treasurer Civil Service Rifle Association, 1869-79. In 1872 gazetted Paymaster, with rank of Major, to 1st Battalion Governor-General's Foot Guards. Is Auditor Dominion Artillery Association.—112 *Waterloo street*; *Western Departmental Building*.

Secretary to Post Office Department.—Lieut.-Col. WM. WHITE, B. 6 Jan. 1830. Entered Imperial public service as clerk in General Post Office, London, 19 Feb. 1846, which appt. he resigned April 1854. Apptd. Chief Clerk in Money Order Office of Post Office Department, Can. (on its establishment), 1 Dec. 1854; Secy. of the Department, 21 Jan. 1861. Author of a *Post Office Gazetteer of the Dominion*; and of the *Annals of Canada*, published (in the *Canadian Monthly*) by Hunter, Rose & Co., of Toronto. Is Senior Major of the Governor-General's Foot Guards, and a Brevet Lieut.-Col. in the Militia of Canada. (*Salary* \$2,400).—*Whitehurst*, 185 *West Wurttemberg street*; *Western Departmental Building*.

Deputy of the Minister of Agriculture and Statistics.—JOSEPH CHARLES TACHE, M.D. B. 1820. A doctor of medicine. Sat for Limousin in Can. Assembly from 1847 to 1857, when he resigned. Was a Commr. from Can. to Paris Exhibition, 1855, on which occasion created a Chevalier of the Legion of Honor by the Emperor of the French; editor of *Le Courrier du Canada* (Que.) from 1857 to 1859, when apptd. an Inspector of Prisons, Asylums, &c., of which he became Chairman, 1863. Apptd. Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Can., Aug. 1864, which office he continued to hold under the Dominion. Was a Commr. to Paris Exhibition, 1867. Author of various works on Canada. (*Salary* \$3,200).—16 *Waterloo street*; *Western Departmental Building*.

Secretary to Department of Agriculture.—JOHN LOWE. Entered public service as Census Staff Officer, July 1870. Apptd. Secretary of the Department of Agriculture, 21 Feb. 1871. Was reporter and

asst. editor *Montreal Gazette* from 1848 to 1851; editor of *Toronto Colonist* from 1851 to 1853; joint editor and proprietor *Montreal Gazette* from 1853 to 1870. Is author of several statistical and other publications. (*Salary* \$2,200.)—*Inkerman Cottage, Rideau Canal; Western Departmental Building.*

Deputy of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries.—WILLIAM SMITH. Entered the service of Customs in the United Kingdom in 1840; apptd. second clerk Imperial Customs, St. John, N.B., in 1842; Surveyor of Shipping in 1850; Comptroller of Customs and Navigation, and Registrar of Shipping, 1855; Receiver-General of Admiralty-droits, 1858; Commr. to investigate complaints against Police Department of St. John, N.B., in 1862; mem. of the West Indian Trade Commission for B.N.A., in 1865, representing New Brunswick in the Commission; Secy. of the Dept. of Marine and Fisheries of the Dominion of Canada in 1867; Deputy of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries of Canada, also a member of the Auditing Board and Civil Service Board of Canada, on 29 May 1868; member of the Civil Service Commission for the purpose of re-organizing the Civil Service of Canada, on 22 June, 1868; in 1875, while in England on public business for the Government of Canada, he was directed by that Government to confer with Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, and the officers of the Board of Trade, on the subject of Imperial Merchant Shipping legislation, which was then under consideration of Parliament, with the view of protecting the interests of Canadian shipowners, who strongly objected to such proposed legislation; in 1876, when Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies requested the Canadian Government to send a representative to London, to confer again with Her Majesty's Government, on behalf of Canada, on the subject of proposed Imperial legislation relating to shipping, then before Parliament, he was appointed for this purpose by the Canadian Government, and remained in London in conference with the Imperial Government, till the close of the session of Parliament, when the Merchant Shipping Bill of 1876 became law; when on this mission he succeeded in procuring a number of alterations in the Bill, which rendered it much more acceptable to the marine interests of Canada than it formerly was, and since then all agitation on the subject among Canadian shipowners has ceased. (*Salary*, \$3,200)—162 *Daly street; Office, Western Departmental Building.*

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Commissioner of Fisheries.—WILLIAM FREDERICK WHITCHER. Entered public service Oct. 1846. Managed Fisheries business, then branch of Crown Lands Dept., up to Confederation (1867.) Since Department of Marine and Fisheries was organized, has conducted the duties as Commissioner of Fisheries. Fisheries of all the Provinces of the Dominion are now under charge of this Department; Fishery Laws being now extended to them all, and outside services organized.—*Rideau Bank; 199 East Wurtemberg street, Ottawa.*

Inspector of Penitentiaries.—JAMES GEORGE MOYLAN of Co. Kildare, Ireland. B. in 1826. Ed. at St. Jarlath's College, Tuam, and the Royal College of Maynooth. In 1856 he left Ireland for America, selecting Washington, D.C., as his first abiding place. Here he remained for three years, during which period he formed his connection with the New York *Daily Times*, which he severed to come to Canada in 1856. Two years later he commenced the publication of the *Canadian Freeman*, a Catholic Conservative Journal, which he conducted for fifteen years. In 1869 Mr. Moylan was selected by the Government to undertake a mission to Ireland in the interest of the Department of Immigration and Agriculture. On his return to Canada in 1872, he was appointed a member of the Board of Penitentiary Directors. In 1875, when the Board was abolished, Mr. Moylan was retained as Acting Inspector, and in Nov. 1876 received the appointment of Inspector of Dominion Penitentiaries. In the discharge of his official duties he has frequently visited the Maritime Provinces, and Manitoba and British Columbia in 1877 and 1878 for the purpose of organizing the Penitentiaries in those distant Provinces.—*154 Daly street; Eastern Departmental Building.*

Chief Clerk, Governor-General's Office.—JOHN KIDD. Was Private Secretary to the late Lord Dudley Coutts Stuart, M.P., for Marylebone, 1847 to 1854. Assistant Military Secretary on the Staff of General Count L. Zamoyzski in the Imperial service in Turkey, 1855-56. Private Secretary to the Earl of Canarvon, 1857. Entered the service of the Canadian Government, January 1858. Apptd. to a first Clerkship, July 1858. Chief Clerk, January 1875.—*127 Metcalfe street; Eastern Departmental Building.*

Private Secretary to the Prime Minister—HENRY KINLOCH. B. at Kingston, 1848. Was Private Secretary to Hon. J. Sandfield Macdonald, Premier of Ontario, 1867 to 1871; to Hon. Edward Blake,

in 1871 and 1872; to Hon. Oliver Mowat, 1872 to 1875. Was again apptd. Private Secretary to Mr. Blake on his taking office as Minister of Justice, and remained as Secretary to Hon. B. Laflamme. Was connected with the Parliamentary Reporting Staff of the leading western newspapers, from 1867 to 1872. Apptd. Private Secretary to Sir John Macdonald Oct. 1878. *The Queen; Eastern Departmental Building.*

1. **THE SENATE.**—The time for the Ordinary Meeting of the House is at 3 P.M., unless some other time shall have previously been ordered. If a quorum is not present at thirty minutes after the time of meeting, the House is adjourned until the next sitting day. Fifteen members, including the Speaker, constitute a quorum. —The Speaker of the Senate is an officer appointed by the Crown.

2. **HOUSE OF COMMONS.**—The Speaker takes the Chair at 3 P.M. daily. If there be a quorum the business is proceeded with; if not, the House is adjourned to the next day, at 8 P.M. Early meetings take place before the termination of the Session, in order to expedite business and bring matters to a close; the House does not usually meet on Saturday, nor does it assemble on any holiday. No one can be admitted to hear the debates without an order from the Sergeant-at-Arms, which is generally obtained through a member. Twenty members, including the Speaker, constitute a quorum.

3. SPEAKER.—He is the presiding officer of the body. He reads all communications which come from the Queen's Representative to the Commons; he has to present and read such addresses and petitions as are carried up to the Governor-General by the Whole House, and to deliver the usual speeches, on the part of the Commons, when presenting the Supply Bill, and other Bills calling for peculiar note and remark. Through him all witnesses and prisoners at the Bar of the House are examined, and he directs all arrangements when the House is to be addressed by Counsel. It is his duty to deliver the reprimand of the House to any one who has incurred the penalty of receiving it; it is also his duty to issue warrants of committal or release for breach of privilege; to communicate with any parties, when so instructed by the House. It is

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his duty to closely examine the provisions of Private Bills, so as to protect the public against any surprise, or undue encroachment or injury. He controls and regulates the conduct of subordinate officers of the House, and enforces the Rules of the House; he cannot join in any debate unless in Committee of the Whole House. As the presiding officer of the House, he has all the duties attached to such an office. The Speaker is chosen by the members of Parliament, and holds his office until the Parliament in which he is elected is dissolved. Should a member persevere in disobeying the order of the Speaker, and of the House, the Speaker may "name him," as the term implies, a course uniformly followed by the censure of the House. In extreme cases, the Speaker may order members or others into custody until the pleasure of the House be signified. On divisions, when the numbers happen to be equal, he gives the casting vote, but he never otherwise votes. Some questions as to the prerogatives and duties of the Speaker will be found among *Speakers' Decisions*.

4. MEMBERS, INTRODUCTION OF.—Members elected during the existence of Parliament, will, after taking the oath of allegiance and subscribing the roll, appear at the Bar of the House and claim their seats, the custom being an introduction by other members, who announce that these requirements have been fulfilled. This is as necessary when a session is commencing as when in progress. A member who has been unseated and re-elected must again sign the roll and take the oath; should he take his seat and vote without doing so, he incurs the penalty of £500 sterling for every day he so sits and votes. Though his fresh introduction at the Bar is unnecessary, such is the practice, to save any re-elected member from unwittingly incurring the penalty. (During the recess of 1877, Mr. Speaker ANGLIN resigned his seat in the House and was re-elected. At the opening of the session of 1878, upon the Governor-General directing the re-assembled House to elect a Speaker, Mr. ANGLIN and other re-elected members forthwith took their seats and voted on the question. For particulars of this case, see "Clerk of the House.") When a member is unseated by a tribunal which at the same time declares another person duly elected to the seat, the new member may (after taking the oath) without any introduction, take his seat and vote, as if he had occupied it from the first.

5. CLERK OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.—“The Clerk of the Commons House of Parliament” holds an office of great trust and importance. He, with two assistants, sits at the upper end of the table. The Crown appoints him by commission under the great seal. It is his duty to make minutes, not of the arguments held in the House, but the decisions at which it arrives—in other words, to make a true and faithful record of all the proceedings in which it may be engaged; to see that they are correctly printed and distributed to the members; to read aloud all such documents as the House may order to be read; to perform the duty (without taking the chair), of president or moderator during the choice of a Speaker, putting a question and directing a division in the same manner that a Speaker would do.

A case has recently occurred for which, in either English or Canadian practice, no precedent exists. During recess, after session of 1877, *Mr. Speaker ANGLIN* resigned his seat in the House (owing to a question respecting breach of the Independence of Parliament Act) and was re-elected to the House. The intention of Government (controlling majority of the House) was to re-nominate him as Speaker; but the technical difficulty occurred, that he was neither a member, in the old session, nor had he been introduced in the new.

Foresceing this dilemma, for which *Mr. Alfred Patrick*, the present Clerk of the House, in his fifty years' experience of Parliamentary practice, could find no precedent, the Clerk of the House appealed to *Sir T. Erskine May*, the Clerk of the House of Commons of Great Britain and Ireland, and one of the highest living authorities upon Parliamentary practice. That gentleman's first reply was *irrelevant*, inasmuch as it related to British practice (supposed, at the time of writing, to obtain in Canada) viz.: that newly-elected members (during an elected Parliament) must be sworn in before *the Speaker*; this would preclude *Mr. ex-Speaker ANGLIN* from being sworn in before a Speaker was elected, and consequently from being eligible for election himself.

Mr. Patrick, however, explained to *Sir T. Erskine May* the Canadian practice respecting the oath (viz.: the taking thereof before *the Clerk of the House*, and not before *the Speaker*) and received the following reply, which the *Editor of the PARLIAMENTARY COMPANION* considers of sufficient importance to be given *in extenso*, and in accordance with which, *Mr. ANGLIN* took his seat without any introduction, and was duly re-elected as *Speaker of the House*.

HOUSE OF COMMONS, 18th July 1878.

MY DEAR MR. PATRICK,

As you have now explained the regulations under which oaths are taken by new members, and their return ratified to the House, I think I may venture to offer an opinion upon the questions submitted to me.

It appears to me that as there are official records of the resignation of his seat by the Speaker; of his re-election, and of his having duly taken the oaths, the Clerk, in the absence of the Speaker, may properly communicate these records to the House.

It is not improbable that objections may be raised to any departure from the accustomed course of proceedings, but I cannot but think it would be justified by the exceptional circumstances of the present case..

You will have to assume the responsibility of this course; otherwise, I can perceive no means of re-electing the Speaker.

6. SERGEANT-AT-ARMS.—This officer, although in attendance on the House of Commons, is appointed by the Crown. It is his duty to obey the commands of the House, to apprehend and take into custody all those who are committed for any offence by the House. All the messengers and servants of the House, except the Clerks, are under his orders.. He has a seat at the Bar of the House, and directs all arrangements for the maintenance of order in the approaches thereto, and in the galleries. He is, of course, in immediate attendance upon the Speaker, from whom he takes all orders in connection with his duties. He is assisted by a Deputy.

7. ORDER.—By this word is meant an obedience to certain rules and regulations intended to facilitate the despatch of business, and preserve that necessary decorum so essential in all deliberative assemblies. The rules by which the business of Parliament are conducted are of two kinds; one kind the House possesses in com-

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mon with all deliberative assemblies—another is peculiar to its own existence and powers. For the proper application of all these rules the Speaker or Chairman's decision is had, and to this decision due deference is at all times paid. The Speaker, while in the Chair, takes no part in the debate, it being his duty to relate the manner in which business shall be transacted; to confine those members who address the House to the subject under consideration; to give his opinion in all things which relate to order; to put the matter in dispute into the form of a question, upon which the votes of members are taken, and to declare the majority as soon as it is communicated to him by the Clerk. It is also his duty to declare the business of the House closed, and to see that the affairs of the House are correctly and properly recorded. After routine he calls upon the member whose motion stands first on the paper of notices or who is otherwise entitled to precedence. All motions must be seconded, or they fall to the ground; being seconded, the motion is handed in writing to the Speaker, who has to read it before debate can be had upon it; having been read, objections may be urged. There are several ways by which a motion may be opposed; it may be met by a direct negative, or by an amendment, or by a motion to postpone, or by proceeding to the next order of the day, or by moving the previous question, or by the simple motion of adjournment. A motion once read cannot be withdrawn without the permission of the House. It must not be forgotten that unless a speech is made objecting to a motion, neither mover nor seconder can speak a second time except in explanation. If, however, a debate does arise, in which an opposition is given to the mover of a motion, he has the right of reply; but it must be understood that this privilege does not belong to the mover of an amendment. All are permitted to explain. The debate being ended, the Speaker or Chairman puts the question, and calls upon those in favor to say "Yea," and those of a contrary disposition to say "Nay." He then declares that in his opinion the "Yeas" or the "Nays" (as the case may be) have it. If his decision is questioned, the House divides, the "Yeas" rising, and their names being taken down, the "Nays" following, the numbers are counted from the record and declared. Should a member, when the voice of the House is called for, say "Aye," and should he afterwards, on division, vote "Nay," and attention be called to the fact, his vote will be recorded "Aye." The simply calling for a *Division*, when the Speaker has declared that "the Ayes have it," would not, however, require the record of his vote adversely as "Nay," the Canadian rule differing here

from the English. (See *Speakers' Decisions* upon this point, No. 55.) When an amendment has been moved, the vote is simply taken on the amendment, and then on the original question. Should the amendment be adopted, it then becomes the substantive motion, and may be amended in the same way that the original motion was amended. Thus a number of successive amendments to the original motion may be disposed of. Any member is at liberty to interrupt another by "rising to order," which means that he rises in his place and calls the attention of the Chair and the House to a breach of the orders then being committed. In the debate it is contrary to order to mention any member by name; the same rule prevails in Committee of the Whole, except as regards the Chairman, who is sometimes called by his name, and not Mr. Chairman. For special questions of order that have arisen since Confederation see *Speakers' Decisions*, No. 55.

STRANGERS.—If any member shall take notice that strangers are present, Mr. Speaker, or Chairman (as the case may be) shall forthwith put the question that strangers be ordered to withdraw, without permitting any debate or amendment; provided that Mr. Speaker or the Chairman, may, whenever he thinks proper, order the withdrawal of strangers.—(*Rule 6.*)

8. COMMITTEES.—Are, first, those of the Whole House, which may be to consider certain resolutions, as to the nature of which considerable latitude prevails; or the House itself resolves into such Committee to consider the details of a Bill, the principle of which may be discussed at any or all of its other stages; or there may be Committees for financial purposes, as those of "Supply," or "Ways and Means," (which see.) Secondly, there are Select Committees chosen by ballot or otherwise, for some specific purpose—the number composing such bodies seldom exceeds fifteen members, except by permission of the House. During the session of 1877, an important discussion took place, involving both the composition and powers of Select Committees. (See *Speakers' Decisions.*) Thirdly, Committees on Private Bills (which see.) When the whole House sits in Committee, the Speaker vacates the chair, the Mace is placed under the table, and some other member is called to preside, who sits in the seat of the Clerk of the House.

9. PETITIONS.—The following Rules respecting Petitions should be carefully observed, as deviation therefrom will involve rejection.

(1.) Petitions involving Public expenditure, such as grants of money or lands, claims for arrears of pay or for remuneration for public service rendered, or other demands imposing a burthen upon the people, cannot be received by the House, which has not the power of initiating such imposition. A petition which only expressed a *hope* for a grant, was excluded in session of 1878.—(See *Speakers' Decisions*, No. 109.) In 1877, however, a petition for imposition of duty, or for bounty, on coal was received. (See *Speakers' Decisions*. No. 68.)

Petitions of this nature should be addressed to "His Excellency the Governor-General in Council." The correct form is to forward them to the Secretary of State, who will then, "by command," refer them to the Ministers of the Crown to whose Departments their subjects respectively relate; and they will thereafter be dealt with Departmentally, in the same manner as any official letter or communication received direct from the parties interested. In point of fact, however, the forwarding of such a petition, by the Minister of Parliament, with a covering letter, direct to the Department concerned, at any time, and without waiting for the session, is practically the best course. In this mode, a Petition may be brought before the Executive in ample time for consideration before the meeting of Parliament, when the representative can, if desired, bring on a discussion upon the merits of the case, in due course.

Although such a Petition may not be presented to the House which has not the power of granting it, it is quite in order (after proceeding as above) to bring it under the cognizance of Parliament by moving an Address to His Excellency, for the Petition, and any other papers connected with it in the Departments, to be brought down; and the Government, upon its responsibility to Parliament, can then be brought to account for the exercise or non-exercise of the power vested in it, of granting the pecuniary or other relief prayed for.

(2.) It has been decided that Aliens, non-residents of the Dominion of Canada, have not the right of petitioning this Parliament. An exception to this rule was made during session of 1878.—(See *Speakers' Decisions*, No. 107.)

(3.) Petitions may be either written or printed; provided always that the signatures of at least three Petitioners are subscribed on the sheet containing the prayer of the Petition.

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(4.) Signatures to Petitions must be original; no agent should sign a Petition to Parliament for any purpose. No chairman can sign for a public meeting, but the common seal of a corporation is received as the petition of the whole body.

(5.) All Petitions must be in respectful and temperate language, and must not contain any matter in breach of the Privileges of the House, such as animadversion upon the conduct of Parliament, or reference to any subject under Debate, or to a motion in course of preparation.

(6.) Petitions to the House of Commons should be addressed: "To the Honorable the Commons of Canada, in Parliament assembled;" the statement of grievance or cause of complaint should be clearly and succinctly set forth; and it must close with a specific prayer, thus:

"Wherefore your Petitioner prays that, &c" setting forth the address and relief that is sought.

(7.) The Member presenting a Petition shall endorse his name thereon, and shall present it in his place in the House, confining himself, when doing so, to a statement of the parties from whom it comes, the number of signatures attached to it, and the material allegations it contains. He is responsible that it does not contain impertinent or improper matter.

(8.) After a lapse of two days for scrutiny by the Speaker and Clerk of the House, every Petition, which proves to be properly receivable, is (Rule 86) "brought to the Table by direction of the Speaker, who cannot allow any debate, or any Member to speak upon, or in relation to, such Petition; but it may be read by the Clerk at the Table if required; or if it complain of some present personal grievance, requiring an immediate remedy, the matter contained therein may be brought into immediate discussion. In ordinary course, it may, upon motion, be referred to a committee, or Resolutions may be based upon it, &c."

10. **BILLS (MONEY)**—All Bills relating to public income and expenditure, and all Bills usually called Money Bills, must originate in the Commons and be introduced by the Government.

11. **BILLS (PUBLIC)**—A Bill is the draft or skeleton of a Statute. Any Bill which the Senate can originate may be introduced and laid on the table by an individual Senator without the previous permission of the House; but in the Commons no Bill can be brought in unless a motion for leave be previously agreed to. Permission having been granted, a Committee is appointed to prepare the Bill. It is then brought in and read a first time, without amendment or debate, and a day is appointed for a second reading, previous to which it is printed, and a copy furnished to each member. The Bill, after the second reading, is referred to a Committee of the Whole House, at the sittings of which its details are considered, as its principles were at each of its several readings. Members are at liberty to discuss its principles at any of its stages, but no one is considered to have declared decisively in favor of its principles, unless by his vote he supports its second reading. In Committee, the Bill is debated clause by clause; the blanks left for amount of penalties, salaries or grants, etc., are filled up, and sometimes the Bill is entirely remodelled. The blanks, as they are called, which are usually filled up in italics, are agreed to without a question being put, unless a member should propose to alter them. The next proceeding is, that the Chairman of the Committee should make a report to the House of the changes that the Bill has undergone, which he does by presenting it to the Speaker in its altered form. The report of the Committee is agreed to without discussion, the Bill is ordered to be printed, and it is then read a third time, when any further amendments can be made. If a new clause be added it is called a rider. The last question but one is that the "Bill do pass;" after this, nothing remains except to determine its title, which used to be a general one for all the Acts passed in the session, but in modern times distinct titles are used for each Statute. During the progress of the Bill, the House *may* divide on the following questions: 1st, on the second reading; 2nd, that it be committed. 3rd, on the consideration of report of Committee, in case of amendments; 4th, or that the Bill be re-committed; 5th, that it be read a third time; 6th, that it do pass; 7th, the title of the Bill. These are quite exclusive of any division in the Committee, or any amendments, or of any clauses added to or expunged from the measure, in or out of the Committee. Alterations are not usually proposed in a Bill until after its principle has been disposed of on the second reading. Immediately after the passing of a Bill, it is taken by a member to the Bar of the Senate, desiring their concu-

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reference, where it passes through the same forms as in the Commons. If the Bill be rejected, no further proceedings ensue. When the Senate agree with the Commons in the principle of the measure, but differ on matters of detail, a conference usually follows between members deputed from each House, who generally succeed in adjusting the difference; but if both Houses remain inflexible, the Bill is dropped. The same proceedings are adopted, *mutatis mutandis*, when the Bill originates in the Upper House. The Bill having thus passed both Houses, remains with the Senate, except in the case of a Bill of Supply, which is sent back to the Commons, to be by them presented at the Bar of the Senate to the Representative of the Sovereign. The assent of the Crown is the final proceeding which converts a Bill into an Act of Parliament. Several discussions have arisen respecting procedure with Bills during recent sessions, for which see *Speakers' Decisions*.]

12. **BILLS (PRIVATE).**—Private Bills are chiefly introduced to enable individuals or bodies corporate to undertake works of public utility at their own risk and chiefly for their own emolument and benefit; but there are other Private Bills which frequently come before Parliament, such as Bills for adjusting claims to property between individual claimants, and Bills relating to divorce, naturalization, etc., etc. The expenses of legislation in such matters must be paid by the parties seeking the relief; and a deposit of \$200 must be made immediately after the second reading of the Bill. After the second reading if all the rules of the House have been complied with, Private Bills go to the Committee, and it is before this Committee that proper attention must be given by the parties interested. Individuals or companies may appear by Parliamentary Agents.

13. **PARLIAMENTARY AGENTS.**—In England all the business for private corporations and individuals is transacted by Parliamentary Agents, who conduct to the interests of their clients, as well as to the convenience of Committees and Members, through their familiarity with Parliamentary practice. Their employment is sanctioned in Canada, every agent being (*Rule 72*) personally responsible to the House and to the Speaker for the observance of the rules, orders and practice of Parliament, and for the payment of all fees and charges; and all agents must have received the express sanction and authority of the Speaker.

14. **AVOIDANCE OF A DECISION.**—When a motion has been made upon which the House is unwilling to come to a vote, there are certain formal modes of avoiding a decision, amongst which are “passing of the orders of the day,” or moving “the previous question.” The former means that the House should—casting aside and taking no notice of the matter then before it—proceed to the other business appointed for that day; the latter, that a vote be previously taken as to the expediency of coming to any decision on the question raised. If “the previous question” be negatived as a matter of expediency, the motion to which it referred is only gotten rid of for the time; whereas a direct negative to the motion itself would be a proscription of it for the remainder of the session, as well as a denial of its principle. With respect to a Bill, moving that it “be read this day six months,” or “this day three months,” is a mode of throwing it out without coming to an express declaration against the principle of the measure.

15. **ROYAL ASSENT.**—The Act by which the Crown agrees to a Bill is called the Royal Assent; this assent is usually given at the end of a session, unless there is urgent necessity for the Act becoming law without loss of time, in which case the Governor-General, or the person administering the Government, comes down to the Upper House, and there, in the presence of both Houses, gives his assent. His Excellency specially manifests his assent to the Supply Bill. Bills to which the Royal Assent is not given are pronounced to be reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon, and are mentioned in the *Official Gazette* as having been reserved for Her Majesty's consideration. Unless a reserve is made in the Act itself, so soon as the Royal Assent is given, the Act becomes a Law, and can be proceeded on before any competent Court.

16. **PRIVILEGES OF PARLIAMENT.**—Amongst the privileges which the Commons claim, are:—

The power of committing individuals to prison—the power of publishing matters which, if not issuing from such high authority might become the subject of proceedings in a Court of Law—the power of directing the Law Officers of the Crown to prosecute persons accused of offences against the laws, or affecting the privileges of Parliament—and finally, of doing anything not directly contravening an existing Act of Parliament, which may be necessary for the vindication and protection of its own rights, in the exercise of

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its constitutional functions. Questions of privilege take precedence of all other proceedings, and are always in order. The privileges claimed by individual members, are freedom of speech and person, including freedom from legal arrest and seizure under process from the Courts of Law and Equity. This does not extend to indictable offences, or to actual contempts of the Courts of Justice. Members of Parliament are exempt from all duties, the performance of which might interfere with their prompt attendance to their Parliamentary calls. Privilege of Parliament, such as it is, continues for a convenient time after prorogation and dissolution. (During recent sessions, several Questions of Privilege have arisen, which will be found among *Speakers' Decisions*.)

17. **COMMITTALS.**—In common with Courts of Law and Equity the Houses of Parliament can punish all contempt of their authority, or disobedience of their mandates. Each House is armed with power to repress any aggression committed upon its rights, or any interference with its privileges; but in the case of the Commons, the operation of this power is limited to the session of Parliament, committals by that House being invalidated by a prorogation. Either House can delegate to a committee the power of sending for papers and records, and of enforcing the attendance of necessary witnesses.

18. **CONFERENCE.**—This is a species of negotiation between the two Houses of Parliament, conducted by managers appointed on both sides, for the purpose of producing concurrence, in cases where mutual consent is necessary; or for the purpose of reconciling differences which may have arisen. If the conference be upon the subject of a Bill depending between the two Houses, it may be demanded by that House which is in possession of the Bill at the time of asking the conference. It is the sole privilege of the Senate to name the time and place for holding a conference, no matter by which House it may have been demanded. Reasons in writing for the course resolved to be taken are usually furnished to the managers on both sides, in which case it is simply called "a conference." Should this proceeding fail, "a free conference" must be held, which gives an opportunity for the managers individually and unrestrained by any precise form of agreement, to urge such reasons as, in their judgment, may best tend to influence the House to which they are addressed. A free conference is usually

demanded after two conferences have been holden without effect. After one free conference, none other but free conferences can be held touching the same subject.

19. SUPPLY.—All proceedings which relate to the public income or expenditure, must originate with the Commons, and must be begun by resolution moved in Committee of Supply, which is always Committee of the Whole House. In the course of the session, estimates are submitted to a Committee of Supply, and resolutions moved thereon, granting to the Crown the sums requisite for the management of the various departments of the Government, and the support of various public and private institutions. Such as are confirmed by the Committee of Supply are reported to the House, where they are again re-considered and adopted or rejected, as the case may be. Upon these a Bill is passed, and this Supply Bill furnishes authority to the Government for disbursing the various sums appropriated. The Upper House may reject this or any other Money Bill, but they cannot alter or amend the substance of a Supply or Money Bill; such a course would be regarded as an invasion of the privileges of the Lower House. Before any Bill can be introduced, authorizing the expenditure of any public money, resolutions must be moved in Committee of Supply, agreed to there, reported and confirmed by the House.

20. WAYS AND MEANS.—As the Committee of Supply relates to the expenditure of the country, so the functions and duties of a Committee of Ways and Means have reference to the funds by which such expenditure is to be met. Loans, duties, taxes, excises, and revenue of every description, are submitted to the Committee of Ways and Means. The propositions of Government on this subject are reduced to resolutions, submitted, considered, and decided on, and such as are agreed to are reported to the House. The series of resolutions in com., when reported, is read a 1st time *pro forma*; then a second time, *en bloc*, (not the first resolution a 2d time, as formerly the practice in Canada.)—(See *Speakers' Decisions*, N. 89), at which stage *general* discussion of the subject takes place. The resolutions are then read *singly*, when discussion is confined to the subject matter of each. Those which may be adopted or embodied in a Bill or Bills, and in due course and form become the law of the land. As in Supply the Upper House may reject these Bills, but cannot amend them, nor can the Upper House insert a pecuniary penalty in any Bill.

21. ADJOURNMENT, PROROGATION AND DISSOLUTION. — Adjournment is a postponement of the sittings or proceedings of the House, from one time to another, specified for the re-assemblage. When the sittings of both Houses are interrupted by royal authority, it is called prorogation. Dissolution puts an end to the representative character of the individuals who, at the time, compose the House of Commons, and Parliament cannot therefore assemble until after a new election, except in cases hereinafter mentioned. The power of adjournment is a right belonging to each House, and there are no restrictions to this power.

The House of Commons can interrupt or postpone any debate for the consideration of any measure, or altogether adjourn its sitting, but the practice is always to adjourn to some stated time; and we think there can be no doubt that, by the previous permission of the House, the Speaker can leave the Chair for a certain number of hours; but this does not amount to an adjournment, and should not be noted as such by the Clerk. But it must be remarked that the adjournment of one House does not adjourn the other. The Crown may, pending an adjournment, summon by Proclamation either House or both, and may direct either House or both to adjourn to any particular day. But while the power exists, and though in former times it has been frequently exercised in the Imperial Legislature, it has grown into desuetude there as well as in the Provinces enjoying the privileges of their own Local Legislatures.

An individual member may for a time interrupt the progress of business by successive motions for adjournment, which may be repeated indefinitely, with this restriction: no second motion to adjourn can be made until after some intermediate proceeding shall have been had. The motion in committee, that the chairman report progress, is equivalent to a motion to adjourn the debate.

Adjournment does not close the session, nor does prorogation terminate Parliament. The former is an act which either House may perform; the latter is a power vested in the Crown, the duration of which may be subsequently shortened or extended as the Crown pleases. All unfinished business terminates and dies with prorogation, but during an adjournment they remain in *statu quo* to be revived on the re-assembling of Parliament. A member who moves the adjournment of a debate, or who is in possession of the Chair at the time of an adjournment, is said to be in possession of the House, with the right to re-open the debate which had been interrupted. This is not the case, however, when Committees of

the Whole House adjourn. Prorogation never extends beyond forty days, but it may be repeated from time to time by proclamation and continue to be renewed until it is intended that Parliament shall meet for the despatch of business. The Crown can summon Parliament to meet at any time by giving fourteen days' notice. Dissolution is the simple death of Parliament, and may be brought about in two ways, either by the pleasure of the Crown, or by lapse of time for which it was called into existence. There was a time when the existence of a Parliament terminated by the demise of the Crown, but a special law removed this provision of the Constitution. But there is no power in the Constitution by which a Parliament in Canada can be extended beyond five years. If Parliament, at the time of the Sovereign's death, be separated by adjournment or prorogation, it must assemble immediately, or within a reasonable period. If no Parliament be then in existence the members of the last must again meet, and may serve as a Parliament for six months, unless sooner prorogued. By the British North America Act, 30 Sec², it is provided that "there shall be a Session of the Canadian Parliament once, at least, every year, so that twelve months shall not intervene between the last sitting etc."

SPEAKER—THE HON. JAMES COCKBURN.

1. *Speaking Twice on Motion Checked.*—20 March 1868. On motion for reference of Petition of *Hon. J. C. Chapais*, relative to Kamouraska election, to the Standing Committee on Privileges and Elections, a debate ensued, in which *Hon. G. E. Cartier* drew a parallel between the Lotbiniere election in 1858 and the present case, and alluded incidentally to the Corrigan murder. *Mr. Joly* raised a point of order, that the murder of Corrigan had nothing to

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do with the point at issue. Objection OVER-ruLED, and debate proceeded. At its close the *Speaker* said: "That in order to put a check upon such sharp retorts as they had been listening to, he would, in future, enforce a rigid observance of the rule forbidding any member to speak more than once upon the same motion." *Debates*, p. 130.

2. *Trade—Bill on Banking—27 March 1868.* On motion for second reading of the Bill to enable Banks in any part of Canada to use notes of the Dominion instead of issuing notes of their own, the *Hon. L. H. Holton*, contended, "that, this being a Bill relating to Trade, and also involving a pledge of the public credit, it ought to have originated in Committee of the Whole House; and, that step not having been taken prior to the first reading, the Bill cannot now be read a second time." After considerable discussion, RULED: "I hold that the Bill does not involve an increased pledge of the public credit, and, therefore, ought (see *Rule 41*), and (*May*, page 364) strictly to have originated in Committee of the Whole House."

"But the Bill, having been read a first time, by leave of the House, and subsequently having been moved into Committee upon the resolutions, which were afterwards concurred in by the House, it is now too late to raise the objection. In none of the precedents quoted where Bills of this class were rejected on the 2d or 3d readings had the House been in Committee,—that proceeding having been entirely omitted. Here the contrary appears; and we need not enquire at this stage whether the introduction of the Bill, or the resolutions in Committee, were the first step in point of time.

"I think the *Hon. Member* is not required to proceed *de novo*, but may go on with his Bill." The Bill was then read a second time. *Journal*, p. 161.

3. *Trade—Bill on Insurance.—27 March 1868.* On motion for second reading of the Bill respecting Insurance Companies, requiring the deposit of a guarantee of \$50,000 from fire, and \$100,000 from Life Insurance Companies, to be made in Dominion Stock, the *Hon. L. H. Holton* objected that—"this Bill relates to Trade, and should be based upon resolutions passed in Committee of the Whole House. That it is a Bill relating to Trade, and that, from the terms of the 'British North America Act,' unless it could be so treated, it is beyond the jurisdiction of this House, as it is only under the head

" 'Relating to Trade and Commerce' that this House can deal with it, and that, if it does not come under that head, the jurisdiction falls to the Local Legislature."

After much discussion, RULED: "I hold that the term 'Trade' does not, in its general and popular sense, apply to Insurance. Trade means buying and selling, importing and exporting goods to market, banking, railways, navigation and telegraphs; all assist trade, and are auxiliaries, but are not branches of trade in the popular sense; yet certainly the first, 'Banking,' is more intimately connected with Trade than Insurance. I do not find that Bills relating to these subjects must necessarily be considered in Committee of the Whole; sometimes it may have been done, but the practice is not uniform, and I see no rule which requires it. I over-rule the point of order."

The House then proceeded upon the Bill. The other question raised by *Mr. Holton*, viz.: "That the regulation of Insurance Companies is a subject properly within the jurisdiction of the Provincial Legislatures,"—being no point of order, but a question of law, was advisedly passed over by the *Speaker*. It was, however, decided by the House, on 20 May (see *Journal*, p. 426) adversely to *Mr. Holton's* objection. *Journal*, p. 161.

4. *Amendment Inconsistent with Motion*.—6 April 1868. On motion, for an address for copies of certain papers, including copies of any instructions to *Hcn. Dr. Tupper*, now on a mission to England, *Dr. Parker* moved in amendment, an addition to the address, requesting the recall of *Dr. Tupper*. *Mr. Morris* objected that the amendment was inconsistent with the main motion, and that both would be unintelligible if co-joined. Objection OVER-RULED. *Journal*, p. 185.

5. *Complex Amendment to Motion into Committee of Supply*.—6 May 1868. On motion to go into Committee of Supply, *Hon. Mr. Holton* moved, in amendment, that it is expedient to reduce the salary of the Governor-General, and salaries of all Government employes receiving more than \$800 per annum, and to provide against salaried officers receiving emolument for special services. *Hon. Mr. Dunkin* objected to the amendment as being complex, and requiring sub-division in order to a regular vote thereon, while, being an amendment to go into Committee of Supply, it cannot, if so put, be divided, or an amendment upon it moved. RULED:—"This motion which contains three distinct propositions, on each

" of which a separate question might be put (and which is therefore a complex motion), is not, therefore, irregular, or out of order. The House could, in general, according to precedent, order a complicated motion to be divided. But that could only be done by amending the motion, which cannot be done now, for but one amendment can be moved in going into Committee of Supply. Therefore, the motion must stand or fall as a whole. The difficulty pointed out by the Hon. Member for Brome is one which does not affect the regularity of the motion, and that is all that I have to deal with." Amendment put and negatived. *Journal*, p. 268.

6. *Petitions for Money Refused.*—The reception of various *Petitions*, on the ground that they asked for grants of public money, or aid, and were not recommended by the Crown, was rejected on the following occasions:—7 May 1868, *Journal*, p. 297; 1, 3, 7, 10 March 1870, *Journal*, pp. 30, 32, 40, 56; 11 March, 7 and 23 April 1870, *Journal* pp. 59, 167, 233; 20 February and 3 March 1871, *Journal* pp. 18, 44, and on several other occasions, for which refer to Index of Journals. (See also No. 52 hereof, relative to *Petitions for Exemptions from Taxation*. See also No. 12 hereof.)

7. *Amendments—Greater Expenditure than in Message—Unnecessary Instruction to Committee.*—16 May 1868. On motion to receive report of Committee of the Whole on the Bill respecting Militia and Defence, Mr. Pope moved, in amendment, to re-commit the Bill, to consider two resolutions; the first declaring the inexpediency and injustice of present large sums paid to Staff Officers, while Battalion and Company Officers are inadequately paid; the second providing that no money shall be paid to Staff Officers until such time as all the officers of the Force are properly considered, etc. The Hon. A. T. Galt proposed, in amendment thereto, to refer the Bill back to Committee, for the purpose of so adjusting the Militia expenditure, that the officers "may receive such allowance as will distinguish between their respective ranks and that of the men." Hon. Mr. Holton, raising the question of order on Hon. Mr. Galt's amendment, RULED:—"Not in order, inasmuch as its adoption would involve the expenditure of a greater sum than that recommended by His Excellency's Message." Hon. Sir John Macdonald, raising the question of order on Mr. Pope's amendment, RULED:—"Not in order, inasmuch as, if adopted, it would be an instruction to the Committee to consider certain resolutions which

"could have been considered without any instruction from the House; and, moreover, that it involves an increase of the Public Expenditure over that recommended by the Message from His Excellency the Governor-General. *Journal* p. 390.

8. *Petition for Canal Construction Received*—19 April 1869. On presentation of petition for construction of Ottawa Ship Canal, *Mr. Alex. Mackenzie* objected to its reception, on the ground that it involved an expenditure of public money. RULED:—"That although the prayer of the petition, if granted, might ultimately involve the expenditure of public money, yet, as it related only directly to public works, it might be received without any violation of the rules." On recommendation of the *Minister of Justice* reception delayed till next sitting.

When again presented, *Mr. Mackenzie* raised a similar objection. A short debate ensuing, RULED:—"The reception of this petition is objected to, because of the rule adopted last session, when, for the first time, the English practice was introduced into this Chamber. (7 May 1868, *Journal*, p. 297.) These are the words in which the decision of the Chair was then announced: Though there is no rule of this House expressly applicable to the question, yet by rule 116, it is ordered that in unprovided cases, the rules, usages and forms of the English House of Commons are to be followed. The practice in England has been clearly against the reception of such petitions, and I find, by a Standing Order of the House of Commons of the 20th March, 1866, it is declared:—"That this House will receive no petition for any sum relating to Public Service, or proceed upon any motion for a grant or charge upon the Public Revenue, whether payable out of the Consolidated Fund, or out of moneys to be provided by Parliament, unless recommended from the Crown." That decision having been given, the House agreed unanimously to adopt it as the rule to be followed in future. The present Petition does not, in my opinion, come within that rule. It is very general in its terms. It sets out a variety of facts with reference to the construction of a work which would, no doubt, involve an expenditure of money, but it concludes with these words:—"Therefore your petitioners humbly request that Your Honorable House will take such measures as will cause the obstructions to this navigation to be removed, and an uninterrupted line, to the full capacity of the leading channel, and the supply of water from the summit level, opened throughout." Now, as I take it, this is not a peti-

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tion asking for any grant which would be a charge on the public exchequer, and I do not think it would be my duty, sitting in this chair, to interfere with the right of the people to petition this House, unless there is a clear rule of this House, which would prevent the petition, beyond a doubt, from being received. I cannot so apply the rule, for by express language it does not cover this case. This is not a petition asking for money. It is a petition asking simply for legislation, and were I to say that the petition came within that rule, I should be opposing my authority against the rights of the public at large to approach this House. If it is the pleasure of the House to exclude petitions of this class in future, the proper way would be to adopt a substantive rule, which would clearly exclude such petitions. I consider, therefore, that the petition must be received." The petition was then received. *Journal*, p. 22.

9. *Motion Over-ruled—Committee on Depreciated Silver.*—26 May 1869. *Mr. Dufresne* moved that the House go into Committee on Monday next, to consider a resolution, declaring the expediency of the purchase, by the Dominion, of depreciated silver coins now in circulation, their export, and the substitution of Dominion notes. A debate ensued, when the Speaker RULED, his attention having been called to a point of order, that:—"The motion involved a charge upon the public revenue, and should originate by Message from His Excellency." Motion withdrawn. *Ottawa Times Debates*, p. 77.

10. *Amendments Over-ruled—Newfoundland Public Lands.*—10 June 1869. On motion of concurrence in resolutions, reported from Committee, on Union of Newfoundland with Canada, *Mr. Blake* moved an amendment, relative to Newfoundland Public Lands; *negatived*. *Hon. Mr. Wood* moved an amendment, relative to the lands, and to financial arrangements; RULED:—"Out of order, inasmuch as it alters the manner in which the amount recommended by His Excellency's Message is to be applied." *Mr. Wood* subsequently moved another amendment relative to lands only; RULED:—"Out of order, the House having decided upon this question, on *Mr. Blake's* amendment." *Journal*, p. 219.

11. *Nova Scotia Financial Arrangements, Amendments, Abstract Principle.*—12 June 1869. On motion of concurrence in resolutions, reported from Committee, for adjustment of the financial arrange-

ments with Nova Scotia, *Hon. Mr. Wood* moved an amendment declaring inexpediency, unless arrangements be at the same time made in favor of Quebec and Ontario. Objected to, as proposing an expenditure in excess of that recommended in His Excellency's Message. RULED:—"In order, as being a mere assertion of an abstract principle. Beyond that, it proposes nothing; it does not propose to take any step in the direction of legislation; but, on the contrary, as I read the motion, the effect would be, if passed, to prevent concurrence in the resolutions, and to stop the whole proceedings—so that the question on this proposed appropriation could not be approached again, this session, unless a Message came down from the Crown recommending such additional expenditure." (Extract.) Amendment put and negatived. *Journal*, p. 235.

12. *Private Motion for Taxation Over-ruled.*—14 June 1869. Resolution moved to tax American wheat, etc. OVER-RULED, inasmuch as motions for imposition of duties should emanate from Government. *Journal*, p. 242.

13. *Amendments Irrelevant.*—30 March 1870. On motion of *Mr. Blake*, for an Address to the Queen, for Imperial Legislation, to debar the Canadian Parliament from disturbing the financial arrangements of Union between the Provinces, two amendments, objected to as irrelevant and vague, were RULED in order. *Journal*, pp. 122-127.

14. *Canadian School Lands—Resolution Irregular.*—4 April 1870. On motion of *Hon. Mr. Wood*, for the adoption of a resolution, detailing the proceedings of the Government of the late Province of Canada respecting the Crown and School Lands, declaring that good faith towards the settlers required that Government to make certain provisions which it had failed to do, and that the objection to carry out the compact made with the settlers, devolves upon the Government of Canada under the B.N.A. Act: *Mr. Casault* objected, that the resolution cannot be considered in the manner proposed, and should have originated in Committee of the Whole House. The *Speaker* RULED: That the objection was good, as the Resolution unquestionably involved a charge upon the public purse of the Dominion. With regard to a point raised by the member for Lambton, as to the Dominion Government "having power to pay this money out of the Provincial subsidies, the very

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"circumstance of this House being the trustee, as it were, of the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, should make it all the more necessary that every proper constitutional check should be interposed before any charge should be incurred, which would eventually be imposed upon those Provinces." He moreover thought there should be a Message from the Governor-General before such a motion could be entertained, and therefore declared the motion out of order. *Journal*, p. 143.

15. *Motion on Hop Interest—Abstract Principle—Resolution Affecting Trade.*—4 April 1870. On motion of concurrence in Report of Select Committee on Hop-growing and Salt interests, *Hon. Mr. Wood* objected, that adoption of motion would lead to imposition of duties. Objection **OVER-RULED**, as it does not follow conclusively that a tax or duty will be imposed; the measures asked for are measures of relief, so far as the House is informed. The *Hon. Sir G. E. Cartier* objected, that the subject matter of the Report related to Trade, and should originate in Committee of the Whole House. Objection **OVER-RULED**, as this rule, in express terms, is confined to Bills only; and the Speaker thought the House might adopt a Report of this general character, which would leave it uncommitted as to specific measures. *Journal*, p. 147.

16. *Instruction to a Commission not appointed.*—4 April 1870. Motion to give certain instructions to the Commission shortly to be appointed to consider the question of Canals. **OVER-RULED**, as the motion purports to give an instruction to a Commission which is not appointed. Motion withdrawn. *Journal*, p. 149.

17. *Senate Bill providing Expenditure.*—5 April 1870. On motion for 3rd reading of Bill from the Senate, amending the Act relating to Lighthouses, *Hon. Mr. Holton* called attention to certain clauses, which make dispositions respecting public expenditure. Objection **OVER-RULED**. "By referring to the authorities, it appeared that the Commons had accepted provisions in Bills from the Lords creating charges not directly imposed by the Bill, but to be defrayed out of moneys to be provided by Parliament; but that exception having been taken to this practice, it did not appear to have been continued since 1860." The present Bill fell far short of the class of Bills alluded to. A clause in it provides that nothing in the Act shall authorize expenditure by the Minister, until previously sanctioned by Parliament. No contract could

therefore be entered into unless thus previously sanctioned. (Extracts.) Bill passed. *Journal*, p. 155.

18. *Amendment not connected with Motion.*—21 April 1870. Upon reading of Resolutions reported from Committee of Supply, to defray expenses of certain Dominion offices, *Mr. Mackenzie* moved, "That this House regrets that the Government should 'have deemed it necessary to increase the salaries of officers in the 'Public Service, &c.'" *Mr. Masson* (Soulanges) then moved, "That 'no Public Employees shall receive more than one salary,' &c. This second motion was objected to, on the ground that the two motions had no connection with one another; and the *Speaker*, concurring, **OVER-RULED** it. *Mr. Mackenzie's* motion was put and negatived. *Journal*, p. 212.

19. *Amendment changing Expenditure recommended by Message.*—6 May 1870. On motion for third reading of the Bill for Civil Service Superannuation, *Mr. Godin* moved an amendment as to the mode of administering the fund, and providing that no officer shall benefit unless he has contributed to the fund during five years, and that widows and orphans of employees shall benefit, &c., &c. Amendment objected to, Imp. Act, 30 Vic., c. 3, sec. 54, providing that the House of Commons shall not pass any vote, resolution, &c., for any appropriation to any purpose not first recommended by Message of the Governor-General during the same session as the vote. Objection *sustained*, and amendment **OVER-RULED**. "This 'amendment proposes a substantial change from the proposal 'recommended in the Message of 2nd May inst.," &c. *Journal*, p. 303.

20. *Trade.—Bill on Insurance.—Question already passed upon.*—6 & 11 May 1870. On motion for second reading of Bill to limit the rate of interest, it was objected to, as it related to Trade, and should therefore have originated in Committee of the Whole. The *Speaker* in a lengthy decision, and quoting precedents, **RULED**, that the term "Trade," does not, in its general and popular sense, apply to insurance. "Banking, railways, navigation, and telegraphs, all 'assist Trade and are its auxiliaries, but are not branches of Trade 'in the popular sense; yet certainly the first, 'Banking,' is more 'intimately connected with Trade than Insurance. I do not find 'that Bills relating to these subjects must necessarily be first considered in Committee of the Whole; sometimes it may have been

(Ex- done, but the practice is not uniform, and I see no rule which
 "requires it." The *Speaker* therefore allowed the Bill to be
 proceeded with. (*Mr. Mills* then objected, and the *Speaker* CONCURRED
 that the same question had substantially been already brought
 before the House and postponed for three months; whereupon the
 order for its second reading was discharged.) *Journal*, pp. 313,
 314, 348.

21. *Motion Respecting Re-vote Re-committed.*—10 May 1870.
 The order of the day being read, for resuming debate of amend-
 ment proposed on 21 April, to concurrence in resolution of Com-
 mittee, appropriating \$1,300,000 for settlement and government of
 N.W. Territories (Re-vote) which amendment provided that no
 Dominion funds should be expended for regaining, by force of arms,
 possession of the Territory, &c.

Hon. Mr. Dunkin moved, amendment to amendment, to refer
 the resolution back to Committee of Supply, for reconsideration
 with Message transmitting Supplementary Estimates for 1869-70,
 and with such estimates presently under reference to said Commit-
 tee. *Hon. Mr. Holton* objected, that as this was a re-vote of last
 year, and the Committee of Supply had already before it a second
 Message, accompanying the Supplementary Estimates, recommend-
 ing a re-vote in another form, one or other must be withdrawn.
 Objection OVER-RULED: The House can know nothing of what goes
 on before the Committee of Supply until it reports. The resolution
 which is proposed to be referred back, may, or may not, be
 intended for the same sum of money as that in the Supplementary
 Estimates which have also been referred to same Committee. If
 two resolutions are reported for two distinct sums, the House can
 then refuse concurrence in one or other of them. *Mr. Dunkin's*
 amendment put and carried. *Journal*, pp. 330, 340.

22. *Motion Over-ruled for Address on Prov. of Canada Debt.*—
 6 March 1871. *Hon. Mr. Dorion* moved that the House will, on
 Wednesday next, go into Committee, to consider certain resolutions,
 for an Address to the Queen, for amendment of the B.N.A. Act, to
 assign the debt of the late Province of Canada entirely to the
 Dominion, &c.

The *Speaker*, concurring in an objection raised by *Hon. Sir G.*
E. Cartier, OVER-RULED the motion, as conflicting with Sec. 54 of
 B.N.A. Act, which debars the House from any vote, address, &c.,
 for appropriation of Revenue not first recommended by Message.

"The contention is that the proposed appropriation being beyond the power of the Parliament of Canada, this provision of the Statute cannot therefore apply. In its literal construction it does apply to the motion, and certainly it seems to me to the full as necessary in a constitutional sense," &c. *Journal*, p. 50.

23. *Decisions on Motions—Address, Debt of the Pro. of Canada.*—9 & 13 March 1871. *Hon. Mr. Dorion* moved an Address to the Queen, praying that the B.N.A. Act be amended, to authorise the Canadian Parliament to legislate on all questions connected with surplus debt of the late Province of Canada.

Hon. Sir G. E. Cartier moved an amendment, to the effect that the House refrains from expressing an opinion on the award rendered by the Arbitrators upon said debt.

Hon. Mr. Chauveau moved a second amendment, declaring that the House will give its most favorable consideration to any measure introduced by the Government, to arrange existing financial difficulties between Ontario and Quebec, "and involving any aid on the part of the Dominion commensurate with the importance of the object itself, and with our resources; due regard being had to the rights of the other Provinces."

Mr. Mills (Bothwell) having objected to the latter motion, as involving an appropriation, and asking the House to commit itself to an expenditure of money, which cannot be done without a Message from the Government, RULED: "That the said motion is out of order."

Hon. Mr. Holton moved an amendment to *Sir G. E. Cartier's* amendment, expressing the regret of the House that the Governor-General had not been advised to recommend the adoption of an Address to the Queen, similar to that set forth in *Mr. Dorion's* original motion. *House adjourned.*

Previously to the House resuming consideration hereof, on March 13, the *Speaker* corrected the entry on the *Journal* of the foregoing RULING. "The motion was out of order, in my opinion, not because it proposed an appropriation of public money within the meaning of the 54th Section of the British North America Act, and should have been preceded by Message, but because it involved an increase to the Public Debt, and should, therefore, have been first considered in Committee of the Whole."

"I am aware that it is doubted whether it is a correct rule of Parliamentary practice that every abstract proposition which, if acted on, would increase the Public Debt of the country, should be

“ first considered in Committee; but my opinion on the point has
 “ been expressed on two or three occasions, and I shall so continue
 “ to decide, unless the House should think proper to express a con-
 “ trary opinion. This rule, however, being self-imposed, may be
 “ enforced or relaxed as the House shall determine. But the con-
 “ stitutional rule contained in the 54th Section of the Imperial Act
 “ is one that, being absolutely binding, should be neither extended
 “ nor restrained by implication, but should at all times be most
 “ guardedly considered by the House.”

This decision was ordered to be entered on the *Journal*. *Mr. Holton's* amendment was negatived, and *Sir G. E. Cartier's* carried. *Journal*, pp. 62 and 72.

24. *Bill on Stamp Duties, simply declaratory.*—16 and 20 *March* 1871. On second reading of the Bill to remove doubts as to the liability to stamp duties of Premium Notes, taken or held by Mutual Fire Insurance Companies, *Hon. L. H. Holton* objected that,—under section 54 of B.N.A. Act, the Bill must first be recommended by Message from the Crown, and also that it should have originated in Committee of the Whole. Decision *reserved*, and debate *adjourned*.

On *March* 20 the *Speaker* ruled:—“ The Bill is to remove doubts; and declares that certain notes shall be deemed to be promissory notes within the meaning of the Act 31 *Vic.* chap. 9, and shall be subject to the duties thereby imposed, and it provides that all such notes heretofore given and not stamped, shall be made valid by a double stamp.

“ There being no appropriation of money proposed, there need be no recommendation from the Crown; and the objection rests on the ground that, as it involves an additional charge on the people, the Bill should have originated in Committee of the Whole, and should, moreover, have been proposed by a Minister.

“ It appears to me that the Bill is merely declaratory, and that it involves no new charge except in so far as the double stamp duty may effect that purpose. On looking carefully at the 31st *Vic.* chap. 9, I find by section 7 that the Governor in Council may declare that any kind or class of instruments, as to which doubts exist, shall be chargeable with any and what duty under the Act; and by sections 10, 11 and 12, provisions are enacted to render valid notes in the hands of innocent holders, and notes passed to third parties. The provisions as to double stamps in the present Bill is merely an extension of the former Act in its remedial

" clauses to the class of notes here referred to, and which are now declared to be within that Act.

" The Bill is one which, therefore, in my opinion, may be properly introduced and proceeded with by a private Member.

" The question, generally, whether private Members may introduce and proceed upon measures relating to taxation, which was discussed in the course of the argument, is one of very grave importance, and, though not needful to the decision of the present objection, I think it proper to say a few words upon it to the House. Instances may undoubtedly be found in the Journals of the English House of Commons, of Bills and Motions by private Members to increase taxation, some of which have passed unchallenged, whilst in other cases the indirect assent of a Minister has been deemed sufficient. Recently, however, in 1869, a high authority, *Sir Thomas Erskine May*, stated before a Joint Committee of the two Houses of Parliament, that 'no private Member is permitted to propose an Imperial tax upon the people; it must proceed from a Minister of the Crown, or be in some other form declared to be necessary for the public service.'

" I think the House may properly accept of this as the correct construction of the rules regulating the introduction of similar measures. The Motion or Bill should either be introduced by a Minister, or, if initiated by a private Member (a practice which should not be encouraged), a Minister should assume the responsibility of it by signifying the consent of the Government to its being entertained by the House.

" If the House agrees with me as to the desirability of adopting this constitutional restriction, it will become my duty to enforce the observance of the rule hereafter."

The Bill was then read and committed. *Journal*, pp. 96, 112.

25. *Amendment Contrary to Previous Decisions.*—22 and 23 March, 1871. The House having considered in Committee of the Whole, a Bill to amend the Acts relating to duties of Customs, *Hon. Sir F. Hincks* moved that the Bill be read a third time tomorrow. The *Hon. L. H. Holton* moved in amendment that the Bill be now re-committed to a Committee of the Whole House, for the purpose of so amending the same as to repeal the duties on coal, coke, wheat and flour. *Hon. Mr. Blanchet* moved an amendment, adding the words, "and also salt, peas and beans, etc." This was agreed to on division. Then *Mr. Colby* moved in further amendment, to substitute for *Mr. Holton's* amendment, as now

amended, a resolution that : "It is inexpedient, during the present session of Parliament, to make any alteration in the existing duties on coal, coke, wheat, flour, salt, peas and beans, barley, rye, oats, Indian corn, buckwheat and all other grain, Indian meal, oatmeal and flour or meal of any other grain," inserted instead thereof;

(Objection being taken by *Mr. Holton*, as it proposes to strike out certain words which the House has already decided, shall form part of the question; RULED: "The point of order is well taken. It seems conclusively so by English authority, and there is good reason for it. The House has pronounced its decision upon the proposition that salt and other articles shall form part of the question to be submitted to the House, and now the House is asked to say that they shall be struck out of the question.

"This would be a contradiction, and is clearly out of order." *Journal*, pp. 131, 132.

26. *Amendment Substantially Same as Original Motion, but Differing in Details*—23 & 27 March, 1871. *Mr. Blake* moved that the House do now resolve itself into a Committee, to consider the following resolutions: 1. Detailing the legislative action on which Confederation was based. 2. Defining the provisions in the B.N.A. Act for the admission of the N.W. Territories into the Union. 3, 4 & 5. Setting forth the measures already taken and proposed to be taken by the Imperial and Canadian Governments for the admission of said territories, and the erection of part of them into the Province of Manitoba. And 6th, "That in the opinion of this House, the sense of both Houses of the Parliament of Canada should be taken as to, and should form the basis of such proposed Legislation."

The *Hon. Sir G. E. Cartier* moved, in amendment, six resolutions, the first five detailing Legislative and Governmental measures taken for establishing the Province of Manitoba, and 7th, "That the provisions of the said draft Act meet the approval of this House, and are in consonance with the will of this House, as expressed in the most formal manner in the said Act relating to Manitoba."

The *Hon. A. A. Dorion* moved, in amendment to the amendment, that, "Irrespective of the merits of the measures proposed by the Government of Canada to be submitted to the Imperial Parliament for the purpose of confirming certain Canadian legislation depriving the Parliament of Canada of certain existing

"powers, and altering the British North America Act, 1867, this House would be wanting in its duty if it did not express its decided opinion that no such Imperial legislation should be asked for by the Government of Canada, except after the details of such proposed legislation shall have been submitted to both Houses of the Parliament of Canada for their judgment, and addresses of such Houses to the Queen, praying for such legislation, shall have been passed."

Mr. Harrison objected to this amendment, as being, in effect, the same as that involved in the original motion. RULED: "The amendment is in order. It proposes to the House a resolution which is substantially the same as that involved in the original motion, but it omits considerable matter of recital, both of fact and law, and in that respect, I think, the proposition is one which the Honorable Member may propose as an amendment. He may say very properly, as he does say, that he has no desire to commit the House to the recitals which form a part of the original motion. I think the motion is therefore in order."

Mr. Dorion's amendment was then put and negatived, and that of *Sir G. E. Cartier* carried, on division. *Journal*, pp. 136, 145.

27. *Bill Over-ruled—Question Already Passed Upon.*—3 April 1871. A Bill respecting Insolvency having been passed and sent to Senate for concurrence, another Bill, introduced to repeal the Insolvency Laws, was objected to, and OVER-RULED, on the ground that the House had already passed upon this question, and that no measure could be entertained at variance with the former one during the present session. *Journal*, p. 209.

28. *Motion of Urgency—Without Notice.*—10 April, 1871. On motion for a Select Committee, to enquire into a charge made in the House, that *Mr. Delorme*, Member for Provencher, had been concerned in the rebellion in the Hudson Bay Territories, and implicated in the murder of *Thomas Scott*,—it was objected that previous notice of motion was required. The *Speaker*, after citing *May* on the subject, said:—"That it rested with the discretion of the House as to whether notice of this motion should be given or not. If the House believed that this was a case of such urgency that it should at once be entertained and disposed of, the House may say that the absence of notice should not bar progress in the matter, but on the other hand, the House may consider the matter of so grave a character as to require time for consideration. I think it rests with the House."

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After statements, and amendments, the House, on division, passed to the Order of the Day.—*Journal*, p. 249.

29. *Correspondence Respecting Damages Claim, Referred to Committee.*—10 April, 1871. Mr. Currier moved that the Return to Address for copies of correspondence between the Department of Public Works and *George Sterling* respecting a claim for damages by the said *Sterling*, be referred to a Select Committee.

The *Speaker* said, that his attention had already been called to this motion. He ruled: "That it does not appear to be objectionable to refer a claim of this nature to a Select Committee. Should their report recommend a payment of money, this House will refuse its concurrence, unless the recommendation from the Crown is announced by a Minister." Question put and motion negatived. *Journal*, p. 254.

30. *Reply to Speech from Throne not a Decision on Special Questions.*—11 April, 1871. On motion of *Hon. Sir G. E. Cartier*, to go into Committee, to consider a resolution, recommended by His Excellency, that the Pacific Railway should be a private, and not a Government work, and should be aided by land grant and subsidy, Mr. Mackenzie objected, that the House had, during present session, passed upon a motion in terms similar thereto [by negativing an amendment proposed by *Sir A. T. Galt* (Sherbrooke) to motion for second reading of Address respecting admission of British Columbia. *Journal*, 202] Ruled: That if the two Resolutions which have been offered to the House—the Resolution of the Member for Sherbrooke, and that of the Honorable Minister of Militia, were precisely the same, word for word, it would still be open to the House to consider the Motion of the Minister of Militia at this stage. The reason of that is this:—The motion of the Honorable Member for Sherbrooke was offered by way of amendment, as an alternative proposition to the House. The House had its option to adopt either the Main Motion, which was to read the Address a second time there and then, or to adopt the Motion of the Honorable Member for Sherbrooke, which was to postpone the reading of that Address to a future day, and to resolve certain things. The House, in negativing the Motion of the Honorable Member for Sherbrooke, has not passed upon the Resolution contained in that Motion. It has simply chosen to say, "we will now read the Address a second time, and we will not pass upon the Resolution, offered by way of amendment, at the present time."

I think we have only to consider the form used in the House of Commons in England in putting questions, to see what is the true effect of the vote on the Motion proposed by the Honorable Member for Sherbrooke. Had the Question been put as it would have been put in England, that all the words proposed to be omitted, "stand part of the question," that is, that the Main Motion "should be voted upon yea or nay," the House would not appear to have passed upon the alternative proposition. But though we may vary our form of Question, our votes must have no different effect than if taken in the English House of Commons.

Therefore, according to my view, if the two Motions had been precisely the same, it would have been still open to the House now, to consider and pass upon the Motion of the Honorable the Minister of Militia. But there are, I observe, important variances between the two Motions. I would particularly allude to the one referred to by the Honorable Member for Sherbrooke, that his Motion proposed to pronounce an opinion upon the understanding of the two contracting parties, apart from, and irrespective of the written evidence altogether; this motion does not do that. With regard to the former Motion, the House might well hesitate in coming to a decision upon a Question so difficult to decide upon; whilst it may or may not hesitate about pronouncing upon its own future action, which is what is proposed by the present Motion. Therefore, for these reasons, I think the Motion is in order.

The House went into Committee accordingly. *Journal*, p. 264.

31. *Motion for Instructions already possessed by Committee.*—2 May 1872. On motion into Committee on Bill to repeal Insolvency Laws, a motion to instruct Committee to except Ontario from its operation was OVER-RULED, as the Bill affected the Dominion, and the Committee had already the power asked for. *Journal*, p. 78.

32. *Petition sent by Telegraph Rejected.*—3 May 1872. A petition respecting Red River Claims, sent by telegraph from Manitoba, was presented by Hon. A. Mackenzie. RULED:—"This petition cannot be received, because there are no real signatures attached to it."

33. *Bill Repealing Insolvency Laws need not originate in Committee of Whole.*—17 May 1872. Third reading of Bill to repeal Insolvency Laws, objected to, the Bill not having originated in

Committee of the Whole. Objection **OVER-RULED**, this Bill not imposing burthens, but repealing them. Moreover, it applies to traders, as individuals, not to Trade as a subject matter. *Journal*, p. 120.

34. *Practical Amendment to an Abstract Motion*.—27 May 1872. On resuming adjourned debate on motion of *Mr. Joly*, to go into Committee for consideration of a resolution, that the Superannuation Fund should be entirely devoted to the relief of officials and their families, *Mr. Jackson* moved, in amendment, that it is inexpedient now to alter the Act, and that the subject should be considered by a new Parliament. Amendment objected to, as having no relation to the original motion, but **RULED** in order, *Mr. Joly's* motion, though merely an abstract opinion, being expressed against the present system, and *Mr. Jackson's* being a practical proposition, which might be adopted in lieu of the other, and pertinent to the subject of the main motion, the amendment was put and carried. *Journal*, p. 166.

35. *Bill Regulating Bonds—Does not Compound Debts with Government*.—16 April 1873. On motion for second reading of Bill extending provisions of Grand Trunk Act, 1862, so far as relates to certain preferential bonds, etc., *Hon. Mr. Cauchon* objected, that it should have been introduced in Committee of the Whole, as its object was virtually to compound a debt due to the Government. Objection **OVER-RULED**: "Compounding" is strictly the "taking less than the thing that is due. That is not asked in this case." *Journal*, p. 164.

36. *Second Amendment to Motion into Committee of Supply*.—2 May 1873. On debates on amendment of motion to go into Committee of Supply, *Hon. Mr. Tupper* moved a second amendment, which was objected to by *Hon. Mr. Holton* as out of order, and **OVER-RULED**. *Journal*, p. 262 (See also No. 59)

37. *Amendment to an Amendment Obliterating Original Motion*.—8 May 1873. On motion of *Mr. Mackenzie*, declaring it reprehensible for Ministers or other servants of the Crown to use the powers of office in elections, and censuring *Gilbert Griffin*, Post Office Inspector, for a certain letter by him addressed to *J. Rannie*, Postmaster, *Hon. Mr. Tupper* moved in amendment, that the House proceed to the orders of the day. *Mr. Joly* moved a second amendment,

declaring the advisability of so amending the Election Law as to disfranchise the whole Civil Service. Second amendment, **OVER- RULLED**: *Mr. Tupper's* amendment, if adopted, obliterates "the original motion, and no further amendment can be proposed pending its consideration." *Mr. Tupper's* amendment put and carried. *Journal*, p. 300.

38. *Bill from Senate Imposing Burdens*.—10 May 1873. On third reading of Bill from Senate, respecting Inspection of Steam-boats. *Hon. Mr. Holton* took notice that the Bill contained provisions which will be a burden on the people, when the House, by resolution, waived its privileges on this point. *Journal*, p. 319.

39. *Motion not According to Notice*.—12 May 1873. On motion of *Mr. Mackenzie* to go into Committee on Resolution, that no person interested in the Pacific Railway "shall be capable of being elected to, or of sitting and voting in Parliament," *Hon. Sir J. A. Macdonald* objected that motion was not in accordance with notice given, which read "shall be eligible to be elected a member of this House." **RULED**:—"The objection is well taken." *Mr. Mackenzie* altered his motion accordingly. *Journal*, p. 326.

40. *Reading Papers in House-Relating to Matters before Committee*.—15 May 1873. *Hon. Mr. Huntington* moved, upon information of important documents, in reference to Pacific Railway charges under investigation by Select Committee, being in the hands of a Trustee, under such circumstances, that there is great danger of their being placed beyond the reach of the Committee before 2nd July next, to which date Committee is adjourned; that the Committee assemble to-morrow, and summon the Trustee to produce the documents. The mover proceeding to read certain letters and documents, *Hon. Sir J. A. Macdonald* objected thereto. **RULED**:—"The question of Order, as I understand it, is this:—Whether a Member in making a motion is to be permitted to read certain letters and papers which, it is said, will support that motion, and which relate to a charge referred on a previous occasion to a Select Committee for investigation. This is bringing into the House for discussion evidence that must come before that Committee in support of the charge. I do think, and I appeal to both sides of the House, that upon the point of Order, as well as upon the strong justice of the case, I am bound to rule that the Honorable Member cannot read those papers." The motion was then put and carried. *Journal*, p. 349.

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41. *Accusing Action of Crown as being "for a purpose."*—3 Nov.

1873. In resumed debate upon the amendments proposed to the Address, in reply to the Speech from the Throne, which amendments expressed opinions upon the conduct of His Excellency's advisers, *Mr. Mills* made reference to the despatches from the Governor-General to the Imperial Government, submitted to the House by Message, "as being sent down for a purpose." *Hon. Sir J. A. Macdonald* objected, that no Member had a right to say that the Representative of the Sovereign sent down certain despatches for the purpose of influencing debate in this House. RULED:—"There is no doubt an Honorable Member may criticise the subject-matter of such despatches, but he should not say they were sent down for a purpose." *Journal*, p. 137.

SPEAKER—THE HON. T. W. ANGLIN.

42. *Petition Rejected as an Election Petition*—20 April 1871.

On motion for reception of Petition of *H. La Boutillier*, that Return for last Election for *Gaspé* be completed and amended, as a matter of privilege, by substituting the name of Petitioner for that of *L. G. Harper*. Objection being taken, that the subject is one which could only come under the cognizance of the Courts of Law, as provided by Statute, RULED: "I cannot find any rule or precedent to guide me in coming to a conclusion on this question. I think it would be well for the House to consider this matter, and lay down a rule with respect to similar Petitions in the future. I am of opinion that it is an Election Petition. Looking over the late English journals, I cannot find any cases of Petitions of this nature having been ruled out. After considering all the circumstances I think that the petition ought not to be received." *Journal*, p. 82.

43. *Trade—Bill on Banking*.—30 April 1874. On motion to introduce a Bill, amending the Acts relating to Banks and Banking, respecting liability of shareholders, objection being taken that the Bill affects Trade, and should originate in Committee of the Whole, RULED: The Bill cannot proceed. *Journal*, p. 142.

44. *Abstract Proposition. Affecting Expenditure, in Order*.—11 May 1874. On motion of *Mr. Blain*, for a Committee of Seven, to consider the feasibility of an Ontario and Huron Ship Canal, also declaring expediency of the appointment of a Commission to

confer with the U.S. Transportation Committee for a similar purpose, *Mr. Thompson* (Haldimand) objected, that the motion involved Public Expenditure in recommending appointment of Commissioners, objection OVER-RULED:—"The motion was an abstract proposition such as could be regularly proposed by a private Member. If it should pass, it would not necessarily bind the House in any way." Question was again proposed, debated and finally withdrawn. *Journal*, p. 214.

45. *Motion of Concurrence in an Improper Report of Committee.*—11 May 1874. On motion of *Mr. Bunster*, that the House doth concur in report of Select Committee, appointed to enquire into the way in which British Columbia is affected by the present tariff; objection being taken that the motion asked for concurrence in a Report which ought not to have been received by the House, RULED:—"That the objection was well taken. The Report was clearly out of order, inasmuch as it recommended the enactment of a special tariff, which could only be originated with the sanction of the Crown, and in a Committee of the Whole." *Journal*, p. 216.

46. *Improper Tariff Amendment.*—15 May 1874. On third reading of Bill amending the Tariff, an amendment moved by *Mr. Ryan*, that the Bill be re-committed, with a view of substituting *ad valorem* for specific duties on tea and coffee, was objected to and OVER-RULED (on the ground that it might involve an increase of the public burthen). *Journal*, p. 243.

47. *Committee Cannot Embody Reports of Previous Committees.*—20 May 1874. *Mr. Orton*, having moved that the House doth concur in the Second Report of Select Committee upon the Agricultural Interests, *Hon. Mr. Mackenzie* objected that it is not competent for a Special Committee to embody in its report the opinions of a similar Committee appointed in a previous Session. RULED: "My attention has been directed to this subject, and I have come to the conclusion that the motion is decidedly out of order. It is laid down distinctly by *May*: 'A Committee re-appointed cannot report the evidence taken before the Committee in the previous Session.' This I find has been done in the Report now before the House. The Committee having carefully examined the result of the labors of a former Committee on the subject of Agriculture, find that much valuable information had been

“ obtained directly from the farmers and millers of the country,
 “ etc. The substance of which information, as obtained from a
 “ draft Report of a former Committee, the present Committee beg
 “ to embody in the Report which they now have the honor to
 “ submit;—consequently the Report, and the motion founded
 “ upon it, are out of order.” *Journal*, p. 282.

48. *Motion to Change Destination of Grant Recommended by Message.*—26 Feb. 1875. On consideration of Resolutions reported from Committee of Supply, *Mr. Masson* moved, in amendment to the vote for Mennonite Immigration, that a part thereof be assigned to inducing Canadians in the United States to settle in Manitoba. **OVER-RULED**, it not being competent for the Hon. Member to move to change the destination of the grant recommended by the Crown. *Journal*, p. 140.

49. *Irregular Motions, appearance of in Journal.*—5 March 1875.—A Member pressed that an amendment, offered by him, though **OVER-RULED** as irregular, should appear on the Journals, and precedents therefore were quoted. Suggested that a Committee consider the point, and prepare a Standing Order; but objected [by *Hon. Mr. Holton*], that a cast-iron rule would prove inconvenient in practice. *Mr. Speaker*, considering sense of House, in present case, to be for insertion of Motion in Journal, **ORDERED** accordingly. *Hansard*, pp. 501-3.

50. *Petition Cannot be Referred to Committee till Called.*—8 March 1875. On motion of concurrence in 1st Report of Select Stand. Com. on Pub. Accts., *Mr. Domville* moved to refer a certain petition to said Committee. Objection being taken to this motion, as one now on the notice paper and *undisposed of*, it was **OVER-RULED** until it was called. *Journal*, p. 177.

51. *Penalties for enforcing Statutes, not “Imposts.”*—20 March 1875. On second reading of *Mr. Cook's* Bill (Protection of Life on Wharves, &c.) *Mr. Speaker* **RULED**: “The old principle of regarding penalties for enforcing Statutes as an Impost upon the people is virtually obsolete, and the Bill is in order. *Hansard*, p. 807. See also No. 64.

52. *Petitions Refused—Exemptions from Duty*—22, 24, 27 March 1875.—Presentation of Petitions for the passing of Acts to

authorize Commissioner of Customs to exempt certain rolling stock from duty, **OVER-RULED**, as involving a public charge, and not being recommended by the Crown. *Journal*, pp. 260, 269, 287.—9 March 1874. A Resolution, declaring opinion of the House that the Welland Canal should be enlarged; similarly **OVER-RULED**. *Journal*, p. 191. See also *No. 6*.

53. *Motions Conflicting with Previous Decisions*.—11 March, 1875. In the resumed debate upon the motion for an Address to the Queen, upon the New Brunswick Schools question, two amendments (Messrs. *Baby* and *Costigan*) were **OVER-RULED**, on the ground that they conflicted with resolutions just affirmed by the House.—*Journal*, pp. 200, 203.

54. *Northern Railway Bill not a Public Bill*.—12 March 1875. *Hon. Mr. Mackenzie* having moved the introduction of a Bill to re-arrange the capital of the Northern Railway Co., to enable it to change its gauge, &c., objection was taken that some of the provisions of the Bill were of a private nature, and should be dealt with under the Rules. **RULED**: The Bill cannot be introduced as a Public Bill. Bill withdrawn.—*Journal*, p. 213.

55. *Voting of Members according to their Voices before Division*.—23 March 1875. On an abstract motion (in favor of Divorce Courts) a Division was had, being called for by five members. The *Premier* pointed out that two members, who had called for a Division against the *Speaker's* decision, "The Nays have it," had yet voted "Nay" on division; he proposed that their votes be therefore recorded "Aye." *Mr. Speaker* observed that, while here, as in England, the *voice* was more binding than the *vote* on Division, the Rules differed on the point of *calling* for a Division. By the English Rule on the *Speaker's* ruling "Noes have it," those differing from him called for a Division. Here, any five might call for Division, without necessarily opposing the *Speaker*. *Hansard*, p. 861.

56. *Amendments to Clauses of Bills in Committee*.—1 April, 1875. The *Committee of the Whole*, on Bill to amend the General Railway Acts, reported for instructions, whether a Member might move an addition to the 4th section, to provide that all supplies for Government Railways, for a greater amount than \$1,000, should be purchased only upon public tender and contract. It being objected—1st, it was not relevant to the Bill, and could not properly be

moved in the Committee; 2nd, it imposed a burthen, and should have been first originated by a resolution in a Committee of the Whole. RULED: "1. There is no doubt that it is perfectly legitimate to make, in Committee, any amendment to a clause, provided that it is relevant to the subject-matter of a Bill, or pursuant to instructions; but if any such amendment shall not be within the Title of the Bill, then the Committee must amend the Title accordingly. 2. The clause, if added to the Bill, will be actually restrictive of the expenditure of public money, and will not tend in any way to increase the public burthens. The amendment is in order." Committee resumed. *Journal*, p. 327.

57. *Abstract Motion Respecting Tariff Allowed*.—18 February, 1876. On adjourned debate, on motion of *Mr. Mills*, for appointment of a Committee upon the present financial depression, *Mr. DeCosmos* moved in amendment, that the early revision of the Tariff is very desirable; and that a revised discriminative Tariff would be productive of great benefit, &c. Objection being taken that the amendment involved the imposition of a burthen upon the people, RULED: That being an abstract proposition, and barren of results, it was in order. *Journal*, p. 96; *Hansard*, p. 124.

58. *Motion Affecting Privilege, Unimportant*.—28 February 1876. The Motion of *Mr. Masson* to concur in Report of Select Committee on reporting and printing of debates, was *not allowed* to be put without previous notice, not being considered sufficiently important to be treated as a matter of privilege; but on *March 2nd*, on which day it appeared on the notice paper, it was *allowed* to take precedence, when Notices of Motions were reached. *Journal*, pp. 87, 93; *Hansard*, p. 289.

59. *Second Amendment on Motion into Com. of Supply*.—29 February 1876. *Mr. Workman's* motion in favor of Protection was OVER-RULED as irregular, being in amendment of an amendment by *Mr. Irving*, to the motion that the Speaker leave the Chair for the House in the Committee of Supply. *Journal*, p. 89. See also No. 36.

60. *Bill, Examination of Engineers, Relates to Trade*.—8 March, 1876. On resuming debate, the motion for second reading of Bill providing for Examination and Licensing Engineers employed elsewhere than on steamboats was OVER-RULED, because: 1. The Bill

related to Trade, and should have originated in Com. of Whole. 2. It imposed penalties and exacted a fee, which could only be done with consent of Crown. *Journal*, p. 119; *Hansard*, p. 524.

61. *Precedence of Abstract Motions of Want of Confidence*.—10, 13 March, 1876. On adjournment of debate of Sir John A. Macdonald's Resolution against the 'Tariff policy of the Government, Mr. Speaker RULED: That though it was the custom to give precedence to want of confidence motions, he could see no rule for it. On the 13th, he justified this decision by quotations from English practice. *Hansard*, pp. 601-2.

62. *Mode of Entry on Journals of personal statements*.—16 March, 1876. On motion for reading extracts from Journals of 1866, affecting personal character of a present Member, discussion arose as to whether: 1. That Members' statements to the House on the subject, before retiring for the discussion, should, in the Journal, follow the reading of the papers. 2. His statement should be entered in full. DECIDED: In both cases—*Yes*. *Journal*, pp. 145 and 158; *Hansard*, pp. 688-9 and 695.

63. *Reception of Petition, having Schedules attached, Rejected*.—28 March, 1876. Reception rejected to a Petition against Judge Loranger, because Schedules or Appendices, containing details of the case, were attached.

Examination of Petitions by Speaker.—From discussion hereon and result, it would appear that the Speaker has functions, respecting reception of Petitions, similar to those of the Examiners of Petitions in British Parliament; *Hansard*, pp. 867-8; *Journal* p. 212.

64. *Bill need not originate in Com. of Whole, merely because containing penal clauses*.—29 March, 1876. Similar Ruling to No. 51; *Hansard*, p. 904.

65. *Amendment Irrelevant to Motion*.—7 April, 1876. Two Resolutions reported from Committee of Supply; 1, Grant for expenses of Pacific Railway; 2, Expenses of its Survey. Res. 1 was, with an amendment, adopted, Res. 2 being read, Mr. Plumb moved, in amendment, an addition, recommending the construction of the Railway as speedily as practicable. Objected to, and OVER- RULED, as irrelevant to the Resolution under consideration. Mr.

Plumb then moved an amendment, recommending *the surveys* being proceeded with, which motion was put and lost on division. *Journal*, p. 286; *Hansard*, p. 1137.

66. *Petitions excluded, involving expenditure.*—15 February, 1877. Reception REJECTED to Petition of ex-members of Manitoba Provisional Battalion, alleging grievances, and asking for six months' pay, on the ground of public expenditure being therein involved. *Hansard*, p. 42.

67. *Reading Reports of Sub-Committees objectionable.*—15 Feb. 1877. *Mr. Speaker* pointed out that the Report of Committee should embody all matter necessary to be read in the House. *Hansard*, p. 42.

68. *Petition, affecting Fiscal Policy, received.*—15 and 16 Feb. 1877. *Mr. Mackay* presented petition from coal owners and others, for duty on imported, or bounty on exported coal. At first RULED inadmissible. but, upon consideration, RECEIVED, *Mr. Speaker* saying:—"The objection to the asking of bounties will, I think, only apply to cases where an individual or individuals personally interested, ask for such bounty as will be profitable to themselves. Where the petition is of a general character, and is signed by persons other than those immediately interested, and, in fact, asks for a modification or change of the financial or fiscal policy of the Dominion, on the ground that such change will be beneficial to the country at large, then such a Petition stands precisely in the same position as one asking for an imposition of taxes for general purposes. On examination of this Petition, I may state that I see no reason to conclude that it is signed exclusively by persons immediately and directly interested, and I am therefore of opinion that it can be properly received." *Hansard*, pp. 42, 51, 77; *Journal*, p. 37. See also No. 81.

69. *Abstract motion for granting land to veteran Militia-men, discussed.*—15 Feb. 1877. Resolution of *Dr. Brouse* in favor of Veterans of 1837-38 was discussed, *Mr. Speaker* observing that, though not strictly in order, latitude was, in such a case, allowable. Bill to give it effect must, of course, emanate from Government. Motion, after discussion, was withdrawn. *Hansard*, p. 54.

70. *Petitions addressed to Crown, House obtaining cognizance of.*—15 Feb. 1877. On appointment of Committee on Petition against

Judge *Loranger*, motion was made to refer to Committee other petitions on same subject, which, however, proved to be addressed to the Crown. It was pointed out that the House could take no cognizance of such petitions, unless they were first moved for, and sent down in Return to Address. *Hansard*, pp. 75, 76.

Administration of Justice.—In the above discussion, it was shown that the special investigation then instructed in no way trenched upon the general Administration of Justice, which is vested in the Provincial Legislatures.

71. *Petitions of Aliens not resident in Canada excluded.*—19 Feb. 1877. On Petitions from Boards of Trade, of Detroit and five other United States cities, against stoppage of traffic on canals during Sundays, RULED: "That these Petitions could not be received, on the ground that Aliens, not resident in this country, had no right to Petition this Parliament, and that this House could not receive any Petitions from such persons." *Journal*, p. 41; *Hansard*, pp. 93-4.

72. *Printing Committee, Powers of.*—19 Feb. 1877. On motion of *Mr. Orton*, for printing of evidence before Agricultural Committee of last Session, discussion ensued as to making the Order, resulting in REFERENCE of motion to Printing Committee as the regular course.

Papers of last Session are not under cognizance of present Session.—This point was made during the above discussion. *Hansard*, pp. 115 and 118.

73. *Replying to newspaper statements discountenanced.*—20 Feb. 1877. *Mr. Mackay* rising to Privilege, and proceeding to reply to certain newspaper misrepresentations, *Mr. Speaker* OBSERVED: That if the member had a charge to make against a newspaper proprietor he could do so, but that a reply in this mode was out of order. *Hansard*, p. 123.

74. *Petitions excluded, Breach of Rule 85.*—26 Feb. 1877. On this and other occasions, neglect of Rule requiring signatures of at least three Petitioners on sheet containing prayer, caused rejection of Petitions. *Hansard*, p. 269.

75. *Two Bills with same Title introduced.*—26 Feb. 1877. The right of *Mr. Palmer* to introduce his Insolvent Acts Repeal Bill

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was questioned, a Bill having a similar title being already before the House, but was, after discussion, CONCEDED. *Hansard*, p. 269-271.

76. *Reading speeches checked.*—26 Feb. 1877. After *Mr. Barthe's* speech (in English) on second reading of his Insolvent Acts Repeal Bill, *Mr. Speaker*, pointing out that a portion of the speech had been read, observed that his duty and intention was to prevent such a practice. *Hansard*, p. 283. On 2 March 1877, in tariff debate, *Mr. Bunster*, in allusion to above, objecting to *Mr. Dymond* reading from pamphlets and papers, *Mr. Speaker* RULED that extracts, and very copious extracts (of *this nature*) might be read. *Hansard*, p. 413.

77. *Insolvent Acts not Acts affecting Trade.*—26 Feb. 1877. On Bill mentioned in No. 76. *Mr. Speaker Anglin* confirmed the decisions of his predecessor, that such Bills do not come under Rule 41, requiring introduction in Committee of Whole. *Hansard*, p. 288. See also Nos. 80 and 84.

78. *Questions not to contain assertions or debateable matter.*—28 Feb. 1877. *Mr. Speaker* laid down the rule of the Imperial Parliament, to be ENFORCED here,—that no Question should contain any matter that might possibly be the subject of argument, and no assertion, either directly or indirectly. *Hansard*, p. 339.

On 1 March 1877, on *Mr. Cheval's* question respecting withdrawal of 20c. pieces, "a real nuisance to the public," *Mr. Speaker* reminded him that this was a debateable assertion. *Hansard*, p. 368.

On 5 March 1877, on *Mr. Blanchet's* question as to intention of constructing a Branch Railway from St. Charles to St. Joseph de Levis, "to avoid the detour by the Chaudiere," *Mr. Speaker* characterized this clause debateable; but his decision hereon was questioned. *Hansard*, p. 437.

79. *Power of Speaker to issue Election Writs during Session.*—1 March 1877. On motion of *Sir John A. Macdonald*, that a Writ do issue for new election in Charlevoix, discussion ensued as to the *Speaker's* duty to issue Writs without order of House, on seats being voided during session. *Mr. Speaker* ORDERED issue of Writ *proprio motu*. *Hansard*, p. 366.—On 5 March 1877, *Mr. Speaker*, in a lengthy ruling, defined the law and practice hereon.—*Hansard*, p. 436; and on a subsequent occasion, 17 April 1877, he confirmed the precedent. *Hansard*, p. 1541.

80. *Bills respecting Banking and Interest, not subject to Rule 41—1 March 1877.* On second reading of *Mr. Jones' Bill*, Protest of Inland Bills, *Mr Mackay* observing that it related to Trade, *Mr. Speaker* quoted *May*, that the Rule requiring origination in Com. of Whole only applied to Bills affecting any particular trade, and did not include general measures respecting Banking, Insurance, and Interest; and he RULED the Bill in order. *Hansard*, p. 370.

NOTE.—This accords with decisions of *Mr. Speaker Anglin's* predecessors. See also Nos. 77 and 84.

81. *Select Committees, Composition of.—Petitions affecting fiscal policy, Reporting upon—1, 2, 7 March, 1877.* On *Mr. Mackay's* motion to refer Petition respecting Coal Trade (see No. 68) to a Select Com. two important points of procedure were discussed at length. 1. Under Rule 78, the exclusion of members from appointment to the Committee, who had declared themselves adverse to the principle to be discussed, the expediency of Committee comprising members of both sides of opinion was discussed and admitted; and on a resumed debate the *Speaker* ruled that only members should be excluded who spoke against the matter being referred to a Committee at all. 2. The power of the Committee to report on the prayer of the petition (for a duty or bounty), as well as on the allegation of facts. This the *Speaker* affirmed, together with the power of the Com. to offer an abstract opinion as to the expediency of the duty. *Hansard*, pp. 379, 392 to 399, 541.

82. *Authenticity of Letters read—6 March, 1877.* In Tariff Debate, *Mr. Wood* having read a letter, but, withholding the writer's name when called for, Members suggested that the letter was 'bogus.' *Mr. Speaker* RULED: That the gentleman who had the floor was not bound to submit to interrogation, or to give the name; that Hon. Members were entirely out of order in characterizing the letter as a bogus one; But that Hon. Members could attach what importance they pleased to it. *Hansard*, p. 512.

83. *Using His Excellency's name in Debate.—7 March, 1877.* In debate on motion for Special Tariff for British Columbia, *Mr. Bunster* quoted a promise, or partial promise made by His Excellency in a speech). *Mr. Speaker* OBSERVED that His Excellency could make no statement on public affairs, except under advice of Ministers; that it was not in order to state what His Excellency had said, or to use His Excellency's name for the purpose of influencing the opinion of the House. *Hansard*, p. 533.

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84. *Bills respecting Weights and Measures not subject to Rule 41*—12 March, 1877. On first reading of *Mr. Jones* Weights and Measures Act Repeal Bill, objection and discussion arose as in No. 77 and 80, resulting similarly, in Bill proceeding without originating in Com. of Whole. *Hansard*, p. 618.

85. *Motion for Return [speech on]*—12 March, 1877. *Mr. Speaker* informed *Mr. Domville* that in moving for papers, his making the contents of other papers laid on the table the subject matter of his remarks, was inadvisable and out of order. *Hansard*, p. 635.

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86. *Divorce Bills, Practice respecting*—16, 19 & 21 March, 1877. —The practice of referring these Bills to Select Com. after first reading, was, upon deliberation, confirmed. *Hansard*, pp. 797 & 811-12. Motion for "second reading to-morrow" instead of "placing on order paper for 2nd reading to-morrow," though objected to, was agreed to (on Division). *Hansard*, p. 876. On 23rd March, however, the above practice was reversed, a Divorce Bill being ordered for a second reading, *instead of* being referred to a Select Com. *Hansard*, p. 937

87. *Newspaper Extracts*.—23 March 1877. HELD (in accordance with *May*) that extract from newspapers or other documents, relating to the debates, could not be read by Members. *Hansard*, p. 965.

88. *Bills, 3rd reading, Amendments*.—4 April, 1877. Maintained that at this stage, Bills may not be re-committed [*Rule 47*]. *Hansard*, p. 1152.

89. *Resolutions [Ways and Means] reading en bloc*—5 & 26 April 1877. Upon the *Finance Minister* moving second reading, Customs and Excise Acts Amendments Bill, *Mr. Masson* objected to an irregularity, in the omission of the 2nd reading of the *Resolutions [Ways and Means Com.]* when the general question might have been discussed. On a second discussion, *Mr. Speaker* explained that the Canadian custom had hitherto been to read the *Resolutions separately*, [general discussions being had on the second reading of the first resolution.] The English and more correct system, as laid down by *May*, was: first reading, *pro forma*, of the *Resolutions, en bloc*; second reading, *en bloc*, at which stage the *general* discussions took place; third reading of *Resolutions singly*, when discussion was confined to

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subject-matter of each Resolution. The latter system was practically accepted by the House, by the following entry, which was made in the Journals *by agreement* :

"That the 2nd reading of the said Resolutions does not appear to have been put to the House, but only the 2nd reading of the "first Resolution. It was resolved that the said informality should not in future be quoted as a precedent." *Hansard*, pp. 1171-74 & 1843.

90. *Reading Extra-Parliamentary Correspondence.*—5 April 1877. *Mr. Speaker* took strong exception (although he stated he did not *rule* thereon) to the reading in the House, by the Minister of the Interior, of a personal correspondence between said Minister and *Sir A. T. Galt*. *Mr. Holton* also protested; and the letters were not read. The special point of order was that the discussion to which the letters referred was then closed, and the reading of them was not pertinent to subject before the House; but the *Speaker's* point was that a gentleman not a Member, should not have his views ventilated in the House by having his letters read there. *Hansard*, pp. 1190-92.

91. *Private motion for "refund," excluded.*—12 April 1877. Motion of *Mr. Cheval*, to re-commit Bill, to add clause for "refund to shipowners, ruled out of order, as affecting *expenditure*, which requires previous recommendation by Governor General. *Hansard*, p. 1396.

92. *When debating irregular, right of making a reply.*—14 April 1877. *Mr. Young*, Chairman of Sel. Com. on Pub. Accts., having moved adoption of 3rd Report, was afterwards stopped in taking part in debate thereon; but *Mr. Speaker*, subsequently finding that the member had been exercising his right of *reply*, desired him to proceed. *Hansard*, pp. 1493 & 1495.

93. *Exemption from subpoena.*—17 April 1877. The House, on Division, *negatived* a motion for leave of absence to the Minister of Finance, to enable him to obey a subpoena. (*Queen vs. Wilkinson*) *Hansard*, p. 1540.

94. *Explaining misrepresentations.*—17 April 1877. In a question of accuracy between *Mr. Macdonald* and *Mr. Mackay*, *Mr. Speaker* ruled: When an Hon. gentleman is misunderstood by anybody

following him; or if anything is misrepresented, he has a right to explain and state: "I did not say so;" or "I meant to say so and so;" or "what I stated was this;" but he cannot at that time *reply*. *Hansard*, p. 1551.

95. *Standing Orders, Suspension of*—24 & 26 April 1877. Upon a motion to place a Divorce Bill on the Orders of the Day, and subsequent motion to suspend the Standing Orders for the purpose (session being at its close), considerable discussion ensued respecting practice and precedent, result being that the motion was *negotiated*, on Division. *Hansard*, pp. 1757 & 1837-40.

96. *Senate Amendments, Discussion*.—27 April 1877. *Mr. Speaker* sustained point of order raised by Sir John A. Macdonald: That, a Bill having passed both Houses, its *general* merits cannot thereafter be questioned, and that discussion on amendments, by the Senate, must be confined to subject of such amendments. *Hansard*, pp. 1879-80.

97. *Relevancy of Paper Read*.—13 Feb. 1878. A discussion (not important) upon the relevancy of a paper read, to the question under consideration. *Hansard*, pp. 152-3.

98. *Unparliamentary Language*.—13 Feb. 1878. *Mr. Speaker's* *censures*. *Hansard*, pp. 195, 197.

99. *Impugning Statements*.—15 Feb. 1878. *RULED*: A charge being formally denied in the House, IN ORDER to repeat that such charge had been *made*, but not that it was *true*. A Member being then asked as to his *belief* of a certain statement, averred that he believed it; was censured; and then explained that he believed it, but not in a "parliamentary sense." *Hansard*, p. 337.

100. *Petition from Foreigners Excluded*.—18 Oct. 1878. *Hansard*, p. 348.

101. *Amendment Motion*.—25 Feb. 1878. A motion for Return may be amended by a motion which, though *similar*, differs in specifying *form* of Return. *Hansard*, p. 521.

102. *Reference of Return to Committee—Notice Necessary*.—26 Feb. 1878. *Mr. Dymond*, moving to refer Return respecting pay-

ments for printing to the Standing Committee on Public Accounts, Opposition Members objected, and *Mr. Speaker* maintained that previous notice of motion was necessary. *Hansard*, pp. 529-31.

103. *Expression, Parliamentary*.—28 Feb. 1878. *Mr. Speaker* called *Mr. Tupper* to order, for alluding to a "packed majority of Committee," the Committee being "appointed" or "selected" by the House. *Hansard*, p. 630.

104. *Personal Explanations*.—7 March 1878. A member impugned, may explain; but no other Member has a right to interpose. *Hansard*, p. 820.

105. *Personal Explanation*.—8 March 1878. *Mr. Mitchell*, having risen to explain respecting an article in the *Globe*, which affected him, *Mr. Speaker* informed him that such explanation was out of place, as the article did not relate to anything that *Mr. Mitchell* had said, or that was said to have been said or done in the House. *Hansard*, p. 864.

106. *Want of Confidence Motion; what Constitutes it; its Precedence in Debate*.—8 and 11 March 1878. A long discussion, and on March 11 a RULING by *Mr. Speaker*, too elaborate to be here condensed, the conclusion being, "unless both sides of the House consent, or until after a notice of motion to that effect should be made and carried, the rules of this House, with regard to the order of transacting the business of the House, must be adhered to." *Hansard*, pp. 937-950.

107. *A Petition from Aliens, received*.—11 March 1878. Petition "from certain American citizens interested in the Connecticut Mutual Insurance Company" was received, although contrary to the rule established in many previous rulings. *Mr. Killam* observed that many mutual companies in the United States doing business in this country were practically Canadian Companies, and petitions sent by directors thereof were entitled to be considered. *Hansard*, p. 950.

108. *Personal references checked*.—11 March 1878. *Messrs. Dymond and Bowell*. *Hansard*, p. 978.

109. *Petition, no prayer*.—15 March 1878. Petition from Temiscouata Township rejected. Had it contained a prayer for

an appropriation, it would have been out of order [see previous rulings]; as it merely expressed a *hope* for a money grant, it contained no prayer at all. *Hansard*, p. 1163.

110. *Government answers to questions*.—20 March 1878. *Mr. Kirkpatrick*, rising to call attention to the mode in which Questions put by Members were answered, was checked by *Mr. Speaker*, his proper course being to bring the matter before the House by regular motion. He concluded his remarks upon a motion of adjournment by *Mr. Mitchell*. *Hansard*, p. 1269.

111. *Allusions to past debates checked*.—20 March 1878. *Mr. Goudge*. *Hansard*, p. 1652.
Speaking after motion is negatived.—12 April 1878.

112. *Privilege and the Press*.—21 March 1878. A discussion upon statements made in the *Globe*, during which *Mr. Speaker* expressed his strong opinion that Members who were connected with the Press should not, as Members, be held responsible for articles published in papers with which they were connected. *Hansard*, p. 1315.

113. *Trade Bill, Bottles, Rejected*.—3 April 1878. *Mr. Macdonald* having moved second reading "Drinks, Bottles, Bill," which secured ownership in bottles stamped with a trade mark, and objection having been taken that the Bill, affecting Trade, should have been first considered in Committee of Whole (Rule 41), *Mr. Speaker* SUSTAINED said objection. *Hansard*, p. 1669.

114. *Precedence in Speaking*.—10 April 1878. On a question of the floor, between *Messrs. Béchard* and *Mackay*, the former of whom, having a notice of amendment (on going into Committee of Supply) upon the paper, had obtained the *Speaker's* eye; *Mr. Mackay* (citing *May*) objected, that such notice gave no claim to precedence, *per se*. This was admitted; but, it was maintained that such notice naturally led the *Speaker* to look to the mover to take the floor, rather than to another Member. *Hansard*, pp. 1815 and 1842.

115. *Privilege and the Press*.—11 April 1878. *Mr. Costigan* having risen to a question of privilege upon certain attacks made upon him in newspapers, a long discussion ensued upon the propriety of Members bringing Press strictures on their conduct before

the House. *Mr. Speaker*, in closing it, observed:—"As he understood it, a question of privilege, according to the modern practice, at all events, must be something attacking a Member of the House, attributing to him corrupt and improper motives, because he spoke or voted in a certain way; assaulting a Member of Parliament going to, or coming from, the House, on account of his behaviour in Parliament, because it was held: That no Member of this House should be accountable in any way, except to the House; therefore, attacking a member outside the House was a breach of the privileges of Parliament." *Hansard*, pp. 1867-72.

116. *Mr. Speaker* sustained an objection taken to a Member, who has moved or seconded a motion to adjourn debate, and whose motion has been negatived, speaking again to the main question. *Hansard*, p. 1976.

117. *Imputation Checked*.—17 April 1878. *Mr. Speaker* sustained the objection of *Mr. Cartwright*, to a remark of *Mr. McCarthy*, that the Premier had "withheld information, and suggested a falsehood." *Hansard*, p. 2068.

118. *Conduct in Committee*—29 April 1878. *Mr. Plumb* having said that the Member for North York had, in Committee, endeavored to stifle discussion, was called to order. *Sir John A. Macdonald* then observed that the effect of examination in Committee might be commented upon; and *Mr. Blake*, that allusion to actions of members of the Committee might not. *Hansard* pp. 2267-68.

SPEAKER.—THE HON. J. G. BLANCHET.

119. *Irregular Procedure*. 5 March 1879 *Mr. McCarthy* having moved for leave to introduce a Bill to empower Clerk of Court to return *John Stewart* \$1,000, deposit in an election case, *Mr. Speaker* ruled that such Bill should have been introduced by petition. *Hansard*, p. 140.

120. *Vote, Mover of Previous Question*. 14 March 1879. *Mr. Ouimet*, having moved the previous question, voted with the yeas, to which *Mr. Anglin* took objection, holding that, according to the British practice, the mover of the previous question should vote in the negative. *Mr. Speaker* ruled that, while such practice prevails in the British Parl., in the Parl. of Canada, both before

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and since Confederation, the previous question had been viewed differently, and, according to his opinion, the mover and seconder were free to vote as they liked. *Hansard*, p. 408.

121. *Policy of Local Governments.*—19 March 1879. The policy of Local Governments not to be introduced into this House. *Hansard*, p. 553.

122. *Precedence of Tariff Debate by Agreement.* 24 March 1879. *Mr. Speaker* ruled that he had nothing to do with an agreement to give precedence to a resolution. Objection being taken he must rule that the motion wait for its turn. *Hansard*, p. 650.

123. *Right of Reply.* 24 March 1879. A reply is allowed to a Member who has moved a substantive motion, and not to an hon. Member moving an Order of the Day or an amendment. *Hansard*, p. 661.

124. *Reference to Evidence before Sitting Committee Irregular.* 31 March 1879 *Mr. Speaker* decided that it was not in order to refer to evidence taken in an investigation that had not been finished or reported to the House. *Hansard*, p. 839.

125. *Privilege, Personal Explanation.* A Member has a right to explain why he was not in the House when a division was taken. *Hansard*, p. 1251.

126. *Bill Referred to Committee of the Whole unless mover requests reference to a Select Committee.*—On second reading of *Mr. McCarthy's* Bill for the repeal of the Marine Telegraph Act, *Mr. Mackenzie* objected to the Bill being referred to a Committee of the Whole.

Mr. Speaker ruled that a Public Bill should be considered in Committee of the Whole, unless the mover asked the House to refer it to a Select Committee for some particular purpose. *Hansard*, p. 1285.

On third reading *Mr. Holton* opposed the Order for the House to go into Committee of the Whole, and in reply to a point of order raised by *Mr. McCarthy* held that it would be in order for him to move that this Order be discharged, and that the Bill be referred to the Railway Committee.

Mr. Speaker said orders were very often discharged in this way in Canada as well as in the English House of Commons. *May* on this point said :

"When it has not been determined, until after the second reading, to commit a Bill to a Select Committee, the Order, or Order of the Day, as the case may be, for the Committee of the whole House, is read and discharged, and the Bill is committed to a Select Committee; or, when the question is proposed for the House to resolve itself into Committee, or for the Speaker leaving the chair, an amendment may be made to commit the Bill to a Select Committee." *Hansard*, p. 1572.

127. *Receiving Memorials from others than Canadians.* A Memorial from the Reciprocity and Free-Trade Association of England was laid on the table at the suggestion of *Mr. Speaker*. *Hansard*, p. 1412.

128. *Amendment, absolute, to Bill for conditional repeal of Insolvent Laws.* 29 April 1879. An amendment by *Mr. Béchard* to a motion for the second reading of *Mr. Colby's* Bill for the conditional repeal of the Insolvent Act, proposing the unconditional repeal of the said Act, was ruled in order. *Hansard*, p. 1610.

129. *Objection taken too late.* 29 April 1879. In the debate on the Insolvent Acts Repeal Bill, *Mr. Cameron* (North Victoria) raised the point of order that the Bill was not printed in French. *Mr. Speaker* said the point was raised too late, *Mr. Cameron* having already spoken on the motion. *Hansard*, p. 1620.

130. *Motion allowed to stand.* 5 May 1879. The Premier having requested *Mr. Mousseau* to allow his notice of motion declaring course of Privy Council in referring Letellier matter to Her Majesty's advisers in England, subversive of principles of responsible government, *Mr. Speaker* said "stand." Objection was raised by *Mr. Holton* but over-ruled. *Hansard*, p. 1762.

131. *Unparliamentary Language.—Latitude in personalities permitted.* 10 May 1879. The point of order being raised in consequence of the personal turn taken in the debate on the Pacific Railway resolutions, between Messrs. *White* and *Huntington*, *Mr. Speaker* said :

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"The main motion that the House do resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, has disappeared altogether, and the question now is the adjournment of the House. There was ample latitude allowed the hon. member for Cardwell (Mr. White) to make the charge against the hon. member for Shefford (Mr. Huntington), and then, to allow the hon. member for Shefford to make a reply, the motion was made to adjourn the House. It is true that these personal recriminations are far from being right, but, as the matter has been commenced, and the charge made, it is as well to allow the matter to go on." *Hansard*, p. 1941.

132. *Procedure.* 12 May 1879. A stranger having violated the dignity of the House, *Mr. Mackenzie* asked the *Premier* to take action in the matter. *Mr. Speaker* ruled that the proper course of procedure was as follows:—The motion is made, then the letter complained of is read by the Clerk, and then a motion is made to bring the person accused to the bar of the House. *Hansard*, p. 1980.

133. *Objection to a motion to be taken when the question is put.* 13 May 1879. *Mr. Costigan* rose in his place and said he desired to call the attention of the House to a certain matter (the charges against Vice-Chancellor Blake) when he was interrupted by *Mr. Holton*, who asked if he was going to conclude with a motion. *Mr. Costigan*, replying in the affirmative, *Mr. Holton* said he found no notice of a motion that could be brought up at this stage of the proceedings. *Sir John Macdonald* asked for the ruling of the *Speaker*. *Mr. Speaker* said:

"The practice is this: Before the Orders of the Day are called, very often some hon. member rises in his place, and expresses himself on some question, or calls the attention of the House to some matter. This is allowed by the practice of the House. Any hon. member may object, and put the question whether the hon. member addressing the House intends to finish with a motion. That question had been put to the hon. member for Victoria, N.B., (*Mr. Costigan*), and he stated in reply that he would conclude with a motion. I have the motion in my hands. I cannot say whether it has a notice or not, but the proper time to call the attention of the Chair to the question whether a notice of it has been given or not is before putting the question to the House. *Hansard*, p. 1984.

134. *Concurrence.* 13 May 1879. Objection being raised by *Mr. Holton* against concurrence on same day in resolutions reported from Committee of Ways and Means, *Mr. Speaker* ruled that concurrence be taken on the following day. *Hansard*, p. 2003.

PART VII.

Parliamentary Summary, 1879.

The Session of 1879 was marked by legislation of great importance, principal among which was the Tariff Bill and the Bill for the amendment of the Pacific Railway Act. The following is a brief *résumé* of the principal business of the session :—

Senate, February 13th. This being the first day of the meeting of the First Session of the Fourth Parliament, the Clerk and other officers of the House of Commons administered the oath to the members elect, after which they were summoned to the Senate Chamber, where the Hon. Chief Justice Ritchie, Deputy-Governor, informed them that the causes of summoning Parliament would not be announced until they had chosen a Speaker, according to law. The members being returned, the Hon. Joseph Goderic Blanchet was chosen Speaker and the House adjourned.

Senate, February 14th. The session was formally opened by His Excellency's Speech from the Throne.—His Excellency expressed his gratification at having been selected by Her Majesty for the high and important office he now fills, and acknowledged with profound gratitude the generous and kind reception that had been accorded himself and Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise. The success of the Canadian Exhibit at the Paris Exhibition, the payment of the Fishery Award, the Order prohibiting the importation of American cattle and the negotiations for the development of trade with France and Spain were each touched upon. It was announced as the intention of the Government to press for the most vigorous prosecution of the Canada Pacific Railroad, and to meet the reasonable views of British Columbia. His Excellency thought it expedient that a measure for the purpose of making preparation for the taking of the decennial census in 1881 should be passed, and intimated that Bills for the following purposes would be submitted during the session :—For the Amendment and Consolidation of the Acts relating to Stamps; to Amend the Act relating to Weights and Measures; re-arrangement of some of the Departments of the Government relating to the survey and management of the Dominion Lands; to the Mounted Police; to the Post Office Department; Amendment, in some particulars, of the Laws relating to Indians,

and for vesting in Her Majesty, for the use of the Dominion, of certain lands in the Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Changes in the Tariff for the purpose of increasing the revenue and at the same time developing and encouraging the various industries of Canada were suggested. A suggestion was also made with reference to a system of Government Life Insurance.

Senate, February 17th. Hon. Mr. Cornwall moved, and Hon. Mr. Delbouchéville seconded, the Address in reply to the Speech from the Throne.

Commons, February 17th. A brief discussion took place on the official reporting of the debates. Mr. Brecken moved the Address in reply to the Speech from the Throne, seconded by Mr. Tassé. The Address was agreed to without division.

Senate, February 18th. The debate on the Address was concluded, and it was carried. An Address of condolence to the Queen on the death of the Princess Alice was adopted.

Commons, February 18th. Mr. Coursol moved for a statement of appointments to the Montreal Customs House. Mr. Ross moved for copies of tenders for official reporting. Mr. Bunster moved for papers in connection with removal of steel rails from Vancouver Island to Fraser River. Mr. Cameron (South Huron) moved for a return of dismissals and superannuations and appointments to the Public Service since 10th Oct. 1878. Mr. Anglin moved for correspondence between the Clerk and late Speaker of the House respecting appointments to vacancies.

Commons, February, 19th. Mr. Colby introduced a Bill relating to Bankruptcy. A discussion took place on the application of Mr. Mousseau to waive the rules of the House in order to allow Mr. Perrault, the newly-elected Member for Charlevoix, to take his seat before the return had been received, the Returning Officer having announced the proclamation of his return by telegraph. The request was not granted.

Commons, February 20th. Mr. Bourassa introduced a Bill to Amend the Insolvency Laws. Mr. Mousseau moved for copies of the petition for dismissal of Lieut.-Governor of Quebec and all correspondence.

Commons, February 21st. An Address of condolence to the Queen on the death of Her Royal Highness the Princess Alice was passed. Mr. McCarthy introduced a Bill to make better provision for the trial of controverted elections.

Senate, February 25th. Debates took place on the action of the Government, in restricting the importation of American cattle, and

on an enquiry as to whether the attention of the Government had been directed to the subject of the prevalence of small pox in Canada.

Commons, February 27th. Mr. Christie moved a resolution respecting the observance of the Lord's Day.

Commons, February 28th. Sir John Macdonald introduced a Bill to amend and consolidate the Acts relating to the Mounted Police Force. The arrangement made by the Government for the official reporting of the debates was agreed to on division.

Senate, March 3rd. A debate occurred on a motion for papers relating to the appointment of the Warden of the Penitentiary in British Columbia.

Commons, March 3rd. A discussion took place on Mr. Robertson's (Hamilton) motion for a Return of reports, etc., in reference to the seizure of the steam tug *Sarah E. Bryant*, of Buffalo, N. Y., by Canadian Customs authorities for an alleged breach of the Coasting and Revenue Laws. Sir John Macdonald introduced a Bill to amend the Dominion Lands Act.

Senate, March 5th. A Bill was introduced to amend the Penitentiary Act.

Senate, March 6th. A Bill was introduced respecting the second Census.

Commons, March 6th. A long discussion took place on the dismissal of Capt. Purdy from the Government steamer *Newfield*. The debate on Mr. McCarthy's Bill to amend the Controverted Elections Act was continued.

Senate, March 7th. A debate took place on a motion for a Return respecting the Georgian Bay Branch Railroad.

Commons, March 7th. A Select Committee was appointed to enquire into the questions of Insolvency and Bankruptcy, etc.

Senate, March 10th. A debate occurred on the proposed distribution of the Fisheries Award. Also on an enquiry regarding the Montreal Harbour Commission.

Commons, March 10th. Hon. Mr. Langevin introduced a Bill to amend the Post Office Act. Hon. Mr. Pope (Compton) introduced a Bill to provide against contagious diseases in cattle. A discussion took place on the claims of P.E.I. to a portion of the Halifax Fisheries Award.

Commons, March 11th. The Estimates were brought down and referred to Committee of Supply. Mr. Mousseau moved, seconded by Mr. Dalton McCarthy, a vote of censure on M. Letellier de St. Just, Lieut.-Governor of Quebec, for wrongfully dismissing his Gov-

enment, the debate upon which occupied three days, closing on the morning of the 14th March shortly before five o'clock, the motion being carried on division. Yeas, 136; Nays, 51.

Senate, March 12th. A debate took place on the Campbell Divorce Petition.

Commons, March 14th. The House went into Committee of Ways and Means, and Hon. Mr. Tilley delivered his Budget Speech announcing the Tariff changes.

Senate, March 17th. A debate occurred on the second reading of the Census and Statistics Bill.

Senate, March 18th. The North-West Mounted Police Bill was discussed in Committee.

Commons, March 18th. Hon. Mr. Pope (Compton) introduced a second Bill to provide against contagious diseases affecting animals. The Tariff debate was continued.

Senate, March 19th. After General Business the consideration of the Census and Statistics Bill was continued, being again resumed on the 20th.

Commons, March 19th. A debate commenced on Hon. Mr. Huntington's motion for papers, etc., relating to the dismissal of Regis Cardinal from the Inland Revenue Department.

Commons, March 20th. Debate on dismissal of Regis Cardinal closed, and motion agreed to.

Senate, March 21st. The Campbell Divorce Case was again before the House. A brief discussion occurred on a motion for a Committee to consider the question of Immigration and Colonization.

Commons, March 21st. Hon. Mr. Tupper introduced a Bill to amend the Canadian Pacific Railway Act, 1874. The Tariff debate was resumed.

Senate, March 26th. A debate took place on the second reading of the Banking Laws Amendment Bill. The debate on Immigration and Colonization was continued, being concluded on the 27th.

Commons, March 26th. The Tariff debate again resumed.

Commons, March 27th. Hon. Mr. Tupper introduced a Bill to effect a change in the offices of Receiver-General and Minister of Public Works.

Senate, March 28th. A motion was passed appointing a Select Committee to enquire into all matters relating to the Canadian Pacific Railway west of Lake Superior. The Campbell Divorce Case was again before the House.

Senate, March 31st. A long debate occurred on a notice calling attention to the increasing Public Expenditure of the Dominion.

Commons, March 31st. Adjourned debate on Controverted Elections Act Amendment Bill resumed.

Senate, April 1st. A debate took place on the question of International Trade.

Commons, April 1st. Tariff debate continued.

Senate, April 2nd. A brief discussion occurred on the Bill to make the 1st of July a public holiday. The debate on the Public Expenditure of the Dominion was continued.

Commons, April 2nd. A debate took place on the Return brought down relating to the River Trent Canal Works; also on a motion for papers with reference to Murray & Co's contract on the Intercolonial Railway, and on Mr. Casey's Election Act Amendment Bill, the latter ending with the six months' hoist.

Senate, April 3rd. The Public Expenditure debate was continued, being again resumed on the 4th.

Commons, April 3rd. Sir John Macdonald announced the decision of His Excellency to refer the Letellier matter to the Home Government. The Tariff debate was resumed.

Senate, April 7th. An enquiry was made respecting the Mail Service to South America. The debate on the Public Expenditure of the Dominion was concluded.

Senate, April 8th. A debate took place on the Bill respecting Building Societies in Ontario.

Commons, April 8th. Mr. DeCosmos moved for leave to introduce a Bill to provide for the peaceful separation of British Columbia from the Dominion, but, having no seconder, the motion was withdrawn. Mr. Costigan called the attention of the Minister of Justice to a certain complaint made through the public journals against Vice-Chancellor Blake. The Tariff debate was resumed.

Commons, April 15th. The Census and Statistics Bill was read a second time after a short debate.

Commons, April 16th. A debate took place on Mr. DeCosmos' motion for a Select Committee to enquire into the question of Chinese labor in British Columbia.

Senate, April 17th. A debate took place on a motion for a Return of Reports, etc., concerning winter communication with Prince Edward Island.

Commons, April 17th. Debate on second reading of Tariff resolutions.

Senate, April 18th. A long debate occurred on a motion to authorize the payment of a witness in the Campbell Divorce Case.

Senate, April 21st. A debate took place on a motion declaring it inexpedient to continue the construction of the Georgian Bay Branch at present. A Bill was introduced for the amendment of the Post Office Act.

Commons, April 21st. Debate on Mr. Keeler's Bill to repeal the Supreme and Exchequer Courts Act.

Senate, April 22nd. The debate on the Georgian Bay Branch was continued.

Commons, April 22nd. Debate on Tariff resolution resumed.

Senate, April 23rd. Debates took place on the Receiver-General's and Public Works Offices Bill and the Sovereign Fire Insurance Bill.

Senate, April 24th. The debate on the Georgian Bay Branch was concluded, the motion being withdrawn.

Commons, April 24th. First reading of Hon. Mr. Tilley's Bill to alter the duties of Customs and Excise.

Senate, April 25th. The Campbell Divorce Bill, granting relief to Eliza Maria Campbell, was read a third time and passed. A debate took place on the Contagious Diseases in Animals Bill.

Senate, April 28th. A debate occurred on the publication of the Senate Debates; also, on the Public Lands and several Private Bills.

Commons, April 28th. Debate on Mr. Wallace's National Currency resolution.

Commons, April 29th. Debate on Insolvent and Repeal Bill.

Senate, April 30th. A debate took place on a Bill to amend the Act of Incorporation of the Confederation Life Association; also, on the Truro and Pictou Railway Bill.

Senate, May 1st. Brief discussions took place on the Temperance Act Amendment Bill, the Intercolonial Railway Law Amendment Bill, Marine Electric Telegraph Bill, etc.

Senate, May 2nd. A debate took place on the Coteau Bridge Company Bill.

Commons, May 2nd. Debate on Militia Acts Amendment Bill.

Commons, May 3rd. Debate on Mr. Fortin's resolution on the Fisheries Award.

Commons, May 5th. The third reading of Mr. Bechard's Insolvent Laws Repeal Bill was carried on division: Yeas, 107; Nays, 55.

Senate, May 6th. Debates took place on the navigation of Hudson's Bay and the British Columbia Supreme Court Bill.

Senate, May 7th. A long debate occurred on the Canada and Atlantic Railway Bill.

Commons, May 7th. Debate on third reading of the Tariff Bill.

Senate, May 8th. A debate took place on the Insolvency Laws Repeal Bill which was concluded on the 9th, when it received the six months' hoist.

Commons, May 8th. Debate on Hon. Mr. Baby's Weights and Measures Laws Consolidation Bill.

Commons, May 9th. A discussion occurred on the item in the Estimates for Intercolonial Railway expenses. Consideration of the Eliza Maria Campbell Relief Bill was commenced, but cut short by expiration of time allotted to Private Bills.

Commons, May 13th. A short discussion took place in connection with charges made in the public press against Vice-Chancellor Blake. The Rivière-du-Loup Branch Purchase Bill passed its third reading after a brief debate.

Senate, May 14th. The Supply Bill was read a first, second and third time and passed after some discussion.

Commons, May 14th. A debate occurred on the third reading of the Supply Bill, also on the Senate amendments to the Supreme and Exchequer Courts Acts Amendment Bill.

Senate, May 15th. The Members of the Commons having been summoned, His Excellency the Governor-General closed the Session with the usual Speech from the Throne.

Commons, May 15th. The last day of the session. A few remarks were made in connection with the non-appearance of Mr. John A. Macdonnell at the Bar of the House in answer to Mr. Speaker's summons, and the House was summoned to the Senate for prorogation.

BAILLARGEON, *Hon. PIERRE, M.D. (Stadacona.)*

Descended from a French family that emigrated to Can. from Londigny, France. S. of the late M. Francois Baillargeon, by Marie Louise Langlois, of St. Laurent. B. at Crane Island, P.Q., 8 Nov. 1812. Ed. at Nicolet College. M. 1842, the dau. of the late Joseph Pinchaud, M.D., of Quebec. A brother of the late Rt. Rev. C. F. Baillargeon, D.D., Archbishop of Quebec. Received degree of M.D. from Harvard Univ. Is a mem. of the Boston Medical Assn., and one of the visiting physicians to the Quebec General Hospital. Called to the Senate, 26 March 1874. Is Presdt. of the Dental Assn. of the Province of Quebec. A Liberal.—17 *St. Ursule street, Quebec.*

BELLEROSE, *Lieut.-Col. Hon. JOSEPH HYACINTHE, J.P. (De La Naudiere.)*

S. of the late M. H. Bellerose, Esq., merchant, Three Rivers, P.Q., by Sophie Le Maitre de Lottinville. B. at Three Rivers, 1820. Ed. at the Colleges of Nicolet and St. Hyacinthe. M. 1847, Henrietta, dau. of Lieut.-Col. Armand, and sister of Hon. J. F. Armand, Senator. Is Vice-Presdt. of the Sovereign Fire Insurance Co., and Mayor of his Municipality. Has been a Commr. under 2 Vict. c. 29, Stat. L.C., and Presdt. of the Union Navigation Co. Has been long and prominently connected with the Volunteer Militia movement in L.C., having, after the passage of the Militia Act of 1854, been the first to organize companies in the rural districts; became Brigade Major 8th Military District, and as such raised 24 companies in 6 months, of which 15 were equipped and armed; and in 1862 was promoted to his present rank, with command of 12th Vol. Rifles, retaining the appt. he had received in 1859 of Commandant of the whole V. Force in M. D. No. 8. Is now Lieut.-Col. commanding Laval Reserve Militia. In 1858, H.M. the Queen, being desirous of showing her estimation of his military services, charged Sir E. W. Head, then Gov.-General, to offer him a captaincy in the 100th or "Prince of Wales Royal Can. Regiment," then being organized, a position he accepted, but subsequently, for private reasons, resigned, notwithstanding that he had passed the necessary examinations therefor. On two occasions declined important appts. under Govt., and after the death of Sir G. E. Cartier, refused a seat in the Cabinet owing to the unsettled policy of Govt. on Man. Amnesty and N.B. School questions, but principally on

account of Pacific Railway charges then pending. Sat for Laval in Can. Assembly from g.e. 1863 until the Union, and for same seat in House of Commons from that event up to his elevation to the Senate, 7 Oct. 1873. Represented Laval in Quebec Assembly from the Union until g.e. 1875, when he retired, and was, during the whole of that time, Chairman of the Contingent Committee, and as such effected great reductions in the House expenditure. BENSON, Hon. JAMES REA. (*St. Catharines.*)

Descended from an Irish family of Eug. extraction, that came to Am. 1815, and settled at Kingston, Ont. M, the eld. dau. of the late Charles Ingersoll, Esq., of Ingersoll, Ont., who for some years represented Oxford in the U.C. Assembly. Has been engaged in commercial pursuits, in connection with mills and vessels, for many years. A dir. of the Imperial Bank of Can., and of the London and Canadian Loan Agency Co.; Vice-Presdt of the International Suspension Bridge Co., and Presdt. of the Welland Loan Co., and of the St. Catharines Gas Co. Has been Presdt of the Niagara District Bank. A mem. of the Town Council of St. Catharines, and of the Co. Council of Lincoln. Was solicited to become a candidate for L.C. Can., upon several occasions, but did not enter public life until 1867, when returned by acclamation for Niagara division; owing, however, to prorogation of Parliament shortly afterwards, did not take his seat, and the Union Act coming into force almost immediately, the old Parlt. of Can. ceased to exist. Sat for Lincoln in the House of Commons from g.e. 1867 until called to the Senate, 14 March 1868. A Liberal.—*Corner Church and James streets, St. Catharines, Ont.*

BOTSFORD, Lieut.-Col. Hon. AMOS EDWIN. (*Sackville.*)

Second s. of the late Hon. Wm. Botsford, one of the Judges of the Supreme Court, N.B., and formerly Speaker of the Assembly of that Province; and grands, of Amos Botsford, Esq., a U.E. Loyalist, formerly of Newton, Conn., who was Speaker of the first Assembly elected after N.B. was constituted a separate Province. B. in St. John, N.B., 1804. Ed. at Sackville. M. Sept. 1864, Mary, relict of the late J. F. Allinson, Esq., of Sackville. Was Presdt. of the Provincial Board of Agriculture, N.B., and Lieut.-Col. 2nd Batt. Westmoreland Militia. Was Presdt. of the Dominion Rifle

ASSD. from its organization until 1871 and is now a Vice-Presdt. of that body. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, N.B., from 1838 to 1840, when he resigned; and a mem. of L.C. same Province from 1833 until the Union. An unsuccessful candidate for Westmoreland in N.B. Assembly, 1830. Was Senior Judge of Common Pleas for Westmoreland for several years; a Commr. with Hon. E. B. Chandler, to settle the boundary line between N.S. and N.B., 1836; a delegate to Washington, respecting border difficulty, 1839; delegate to Quebec, during Govt. of Lord Durham, to discuss measures connected with the general interests of B.N.A.; Commr. with Col. Robinson and Joseph Bouchette, Esq., to settle disputed boundary between Can. and N.B.; and a delegate a second time to Washington respecting a Reciprocity Treaty with the U.S., 1852. Moved and carried, 1855, an addition to Standing Orders of L.C. of N.B., to allow the public to be present at the deliberations of that body, which up to that period had been carried on with closed doors; moved resolutions in the same House, March 1866, approving of the Union of the B.N.A. Colonies. Was requested to form an Administration for N.B., 1866, but declined. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Conservative.—*Sackville, N.B.; Rideau Club.*

BOURINOT, Lieut.-Col. Hon. JOHN. (*Sydney.*)

Of Norman descent. B. at Grouville, in the Island of Jersey, on 15 March 1814. M. Jane, dau of Hon. John G. Marshall, formerly chief Justice of the Island of Cape Breton. Is Vice-Consul of France, and Lt.-Col. of the Reserve Militia. Sat for the County of Cape Breton from 1859 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation 1867. A Conservative.—*Sydney, C.B.*

BROUSE, Hon. WILLIAM HENRY, M.A., M.D. (*Prescott.*)

S. of Col Jacob Brouse, a descendant of one of the first U.E. Loyalists that settled on the banks of the St. Lawrence. B. in Matilda, Dundas, Ontario. Ed. at Victoria College, Cobourg, in Arts, where he took degree of M.A.; studied with the late Hon. Dr. Rolph in Toronto, and graduated at McGill College, Montreal, in Medicine, where he obtained degree of M.D. M. Francis A., eld. dau. of the late Alpheus Jones, Esq., of Prescott. Is Surgeon 56th Batt. V.I.; a member of the Senate, Victoria College; and a dir. of the Toronto Life Assurance and Tontine Co., and of the Prescott

& Brockville Macadamized Road Co. Apptd. mem. of the Medical Examining Board for U.C., 1850. Elected mem. of Medical Council for Ont., 1866, 1869 and 1872, continuously, since its first formation, and elected President of that body 1870. Has been Reeve and Mayor of Prescott. An unsuccessful candidate for St. Lawrence division in L.C., Can., 1858. First returned to Parlt., for South Grenville, at g.e. 1872; re-elected at g.e. 1874. A Reformer. Took an active part in securing the appropriation, \$50,000, as a reward to the surviving Militia veterans of 1812. Believes that the loyal men who quelled the Rebellion of 1837-8 should be rewarded, and therefore moved that a grant of land in the North-West, equal in extent to that granted the emigrant settlers, should be given them for their services. In favor of the establishment of a Dominion Sanitary Bureau, and of the introduction of Military Drill into Schools, respecting which he moved in the House of Commons for a Committee during the session of 1875. Called to the Senate, 1878.—*Prescott, Ont.*

BROWN, Hon. GEORGE. (*Lambton.*)

S. of the late Peter Brown, Esq., merchant, Edinburgh, Scot., who in 1838 emigrated to New York, where he edited the *British Chronicle* newspaper, and thence, in 1843 moved to Toronto, where he established the *Toronto Banner* as an Independent organ of Liberal Presbyterian views, by the only dau. of George Mackenzie, Esq., of "The Cottage," Stornoway, Isle of Lewis. B. in Edinburgh, 29 Nov. 1818. Ed. at Edinburgh High School. M. in the same city, 27 Nov. 1862, Annie, eldest dau. of the late Thomas Nelson, Esq., of Abden House, Edinburgh. Founded the *Toronto Daily Globe* newspaper, of which he became chief political writer, 1844; founded the *Canada Farmer*, a weekly journal devoted to agricultural interests, 1864. Is now managing Director of "Globe Printing and Publishing Company;" and largely engaged in stock raising. A mem. of the Senate of the University of Toronto. Was a mem. of Commission apptd. to inquire into certain alleged abuses in the management of the Provincial Penitentiary, Kingston, 1849. Was for many years leader of the Reform Party of U.C., and as such called on to form a Govt. for late Province of Can, 2 Aug. 1858, which he succeeded in doing in co-operation with the Hon. A. A. (now Chief Justice) Dorion. Before it was possible for the members of his Administration to be re-elected, the House of Assembly passed a vote of want of confidence. He consequently determined

to dissolve Parliament, but the Governor-General (Sir Edmund Head) refused to grant a dissolution, when Mr. Brown and his colleagues at once resigned. He again entered Ex. Council, 30 June 1864, as a member of the Administration formed to carry out the scheme of Confederation, being leader of the Reform section, then in a majority in the House, as Mr. Macdonald was leader of the Ontario Conservatives, and Mr. Cartier of the French Canadian Conservatives. Mr. Brown had, in the session of 1864, obtained a Select Committee to enquire into and report upon such changes in the constitution as might satisfy the just expectations of Western Canada. The Committee reported in favor of a Federal system, such as was afterwards established. He resigned 21 Dec. 1865, after the Confederation scheme was arranged, though the Imperial Act was not passed, owing to his disapproval of the policy of the Govt., with reference to a Reciprocity Treaty with the U.S. Was a mem. of the Charlottetown Union Conference, 1864, of that at Quebec in same year, and of the Confederate Council of B.N.A. Colonies for the negotiation of Commercial Treaties, that sat in latter city, Sept. 1865. Proceeded to England as a delegate on public business, 1865, and to Washington, March 1874, on behalf of Can. and the Empire, as joint Plenipotentiary with Sir Edward Thornton, to negotiate with the Government of the U.S. a commercial treaty. Declined the Lieut.-Governorship of Ont., 1875. Sat for Kent in Can. Assembly from g.e. 1851 to g.e. 1854; for Lambton from latter date to g.e. 1857, when returned for North Oxford and the City of Toronto (elected to sit for Toronto); for South Oxford from March 1863 until the Union. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Haldimand, April 1851; for Toronto East at g.e. 1861; and for South Ontario, in House of Commons, at g.e. 1867. Called to the Senate, 16 Dec. 1873. A Liberal.—252 Wellington street West, Toronto; Bow Park, near Brantford, Ont.; Toronto Club; Rideau Club.

BULL, Hon. R. B. (*Burlington*.)

Called to the Senate 1 March 1879, in the room of the Hon. Donald McDonald, deceased. Hon. Mr. Bull was formerly a member of the Legislative Council of Canada.—*Hamilton*.

BUREAU, Hon. JACQUES OLIVIER, N.P. (*De Lorimier*.)

Family came from Normandy. S. of Jacques Bureau, Esq., merchant, of Three Rivers, P.Q. B. there, Feb. 1820. Ed. at Nicolet College. M. 1st, 1844, Mdlle. Emilie St. Pierre (she d.

in 1852); 2nd, 1868, Madame J. H. Terroux. Admitted as a Notary Public of L. C., 1843. Sat for Napierville in Can. Assembly from 1855 until Sept. 1862, when elected for "De Lorimier" division in L. C., which he represented until the Union. Was a mem. of Ex. Council, and Prov. Secy., Can. (succeeding Hon. A. A. Dorion) from January to May 1863. Called to Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. Was one of the most active promoters of the anti-seigniorial movement, and a mem. of the Reform Convention that met at Quebec on that subject. During session of 1879 moved for a return of papers relating to international trade, supporting his motion in an elaborate speech, which has since been published in pamphlet form. Has always been a consistent Reformer.—96 St. Francois Xavier street, Montreal.

CAMPBELL, *Hon. Sir ALEXANDER, K.C.M.G., P.C.* (Cataraqui.)

S. of the late James Campbell, M.D. B. in the E. R. of Yorkshire, Eng., in 1822. Ed. at Lachine, at the College of St. Hyacinthe, and at Kingston. M. in 1855, Georgina Frederica Locke, dau. of Thomas Sandwith, Esq., of Beverley, Yorkshire. Called to the Bar of U.C. in 1843. Created a Q.C. in 1856, and a Bencher of Osgoode Hall in 1857. Represented Cataraqui Division in the L. C. of Can. from 1858 until the Union, in 1867; was Speaker of that body in 1862-3. Commissioner of Crown Lands, and mem. of the Ex. Council from 1864 to the Union. A mem. of the Quebec Conference. Sworn of the Privy Council, 1 July 1867. Postmaster-General from thence until 1873, when apptd. Minister of the Interior. Resigned with the Macdonald Govt., 5 Nov. 1873. Was leader for the Govt. in the L. C. of old Can. from 1858 until 1867, and in the Senate from the Union in 1867 until Nov. 1873, and from thence until the resignation of the Mackenzie Govt., leader of the Opposition in the Senate. Sworn in as Receiver-General, Oct. 1878, and became Postmaster-General 20 May 1879. Resigned position as Postmaster-General 15 Jan. 1880, to accept portfolio of Minister of Militia. Is leader of the Government side in the Senate. Created K.C.M.G. by Her Majesty the Queen 24th May 1879.—Residence: Toronto, Ontario; U. E. Club, Toronto; Rideau Club, Ottawa; St. James' Club, Montreal.

CARVELL, *Hon. J. S.* (Charlottetown.)

Called to the Senate, Dec. 1879. A Conservative.—Charlottetown, P.E.I.

CHAFFERS, *Hon. WILLIAM HENRY.* (*Rougemont.*)

S. of the late Mr. William Unsworth Chaffers, by Catherine H. Blanchette; and grands. of W. Chaffers, Esq., M.D., of Liverpool, Eng. B. in Quebec, 1830. Ed. at Chambly and Montreal. M. 1849 Louise, dau. of the late James O'Leary, Esq., M.D., formerly a surgeon in H.M. service (she d. 1870.) A merchant. Is a dir. of the Isolated Risk Insurance Co. Sat for Rouville in Can. Assembly from Oct. 1856 till g.e. 1857, when he retired. Has been Warden of Rouville, Mayor of St. Cesaire, a Commr. of Small Causes, and Presdt. of the Rouville Agricultural Society. Represented Rougemont in L.C. Can., from Jan. 1864 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Liberal.—*St. Cesaire, P.Q.*

CHAPAIS, *Hon. JEAN CHARLES, P.C.* (*De la Durantaye.*)

S. of the late J. C. Chapais, Esq., merchant, of River Ouelle, P.Q. B. at River Ouelle. Ed. at Nicolet College. M. the dau. of the late Amable Dionne, for many years a mem. of the L.C. Can., a merchant; was a mem. of the Ex. Council, and Commr. Public Works, Can., from March 1864, until the Union. Sworn of the Privy Council, 1 July 1867, and was Minister of Agriculture from that date until 16 Nov. 1870, when appointed Receiver-General; resigned Jan. 1873. Sat in the Quebec Union Conference, 1864. Has been a Government Director of the Grand Trunk Railway. Sat for Kamouraska in Can. Assembly from 1851 until the Union. Contested same seat for Commons at g. e. 1867, on being opposed by Mr. C. F. Pelletier; special return made and no election declared. Sat for Champlain in Local House from 1867 to 1871. Called to the Senate 13 January 1868. A Conservative.—*St. Dennis de la Boutellerie, P.Q.; Rideau Club.*

CHINIC, *Hon. EUGENE.* (*Gulf.*)

S. of the late Joseph M. Chinic, Esq., merchant of Quebec. B. there 18 Oct. 1818. M. Miss LeBlond, of Montreal. Head of the firm of Chinic, Beaudet & Co., wholesale and retail hardware merchants. Is a dir. of the Notre Dame Savings Bank; of the Canada Investment and Agency Co.; and Presdt. of the Quebec Steel Co., and of *La Banque Nationale*. Called to the Senate 10 April 1873. A Conservative.—*Mount Pleasant, St. Foye Road, Quebec; Rideau Club.*

CHRISTIE, *Hon. DAVID, P.C. (Erie.)*

B. in Edinburgh, Scotland, October 1818. Ed. at Edinburgh High School. Came to Canada 1833. M. 1st, 1848, Isabella, eld. dau. of Robert Turnbull, Esq., Lennel, (she d.); 2nd, 1860, Margaret Robinson, dau. of William Telfer, Esq., Springfield. An extensive agriculturist. Has been a member of the Board of Agriculture and of the Council of the Agricultural Association since its formation. Has been President of the Agl. Association, U.C.; of the new Agl. and Arts Association, Ont.; and of the Board of Agriculture. Is Chairman of the Commission of Ontario School of Agriculture; Presdt. Dominion Council of Agriculture and of the American Short Horn Breeders' Association. Sat for many years in the Senate of Toronto University. Was Vice-President of the Constitutional Reform Association, Toronto, 1859. Sworn of the Privy Council 7 November 1873, and was Secretary of State from that date until appointed Speaker of the Senate, 9th January 1874, which position he held until October 1878. Appointed Administrator of the Govt. of Ontario, May 1875 [during the illness of Lt.-Gov. Crawford], but not sworn in, owing to the death of the Lt.-Gov. Sat for Wentworth in Canada Assembly from 1851 to 1854, and for East Brant from 1855 to 1858, when he resigned and was elected for the Erie division, L.C., which he represented until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Liberal—*The Plains, Paris, Ontario.*

COCHRANE, *Hon. MATTHEW HENRY. (Wellington.)*

Family came to Can. from the North of Irel. Son of the late Mr. Cochrane, a Quebec trader. An eminent cattle importer and breeder. Is a trustee of Lennoxville University; a mem. of the Council of Agriculture of Quebec; a dir. of the Can. Meat and Produce Co.; of the Can. Agricultural Ins. Co.; and of the Waterloo and Magog Railway Co.; and Presdt. of the Tolley Manufacturing Co. Called to the Senate 17 Oct. 1872. A Conservative.—*Hillhurst Farm, Compton, P.Q.*

CORMIER, *Hon. CHARLES. (Kennebec.)*

S. of M. Pierre Cormier, by Marie Anne Landry; and grands. of Francois Cormier, who emigrated from France to l'Acadie, N.S., and removed thence to St. Gregorie le Grand, Nicolet, P.Q. B. at

St. Gregorie le Grand, 22 June 1813. Ed. there. M. 5 Nov. 1838, Mdle. Lucile Archambault, of Montreal. A millowner. Has been Mayor of Plessisville on several occasions, Prestd. of the Comms. Court, and Presdt. of School Comms. Sat for Kennebec in L.C., Can., from 1862 until the Union, when called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation. A Liberal, and "Nationalist."—*Plessisville de Somerset, P. Q.*

CORNWALL, Hon. CLEMENT FRANCIS, B.A. (*Ashcroft.*)

S. of Rev. Alan Gardner Cornwall, Rector of Newington, Bagpath and Beverstone, Gloucestershire, Eng., and Chaplain in Ordinary to Her Majesty, by Caroline, his wife, dau. of Thos. Kingscote, Esq., of Kingscourt Park, Gloucestershire. The ancient English family of Cornwall is descended in an unbroken line from a son of King John of Eng., who was created Earl of Cornwall; the Kingscotes of Kingscote have lived on the lands they now hold from a period antecedent to the Conquest. B. in England 1836. Ed. at a private school, and at Trinity College, Cambridge, where he graduated B.A. M. 1871, Charlotte, 3rd dau. of Rev. Arthur Gore Pemberton, Rector of Kensal Green, London, Eng. Called to the Bar of the Inner Temple, Eng. 27 Jan. 1812. Is a magistrate for B.C. Sat for Yale-Lytton in L.C. of B.C. during sessions 1864-5, and again during session of 1871, when terms of Union with Can. were agreed upon. Called to the Senate, on B.C. entering the Dominion, 13 Dec. 1871. Moved the Address in reply to the Speech from the Throne in the session of 1879. A Conservative.—*Ashcroft, B.C.; Oxford and Cambridge Club, London, Eng.; Rideau Club.*

DE BOUCHERVILLE, Hon. CHARLES EUGENE BOUCHER, M.D. (*Montarville.*)

Descended from Lieut.-Gen. Pierre Boucher, Sieur de Grobois, Governor of Three Rivers in 1653, and founder of the Seigniory of Boucherville. S. of the late Hon. P. Boucher de Boucherville, a member of the L.C., Canada, by Amelie, sister of the Hon. C. C. S. de Bleurv. B. at Boucherville, P.Q., 1820. Ed. at St. Sulpice College, Montreal. Conducted his medical studies at Paris, where he graduated. M. 1st, Susane, dau. of R. L. Morrogh, Esq., advocate, of Montreal (dead); 2nd, Miss C. Luissier, of Varennes. Was a mem. of Ex. Council and Speaker of the Leg. Council from July

1867, to Feb. 1873. Entrusted with the formation of a new Cabinet on the resignation of Mr. Ouimet, a duty he successfully accomplished 22nd Sept. 1874, when he and his Ministers were sworn into office, he (Mr. De B.) taking the portfolio of Secretary and Registrar and Minister of Public Instruction; transferred to Department of Agriculture and Public Works, 27 Jan. 1876. Sat for Chambly, in Can. Assembly, from g.e. 1861 until the Union. Called to L.C., July 1867. Called to Senate Feb. 1879. A Conservative.—*Quebec*; *Boucherville*.

DEVER, Hon. JAMES. (*St. John.*)

B. at Ballyshannon, Ireland, 2 May 1825. Came to this country early in life, and was ed. at St. John. M. Nov. 1853, Miss Margaret Morris. A merchant. Called to the Senate, 14 March 1868. A Liberal.—5 *Chipman's Hill, St. John, N.B.*

DICKEY, Hon. ROBERT BARRY, Q.C. (*Amherst.*)

S. of the late R. M. Dickey, Esq. B. at Amherst, N.S., 10 Nov. 1812. Ed. at Windsor Academy. M. Oct. 1854, Mary Blair, 3rd dau. of the late Hon. Alex. Stewart, C.B. Called to the Bar, N.S., Jan. 1834, and to that of N.B. 1835. Is a dir. of the N.S. Electric Telegraph Co., and Consular Agent for the United States at Amherst. Was a delegate from N.S. Govt. to Eng. on subject of Intercolonial Railway, 1858; and to the Quebec Union Conference, 1864. Was a mem. of L.C. of N.S. before the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Conservative.—*Amherst, N.S.*; *Halifax Club*; *Rideau Club*.

DICKSON, Lieut.-Col. Hon. WALTER HAMILTON. (*Niagara.*)

Of Scottish descent. S. of the late Hon. Wm. Dickson, a mem. of the L.C. of U.C. B. in U.C. 1805. M. 1st, Miss Augustus Maria Geale (she d.); 2nd, Mrs. Armstrong. Called to the Bar, U.C., Hilary Term, 1830. Sat for Niagara in Can. Assembly from 1844 to 1851. Was a life mem. of the L.C., Can., from Feb. 1855 until the Union. Is Lieut.-Col. in the Militia, and has been, for 19 years, President of the Agricultural Society of same Co. Represented Mille Isles in L.C., Canada, from 1864 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Conservative.—*St Benoit, P.Q.*

FABRE, *Hon.* LOUIS K. HECTOR. (*La Salle.*)

S. of Edouard Raymond Fabre, Esq., by Luce Perrault, and brother of the Rt. Rev. E. C. Fabre, Coadjutor Bishop of Montreal. B. in Montreal, 9 Aug. 1834. Ed. at the College of L'Assomption and St. Hyacinthe, and at St. Sulpice, of Montreal. M. 3 Aug. 1864, Flora, dau. of Adolphus Stein, Esq., of Arthabaskaville, P.Q. Studied law with his brother-in-law, the late Sir George E. Cartier, and was called to the Bar, L.C., 1856. Has been long and intimately connected with the newspaper press of Quebec, and occupies a distinguished position as a French Canadian *litterateur*. Was some time editor of *L'Ordre* (Montreal); and from 1862 to 1866 had editorial management of *Le Canadien* (Quebec.) In May 1867, founded *L'Evenement* (Quebec), of which he remains editor. Has been a Vice-Presdt. of Dominion Editors' and Reporters' Assn. Author of *Esquisse biographique sur Chevalier de Lorimier* (Montreal 1856); *Ecrivains Canadiens* (*Rev. Can.* 1865-6); *Canadian Literature* (*Trans. L. & H. Soc.* 1866); *Confederation, Independence, Annexation* (Quebec 1871.) Has been Presdt. of the Literary and Historical Society of Quebec. An unsuccessful candidate for Quebec County in House of Commons, March 1873. Called to the Senate, 5 Feb. 1875. A "Nationalist."—*Corner Dauphine and St. Ursule streets, Quebec.*

FERGUSON, *Lieut.-Col. Hon.* JOHN. (*Bathurst*)

Descended from the family of Ferguson of Auchentiber, Ayrshire, Scot. B. in Ayrshire, Scot., 1813. Ed. there. Settled in Bathurst, N.B., 1836. M. 1847, Mary, youngest dau. of the late Hugh Munroe, Esq., of Somerstvale, Bathurst. Has been for many years a partner in the firm of Ferguson, Rankin & Co., a branch of the extensive firm of Pollock, Gilmour & Co., of Glasgow. Is Lieut.-Col. 1st Batt. Gloucester County Militia, and a mem. of the Council of the Dominion Rifle Assn. Sat in L.C. of N.B. from

Sept. 1864 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Conservative.—*Bathurst, N.B.*

FERRIER, *Lieut.-Col. Hon. JAMES. (Shawinigan)*

B. in Scot. 1800. Ed. in Fifeshire. Came to Can. in 1821, and up to 1836 was actively engaged in mercantile pursuits. Became a mem. of the Corporation of the City of Montreal in 1841, Mayor in 1847, and Lieut.-Col. of the Fire Battalion of Montreal Militia same year. Projected the Montreal and Lachine Railway, of which he was Presdt. for some years. Apptd. a mem. of the Board of the Royal Institution for the Advancement of Learning, 1845, of which he subsequently became Presdt. Has been a dir. of the Can. Board of the Bank of British North America since it was first established. Was Presdt. of the Montreal Assurance Co. for six years; of the St. Andrew's Society, Montreal, upon several occasions; and a mem. of the Council, Victoria College, Cobourg. Is Chairman Can. Board of the Grand Trunk Railway Co., including the Montreal and Champlain, and the Buffalo and Lake Huron Railway Cos. Presdt. of the Quebec Temperance and Prohibitory League; of the Montreal Temperance Vigilance Assn.; and of Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society; Vice-Presdt. of the Sabbath School Assn. of Can.; and of the French Can. Missionary Society; Supt. of the Wesleyan Central Sunday School, St. James street, Montreal; and a dir. of the International Bridge Co. Was a life mem. of the L.C., Can., from 27 May 1847, until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. Apptd. mem. for Victoria in the L.C., Quebec 1867. A Conservative.—100 St. Alexander street, Montreal; St. James' Club.

FLINT, *Hon. BILLA. (Trent.)*

B. in Elizabethtown, Leeds, Ont., 9 Feb. 1805. Ed. there. M. Sept. 1827, Phoebe Sawyer, 2nd dau. of the late P. Clements, Esq., of Brockville. A merchant. Apptd. a J.P. 1836. Was first Presdt. of the Board of Police, Belleville. Reeve of Belleville. Mayor of that town 1866. Reeve of Elzevir for 21 years up to 1879. Warden of Hastings, 1873. Sat for Hastings in Can. Assembly from 1847 to 1851, when defeated, and for South Hastings from 1854 to 1857. An unsuccessful candidate for Trent Division, L.C. Can. 1861. Represented that division from 1863 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Liberal.—*Belleville, Ont.*

GIRARD, *Hon. MARC AMABLE, N.P. (St. Boniface.)*

S. of the late M. Amable Girard, of Varennes, P.Q., by Josephthe Daunais. B. at Varennes, 25 April 1822. Ed. there. Unmarried. A Notary Public. Called to the Bar of Manitoba, 1871. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, and Treasurer of Manitoba, from Sept. 1870 until March 1872, when he resigned; and Premier of the Province, with office of Provl. Secy, from 8 July to 2 Dec. 1873, when he and his Govt. retired. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council for N.W. Territories, Dec. 1872. Is Vice-Présdt. of the Selkirk Agricultural Society, and Présdt. of the St. Jean Baptiste Society of Manitoba. An unsuccessful candidate for Montarville in L.C. Can. 1858, and for Hochelaga in Can. Assembly, 1862. Represented St. Boniface in Manitoba Assembly, for which he was first returned by acclamation, Dec. 1870. Called to the Senate, on Manitoba entering the Dominion, 13 Dec. 1871. A Conservative.—*St. Boniface, M.*

GLAZIER, *Hon. JOHN. (Sunbury.)*

A lumber merchant. A dir. of the Fredericton Railway Co. Sat for Sunbury in N.B. Assembly for some years prior and up to the Union, and afterwards, until apptd. to the Senate, 14 March 1868. A Liberal.—*Lincoln, Sunbury, N.B.*

GUEVREMENT, *Hon. JEAN BAPTISTE. (Sorel.)*

B. in P.Q. Sat for Richelieu in Can. Assembly, from 1854 to g.e. 1856, when defeated. Represented Sorel in L.C. Can. from 1858 until the Union. An unsuccessful candidate for Richelieu in Quebec Assembly, at g.e. 1867. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Conservative.—*Charlotte street, Sorel, P.Q.*

GRANT, *Hon. ROBERT PATTERSON, J.P. (Pictou)*

S. of the late Lewis Grant, Bookseller and Publisher, Inverness, Scotland. B. there 1814. Ed. at the Inverness Royal Academy. Came to Can. 1833. Went to N.S. in 1835. M. 1840, Annie, dau. of the late James Carmichael, of New Glasgow. Contested four elections in the Liberal interest, in only one of which was successful; on that occasion he was elected to the Nova Scotia Assembly from the N.R. of Pictou, and which seat he held from

1859 to 1863. Attended the Detroit Convention [made celebrated by the memorable speech of the late Hon. Joseph Howe], as a delegate from the Halifax Board of Trade. Is, and has been for the past twenty years, Chairman of the Incorporated Board of Education of the Presbyterian Church of the Lower Provinces of B.N.A. [now incorporated with the Canada Presbyterian Church]. Is Attorney for the Underwriters of the Home Marine Insurance Association of Pictou, and President of the Pictou Bank. Has always been a Liberal, but differed from his political friends on one question—the question of Confederation, which he favored. Apptd. to the Senate 2 Feb. 1877, on death of Hon. John Holmes.—*Sea Bank, Pictou, N. S.*

HAMILTON, Hon. JOHN. (*Kingston.*)

Youngest s. of the late Hon. Robert Hamilton, of Queens-town, Ont. Born there, 1801. Ed. there. M. Frances Pasia, dau. of David Macpherson, Esq., of Inverness, Scotland, [she died 1873.] Is Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Queen's University, Kingston. Was for 17 years President of the late Commercial Bank. Has been President of the Kingston St. Andrew's Society. Sat in L. C. Can. as a life mem. from June 1841, until the Union. Called to Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Conservative.—*The Elms, Maitland street, Kingston, Ont.*

HAMILTON, Hon. JOHN. (*Inkerman.*)

A member of the family of Hamilton of Hamwood, Co. Meath, Irel. The family claims descent from Hugh Hamilton, a son of Sir James Hamilton, of Evandale, in the Kingdom of Scot. who settled in Irel. 1616. [See Burke's *Landed Gentry.*] Third s. of the late Col. George Hamilton, of Hawkesbury, Can., who died in 1837, by Lucy Craigie. B. near Quebec in 1827. Ed. in Montreal. M. 1st., Rebecca L. dau. of the Rev. John Lewis, B. A., of Cork, Irel. (she d.); 2nd, Ellen Marion, dau. of Wm. Wood, Esq., of Seale Lodge, Surrey, Eng. (she d. January 1872;) 3rd,—June 1873, Jeannie, relict of the late John Major, Esq., and dau. of the late Charles Cambie, Esq., formerly of Castletown, Tipperary, Irel. Is a mem. of the extensive and long-established lumber firm of Hamilton Bros., Proprietors of the Hawkesbury Mills, Ont.; of the Coldbrook Rolling Mills Co.; and dir. of the

Ottawa Union Forwarding Co.; of the Canada Investment and Agency Co.; Vice-President of the Merchants' Bank; and of the Reliance Mutual Life Assurance Society of London; and President of the Canada Timber and Lumber Association. Was Reeve of Hawkesbury for four years and Warden of the United Counties of Prescott and Russell for three years. Sat for Inkerman in L.C., Can., from 1860 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Conservative.—*Evandale House, Hawkesbury, Ont.*; *Tyrella House, Sherbrooke street, Montreal*; *St. James' Club*; *Rideau Club*.

HAYTHORNE, Hon. ROBERT POORE. (*Queen's Co.*)

Descended from a family of merchants and bankers belonging to Bristol, Eng. S. of the late Ald. Haythorne, four times elected Mayor of Bristol, who was largely engaged in the Spanish wool trade, and subsequently owned landed property in Gloucestershire, by Miss Curtis, of Mardyke, Bristol. B. at Clifton, Bristol, 1815. Ed. there. M. 1861, in P.E.I., Elizabeth Radcliffe, eld. dau. of Thomas Scott, Esq., Belfast, Irel. Is a Magistrate, and a Governor of Prince of Wales College. Entered the Ex. Council, 1867, as a mem. of the late Hon. G. Cole's Administration; after his retirement continued to sit in the Administration of Hon. Joseph Hensley, and on his elevation to the Bench, succeeded him as Presdt. of the Council, and leader of the Govt., in which he continued until his resignation, 1870. On 2 April 1872, four days before the meeting of Parlt., was entrusted with the formation of a new Govt., a duty in which he was successful; and in Feb. 1872, he, with his colleague, Hon. D. Laird, formed a delegation to Ottawa on the subject of the Union of P.E.I. with Can., on the result of which mission his Govt. went to the country, but not being sustained, he accordingly resigned, 18 April 1873. Had assisted in carrying improvements in the laws relating to the Lands Tenures of P.E.I. Sat in the L.C. of P.E.I. from 1866 to 1874. Called to the Senate, on the admission of P.E.I. as a Province of the Dominion, 18 Oct. 1873. A Liberal.—*Marshfield, Charlottetown*.

HOPE, Hon. ADAM. (*Hamilton*.)

The family came originally from Holland, with William, Prince of Orange, at the Revolution of 1688, consisting of two brothers, commissioned officers in the army, and subsequently farmers near

Edinburgh, leaving a son, Alexander Hope, who left two sons, Alexander and James. The latter married Janet, daughter of Robert Adamson, merchant, Dunkeld, and had two sons, Robert and William. Robert became tenant of East Ferrygate, East Lothian, in 1774, and subsequently of the neighboring farms of West Fenton, and Fenton Barns, and was succeeded by Robert Hope, Esq., the father and George Hope, Esq., the brother of Senator Hope, both distinguished as eminent agriculturists and writers on agricultural affairs. B. at West Fenton, Parish of Dirleton, East Lothian, Scotland, 8 January 1813. Ed. at Dirleton Parish School and in Edinburgh. Was six years in the counting house of a Leith, firm in which David Davidson, Esq., formerly treasurer of the Bank of Scotland, and General Manager of the Bank of Montreal, was then a partner. Emigrated to U.C. in 1834, and entered the office of Young, Weir, & Co., merchants, Hamilton; began business in St. Thomas in 1837, and served as a private in a volunteer company in the Rebellion of that year. M. in 1840, Hannah, dau. of Thomas White, Esq. Removed to London in 1845, and subsequently to Hamilton in 1865, where, as in London, he had been largely engaged in mercantile business. Is President of the Hamilton Provident and Loan Society, and a director of the Canadian Bank of Commerce. Was called to the Senate 3 January 1877. Is strongly in favor of the system of British Parliamentary Party Government for Canada, with Party lines sharply drawn. A Liberal, and in favor of Free Trade, as understood in England. —*Hamilton, Ont.*

HOWLAND, *Hon.* GEORGE WILLIAM. (*Alberton.*)

B. in Waterford, Irel., 19 May 1835, Emigrated with his parents to P.E.I., 1839. Ed. at the Central Academy there. M. Oct. 1866, Miss Olson, of St. John, N.B. (she d. in April 1876). A merchant and shipowner, and largely engaged in the fish trade. Is Vice-Presdt. (P.E.I.) of the Dominion Board of Trade, and a Governor of Prince of Wales College. Entered Ex. Council of P.E.I. 1866, and remained a mem. of the Govt., a part of the time being co-leader, almost uninterruptedly up to 30 June 1873. Was a delegate to Washington on trade matters, 1869, and to Ottawa, with Hon. Messrs. Pope and Haviland, May 1873, to settle terms of Union with Can., which terms were adopted unanimously by both Houses of the Legislature. Sat for Prince [1st Dist.] in Provl. Assembly, from 1862 until June 1873, when apptd. Collector of Customs at Charlottetown, which office he resigned in Sept. following, in order to con-

test Prince for House of Commons, and was defeated. Consular Agent for the U.S., and Vice-Consul for Sweden, Denmark and Norway. Was in Provl. Assembly a strenuous advocate of the building of P.E.I. Railway. Called to the Senate, on P.E.I. entering the Dominion, 18 Oct. 1873. A Liberal.—*Alberton, P.E.I.*

KAULBACH, *Lieut.-Col. Hon.* HENRY ADOLPHUS NEWMAN, *LL.B., Q.C.*
(Lunenburg.)

Of German descent, of lineage with Wilhelm Von Kaulbach, Officer of the Legion of Honor, the Dir. of the Royal Academy of Fine Arts at Munich, who in 1846 painted for Louis I., of Bavaria, "The Destruction of Jerusalem." Greatgrands. of Martin Von Kaulbach, Esq., an original grantee and settler of Lunenburg, N.S., in 1752. Grands. of Henry Kaulbach, Esq., who was apptd. High Sheriff of the same Co. by Gov. Wentworth, in 1798, and held that office, with others of distinction, until 1828, when he resigned the office of High Sheriff in favor of his son, Lieut.-Col. John Henry Kaulbach, who held it to his death in 1879. Eldest s. of last named High Sheriff, by Sophia Fredericka, dau. of Adolphus Newman, Esq. Brother of C. Edwin Kaulbach, Esq., M.P. for Lunenburg, and Rev. J. Albert Kaulbach Vicar of Truro, N.S. B. at Lunenburg, N.S., 1830. Ed. there at Grammar School, and in classics under tutorship of Rev. J. C. Cochrane, D.C.L., and in Harvard Univ., Cambridge, U.S. where he graduated LL.B. Studied law first with his uncle, Hon. John Creighton, Sr., Q.C., M.P.P., and mem. of the Ex-Council of N.S., afterwards Presdt. of the L.C., and subsequently with Hon. Wm. Young, then leader of the N.S. Govt., now Kt., Chief Justice of N.S. Called to the N.S. Bar, and apptd. Notary Public 1855, and soon enjoyed a large and lucrative practice in his Co. M. 1858, Eunice Sophie, only child of the late John Harris, Esq., of Thornhill, Kings, N.S. (she d. 1879) Apptd. Lieut.-Col. 1st Regiment Lunenburg Co. Militia and Volunteer Artillery in 1859. Contested Lunenburg Co. at g.e. 1863, against Hon. Joseph Howe, then leader of the Govt., N.S. (subsequently Governor of N.S.); returned by a large majority, and held that seat for the Co. in N.S. Assembly until the Union of the Provinces. During the time he was M.P.P. he was a mem. of the N.S. Central Board of Agriculture, and an ardent advocate of the Federal Union of all the Provinces of British North America, and of free schools by direct taxation. The Acts of Union and Free Schools being accomplished, he again contested his Co. at g.e. 1867; was defeated by the opposi-

tion to Free Schools and the Union. Called to the Senate 27 March 1872. Became a Q.C. under patent from the Earl of Dufferin, Gov. Genl., 1873. Continues practising as Barrister-at-law. Extensive land proprietor and shipowner. A Conservative.—*Residence: Medway Hall, Lunenburg, N.S.*

LEONARD, Hon. ELIJAH. (*London.*)

B. in the U.S. Has been Mayor of London, Ont., and a dir. of the London and Port Stanley Railway. An unsuccessful candidate for London in Can. Assembly at g.e. 1854. Represented Malahide division in L.C. Can. from 1862 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Liberal.—*Talbot street, London; Ont.*

LEWIN, Hon. JAMES DAVIES. (*Lancaster.*)

Descended from the Lewins of Womaston, Radnorshire, Wales, a family of private country gentlemen. B. at Womaston, Radnorshire, in 1812. Ed. at Kingston Grammar School. In early life entered the Civil Service of the British Government, and in that service came to N.B. in 1830, and continued thus for 20 years, when upon the abolition of the Dept. with which he was connected, was elected in 1855 Presdt. of the Bank of N.B., maintaining that position ever since. Called to the Senate 1876, to fill the vacancy created by the death of the Hon. John Robertson.—*St. John, N.B.*

MACDONALD, Hon. WILLIAM JOHN. (*Victoria City.*)

Descended from Somerled, Thane of Argyll and Lord of the Isles. Third s. of the late Major Alexander Macdonald, of Valley, North Uist, and Glendale, Isle of Skye. B. in Co. of Inverness, Scot., 1832. Ed. there. Came to B.C. 1851. M. 17 March 1867, Catharine, second dau. of Capt. *J. M. Read, of Hon. H. B. Co's service. Is Presdt. B.C. Rifle Assn. Was for eight years in the Hon. H. B. Co's service, during which time he acted as Capt. of Militia and Collector of Customs. Elected Mayor of the city of Victoria 1866, and again in 1871. Served as a mem. of first Board of Education; mem. Govt. Tax Court of Revision and Appeal; Road Commr., &c. Sat for Sooke in V.I. Assembly from 1859 for several years, and was also a mem. of the L.C. of B.C. Apptd. to the Senate on B.C. entering the Dominion, 13 Dec. 1871. A Liberal.—*Gordon street, Victoria; Rideau Club.*

MACFARLANE, *Hon.* ALEXANDER, *Q. C.* (*Wallace.*)

Of Scottish descent. S. of the late Hon. Donald Macfarlane. B. at Wallace, N.S., June 1817. M. Anne, dau. of Amos Seaman, Esq., of Minudie, N.S. Called to the Bar of N.S. Dec. 1844. Apptd. Q.C. June 1867. Is a Surrogate of the Vice Admiralty; and Presdt. of the Spring Hill Mining Co. Sat for Cumberland in N. S. Assembly from 1856 until the Union. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council of N.S. from 1865 to time of Union, and holds rank and precedence as such by patent from the Queen. Was one of the delegates from N.S. to the Colonial Conference in London, to complete terms of Union, 1866-7. Called to the Senate, 10 Oct. 1870. A Conservative.—*Wallace, N.S.; Halifax Club.*

MACMASTER, *Hon.* WILLIAM. (*Midland.*)

S. of the late Mr. William MacMaster, linen merchant, of Co. Tyrone, north of Ireland. B. 1811. Came to Can., 1833. M. 1st, 1851, Miss Mary Henderson, of N.Y. (she d. 1868); 2nd, 1871, Susan Molton, relict of the late James Fraser, Esq., of Newburgh, N.Y. Was for many years head of the firm of W. MacMaster & Nephews, wholesale dry goods merchants, Toronto. Is a mem. of the Senate of the University of Toronto; and of the Council of Public Instruction, Ont.; President of the Canadian Bank of Commerce; and of the Freehold Permanent Building and Savings Society; Vice-President of the Confederation Life Assn.; a dir. of the Great Western Railway of Can.; of the Isolated Risk Assurance Co.; of the Canada Landed Credit Co.; and of the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway. Held for several years the office of Chairman of the Canada Board of the Great Western Railway Co. Represented Midland Division in L.C., Can., from 1862 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Liberal—*Rathuelly, Davenport Road, Toronto; Bloor street, Yorkville, Toronto; Toronto Club.*

MACPHERSON, *Hon.* DAVID LEWIS. (*Saugeen.*)

B. in Scot. 12 Sept. 1818. Ed. at the Inverness Royal Academy. Came to Can. 1835. M. June 1844, Elizabeth Sarah, eld. dau. of William Molson, Esq., of Montreal, and grand-dau. of Hon. John Molson, in his life-time a mem. of the Ex. Council of L.C., and President of the Bank of Montreal. Is a mem. of the

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firm of Gzowski & Co., contractors, who have constructed several branches of Can. Railways and other important works; a mem. of the Corporation of Hellmuth College, London, Ont.; a dir. of Molson's Bank; of the Toronto Rolling Mills Co.; of the Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railway Co.; and of the Western Canada Permanent Buildings and Savings Society. Elected President of the Inter-oceanic Railway Co., incorporated for the purpose of constructing a railway across the continent to British Columbia, 1872. Was Arbitrator for the Province of Ontario under the B.N.A. Act, "for the division and adjustment of the debts, credits, liabilities and properties of U.C. and L.C., 1868." Has been Vice-President of the Montreal Board of Trade, and President of the St. Andrew's Society of Toronto. Author of a pamphlet on Banking and Currency, (Toronto, 1869), and also of two pamphlets, 1877-78, dealing with the public expenditure, &c. Represented Saugeen Division in L.C., Can., from Oct. 1864, until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Conservative.—*Chestnut Park, Toronto; Toronto Club; Rideau Club; St. James' Club.*

McCLELAN, Hon. ABNER REID. (*Hopewell.*)

B. at Hopewell, N. B., 1831. Ed. at Mount Allison Wesleyan Academy. Was one of the Governors of Mount Allison Wesleyan College, Sackville, N. B., and Vice-President of the Alumni Society of the Academy and College of that name. Was a mem. of Ex. Council and a Commr. of the Board of Works, N. B., from April 1866, until the Union. Sat for Albert in N. B. Assembly, from 1854 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Liberal.—*Riverside, Hopewell, N. B.*

McLELAN, Hon. ARCHIBALD WOODBURY. (*Londonderry.*)

Of Irish origin. Only s. of the late G. W. McLelan, Esq., who sat in the N. S. Assembly for a lengthened period. B. at Londonderry, N. S., Dec. 1824. Ed. there and at Mount Allison Wesleyan Academy. M. 1854, Miss Caroline Metzler, of Halifax. A dir. of the Cobequid Marine Insurance Company. Sat for Colchester in N. S. Assembly, from 1858 until 1863, for Northern Colchester from later date until the Union, and for Colchester in House of Commons, from the Union until called to the Senate, 21 June 1869. Apptd. one of the Commrs. for the construction of the Intercolonial Railway, June 1869. A Liberal; was opposed

to Confederation until "Better Terms" were yielded to N.S.—*Londonderry, N.S.*

MILLER, Hon. WILLIAM, Q.C. (*Richmond.*)

Descended from a family that emigrated to N.S. at the early settlement of the Province. B. at Antigonish, N.S., 12 Feb. 1835. Ed. at the Grammar School, St. Andrews, and the Antigonish Academy. M. Oct. 1871, Annie, dau. of the late Hon. James Cochrane, of Halifax, N.S. Called to the Bar, N.S., May 1860. Created Q.C. 1872. Sat in N.S. Assembly from g.e. 1863, until the Union, and while in that House rendered important assistance to the Union cause. Being opposed to the financial conditions, and other details of the Quebec scheme of Union, it was on his suggestion that the Government delegation to England was appointed, in order to effect, under the auspices of the Imperial authorities, such modifications of that scheme as would render it more acceptable to the people of N.S. Was nominated as a delegate to the London Colonial Conference of 1866-7, but declined the appointment. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, 1867. A Liberal.—*Halifax; Arichat, N.S.*

MONTGOMERY, Hon. DONALD. (*Park Corner.*)

Sixth s. of the late Daniel Montgomery, Esq., who emigrated from Argyllshire, Scotland, to P.E.I. upwards of a century ago, and for more than thirty-five years represented Prince County in the Provl. Assemby, by Miss Penman, of New Eng. B. in Princetown, P.E.I., 19 Jan. 1808. Ed. there. M. 1st, 1835, Miss Anne Wainay (she d. April 1856.) 2nd, May 1861, Louisa, relict of the late Lawrence W. Gall, Esq. Sat for Princetown in the Provl. Assembly, of which he was Speaker for four years, from 1838 until 1862, when the L.C. being made elective, he was elected to that body and became Speaker, an office he continued to hold until March 1874. Called to the Senate on P.E.I. entering the Union, 18 Oct. 1873. A moderate Conservative.—*Park Corner, P.E.I.*

MUIRHEAD, Hon. WILLIAM. (*Chatham.*)

S. of the late John Muirhead, Esq., a native of Dumfries-shire, Scot., who came to N.S. 1817, and for some years carried on business as a merchant and shipbuilder, at Pictou, N.S. B. in town of

Pictou, 4 April 1819. Ed. at Miramichi. M. Miss Annie Gray. A merchant, shipper, shipbuilder, ship and millowner. Is a dir. of the Maritime Bank of the Dominion; of the Goldbrook Rolling Mills Co.; of the Northern Western Railway; Presdt. of the Miramichi Ship Building Co.; and of the Maritime Warehousing and Dock Co. Sat in the L.C. of N.B. from 1867 until called to the Senate, 4 Jan. 1873. A Liberal.—*Chatham, N.B.; Rideau Club.*

NELSON, Hon. HUGH. (*Barkerville.*)

S. of Robert Nelson, Esq., of Shore Cottage, Magheramorne, Antrim, Irel., by Frances Quinn. B. at Larne, north of Irel., 25 May 1830. Ed. there. Represented New Westminster in B.C. Legislature from Nov. 1870 until its dissolution, 1871. Returned to Commons for same constituency Nov. 1871, on the admission of B.C. into the Dominion; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1873. Called to Senate Dec. 1879. A Liberal Conservative.—*Burrard Inlet, B.C.*

ODELL, Hon. WILLIAM HUNTER. (*Rockwood.*)

S. of the late Hon. William Franklin Odell, who held the office of Provl. Secy. of N.B. for 32 years; and grands. of Hon. Jonathan Odell, a zealous Royalist. B. in N.B. Ed. at King's College, Fredericton, where he graduated B.A., 1832. M. the eld. dau. of the late Hon. Mr. Justice Bliss, of Halifax. Called to the Bar. N.B., 1838. Apptd. Clerk of the Supreme Court, N.B., which office he subsequently resigned. Apptd. Deputy Provl. Secy., Registrar and Clerk of the Ex. Council, N.B., 1838, and subsequently, in 1844, filled the latter position on its being constituted a separate and distinct office. A Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, 1847, and a mem. of the L.C. of N.B. by Royal Warrant, 1850, where he sat until the Union. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council and Postmaster-General, N.B., from 1865 until resignation of the Govt. the following year. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. PAQUET, Hon. ANSELME HOMERE, M.D. (*De la Vallière.*)

S. of the late Timothée Paquet, Esq. by Marie F. Robillard, both of the parish of St. Cuthbert, P.Q. B. at St. Cuthbert 27 Sept. 1830. Ed. at the College of L'Assomption. M. at L'As-

somption, Sep. 1854, Delle Marie A. H. Gariepy. Is a Licentiate of College of Physicians and Surgeons, L.C. Professor of Hygiene and Public Health at the Montreal School of Medicine and Surgery, and of the Medical Faculty of Victoria University; Presdt. of the Permanent Building Soc'y. of the County of Berthier; Manager of the Agency of the Ville-Marie Bank, at *St. Cuthbert*. An unsuccessful candidate for De La Naudière, L. C. Can. 1863. Sat for Berthier in Can. Assembly from 1863 until the Union, and for same seat in House of Commons from that event until 9 Feb. 1873, when elevated to the Senate. A Liberal.—*St. Cuthbert. P. Q.*

PELLETIER, *Hon.* CHARLES ALPHONSE PANTALÉON, *B.C.L., C.M.G., Q.C., P.C.* (*Grandville.*)

S. of J. M. Pelletier, a merchant and farmer, by Julie Painchaud, sister of the late Rev. C. F. Painchaud, founder of the College of St. Anne, P.Q. B. at River Ouelle, P.Q. 22 Jan 1837. Ed. at St. Anne's College and at Laval University, from which he obtained degree of B. C. L. 15 Sept. 1858. M. 1st, 1861, Susanne, dau. of the late Hon. Chas. E. Casgrain, M.L.C. [she d. 1862]; 2nd, Virginia A. second dau. of the late Hon. M. P. De Sales La Terrière, M.D. who sat in the Parlt. of L.C. and afterwards in that of the United Can. Called to the Bar, L.C. 1860. Has been Syndic of the Quebec Bar, and was elected three times President of the *Société de St. Jean Baptiste, Quebec*. Was for several years Major, 9th Batt. or *Voltigeurs de Québec*. Was in command of that Batt. during the Fenian Raid in 1866; retired, retaining his rank, in 1866. Was a candidate for Kamouraska at g.e. 1867, when special return was made and the constituency was disfranchised for some months. First returned for that seat Feb. 1869; re-elected at g.e. 1872, and again, by acclamation, at last g.e. 1874. Sat for Quebec East in Quebec Assembly, from Feb 1873, to Jan. 1874, when in consequence of the operation of the Act respecting dual representation, he resigned his seat in that body, in order to remain in the Commons, and in which he continued (representing Kamouraska), up to 1877. Sworn of the Privy Council, in Jan. 1877, as Minister of Agriculture, and called to the Senate for Grandville Division upon appointment of Hon. L. Letellier, de St. Just to Lieut.-Governorship of Quebec. Elected Honorary President of the Dominion Council of Agriculture. Was President of the Canadian Commission for the Paris Universal Exhibition of 1878, for which service he received the order of

C.M.G. Resigned portfolio of Minister of Agriculture, Oct. 1878. Created a Q.C. 1879. A Liberal—*Cor. St. Ursule and St. Louis streets, Quebec; Quebec Garrison Club; Ottawa Rideau Club.*

PENNY, *Hon.* EDWARD GOFF. (*Alma.*)

B. at Hornsey, London, Eng. 15 May 1820. Ed. in Eng. M. 1857, Elenor Elizabeth, dau. of Oliver Smith, Esq. of Montreal. Came to Can. 1844. Called to the Bar, L.C. 1850 One of the proprietors of, and chief political writer for the Montreal *Herald* newspaper. Author of a pamphlet against Confederation (Montreal, 1867). Appt. a Commr. on behalf of Can. at the Philadelphia Exhibition, 1875. Called to the Senate, 13 March 1874. Was a Dominion Commr. to the Centennial Exhibition at Philadelphia from May to November 1876. A Liberal.—*Hornsey House, Cor. St. Luke and St. Mark streets, Montreal; Rideau Club.*

POWER, *Hon.* LAWRENCE GEOFFREY, LL. B. (*Halifax.*)

Was called to the Senate 2 Feb. 1877, in place of Hon. Sir Edward Kenny. Eld. and only surviving s. of Mr Patrick Power, who represented the County of Halifax in the Commons from g.e. 1867 to g.e. 1872, and from g.e. 1874 to g.e. 1878. B. Aug. 1841, at Halifax, N.S. Ed. at St. Mary's College, Halifax; Carlow College and the Catholic University, Ire., and Harvard Law School, Cambridge, Mass., where he took the degree of LL.B. in 1866. Was admitted to the Bar in December 1866. Senior partner in the law firm of Power & Frith, Halifax. Was for six years an Alderman of the city of Halifax, and for ten years a member of the Board of School Commrs. of the same place. Was for ten sessions Clerk Assistant and Clerk of Bills of the Assembly of N.S., having been three times elected by the House. Was actively engaged in the preparation of *The Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, Fourth Series*, 1874, and *Laws and Ordinances relating to the City of Halifax*, 1876. Is a mem. of the Senate of the University of Halifax, and an Examiner in the Faculty of Law of that institution. Unmarried. A Reformer.—*South Park street, Halifax, N.S.*

POZER, *Hon.* CHRISTIAN HENRY. (*Lauzon.*)

Of German descent. S. of the late Wm. Pozer, Esq. of St. George d'Aubert Gallion, P.Q. B. there 26 Dec. 1835. Ed. in

Quebec. Unmarried. Called to the Bar, L.C. July 1860. A dir. of the Levis and Kennebec Railway. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Beauce in Can. Assembly at g.e. 1863; first returned to Parliament at g.e. 1867. Sat for Beauce in Quebec Assembly from g.e. 1867 until Jan. 1874, when he resigned in order to confine himself to the Commons. Resigned seat in the Commons and called to the Senate 26 Sept. 1876. A Nationalist.—*Quebec; St. George, Beauce, P.Q.*

PRICE, Lt.-Col. Hon. DAVID EDWARD. (*Laurentides.*)

Ancestors originally from Wales. S. of the late Wm. Price, of Elstree, Herts, England, who came to Canada in 1810. Merchant of Quebec; by Jane, 3rd dau. of late Chas. Gray Stewart, Esq., Comptroller of the Imperial Customs at Quebec. B. at Quebec, in 1826. Ed. there, at Dr. Lundy's Classical College. Senior mem. of the firm of Price Brothers and Co., Merchants of Quebec. Col. of the 2nd Batt. Chicoutimi Militia. Member of the Quebec Agri. Council. President of the Agri. Society of Chicoutimi. Vice Consul at Saguenay, for the Kingdom of Denmark, Sweden, Norway and for the Argentine, Chilian and Peruvian Republics, and Consular Agent for U.S. of America. Resigned in 1854 in favor of Hon. Mr. Morin, Com. Crown Lands, who lost his election in Terrebonne. Sat for Chicoutimi and Tadousac, in Can. Assembly, from 1855 to General Election 1857, and from latter date for Chicoutimi and Saguenay, until elected to Leg. Council for Laurentides Division, in 1864; where he sat until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Liberal Conservative.—*Wolfeville, Quebec; Liberty Hall, Chicoutimi, Saguenay; Stadacona Club; St. James' Club; Rideau Club.*

READ, Hon. ROBERT. (*Quinté.*)

E'd. s. of Robert Read, Esq., an extensive farmer in the Co. Suffolk, Eng. B. at Fressingfield, in that county, 11 December 1814. Ed. at Laxfield, same county. A dir. of the Grand Junction Railway. Sat for Quinté division in L.C. Can., from Oct. 1862 until the Union. Represented East Hastings in the House of Commons from the Union until called to the Senate, 24 Feb. 1871. A Conservative.—*Belleville. Ont.*

REESOR, *Hon. DAVID.* (*Kings.*)

Of German descent. B. in Tp. of Markham, Ont. 1823. Ed. there. M. Emily, eldest. dau. of the late Daniel McDougall, Esq., of St. Mary's, Ont., and sister of Hon. W. McDougall, C. B., M. P. P. Founded the Markham *Economist* newspaper, of which he was editor for some years. Has been Warden of York and Peel. Represented Kings division in L. C., Can., from 1860 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Liberal. —*Markham, Ont.*

RYAN, *Lieut.-Col. Hon. THOMAS.* (*Victoria.*)

B. at Balinakill, Co. of Kildare, Ireland. Ed. at Clongowes College, same county. M. 1871, Duding, 2nd dau. of Charles N. F. DeMontenach, Esq., grand-dau. of the late Baroness de Longueuil, and relict of the late Oliver Perrault de Liniere, Esq., of Montreal. Is one of the Catholic Commissioners of Education for the Province of Quebec, and a dir. of the Bank of Montreal. Was for many years a partner in the Quebec and Montreal firms of Ryan Brothers & Co.; retired from business 1863, and in same year was elected by acclamation for the Victoria division in L. C., which division he continued to represent until Confederation. Was one of the Commrs. appointed in 1865 to proceed to the West Indies, Mexico and Brazil to open trade relations between those countries and Can. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Liberal Conservative.—304 *Peel Street, Montreal; St. James' Club; Rideau Club.*

SCOTT, *Hon. RICHARD WILLIAM, Q. C.* (*Ottawa.*)

On paternal side descended from an influential family in the Co. Clare, Irel. S. of the late W. J. Scott, Esq., M. D., who after serving on the medical staff of the army during the Peninsular war, came to Can., and subsequently became Registrar of the County of Grenville, Ont., by Sarah Ann, dau. of the late Capt. Allan McDonell of Matilda, Dundas, Ont., formerly an officer in the King's Royal Yorkers. B. at Prescott, 24 Feb. 1825. Ed. at Prescott. M. Mary Ann, dau. of the late John Heron, Esq., of Ottawa. Studied law with Mr. Marcus Burritt, of Prescott, and subsequently with Messrs. Crooks & Smith, of Toronto, and was called to the Bar of U. C., Easter Term 1848. Created a Q. C. 1867. Was Mayor of

Ottawa 1852. Elected Speaker of the Ont. Assembly, 7 Dec. 1871, but resigned on being apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council and Commr. of Crown Lands for that Prov. on 21 same month, in which office he remained until 7 Nov. 1873, when sworn of the Queen's Privy Council. Was Secretary of State from 9 Jan. 1874 until Oct. 1878. Acted as Minister of Finance during the absence of Mr. Cartwright in Eng., 1874, and again in 1875; acted as Minister of Inland Revenue, during illness of Mr. Geoffrion, 1875-6; and as Minister of Justice during Mr. Blake's absence in England in 1876. Sat for Ottawa in Can. Assembly from 1857 to 1863, when defeated; and for same seat in Ont. Assembly from g.e. 1867 until Nov 1873, when he resigned. Mr. Scott's principal legislative achievement is the Separate School Law of Ont., which he prepared and carried in 1863, as a private member, a measure which was the means of removing a vexed question from the political arena, and of allaying much public irritation. The Canada Temperance Act was framed by Mr. Scott, and carried through Parl. chiefly owing to his exertions. Called to the Senate, 13 March 1874. Was present, officially, at the U.S. Centennial, 1876. A Liberal.—*Ottawa.*

SEYMOUR, *Hon. BENJAMIN.* (*Newcastle.*)

Of English origin. B. in Fredericksburg, Ont., 1806. Ed. at the Royal Grammer School, Kingston. M. in 1833, a dau. of the late Duncan Mackenzie, Esq. Sat for Lennox and Addington in Can. Assembly from 1844 to 1854, when defeated. Was a life mem. of the L.C. Can. from 1855 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Conservative. — *Seymour Place, Port Hope, Ont.*

SIMPSON, *Hon. JOHN.* (*Bowmanville.*)

Family came to Can. from Scot. and settled on the "Scotch Line," Perth, 1816; afterwards removed to Brockville. B. at Rothies, near Elgin, Scot., May 1812. Ed. in Can. Entered mercantile life, 1825, as a clerk, at Darlington, Ont. Opened a branch of Bank of Montreal at Bowmanville, 1848, and subsequently another at Whitby. Assisted in founding the Ontario Bank, 1857, of which he became Presdt., a position he still holds. Represented Queen's division in L.C. Can. from 1856 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Liberal.—*Bowmanville, Ont.; Rideau Club.*

SKEAD, *Hon. JAMES.* (*Rideau*)

Of Scottish descent. B. near Moresby Hall, parish of Moresby, Cumberland, Eng. Ed. there. M. Miss Mackey. A lumber merchant and manufacturer. Is Presdt. of the Ottawa Board of Trade, of the City of Ottawa Agricultural Society, of the Ottawa Liberal Conservative Association. Has been Presdt. of the Ottawa Agrl. Insur. Co., and of the Upper Ottawa Steamboat Co. Is Presdt. of the Dominion Board of Trade; a dir. of the Ottawa Ass. of Lumber Manufacturers, of the Madawaska River Improvement Co., of the Caughnawaga Ship Canal Co. Has been Vice-Presdt. of the Canada Central Railway Co., and of the Montreal and Ottawa City Junction Railway. Elected Presdt. of the Liberal Conservative Convention which met in Toronto, 23 Sept. 1874. Has been a mem. of the Corporation of the City of Ottawa; Presdt. of the Agricultural and Arts Assn. of Ont., and of the Ottawa St. George's Society, by which he was (1876) presented with a handsome gold cross of St. George, for active services in promoting the affairs of the Assn. Was also (1876) apptd. a Judge of the Timber Department at the U. S. Centennial. Unsuccessfully contested Carleton for Ontario Assembly at g. e. 1867. Represented Rideau Division in the L. C. Can., from 1862 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May 1867. A Conservative.—*Corner of Wellington and Kent streets, Ottawa; Rideau Club.*

SMITH, *Hon. FRANK.* (*Toronto.*)

B. at Richfield, Armagh, Ireland, 1821. Accompanied his father to Can., 1832, and settled near Toronto. M. the dau. of John O'Higgins, Esq., J. P., of Stratford, Ont. Carried on business in London from 1849 to 1867, when he removed to Toronto, where he continues his extensive wholesale grocery trade. Was an Alderman of London for several years, and Mayor of the city 1866. Is Presdt. of the Toronto Savings Bank, and of the Toronto Victuallers' Assn., and a dir. of the Dominion Bank. Was Presdt. during its existence, of the Northern Extension Railway Co. Called to the Senate, 2 Feb. 1871. A Conservative.—*13 Bloor street, Yorkville, Toronto; Toronto Club; Rideau Club.*

STEVENS, *Hon. GARDNER GREEN.* (*Bedford.*)

S. of the late Gardner Stevens, Esq., one of the early settlers of the Eastern Townships. B. in Brompton, P. Q., 1814. Ed.

there. M. 1847, R. J., dau. of the late Sydney Spafford, Esq., of Compton. A dir. of the Stanstead, Shefford and Chambly Railway, of the South Eastern Railway and of the Eastern Townships Bank. Has been Mayor of Waterloo, and for the past two years has held the Wardenship of Shefford. Called to the Senate on the resignation of the late Hon. A. B. Foster, 19 Feb. 1876. A Liberal.—*Waterloo, P. Q.*

SUTHERLAND, Hon. JOHN. (*Kildonan.*)

S. of Mr. Alexander Sutherland, a native of the North of Scot., who, after serving in the British army during the Peninsular campaign, came to this country in 1815, and settled at Red River, 1821. Ed. there. M. the second dau. of John Macbeth, Esq., of the same place. Was a mem. of the Council of Assiniboia from 1866 until it ceased to exist, and was the first Sheriff of Manitoba (apptd. 1870) an office he resigned on being called to the Senate, 13 Dec. 1871. Is "National" in politics, but desires to have the connection with the Mother Country cherished to the fullest extent.—*Bellevue House, Kildonan, M.*

THIBAudeau, Hon. ROSAIRE. (*Rigaud.*)

Descended from a French family mentioned in history as being in existence during the reign of Louis XV, and which, on the breaking out of the French Revolution in 1789, emigrated to Acadia, and thence to L.C. B. 1 Oct. 1837, at Cap Sante, county of Portneuf. M. 9 Dec. 1873, Marguerite LaMothe, eld. dau. of Guillaume LaMothe, Esq., Postmaster of Montreal. Mem. of the firm of Thibaudeau Bros. and Co., Montreal. Dir. of Harbor Commission at Montreal; Vice-Presdt. of the Royal Canadian Insurance Co.; dir. of the Montreal Cotton Co.; dir. of the V. Hulon Cotton Mill Co.; local dir. at Montreal of Banque Nationale. A Liberal.—*Montreal.*

TRUDEL, Hon. FRANCOIS XAVIER ANSELME. (*De Salaberry.*)

S. of F. X. Trudel, Esq., a farmer, of St. Prosper, P.Q., by Julie Langevin, a grand-dau. of J. A. Hamlin, Esq., *Seigneur de Grondines*; and grand-s. of Oliver Trudel, Esq., of Ste. Genevieve de Batiscan, who represented Champlain in L.C. Assembly for a lengthened period. B. at St. Anne de la Paradi, P.Q., 28 April 1838. Ed at

Nicolet College. M. April 1864, Marie Zoe Aimée, dau. of the late Hon. Louis Renaud, late Senator for DeSalaberry Division. Called to the Bar, L.C., Dec. 1861. Was editor of *La Minerve* (Montreal) for a short time, 1860. One of the authors of the *Programme Catholique* (1871) and has written largely in the French Canadian periodicals of the day. Has been for several years Presdt. of the "Cercle Littéraire" and of the "Union Catholique," of Montreal. Created Q.C. in 1876. Sat for Champlain in Quebec Assembly from g.c. 1871 until g.c. 1875. Called to the Senate 31 Oct. 1873. A Conservative.—265 *Sherbrooke street, Montreal.*

VIDAL, *Lieut.-Col. Hon. ALEXANDER, P.L.S.* (*Sarnia.*)

Family originally from Spain. Removed to Eng. in 17th century. Eld. surviving s. of the late Capt. R. E. Vidal, R.N. B. in Berkshire, Eng, 4 Aug. 1819. Ed. at the Royal Mathematical School, Christ's Hospital, London, Eng. Accompanied his father to Canada, 1834, and settled in Sarnia following year. M. Dec. 1847, Catharine, eld. dau. of the late Capt. W. E. Wright, R.N. of Moore, Lambton. A P.L.S., and practised his profession from 1843 to 1852 Is Lieut.-Col. Lambton Reserve Militia; County Treasurer of Lambton, and Vice-President. Y.M.C.A., Sarnia. Was manager of Sarnia branch of late Bank of U.C., from 1852 until the failure of that institution, 1866, and held same position in service of Bank of Montreal from that time until 1875, when he resigned. Elected Chairman of the Dominion Prohibitory Convention, Montreal, Sept. 1875. An unsuccessful candidate for House of Commons at g. c. 1872. Sat for St. Claire Division in L.C. Can., from Sept. 1863, until the Union. Called to the Senate, 15 Jan. 1873. Is Presdt. of the Dominion Alliance for the Total Suppression of the Liquor Traffic, and Presdt. of the English Loan Co., of London, Ont. A Conservative.—*Sarnia, Ont.*

WARK, *Hon. DAVID.* (*Fredericton.*)

Descended by both parents from Scotch families that settled in Ulster in the 17th century. B. near Londonderry, Irel., 1804. Came to N.B. 1825. M. Annie Elizabeth, dau. of Isaac Burpee,

Beauchesne, Parish Priest of St. Luc, Co. Champlain, P. Q. B. at Becancour 8 June 1841. Ed. at Nicolet College and by private tuition. M. at Carleton, Co. Returned for present seat in the House of Commons by acclamation, on appointment of Hon. Theodore Robitaille as Lieut.-Governor of Province of Quebec, 26 Aug. 1879. Was Secy.-Treas. of the Township of Carleton from 1866 to 1879; Fishery Overseer from 1870 to 1871; and Landing Waiter and Examiner and acting Collector of Customs at the out-port of Carleton from 1871 to 1874. Is Major in the Bonaventure Reserve Militia. Commr. *Dedimus Potestatem*; Commr. for N.S. for taking affidavits in the Prov. of Quebec; Presdt. of the St. Jean Baptiste Society; mem of the Provl. Board of Notaries; Commr. of the Superior Court in the District of Gaspé. Independent Conservative, favorable to a National Policy. Will support the Govt. of Sir John A. Macdonald in all measures tending to improvement and progress, to civil and religious liberty, and tending to maintain British connection in the strongest possible manner, but is thoroughly independent of party.—*Carleton. Bureaux Chaleurs, P. Q.*

BÉCHARD, Major FRANÇOIS. (*Iberville.*)

S. of the late M. Fran. Béchard, of Mount Johnson, P. Q., by Clémence Gozette. B. in Quebec. Ed. at St. Hyacinthe College. Resided for some years in Illinois, where he m. Mary Eliza, dau. of William Townsend, Esq., of Chicago. Is Major in Iberville Reserve

A mem. of the Agricultural Council of Quebec. Has been Presdt. of the Chambly Agricultural Society for several years, and an active promoter of local agricultural and industrial exhibitions. As a farmer, has carried off the first prizes in the ploughing matches in the Co. Chambly, and won first prize for the best farm. Contributes largely to the press on agricultural and public matters. An unsuccessful candidate for Chambly in Local Assembly at g.e. 1871, and for same seat in Commons in Jan. and Dec. 1874. B. in Toronto. 7 Sept. 1826. Ed. at U.C. College. Unmarried. Graduated as M.D. at Univ. of McGill College, 1847. Is one of the examiners in

Ont. College of Physicians and Surgeons, and a Trustee of Cornwall High School. Entered Volunteer Militia Service, as captain of a company raised by him during Trent difficulty, 1861; became Major 1866, and promoted Lieut.-Col. 59th Stormont and Glengarry Batt., V.I. 1859, a command he still holds. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, by acclamation, at g.e. 1872. Again returned at last g.e. Unseated on petition, and re-elected, 27 Jan. 1880. A Conservative.—*Cornwall, Ont.*

Assembly from 1847 to 1849; was Solicitor-Genl. for U.C. for a short time in the Lafontaine-Baldwin Administration, and subsequently Chancellor of that Prov., by Catharine Hume, grand-dau. of William Hume, Esq., of Humewood, M.P. for Wicklow in the British House of Commons; and grand-s. of the late Rev. Dominick Edward Blake (of the family of Blake of Castlegrove, Galway), Rector of Kiltegan and of Loughbrickland, and Rural Dean, by Anne Margaret Hume, of Humewood. B. in Tp. of Adelaide, Middlesex, Ont., 13 Oct. 1833. Ed. at University of Toronto, where he took first-class honors in classics and received the degree of M.A., 1858. M. Margaret, dau. of the late Right Rev. B. Cronyn, Lord Bishop of Huron. Called to the Bar, U.C. in Michaelmas Term. 1856; created Q.C. 1864. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society of Ontario, 1871. Senior partner in the extensive law firm of Blake, Kerr & Boyd, Toronto. Was for a short time one of the examiners in, and lecturers on, Equity Law for the U.C. Law Society. Returned for South Bruce in Ontario Assembly at g.e. 1867, and was leader of the Opposition in that body from 1868 until 20 Dec., 1871, when called upon to form a Govt. for Ontario, which he succeeded in doing, accepting for himself the position of Presdt. of the Ex. Council in the same (without salary); resigned the Premiership of Ont. and seat in Local House, 25 Oct. 1874. Elected Chancellor of Toronto University, 1876. Returned

for South Bruce and for West Durham in Local Assembly at g.e. 1871 (elected to sit for former place). First returned to House of Commons for West Durham at g.e. 1867; re-elected by acclamation, and also returned for South Bruce at g.e. 1872 (elected to sit for last-named seat), for which he was again returned at g.e. 1874; re-elected by acclamation on his being apptd. to office, 2 June 1875. Sworn of the Privy Council, 7 Nov. 1873, and was a mem. of Mr. Mackenzie's Administration (without office and without salary) from that date until Feb. 1874, when he resigned. Declined the Chancellorship of Ontario, Dec. 1869, and the Chief Justiceship of the Supreme Court of the Dominion, May 1875. Apptd. Minister of Justice, 19 May 1875. Resigned, Sept. 1877, and exchanged to the portfolio of President of Council. Resigned Presidency of Council, 31 Jan. 1878, in consequence of continued ill-health. Visited England on public business, 1876. Was a candidate for South Bruce at g.e. 1878, when he was defeated. Elected to present seat, on resignation of sitting mem., Mr. Burk, 17 Nov. 1879. The following statement of Mr. Blake's political views is summarized from his speeches as a private member:—"An Independent-Liberal; believes that the basis of the franchise should be widened, and that efficiency instead of influence should be the passport to the public service; thinks political progress essential to political vitality, and advocates the fullest freedom of discussion on all topics affecting the public interests; supports the adoption of a system of proportional representation, whereby, among other improvements, the strength of the various opinions held by the people may be more nearly represented in Parliament; considers that, as the franchise is not merely a right, but a trust, the wilful neglect to vote should be followed by temporary disfranchisement; is opposed to the appointment of Senators for life by the administration, and desires their selection for a term of years by the Provinces; thinks that the future of Canada depends very largely on the development of the great North-West; advocates the construction, as rapidly as the resources of the country will permit, of the sections of the Pacific Railway necessary for communication between that country and our interior seaboard, in conjunction with an extensive scheme of exploration and colonization; believes that the cultivation of a national spirit is requisite to the success of the Union; that the present form of connection between England and Canada does not possess the element of permanence; that as the child grows into the man, so the State will come to maturity, and that (notwithstanding the enormous diffi-

culties which surround the scheme), there is a possibility and hope of reorganizing the Empire on a Federal basis, so as to reconcile British connection with British freedom."—84 *Grosvenor street, Toronto; National Club; Toronto Club; Rideau Club.*

BLANCHET, *Hon. Lieut.-Col. JOSEPH GODERIC, M.D. (Lévis).*

Family one of the first established in *La Nouvelle France*. S. of M. Louis Blanchet, of St. Pierre, Rivière du Sud. B. at St. Pierre, 7 June 1829. Ed. at the Quebec Seminary and at the St. Anne College. M. Aug. 1850, Emelie, dau. of M G. D. Balzaretti, of Milan, Italy. A physician. Is Lieut.-Col. of the 17th Batt. Volunteer Infantry, which he raised in 1863, and has since commanded. Elected Hon. Presdt. of the *Cercle de Quebec*, 1871; Presdt. of the Lévis and Kennebec Railway, 1872, and apptd. a mem. of the Catholic section of the Council of Public Instruction for the Province of Quebec, 1873. Commanded the 3rd Administrative Batt. on frontier service during the St. Alban's Raid, 1865, and was in command of the Active Militia Force on the south shore of the St. Lawrence, Quebec District, during the Fenian Raid in 1866 and again in 1870. Was Speaker of the House of Assembly of the Province of Quebec, from the meeting of the first Parliament after the Union in 1867, until the dissolution of the second Parliament, 1875. Was Mayor of the Town of Lévis for six years. An unsuccessful candidate for Lévis in Can. Assembly at g. e. 1857. Sat for Lévis in Can. Assembly from g. e. 1861 until the Union, when returned by acclamation to the House of Commons, where he continued to sit until g. e. 1874, when, in consequence of the operation of the Act respecting dual representation, he resigned his seat in that body in order to remain in the Quebec Assembly, to which he was first returned at g. e. 1867, and in which he continued (representing Lévis) up to g. e. 1875, when defeated. Returned for Bellechasse, 23 Nov. 1875, to fill the vacancy caused by the elevation of the sitting mem. to the Supreme Court of the Dominion. Re-elected for Lévis at last g. e. Elected Speaker of the House of Commons, 13 Feb. 1879. A Liberal Conservative.—*St. Joseph street, Lévis.*

BOLDUC, JOSEPH. (*Beauce*) 2ND MEM.

Is a notary, and largely engaged in agricultural pursuits. S. of the late Captain Augustin Bolduc, who was one of the earliest

settlers in the parish. B. on 22 June 1846. Ed. in St. Marie. M. at St. Francois de la Beauce, 12 Oct. 1873, M. A. G. Mathier, dau. of Jean Mathier, Esq. Is Mayor of the parish in which he resides, and Warden of the County; also a Director of the County Agricultural Association. Was elected, June 1876, a mem. of Prov. Board of Notaries for Prov. of Quebec. First returned to Parliament on 18 Oct. 1876. Re-elected at last g.e. In politics, "National."—*St. Victor de Tring, Co. Beauce, P.Q.*

BORDEN, FREDERICK WILLIAM, A.B., M.D. (*Kings, N.S.*)

S. of the late Dr. Jonathan Borden, who practised his profession in Kings, his native county, for thirty years. B. in Cornwallis, Kings, N.S., 14 May 1847. Ed. at King's College, Windsor, in Arts, where he took degree of A.B., 1866; and at Harvard Medical School, Boston, in Medicine, where he took degree of M.D., 1868. M. 1 Oct. 1873, Julia M., dau. of John H. Clarke, Esq., of Canning. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at g.e. 1874; re-elected at last g.e. A Reformer.—*Canning, N.S.*

BOULTBEE, ALFRED. (*East York.*)

Called to the Bar, U.C., Trinity Term, 1855. Practised law in Newmarket for nearly twenty-five years, and, since then, in Toronto. Took a very active part in politics and local affairs for many years. Was a Reformer, and supported the Hon. Robert Baldwin, and was much dissatisfied with the treatment of that statesman by the Grits, and gradually drew away from the party—with many other leading Reformers. Started the North York *Sentinel*, which he edited during its existence. Was Reeve of Newmarket for many years continuously. Organized the Newmarket Volunteer Company at the time of the Trent affair, being gazetted as Captain forthwith. Contested North York for the Local House with Hon. John McMurrich, in 1867, and was defeated, but carried this Riding against the same gentleman in 1871. Contested North York for the Commons with Mr. Dymond in 1875, being defeated. Carried East York at the g.e. of 1878, against the old member, Mr. Metcalfe. Took strong ground in favor of a National Policy, and the protection and encouragement of Canadian industries. A Conservative, and Political Secy. of the U.E. Club.—*Toronto, U.E. Club.*

BOURASSA, FRANCOIS, JR. (*St. Johns.*)

Eldest s. of Capt. Francois Bourassa, farmer of Montebello, P. Q.; and brother of M. Napoleon Bourassa, the well-known Can. writer and painter. B. at Lacadie, June 1813. Ed. there. M. Feb. 1832, Dlle. Sophia Trahan. An unsuccessful candidate for De Lorimer in L. C., Can., 1862. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1854 until the Union, when returned to Commons; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1872; again at g.e. 1874; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Lacadie, P. Q.*

BOURBEAU, D. O. (*Drummond and Arthabaska.*)

S. of Louis L. Bourbeau, Esq., of St. Pierre les Besquets, by Jesse Gauveseau. B. 21 Sept. 1834, at St. Pierre les Besquets. M. Miss M. B. Bouchard, of Victoriaville. First returned to Parit. 27 Oct. 1877; re-elected at last g.e. Is a Justice of the Peace; Mayor of Victoriaville; Dir. of the Arthabaska Building Society; Dir. of the Arthabaska Agricultural Society, and Chairman of the Board of School Commissioners. A Conservative, and in favor of the National Policy.—*Victoriaville, Co. of Arthabaska, P. Q.*

BOWELL, Hon. Lieut.-Col. MACKENZIE, J. P. (*North Hastings.*) P. C.

B. at Rickingham, Suffolk, Eng., 27 Dec. 1823. Came to Can. with his parents, 1833. M. Dec. 1847, Harriet Louisa, eld. dau. of the late Jacob G. Moore, Esq., of Belleville. Was a Major 49th Batt. of Volunteer Rifles, and served upon the Frontier during the American War of 1864, and in 1866 during the Fenian troubles; was Vice-Presdt. of the Dominion Editors' and Reporters' Assn.; was Vice-Presdt. of the Agricultural and Arts Association of Ontario. Was editor and proprietor of the *Belleville Daily* and *Weekly Intelligencer* newspapers for a lengthened period; and has also been President of the Ontario Press Assn. Held the Chairmanship of the Board of School Trustees, Belleville, for eleven years; and was for eight years Grand Master of the Provl. Orange Grand Lodge of Ontario East. Elected Most Worshipful Grand Master and Sovereign of the Orange Assn. of B. A., 1870, an office he continued to hold until he resigned in 1878. Was Presdt. of the Tri-Annual Council of the World. Moved the resolution for the expulsion of Louis Riel from the House of Commons, which was carried 16 April 1874. First

returned to Parl. for present seat 'at g.e. 1867; re-elected at g.e. 1872; at g.e. 1874, and last g.e. Sworn of the Privy Council, as Minister of Customs, 19 Oct. 1878. Re-elected by acclamation on accepting office. A Conservative.—*Ottawa, Rideau Club; William street, Belleville*

BRECKEN, FREDERICK DE ST. CROIX, Q.C. (*Queen's P.E.I.*)

S. of the Hon. John Brecken, who was a mem. of the Ex. and Legislative Council of P. E. Island for many years before the introduction of Responsible Govt. B. at Charlottetown, 9 Dec. 1828. Ed. at the Central Academy. M. Sept. 1858, at St. John, N.B., Helen Leith Boyd Emslie, dau. of the late Capt. Emslie, 83rd Regt. Was Attorney and Advocate-General from April 1859 to Jan. 1863; and from Sept. 1870 to April 1872 was a mem. of the Ex-Council and Atty.-Genl. Re-apptd. April 1873, and held office till Aug. 1876. First returned to the Provl. Legislature, P.E.I., for the City of Charlottetown, in 1863; was re-elected until Aug. 1876. Returned to Commons at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Kings street, Charlottetown, P.E.I.*

BROOKS, EDWARD TOOLE, M.A., Q.C. (*Sherbrooke.*)

S. of the late Samuel Brooks, Esq., who sat for Sherbrooke Co. in Can. Assembly from 1844 until his death, 1849. B. in Sherbrooke. Ed. at Darmouth College, N.H., where he graduated. M.A. M. the dau. of Eleazar Clarke, Esq., Revenue Inspector and High Constable, Sherbrooke. Called to the Bar, L.C. 1854. Created Q.C., 1875. Elected *Batonnier* of the St. Francis Bar, 1875. Vice-President of the International Railway, and also of the Waterloo and Magog Railway. Trustee of Bishop's College. President of the Sherbrooke Rifle Association. First returned to Parl. for present seat, by acclamation, at g.e. 1872; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1874 and again at last g.e. A Conservative; and, "seeing no good cause for changing his political opinions as expressed by him at his former election, so far as relates to the policy inaugurated and carried out by the Govt. of Sir John Macdonald from the time of Confederation, and under which the country was so prosperous, he will use his best endeavors to see that policy successfully carried out."—*Sherbrooke, P.Q.; Rideau Club; U. E. Club.*

BROWN, Lieut.-Col. JAMES. (*West Hastings*)

B. in Scot. 1826. Ed. in Canada. Unmarried. A mem. of the firm of G. & J. Brown, iron manufacturers, Belleville. Is Lieut.-Col. 48th Hastings Batt. V.I.; and Vice-Presdt. of the Belleville and North Hastings Railway. Has been Mayor of Belleville, and was Reeve of Hastings for six years. An unsuccessful candidate for South Hastings in Can. Assembly at g.e. 1861. First returned to Parl., for present seat, at g.e. 1867; re-elected at g.e. 1872. at g.e. 1874 and at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Great St. James street, Belleville, Ont.*

BUNSTER, Hon. ARTHUR. (*Vancouver*)

B. in Queen's Co. Irel. 1833. Ed. in Dublin. M. Miss Pratt, of New York State. A brewer, miller and farmer. Sat in the B.C. Legislature before the Union with Can., and represented Victoria in B.C. Assembly from the Union in 1871, up to Jan. 1874, when he resigned in order to contest Vancouver for the Commons, in which he was successful. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal; and will support the party that builds the Pacific Railway and carries out strictly the terms of union with B.C.—*Victoria, B.C.*

BUNTING, CHRISTOPHER WILLIAM. (*Welland*)

Only s. of William Bunting, Esq., of Amigan, County of Limerick, Ireland, by Jane, dau. of George Roberts Crowe, Esq. of Limerick, Ireland. B. at Amigan, Limerick, Ireland, Sept. 1837. Ed. in Limerick and Toronto. M. Nov. 1868, Mary Elizabeth, second dau. of Mr. James E. Ellis, of Toronto. Was connected with the Press in early life, and then entered mercantile life, and was for many years engaged in the West India trade. A successful merchant. Is proprietor and publisher of the *Mail* newspaper. First returned to Parliament at the last g.e. A Liberal Conservative and in favor of the National Policy.—*Clifton and Toronto; U.E. Club; Toronto Club; Rideau Club.*

BURNHAM JOHN. (*East Peterborough*)

First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Ashburnham, Ont.*

BURPEE, CHARLES. (*Sunbury.*)

Family removed to N.B., from Massachusetts, 1763, and were among the first English inhabitants of the Province; they settled at Sheffield, Co. Sunbury, where they have continued to reside ever since. B. at Sheffield, 18 June, 1817. Ed. there. M. Charlotte Hayward, dau. of the late Thos. Perley, Esq., of the same place. Was a mem. of the Provl. Board of Agriculture from 1864 to 1866. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1867; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1872; and again at g.e. 1874. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Sheffield, N. B.*

BURPEE, Hon. ISAAC (*St. John, N. B.*) P. C.

Descended from a Huguenot family, that, driven out of France by religious persecution about the year 1570, took refuge in England, and subsequently, in 1622, or thereabouts (religious freedom and liberty of conscience being denied them), emigrated to America, where they joined the little colony of Puritans already formed in Massachusetts Bay. In 1763, Jonathan Burpee removed from Rowley, Mass., to Maugerville, in the present Province of New Brunswick, where he left many descendants, one of whom, David Burpee, became Provost Marshal, then High Sheriff, and subsequently a Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of New Brunswick. Eld. s. of the late Isaac Burpee, Esq., of Sheffield, N.B. by Phœbe, dau. of Moses Coban, Esq. B. at Sheffield, 28 Nov. 1825. Ed. at the County Grammar School. M. 8 March 1855, Henrietta, youngest dau. of the late Thos. Robertson, Esq., of Sheffield, Eng. Removed to St. John in 1848, shortly afterwards entering into partnership in the hardware trade, with his brother Frederick, under the name and style of I. and F. Burpee, and subsequently with another brother, John P. C. Burpee, from which firm, however, he retired on his appointment to office. While a merchant of St. John, took an active part in having manufactories established to provide employment for the surplus population of the city; and he was also one of the leaders of the movement which secured for the town of Portland an act of incorporation, thereby doing away with the old system of irresponsible life magistrates, and placing the administration of civic affairs under the control of the people. Of the new Town Council he was elected Chairman, an office he continued to hold for several years. Is a dir. of the Confederation Life Assn, of the Victoria Coal Mining Co., and of the N. B. Deaf and Dumb Institution, Treasurer of the

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St. John Industrial School; a mem. of the Ex. Council of the Congregational Union of N.B. and N.S., and Vice-Presdt. of the Evangelical Alliance of N.B. Sworn of the Privy Council and apptd. Minister of Customs, 7 Nov. 1874. First returned to Parl. for present seat at g.e. 1872. Re-elected at g.e. 1874, and again by acclamation on his appt. to office. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—“*Belleville*,” *St. John, N. B.*; *Rideau Club*.

CAMERON, HECTOR, Q.C., M.A. (*North Victoria*) 3RD MEM.

Descended from the Glen Dessery branch of the Clan Cameron, of Inverness-shire, Scot. Only surviving s. of the late Asst. Commissary Genl., Kenneth Cameron; and nephew of the late John Cameron, Esq., who represented Victoria in Can. Assembly from 1857 to 1861. B. in Montreal, 3 June 1832. Ed. at King's College London, Eng., and at Trinity College, Dublin, where he graduated B.A. 1851. Afterwards took degree of M.A. at University of Toronto. M. Aug. 1860, eld. dau. of Wm. Boswell, Esq., barrister-at-law; and grand-dau. of Capt. Hon. W. Boswell, R.N. Called to the Bar, Ont., Easter Term 1854. Created a Q.C. 1872. Unsuccessfully contested South Victoria at g.e. 1867, and North Victoria at g.e. 1874, both for House of Commons. Was again a candidate for latter seat, 10 Nov. 1874, on the sitting mem. (Mr. Maclellan) being unseated, when the latter was returned, but being again unseated, 4 May 1875, Mr. Cameron was declared the sitting mem. on a scrutiny of votes. Re-elected at last g.e.—*Toronto*; *Toronto Club*; *U.E. Club*.

CAMERON, MALCOLM COLIN. (*South Huron*.)

B. in Perth, Co. Lanark, Can. Ed. at Knox College, Toronto. M. May 1853, Jane W. dau. of Dr. John McLean, formerly of the Royal Navy. Called to the Bar, U.C. Easter Term, 1860. Has been Mayor of Goderich. First returned to Parl., for present seat, at g.e. 1867; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal; opposed to the present Govt.—*Goderich, Ont.*

CARLING, Hon. JOHN. (*London*.)

Youngest s. of Thomas Carling, Esq., of London, Ont., a native of Yorkshire, England, who came to Canada in 1818, and settled in Middlesex, Ont., 1819. B. in the Township of London, Middlesex,

23 Jan. 1828. M. Hannah, eldest dau. of the late Henry Dalton, Esq., of London, Ont. A mem. of the firm of Carling & Co., brewers, London. Was returned as mem. for London to the Can. Assembly, 18 Dec. 1857, and held the seat continuously from that time until Confederation, when he was re-elected in Aug. 1867 for the House of Commons, and held the seat up to the g.e. of 1874, was also returned for the Local House in 1867, holding the portfolio of Minister of Agriculture and Public Works in the Sandfield-Macdonald Govt. from July 1867, until Dec. 1871, when the Govt. was defeated and retired from office. Was Receiver-General in the old Govt. of Can. in 1862. Re-elected to Commons at last g.e. Was a dir. of the Great Western Railway for a number of years, and also a dir. of the London, Huron & Bruce and London & Port Stanley Railways. Elected a Water Commr. for London in 1878, and subsequently appointed Chairman of the Board. Liberal Conservative.—*London, Ont.*

CARON, JOSEPH PHILIPPE RENÉ ADOLPHE, *B. C. L., Q. C.* (*Quebec County*)

Eld. surviving s. of the late Hon. R. E. Caron, Lieut.-Governor of the Province of Quebec. B. in the city of Quebec, 1843. Ed. at the Seminary of Quebec, at Laval University, and at McGill University, at which latter institution he graduated B. C. L., 1865. M. 25 June 1865, Alice, only dau. of the late Hon. Francois Baby, who represented Stadacona division in L. C. of Can. for several years. Studied law with L. G. Baillarge, Esq., Q. C., and subsequently with Hon. [now Sir] John Rose, Bart., and was called to the Bar, L. C. 1865. Is a mem. of the extensive law firm of Andrews, Caron & Andrews, Quebec. A dir. of the Stadacona Bank of Quebec; of the Anticosti Co.; and of the Coldbrook Rolling Mills Co. Was Vice-President of the Literary and Historical Society of Quebec, 1867. An unsuccessful candidate for Bellechasse at g.e. 1872. First returned to Parliament for present seat, March 1873; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1874 and again returned at last g.e. Created Q. C. 1876. A Liberal Conservative, and "intends following the same course in the future as he has in the past; will not vote blindly with any particular clique, but will give a loyal support to all measures which he shall consider good and likely to consolidate the Confederation, to develop the resources of our country, and to protect our institutions."—*Charlevoix street, U. T., Quebec; Stadacona Club; Rideau Club.*

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CARTWRIGHT, *Hon. Sir* RICHARD JOHN. (*Centre Huron.*) P. C.

S. of the late Rev. R. D. Cartwright, Chaplain to the Forces at Kingston; and grands. of Hon. Richard Cartwright, a U.E. Loyalist, who was a member of the first Parliament of U.C., which met in 1792, and continued to hold a seat in that body until his death, 1815. B. 4 Dec. 1835. M. August 1859, Frances, eld. dau. of late Col. Alex. Lawe, H. E. I. C. S. A dir. of the Canada Life Assurance Co. Was Presdt. of the late Commercial Bank of Can. Author of a pamphlet on the Militia question, (1864) Sworn of the Privy Council and apptd. Minister of Finance of Can. 7 Nov. 1873, which position he held until the resignation of Mr. Mackenzie's Administration, Oct. 1878. Proceeded to England on public business, 1874 and 1875, and again in 1876. Sat for Lennox and Addington in Can. Assembly from 1863 until the Union. Returned to Commons for Lennox at g.e. 1867; again at g.e. 1872; again on his appt. to office, and by acclamation at g.e. 1874. Returned for present seat on resignation of Mr. Horton, the sitting mem., 2 Nov. 1878. An Independent Conservative.—*King street, Kingston, Ont.; Rideau Club.*

CASEY, GEORGE ELLIOTT, B. A. (*West Elgin.*)

S. of the late William Casey, Esq., of Southwold, Elgin, Ont., and formerly of Westmeath, Ireland, by Sarah, dau. of the late George Elliott, Esq., a native of Omagh, Irel., who came to Elgin, then a portion of the Talbot Settlement, 1817, and took a prominent part in local affairs. B. in Southwold, March 1850. Ed. at the Grammar School, St. Thomas, and at the Univ. of Toronto, where he graduated (with honors in classics), June 1871. Passed matriculation of Law Society of Toronto, Feb. 1872. M. 27 Dec. 1877, Sarah Isabella, dau. of Jas. L. Biggar, Esq., M.P. First returned to Parl. for present seat at g.e. 1872; re-elected at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. A Reformer. In favor of the reorganization of the Senate on Mr. Mills' plan, and of the introduction of competitive examinations as a means of choosing Civil Servants. Moved for a Committee on the condition of the Service in 1877, which reported in favor of the competitive principle. Introduced Bills in 1878 and 1879 based on this report, the latter of which was withdrawn on the Govt. promising to deal with the subject; also in 1879 a Bill to amend the Election Law in regard to general treating, and the validity of ballots irregularly marked or dealt with.—*Fingal, Ont.*

CASGRAIN, PHILIPPE BABY. (*L'Islet.*)

Descended from an ancient French family, originally belonging to Airvault in Poitou, mems. of which came here in the early years of French settlement in Can., served in the French army, and became possessed of the Seigniories of La Bouteill rie, St. Denis, and L'Islet de Bonsecours. S. of the late Hon. Charles Eusebe Casgrain, who sat for Cornwallis in L. C. Assembly from 1830 to 1834; was a mem. of the Special Council of L. C. from 1838 to 1840, and at his death held the office of Asst. Commr. of Public Works, Can., by Anne Elizabeth, dau. of the late Hon. James Baby, at one time Speaker of the L. C. of U. C. B. in the City of Quebec 1827. Ed. at St. Anne College. M. 1854, Matilde, dau. of the late Col. Perrault, and grand-dau. of the late F. X. Perrault, Esq., for many years Prothonotary of Dist. of Quebec. Called to the Bar, L. C. 1850. Was Deputy Prothonotary of Superior Court, Quebec, for thirteen years up to 1873, when he resigned to enter Parlt. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g. e. 1872; re-elected by acclamation at g. e. 1874, and again at last g. e., against the local candidate. A Liberal in the true English sense; favors Political Independence, unless the Colonies have a more direct influence in the Councils of the British Empire.—4 *Collins street, Quebec.*

CHANDLER, EDMUND LEAVENS. (*Brome.*)

Third s. of Horace M. Chandler, of St. Armand, P. Q., by Lydia Leavens, of Berkshire, Vt., and grand-s. of the late Daniel Chandler, of Hartford, Conn. B. at Frelighsburg, P. Q., 21 Dec. 1829. Ed. in the P. of Q. and State of Vt. M. 9 April 1860, at Enosburg, State of Vt., to Miss Jennie A. Darling. Elected School Commr. for Brome, July 1856, acting as Presdt. for six years. Elected Sec.-Treas. for the Co. of Brome in Dec. 1855, and continued to hold said office for about twelve years; then elected as Municipal Councillor, which office he now holds. Served as Mayor of Brome four terms and Warden two terms. Elected Dir. and Sec.-Treas. of the South Eastern Railway in 1867, resigning the latter office in 1878, but still acting as Dir. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal.—*Brome, Co. of Brome, P. Q.*

CHARLTON, JOHN. (*North Norfolk.*)

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3 Feb. 1829. Ed. in N.Y. Came to Can. with his family 1849, from Cattaraugus Co., N.Y. Engaged in business at Lynedoch, Co. Norfolk, in 1853, and has continued to reside there. M. Nov. 1854 in Can., Miss Ella Gray. A timber dealer, and engaged in business in Can. and Michigan. First returned to Parl. for present seat at g.e. 1872; re-elected at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Lynedoch, Ont.*

CIMON, ERNEST. (*Chicoutimi and Saguenay.*)

S. of Cleophe Cimon, N.P., who represented Charlevoix in the Can. Assembly from 1858 to 1861. B. at Murray Bay, P.Q. 30 March 1849. Ed. at the Seminary of Quebec and at Laval University, where he became a Licentiate of Law, 1871. Unmarried. Studied law with Mr. M. A. Hearn, and with Messrs. Langlois, Angers & Colston, of Quebec, and was called to the Bar of Quebec, 1871. Has acted as Crown Prosecutor in Chicoutimi for several years. First returned to Parl. for present seat at g.e. 1874; re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Chicoutimi, P.Q.*

COCKBURN, ALEXANDER PETER. (*Muskoka.*)

Of Scottish parentage. B. in Finch, Stormont, Ont., 7 April 1837. Ed. there. M. Sept. 1864, Miss Mary Helen Proctor, of Beaverton, Ont. A merchant and forwarder. Has been Reeve of Eldon. Sat for North Victoria in Ont. Assembly from g.e. 1867, until g.e. 1871, when he declined offering, being satisfied with having aided, while there, in the development of a comparatively liberal land and railway policy for the Province, and also because he was not fully in accord with the leader of either of the two parties in the Assembly. Elected for present seat in House of Commons at g.e. 1872, but not returned until writ was amended by resolution of the House, March 1873; re-elected at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. Has labored successfully to promote a vigorous policy for the development of the great northern districts by the construction of railways and colonization roads, in conjunction with a liberal land policy for actual settlers. He has written largely on the subject from 1865 up to present time: *A Few Weeks in the North* (for which he was specially complimented by the late Hon. T. D. McGee); the *Settler's Guide* (1858); and the *Tourist's Guide* (1868), being amongst his productions. Was Presd. of the Muskoka Settlers Assn., which he founded 1867; and is now

Manager of the Northern Lakes Navigation Co. A Liberal.—40
Duke street, Toronto.

COCKBURN, *Hon. JAMES, Q.C.* (*West Northumberland.*)

S. of James Cockburn, Esq., by Miss Sarah Turnbull, both of Berwick-on-Tweed, Eng. B. near Berwick, 13 Feb. 1819. Ed. at Berwick Grammar School and Upper Canada College. M. Isabel, dau. of Capt. Paterson, late of the 85th Regt. (she d. 1862). Called to the Bar, W.C., in Michaelmas Term, 1846. Created Q.C. 1863. Is a Bencher *ex-officio* of the U.C. Law Society Osgoode Hall; was appointed Solicitor-General U.C. and member of the Cabinet in March 1864, and so continued till the Union of 1867; was elected for West Northumberland at the g.e. in 1861, when he defeated the Hon. Sidney Smith, then Postmaster-General. Parliament having been dissolved, under the Macdonald-Sicotte Administration, was re-elected for the same constituency by acclamation. On accepting office in March 1864, was re-elected by a large majority. In July 1867, was elected for same constituency by acclamation for the first Parliament of the Dominion. Was again elected by acclamation in 1872. At the g.e. in 1874 was defeated. At the g.e. in 1878, was elected for same constituency after a contest. In Nov. 1867 was unanimously elected first Speaker of the House of Commons. In February 1872 was unanimously chosen Speaker of the second Parliament. Was a Member of the Quebec Confederation Conference in 1864. A Liberal-Conservative.—*Ottawa, Ont.; Rideau Club.*

COLBY, CHARLES CARROLL. (*Stanstead.*)

Paternal ancestors emigrated from Chester, Eng., to New Hampshire, before the Am. revolutionary war. S. of the late Dr. F. M. Colby, a well-known medical practitioner, who came to Stanstead. 1832, and represented that county in L.C. Assembly from 1834 until the suspension of the Constitution, 1837. B. at Derby, Vt., 10 Dec. 1827. Came to Can. with his parents, 1832. Graduated at Dartmouth College, N.H., July 1847. M. Dec. 1858, Miss Harriet Child, of Waybridge, Vt. (called to the Bar. L.C., 1855. A dir. of the Massawippi Railway; of the Crown Mining Co.; and of the Waterloo and Magog Railway. Was a Vice-Presdt. of Quebec Temperance and Prohibitory League, 1872. First returned to Parl. for present seat at g.e. 1867; re-elected by acclamation at

g. e. 1872, and again at g. e. 1874; re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Stanstead, P. Q.*

CONNELL, GEORGE HEBER. (*Carleton, N. B.*)

Grand-parents removed to this locality from the U. S. at the time of the Am. Revolution. S. of late Hon. Charles Connell, representative of this county from Confederation up to his death in 1873. B. at Woodstock, in the County of Carleton. Ed. at the St. John Grammar School. M. in 1857, at Digby, N. S., to Isabel, dau. of John Barnaby, Esq., Digby, N. S. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. Independent as regards parties, but favors moderate protection.—*Woodstock, Carleton Co., N. B.*

COSTIGAN, JOHN, J. P. (*Victoria, N. B.*)

B. at St. Nicholas, P. Q., 1 Feb. 1835. Ed. at St. Ann's College. M. 1855, Miss Ryan, of Victoria, N. B. Has been Registrar of Deeds for Victoria, and Judge of the Superior Court of Common Pleas, N. B. Sat for present seat in N. B. Assembly from 1861 to 1866, when defeated. Returned to Commons at the Union; re-elected at g. e. 1872; again at g. e. 1874, and again at last g. e. A Conservative. Moved an address, 20 May 1872, praying His Excellency to disallow the N. B. School Act on the ground that said law is unjust, and causes much uneasiness among the Roman Catholic population; and on 14 May 1873, "that the Govt. should advise His Excellency to disallow the Acts passed by the N. B. Legislature," which was carried. On 6 May 1874, moved for an address to Her Majesty, praying to cause an Act to be passed amending the B. N. A. Act, 1867, by providing that every religious denomination in N. B. shall continue to possess and enjoy all such rights with regard to their schools as they possessed and enjoyed at the time of the passage of the said Act, &c., which motion was subsequently withdrawn. On 8 March 1875, moved resolution praying for the passage of an Act amending the B. N. A. Act, by providing that the Roman Catholic inhabitants of N. B. shall have the same rights, privileges, &c., as to separate or dissential schools, &c., as are enjoyed and possessed by the Roman Catholic minority of Ontario and the Protestant minority of Quebec, which, after amendment, was carried. In session of 1877 moved for an enquiry into the case of Professor O'Donohue, charged with having aided in the North-West Rebellion.—*Grand Falls, N. B.*

COUGHLIN, TIMOTHY. (*North Middlesex.*)

S. of Daniel Coughlin, of the Co. of Cork, Ireland, who emigrated to Can. in 1832, and settled in the Township of Yarmouth, Co. Elgin, and from there removed to the Township of Stephen, Co. Huron, in 1846, where he still resides. B. in Township of Yarmouth, Co. Elgin, 8 Jan. 1834. Ed. in the Common School of the Townships of Yarmouth and Westminster. M. 22 May 1870, Mary Ann, dau. of Michael Glavin, of the Township of Biddulph, Co. Middlesex. Was Township Treasurer of Stephens for 15 years, and is now Reeve of same Township. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Offa, P.O., Co. Huron, Ont.*

COUPAL DE ST. CYPRIEN, SIXTE, J.P. (*Napierville.*) 3RD MEM.

B. in Province of Quebec. A farmer. Has been Mayor of the municipality, and a School Commr. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat in Can. Assembly, 1862, and for same seat in Commons at g.e. 1872 and g.e. 1874. Represented Napierville in Can. Assembly from g.e. 1863 until the Union, when he was returned to Commons, where he sat until g.e. 1872. Again returned 4 Aug. 1874, on resignation of sitting mem.; unseated on petition, 7 May 1875; re-elected 18 June 1875. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Lacolle, P.Q.*

COURSOL, MICHEL JOSEPH CHARLES, Q.C. (*Montreal East.*)

S. of the late M. Michel Coursol, an officer in the Hudson Bay Company, by Marie Mélanie, daughter of M. Joseph Quesnel, the well-known Canadian poet and dramatist. B. at Amherstburg, Ont., 3 Oct. 1819. Ed. at the Montreal College. M. the dau. of the late Hon. Sir Etienne Taché, who was on two occasions Prime Minister of Canada. Studied law with C. S. Cherrier, Esq., Q.C., who subsequently became his step-father, and was called to the Bar 1841; created a Q.C. 1873; appointed Joint Coroner for the District of Montreal, 30 June 1848; Inspector and Superintendent of Police for City of Montreal, 2 Feb. 1856; Judge of the Sessions of the Peace for Montreal, 1870; a Commissioner under 31 Vic., cap. 94, 23 Nov. 1869; and Commissioner of Police for the Dominion, same date. Was a Commissioner appointed to enquire into the state of the Montreal Registry Office, 23 April 1850; and has held the office of Mayor of Montreal. Created a Knight of the Order of

Charles III., of Spain, 1872. Resigned Judgeship Sept. 1878, in order to contest Montreal East for the Commons, in which he was successful, being elected by a majority of 1,392. A Conservative.—“*Souvenir*,” *Dorchester street West, Montreal*.

CURRIER, JOSEPH MERRILL. (*City of Ottawa*.)

Of French descent. Seventh and youngest s. of the late Ezekiel Currier, Esq., of North Troy, Vermont, near Canada line. B. 1820. Ed. at North Troy. M. 1st, 1846, Christina, dau. of the late John Wilson, Esq., of Cumberland, Ont. (she d.); 2nd, 1861, Annie, dau. of F. G. Crosby, Esq. (accidentally killed at Long Island a few days afterwards); 3rd, 1868, Hannah, dau. of the late Ruggles Wright, Esq., of Hull, P.Q. Came to Can. 1837, and was for many years engaged in the lumber trade; had charge for several years of the extensive lumber mills of the late L. C. Bigelow, at Buckingham, P.Q., and afterwards of the lumber business of Messrs. McKay and McKinnon, New Edinburgh, Ont. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from g.e. 1863 until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e. 1867; by acclamation, at g.e. 1872; again returned at g.e. 1874. In April, 1877, resigned his seat in consequence of an infringement of the Independence of Parlt. Act; re-elected May, same year. Again re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Gorphwysfa, New Edinburgh; Rideau Club*.

CUTHBERT, EDWARD OCTAVIAN. (*Berthier*.) 2ND MEM.

Descended from the Cuthberts of Castle Hill, Inverness-shire, Scot. Only surviving s. of the late Hon. James Cuthbert, a mem. of the Special Council of L.C., by Louise A. Cairns, his wife. B. at the Manor House, Berthier (*en haut*), P.Q., 3 Dec. 1826. Ed. at Chambly College. M. 1 Dec. 1853, Mary, eld. dau. of the late Augustus Bostwick, Esq., Q.C., of Three Rivers. Is Seigneur of Berthier. Has been Mayor of the town of Berthier, and Presdt. of the County Agricultural Society. An unsuccessful candidate for Berthier in Quebec Assembly at g.e. 1867. First returned for present seat, 27 Feb. 1875, on the elevation of sitting mem. to the Senate. Re-elected at last g.e. An Independent Conservative.—*Berthier (en haut), P.Q.*

DALY, MALACHY BOWES. (*Halifax*.)

S of Sir Dominic Daly, who belonged to an old Irish family, Co. Galway, and who was afterwards, for 25 years, Col. Secy., and

represented Megantic in the Can. Legislature; also Lieut.-Gov. of Tobago, and subsequently of P.E.I., and Gov.-in-Chief of S. Australia, by Caroline Maria, dau. of Col. Gore, of Barrowmount, Co. Kilkenny, Irel. B. at Marchmount, near Quebec, 6 Feb. 1836. Ed. at St. Mary's College, Oscott, near Birmingham, Eng. M. at Halifax. 4 July 1859, to Joanna, 2nd dau. of Sir Edward Kenny, of Halifax, formerly a member of Sir John A. Macdonald's Ministry. Barrister-at-Law. Was Private Secy. to Sir D. Daly, Gov. of P.E.I., for six years; also, Private Secy. to Sir R. G. MacDonnell, Gov. of N.S., and Sir Hastings Doyle; also, Provl. A.D.C. to Sir W. Fenwick Williams, Gov. of N.S. Was for two successive years Presdt. of the Charitable Irish Society, of Halifax, and is at present Presdt. of the General Council of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul of Halifax. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative. —18 *Kent street, Halifax, N.S.*

DAOUST, JEAN BAPTISTE. (*Two Mountains*.)

S. of J. B. Daoust, Esq., by L. St. Germain. B. 18 Jan. 1817, at St. Eustache. M. Miss Z. St. Maurice, dau. of J. St. Maurice, Esq., of St. Laurent. Apptd. Magistrate and Commr. of Small Causes, and has held various municipal offices. Elected by acclamation in 1854 for Two Mountains to the old Parl. of Can., which seat he held from that date until the Confederation of B.N.A. Provinces, in 1867, when he was elected to the Commons by acclamation, and continued to hold the seat until 1872, when he retired for a short time from political life. Held the position of Warden of Penitentiaries of the Prov. of Quebec for three years. At g.e. for P.Q. 1867, waived his claim for a seat in the Local House in favor of the then Atty.-Gen. of that Prov., Hon. Mr. Ouimet. Re-elected to the House of Commons, 11 March 1876, by acclamation, on the resignation of Mr. Globensky, the sitting mem. Again re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative. —*St Eustache.*

DAWSON, SIMON JAMES, C E. (*Algoma*.)

Connected on both father's and mother's side with old historic Scotch families; maternal grandfather for a long period heir presumptive to the honors of the ancient house of Glengarry. B. in Scot. Ed. there. Came to Canada when young. Unmarried. A Civil Engineer. Apptd., 1851, to plan and superintend the construction of extensive works then contemplated on the St. Maurice,

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to open up the vast pine regions of that river and its tributaries, which had been previously almost inaccessible to the lumber trade, which works he carried out successfully. Apptd., 1857, to explore the country from Lake Superior to the Saskatchewan, and report upon its adaptability for settlement, and the practicability of opening up communications therewith. Resigned the office after completing his reports, and carried on business for some years as a timber merchant on the St. Maurice. In 1863 called upon to commence the construction of the route to Red River, now known as the "Dawson Route;" and, in 1870, although but little had comparatively been done, owing to the limited means appropriated therefor, put through the Red River expeditionary force under Col. (now Lt.-Gen. Sir) Garnet Wolsely, when all other means of reaching the country to subdue the insurrection had proved unavailing. Was joint commissioner, with the Lt.-Gov. of Manitoba and the Indian Commr. of the North-West, in concluding a treaty with the Saulteux tribe of the Ojibbeway Indians, 1873. Resigned charge of the Dawson Route on becoming a candidate for the constituency of Algoma, for which he was returned at g.e. for Ont. 1875. Resigned his seat in the Local Legislature, and was returned for the Commons at last g.e. (1878), defeating his opponent, Col. Arthur Rankin, who came out in the Reform interest. Independent in politics. A strong advocate of the immediate construction of the section of the Pacific Railway reaching from Lake Superior to Manitoba. Has stated in the Legislature of Ont. that, in his opinion, it would be to the advantage of the Dominion that the great central region known as Algoma, extending from the 81st to the 95th meridian, that is, from French River to the Lake of the Woods, should be formed into a separate Province.—*Thunder Bay, Algoma; Queen's Hotel, Toronto; Toronto Club.*

DE COSMOS, Hon. AMOR. (Victoria, B.C.)

B. at Windsor, N.S. Ed. there and in Halifax. Unmarried. Went to California, 1852; and to B.C. 1858, where he has since remained. Founded the *British Colonist*, newspaper, 1858, which he owned and edited from that date until 1863; founded the *Daily Standard* (same city) for political purposes, 1870; and was editor and proprietor of it until 1872, when he retired from the proprietorship. Has been actively engaged in politics since 1858. Called upon to form an Administration in B.C., 23 Dec. 1872, a duty he succeeded in accomplishing, and in which he held the office of

Presdt. of Ex. Council (without salary), from the date of the Govt's formation until he retired, Feb. 1874, from local politics, owing to the operation of the Act against dual representation. Was special agent and delegate to Ottawa and London, respecting the B.C. Graving Dock and Loan, 1873-4. Mr. De C. was the first British Columbian to advocate the introduction of responsible govt. into that Colony; he was the first person to recommend a Union of the Pacific Provinces, which he succeeded in accomplishing, 1867; and was also the first to advocate the Confederation of B.C. with the Dominion, and was subsequently instrumental in securing the unanimous acceptance of the terms of Union made with Can. Represented Victoria in V.I. Assembly, after the Union of V.I. with B.C. Sat in the L.C. almost uninterruptedly from 1867 to 1871; at the Union of B.C. with Can., was returned to both the Assembly and the House of Commons; re-elected to Commons at g.e. 1872, at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e.—*Victoria, B.C.*

DESAULNIERS, LOUIS LÉON L., M.D. (*St. Maurice.*)

Descended from Charles Lesieur, Notary Royal and Solicitor-General under the French Govt., and of Francoise-de-Lafond, niece of Pierre Boucher, Governor of Three Rivers. Grandfather was the first Deputy of the Co. of St. Maurice in 1791. Father was also Deputy of the same Co. before the insurrection of 1837, and after the Union of the two Canadas. B. at Yamachiche, Q., 1823. Ed. at Nicolet Seminary. M. Della Flora Josephine Merrill. A. graduate M.D. of Harvard University, Boston. Lieut.-Col. V.M., Co. of St. Maurice, and Justice of the Peace for P.Q. Was elected for present seat in Can. Assembly at g.e. 1854-57, and 1861-67. Resigned in 1868 to accept the position of Inspector of Prisons and Asylums for P.Q. Elected to Commons at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Montreal.*

DESJAUDINS, T. C. ALPHONSE. (*Haïphelaga.*)

Family settled in Can. before the cession to Eng. B. at Terrebonne, P.Q., 6 May 1841. Ed. at Masson College and the Seminary of Nicolet. M. 19 May 1864, Virginie, eld. dau. of the late Hubert Paré, Esq. (she d. Feb. 15, 1879). Called to the Bar L. C. 1863, and practised his profession in Montreal until 1868, when he abandoned law for journalism, and became one of the editors of *L'Ordre*. Was for some years chief editor and one of the directors of *Le Nouveau*

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Monde. Retired from journalism in Sept. 1879. President of the Jacques Cartier Bank. Created a Knight of the Order of Pius IX., 30 July 1872, after his return from a visit to Rome, where he had the honor of being admitted to an audience with His Holiness. Took an active part in the organization of the Canadian Papal Zouave contingent, which went to the assistance of the Holy Father, 1868. Was one of the authors of the *Programme Catholique*, first published, April 1871, which was prepared for the purpose of being offered to the Conservative Party as a basis on which the several opposing sections of that Party, then engaged in a warm contest, might agree. First returned to Parl. for present seat by acclamation at g.e. 1874. Re-elected at last g.e. An Independent Conservative.—*Place Souigny, St. Charles Borromé: street, Montreal; Rideau Club*.

DOMVILLE, JAMES. (*Kings, N.B.*)

S. of Major-General James Domville, R.A., by Frances, dau. of Hon. William Usher. B. 29 Nov. 1842. Ed. in Eng. M. 1867; Isabel, dau. of the late William Henry Scovil, Esq., of St. John, N.B. A merchant and manufacturer. Major 8th Regt. Cavalry. Sat as Chairman of the delegation from St. John, N.B., at Dominion Board of Trade, Ottawa, 1871. First returned to Parl. for present seat at g.e. 1872; re-elected at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Wellington Row, St. John, N.B.; Kinghurst, Rothesay, King's Co., N.B.; Rideau Club; St. James' Club; U.E. Club; Hanover Square Club, London, Eng.*

DOULL, ROBERT, J.P. (*Pictou*)

Third s. of John Doull, merchant, by Jane Craig, both of Wick, who emigrated to this country in 1828. B. in Wick, Caithnessshire, Scot., in 1828. Ed. at Pictou Academy. M. in 1852 at Pictou, Janet Crichton, dau. of James Crichton, Eng.; grand-dau. of the late Hon. David Crichton, M.L.C. She died in 1869. A Lieut.-Col. of Militia. Was Treas. of Co. Pictou for 15 years. Represented Oddfellows of the Maritime Provinces at meeting of Grand Lodge at San Francisco, 1869. A Dir. of the Pictou Bank. Sat for Pictou in House of Commons from 1872 until 1874. Defeated at g.e. in 1874 by one vote. Again returned at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative and in favor of the N.F.—*Pictou, N.S.*

DREW, GEORGE ALEXANDER. (*North Wellington.*)

S. of John Drew and Margaret McKay. Great grand-s. of a Highland Scotch U. E. Loyalist. B. 21st Feb. 1826 in Co. Glengarry, Ont. Ed. at Grammar School at Williamstown and Cornwall. M. 1st, 6th May 1856, Elizabeth Mary, eldest dau. of the late John Jacob, of Post de Grave, Newfoundland, (she d.); 2nd, 6 July 1865, Marie Louise, second dau. of the said John Jacob. Studied law under the late Hon. John Sandfield Macdonald. Called to the Bar 1854, and apptd. Queen's Counsel 18 Dec. 1872. First elected to Parlt. for North Wellington at g. e. 1867. Defeated at g. e. 1872, and again in 1874 by a majority of 6. On his opponent, Col. Higinbotham being unseated on petition, again contested seat and was defeated by a majority of 3. Re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative and always a supporter of Sir John A. Macdonald and his Governments. In favor of a national policy and the early completion of a thorough Pacific Railway—*Elora, Ont.*

DUGAS, FERMIN. (*Montcalm*)

S. of the late Lieut.-Col. Philémon Dugas, who emigrated from the U. S. to Canada in 1816, and was one of the first settlers of the Township of Rawdon, Co. Montcalm, P. Q. B. at Rawdon, 1839. Ed. at L'Assomption College. M. 1st, 1851, Miss Adeline Pominville, (she d. 22 June 1859); 2d Miss Mary Ann Reinhardt, (she d. 24 July 1871); 3d Mary Anastacea, relict of the late James Daly, Esq. A mill-owner. Has been Mayor of the Municipality and Presdt. of the School Commissioners. First returned to Quebec Legislature in 1867; re-elected by acclamation at g. e. for the same seat in 1871. First returned to the House of Commons in 1871, and re-elected by acclamation in 1872, 1874 and 1878. A Conservative. Was in favor of a general amnesty for political offences in Manitoba, and of a just settlement of the N. B. School question. Is in favor of a moderate protective tariff for the development of the industries of the country—*Montcalm Village, P. Q.*

DUMONT, JOSEPH. (*Kamouraska.*)

First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal.—*St. Andre, Q.*

ELLIOTT, WILLIAM. (*Peel*.)

Eld. s. of William Elliott and Frances Hamilton, who came from the Co. Fermanagh, Irel. B. in Toronto Township, April 21 1837, where he still resides. M. Miss Ann Jane Jackson, eld. dau. of John H. Jackson, Esq., of Trafalgar Township, Halton Co., 1863. Was a mem. of the Toronto Township Council for seven years, four of which he held the position of Deputy Reeve, and one year that of Reeve. In 1874 was nominated for the Commons to represent Peel Co., being defeated by 14 votes. Carries on a large mercantile business and farms 300 acres of land. First elected to Parlt. at last g.e. A supporter of Sir John Macdonald and the National Policy.—*Meadowdale, Ont.*

FARROW THOMAS. (*North Huron*)

S. of Martin and Sabina Farrow, both of Lincolnshire, Eng. B. in the parish of Mumby, Lincoln, Eng., 8 March 1833. Ed. there. Came to Can. 1849. M. 1858, Miss Mary McDonald of London, Ont. (she d. 26 July 1874). Was for some years Supt. of Schools for Wawanosh, Morris and Turnberry. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1872; re-elected at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. Decidedly a Liberal Conservative. Believes in a protective policy, and is in favor of a stringent liquor law, the development of the resources of the country from east to west, a liberal land policy, inducements to emigrants, and the nursing of our home manufacturing interests.—*Bluevale, Ont.*

FERGUSON, CHARLES FREDERICK, M.D. (*North Leeds and Grenville*.)
2ND MEM.

Family from Drumgunnion, Leitrim, Irel. S. of Mr. Robert Ferguson, of the Tp. of Kitley, Leeds, Ont. B. there. Graduated as M.D. at Queen's University, Kingston, 1859. M. Miss Bell, of Oxford, Co.—Grenville, sister of the late Robert Bell, Esq., C.E., who represented Russell in the Can. Assembly previous to Confederation. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1874. Unseated on petition 10 Nov. 1874; re-elected 16 Dec. same year; again re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Kemptville, Ont.*

FIBET, JEAN BAPTISTE ROMUALD, *M. D.* (*Rimouski*)

S. of Henri Fiset, Esq., J.P., of St. Cuthbert, P.Q. B. there, 7 Feb. 1842. Ed. at Montreal College; graduated as M.D. at Laval University, 1867. M. Amée, dau. of Honore Plamondon, Esq., of Quebec, and niece of the Hon. Justice Plamondon, of Arthabaskaville, P.Q. Is a Town Councillor of Rimouski, and Surgeon, Provisional Batt. Rimouski Militia. An unsuccessful candidate for Rimouski in Quebec Assembly, April 1872. First returned to Parl. for present seat at g.e. 1872; re-elected at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. A Liberal.—*St. Germain de Rimouski, P.Q.*

FITZSIMMONS, WILLIAM. (*Brockville.*)

S. of the late Mr. Robert Fitzsimmons, a native of the County Leitrim, Irel. (9th Light Dragoons), who served in Spain and Portugal during the Peninsular War, and retired after fifteen years active service. (He came to Canada in 1823, and settled in Perth, County Lanark; removed to Brockville in 1851, and died in 1861, at the advanced age of ninety-five years.) B. in the Co. Donegal, Ireland. Came to Canada with his parents in 1823. Ed. at the Perth District Grammar School. M. at Kingston 1839, Miss Ann Taylor (she died in 1872). Settled in Brockville in 1841, where he has successfully carried on his business as a contractor and builder. Has been a director of the Brockville Mechanics' Institute for several years, and President for three years. Served on the Board of School Trustees for eleven years. Was a member of the Town Council for five years. Is a director of C.C.R., and was Mayor of Brockville for eight years, six of which he was returned by acclamation. Sat for Brockville in the Ontario Assembly from the g.e. 1867 up to 1871. Again re-elected at the g.e. in 1871. An unsuccessful candidate for the Ontario Assembly at the election in 1875, the constituency having been changed, two townships (front and rear of Yonge) having been taken from the South Riding of Leeds and attached to Brockville. Although unsuccessful, he polled a large vote, and had a majority in his old constituency of 114. Returned for Brockville to the House of Commons at the last g.e. A Conservative, and in favor of encouraging our agricultural and manufacturing industries, feeling satisfied that upon these, in a great measure, depend the prosperity of our country; and will support such measures as are calculated to bind more closely the ties which

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unite us to the Mother Country, and to sustain British connection.

FLEMING, GAVIN, J.P. (*North Brant.*)

S. of the late Mr. John Fleming, by Margaret Dobbie, both of whom came to Can. from Scot. 1831. B. at the farm of Shieldhill, near Falkirk, Shropshire, Scot., 5 June 1826. Ed. at Falkirk. Came to Can. 1849, and for twenty years was a merchant at Glenmorris; retired from business, 1871. Was Treasurer of South Dumfries for four years. First returned to Parl. for present seat. at g. e. 1872; re-elected by acclamation at g. e. 1874; again re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal. Advocates a Prohibitory Liquor Law; an Elective Senate; a liberal land policy; the enfranchisement of the Indians in the older settled districts of the country; and is in favor of a fair and equitable Reciprocity Treaty.—*Glenmorris, Ont.*

FLYNN, Hon. EDMUND POWER. (*Richmond, N.S.*)

B. in Cape Breton. Ed. there. A merchant. Is a Coroner for Richmond. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, N.S., from Nov. 1867, until January 1874, and Commissioner of Crown Lands from April 1871, until date last mentioned, when he resigned. Sat for Richmond in N.S. Assembly from g. e. 1867, until Jan. 1874, when he resigned, in order to contest the seat for the Commons in which he was successful. Re-elected at last g. e. A Conservative. Supported the Mackenzie Administration.—*Arischat.*

FORTIN, Hon. PIERRE, M.D. (*Gaspé.*) 3RD MEM.

S. of the late M. Fortin of Laprairie, by Julie Duvernay. Descended from a family of Normandy, on father's side, and from a family of Brittany, France, on mother's side. B. at Vercheres P.Q., Dec. 1823. Received his classical education at Montreal Seminary; studied medicine at McGill College, where he took his degree of M.D. 1845. Unmarried. Served as a surgeon at Quarantine, Grosse Isle, during 1847 (fever year) and 1848. Aided in 1849 in forming a special mounted constabulary force for quelling disturbances of the peace in Montreal and adjoining districts, a troop of which was placed under his command. In 1852 he was appointed Stipendiary Magistrate for the lower River and Gulf of St. Lawrence, and in that capacity he organized the service for the protection of the sea

and river fisheries in those ports. He was at the head of that service from 1852 until the Union, when he resigned, and in that position he first had under him the armed steamer *Doris*, and afterwards the armed schooner *La Canadienne*, built specially for the service, in which latter vessel he was wrecked in Nov. 1861, during a violent snow-storm on the North Coast. In 1859 he established on all the coasts and in the Rivers of the Province of Quebec the system of licenses for the salmon fishing. In 1862, Mr. Fortin began a work on the marine animals, fishes, mollusca, crustacea of the Lower River and Gulf St. Lawrence and he described over eighty species of them, and his descriptions, made from nature in nearly all cases, were printed in some of his annual reports to Government; see report of 1862, and following. Mr. Fortin, in several of his reports described the fishing coasts of the Province of Quebec, 1,200 miles in extent, and the different fisheries that are carried on in these parts. He has given valuable statistics, especially since the year 1862, when he adopted a formula which is still followed. In 1858, Mr. Fortin was instructed by the Government of Canada to visit officially the French Colonies of St. Pierre, Miquelon and Longlake, with a view to study the conditions under which the French fisheries and fish trade are carried on, both around St. Pierre and on the west, north-west and north coasts of Newfoundland, commonly called the French Coasts. Mr. Fortin was cordially received by the Governor and authorities of St. Pierre, and every facility offered him to fulfil his mission, while the schooner yacht *La Canadienne*, Quebec built, was much admired by the ship-builders and others there. Mr. Fortin reported to the Government of Canada on his mission and gave interesting accounts of the French fisheries of St. Pierre and neighboring coasts. In 1868, Mr. Fortin, in order to make himself better acquainted with everything appertaining to navigation, shipping, ship-building and the fisheries, visited the Maritime Exhibition at Havre, France, which, as everyone knows, was a very successful one. Mr. Fortin brought back with him a great deal of information regarding the fisheries and navigation, which formed the subject of much correspondence published by *La Minerve*. Was a mem. of Ex. Council and Commr. of Crown Lands for the Province of Quebec from Feb. 1873 until 7 Sept. 1874, when he resigned. Elected Speaker, 4 Nov. 1875, but resigned in 1876, in consequence of his election being protested. While Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Quebec he founded the Marine Library of P.Q., and procured several hundred books relating to shipping, &c., and over 500 marine charts from all parts of the world. Also enlarged the

Was one of the founders of the Geographical Society of Quebec, and was its first Presdt. Was from 1867 to 1874, Chairman of the Special Committee of the Commons, on Navigation and Fisheries. Sat for Gaspé in House of Commons from g.e. 1867. until g.e. 1874, when he retired in order to confine himself to Local House, for which he was first returned at g.e. 1867; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1871, again returned at g.e. 1875, unseated on petition, and re-elected 1877. Did not offer for re-election at last g.e. for P.Q. in consequence of the electors of the Magdalen Islands, where he had obtained a large majority, being deprived of their votes, the dates of the nomination and polling being so fixed that the Returning Officer claimed navigation was not open at the Islands, and did not try to have the proclamation posted there. Elected for present seat at last g.e. by a majority of 797. This is his eighth election in twelve years. A Conservative. "In favor of a system of nautical education with a view to perfecting the scientific instruction of our marines, and thereby making them equal to the best in the world; also empowering our Marine Boards to examine candidates for extra-masters' certificates, and completing the improvements of the St. Lawrence water-course, comprehending the lakes, canals, river and Gulf of St. Lawrence, so as to make it the chief commercial artery of this continent; and firmly believes that the necessary improvements in the postal and telegraphic communications in the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the sea-coasts of the Maritime Provinces are essential to completely attain that object. FULTON, OSCAR. (*Stormont*)

S. of John and Anna Fulton, both descendants of U. E. Loyalists. B. in Township of Cornwall, 22 March 1843. Ed. at Common School. M. 15 Oct. 1867, Mary Catherine Wyatt, of Township of Osnabruck. A Capt. of V.M. Reeve of Roxborough, Co. Stormont, for 1877 and 1878. Mem. of Board of Audit for united Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry. A Liberal Conservative. Advocates a readjustment of the tariff; building of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and enlargement of canals as rapidly as the finances of the Dominion will permit.—*Avonmore P.O., Ont.*

GAULT, MATHEW HAMILTON, J.P. (*Montreal West.*)

S. of the late Leslie Gault, merchant and shipowner of Strabane, Co. Tyrone, and of Mary Hamilton, of Trenta House, Co. Donegal, Ireland. B. in Strabane. M. in Montreal, May 1864, to Elizabeth I. Bourne. Presdt. of the Exchange Bank of Canada; Presdt. of the Montreal Loan and Mortgage Co.; Vice-Presdt. of the Sun Mutual Life Ins. Co.; Vice-Presdt. of Montreal Mining Co.; Dir. of the Richelieu and Ont. Nav. Co., Dominion Tel. Co. and Windsor Hotel Co. Resident Manager of the British America Assurance Co. for P.Q.; Chief Agent of the Royal Ins. Co. of Eng.; Agent of the Mutual Life Ins. Co. of N.Y. Founder of the Irish Protestant Benevolent Society of Montreal, the parent society of this Dominion. For very many years took an active interest in the Volunteer Garrison Artillery, from which he retired, retaining his rank as Captain. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e., by a majority of 1,737 votes. A Conservative, and in favor of protection to native industries; believes the present Fiscal Tariff will meet the wants of the country; looks forward to an era of unexampled prosperity for the Dominion when our railway system through Canadian territory is completed to the North-West.—*Bracehead, Montreal; Summer Residence: Rockcliffe, Cacouna.*

GEOFFRION, Hon. FELIX, N.P. (*Vercheres.*) 2ND MEM. P.C.

S. of M. Felix Geoffrion, by the late Catherine Brodeur. B. at Varennes, P.Q., 4 Oct. 1832. M. Oct. 1856, Almaide, the youngest dau. of Lieut.-Col. Joseph Dansereau, of Vercheres. A Notary Public. Was Registrar for Vercheres from 1854 to 1863. Has been Presdt. of the Montreal, Chambly and Sorel Railway. Moved for Select Committee, 1874, to enquire into causes of the difficulties existing in the N.W. Territory, 1869-70, of which Committee he became Chairman, and prepared report submitted to Parlt. Sworn of the Privy Council, and apptd Minister of Inland Revenue, 8 July 1874. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1863 until the Union, when returned to Commons, where he has since continued to sit. Re-elected by acclamation on his appt. to office. Resigned portfolio in consequence of serious illness, Dec. 1876, retaining his seat in Parlt. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Vercheres, P.Q.*

GIGAULT, GEORGE AUGUSTE. (*Rouville.*)

S. of Pierre Gigault, by Margaret Wait. Brother of the Rev. F. Gigault, R.C. Priest of Lowell. B. 23 Nov. 1845, in St. Mathias. Ed. at St. Hyacinthe College. M. at Belœil, 12 July 1870, to Miss Isabella Dillon. Was admitted as Notary on 16 Oct. 1867; a mem. of the Board of Notaries for the Prov. of Quebec for 3 years. Was Mayor of St. Cesaire from Jan. 1875 to Jun. 1878. Was Postmaster of St. Cesaire from Dec. 1870 to Feb. 1874. While Mayor, was instrumental in having waterworks built in St. Cesaire. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative, and in favor of a Protective Tariff.—*St. Cesaire, P.Q.*

GILLIES, JOHN. (*North Bruce.*)

Is Reeve of Elderslie, and has been Warden of Bruce. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at g.e. 1872; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1874; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Paisley, Ont.*

GILLMOR, Hon. ARTHUR HILL. (*Charlotte.*)

S. of Daniel Gillmor, Esq., J.P., of St. George, N.B.; and grands. of Arthur Hill Gillmor, Esq., of Hillsborough, Co. Down, Irel. B. at St. George. Ed. there. M. 1846, Miss Howe, of Maine, U.S. A mill-owner. Sat for Charlotte, in N.B. Assembly, from 1854 until 1866, when defeated on Confederation question. Was Provl. Secy. in Mr. A. J. Smith's Anti-Confederate Govt. 1865. Contested Charlotte unsuccessfully for House of Commons at g.e. 1872. First returned at g.e. 1874; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Broadway, St. George, N.B.*

GIROCARD, DESIRE, Q.C., D.C.L. (*Jacques Cartier.*)

B. at St. Timothé, Co. Beauharnois, 7 July 1836. Ed. at the Montreal College, and graduated in law in McGill University, from which he has received the degrees of B.C.L. and D.C.L. Called to the Bar of Lower Canada, 13 Oct. 1860, and made Q.C. in 1876. M. 1st, Mathilde Pratt, dau. of the late John Pratt, and 2nd, Essie Cranwell, sister of Samuel Cranwell of New Orleans. Author of Treatise on Bills of Exchange, the Insolvent Act, Laws of Marriage, &c., &c. Founder, with W. H. Kerr, Q.C., and other leading

Barristers, of the *Revue Critique* and well known by his contributions on constitutional law and international questions, which have received notice from the press in this country, and also from that of the United States, England and France, among others, his Papers on the Treaty of Washington, the Indirect Alabama Claims, Church and State, the Pacific Scandal, Royal Commissions, &c. Until 1872 he devoted himself exclusively to his profession, wherein he obtained success, principally as a commercial lawyer. First entered political life in 1872 as the opponent in Jacques Cartier of Mr. Rodolphe Laflamme, Q.C., who enjoyed considerable prestige and influence, and was defeated by 48 votes. In 1874 the latter was returned by acclamation, Mr. Girouard having been invited to stand for Beauharnois, where he was defeated by the intervention of a third candidate. In 1878 he was requested to oppose the re-election of Mr. Laflamme as Minister of Inland Revenue, and was defeated by 28 votes. He contested this election and the petition having been dismissed by the late Hon. Mr. Justice Wilfrid Dorion, he carried the case to the Supreme Court, where judgment was confirmed by Messrs. Justices Tachereau, Fournier and Henry, Chief Justice Richards, and Mr. Justice Strong dissenting. In 1878 he was again solicited to stand against his old opponent, and on the 17th Sept. was reported as defeated by 14 votes, but on a recount by Mr. Justice Mackay, was declared elected by two votes, although his majority was really over 100, as afterwards was established in the celebrated Ste. Anne's Ballot Box Case. His opponents not satisfied with great Government pressure and the employment of bribery and corruption, resorted to a practice unknown in this country, and condemned by all parties,—tampering with the ballot box. A Conservative, and strong supporter of the policy of Sir John A. Macdonald and of the late Sir George E. Cartier.—*No. 8 Prince of Wales Terrace, Montreal, and Summer Residence at Dorval, Co. GIROUARD, GILBERT ANSELME. (*Kent, N.B.*)

B. at St. Mary's, Buctouche, N.B., 26 Oct. 1846. Ed. at St. Joseph's College, Memramcook. M. 28 May 1872 at St. Mary's, Buctouche, Sophia dau. of Enoch Baker, of Little Falls, Victoria Co., N.B. Is a general merchant. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e.—A Liberal Conservative.—*Buctouche, Kent Co., N.B.*

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GLEN, FRANCIS WAYLAND. (*South Ontario.*)

Of Scotch Descent. Ancestors from Paisley, Scotland, originally. S. of the Hon. E. M. K. Glen, who lived near Rochester, N. Y. B. near Albany, N.Y. Ed. at Rochester, N.Y. M., at Rochester, N.Y., to the dau. of the late Joseph Hall in 1863 First returned to Parli. at the last g.e. The election was contested and case is now (Jan. 1880) before the Supreme Court. A Reformer.—*Oshawa, Ont.*

GRANDBOIS, PAUL ETIENNE, M.D. (*Temiscouata.*)

B. in 1846 at Ste. Philomène, Co. of Chateauguay. Ed. at St. Sulpice College, Ste. Thérèse de Blainville Little Seminary and Laval University. M. in 1873 second dau. of the late George Pelletier, Esq., merchant of Fraserville. First returned to Parli. at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Fraserville, P.Q.*

GUNN, ALEXANDER. (*Kingston.*)

S. of James Gunn, Mason, Contractor and Farmer, Burns, Caithness, Scotland, by his wife, Janet Sheaver. B. 5 Oct. 1828, at Burns, Caithness. Ed. at Forss School, Caithness. M. 13 Oct. 1864, at Kingston, Ont. to Angélique Agnes Matthews, dau. of the late Robert Matthews, Esq. First returned to Parli. at last g.e. A Liberal Reformer.—*Kingston, Ont.*

GUTHRIE, DONALD, Q.C. (*South Wellington.*) 25D MEM.

B. in Edinburgh, Scotland, 8 May 1840. S. of late Mr. Hugh Guthrie, of same place, by Catherine, dau. of Mr. John Macgregor, of Rannoch, Perthshire, Scot. Ed. in Edinburgh, and afterwards in Toronto, Can. Studied law in the offices of Hon. Oliver Mowat, and the late Hon. Ferguson Blair and Mr. Kingsmill. Admitted an attorney, 1863; called to the Bar of Ontario, Trinity Term, 1866. M. 17 Dec. 1863, at Montreal, Eliza Margaret, youngest dau. of the late Mr. John MacVicar, of Chatham Township, Ont., formerly of Dunglass, Argyllshire. Created a Q. C. March 1876. Is senior partner in the law firm of Guthrie, Watt & Cutten, of Guelph. Has been for ten years Presdt. of the Guelph Gas Light Co. First returned to Parli. 5 July 1876, upon resignation of sitting mem. again returned at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Craganour, Guelph, Ont.*

HACKETT, EDWARD. (*Prince, P.E.I.*)

Father and mother came from Ire. in the early part of the present century and settled near St. Peters, on the eastern end of the Island, from whence they removed to Chatham, N.B., and back again to Tignish, P.E.I., about forty years ago. B. at Tignish, P.E.I., 1840. Ed. there. M. 1860, Hannah Maria, third dau. of James Fitzgibbon, shipbuilder, Annapolis, N.S. Apptd. a Justice of the Peace for Prince Co. 1872. Resigned, 1876. First returned to Local Assembly, P.E.I., 1876, representing the 1st dis. Prince Co. Sat for two sessions in the House of Assembly. First returned to Commons at last g.e. Conservative in politics. Believes in a policy that will encourage and protect the industries of the country. Is a strict believer in the rights of minorities; will support such measures as he thinks conducive to the interests of the whole people.—*Tignish, Co. Prince, P.E.I.*

HADDOW, GEORGE. (*Restigouche.*)

S. of Robert Haddow, Esq., of New Mills, Ayrshire, Scot., by Elizabeth Taylor, of Chatham, N.B. B. in Douglstown, Miramichi, N.B. 10 Dec. 1833. Ed. at Northumberland Grammar School. M. Aug. 1859, at Chatham, N.B., Christina, dau. of Rev. John McCurdy, D.D. First returned to Parl., for present seat, 12 Jan. 1878, by acclamation; re-elected by acclamation at last g.e. Is Vice-Consul for Sweden and Norway. An Independent.—*Dalhousie, N.B.*

HAGGART, JOHN GRAHAM. (*South Lanark.*)

S of John Haggart, Esq., formerly of Breadalbane, Perthshire, Scot., but latterly of Perth, Lanark, Ont., by Isabella Graham, of the Isle of Skye, Inverness-shire, Scot. B. in Perth, Ont., 14 Nov. 1836. A saw and grist-mill owner. Was for several years Mayor of Perth. An unsuccessful candidate for South Lanark in Local Assembly at g.e. 1867 and in 1869. First returned to Parl. for present seat at g.e. 1872; re-elected at g.e. 1874 and again at last g.e. A Liberal-Conservative.—*Perth, Ont.*

HAY, ROBERT. (*Centre Toronto.*)

B. in Perthshire, Scot.; emigrated to Can. in 1831. M. 18 Nov. 1849, Mary, only dau. of Thomas Dunlop (she d. 1871). Has been a

manufacturer of cabinet furniture 44 years. A dir. of the Credit Valley Railway. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. In politics, a Baldwin Reformer, but, with a great many others, became convinced that the late Government were pursuing a policy detrimental to the best interests of the country, and, along with an overwhelming majority of the electors of the Dominion, declared in favor of a National Policy. In favor of a Prohibitory Liquor Law when practicable.—*Toronto, Ont.*

HESSON, SAMUEL ROLLIN, J.P. (*North Pe th*)

Parents both born in Irel.; came to Can. in 1832. Mother's name was Dunbar, and grandmother's, Wallace. B. in Co Antrim, Irel., 1829. Ed. at the Dundas, Ont., Grammar School. M. 21 Nov. 1855, at Simcoe, Ont., Miss M. L. Polley, eld. dau. of John Polley, Esq., founder of Simcoe. Was Postmaster of Sebringville for seven years. Apptd. J.P. for the Co. of Perth 22 years ago. A general merchant. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative, strongly impressed with the advantage of a Protective or National Policy to this young Dominion.—*Stratford, Ont.*

HILLIARD, GEORGE. (*West Peterboro'*)

Fifth s. of the late Lieut.-Col. Hilliard, of Her Majesty's 5th Regiment. B. at Morrisburg, Co. of Dundas, in May 1827. M. Eliza, third dau. of the Hon. Jonathan Gove, of Acworth, New Hampshire, U.S. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e.—*Peterboro', Ont.*

HOLTON, Hon. LUTHER HAMILTON, J. P. (*Chateauguay*)

B. in South Leeds, Oct. 1817. Removed to Montreal, 1826, where he entered mercantile life, and was for many years a mem. of the firm of Hooker & Holton, forwarders. M. Miss Eliza Forbes, dau. of William Forbes, Esq., of Montreal. Is honorary Presdt. of the Reform Assn. of the *Parti National* of Montreal, and a Governor of McGill University (he being a member of the Royal Institution for the advancement of learning). Has been Presdt. of the Board of Trade (repeatedly); and of the Montreal City and District Savings Bank; a Vice-President of the Free Trade Assn.; a Harbor Commissioner; a dir. of the City Bank; and a member of the corporation of Montreal. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council,

Can. from 2 to 6 August, 1858 (in the Brown-Dorion Administration); and from May, 1863, to March, 1864 (in the Sandfield MacDonald-Dorion administration); and held the office of Commissioner of Public Works, Can. on the first occasion; and that of Minister of Finance on the latter. Was a Govt. dir. of the Grand Trunk Railway from Nov. 1852 to July 1853. Sat for Montreal in Can. Assembly from 1854 till 1857, when defeated. Was mem. for Victoria division in L.C. Can. from Sept. 1862, to May 1863, when he resigned (on being apptd. Minister of Finance), and was returned for present seat, which he represented until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e. 1867, again at g.e. 1872, again at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. Represented Montreal Centre in the Local House, from g.e. 1851, until 16 Jan. 1874, when he retired from that body in order to confine himself to the House of Commons. Entered Parlt. as an advanced Liberal, and has always been in accord with the Liberal party, except on the question of Confederation, which temporarily divided that party. — 1043 *Sherbrooke street Montreal; St. James' Club; Rideau Club.*

HOOPER, EDMUND J. GLYN. (*Lennox*)

Second s. of J. Hooper, of Davenport, Devonshire, Eng. who came to this country in 1819. B. in Devonshire, Eng. 7 July 1818. Ed. at Quebec Seminary. M. 1st, 1839, at St. Johns, Que. Isabel Richmond, of Milton, Vt.; 2nd, Cynthia Ham. of Fredericksburgh, Co. of Lennox and Addington, Ont. At outbreak of troubles in 1837, served in Quebec as second Lieut. in the Royal Quebec Volunteer Artillery; in 1838 and until the end of the disturbance, as first Lieut. in same corps. Removed to Lennox in 1843. Was a Capt. in the Addington Militia until 1864. In 1866 (June) raised the Napanee Batt. of Garrison Artillery, of which he is still in command. In April 1870, during the Fenian Raid, had command of the gun boat *Rescue*, (with part of his company on board), cruising between Kingston and Prescott. Presdt. of Lennox and Addington Rifle Ass. Presdt. of Napanee, Tamworth and Que. R.R. In 1872, contested the Co. of Lennox with Hon. R. J. Cartwright, and was defeated by over 800 majority; was elected at last g.e. defeating same opponent by 79 majority. A merchant. Is Treasurer of the Co., which office he has held since 1865. Liberal Conservative, and Protectionist.—*Napanee, Ont.*

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HOUDE, FREDERIC. (*Maskinongé*.)

S. of Antoine Houde, agriculturist. Norman descent. B. 23 Sept. 1847, at Rivière-du-Loup (en haut) P.Q. Ed. at Nicolet College. M. 29 June 1874, Miss Catharine Dougherty. Has been a journalist since 1867, and editor of the *Nouveau Monde* of Montreal, of which he is now proprietor, since 1874. Is Presdt. of the Club Cartier, Montreal. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A National Conservative in politics. An advocate of the patriotic and fraternal union of all classes of Canadians.—*Montreal, P.Q.*

HUNTINGTON, Hon. LUCIUS SETH, Q.C. (*Shefford*.) 2ND MEM. P.C.

The descendant of a New Eng. family that came to New Eng. at the time of the *Mayflower*, and participated in all the vicissitudes of that time. No New Eng. family has more distinguished itself in the Church, Field and Senate. (*See New Eng. Genealogical Register*.) Grandf. a U. E. Loyalist, removed to Can. and settled at Compton towards the close of the last century. S. of the late Seth Huntington, Esq. of Waterville, P.Q. B. at Compton, P.Q. 26 May, 1827, Ed in Can. M. 1st, Miriam Jane, dau. of the late Major David Wood, of Shefford (she d. March, 1871.) 2nd, in New York, 28 Oct. 1877, Mrs. Marsh, relict of the late Charles Marsh, Esq. Civil Engineer. Called to the Bar, L.C. 1853. Created Q.C. 1863. A member of the law firm of Lafamme, Huntington & Lafamme, Montreal. Was a member of the Ex. Council, Can., and Solicitor-General, L.C. from May 1863, to March 1864, when the Government (the Sandfield Macdonald-Dorion) resigned. Sworn of the Privy Council, 29 Jan. 1874, and was President of that body from that time until apptd. Postmaster-General, 9 Oct. 1875, which position he held until resignation of Government, Oct. 1878. Acted as Minister of Public Works during Mr. Mackenzie's absence in England, 1875. Contested Shefford for Can. Assembly, 1860, on which occasion there was no return, and before the Election Committee to which the matter was referred could report, the Parl. had expired. At the ensuing g.e. 1861, was elected, and he continued to represent Shefford until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e. 1867, at g.e. 1872, and again at g.e. 1874: re-elected by acclamation on his appt. to office. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Waterloo, P.Q.*; 1124 *St. Catherine street, Montreal*; *Bolton Lodge, Lake Memphremagog, P.Q.*; *St. James' Club*; *Rideau Club*.

HURTEAU, HILAIRE, N.P. (*L'Assomption.*) 2ND MEM.

B. at Contrecoeur, P.Q. 4 May, 1837. Ed. at L'Assomption College. M. 30 May, 1859, Mdle Delphine Beaudoin. A Notary Public. Was Mayor of St. Lin for three years, and Warden of the County for an equal length of time. Has also held the office of Secy.-Treasurer of Schools. First returned to Parliament for present seat at g.e. 1874; unseated on petition, 24 Nov. 1874; re-elected by acclamation, 16 Jan. 1875. Again re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—*St. Lin, P.Q.*

IVES, WILLIAM BULLOCK. (*Richmond and Wolfe.*)

S. of Eli Ives and Artemissa Bullock; of English extraction. First settled in Connecticut; moved to the Co. of Stanstead among the first settlers on Lake Memphremagog. B. in the Township of Compton, Co. Compton, 17 Nov. 1841. Self-educated, after taking course in Compton Academy. M. 18 Nov. 1869 at Cookshire, Co. of Compton, Elizabeth E. only dau. of the Hon. J. H. Pope, M.P. Minister of Agriculture. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. Conservative.—*Sherbrooke, P.Q.*

JACKSON, GEORGE. (*South Grey.*)

B. at Hutton, in the North Riding of York, England, in Dec. 1809. Ed. at a private school there. M. in 1832 Miss Susan Merritt, of Willsborough, in the Co. of Kent, England. Was engaged in the grocery and provision trade on his own account and as partner in the firm of Peacock & Jackson, Brewers and Maltsters, for several years in the city of Durham, England. Came to Canada in 1844, and in the following year purchased the mills and estate in Nottawasaga, then known as Hurentario, now Collingwood. Was apptd. agent for the settlement of Crown Lands in the Cos. of Grey and Bruce in 1848; resigned in 1854. Was Warden of Grey in 1858-59-60-75. Was the first representative of the Co. of Grey. Was returned at the g.e. in 1854. At the g.e. 1857 was not a candidate. Was returned again in 1861 and sat until the Union. Was returned to the Commons at the g.e. in 1867 for the South Riding of the Co. of Grey and was defeated by Mr. George Landerkin at the g.e. of 1873. Again a candidate at the last g.e. and was elected by a majority of 82 over Mr. Landerkin. A Liberal Conservative.—*Durham, Ont.*

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ONES, DAVID FORD. (*South Leeds.*)

Of Welsh descent. Family came to America 1645. S. of the late Hon. Mr. Justice Jones, Toronto, and grandson of Ephraim Jones, Esq., U.E. Loyalist, both of whom at different periods represented the Co. of Leeds in the U.C. Assembly. B. at Brockville, Ont. Ed. at Upper Canada College. M. Rebecca Ogden, dau. of Wm. Roebuck, Esq., niece of the late John Arthur Roebuck, Esq., M.P., for Sheffield in the British House of Commons. An extensive manufacturer. Has been Warden of Leeds and Grenville. Held the commission of Ensign in the "Queen's Rangers," an incorporated Battalion commanded by Col. Saml. P. Jarvis, serving during the Rebellion of 1837 and 1838, and resigning his commission in 1839. In 1862, during the Trent difficulty, organized a Co. of Artillery, the "Gananoque Field Battery," which Co. he commanded for several years, serving during the Fenian Raids, retiring with rank of Major in 1869. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat in Can. Assembly at g.e. 1863. Sat for South Leeds in that House from Jan. 1864, until the Union. First returned to Commons at g.e. 1873; re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Gananoque, Ont; Rideau Club.*

KAULBACH, CHARLES EDWIN. (*Lunenburg.*)

Of German descent. S. of Lieut.-Col. J. H. Kaulbach, High Sheriff of Lunenburg, N.S. Grandson of Henry Kaulbach, Esq., who was High Sheriff of the same Co. for an extended period. Brother of Senator Kaulbach and Rev. J. A. Kaulbach of Truro, N.S. B. at Lunenburg 1834. Ed. at Lunenburg. Unmarried. Captain and Adjutant of Militia, and for several years Commander of Volunteer Rifle Company in his native town. Large ship and landed estate owner. Performed the duties of High Sheriff in his native county for several years. Was a delegate to the Provincial Synod at Montreal in 1876; to the Diocesan Synod in Halifax in the interest of the Episcopal Church in 1870-72 and 1876. At present Vice-President of Nova Scotian Society for the prevention of Cruelty to Animals. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Lunenburg, N.S.*

KEELER, JOSEPH, J.P. (*East Northumberland.*)

S. of Joseph Abbott Keeler, of Colborne, Ont., grandson of Joseph Keeler, who came from New England in 1796, and was the

first settler in the Township of Cramahe, Co. Northumberland, Ont. B. 24 May 1824, at Colborne. Ed. at U.C. College, Toronto. M. 12 Oct. 1848, Octavia, youngest dau. of Rev. Thos. Phillips, D.D., Principal of U. C. College, and Rector of Etobicoke, Co. York. Holds rank of Major in Reserve Militia. A farmer; has been grain dealer, &c. Was Postmaster of Colborne in 1858. First returned to Parl. at g.e. 1867; again returned in 1872. Was an unsuccessful candidate in 1874; and re-elected at last g.e. A National Liberal Conservative. In favor of protection to home industries; Canada for Canadians.—*Kelwood, Township of Cramahe, Colborne P. O., Ont.*

KILLAM, FRANK. (*Yarmouth.*)

Third son of the late Hon. T. Killam, some time a mem. of the N.S. Assembly, and who sat for Yarmouth in the House of Commons from the Union until his death, Dec. 1868. B. at Yarmouth 1843. Ed. there and at Sackville, N.B. M. 1868, Ellen, dau. of Henry Hood, Esq., of Yarmouth. A mem. of the extensive firm of Killam Bros., ship-owners and commission merchants. First returned to Parl. for present seat, on death of his father, the sitting mem., Jan. 1869. Re-elected at g.e. 1872, at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Yarmouth, N.S.*

KILVERT, FRANCIS EDWIN. (*Hamilton.*)

Only s. of the late Richard Kilvert, of Bath, England. B. 27 Dec. 1838 in the Township of Hamilton, Co. of Northumberland, Ont. Ed. at the Cobourg Grammar School. M. 6 June 1863 Nanny Young, fourth dau. of Benjamin S. Cory, Esq., M.D., Wankegan, Ill., formerly of Wellington, Prince Edward Co. Called to the Bar U.C. Easter Term, 1867. Was Ald. of the city of Hamilton for the years 1874, 1875, and 1876, and Mayor of the same place for the years 1877 and 1878. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Conservative and Protectionist.—*Hamilton, Ont.*

KING, GEORGE GERALD. (*Queen's, N.B.*)

Eldest s. of the late Malcolm King, of the town of Fintry, Scot., by Elizabeth, dau. of Edward Hickson, of Miltown, Ireland. B. 11 Dec. 1836, at Springfield, King's Co., N.B. Ed. at Springfield Public School. M. at Chipman, Queen's Co., 23 Oct. 1860, Esther, dau. of Ebenezer Briggs. Filled the office of Warden of

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Queen's Co. for one term. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal.—*Chipman, Queen's Co., N.B.*

KIRKPATRICK, Lieut.-Col., GEORGE AIRY, LL.B. (*Frontenac.*)

Fourth s. of the late Thomas Kirkpatrick, Esq., Q. C., a native of Coolmine, near Dublin, who represented Frontenac in the House of Commons from the Union until his death, March 1870, by the dau. of the late Alex. Fisher, Esq., Judge of the Midland District. B. in Kingston, 13 Sept. 1841. Ed. at Kingston Grammar School, at High School, St. John's, P. Q., and at Trinity College, Dublin; graduated at latter institution as Moderator and Silver Medalist, Dec. 1861, and received the degrees of B.A. and LL.B. M. Oct. 1865, Frances Jane, dau. of the late Hon. John Macanlay; (she d. 20 Jan. 1877.) Called to the Bar, U. C., Hilary Term, 1865. Is President of the Kingston Waterworks Co., Lieut.-Col. Commanding the 47th "Frontenac" Batt. V. I., Vice-President of the Kingston Rifle Assn., and a dir. of the Kingston and Pembroke Railway. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, April 1870, on death of his father, the sitting mem.; re-elected by acclamation at g. e. 1872; again returned at g. e. 1874; re-elected at last g. e. Commanded the Wimbledon Rifle Team, 1876. A Liberal Conservative.—*King street, Kingston, Ont.; Toronto Club; Rideau Club; U.E. Club.*

KRANZ, HUGO, J.P. (*North Waterloo.*)

Descendant of an old Hessian family. Only s. of the late Charles Kranz, of Berlin, Ont., merchant, with whom he came to America in 1851, and settled in Berlin, Ont. in 1855. B. 13 June 1834, in Lehrbach, Grand Duchy of Hesse Darmstadt. Ed. at the Polytechnical School at Darmstadt. M. 1865, Catherine Seip, dau. of the late George Seip, brewer, of Berlin, Ont. Has held the municipal offices of Town Clerk, Reeve and Mayor for many years. Trustee and Treasurer of Berlin High School since 1871. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A National Conservative.—*Berlin, Ont.*

LANDRY, AUGUSTE CHARLES PHILIPPE ROBERT, A.B., J.P., M.C.A. (*Montmagny.*)

S. of the well-known Surgeon of Quebec, J. E. Landry, by the late Caroline E. Lelievre. B. at Quebec, 15 Jan. 1846. Ed. at

Quebec Seminary, where he obtained the degree of B A., and at St. Anne Agricultural College, M. 6 Oct. 1868, Wilhelmina, dau. of the late Etienne Couture, of St. Gervais. A farmer. Mem. of the Council of Agriculture of the Province of Quebec, to which position he was called after having obtained the first prize and gold medal for the best Treatise on Agriculture. Presdt. of the Montmagny Agricultural Society; Vice-Presdt. of the Union Agricole Nationale, of the Province of Quebec. Secretary of the Montmagny No. 3 Colonization Society; mem. of the Entomological Society, Can. Senior Major of the 61st Batt. of Montmagny and L'Islet. Author of *Traité populaire d'Agriculture théorique et pratique*; *Les Boissons alcooliques et leurs falsifications*; *Où est la disgrâce*, and other scientific, literary and political pamphlets. Was an unsuccessful candidate, in 1873, for the Local House. First returned to the Quebec Legislative Assembly for the County of Montmagny at g.e. 1875. Unseated 29 May 1876, by judgment of the Superior Court. Returned to Parl't for present seat at last g.e. A Conservative and Protectionist.—*Land Villa, Co. Montmagny, P.Q.*

LANE, SAMUEL J. (*North Greg.*)

A Barrister. First returned to Parl't. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, and in favor of the National Policy.—*Owen Sound, Ont.*

LANGÉVIN, Hon. HECTOR LOUIS, C.B., Q.C. (*Three Rivers.*) P.C.

S. of the late Jean Langevin, Esq., formerly Asst. Civil Secy. under the Earl of Gosford and Lord Sydenham, during the periods those noblemen held the office of Governor-General, by the late Sophie Scholastique La Force, whose father, Major La Force, went with his militia men to the frontier in the war of 1812, and whose grandfather was Acting Commodore of the British fleet on Lake Ontario during the Am. Revolutionary war; and brother of His Lordship the Right Rev. Jean Langevin, Bishop of St. Germain de Rimouski. B in the city of Quebec, 25 Aug. 1826. Ed. at the Seminary of that city. M. 1854, Justine, eldest dau. of the late Lieut.-Col. Charles H. Tetu, J.P. Studied law first with the late Hon. A. N. Morin, and afterwards with the late Hon. Sir George E. Cartier, and was called to the Bar, L.C., Oct. 1850. Created Q.C., 30 March 1864. Was editor of the *Mélanges Religieux* (Mon-

treal) from 1847 to 1849, and also of the *Journal d'Agriculture* (same city); and at a later period (1857) of the *Courrier du Canada* (Quebec). Sat as a mem. of the City Council, Quebec, for some years, and was Chairman of the Waterworks Committee. Was Secy.-Treas. and afterwards Vice-Presdt. of the North Shore Railway Co.; Mayor of Quebec from Jan. 1858 to Jan. 1861, and during his incumbency visited England on matters affecting the city finances, etc.; for two years, 1861 and 1862, Presdt. of St. Jean Baptiste Society (Quebec); and in 1863 and 1864, Presdt. of the Institut Canadien, same city. Author of *Le Canada, ses Institutions, etc.*, a prize essay (Quebec, 1855), and of *Droit Administratif, ou Manuel des Paroisses et Fabriques* (Quebec, 1862), a second edition, revised, corrected and enlarged, being published by him in 1878. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, Can., from 30 March 1864, until the Union; and held the offices of Solicitor-Genl., L.C., from 30 March 1864, to Nov. 1865; and Postmaster-Genl. from latter period until the Union. Was sworn of the Privy Council, 1 July 1867, when appointed Secy. of State of Canada, in which office he remained until transferred to the Public Works Department, 8 Dec. 1869. Was, while at the State Department, *ex-officio* Registrar-Genl. of Canada, and Supdt.-Genl. of Indian Affairs. Was a Commr. to assist Mr. Speaker in the management of the interior economy of the House of Commons; also, Chairman of the Railway Committee of the Privy Council. Created a Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath (Civil) by Her Majesty, 1868. Created Knight Commander of the Roman Order of Pope St. Gregory the Great, 1870. Was a delegate to the Charlottetown Union Conference, 1864; to that in Quebec in same year; and to the London Colonial Conference, 1866-7, to complete terms of Union B.N.A. Provinces. In 1871, at the desire of the Privy Council, visited British Columbia with the view of acquiring a knowledge of that new Province in relation to the Pacific Railway and its western terminus, and also of studying the requirements of the Province, and ascertaining personally what public works were necessary for it. On his return he published a report containing much information about British Columbia, and making known its present position and immense wealth and resources (Ottawa, 1872). Acted as leader of the L.C. Conservatives in the session of 1873, during the absence in England of Sir George Cartier, and was selected by the Conservative members, after Sir George Cartier's funeral in Montreal, June 1873, as the Conservative leader in the Province of Quebec. Sat for the

Co. of Dorchester in Can. Assembly from g.e. 1857 until the Union. Returned to Commons by same constituency from the Union until 1874, when he retired. He had ceased to be a Cabinet Minister, with his colleagues, in Nov. 1873. He also represented Dorchester in Local House from g.e. 1867 to g.e. 1871, when returned for Quebec Centre by acclamation; retired, Jan. 1874. Elected for Charlevoix, Jan. 1876; again returned for same constituency, April 1877, after being unseated on petition; contested Rimouski unsuccessfully at g. e. 1878. Sworn as Postmaster-General, 19 Oct. 1878. Elected by acclamation for the city of Three Rivers, 17 Nov. 1878, on resignation of the sitting mem. Is a mem of the Railway Committee of the Privy Council. On 5 April 1879 was chosen by the Governor-General in Council to proceed to England and lay before the Imperial Govt. the views of the Can. Ministry in connection with the proposed dismissal of M. Letellier de St. Just, the Lieut.-Gov of the Prov of Quebec; the result of such mission being the recognition by the Imperial Govt. of the constitutional rights of the Can. Govt. to remove Lieut.-Govs. for proper cause. During his absence in England, May 1879, was apptd. Minister of Public Works. A Conservative.—*Corner of St. Louis and St. Ursule streets, Quebec; 45 Slater street, Ottawa; Rideau Club.*

LANTIER, JACQUES PHILIPPE, J.P. (*Soulanges.*)

Family came from Brittany. S. of M. Antoine Lantier, by Marie Reine Ramour. B. at St. Polycarp, P^rQ., 21 July 1814. Ed. Nicolet College and at the College of St Sulpice, Montreal. M. 24 May 1865, Delle. Julienne Bonville. A store-keeper. Author of a pamphlet on the Cascades and Coteau Landing Canal, and of another on the Harbours of Coteau Landing and Cascades Bay. Sat for Vaudreuil in Can. Assembly from 1844 to 1847. First returned to Commons for present seat at g. e. 1872; re-elected by acclamation at g. e. 1874; again re-elected at last g. e. A Conservative. Gave notice of motion, 1873, for an Address to the Queen, praying Her Majesty to grant a full and complete pardon and amnesty for all acts, crimes and offences committed in Manitoba previous to its being incorporated with the Union. "In favor of the consolidation of B.A.; the improvement of the navigation of the St. Lawrence; the development of our resources; the extension of our trade; and protection to manufacturers."—*St. Polycarp, P. Q.*

LARUE, ACHILLE. (*Bellechasse.*)

Descended from the family of Michael de La Rue, who came to Canada from Seez, Normandie. S. of the late Nazaire La Rue, of St. Valier, by Adelaide Roy. B. at St. John, Island of Orleans, 27 Oct. 1849. Ed. in the Seminary of Quebec and Laval University. Unmarried. Is Presdt of Le Club Canadien and Secy. of the Reform Assn. of the Prov. of Quebec. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal.—*St. Ann street, Upper Town, Quebec.*

LAURIER, Hon. WILFRID, B. C. L. (*Quebec East.*) P. G.

Family among the first established in *La Nouvelle France*. S. of the late M. Carolus Laurier, P. L. S. B. at St. Lin, L'Assomption, P. Q., 20 Nov. 1841. Ed. at L'Assomption College. M. 13 May 1868, Miss Lafontaine. Obtained decree of B. C. L. at McGill University, 1864. Studied law with Hon. R. Laflamme, Q. C., M. P., and was called to the Bar L. C. 1865. A dir. of the Royal Mutual Life Insurance Co Edited *Le Defricheur* newspaper for a short time. Was a delegate to the Dominion Prohibitory Convention, Montreal, 1875. Sat for Drummond and Arthabaska in Quebec Assembly from g. e. 1871 until Jan. 1874, when he resigned in order to contest the seat for the Commons, in which he was successful. Was mentioned (Jan. 1877) as probable successor of Hon. L. de St. Just as Minister of Agriculture. Sworn of the Privy Council as Minister of Inland Revenue, Sept. 1877, which office he held until the resignation of the Government, 1878; defeated in Drummond and Arthabaska upon appealing to his constituents; elected immediately after for Quebec East, upon resignation of Hon. I. Thibaudeau. Re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal.—*Arthabaskaville, P. Q.; Rideau Club.*

LITTLE, WILLIAM CARRUTHERS, J. P. (*South Simcoe.*)

Third s. of John Little, Esq., of Pitchcombe House, near Stroud, Gloucestershire, Eng. B. in England. Ed. at Bedford Grammar School. Came to Can. 1847. M. 1st, 1854, Mary, dau. of Edward Hamil, Esq., of Tyrone, Irel., (she d. 1866); 2nd, 1869, Mary Harriet, youngest dau. of Wm Bennett, Esq., of Claremont, Pickering, Ont. Has been a mem. of the Innisfil Municipal Council for twenty-seven years, and of the County Council of Simcoe for twenty years. Is a Major of South Simcoe Reserve

MACDONALD, *The Right Hon. Sir JOHN ALEXANDER, K.C.B., D.C.L., (OXON), L.L.D., Q.C. (Victoria, B.C.) P.C.*

Eld. s. of the late Hugh Macdonald, Esq., of Kingston, Ont., and formerly of Sutherlandshire, Scot. B. 11 Jan. 1815. Ed. at Royal Grammar School, Kingston, under Dr. Wilson, a Fellow of Oxford Univ. M. 1st, Isabella, dau. of the late Alexander Clark, Esq., of Dalnavert, Inverness-shire, Scot. (she d. 1856); 2nd, 1867, Susan Agnes, dau. of the late Hon. T. J. Bernard, a mem. of Her Majesty's Privy Council of the Island of Jamaica. Studied law with the late Mr. George Mackenzie, and was called to the Bar, U.C., Hilary Term, 1836. Created a Q.C. 1846. A Bencher, *ex-officio*, of the Law Society of Ontario; and head of the extensive law firm of Macdonald, Macdonald & Marsh, Toronto. Is the grand representative in Can. of the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Eng., and holds the rank of a Past Grand Senior Warden of the Freemasons of Can. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council of Can. from 11 May 1847 to 10 March 1848 (in the Administration of the late Hon. Mr. Morris); from 11 Sept. 1854 to 29 July 1858 (in the McNab-Morin, the Tache-Macdonald, and the Macdonald-Cartier Administrations); from 6 Aug. same year, to 23 May 1862 (in the Cartier-Macdonald Administration); and from 30 March 1864 until the Union (in the Tache-Macdonald and the Belleau-Macdonald Administrations); and was during these several periods, Receiver-

General from 21 May to 7 Dec. 1847; Com. of Crown Lands from latter date to 10 March 1848; Attorney-General for U.C. from 11 September 1854 to 29 July 1858, when as Prime Minister he and his Cabinet resigned, being defeated on the seat of Government question. Returned to office 6 August same year, as Postmaster-General, a position he resigned the following day, on his re-appointment as Attorney-General, U.C., which he continued to hold until the defeat of the Administration on the Militia Bill, May 1862, when he and his colleagues again retired from office. The late Sir George E. Cartier and he led the Opposition in the Assembly, until the defeat of the Sandfield Macdonald-Dorion Govt., when the Tache-Macdonald Govt. was formed, 30 Mar. 1864, and he returned to his old office of Attorney-General, and was Govt. leader in the Assembly from that time until the Union of the B. A. Provinces, 1867. Held the office of Minister of Militia Affairs jointly with that of Attorney-General, from Jan. to May 1862, and from Aug. 1865, until the Union. Was requested to take the place of Sir E. P. Tache as Prime Minister, on the death of that gentleman in '65, but waived his claim in favor of Sir N. F. Belleau. Has been a delegate to England and other countries on public business on many occasions, and was a delegate to the Conference in Charlottetown in 1864, which had been convened for the purpose of effecting a Union of the Maritime Provinces, to that which succeeded it in Que., same year, to arrange basis of Union of all B. A. Colonies; and was Chairman of the London Colonial Conference, 1866-7, when the Act of Union known as the "British North America Act" was passed by the Imperial Parlt. On 1 July 1867, when the new Constitution came into force, was called upon to form the first Govt., for the New Dominion, and was sworn of the Privy Council and was apptd. Minister of Justice and Attorney-General of Can., an office he continued to fill until he and his ministry resigned on the Pacific Railway charges, 6 Nov. 1873. In 1871 was appointed one of Her Majesty's Joint High Commissioners and Plenipotentiaries, together with Earl de Grey (now Marquis of Ripon) Sir Stafford Northcote, Sir Edward Thornton, and Right Hon. Montague Bernard, to act in connection with five commissioners named by the President of the United States for the settlement of the Alabama claims, and of matters in dispute between Great Britain and the United States, the labors of which Joint High Commission resulted in the Treaty of Washington, signed at Washington, U.S., on 8 May 1871. Received degree of D.C.L. (hon.) from Oxford University, 1865. Is also LL.D. of Queen's University, Kingston, and a D.C.L. of University of Trinity Coll., Tor. Created K.C.B. (civil) by Her Majesty,

July 1867. Created a Knight Grand Cross of the Royal Order of *Isabel la Catolica* (of Spain). Jan. 1872. Nominated a mem. of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, July 1872, and sworn in Aug. 1879. Unanimously elected leader of the Can. Liberal Conservative Opposition, 6 Nov 1873. Sat for Kingston in Can. Assembly from Nov. 1844, until the Union. Returned for same seat in the Commons at g.e. 1867; at g.e. 1872, and at g.e. 1874. Unseated on petition, 21 Nov. 1874; re-elected 29 Dec. 1874. Contested the city of Kingston at last g.e. when he was defeated. Immediately afterwards was elected by acclamation for Marquette, Man., which he vacated—by having accepted office as Premier and Minister of the Interior on 17 Oct. 1878, which position he now holds. Was then elected with Mr. DeCosmos for Victoria, B.C., of which he is now senior mem. The following are among the principal measures which have been carried through Parlt. by the Right-Hon. Knight, viz:—The secularization of the clergy reserves; the improvement of the criminal laws, the promotion of public instruction; the consolidation of the statutes; the extension of the municipal system; the reorganization of the militia; the settlement of the seat of Government question; the establishment of direct steam mail communication with Europe; the establishment of additional penitentiaries, criminal lunatic asylums and reformatory prisons, and providing for the inspection thereof; the providing for the internal economy for the House of Commons; the reorganization of the Civil Service on a permanent basis; the construction of the Intercolonial Railway; the enlargement of the canals; the enactment of a stringent election law; the ratification of the Washington Treaty; the Confederation of B.N.A.; and extension and consolidation of the Dominion. S. of Hugh Macdonald, Esq. of Panmure, who came to P.E.I. in 1805, from Moydart, Inverness-shire, Scotland, and was M. to Catherine, dau. of A. Macdonald, Esq. of Rhul, Arisaig, Inverness-shire. B. at Panmure P.E.I. 30 June, 1837. Ed. at Grammar

School, Georgetown and Central Academy, Charlottetown, P.E.I. M. at Charlottetown, 27 June 1865, Mary Elizabeth, sixth dau. of the late Hon. John Small Macdonald. . Apptd. Commr. for managing exhibition of Local Industry for P.E.I. on several occasions. A Captain in V.M. First returned to Parlt. in 1870 as one of the representatives for the Third Electoral District of King's Co. in the Local Assembly; supported the Railway Bill, and on a dissolution of the House was again returned with a handsome majority. In 1873 went again to the country on the question of Confederation, and was returned in favor of Confederation on the "Better Terms." On the island going into Confederation, was returned for King's Co. to support Sir John A. Macdonald. On his defeat and a general election under Mr. Mackenzie, ran again and was defeated, Mr. McIntyre beating him by about 30 votes. Contested the district of King's Co. at last election in connection with Dr. E. B. Muttart in the Liberal Conservative interest, and was opposed by Dr. P. A. McIntyre and Malcolm McFayden, Esq. Was returned by a majority of 765 over Dr. McIntyre, and 1013 over Mr. McFayden. Liberal Conservative Supported Railway Bill and Confederation. Is in favor of the National Policy.—*Montague, P. E. I.*

MACDONELL, DONALD GREENFIELD. (*North Lanark*)

S of A. G. Macdonell, Esq. of Morrisburgh; grands. of Donald Macdonell, late Dpty. Adjnt.-Genl. and grand-nephew of Col. Macdonell, A.D.C. to Genl. Brock. B. at Morrisburgh, 2 July 1849. Ed. at U.C. College, Toronto. M. 30 June 1875, to Margaret, dau. of B. Rosamond, Esq. Almonte. (she d. 28 Aug. 1877.) Elected Reeve of Almonte by acclamation, Jan. 1878. First returned to Parlt. on death of sitting mem. D. Galbraith, Esq., 22 Jan. 1880. A Liberal.—*Almonte, Ont.*

MACDONNELL, SAMUEL, Q. C. (*Inverness*.)

Fifth s. of the late Donald MacDonnell, Esq., of St. Andrews, Antigonish, N.S., by Miss Mary Macdonald, Knoidart; and grands. of Donald MacDonnell, Esq., Glengarry, Scot., who came to N.S. 1820, and settled in Hants. B. at St. Andrews, April 1834. Ed. at St. Andrew's Grammar School. M. 1866, Annie, second dau. of Hon. Peter Smyth, M.L.C., of N.S. Called to the Bar, N.S. 1862. Created a Q.C. 1867. A Master in the Supreme Court of N.S. Was a Commr. in charge of a detachment of H.M.'s 17th Regt., to

suppress the riot at Sidney Mines, 1864. Sat for Inverness in N.S. Assembly from 1863 until 1867, and from g.e. 1871 until Aug. 1872, when he resigned to contest the county for the Commons, in which he was successful; re-elected at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. While in the Assembly seconded the motion of Hon. W. Miller referring the Quebec terms of Union to the Imperial Govt. for such modifications as would make them more acceptable to the people of N.S. An unsuccessful candidate for same seat in the Commons at g.e. 1867. A Conservative and a Unionist; supported the MacKenzie Administration.—*Port Hood, N.S.*

MACKENZIE, Hon. ALEXANDER. (*Lambton*) P.C.

Third s. of the late Alexander Mackenzie, of Logierait, Perthshire, Scot, by Mary, second dau. of Mr. Donald Fleming, of the same parish; and grand-s. of Mr. Malcolm Mackenzie, of Strath-tummel. The family, consisting of the parents and seven sons, came to Can. 1842. One of the sons—the late Hope F. Mackenzie, Esq., represented Lambton, and afterwards North Oxford, in the Can. Assembly for some years. B. near Dunkeld, Perthshire, 28 Jan. 1822. Ed. at the public schools of Moulin, Dunkeld and Perth. M. 1st, Helen, dau. of the late Mr. Wm. Neil, of Irvine, Scot. (she d. 2 Jan. 1852); 2nd, 17 June, 1853, Jane, eldest dau. of the late Mr. Robert Sym, of Perthshire, Scot. In youth learned the business of a builder and architect, and after arrival in Can. became a contractor. For some years edited the *Lambton Shield*, a Reform journal. Is Presdt. of the Isolated Risk and Farmers' Fire Ins. Co. Was Major 27th Lambton Batt. of V.I. for some years up to Oct. 1874, when he resigned. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council and Treas. of Ont. (in Mr. Blake's Administration), from 21 Dec. 1871 until Oct. 1872, when he retired with Mr. Blake for the purpose of confining themselves entirely to Dominion politics. Declined a seat in the Can. Cabinet on the occasion of the retirement of Mr. Brown, 1865. Was leader of Ontario Reform Opposition in House of Commons from the Union until 1873, when elected leader of the whole Opposition party, and continued in that position until 5 Nov. 1873, when, owing to the resignation of Sir John Macdonald, he was called on to form a new Administration, a duty he succeeded in accomplishing on the 7th of the same month, when he and his colleagues were sworn of the Privy Council, he (Mr. M.) taking the office of Minister of Public Works, which he held until he resigned with the other members of the Ministry, Oct. 1878. Pro-

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ceeded to the Mother Country in June 1875, and while there was presented with the Freedom of Irvine, Dundee and Perth, and visited Her Majesty at Windsor Castle. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1861 until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e. 1867, and at g.e. 1872; again at g.e. 1874; re-elected by acclamation on his appt. to office; and again at last g.e. Represented West Middlesex in Local House from g.e. 1871 until Oct. 1872, when he resigned. Several important measures owe their existence to Mr. M. as a private mem., viz—the Act Amending the Assessment Act of U.C. (1863); that consolidating and amending the Acts relating to the Assessment of Property, U.C. (1866); and the highly useful measure for providing means of egress from Public Buildings (1866.) As Chairman of Committee on Municipal and Assessment Laws (1866). wrote and framed the greater part of the General Act on Municipal Corporations, &c. All the measures of his Govt., including the enactment of a stringent election law, with the trial of election petitions by judges, and vote by ballot; the abolition of the real estate qualification of members; the inspection of produce and weights and measures; the better administration of Penitentiaries; the enactment of the Marine Telegraph Law, which virtually abolishes the monopoly of the Cable Company; the establishment of a Dominion Military College, and the improvement of the Militia system; the enlargement of the Canals; the permanent organization of the Civil Service; the establishment of a Supreme Court for the Dominion; the reduction of postage to and from the U.S.; the free delivery of postal matter in cities and towns; the opening of direct mail communication with the West Indies; the construction of a trans-continental telegraph line; the better administration of Govt. Railways; an improved copyright law; the adoption of a final route for the Pacific Railway; the opening of negotiations, conducted on our behalf by our own delegate in person, between Can. and the U.S. for the establishment of an equitable Reciprocity Treaty between the two countries; a new insolvent law; and the establishment of a Territorial Govt. for the great North-West, have all been more or less moulded and directed by him. In addition, two very important questions, which for some time agitated the public mind and threatened the gravest complications—the Manitoba Amnesty and the New Brunswick school questions—have been satisfactorily adjusted during Mr. M.'s administration. A Liberal; and “has always held those political principles—which by some in England may be considered peculiar—of the universal

brotherhood of man, no matter in what rank of life he may have taken his origin. Has believed, and now believes, in the extinction of all class legislation, and of all legislation that tends to promote any body of men, or class of men, for the mere fact of their belonging to a body or class, to a higher position politically than any other class in the country. In our great colonies, while no fault is found with the political organization of the Mother Country, or of any other country, we take our stand simply and completely on the ground that every man is equal in the eye of the law, and has the same opportunity, by exercising the talents with which God has blest him, of rising in the world, in confidence of his fellow-citizens—one man quite as much as another. Believes thoroughly in party government, and that it is utterly impossible to conduct the government of a new country without it. While an earnest advocate and upholder of the present connection with the Mother Country, he will always endeavor to maintain Canadian rights and to bring Canada into prominence in the eyes of the world."—*Toronto, Ont.; Sarnia, Ont.; Rideau Club.*

MACMILLAN, DUNCAN, B.A. (*East Middlesex.*) 2ND MEM.

Second s. of William Macmillan, Esq., P.L.S., and grand-s. of the late Duncan Mackenzie, Esq., J.P., who served throughout the Peninsular War, and on the reduction of the army came to Western Can. 1817, where he continued to reside up to his death, Aug. 1875. B. in the Tp. of London, Middlesex, Ont., 11 Feb. 1837. Ed. at Queen's Univ., Kingston, where he graduated B. A. 1857. Unmarried. Studied law with Sir John A. Macdonald, and was called to the Bar, Ont., in Easter Term, 1861. First returned to Parl. (on sitting mem. being unseated) 28 Jan. 1875. Re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative.—*London, Ont.*

MALOUIN, JACQUES, Q.C. (*Quebec Centre.*)

S. of F. X. Malouin, Esq., architect and builder, of Quebec. B. in Quebec, Feb. 1826. Ed. in same city. M. 3 June 1852, Marie Angeline Luzon (she d.); 2nd, Alvine Morisset. Is a *Battonnier* of the Bar of L.C.. Twice held the position of *Battonnier* of the Bar of L.C. section of the district of Quebec, and a mem. of the council thereof for nearly twenty years, and for the greater portion of that time was Treasurer and one of the Examiners for the admission of candidates to the Bar. Returned for present seat by acclamation, 4

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Nov. 1877, on the appointment of Hon. J. E. Cauchon to Lieut.-Governorship of Manitoba. Re-elected at last g.e. An Independent.—*Quebec.*

MASSON, Hon. LOUIS FRANCOIS RODERICK. (*Terrebonne.*) P. C.

Fourth s. of the late Hon. Joseph Masson, and bro. of the late Hon. Edouard Masson, M.L.C. B. at Terrebonne, P.Q., 7 Nov. 1833. Ed. at the Jesuit College, Georgetown, and at Worcester, U.S., and completed his classical studies at the College of St. Hyacinthe, P.Q. M. 1856, Louisa Rachel, eld. dau. of the late Lt.-Col. Alexander Mackenzie, and grand-dau. of the Hon. Roderick Mackenzie, an Ex. Councillor of the L.C., and a partner in the North-West Fur Co. Called to the Bar, L.C., Nov 1859. Has held a commission in the Can. Volunteer Militia Force since Oct. 1862, and was apptd. Brigade Major 8th Military Dist., L.C., 21 Aug. 1863, which he resigned, Jan. 1868. Served on the frontier during the first Fenian Raid, March 1866, and was on active service during the second raid, in the same year; promoted to present rank 1867. Elected Mayor of Terrebonne 1874. First returned to Parlt. for present seat. by acclamation, at g.e. 1867; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1872, at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. Sworn a mem. of the Privy Council as Minister of Militia and Defence, Oct. 1878. Acting upon the strict injunctions of his medical advisers, resigned his position as Minister of Militia, 15 Jan. 1880, and accepted portfolio of Predt. of the Council. A Conservative. Has taken strong ground in favor of an amnesty for political offences in Manitoba, and of a settlement of the N.B. School Question, and declined a seat in the Macdonald Cabinet in the fall of 1873, principally on account of the unsettled state of those questions. Is in favor of a Reciprocity Treaty with the U.S. on fair and equal terms; of a moderately protective tariff; of the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway wholly on Can. soil, as soon as the finances and circumstances of the country will permit.—*Terrebonne, P. MASSUE, LOUIS HUET. (*Richelieu.*)

Quebec. Is Presdt. of the Council of Agriculture of the Prov. of Quebec. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal-Conservative; favors protection.—*Varenes, P. Q.*

McCALLUM, LACHLIN. (*Monck.*) 2ND MEM.

B. in Scot. A shipbuilder and owner. Was Captain of the Dunville Naval Co., which he commanded at Fort Erie during the Fenian raid, June 1863. An unsuccessful candidate for Haldimand in Can. Assembly at g.e. 1862. Sat for present seat in House of Commons from g.e. 1867 until g.e. 1872, when defeated, and in the Ont. Assembly from g.e. 1871 until Sept. 1872, when unseated on petition. Again returned to Commons at g.e. 1874. Unseated on petition 12 May 1875; re-elected 22 June 1875, and again at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Stromness, Ont.*

MCCARTHY, D'ALTON, Q. C. (*North Simcoe.*)

Descended from an Irish family, his father being a solicitor of Dublin, and grandfather, Bucknell Henry McCarthy, a mem. of the Irish Bar. B. at Oakley Park, near Dublin, 10 Oct. 1836. Ed. at Rev. Mr. Harnman's School, Blackrock; at Rev. Mr. Flynn's School, Dublin, and at Barrie Grammar School. M. 1st, 21 Oct. 1867, Emma Katharine, dau. of Edmund G. Lally, Esq., of Barrie (she d.) 2nd, 15 July 1873, Agnes Elizabeth, relict of Richard B. Bernard, Esq. Contested North Simcoe unsuccessfully, 1872-74. First returned to Parlt. for Cardwell, 14 Dec. 1876. Returned for North Simcoe at last g.e. Has been an elected Bencher of the Law Society since the elective system was introduced, under the late Hon. John Sandfield Macdonald's Act. Has been Presdt. of Agricultural Society of North Riding of Simcoe, until its dissolution by the division of the North Riding into East and West Ridings, since which time he has been Presdt. of the West Riding Agricultural Society. Has also been Presdt. since formation, 1873, of the Liberal Conservative Assn. of North Riding of Simcoe. A Conservative.—*Barrie, Ont.; U.E. Club.*

MCCUAIG, JAMES S. (*Prince Edward.*)

Descended from a U.E. Loyalist. S. of the late Col. John McCuaig, of Picton, Ont. B. 29 Sept. 1819, at Picton. Ed. at Picton. M. 1st, Julia Isabella, only dau. of the late James Glass,

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Esq., of Belleville; 2nd, Maria Augusta, widow of the late Rev. John Pope, of Kingston. First returned to the Ontario Legislature for the Co. of Prince Edward at g.e. 1871, and at the close of first session resigned upon becoming a candidate for the House of Commons, when he was defeated by Walter Ross, Esq. Was Inspector of Provincial Canals for a period of two years, during the administration of the Macdonald-Cartier Govt. Again a candidate for Commons at g.e. 1873, and was defeated by a majority of 126. First returned to the House of Commons at last g.e., by a majority of 290. A Conservative and Protectionist.—*Pictou, Ont.*

McDONALD, Hon. JAMES, Q.C. (*Pictou*) P.C.

Family came from the Highlands of Scotland to Pictou, N.S., nearly a century ago. B. at East River, Pictou, 1 July 1828. Ed. at New Glasgow, N.S. M. 1856, Jane, dau. of the late Wm. Mortimer, Esq., of Pictou. Called to the Bar, N.S. 1851. Created a Q.C. 1867. A dir. of the Confederation Life Assn. Was chief railway Commr. for N.S., from June 1863 to Dec. 1864, when he was apptd. Financial Secy. in the Govt. led by Dr. Tupper, which he continued to hold until the Union. Was one of the Commrs. (representing N.S.) apptd. to open trade relations between the West Indies, Mexico and Brazil and the B.A. Provinces, 1865-66. Sat for Pictou in N.S. Assembly from 1859 until the Union, and from g.e. 1871 until July 1872, when he resigned. An unsuccessful candidate for Pictou in House of Commons at g.e. 1867. First returned to Commons at g.e. 1872. Again returned at last g.e. Sworn of the Privy Council as Minister of Justice, Oct. 1878. A Conservative and a Unionist.—“*Blink Bonnie*,” *N.W. Arm, Halifax; Halifax Club; Rideau Club, Ottawa.*

McDONALD, WILLIAM, J. P. (*Cape Breton.*)

Descended from the Clan Roland family. Grandfather emigrated from the Island of Uist, Scot., and settled in the Co. Inverness, N.S. B. at River Dennis Road, Inverness, N.S., Oct. 1837. Ed. there and at St. Francois Xavier College, Antigonish. M. Feb. 1865, Kate, dau. of Mr. Donald McDonald, of East Bay, C.B. A merchant. Has been postmaster of Little Glace Bay, which position he resigned previous to g.e. 1872. Issuer of Marriage Licenses, and Registrar of births, marriages and deaths. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1872; re-elected at g.e. 1874, and

again at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, and in favor of protecting the native industries of the country from unequal foreign competition.—*Little Glace Bay, N.S.*

MCDONALD, DUNCAN. (*Victoria, N.S.*)

MCDUGALL, Hon. WILLIAM, C.B. (*Halton.*) 3RD MEM. P.C.

S. of the late Daniel McDougall, Esq. of St. Marys, Ont., and grands. of John Macdougall, Esq., a native of Scotland, and a U.E. Loyalist, who served in the British Commissariat service during the Am. revolution; settled in Nova Scotia at the termination of hostilities, and subsequently removed to U.C. B. in Toronto, 25 Jan. 1822. Ed. there and at Victoria Univ. Cobourg. M. 1st, 1845, Amelia Caroline, dau. of Joseph Easton, Esq., of Millbank, (she d. Jan. 1869); 2nd, 18 Nov. 1872, Margaret, dau. of John Beatty, Esq. M.D. formerly a professor in Victoria University, Cobourg, Ont. Admitted as an Attorney, U.C. 1847. Called to the Bar, U.C. in Hilary Term, 1862. A member of the law firm of Macdougall & Gordon. Founded (1848) the *Canada Farmer*, an agricultural journal, subsequently merged in the *Canadian Agriculturist*, which he published and edited until 1858. Founded (1850) the *North American*, a Reform newspaper, of which he was chief editor, until it was merged in the *Toronto Daily Globe*, in 1857. Was the leading political writer on the *Daily Globe*, from 1857 to 1860. Represented Can. at the New York Exhibition, 1853. Was Secy. of the Constitutional Reform Assn. of U.C. 1859; a mem. of Ex. Council and Commr. of Crown Lands, Can. from May 1862 to March 1864, (in the Sandfield Macdonald-Dorion Administration), when the Govt. resigned; Prov.-Secy. (in the Tache-Macdonald Union Administration, from June 1864, and Acting Minister of Marine (with charge of Provincial gun-boats on the lakes), from July 1866, until the Union of the Provinces, 1867. Sworn of the Queen's Privy Council, and was Minister of Public Works for the Dominion, from 1 July 1867, until commissioned Lieut.-Gov. of Rupert's Land and the North-West Territories, Oct. 1869. Created C.B. (Civil) by Her Majesty the Queen, 1867. Was Chairman of the Commission

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apptd. to open trade relations with the West Indies, Mexico and Brazil, 1865-6. (*See Report.*) Was a delegate to the Charlottetown Union Conference, 1864; to that at Quebec, in the same year; and to the Colonial Conference in London to complete terms of Union of B.N.A. Colonies, 1866-7. Delegate to Eng. with the late Sir G. E. Cartier, to confer with Imperial authorities on the defences of the Dominion, and for the acquisition of the North-West Territory, 1868. Apptd. Govt. Trustee of Canada Southern Railway Municipal Bonds, 1870; Commr. for Ont. for the settlement of the North-Western Boundary of the Province, 1871. (*See Report.*) Sent to Eng. by Dominion Gov. 1873, as Special Commr. to confer with Imperial Govt. on subject of Fisheries, and to make arrangements in Scandinavia and the Baltic Provinces for the Emigration Department. Author of *Six Letters to the Hon. O. Mowat, Attorney-Genl. on the amendment of the Provincial Constitution (Toronto, 1872.)* Sat for North Oxford in Can. Assembly, from 1858 to 1863; for North Ontario from g. e. 1863 until July, 1864; and for North Lanark from Nov. 1864, until the Union, when returned to Commons for same seat, and continued to represent it in that House until g. e. 1872, when defeated. Was an unsuccessful candidate for North Wentworth, 1854; for Waterloo at g. e. same year; for Perth at g. e. 1857, and for East York in the Ont. Assembly at g. e. 1875. Returned for S. Simcoe in the Ont. Assembly, 25 May 1875, on death of sitting mem. and held the seat until he resigned, Sept. 1878, to contest Halton for the Commons, in which he was successful. A Conservative Liberal. "It is his theory and belief that it is in the interest of the people at large, in the interest of the Provinces, and, therefore, of the Dominion, that our local questions, our local measures, and our municipal affairs, should be considered on their merits and independently of politics." Montreal, Ottawa and Occidental Railway, between Quebec and Montreal; is a Dir. of the St. Lawrence Steam Navigation Co., and of the Union Bank of Lower Canada; is a Commr. of the Quebec Turnpike Trust; and was formerly dir. of the North Shore Railway Co. Was a mem. of the City Council of Quebec from 1858 to 1864. Sat for Stadacona Division in Legislative Council of the Province of Quebec from 1867 until the g. e. 1874, when he resigned, owing to the abolition of dual representation, to run for the House of Commons. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at the g. e. 1867, by acclamation; re-elected at g. e. 1872; again at g. e. 1874, and again by acclamation at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Esplanade, Quebec; Stadacona Club; Rideau Club.*

McINNES, THOMAS ROBERT, M. D., C. M. (*New Westminster.*)

Fourth s. of the late John McInnes, Esq., formerly of Inverness, Scotland, and latterly of Lake Ainslie, Nova Scotia, by Mary, third dau. of Capt. Edward Hamilton, of Paisley, Scotland. B. at Lake Ainslie, N.S., 5 Nov. 1840. Ed. at Normal School, Truro, N.S., and Harvard University, Boston, U.S. M. 26 Oct. 1865, Mrs. Webster, relict of the late Geo. M. Webster, Esq., of Dresden, Ont. Elected by acclamation Reeve of Dresden, Ont., January, 1874. Was Mayor of the city of New Westminster, B. C., from January 1876, to January 1878. Physician and Surgeon to the Royal Columbia Hospital since May 1874. Appointed Medical Superintendent of British Columbia Lunatic Asylum, July 1878. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, 26 March, 1878, upon resignation of the sitting member; re-elected at last g. e. Thoroughly independent in politics. Favors compulsory voting, equitable reciprocity with the U.S. and consolidation of the Dominion by the immediate construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway.—*Mary street, New Westminster, B. C.*

McISAAC, ANGUS. (*Antigonish.*)

Of Scottish descent. B. at Antigonish, N.S., 1842. Ed. at St. Francois Xavier College, N.S. Appointed Inspector of Schools for Antigonish, 1868. Called to the Bar, N.S., 1871. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, Dec. 1873, on resignation of the sitting member, but did not take his seat, owing to the dissolution of Parlt. soon after; re-elected by acclamation at g. e. 1874, and again re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal.—*Antigonish, N. S.*

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MCKAY, THOMAS. (*Colchester.*) 2ND MRM.

Of Scottish descent. B. in Co. Pictou, N.S., 8 Jan. 1839. Ed. there. M. Nov. 1868, Miss Jessie Blair, of Truro. A merchant. First returned to Parl. for present seat at g.e. 1874. Unseated on petition 14 Nov. 1874; re-elected 17 Dec. 1874, and again at last g.e. A supporter of the present Government.—*Truro, N.S.*

McLENNAN, JOHN. (*Glengarry.*)

Father emigrated from Scotland in 1802 and served as clerk; was a soldier in the war of 1812 in a militia regiment, in which he obtained a commission; afterwards a schoolmaster, farmer, magistrate and again a soldier in 1836, when he commanded a company of militia on duty for a year or two at Lancaster Village. B. at Williamston, in the Co. of Glengarry, in 1821. Ed. chiefly in Common School in the Co. M. in 1855. Engaged greater part of life in commercial pursuits. Has filled the office of President of the Montreal Board of Trade. Is vice-President of the Merchants' Bank of Canada. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Liberal-Conservative.—*By the Lake, Lancaster, Ont.*

McLEOD, WILLIAM MCKENZIE, M.D., J.P. (*Cape Breton.*)

Third S. of the Rev. Hugh McLeod, D.D., Minister of Sydney and Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, by Catherine, dau. of the late Rev. Hugh Ross, of Fearn, in Rosshire, Scotland. B. at Sherwood House, Sydney, C.B., 4 July 1854. Ed. at Sydney Academy, Dalhousie College, Halifax, and at Bellevue Hospital Medical College, New York. Graduated as Doctor of Medicine at latter institution in March 1875. Unmarried. First returned to Parl. in Oct. 1879 to fill the vacancy in the representation of Cape Breton Co., N.S., caused by the death of the late member, Hugh McLeod, (brother to the present member). A Liberal-Conservative and supporter of the present Administration.—*Sherwood, Sydney, Cape Breton, N.S.*

McQUADE, ARTHUR. (*South Victoria.*)

S. of Mr. Henry McQuade, of Lisnabuntre, Cavan, Irel., by Mary Curran. B. in Cavan, 1817. M. at Cobourg, Ont. 1841,

Susannah, dau. of Mr. Thomas Trotter. For eleven years held the office of Deputy Reeve, and is now Reeve of the Tp. of Emily. Is also Lt.-Col. Victoria Reserve Militia. Has been long connected with the Orange body, and for some years held the office of County Master. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1874; re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Omemeé, Ont.*

McRORY, JOHN, J.P. (*Addington.*)

Second s. of Matthew T. McRory, who emigrated to Canada from Irel. in 1823. B. in Kingston Tp. 1834. Ed. at Kingston. M. at Kingston, Dec. 1856, Miriam. dau. of Abraham Wood, Esq. Filled the office of Reeve from 1865 to 1877, and was Warden Co. Frontenac for the year 1876. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative, and believes the readjustment of the tariff will be an advantage to the country.—*Loughborough, Ont.*

MERNER, SAMUEL. (*South Waterloo.*)

S. of Jacob Merner, farmer, of Canton Berne, Switzerland. B. at Canton Berne, Switzerland, 29 Jan. 1823. Ed. at same place. M. in Preston, Ont., Nov 1845, to Mary Ann Grasser, dau. of Joseph Grasser, farmer, of Wilmot Tp., Co. Waterloo. Was Warden of the Co. of Waterloo in 1873, and Reeve of the Village of New Hamburg for the last seven years. For a number of years all Swiss people emigrating to the Western Prov. have been directed to Mr. Merner. Contested the Riding in 1877, on the death of John Fleming, Esq., M.P.P., for the Local Legislature, with Isaac Masters, Esq., when he was defeated by 23 votes. Returned to House of Commons at last g.e. An Independent, but in favor of the National Policy.—*New Hamburg, Ont.*

METHOT, FRANCOIS XAVIER OVIDE. (*Nicolet.*)

Youngest s. of the late F. X. Methot, who represented Quebec in the Parlt. of Old Canada from 1847 to 1851. B. in Quebec, 19 Sept. 1843. Ed. at the Quebec Seminary. M. May 1864, Marie Clara, fourth dau. of the late A. P. Methot, Esq., who sat for Nicolet in Can. Assembly from 1844 to 1847. Represented Nicolet in Quebec Assembly from g.e. 1871; re-elected at g.e. 1875. Returned to House of Commons for same Co. 18 Dec 1877, on the appointment of Mr. Gaudet to the L.C. of Quebec; re-elected at last g.e.

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Has been Mayor of St. Pierre les Becquets for several years; is a J.P. and holds a Captaincy in the Militia. An Independent Conservative and in favor of a judicious protective tariff.—*St. Pierre les Becquets, P.Q.*

MILLS, Hon. DAVID, LL. B. (*Bothwell*.) P. C.

Family, which came from near Plymouth, Eng., proceeded to Holland in the time of Charles I, thence to New England with the Puritans, and the descendants removed to N.S. at the time of the Am. revolution. S. of Nathaniel Mills, who removed from U S to Can. 1817. B. in the Tp. of Oxford, Kent, Ont., 18 March 1831. Graduated at Michigan University. M. Dec. 1860, Miss M. J. Brown. Was Superintendent of Schools for Co. of Kent from Ap. 11 1856 to April 1865. Was employed by Ontario Govt. to define the North-Western boundary of the Prov. 1872. (See report on that subject.) Author of a pamphlet on *The Present and Future Political Aspects of Canada* (1869); and another on *The Blunders of the Dominion Government in Connection with the North-West Territory* (1871). Elected mem. of the Council of Public Instruction for Ont. (representing the School Inspectors) Aug. 1875. An unsuccessful candidate for a seat in the Council of Public Instruction, Ont., 1874. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g. e. 1867; re-elected at g. e. 1872; at g. e. 1874, and again at last g. e. Sworn in as Minister of Interior (vice Laird) Oct. 1876, which position he held until resignation of Govt., Oct. 1878. An advanced Liberal. Favors the amendment of the Constitution so as to provide for the election of the Senate; for the appointment of Provl. Judges by the Provl. Executives, and the complete separation of Provl and Federal jurisdiction. Was opposed to admission of British Columbia into the Union as premature, and the terms of Union as preposterous. He was of opinion that with more than two thousand miles of unsettled territory between the Upper Ottawa and British Columbia, we were not in a position to undertake the responsibilities of governing the country upon the Pacific coast. He held that railway construction, if needed in British Columbia, was a work to be undertaken by Imperial rather than by Canadian authority. He was opposed to pledging Canada to the construction of a continuous line of railway to the Pacific, as wholly beyond the resources of this country. He denies that there ever can be a thorough traffic of Asiatic or European products over the road of any consequence, and that no engagement yet made with British Columbia, looking to the

completion of the road, can be fulfilled. He holds that since the Northern Pacific Railway has been built to the banks of the Red River of the North, that the Eastern terminus of the Canadian road ought to have been at Pembina. He holds that railway travel and traffic are not in any way affected by political boundaries, and that by utilizing the Northern Pacific we would have made it dependent upon the continuance of our trade over it to and from the North-West. Favors the government of Can. by the Can. Parl., and not by despatches from the Colonial Office. In favor of the establishment of Can. Courts having Admiralty jurisdiction. Holds that power to legislate upon the subjects of navigation and shipping carries with it power to establish Courts to adjudicate upon matters arising under such legislation, in accordance with the well-settled rules of maritime laws. Favors a national policy, based not upon principles of commercial exclusion, but upon principles of commercial extension. Thinks Canada has outgrown the condition of an ordinary colony. She has commercial relations with Foreign States, in which she alone is interested, and which she alone ought to regulate and control on her own behalf. Is opposed to the People's representatives abdicating their functions, either by failing to maintain an effective control over the expenditure of the national resources, or by surrendering to the Crown and Privy Council an important part of their legislative functions. Does not regard an enormous public debt as a national blessing; and believes that the prosperity of the country is to be promoted by habits of economy among the people, by encouraging a feeling of self-reliance and personal independence, and by fostering a spirit of patriotism—not flunkeyism—by which the interests, the prosperity, and the honor of Canada are made the paramount duty of their representatives, and not upon gigantic and costly works built in wild and uninhabitable regions. Considers the present state as one of transition, and regards the Confederation of the Empire, for certain specified purposes, as the most satisfactory solution of our political future.—*Palmyra, Ont.*

MONGENAIS, Lieut.-Col. JEAN BAPTISTE, J.P. (*Vaudreuil.*)

Grandfather was born in France, and his father in Canada. B. 24 Nov 1803, at Rigaud, Co Vaudreuil. Ed. at Rigaud. M. 1st. 14 Feb. 1825, Miss Cholet; 2nd, Nov. 1833, Miss St. Denis, and 3rd, Jan. 1834, Miss Roy, each time at Rigaud. Was a merchant up to the year 1857, when he retired. Has been Commr. of the

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Commr.'s Court, is a Justice of the Peace, and Lieut.-Col. of Militia. Sat in Quebec Assembly for Vaudreuil and Soulanges from 1848 to 1857, and from 1860 to 1864. First elected to Commons at last g. e. A Conservative.—*Rigaud, Co. of Vaudreuil.*

MONTPLAISIR, HYPOLITE. (*Champlain.*)

S. of Mr. Paschal Montplaisir, by Victoire Crevier. B. at Cap de la Magdelaine, P. Q., 7 March 1839. Ed. at Three Rivers. Has been Secretary and Treasurer of Schools, and Mayor of the parish. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at g. e. 1874; re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal.—*Cap de la Magdelaine, P. Q.*

MOUSSEAU, JOSEPH ALFRED, Q. C. (*Bagot.*)

S. of M. Louis Mousseau, of Berthier, P. Q., by Sophie Duteau de Grandpre, and grandson of M. Louis Mousseau, who sat for Warwick in the Quebec Assembly for a considerable period. B. July 1838. Ed. at the Berthier Academy. M. Marie Louise Herselle, eld. dau. of Leopold DesRosiers, Esq., N. P., of Berthier, by Marie Louise Donaire Bondy. Studied law with the Hon. L. A. (now Justice) Oliver, subsequently with Mr. T. K. (now Hon. Justice) Ramsay, and finally with the Hon. L. T. (late Justice) Drummond, and Mr. L. (now Hon. Justice) Belanger. Called to the Bar, L. C., 1860. Created a Q. C. 1873. Head of the extensive law firm of Mousseau & Archambault. Well known as a writer for the periodical press. Was one of the founders of *Le Colonisateur* newspaper, 1862, and of *L'Opinion Publique*, 1870. Author of a pamphlet in defence of Confederation against the attacks of the then Opposition, 1867, and of another *Brochure*: "*Cardinal & Duquet, Victimes de 1837-38.*" First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at g. e. 1874; re-elected at last g. e. A Conservative, and "as in the past, will constantly labor to have British North America erected into a grand empire, under the auspices, and with the institutions of the mother country." In favor of a full and complete amnesty, covering all offences committed in the North-West previous to the establishment of a Constitutional Government there. Moved, last session (1879), a vote of censure against Lieut.-Gov. Letellier, and was an efficient promoter, with his friend, Mr. Quimet, M. P., of Mr. Letellier's removal.—488 *Craig street, and 268 Dorchester street, Montreal.*

MUTTART, EPHRAIM BELL, M.D. (*King's, P.E.I.*)

Second s. of John Muttart and Elizabeth Bell, of Cape Traverse, in P.E.I. Father of German descent Mother born in Dumfriesshire, Scotland. B. 7 March 1839, at Cape Traverse, Prince Co., P.E.I. Ed. in P.E.I.; Sackville, N.B.; and graduated as M.D. at Harvard University in 1861. M. 20 May 1863, the eld. dau. of the late James McDonald, Esq., of Kingsboro', P.E.I. A Coroner; also Medical Referee for the Standard and Canada Life Assurance Companies. First returned to Parliament at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative. In favor of Free Trade throughout the British Dominions and dependencies, and Reciprocal Free Trade with all the rest of the world.—*Souris, P.E.I.*

O'CONNOR, Hon. JOHN, Q.C. (*Russell.*) P.C.

Descended from two distinct families of the O'Connors, of Kerry, Irel; father and mother were both O'Connors, though not related within known degrees of kindred; they emigrated to Am. in 1828, and settled in Boston, Mass. B. at Boston, Jan. 1824. Came to Essex with his parents in 1828. Ed. there. M. April, 1849, Mary, eld. dau. of Richard Barrett, Esq., late of Killarney, Irel. Called to the Bar, U.C., Hilary Term, 1854. Is a mem. of the Michigan (U.S.) Bar. Has been Reeve of the town of Windsor. Was Warden of Essex for three years, being twice elected by an unanimous vote of the County Council; and for 12 years fulfilled the duties of Chairman of the Board of Education of the town of Windsor. Author of *Letters addressed to the Governor-General, on the subject of Fenianism*, (1870.) Was Presdt. of the Council in Sir John Macdonald's Administration from 2 July 1872 until 4 March 1873. Minister of Inland Revenue from 4 March until 1 July 1873, and Postmaster-General from latter date until resignation of Govt. 5 Nov. 1873. Created a Q.C. in 1873, by commission of His Ex. the Governor-General. Again sworn as President of Council 17 Oct. 1878, which position he held until 15 Jan. 1880, when he resigned and became Postmaster-General. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Essex in L.A., Can., at g.e. 1861, but succeeded in 1863 in unseating the sitting member (Mr. Arthur Rankin,) and obtaining a new election, when he was returned, and sat until the dissolution of Parliament in May of that year; again contested same seat at g.e. 1863, when a Special Return was made to the House by the Returning Officer; both candidates petitioned to be

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seated, and Mr. O'Connor's petition being thrown out by the Speaker upon preliminary objections, Mr. Rankin was seated. Returned to Commons for the Co. of Essex, at g. e. 1867 and 1872, as well as at the special election after unseating Mr. Rankin; for Russell at the last g. e. (1878.) A Conservative and a supporter of Sir John A. Macdonald.—*Ottawa, Ont.*

OGDEN, ALFRED. (*Guysborough*)

Grandparents were Loyalists, who came from New York State during the American Revolutionary War, and settled in Sackville, Westmoreland Co, N.B. Youngest s. of the late John F. Ogden. B. 31 Dec. 1843, at Port Elgin, Westmoreland Co. New Brunswick. Ed. there. M. to Miss Annie Cook, 6 June 1866, Baltimore, Maryland, U.S. First returned to Parliament at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative, and supporter of the present Administration.—*Cape Canoe, Guysborough Co. N.S.*

OLIVER, THOMAS. (*North Oxford.*)

B. and ed. in Scotland. Has been Reeve of Woodstock, and Warden of the Co. Oxford. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1866 until the Union. Returned to Commons by acclamation at g. e. 1867; at g. e. 1872; at g. e. 1874 and again at last g. e. A Liberal and supporter of Mr. Mackenzie.—*Woodstock, Ont.*

OLIVIER, LOUIS EPHREM, M. D. (*Megantic.*)

S. of Jean Baptiste Olivier by Thessile Plante. B. in St. Nicholas Parish, Levis Co., 28 Aug. 1848. Ed. at Quebec Seminary. M. at St. Ferdinand d'Halifax, Megantic Co., in 1875 to Madame Marie Adéla Pelletier, now deceased. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal, in favor of Free Trade.—*St. Ferdinand d'Halifax, P. Q.*

ORTON, GEORGE TURNER, M. D., M. R. C. S. (Eng.) (*Centre Wellington.*) 2ND MEM.

S. of the late Dr. Henry Orton, who came to this country from Leicestershire, Eng., and settled at Guelph, Ont. 1835. B. in Guelph 1837. Ed. for the medical profession at College of Surgeons, Dublin, and at the University of St. Andrews, Scot., where

he graduated M.D. 1860. Is a mem. of the Royal College of Surgeons of Eng.; and Surgeon 30 Batt., Wellington Rifle Volunteers. M. Anne, dau of William Farmer, Esq., late of Sutton-Maddock, Shropshire, Eng.; for many years engaged in lumbering operations on the Gatineau. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g. e. 1872; first returned at g. e. 1874. Unseated on petition, 3 Nov. 1874; re-elected 13 Dec. 1874, and again at last g. e. A recount of votes being held, he was confirmed in his seat. A Liberal Conservative; in favor of British Connection; the consolidation of the Dominion; equitable reciprocity with U.S.; and the construction of the Pacific Railway through our own country with the greatest despatch, so as, if possible, to keep faith with British Columbia. Moved for a Committee on the Agricultural Interests of the Dominion, 1874, and in 1875.—*St. Davis street, Fergus, Ont.; U. E. Club.*

OUIMET, JOSEPH ALDÉRIC, LL. B. (Laval.)

Family one of the oldest in the Dist. of Montreal. S. of M. Michel Ouimet, J.P. B. at St. Rose, P.Q., 20 May 1848. Ed. at the Seminary of St. Therese de Blainville; graduated as LL. Is a mem. of the law firm of Desnoyers, Ouimet & Ouimet, Montreal. Apptd. a mem. of Board of R.C. School Comms. for Montreal, 1874. Is now a dir. of the Montreal City and District Savings Bank. Lieut.-Col. of the 65th Batt. Volunteer Rifles (Mount Royal.) First returned to Parl. for present seat, on resignation of sitting mem. Nov. 1873; re-elected by acclamation at g. e. 1874 and again at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative, and was first returned as an independent supporter of Sir John Macdonald. Is strongly in favor of British connection, and of the carrying out of the Confederation scheme in its entirety. Supports a protective tariff; the construction of the Pacific Railway on Canadian soil; and any well-devised scheme for the improvement of the interior navigation of the country.—*Montreal.*

PATERSON, WILLIAM. (South Brant)

S. of James Paterson, Esq., of Aberdeen, Scot., who came to Can. 1836; and grands. of Rev. Mr. Paterson, of Midmar, Scot. B. in Hamilton, Ont., 19 Sept. 1839. Ed. there and in Caledonia by Dr. Ferrier. M. Sept. 1863, Lucy Clive, third dau. of T. C. Davies,

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Esq., of Brantford. A cigar manufacturer and proprietor of the Brantford Steam Confectionary and Biscuit Works. Elected a mem. of Town Council of Brantford, 1868; was Deputy Reeve, 1869-70-71, and Mayor 1872. First returned to Parl. at g.e. 1872; re-elected at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Charlotte street, Brantford, Ont.*

PATTERSON, JAMES COLEBROOKE. (*Essex*)

S. of the late Rev. James Patterson, formerly of Kingston, near Dublin. Is Warden of Essex. Has been Reeve of Windsor for several years. First returned to Parliament for the North Riding of Essex in the Local Legislature of Ont., at the g.e. Jan. 1875. Resigned his seat in the Local House to contest the Co. for the House of Commons at the last g.e. A Conservative.—*Windsor Avenue, Windsor, Ont.*

PERRAULT, JOSEPH STANISLAS. (*Charlevoix*.)

S. of Edward Perrault, gentleman, and of Emilie Mathurin dit Girbourg, descendant of a French family who came to Canada about two centuries ago. B. 13 May 1846 in the parish of L'Assomption, near Montreal. Ed. at the College of L'Assomption. M. to Dlle. Maria Louisa Brault, in the same parish. Studied law at the University, Laval, Quebec, where he graduated LL. B., and was called to the Bar, 13 July 1870. Has practised his profession since that date. Has been Crown Prosecutor for the District of Saguenay. Was a candidate at the last g.e., being defeated by the late Pierre Alexis Tremblay. Mr. Tremblay having died, he again became a candidate for the County of Charlevoix, in Feb. 1879, being opposed by Mr. Xavier Cimon, whom he defeated. A Conservative.—*St. Etienne, Malbaie, Que.*

PICKARD, JOHN. (*York, N.B.*)

Descended from a Loyalist family that came from Massachusetts to N.B. after the American Revolution, and were amongst first settlers on the River St. John. S. of Mr. David Pickard, millowner, Douglas, York, N.B. B. in Douglas. Ed. there. M. Oct. 1851, Mary, dau. of Daniel Yerxa, Esq., of Douglas. A lumber merchant. Is R. W. Grand Master of the Orange Grand Lodge of N.B.; a dir. of the N.B. Railway Co.; and Vice-Presdt. of the York Agricultural

Society. Sat for York in N. B. Assembly from Oct. 1868 until following year, when he resigned, and was returned by acclamation to Commons upon the resignation of the sitting mem. Re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1872; at g.e. 1874, and again returned at last g.e. A Liberal; "was previously opposed to Confederation, but it having been accepted by the people, he will do his best to render it successful. Occupies an independent position, and will support or oppose the Government according to its acts."—*Regent street, Fred. ericton, N. B.*

PINSONNEAULT, *Lieut.-Col. ALFRED. J.P. (Laprairie.)*

B. in Province of Quebec. Is Lieut.-Col. 7th Batt. Huntingdon Militia. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1863 until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e. 1867; re-elected at g.e. 1872; returned by acclamation at g.e. 1874, and again re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative. *St. Jacques Le Mineur, P.Q.*

PLATT, SAMUEL. (*East Toronto.*) 2ND MEM.

B. in the city of Armagh, Ireland, 1812. Ed. there. Came to Can. 1827, and settled at Kingston, whence he removed to Toronto, 1829, where he has ever since continued to reside. M. 1836, Miss Lockett, of Staffordshire, Eng. A dir. of the Tor. Consumers' Gas Co., and Vice-Presdt. of the Western Loan and Savings Co. Elected a Water Commr. for Toronto, 1872. Was an extensive brewer and distiller for many years. Sat in the Toronto City Council for nine consecutive terms. First returned to Parl. 18 Jan. 1875, on the sitting member being unseated and a new election ordered; re-elected at last g.e. Thoroughly independent in politics, and in strong sympathy with the "Canada First" party.—*295 Jarvis street, Toronto; National Club.*

PLUMB, JOSIAH BURR. (*Niagara.*) 2ND MEM.

S. of an Episcopal Clergyman of Eng. descent on both sides. B. in his father's parish, East Haven, Conn., U.S., 1816. M. in 1848, the youngest dau. of the late Hon. Samuel Street, of Niagara Falls (she d.) First returned to Parliament for present seat at g.e. 1874. Unseated on petition, 22 Oct. 1874; re-elected 19 Dec. 1874. Was a candidate at last g.e., when his opponent, Mr. Hughes, of Toronto, was declared elected by a majority of two votes. Sub-

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sequently, that gentleman was disqualified, and four votes having been struck off his list for bribery, the seat was awarded to Mr. Plumb. A Conservative. Is of opinion that "the great aim of Parliament should be to remove sectional jealousies, and to cement the Union into a whole, in which Provincial boundaries should be obliterated in the carrying out of Parliamentary work."—*Niagara, Ont.; Toronto Club; Rideau Club; U.E. Club.*

POPE, *Hon.* JAMES COLLEDGE. (*Queen's, PEI.*) *P. C.*

Descended from a Cornish family. B. at Bedeque, P. E. I., 11 June 1826. Ed. there and in Eng. M. a dau. of Thomas Pethick, Esq., of Charlottetown. A merchant. Entered the P. E. I. Assembly 1857, and continued to hold a seat in that body since that time (except during a few months in 1873, when he sat in House of Commons) until Aug. 1876, when defeated upon the School Question. Entered the Ex. Council 1859. Was Premier from 1865 to 1868, and again from 1870 to 1872; and in 1873 was called upon to form a new Administration, which he succeeded in doing. The construction of the P. E. I. Railway, and the successful negotiations of "better terms" on the colony entering the Dominion, were two of the achievements of his Govt. Returned for present seat in the House of Commons, Nov. 1876, upon the elevation of the then sitting mem., Hon. D. Laird, to be Lieut.-Gov. of the North-West Territories. Again returned at last g.e. Sworn a mem. of the Privy Council as Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Oct. 1878. A Conservative.—*Ottawa; Ravenwood, Charlottetown, P. E. I.*

POPE, *Hon.* JOHN HENRY. (*Compton.*) *P. C.*

B. in Eastern Townships, P. Q. Is Presdt. of the International Railway, and of the Compton Colonization Society; one of the Trustees of the St. Francis College, Richmond, P. Q.; and a Dir. of the Eastern Townships Bank. Commanded the Cookshire Volunteer Cavalry for many years, and retired, retaining his rank as Major, 1862. Sworn of the Privy Council, and was Minister of Agriculture from 25 Oct. 1871 until 5 Nov. 1873, when he retired with his chief, Sir John A. Macdonald, on the Pacific Railway question. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1857 until the Union. Was an unsuccessful candidate for same seat at g.e. 1854. Returned to Commons by acclamation at g.e. 1867, on his appt. to office at g.e. 1872, and at g.e. 1874. Again returned at

last g.e., and sworn of the Privy Council as Minister of Agriculture, 17 Oct. 1878. A Liberal Conservative.—*Cookshire, P.Q.*; *Rideau Club*.

POITRE, JOHN. (*Pontiac*.)

Family Norman-French emigrants. B. in Edwardsburg, Grenville, in the year 1817. Ed. in Potsdam, State of N.Y. M. in 1846, Mary Margaret, eldest dau. of the late Pierre Bomé, of Quebec. Entered the House of Assembly for the United Provinces in 1861 for the Co. of Pontiac; served till Confederation, and then represented the same Co. in the Quebec Provincial Assembly till 1874. Resigned in favor of the Hon. L. R. Church. Received a valuable testimonial in the shape of a valuable piece of plate from his constituents, in whose interests he resigned, after having served for the period of fourteen years. A farmer, lumber manufacturer and miller. Was Emigration Agent at Quebec from 1876 to last July, which office he resigned at the request of a convention held at Portage-du-Fort, at which he was nominated to represent the Co. of Pontiac in the House of Commons. Lieut.-Col. commanding Reserve Militia of the Co. of Pontiac. A Conservative. A follower of the late Sir G. E. Cartier, Bart., and of the Right Hon. Sir J. A. Macdonald. An advocate of the National Policy.—*Chichester P.O., Pontiac, P.Q.*

RICHEY, MATTHEW HENRY, Q.C. (*Halifax*.)

Eldest s. of the Rev. Matthew Richey, D.D., at one time Presdt. of Victoria College, Cobourg, and for some years Presdt. of the Wesleyan Methodist Conference in Can., and subsequently of the Wesleyan Methodist Conference of Eastern British America. B. at Windsor, N.S., 10 June 1828. Ed. at Collegiate School, Windsor; U.C. Academy, Cobourg; U.C. College, Toronto; and Queen's College, Kingston. Admitted to Bar of N.S. 1850. M. 22 June 1854, Sarah Lavinia, dau. of the late Hon. John Hawkins Anderson, Senator. Mayor of Halifax—three consecutive years, 1864-7, and three, 1875-8. Created Q.C. 1873. A mem. of the Senate of the Univ. of Halifax. Presdt. of the Nova Scotia S.P.C.A. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Halifax, N.S.*

RINFRET, CÔME ISAÏE, M.D. (*Lotbinière*.)

S. of F. J. Rinfret, Esq., merchant, by C. Thibaudeau, a sister of the Hon. Isidore Thibaudeau. B. at Cape Sante, Co. Portneuf. Ed. at the Seminary of Quebec. M. Miss N. Laliberté, at St. Croix in the winter of 1873. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. Elected as a Liberal.—*St. Croix, Co. Lotbinière*.

ROBERTSON, THOMAS, Q.C. (*Hamilton*)

B. 25 Jan. 1827, at the Village of Ancaster, then the most important business centre west of York. His father, the late Alexander Robertson, Esq., of Goderich, a remote descendant of the Robertsons of Struan, Chiefs of the Clan Donnachie, came to this country in 1820, from Foxbar, in Renfrewshire, which had been the home of his family for several generations, since the time when, the misfortunes of Prince Charlie having proved the ruin of so many of his adherents, not a few of the Robertsons had left their beloved Kannoeh to seek for better fortunes in the, to them, unwontedly peaceful pursuits of the lowlands. M. 1824, Matilda, eld. dau. of Col. Titus Geir Simons, High Sheriff of the old Gore District, who had served in command of his regiment in the war of 1812-13, and fought at Lundy's Lane, where he was dangerously wounded. Of this marriage Mr. Robertson is the eldest child. He was ed. at the London and Huron District Grammar Schools and the Univ. of Toronto; studied law under the late Hon. John Hillyard Cameron; became an Attorney in 1849; was called to the Bar in 1852; became a Q.C. under Patent from the Earl of Dufferin, Governor-General, in 1873, and a Bencher of the Law Society of Ont. in 1874. Mr. Robertson m. in June 1850, Frances Louisa, youngest dau. of the late Theodore Reed, Esq., one of the earliest pioneers of the "Huron Tract," by whom he has three sons and one daughter living. He began his professional career at Dundas, whence he subsequently removed to Hamilton, where he enjoys a large practice and a widely-extended reputation as a leading *nisi prius* advocate. He was the first Crown Attorney for Wentworth, and he remained such until 1863, when he was superseded by the appointment by Mr. Sandfield Macdonald of the late Mr. S. B. Freeman, Q.C. to the Clerkship of the Peace, whereby he became also *ex-officio* Crown Attorney. At the first g.e. after Confederation, Mr. Robertson contested South Wentworth with Mr. Rymal, the then and now sitting mem. for that constituency, at whose hands he suffered

defeat by a majority of 27 votes. Mr. Robertson and his colleague, Mr. F. E. Kilvert, M.P., were elected at the g.e. of 1878, in opposition to Mr. Irving, Q.C., and Mr. Wood, the late mems, to the representation of the constituency for which they now sit. A Liberal-Conservative and a supporter of the National Policy, which, as to its main features, he strongly advocated in 1867 in his contest with Mr. Rymal in South Wentworth. He is also in favor of compulsory voting, which he suggested as a desirable amendment of the law, both through the press and in letters to Mr. Edward Blake and other persons, so long ago as 1870.—*Hamilton, Ont.*

ROBERTSON, THOMAS. (*Shelburne.*)

S of Hon. Robert Robertson, ex-Commissioner of Mines and Public Works, N.S., who represented Shelburne in N.S. Legislature from 1855 to 1878, by Sarah, dau. of the late Wm. Richan, of Yarmouth. Grand-s. of the late William Robertson, U.E. Loyalist, who removed from New York to Shelburne in 1783. B. 13 Sept. 1852. Ed. at Barrington. Unmarried. Was apptd. to Civil Service of N.S. in 1868, and retired by resignation in 1877. Filled important positions in Mines and Works and Provl. Secy.'s Depts., also in connection with the Immigration Dept. Is a prominent member of Independent Order of Oddfellows. Historiographer of Grand Lodge of the Lower Provinces of B.N.A., and was representative of that body in Grand Lodge of the United States for the years 1876-7. Author of History of the County of Shelburne, N.S. (an essay) and History of the County of Digby, prize essay, King's College, Windsor, N.S. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. Unsuccessful candidate for Local Legislature at special election held in Jan. 1878. A Liberal, and favors Free Trade and advanced temperance legislation.—*Barrington, N.S.*

ROBINSON, Hon. JOHN BEVERLEY. (*Toronto West.*) 2ND MEM.

Second s. of the late Sir John Beverley Robinson, Bart., C.B. for many years Chief Justice of Upper Canada, and representative of York and Toronto in Parl. Descended from a Yorkshire family, among the most prominent of whom may be mentioned Christopher Robinson, Secy. of the Colony of Virginia, the first of the family to come to Am., 1660, and elder bro. of Dr. John Robinson, Bishop of Bristol and of London. Among the direct descendants of Christopher Robinson were John Robinson, Presdt. of the Council of Vir-

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ginia, and for nearly 30 years Speaker of the House of Burgesses there in old colonial times; Col. Beverley Robinson, a well-known Loyalist officer in the Am. Revolutionary war, who raised a regt. in defence of the Crown, and whose name (and residence, Beverley House, on the Hudson River) was intimately associated with that of André in the Revolutionary war; Gen. Sir Frederick Robinson, G.C.B., Commander-in-Chief and Provisional Governor of U.C. and afterwards Governor of Tobago; Christopher Robinson, who during the Revolutionary war served as an officer of the "Queen's Rangers," under the command of Gen. Simcoe, first Gov. of U.C. After the close of the war he was appointed Inspector of the Reserves of the Crown in U.C., finally settled in York, and in 1796 represented the Counties of Lennox and Addington in the House of Assembly. He was father of the late Chief Justice Sir John Beverley Robinson, Bart., who, in addition to his other services to his country, fought as a volunteer under Gen. Brock in the war of 1812, and was present at the capture of Detroit and at the battle of Queenstown Heights. B. at Beverley House, Toronto, 21 Feb. 1821. Ed. at U.C. College. M. 30 June 1847, Mary Jane, second dau. of the late Hon. Mr. Justice Hagerman. Called to the Bar, U.C., Easter Term 1844. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, Can., and Presdt. of that body in the Cartier-Macdonald Administration, from 27 March to 21 May 1862. Returned for Algoma in House of Commons at g. e. 1872 and sat until the dissolution 1874. Elected for several years as one of the Aldermen of the city; also Presdt. of the City Council and afterwards Mayor of the city. Was Presdt. of St. George's Society, and for 15 years Solicitor for the Corporation. Had seven elections in the interests of the Conservative party for the City of Toronto, and returned five times to the House of Commons by large majorities, the greatest majority (670) being polled at the last g. e. A Conservative. — *Sleepy Hollow, Toronto; U.E. Club.*

ROCHESTER, JOHN. (*Carleton, Ont.*)

Family came from Eng. to Am. 1818; removed to Can. 1820 and finally settled at Bytown (now Ottawa City) 1827. S. of the late John Rochester, Esq., a native of Berwick-on-Tweed, and for some years a contractor to the troops employed in the construction of the Rideau Canal. B. at Rouse's Point, N. Y., 1822. Ed. in Can. M. Sept. 1845, Elizabeth Ann, dau. of the late Rev. Thomas Bevvitt, Wesleyan Minister at Matilda, Ont. A lumber manufacturer. A dir. of the Ottawa Agricultural Insurance Co. Has been Presdt.

of the St. George's Society, Ottawa; and of the Ottawa Ladies' College. Sat in City Council, Ottawa, as an Alderman, for eleven years, and was Mayor of the city for three consecutive terms. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g.e. 1868. First returned at g.e. 1872; re-elected at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Richmond Road, Ottawa; Rideau Club.*

ROGERS, ALEXANDER. (*Albert.*)

Only s. of William Rogers, by Eliza, dau. of James Loughhead, of Truro, N.S. Great grand-parents emigrated from the North of Ireland to Nova Scotia about 1760. B. at Hopewell Hill, N.B., 12 Feb. 1842. Ed. at Mount Allison Wesleyan Academy. M. 5 Dec. 1866, at Hopewell. Bessie, dau. of the late Thos. B. Moore, barrister. Is a merchant. Has been Secy. and Treas. of the Albert County Agricultural Society since its organization in 1861. First returned to N.B. Assembly, for Albert, at g.e. 1874. Unseated, on petition, 17 July 1875. Re-elected 28 Aug. 1875. Again unseated 3 Dec. 1875. Re-elected 18 Jan. 1876. An unsuccessful candidate for the Assembly at g.e. 1878. First returned to House of Commons at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Hopewell Hill, Albert Co., N.B.*

ROSS, GEORGE WILLIAM. (*West Middlesex.*)

Of Celtic origin. Family came to Can from Ross-shire, Scot., 1832. B. in County Middlesex, Ont., 18 Sept. 1841. Ed. there and at Provl. Normal School, Toronto. M. Christina, fourth dau. of Duncan Campbell, Esq., of Middlesex (she d. Aug. 1872); 2nd, 1875, Miss Boston, of Lobo, Co. Middlesex. Has been for many years a leader in the Temperance and Prohibitory movements in Can., and has rendered most important services in connection therewith, having succeeded in obtaining the appt. of the late commission of the U.S., and in securing the meeting of the late Dominion Convention at Montreal. Is Inspector of Public Schools for Co. Lambton; one of the proprietors of the *Ontario Teacher*; a Vice-Presdt. of the Ontario Temperance and Prohibitory League; and a P.G.W.P. of Grand Division Sons of Temperance of Ont. Has been editor of the *Strathroy Age*, and of the *Seaforth Expositor*, both Reform journals. First returned to Parl., for present seat, at g.e. 1872, re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1874, and again returned at last g.e. A thorough Reformer, and a supporter of Mr. Mackenzie.—*Strathroy, Ont.*

ROSS, JOHN SYLVESTER. (*Dundas.*)

S. of the late Michael Ross, Captain of Militia and Volunteers actively engaged in 1812-13, and grantds. of the late Jacob Ross, U.E. Loyalist — in charge of an important duty under Sir John Johnson, for which he received special thanks—declining a command, and received large land grant in recognition. B. 1821, Township Osnabruck, Co. Stormont. Ed. at District Co. School, and by private tutor. M. 1845, Charlotte, second dau. of Peter Carman, Esq., Iroquois, and grand-dau. of the late Peter Shaver, Esq., who represented the Co. Dundas in the U.C. Legislature for sixteen years. Municipal Councillor for ten years; is Reeve and a J.P.; Clerk of the Division Court. Chairman of the High School Board for fifteen years. Commr in B. R. Presdt. of the Iroquois Milling Co. Was elected in 1861 to U C. Legislature for Co. Dundas; re-elected 1863, and again, to Dominion Parlt., by acclamation, in 1867. Defeated in 1872. Re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative-Liberal; thoroughly Canadian; opposed to the Govt. constructing and working railroads. In favor of limiting the rate of interest. Opposed to the Bankrupt Law. Holds that the Pacific Railway should have received Imperial aid, and is in favor of special arrangements with other countries in trade matters.—*Iroquois, Co. Dundas, Ont.*

ROULEAU, FRANCOIS FORTUNAT, B.C.L. (*Dorchester.*) 2ND MEM.

S. of Lieut.-Col Francois Rouleau, N.P., Registrar of Dorchester, by Luce Labonté. B. at Ste. Claire, P.Q., 4 July 1849. Ed. at the Laval Normal School, Quebec, and at Laval University, where he obtained the degree of B.C.L., 1870. M. 8 May 1873, M. J. J. Alphonsine Peachy, dau. of J. W. Peachy, Esq., Customs Department, Ottawa. Called to the Bar, P Q, 1870. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1874. Unseated on petition, 8 July 1875; re-elected 14 Dec. 1875, and again at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Donnacona street, Quebec.*

ROUTHIER, FELIX, J.P. (*Prescott.*)

Fourth s. of the late Charles Routhier, farmer of St. Placide, Two Mountains Co., Q. B. 21 May 1827 at St. Placide. Ed. at the Public Schools. M. 9 July 1849 at St. Benoit, Two Mountains Co., Angélique Delorme dit Lemay. Is a manufacturer, Justice of

the Peace, a Major, V.I., and Mayor of the Municipality of St. Placide. First returned to Parl. at last g.e.—A Conservative.—*Vankleek Hill, Ont.*

ROYAL, Hon. JOSEPH, LL.D. (*Provencher.*)

B. at Repentigny, P.Q., 7 May 1837. Ed. at the Jesuits' College, Montreal. Called to the Bar L.C., 1864, and to the Bar of Manitoba, 1871. As an advocate, has been retained in many important causes, the most notable of which were those of the Queen vs. Ambroise Lépine, and the Queen vs. Naud, tried at the Manitoba Criminal Assizes, Oct. 1874, for the execution of Thomas Scott, under the Provisional Govt. of Louis Riël, and in which he was associated with Hon. J. A. Chapleau, Q.C., as a Counsel for the defence. Was for some years one of the Asst. French Translators to the Can. Assembly. Has been a prominent writer on the French Can. newspaper and periodical press for a lengthened period. Edited the Montreal *Minerve* from 1857 until 1859, when he established *L'Ordre*, which he conducted until 1860. Was one of the founders of *La Revue Canadienne* 1864, to which he contributed many valuable and interesting papers. In 1867 founded, with others, *Le Nouveau Monde* (Montreal), of which he became chief editor. In 1871, shortly after his removal to Manitoba, established *Le Métis*, of which he still remains editor and proprietor. Is leader of the Métis and French Canadians of Manitoba. Author of *Vie Politique de Sir Louis H. Lafontaine* (1864), and of many other important contributions to French Canadian literature. Was one of the Secretaries to the Montreal Central Committee, and took an active part in organizing the Papal Zouaves who were sent to the assistance of the Holy Father, 1868. Elected First Vice-Chancellor of the University of Manitoba in 1877, and re-elected 1878. Appt. a Commr. for the Consolidation of the Statutes of the Province, in May 1877, together with Chief Justice Wood. Elected Speaker of the first Leg. Assembly of Manitoba 1871, an office he vacated March 1872, on being apptd. a member of Ex. Council, and Prol. Secy. of the Province; resigned with the Govt. 8 July 1874. Re-apptd. to the Cabinet, with the offices of Prol. Secy. and Minister of Public Works, 3 Dec. 1874. Resigned office of Public Works, and accepted that of Atty.-Genl., May 1876, which he held until resignation of Govt., when he was offered and accepted portfolio of Min. of Public Works in the new Administration, 1878. Early in 1879 a difference of opinion having arisen

between the Premier and Hon. Mr. Royal; the latter resigned. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council for the N.-W. Territories, 1873. Was the first Supt. of Education (apptd. 1871) for Manitoba, and as such exerted himself in having the law explained and carried out in every locality; resigned March 1872, on his appt. to office. Obtained the command of a cavalry troop, composed of natives, at the time of the Fenian raid Oct. 1871, and was detailed on an important scouting expedition in the South-West of the Province. Discharged the administrative duties of Atty.-Genl. from 3 Dec. 1874 until 1878, and personally supervised the important legislative of 1875-6, introduced by the Davis-Royal Govt., which included the County Municipalities Act; the Administration of Justice Act; the Electoral Law; the Act respecting the trial of Controverted Elections, and the Act for the abolition of the Leg. Council. Is also the author of the School Law (refunded) 1873; of the system of registration of deeds, and of the mode of establishing and collecting vital statistics. Has been a delegate to Ottawa on several occasions on the subject of "Better Terms," and the enlargement of the boundaries of Manitoba. In Oct. 1875 was successful, with Mr. Davis, in securing a readjustment of the financial arrangements of the Dominion. In the session of 1877 carried through the law respecting the consolidation of the Province since its annexation to Canada. First returned to the Leg. Ass. Manitoba, for St. Francois Xavier West by acclamation, Dec. 1870, on the erection of Manitoba into a Province of the Dominion; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1874, and again at g.e. 1878. Elected for present seat on appt. of Mr. Dubuc, the sitting mem., as Puisne Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench, Manitoba, Dec. 1879. A Conservative. An advocate of extension, so as to make Manitoba a Maritime Province, with a port on Lake Superior and on the Hudson Bay. A firm believer in the great destiny of the Far West, and will labor zealously towards its accomplishment. Visited Ottawa to confer with the General Govt. upon Provincial affairs in 1874, 1875, 1876, and again in 1879.—*Provencher Avenue, St. Boniface; Winnipeg; Manitoba Club.*

RYAN, MICHAEL PATRICK, J. P. (*Montreal Centre.*)

Third s. of William and Mary Ryan. B. at Pallis Donohill, County Tipperary, Ireland. Ed. there. The family came to Can. in 1840. Settled on a farm near Chambly. Kept the Franklin House from 1849 to 1855. M. Margaret, eldest dau. of Patrick

Brennan, Esq., merchant. Was elected a member of the Corporation of Montreal in 1852. Sat for three years. In 1856 went into the provision business, and for many years did the largest business in the trade. Retired from it in 1875, owing to severe losses sustained. Was a mem. of the Council of the Board of Trade, Montreal. Three times elected Presdt. of the Commercial Exchange Assn. Captain of Militia. Was Director of the M.O. & O.R. First elected to Parlt. by acclamation for Montreal West in April 1868, on death of Hon. Thos. D'Arcy McGee. Elected again by acclamation for same division in 1872. Contested Montréal Centre in 1874, and defeated his opponent, Bernard Devlin, Esq., by 383 votes. Was unseated and contested the seat again with the same opponent, and was defeated by 73 votes. Was again elected for Montreal Centre at last g.e. by a majority of 802 votes over his opponent, B. Devlin, Esq. A Liberal Conservative, having always supported that party since the days of Baldwin and Lafontaine. A strong supporter of a policy of protection to develop the industries of the country and give employment to the people.—390 *St. Antoine street, Montreal.*

RYAN, JOSEPH O'CONNELL. (*Marquette*.) 2ND MEM.

S. of Mr. John O'Connell, of Pittsburgh, Frontenac, Ont. B. at Dunnville, Ont., 18 Dec. 1841. Ed. at Regiopolis College, Kingston. Assumed his mother's maiden name [Ryan] at the request of his uncle. M. Sept. 1868, Mary Helena, niece and adopted dau. of the late P. Macmanamin, Esq., of Kingston. Studied law with Robt. Wilkinson, Esq., County Attorney of Frontenac, and was called to the Bar, Ont., in Michaelmas Term, 1869; to that of Man., 1872. A Dir. of the Royal Mutual Life Assurance Co. Edited the *British American* (Kingston), a Reform journal, for a short period; and was one of the two special Auditors who, in 1868, discovered a defalcation of many thousand dollars in the accounts of the then Treasurer of Frontenac. Was a candidate for present seat at last g.e., when the late Mr. Robert Cunningham was returned; the election being protested, a scrutiny of votes was had before the Election Court after Mr. Cunningham's death, and Mr. Ryan was declared the sitting mem. Was again a candidate at last g.e., but retired in favour of Sir John Macdonald, who was elected by acclamation. On the seat becoming vacant, through the acceptance of office as Premier by Sir John Macdonald, was again a candidate and elected by acclamation. A Liberal.—*Portage La Prairie, Man.*

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RYKERT, JOHN CHARLES. (*Lincoln.*)

German descent: s. of George Rykert, who formerly represented Lincoln in the old Upper Can. Parl. B. at St. Catharines, 10 March 1832. Ed. at Upper Can. College. M. 19 Oct. 1854 to Miss Hawley, dau. of Col Sheldon Hawley, of Trenton, Co. Hastings. A Barrister and Attorney-at-Law. Reeve of Township of Grantham and St. Catharines for 20 years continuously. Warden five times. President of the Agricultural and Arts Association of Ontario in 1865, and has since that time been a mem. of the Council of the same Association. Now represents Elect. Dist. No. 8, and has since 1867. Chairman St. Catharines Collegiate Institute. First returned to Parl. in 1860, and again in 1861 by acclamation. Sat in Parl. until the fall of 1863. Elected by acclamation at time of Confederation for the Local House; again by acclamation in 1871. Elected again in 1876. Was defeated in 1875 by Capt. Neelin for the Local, but unseated and disqualified him for bribery and was elected over him in 1876, his disqualification being removed by the Mowat Govt. Returned to Commons at last g.e. A Conservative.—*St. Catharines, Ont.*

RYMAL, JOSEPH. (*South Wentworth.*)

S. of Mr. Jacob Rymal, who sat in the U.C. Assembly. B. in Co. Wentworth, 17 Nov. 1821. Is a Dir. of the Victoria Mutual Insurance Co. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from g.e. 1867 until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e. 1867; re-elected at g.e. 1872; at g.e. 1874 and again at last g.e. A Liberal. In favor of a Prohibitory Liquor Law.—*Barton, Ont.*

SCHULTZ, HON. JOHN, M.D. (*Lisgar.*)

Of Danish descent. S. of late Wm. Schultz, merchant of Amherstburgh, Ont., by Eliza, dau. of Wm. Riley, Esq., of Bandon, Irel. B. at Amherstburgh Ont., 1 Jan. 1840. Ed. in Arts at Oberlin, Ohio, and in Medicine at Queen's University, Kingston, and Victoria University, Coburg. Graduated as M.D. 1860. M. at Winnipeg, 1868, Miss Agnes Campbell Ferguhanson, of Georgetown, B.C. Went to the North-West in 1860, and was leader of the Canadian party at the time of the Rebellion of 1869-70; was seized, imprisoned and sentenced to death by Riel, but escaped. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council for the N.-W. Ter., Dec. 1872. Is Presdt.

of Manitoba Board of Trade; a mem. of the Dominion Board of Health for Manitoba and N.-W. Ter.; Presdt. of the N.-W. Trading Co.; a Dir. of the Manitoba South-Western Colonization Ry., and one of the Board of Governors of Manitoba Medical Board. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, on Manitoba entering the Dominion, March 1871. Re-elected at g.e. 1872, also at g.e. 1874, and by acclamation at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, strongly in favor of the development of the North-West.—*Winnipeg.*

SCRIVER, JULIUS. (*Huntingdon.*)

Descended from U.E. Loyalists, who came to Can. from Dutchess County, N.Y., at the close of the revolution. B. at Hemmingford, P.Q., 26 Feb. 1826. Ed. at the University of Vermont. M. Miss Frances A. Stevens, of Potsdam, N.Y. Is Presdt. of the Quebec Frontier Railway. Sat for Huntingdon in Que. Assembly from the Union until Sept. 1869, when he resigned and was returned to Commons by acclamation. Re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1872; and again returned at g.e. 1874. Re-elected by acclamation at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Hemmingford, P.Q.*

SHAW, ALEXANDER. (*South Bruce.*)

Descended from John Shaw, yeoman, deceased, of the Township of Ramsay, Lanark, Ont., who was one of the earliest settlers in that Township. His son, William McNair Shaw, was the first white child born in that settlement, and at the time of his death represented South Lanark in the Ontario Legislature. B. 1833 in the Township of Ramsay. Ed. at Town of Perth. M. in 1860, to Anna Robertson, dau. of Peter Robertson, merchant of the Town of Kincardine, Bruce. A Barrister. Was Mayor of Walkerton one year, fourth year after it was incorporated, and has been since the County of Bruce was separated from Huron, 11 years, and is now Solicitor for the County of Bruce. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, and of opinion that our industries should be benefitted by a protective policy suited to our wants and the country we inhabit.—*Walkerton, Ont.*

SKINNER, Lieut.-Col. JAMES ATCHESON. (*South Oxford.*) 2ND MEM.

B. in the Royal Burgh of Tain, Ross-shire, Scot., 1826. Ed. at the Grammar School and Royal Academy there. Came to Can.

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1843. M. 1849, Agnes, second dau. of Robert Johnson, Esq., of Annandale. "A farmer, and proud of being a farmer." Entered the Can. Volunteer Militia Service 1855, and shortly afterwards organized the first Highland Co. enrolled in Western Can.; in 1860, after the disbandment of the first one, organized a second Highland Co., (which he uniformed at his own expense), and which did duty during the visit to Hamilton of H.R.H. the Prince of Wales; in 1862, on the formation of the 13th V.I., became Major, and in 1866 succeeded to the Lieut.-Colonelcy of that Batt., a position he still retains. Is also Vice-Presdt. of the Ontario Rifle Assn.; a mem. of Council of Dominion Rifle Assn.; and Presdt. of the Highland Society of Hamilton and Canada West (holding a charter from the Highland Society of Scotland); and of the Highland Society of Embro. Was present at Ridgeway with the 13th; and acted as Brigadier at the military camps at Niagara, 1873-4. Col. Skinner also organized and commanded the first Colonial "team," (raised in Ontario in 1871), for competition at the annual rifle matches at Wimbledon. First returned to Parlt. for present seat 23 May 1874, on the resignation of the sitting mem. Re-elected at last g.e. "In politics, has always been a Reformer, and will always be found using his best endeavors to procure an honest, economical and efficient administration of the affairs of the country."—*St. Duthus House, Dunelg, Woodstock, Ont.; Rideau Club.*

SMITH, Sir ALBERT JAMES, *K. C. M. G.*, *Q. C.* (*Westmoreland.*) *P. C.*

S. of the late T. E. Smith, Esq., of Co. Westmoreland, N.B. B. there 1824. Ed. at the Co. Grammar School. M. June 1863, the dau. of J. W. Young, Esq., of Halifax, N.S. Called to the Bar, N.B., Feb. 1847. A Queen's Counsel. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, N.B., from 1856 to 1863, and also for a short period in 1866; Attorney-Genl. from 1862 to 1863, when he retired from the Govt.; held same office in his own Administration, 1865. Was a delegate to Eng.; with the present Judge Fisher, 1858, on the subject of the Intercolonial Railway; to the same country, with the present Chief Justice Allan, on public business, 1865; and to Washington, with Hon. Messrs. Galt (now Sir A. T.), Howland and Henry, on the subject of Reciprocal Trade, Jan. 1866. Declined the Chief Justiceship of N.B. 1866; the Lieut.-Governorship of the same Province, 1873; and the Ministership of Justice, June 1874. Sworn of the Privy Council, and appointed Minister of Marine and Fisheries, 7 Nov. 1873. Represented the Dominion

Govt. before the Fisheries Commission at Halifax, in 1877, which resulted in an award of \$5,500,000 in favor of Great Britain. Created K. C. M. G., by Her Majesty the Queen, 1878. Sat in the N. B. Assembly from 1852 until the Union, when returned to Commons; re-elected by acclamation at g. e. 1872; again on his appointment to office, and again at last g. e. A Liberal.—*Dorchester. N. B.; Rideau Club.*

SMITH, Hon. DONALD ALEXANDER. (*Selkirk.*)

B. in Scot. 1821. Ed. there. M. Isabella, dau. of the late Richard Hardisty, Esq., at one time an officer in the British army, and afterwards of the Hon. Hudson Bay Co. Has been for many years in the service of the Hon. Hudson Bay Co., and now holds the office of Resident Governor and Chief Commr. of the Corporation. Is Vice-Patron of the Selkirk Rifle Assn.; Presdt. of the Manitoba Provl. Agricultural Assn.; of the Selkirk St. Andrew's Society; and of the Anticosti Co.; Vice-Presdt. of the Dominion Rifle Assn.; and of the London and Canadian Loan and Agency Co.; and a dir. of the Bank of Montreal; of the Mitchell Steamship Co.; of the Bank of Manitoba; and of the Railway Equipment and Railway Stock Co.; and a mem. of the Board of Management of the Manitoba (Presbyterian) College. Appt. a mem. of the Ex. Council for N. W. Territories, Oct. 1870. Was a Special Commr. to enquire into the causes, nature and extent of the obstruction offered in the North-West Territories to the peaceful ingress of Hon. W. Macdougall, and for other purposes, Dec. 1869. Represented Winnipeg and St. John in the Manitoba Assembly from the first meeting of that body, 1871, until Jan. 1874, when he resigned in order to confine himself to the Commons. First returned to Commons for present seat on the admission of Manitoba into the Union, 1871; re-elected at g. e. 1872, at g. e. 1874, and again at last g. e., which election was protested and is now before the Courts. A Conservative. and "as he has no favors to ask, and nothing personal to desire from any Govt., he will support only such measures as are conducive to the advancement of Manitoba and the North-West in the first instance, and to the general prosperity of the Dominion."—*Silver Heights and Fort Garry, Manitoba; Hudson Bay Hous. Montreal; St. James' Club; Rideau Club.*

SNOWBALL, Jabez B. (*Northumberland.*)

S. of Rev. John Snowball. Family originally German, but for some generations of Yorkshire, Eng. B. at Lunenburg, N. S., 24

Sept. 1837. Ed. at Mount Allison Wesleyan College, Sackville, N.B. M. 1st, at Chatham, 27 July 1858, Margaret, dau of John McDougall, Esq.; 2nd, at Airdrie, Scotland, 18 Feb. 1873, Maggie E, dau. of the Rev. Robert Archibald. Is Consular Agent of France for Miramichi; Presdt. St. George's Society of Miramichi; Miramichi South-West Boom Co.; Chatham Gas-light Co., and Manager Chatham Branch Ry Co. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. An Independent.—*Chatham, Miramichi, N.B.*

SPROULE, THOMAS SIMPSON, M.D. (*East Grey.*)

S. of James and Jane Sproule, natives of Tyrone, Irel, who came to Canada, A.D., 1836, and settled in the Township of Kings, Co. York, as farmers. Remained there until 1850, when they moved to the Co. Grey. B. in the Co. York, A.D., 1843. Ed. in the University of Victoria and University of Michigan. Graduated, 1867, as M.D., since which time has been practising his profession; unmarried. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Conservative.—*Markdale P.O., Ont.*

STEPHENSON, RUFUS. (*Kent, Ont.*)

Family came originally from Lancashire, Eng. One of his ancestors, Samuel Chapin, emigrated to Am. as early as 1641. Youngest s. of Eli Stephenson, Esq., formerly of St. Catharines, Ont.; and a nephew of the late Col. E. W. Stephenson, of the same place. B. at Springfield, Mass., U.S., 14 Jan. 1835. Ed. at Grantham Academy, St. Catharines. M. Oct. 1854, Georgiana Emma, eld. dau. of Thomas Andrew, Esq., barrister, formerly of London, Eng., and grand-dau. of Joseph Sparks, Esq., of the Co. Kent, Eng., once a dir. of the Hon. East India Co. Was, up to within the date of the present Parlt., editor and proprietor of the Chatham *Planet* newspaper. Has been a mem. of the Town Council of Chatham for some years, and was Mayor of that town from 1869 to 1875. Is also a mem. of Kent Municipal Council; mem. of the County Board of Grammar School Trustees; and Capt. of No. 2 Co. 24 Kent Batt. V.I. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g. e. 1867; re-elected at g. e. 1872; at g. e. 1874, and again at last g. e. A Conservative.—*Chatham, Ont.; Rideau Club.*

STRANGE, FREDERICK WILLIAM, *M.R.C.S., Eng. (North York.)*

S. of the late Thomas Strange, Esq., of Sulhamskoad Abbotts, Berkshire, Eng., and grands. of the late Thomas Strange, Esq., of Bridge House, Padworth, Berkshire. Came to Can. in 1869. Ed. at Bath and Winchester. Studied medicine at Liverpool and University College, London. A Fellow of the Obstetrical Society of London. Was Asst. Surgeon of the London Surgical Home and Hospital for Women from 1866 to 1869. Is Coroner for the Co. York; ex-Captain 12th Batt. York Rangers; Captain Queen's Own Rifles, Toronto; Presdt. North York Liberal Conservative Association. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, advocating progress and reform as far as is consistent with practical statesmanship and security of the country as one important part of the British Empire.—273 *St. James street, Toronto; U.E. Club; Toronto Club; Royal Canadian Yacht Club, Toronto.*

TASSÉ, JOSEPH. (*City of Ottawa.*)

B. in Montréal, 23 Oct. 1848. Ed. at Bourget's College, Rigaud, Co. of Vaudreuil. M. Aug. 1870, Marie Alexandrine Victoire Georgianna, dau. of J. P. M. LeCourt, Esq., Architect. Edited *Le Canada*, a tri-weekly Ottawa paper, in 1867-8. Acted as joint editor of the Montreal *Minerve*, the leading French Conservative organ of Quebec, from 1869 to March 1872, and as dir. of *Le Revue Canadienne*, a monthly review, to which he has contributed many essays on literature, history and political economy. Was then apptd. Asst. French Translator of the House of Commons. In 1873 visited England; Belgium, France, Switzerland and Italy, and published a detailed account of his extensive tour. Was elected Presdt. of the French Canadian Institute of Ottawa in 1872 and 1873. Took the initiative of a movement towards the building of its splendid edifice on York street. Organized a most successful literary convention, composed of prominent literateurs and of delegates of various French and English Societies, on the occasion of the inauguration of the new Institute 24 and 25 Oct. 1877. In June 1874, was sent as a delegate to the French National Convention of Montreal, which had chiefly for object the return of the Canadians emigrated to the United States, and took a prominent part in its deliberations. Elected Presdt of the St. Jean Baptiste Society in 1875 and 1876. One of the founders and dirs. of the French Canadian Building Society. Has been a frequent lecturer before national and literary societies

here and in the United States, and has published several works of importance, among others: *Phlemon Wright, ou Colonisation et Commerce de Bois* (1871), an essay on the establishment and the development of the Ottawa region; *Le Chemin de fer Canadien Pacifique* (1872); the first French elaborate essay on the Canadian Pacific Railway; *La Vallée de l'Outaouais* (1872), a pamphlet of 80 pages on the Ottawa Valley: its resources, agricultural and mineral, its lumber trade, its railways and canals, partly reproduced in *Le Tour du Monde* (Paris, July 1875); *Les Canadiens de l'Ouest* (1878), his capital work, forming 2 vols. in 8vo of 400 pages each, with portraits and engravings. The purport of the last work is to demonstrate that French Canadians have been mainly the discoverers and pioneers of the American and Canadian North-West. It has been partly translated in American papers, and specially in the collections of the Historical Society of Wisconsin, and has been favorably noticed in foreign reviews. Declined candidature in 1874, and first returned to Parlt. for present seat at last g. e. A Conservative.—*Ottawa.*

TELLIER, LOUIS. (*St. Hyacinthe.*)

S. of Zephirin Tellier, of Ste. Mélanie de Daillebout, yeoman, and L. Ferland. B. at Berthier-en-Haut, 25 Dec. 1844. Ed. at Joliette College. Called to the Bar at Montreal, 16 Oct. 1866. M. 26 May 1868 in the city of St. Hyacinthe, Hermine, second dau. of the late Dr. Adolphe Malhiot and Hermine Malhiot, who died in the same city on the 7 Feb. 1878. Held the office of Deputy Prothonotary of the Superior Court for the district of St. Hyacinthe and Deputy Clerk of the Circuit Court in and for the same district, from 1863 to 1873. Has been Crown Attorney for the said district since 1873. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Conservative.—*St. Hyacinthe, P. Q.*

THOMPSON, Major DAVID. (*Haldimand.*)

Grandfather came from Scot. S. of the late D. Thompson, Esq., who sat for Haldimand in Can. Assembly, from 1841 to 1851. B. in the Tp. of Wainfleet, Welland, Ont., 7 Dec. 1836. Ed at Hamilton Grammar School and Upper Canada College. M. Sept. 1858, Elizabeth, fourth dau. of Ebenezer Stinson, Esq., of Hamilton. A grain and flour merchant. Is a Municipal Councillor; a dir. of the Canada West Farmers' Mutual and Stock In-

urance Company; Major 37th Haldimand Batt., of Volunteer Rifles; Vice-President of the Haldimand Agricultural Society. Sat for Haldimand in Canada Assembly from 1863 until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e. 1867; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1872, again returned at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. A Liberal. In favor of a Prohibitory Liquor Law.—*Ruthven Park, Deans, Ont.*

THOMPSON, JOSHUA SPENCER. (*Cariboo.*)

B. in Belfast, Ireland. Ed. there. Settled in the territory held by the Hudson Bay Co., now the Province of British Columbia, 1858. Is engaged in mining operations in the district of Cariboo. First returned to Parl. for present seat on admission of B.C. into Can. Union 1871; re-elected at g.e. 1872 by acclamation; re-elected at g.e. 1874, and re-elected at last g.e., 1878, by acclamation. A Liberal Conservative.—*Barkerville, B.C.; Kideau Club.*

TILLEY, *Hon. Sir* SAMUEL LEONARD, *K.C.M.G., C.B.* (*St. John City, N.B.*) *P.C.*

S. of Thomas M. Tilley, Esq., of Queen's Co., N.B.; and great grand-s. of Samuel Tilley, Esq., formerly of Brooklyn, N.Y., a U.E. Loyalist, who came to N.B. at the termination of the Am. revolution, and became a grantee of the city of St. John. (See Sabine's *Am. Loyalists.*) B. at Gagetown, Queen's Co., N.B., 8 May 1818. Ed. at the Co. Grammar School. M. 1st, Julia Anna, dau. of James T. Hanford, Esq., of St. John (dead); 2nd. 1867, Alice, eldest dau. of Z. Chipman, Esq., of St. Stephen, N.B. Is a Commr. to assist Mr. Speaker in the internal economy of the House of Commons; a Presdt. of the Diocesan Church Society, N.B.; Vice-Presdt. of the Auxiliary Bible Society, Ottawa; and a local dir. of the Can. Life Assurance Co. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, N.B., from Nov. 1854 to May 1856, from July 1857 to March 1865, and again from April 1866 until the Union, during which several periods he held the office of Provl. Secy. of that Province; and from March 1861 to March 1865, was leader of the Govt. Has been leader of the Liberal party in N.B. for a lengthened period. Has been a delegate to Eng. on several occasions to confer with the Imperial Govt. on important public business, notably regarding the Union of the B. A. Colonies and

the construction of an Intercolonial Railway; has also repeatedly served on like missions to the sister Provinces. Was a delegate to the Charlottetown Union Conference 1864; to that in Québec same year; and to the London Colonial Conference, to complete terms of Union, 1866-7. Holds a patent of rank and precedence from Her Majesty as an Ex. Councillor, N.B. Created C.B. (Civil) by Her Majesty 1867, and K.C.M.G., May 1879. Sworn of the Privy Council and apptd. Minister of Customs for the Dominion, 1 July 1867. Resigned Nov. 1873, on appt. as Lieut.-Gov. of New Brunswick. Was Acting Minister of Public Works from Nov. 1868 to April 1869. Sworn as Minister of Finance, Oct. 1878. Sat for city of St. John in L.A. of N.B. from June 1854 to June 1856, when defeated on the Prohibitory Law question, and the Govt. resigned; from June 1857 to March 1865, when defeated on the Union policy of his Govt., and again from 1866 until the Union, when he resigned to accept a seat in the Commons, and represent N.B. in the Dominion Cabinet. The Prohibitory Liquor Law of N.B. was the work of Mr. Tilley as a private mem.; amongst other measures of importance introduced and carried by the Govt. of which he was a mem., may be mentioned the following: Vote by ballot and extension of the franchise; an Act authorizing the construction of the European and North American Railway as a Govt. work; an Act authorizing the construction of the Intercolonial Railway, N.B. agreeing to pay three-and-a-half-twelfths of the cost; an Act granting facility for the construction of certain Railways under which 230 miles have since been built in N.B. Was Lt.-Governor of N.B. from 15 Nov. 1873 until 11 July 1878. Returned to Commons at last g.e. Re-elected by acclam. on accepting office. A Liberal Conservative.—*St. John, N.B.; St. Andrew's; Metcalfe street, Ottawa.*

TROW, JAMES, J.P. (*South Perth*)

B. in Newton, Montgomeryshire, North Wales, 16 Dec. 1825. Ed. at Welchpool. Came to Can. 1841. M. 1847, Miss Mary Moore, of Blenheim, Oxford, Ont. Is Vice-Presdt. of the Perth Mutual, and a dir. of the Ont. Mutual Insurance Assns. Is Reeve of North Easthope, an office to which he has been elected by acclamation seventeen years in succession. Has been Warden of Perth. Sat for South Perth in Local Assembly from 1867 until 1871, when defeated. First returned to the Commons at g.e. 1872; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1874, and again returned at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Shakespeare, Ont.*

TUPPER, *Hon Sir CHARLES, K.C.M.G., C.B. (Cumberland.) P.C.*

Family originally from Hesse-Cassel; went to Guernsey, thence to Virginia, and subsequently, at the termination of the American revolution, removed to N.S. with other Loyalists; it is connected with the family of the late Major-Genl. Sir Isaac Brock, K.B., the hero of Queenstown. S. of the Rev. Charles Tupper, D.D., of Aylesford, N.S. B. at Amherst, N.S., 2 July 1821. Is an M. A. of Acadia College, N.S. Took degree of M. D. at Edinburgh, and obtained the diploma of the Royal College of Surgeons, same city, 1843. M. Oct. 1846, Miss Frances Morse, of Amherst. Is Governor of Dalhousie College, Halifax (apptd. by Act of Parl., 1862). Was Presdt. of the Can. Medical Assn. from its formation, 1867, until 1870, when he declined re-election. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council and Provl. Secy., N.S., from 1857 to 1860 and from 1863 to 30 June 1867; and Prime Minister of that Prov. from 1864 until he retired from office with his Govt. on the Union Act coming into force, 1 July 1867. Was a delegate to England on public business from the N.S. Govt., 1858 and 1865; from the Dominion Govt. (with respect to the N.S. difficulty) March 1868; leader of the delegation from N.S. to the Union Conference at Charlottetown, 1864; to that in Quebec in same year, and to the final Colonial Conference in London to complete terms of Union, 1866-7. Hold; patent of rank and precedence from Her Majesty as an Ex. Councillor, N.S. Created C.B. (civil) by Her Majesty, 1867, and K.C.M.G. 24 May 1879. Author of *A Letter to the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Carnarvon on the Union Question* (London, 1866). Declined a seat in the Can. Cabinet, 1867, and the Chairmanship of Intercolonial Railway Board, 1868. Sworn of the Privy Council June 1870, and was Presdt. of that body from that date until 1 July 1872, when he was transferred to the Inland Revenue Dept., and there remained until 22 Feb. 1873, when apptd. Minister of Customs; resigned office with Sir John Macdonald, 5 Nov. 1873. Sat for present seat in N.S. Assembly from 1855 until the Union, when returned to Commons; re-elected by acclamation on his accepting office in 1870, again returned at g.e. 1872, again at g.e. 1874, and again at g.e. 1878; re-elected on accepting office of Minister of Public Works, making eleven times that he has been elected in his native county. Sworn as Minister of Public Works, Oct. 1878, and as Minister of Railways and Canals, 20 May 1879. The following are some of the measures which were introduced and carried through the Legislature of N.S. by the hon. mem.: The Jury Law; Education Act, providing free schools; Equity Judge

Act; Windsor and Annapolis Railway Act; Bill providing for a Quarantine Station and Hospital; Representation Bill; Executive and Legislative Disabilities Act; the first Act passed by any of the Provinces prohibiting dual representation; an Act reducing the number of mems. in the Assembly from 55 to 38 on entering the Union, and an Act relative to certain public officers and their salaries, which abolished the offices of Financial Secy. and Solicitor-Genl., and largely reduced the expenditure for salaries; he also inaugurated the movement and moved the resolution for the Union of the Maritime Provinces, 1864, under which delegates were sent to Charlottetown in that year; and the resolution authorizing delegates to be sent to London to arrange the terms for the Union of N.S. and N.B. with Can., 1866. A Liberal Conservative.—*Cliffside, Ottawa; Rideau Club; Halifax Club; U. E. Club.*

VALLÉE, ROCH PAMPHILE. (*Portneuf.*)

S. of Jean Stanislas Vallée, Notary, of Montmagny, who was a patriot in the rebellion of 1837-38. B at St. Thomas, Montmagny, 28 May 1848. Ed. at St Anne's College. M. 21 Jan. 1873, Miss Zoé Montigny. Editor-in-chief of *Le Courrier du Canada*. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. Opposed Hon. A. Chauveau, at Rimouski, in last g.e. for Quebec Legislature, when result was a tie, his opponent being elected by the casting vote of the Returning Officer. The same extraordinary position was arrived at in the last election in Portneuf, his opponent being declared elected by the casting vote of the Returning Officer, on the first count, but a recount giving Mr. Vallée 33 majority, he was subsequently awarded the seat. A Catholic Conservative and Protectionist.—*Quebec.*

VANASSE, FABIEN. (*Yamaska.*)

Youngest s. of Francois Xavier Vanasse, farmer, of the parish of St. David, County of Yamaska, and of Angélique Dupuis, his wife. B at St. David, 6 Nov. 1849. Ed. at Nicolet Seminary, and admitted to the Bar at Montreal, 12 Jan. 1875. M. Miss Mary Claire Elmiere Desève, youngest dau. of Alexander Desève, Esq., Advocate, of Montreal, 17 Jan. 1877. First elected to Parlt. for present seat, 7 July 1879, in place of the sitting mem., C. I. Gill, Esq., apptd. Judge. Was Presdt. of L'Institut Légal of Montreal, 1873; Secy. of the Club Cartier from 1874 to 1875, and Vice-Presdt. of the same institution from 1877 to 1879. Is one of the

collaborators of the journal *L'Opinion Publique*. Elected as a "National Conservative."—364 *St. Henry* and 212 *Notre Dame streets, Montreal*.

WADE, JOHN CHIPMAN. (*Digby*.)

B. at Granville, Annapolis, N. S. Ed. at Annapolis Royal. M. Caroline, youngest dau. of the late Rev. Roger Viets, of Digby. Admitted to the Bar of N.S. 1840; apptd. Q.C. 1867. Sat in Legislative Assembly of N. S. from 1854 until 1867, and was Speaker of that body from 1863 to 1867. Defeated at g.e. 1867, in consequence of having supported Confederation. First returned to Commons, for present seat, 21 Jan. 1878, defeating Hon. W. B. Vail, Minister of Militia. Re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Digby, N.S.*

WALLACE, WILLIAM. (*South Norfolk*) 2ND MEM.

Eld. s. of the late John Wallace, a native of Ayrshire, Scot., who served in the Scotch Greys at Waterloo, by Anne Spiers, his wife. B near Galston, Ayrshire, 4 Feb. 1820. Ed. at the parish school at Whithorn, Wigtonshire. M. 1852, Mary Anne, second dau. of George Kent, Esq., of Simcoe, Ont. Came to Can. 1840. Founded the *British Canadian* newspaper (Simcoe) 1861, of which he still remains editor and proprietor. Was School Trustee of Simcoe for many years, and has been Reeve of Simcoe and a mem. of the County Council. Sat for present seat from g.e. 1872, until g.e. 1874. Again returned 16 Dec. 1874, on the unseating of the sitting mem.; re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative, but not opposed to well-considered change or wise progress. Is an advocate of a Federation of the Empire, and introduced a series of resolutions bearing on that question in 1873; of railways and telegraphs being owned by the Govt., of a scheme for building the Pacific Railway on the credit of the country, but not by money borrowed from abroad; of a national currency; and of a Civil Service reform, which will divest Govts. of patronage; of compulsory voting; and of every other measure that will advance the moral or industrial interests of the country. Determinedly hostile to "Canada First" if it means independence, but strongly in favor of it if it means Canada first in all that will tend to the elevation of man and the greatness of a people. Opposed to an elective Senate because it is another step towards Republicanism, in which it is his opinion Canada and Canadians have already gone too far.—*Simcoe, Ont.*

WALLACE, NATHANIEL CLARKE. (*West York*)

Third s. of Capt. Nathaniel Wallace, of Woodbridge, who came to Can. from Sligo, Irel., in 1834. B. in Woodbridge, County of York, 21 May 1844. Ed. at the Public School there, and for a short time in 1863 at Weston Grammar School. M. 7 June 1877, in the city of Ottawa to Belinda, youngest dau. of the late James Gillmor, of Ottawa. Had been first Deputy Reeve of the Township of Vaughan for the last five years, and for the current year is Warden of the County of York. Taught Public School from 1864 to 1869, when he went into mercantile business with his brother, under the firm of Wallace Bros. Has been successful. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative. Believes in the National Policy, the Construction of the Canada Pacific Ry., and opening up of the North-West as far as our means will permit—*Woodbridge, Township of Vaughan, Co. of York, Ont.*

WELDON, CHARLES WESLEY, A.M., Q.C. (*St John.*)

Eldest s. of Hon. John W. Weldon, one of the Judges of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, by Frances Chandler, (who died in 1844,) youngest dau. of Hon. Judge Upham, one of the Judges of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick at its first organization. Judge Upham was a Massachusetts Loyalist, and took part in the Revolutionary War as a Colonel of Dragoons. B. at Richibucto, N.B., 27 Feb. 1830. Ed. at the Academy and King's College, Windsor, N.S.; graduated 1847. Called to the Bar of N.B. 1852. Apptd. Q.C., 1873. Presdt. of the N.B. Electric Telegraph Co. M. at St. John, N.B., March 1860, to Annie, only dau. of John Tucker, Esq. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. Was strongly opposed to the Confederation of the Provinces, and was a supporter of the Government of which Hon. Mr. Mackenzie was the head. Opposed to the National Policy and the present Government.—*St. John, N.B.*

WHEELER, GEORGE, J.P. (*North Ontario.*)

Eldest s. of Edward Wheeler, J.P., Ex-Reeve of the Township of Whitchurch, Co. of York, Province of Ontario, now Reeve of Stouffville, Co. of York, who came to Canada, A.D. 1832, from Devonshire, Eng., by Anna Maria, third dau. of Peter Reesor, one of the first settlers in the Township of Markham, Co. of York, who emigrated from Pennsylvania, U.S., about the year 1800. B. at Markham,

2 Sept. 1836. Ed. at Toronto and Victoria College, Cobourg. M. at Uxbridge, Sept. 1861, Harriet-only dau of William Hamilton, Esq., of Uxbridge. Has filled the position of Reeve of Uxbridge, and Warden of the Co. of Ontario. Was Postmaster of Uxbridge from 1865, until he resigned to contest North Ontario at g.e. 1874. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Liberal. — *Uxbridge, Ont.*

WHITE, PETER, JR. (*North Renfrew.*) 3RD MEM.

Of Scottish descent. S. of the late Lieut.-Col. Peter white, who settled at Pembroke 1828. B. at Pembroke, Ont., 30 Aug. 1838. Ed. there. M. Dec. 1877, Miss Thompson. A lumber merchant. Has been Reeve of the Township and Town of Pembroke. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g.e. 1873, and in Nov. 1874. Sat for present seat from g.e. 1874 until 14 Sept. same year, when unseated on petition. Again returned 21 Jan. 1876, on the sitting mem. being unseated. Re-elected at last g.e.: A Liberal Conservative.—*Pembroke; Rideau Club.*

WHITE, JOHN. (*East Hastings.*)

B. in town of Donegal, Irel., 1833. Ed. there. M., 1856, Miss Esther Johnson, of Roslin. Reeve of Tyendinaga three years. Elected Grand Master Grand Orange Assn. Ontario East, and a Deputy Grand Master of Grand Black Chapter of Orangemen of B.A., 1874. First returned to Parl., March 1871; re-elected at g.e. 1872, and at g.e. 1874. Contested seat at last g.e. and after a recount was declared elected, but subsequently unseated on petition. On new election being held 25 Feb. 1879, was again elected. A Conservative.—*Roslin, Ont.*

WHITE, THOMAS. (*Cardwell.*)

Father emigrated to this country from Co. Westmeath, Ire., in 1826, and carried on business for many years in Montreal as leather merchant. B. in Montreal, 1830. Ed. at High School, Montreal. M. in 1853. Served in Peterboro' and Hamilton as member of Grammar School Boards; was for some time Reeve of Town of Peterboro'. Representative for a number of years of the Montreal Board of Trade in the Dominion Board; member for three years of Executive Council of Dominion Board, and representative for five

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years of that body at the National Board of Trade of the United States. First returned to Parl. at g.e. 1878. Was a candidate for S. Wentworth in 1867, for the Leg. Assembly, Ont.; for the Commons in Prescott Co., Ont., 1874, and for Montreal West in 1875, and again in 1876. The aggregate majorities against him in the first three elections was only sixteen. A Conservative. Believes that Canada occupies an exceptional position, rendering it impossible to apply the principle of Free Trade, as stated by political economists, without serious injury. Thinks the Tariff should be so framed as to promote foreign trade by Halifax in winter, and the St. Lawrence in summer, as against trade by American seaports; and as to foster the development of the Agricultural, Mining, and Manufacturing interests of the country. In favor of a British Zollverein which would strengthen the bond of union between the mother country and the colonies, by fostering and protecting their trade relations.—5 *Beaver Hall Square, Montreal.*

WILLIAMS, Lt.-Col. ARTHUR TREFUS HENEAGE. (*East Durham.*)

S. of John Tucker Williams, Esq., a Commander in the Royal Navy, who sat for Durham in Can. Assembly from 1840 to 1848. B. at Penryn Park, Port Hope, Ont., 1837. Ed. at U.C. College and Edinburgh University. M. the dau. of Hon. Senator Seymour. Is Lieut.-Col. commanding 46th "East Durham" Batt. V.I. Chairman of the Port Hope Harbor Comms.; Presdt. of the Midland Loan and Savings Co. First returned to Parl. for E. Durham, in Ont. Legislature at g.e. 1867. Re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1871. First elected to Commons at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Penryn Park, Port Hope, Ont.; Toronto Club.*

WISER, JOHN PHILIP. (*South Grenville.*)

B. in Oneida Co., N.Y. Ed. there. M. Emily, second dau. of Hon. H. Godard, of Richville, N.Y. Came to Prescott in 1857 as Manager for Messrs. Egert & Averells; became their successor in 1862, having purchased their entire interest in the Prescott Lumber, which he has since rebuilt and enlarged, until it now ranks third in capacity in the Dominion. Is extensively engaged in cattle feeding, and from his establishment the first important shipment of cattle was made to Eng. Is also proprietor of the celebrated "Rysdyk Stock Farm," situated half a mile west of Prescott, on the banks of the St. Lawrence, containing nearly 600 acres. The most fashion-

able and highly prized Hambletonian stock is the feature of this establishment, from which Mr. Wiser has turned out some of the fastest and most valuable horses ever raised in Can. Mr. Wiser has spared no expense to improve the quality and value of the stock on his farm, which has thus far not proved the pecuniary success the undertaking merited, but the advantage to the country at large cannot be overestimated. Is largely interested in agricultural and manufacturing industries. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Liberal, and will vote for all measures that will promote the prosperity of the country.—*Prescott, Ont.*

WRIGHT, *Lieut.-Col.* ALONZO. (*Ottawa Co.*)

S. of the late Lieut.-Col. Tiberius Wright; and grands. of the late Philemon Wright, formerly of Woburn, Mass., who came to Can., 1797, founded the village of Hull, on the Ottawa, and became the first representative of the Co. of Ottawa in the L.C. Assembly. B. at Hull, P.Q., 26 Feb. 1825. Ed. at Potsdam Academy, N.Y. M. Mary, eld. dau. of the late Nicholas Sparks, Esq., of Ottawa City. Is Lieut.-Col. of the Ottawa Co. Reserve Militia; Presdt. of the Co. of Ottawa Agricultural Society; and a dir. of the City of Ottawa Agricultural Society. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1862 until the Union, when returned to Commons by Acclamation; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1872; again returned at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. by a majority of 1624.—A Liberal Conservative.—*Ironsides, Hull, P.Q.; Rideau Club.*

YEO, *Hon.* JAMES. (*Prince.*)

Second s. of the late Hon. James Yeo, of Porthill, P.E.I., who came from Devonshire, Eng., 1827, and held a seat in the Provincial Assembly for a period of thirty years. B. at Porthill, 1832. M. 1855, Sarah Jane, dau. of William Glover, Esq., formerly of Devonshire, Eng. A merchant, ship-builder and ship-owner. Sat in the P.E.I. Assembly for some years before the Union with Can., and also held a seat in the Ex. Council of that Colony. First returned to Commons on P.E.I. entering the Dominion, Sept. 1873; re-elected at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Porthill, P.E.I.*

ONTARIO.

The Lieutenant-Governor.—His Honor the Honorable DONALD ALEXANDER MACDONALD, P.C.* S. of a Scottish Highlander, and Roman Catholic, who settled in Glengarry, Ontario, 1786; and a younger brother of the late Hon. J. S. Macdonald, Q.C., M.P., who represented Cornwall in the Can. Parl. during the whole period between the Union of 1841 and the Confederation of B.N.A., 1767; was Prime Minister of Can. from May 1862, to March, 1864; and first Prime Minister of his native Province after Confederation. B. at St. Raphael's, Glengarry, Ont. Ed. at St. Raphael's College, under the late Hon. and Right Rev. Alex. Macdonnell, D.D., afterwards Bishop of Kingston. M. 1st, 1843, Margaret Josephine, eld. dau. of the late Duncan Macdonnell, Esq., of St. Andrews, Cornwall (she d. 1844); 2nd, Catherine, second dau. of the late Hon. Col. Alex. Fraser, of Fraserville, Glengarry, (she d. 1869). Is Lieut.-Col. commanding the Glengarry Reserve Militia; Presdt. of the Montreal and Ottawa City Junction Railway; and a dir. of the Ontario Bank. Was for several years Warden of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry. Acted as Vice-Presdt. of the Constitutional Reform Convention at Toronto, 1859. Declined the Treasurership of Ont., Dec. 1871. Sworn of the Privy Council, 7 Nov. 1873, and was Postmaster-Genl. from that date until apptd. Lieut.-Gov. of Ont., 18 May 1875. (*Salary, \$10,000.*) Sat for Glengarry, in Can. Assembly, from g.e. 1857, until the Union, when returned for same seat in House of Commons, where

Fourth s. of David and Mary A. Cascaden, of Ballyshannon, Co. Donegal, Irel., who emigrated to Canada in 1852, eventually

settling in Co. Bruce, Ont. B. in Ballyshannon, Co. Donegal, Irel., 3 Dec. 1840. Ed. in Toronto and London, Eng. M. 1st, Catherine, dau. of James Ferguson, Southwold, Ont., 29 Nov. 1860 (she d.); 2nd, H. Catherine, dau. of Daniel Deacon, Esq., Iona, 13 Nov. 1872. Received the degree of Doctor of Medicine from Toronto University in 1863; enrolled a mem. of the Royal College of Surgeons, Eng., in 1867; became a Licentiate of the Royal College of Physicians, London, Eng., and of the Royal Colleges of Surgeons and Physicians, Edinburgh, in the same year. Held the office of Coroner until his nomination for Parlt. Was Presdt. of the West Elgin Reform Assn. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal, and opposed to protection and a national currency.—*Iona, Ont.*

CH'SHOLM, KENNETH. (*Peel.*)

Descended from an old Highland family, originally from Inverness-shire. B. and ed. in Co. of Peel. A merchant. Held the Wardenship of the Co. for three years in succession, and is now Reeve of Brampton. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, 19 Feb. 1873, on death of the sitting mem.: re-elected at last g.e. Unseated on petition 14 June 1875, but judgment subsequently reversed on appeal. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal and supporter of Mr. Mowat.—*Alderlea, Brampton, Ont.*

CLARKE, Lieut.-Col. CHARLES, J. P. (*Wellington Centre.*)

B. in Lincoln, Eng., 28 Nov. 1826. Ed. at Waddington, Lincolnshire, under Mr. George Boole, afterwards Prof. of Mathematics in Queen's College, Cork. Is Lieut.-Col. commanding the 30th Wellington Batt. Volunteer Rifles. Edited the *Journal and Express* (Hamilton) from 1848 to 1850, and the *Backwoodsman* (Elora) for some years. Was Reeve of Elora for several years. Was the author of a series of letters, signed "Reformer," appearing in the *Toronto Mirror* in 1850, which advocated advanced Liberal principles, and were widely copied by the Reform Press. Contributed the "Planks of the Platform" laid down in the *North American*, edited by Hon. Wm. Dougall. Acted as Permanent Chairman of Committees of the Whole House in Ontario Assembly during last Parlt., and also as Chairman of Public Accounts Committee. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, in 1871; re-elected by acclamation in 1875, and again at g.e. in 1879, after a contest. A Reformer, and a supporter of Mr. Mowat.—*Elora Ont.*

COOK, HERMON HENRY. (*East Simcoe*)

Fifth s. of the late Capt. George Cook, a U.E. Loyalist; nephew of Capt. John Cook, who represented Dundas in the U.C. Assembly, from 1829 until responsible government was obtained, when he resigned; brother of J. W. Cook, Esq., who represented Dundas in the Can. Assembly from 1857 until 1861; and brother of S. S. Cook, Esq., who lately represented the same county in the Ont. Assembly. B. in Tp. of Williamsburg, Dundas, Ont., 1838. Ed. at Iroquois Grammar Sch. M. 1861, Miss White. A lumber merchant. An unsuccessful candidate for North Simcoe in Local Assembly at g.e. 1871. First returned to Commons for North Simcoe at g.e. 1872; re-elected at g.e. 1874. Unseated on petition, 11 Nov. 1874; re-elected 26 Dec., same year. Elected for present seat at last g.e. A Reformer.—505 *King street West, Toronto.*

CREIGHTON, DAVID. (*North Grey*.) 2ND MEM.

Of Irish parentage. B. in Glasgow, Scot., 1 April 1843. Came to Canada with his parents, 1855. M. 15 Oct. 1873, Miss Jane Elizabeth Kramer. Has been editor and publisher of the Owen Sound *Times* newspaper since 1864. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, 30 Oct. 1875, on sitting mem. being unseated and disqualified. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, and opposed to Mr. Mowat.—*Owen Sound.*

CROOKS, Hon. ADAM, LL. D. Q. C. (*South Orford*.)

S. of the late Hon. James Crooks, who sat in the Legislative Council of U.C., and from 1841 until his death in 1860, in the Legislative Council of Canada. B. at West Flamboro' Ont., 11 Dec. 1827. Ed. at U.C. College and at the University of Toronto, where he was Gold Medalist in Classics and Silver Medalist in Metaphysics, and graduated B.A., 1860, and afterwards proceeded to M.A. and LL.D. M. 4 Dec. 1856, Emily, youngest dau. of the late General Thomas Evans, C.B., [she d. 5 Nov. 1868.] Called to the Bar, U.C. Trinity Term, 1851. Created Q.C., 1863. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society of Ont., 1871. Is a mem. of the Corporation of Hellmuth College, London. Was one of the Examiners in and Lecturers on Commercial Law, for Law Society of Ont.; and Vice-Chancellor of University of Toronto for some years. Author of *Characteristics of the Canadian Community*, (Trans. Royal

Colonial Institute). Apptd. a mem. of Ex-Council, and Attorney-General of Ont.. 20 Dec. 1871, in which office he remained until transferred to the Treasurership, 25 Oct. 1872, to which was added the First Minister of Education, 1876. Appointed 1877, Minister of Education, on the separation of the Educational and Treasury Departments. Contested Toronto West unsuccessfully at g.e. 1867, and Toronto East at last g.e. Sat for Toronto West from g.e. 1871 until last g.e. Returned for present seat, 19 Sept. 1875. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—75 *Peter street, Toronto; Toronto Club.*

DERUCHE, HAMMEL MADDEN. (*Addington.*)

Of French descent. B. in Ont. Ed. at the Univ. of Toronto, where he graduated B.A., 1868. M. Dec. 1872, Sarah Anne Christian, second dau. of T. G. Pile, Esq., formerly of Barbadoes, W.I. A Barrister. Apptd. a mem. of the Council of Public Instruction, Ont., 1873. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1871; re-elected at g.e. 1875, and again at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of Mr. Mowat.—*Napanee, Ont.*

DRYDEN, JOHN. (*South Ontario.*)

Father emigrated from Sunderland, Eng., in 1820 and settled in Whitby, where he has since resided. B 1840 in Tp. of Whitby. Co. Ontario. Ed. at the High School, Whitby. M. Feb. 1867 to Mary Lydia Holman of New York. Was Reeve and Deputy Reeve for six years. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Brooklin, Ont.*

FERRIS, JAMES MARSHALL, J.P. (*East Northumberland.*) 2ND MEM.

Family settled after the Cromwellian was at Florence Court Fermanagh, Irel. S. of the late Matthew Ferris, by Miss Marshall of Co. Tyrone. B. in Co. Fermanagh, 1828 Ed. there. Came to Can. 1850. M. 1857, Catherine, second dau. of the late Jacob Fralick, Esq., of Sidney, Hastings, Ont. Has been Postmaster of Campbellford since 1860, and Reeve of Seymour since 1868. Has also held the office of Warden of the united counties of Northumberland and Durham. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, at g.e. 1875. Unseated, on petition, 10 Oct. 1875; re-elected 9 Nov. 1875, and again at last g.e. A Liberal, and supporter of Mr. Mowat.—*Campbellford.*

FIELD, JOHN COLLARD. (*West Northumberland.*)

B. in Wiveliscombe, Somersetshire, Eng. Descended from John and Martha Field, of the same place. Ed. partly in England and at the Grammar School, Cobourg. M. in the Tp. of Hamilton 15 May 1844. Miss Thirsa Pearse. Was a Town Councillor of Cobourg for two years. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Cobourg, Ont.*

FRASER, Hon. CHRISTOPHER FINLAY, Q. C. (*Brockville.*)

S. of Mr. J. S. Fraser, of Brockville, Ont. B. there, 1838. M. Miss Lafayette, of the same town. Studied law with the Hon. A. N. Richards, Q.C., and was called to the Bar, U.C., in Trinity Term 1865. Is Presdt. of the Catholic Literary Assn., of Brockville. Was one of the originators of the Ont. Catholic League. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council, 25 Nov. 1873, and was Provl.-Secy. and Registrar from that date until 4 April 1864, when appointed Commissioner of Public Works, (*Salary, \$4,500.*) An unsuccessful candidate for Brockville in present House, at g.e. 1867, and for South Grenville at g.e. 1871. First returned, for South Grenville, March 1872, on death of sitting mem., but unseated on petition. Again returned on new election, Oct. 1872, and by acclamation, on his appt. to office; re-elected at g.e. 1875. Was elected for Brockville at last g.e., being defeated in South Grenville, where he was also a candidate. Created a Q.C., 1876. A Liberal.—*Rossin House, Toronto; Brockville, Ont.*

FREEMAN, JOHN B. (*North Norfolk.*)

Paternal grandfather was an Englishman, and was one of the first Methodist ministers that settled in the Long Point country. Father occupied several important offices in the Co. of Norfolk. B. in the Tp of Windham, Co. of Norfolk, 22 Aug. 1835. Ed. at the Co. Grammar School. M. in 1861, Jane Scatcherd, of Wyton, Co. Middlesex. Is still living on the same farm where both his father and grandfather lived and died. Is a mem. of the Council of Windham and Presdt. of the Co. Agricultural Society. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Windham, Ont.*

FRENCH, FREDERICK JOHN. (*South Grenville.*)

S. of John Strachan French, merchant of Burritt's Rapids. Descended from an Eng. family (of Manchester), who had granted to them the land on which the City of Manchester, N.H. is built. At the American Revolution they elected to remain British subjects and as U. E. Loyalists were granted lands in Can. The homestead still remains in the family, near Cornwall. Great-grandfather, Jeremiah French, represented the Eastern District in the first Parlt. held in U.C., 14 Oct. 1792. B. at Burritt's Rapids, 18 Jan. 1847. Ed. by Prof. Thorburn, Ottawa; studied Law with Judge Lyon, Ottawa, and D. B. Read, Q.C., Toronto. Admitted as Attorney, May 1868, and as Barrister, May 1870. M. Miss Gordon, of Stratford, Ont. 28 April 1875. Has represented East Ward in Town Council of Prescott. Presdt. of Conservative Ass. of South Grenville. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. Conservative. "In favor of rigid economy as inaugurated by the late Sandfield Macdonald; the increase of jurisdiction of the local courts; general law reform; reduction of expenses of legislation and the number of members."—*Prescott, Ont.*

GIBSON, Lieut.-Col. JOHN MORISON. (*Hamilton.*)

S. of the late William Gibson, of Toronto Township, farmer, who came to this country in 1827 from Glamis, Forfarshire, Scotland, and who married Mary Sinclair, whose family belonged to the Township of Nelson, in the County of Halton. Cousin of the late David Gibson, of Yonge street, who formerly represented North York in the old Parlt. of Can., and who was prominently associated with W. Lyon Mackenzie in the troubles of 1837. B. 1 Jan. 1842, in the Township of Toronto, in the Co. of York. Ed. at Central School, in Hamilton, and University College, Toronto. Took the degree of B.A., 1863, carrying off the Prince's prize of that year, together with silver medals in classics and modern languages, and the prize in Oriental languages. Commenced the study of law at Hamilton, and was called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1867. Entered the law course at the University of Toronto, receiving the degree of LL.B., and the gold medal of that faculty, in May 1869. M. 1st, 26 Oct. 1869, Emily Annie, dau. of the late Ralph Birrell, merchant of London, Ont. (she d. 3 June 1874); 2nd, 26 Sept. 1876, Caroline Hope, dau. of Hon. Adam Hope, of Hamilton, Senator; who also died 9 Oct. 1877.

A member of Board of Education, Hamilton, of which he was Chairman two years. Elected mem. of Senate of Toronto Univ., 1873 and 1878. An active member of the Volunteer Force since 1860. Was with his regt. (13th Batt.) at Ridgeway in 1866. Holds a first class Military School Certificate Has a very high reputation as a marksman, having been a member of the Canadian Wimbledon teams in 1874, 1875 and 1879, winning prizes on all these occasions. In 1879 achieved the highest honor which has yet fallen to a Canadian marksman, by winning the Prince of Wales' prize (a badge and £100). Was also a member of the Canadian team at Creedmoor, in 1876. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Hamilton; Hamilton Club; National Club, Toronto.*

GIBSON, THOMAS, (*East Huron.*)

S. of Mr. Thomas Gibson. B. at Greenlaw, Berwickshire, Scot., 8 Jan. 1825 Ed. there. M. 1st, 1854. Miss Elizabeth Hudson, (she d.) 2nd, Sarah, eld. dau. of Richard Young, Esq., of Lakelet. Was Reeve of Howick for seven years. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g.e. 1867. First returned at g.e. 1871; re-elected at g.e. 1875 and again at last g.e. A Liberal and a supporter of Mr. Mowat.—*Wroxeter, Ont.*

GRAHAM, PETER. J.P. (*East Lambton.*)

S. of Mr. Thomas Graham, of Kirkoswald, Cumberland, Eng. who emigrated to L.C., 1832. B. and ed. at Kirkoswald. Has held the office of Councillor, Deputy Reeve, and Reeve of Warwick, in succession; and has also been Presdt. of the Lambton Agricultural Society. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1875; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of Mr. Mowat.—*Warwick.*

HARCOURT, RICHARD, M.A. (*Monck.*)

Third s. of Michael Harcourt who was twice elected for Haldimand Co. in the old Parlt. of Can. B. in township of Seneca, Haldimand Co. 1841. Graduate and medallist of Toronto University. M. 1876, Augusta H. Young, dau. of the late Jacob Young. Public School Inspector for Haldimand Co. for five years. First elected to the Legislative Assembly of Ontario Dec. 1878. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—*W. Uland, Ont.*

HARDY, Hon. ARTHUR STURGIS, Q.C. (*South Brant.*)

Descended on both sides from U.E. Loyalists. S. of Russell Hardy, Esq., merchant, Brantford, Ont. B. at Mount Pleasant, Ont., 14 Dec. 1837. Ed. at Rockwood Academy and at Co. Brant Grammar School. M. 19 Jan. 1870, Mary, dau. of Hon. Justice Morrison, of Toronto. Called to the Bar of Ont., Easter Term, 1865. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, April 1873, on resignation of sitting mem. Re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1875. Created a Q.C. 1876. Apptd. Provl. Secy. and Registrar, March 1877, and re-elected by acclamation. Again returned at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Brantford; Toronto.*

HARKIN, WILLIAM, M.D., C.M. (*Prescott.*)

Parents came from Donegal, Ireland. B. at West Hawkesbury, Ont. 1831. Ed. at the Vankleek Hill and L'Orignal High Schools; graduated as M.D. at McGill Univ. 1858. M. 24 May 1859, Eliza, dau. of Duncan McDonnell, Esq., of Vankleek Hill. A mem. of High School Board. Has been Reeve for past three years. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1875; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, and opposed to the present Govt.—*Vankleek Hill.*

HAWLEY, GEORGE DOUGLAS. (*Addington.*)

Descended from a U.E. Loyalist. B. in Township of Fredericksburg, Co. Lennox, 3 April 1841. Ed. in the City of Kingston, at Queen's College Preparatory School. Unmarried. Has been a Township Councillor. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Bath, Ont.*

HAY, DAVID DAVIDSON, J.P. (*North Perth*)

Family from Forfarshire, Scot. B. in Dundee, Scot. 1823. Ed. by private tuition. M. 1849, Miss Jane Rogerson, of Co Simcoe, Ont. Has been Reeve of Elma, and of the village of Listowel. Served as Emigration Commr. to Scot for Ont. 1873-4, when apptd. General Emigration Agent for Ont., an office he held until Jan. 1875, when he resigned. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g.e. 1867. First returned at g.e. 1875; re-elected at last g.e. A Reformer. In respect of administration, is in favor of

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economy, combined with wise and liberal expenditure on public works to develop the resources of the Province, especially colonization railroads. In respect to legislation, will support a bill for compulsory voting, improved assessment laws, the simplifying and cheapening of the legal machinery of the courts, etc.—*Listowel*.

HUNTER, JAMES HILL. (*South Grey*.)

Parents both natives of Renfrewshire, Scot. B. at Kilbarchall, in that Co., 26 July 1839. Ed. at the Grammar School, Goderich, and at U. C. College. M. Oct. 1863, Kate, youngest dau. of Alex. McDonald, Esq., of Belleville. A merchant. Has been Reeve and Deputy Reeve of Glenelg. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1875; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Durham*.

JELLEY, WILLIAM. (*Dufferin*.)

At one time a resident in the Brockville district, whence he moved to the Township of Melancthon, where he engaged in the grain business, in which he met with marked success. He there founded the Village of Shelburne, in which he is a large property owner. First returned to Parlt. on sitting member, Dr. Barr. being unseated, 9 Jan. 1880. A Conservative.—*Shelburne, Ont.*

KERR, JOSEPH. (*Stormont*.)

First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. Unseated on petition, and re-elected 23 Jan. 1880. A Conservative.—*Cornwall, Ont.*

LIDLAW, JAMES. (*South Wellington*.)

First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Que'ph. Ont.*

LAUDER, ABRAM WILLIAM. (*East Grey*.)

S. of the late Thos. D. Lauder, Esq., of Durham, Ont., and grand-s. of the Rev. Wm. Lauder, late of Bewcastle, Cumberland, Eng. A collateral ancestor was one of the claimants for the Roxburgh Estates in 1812. B. at Bewcastle 1834. Ed. at Canobie and Langholm. M. 1856, Miss M. E. Toof. Called to the Bar, U. C., Easter Term, 1864. A mem. of Senate of Univ. of Victoria College, Cobourg. Apptd. Govt. Trustee of Municipal Bonus Fund of the

Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railway, 1869. Sat for South Grey from 1867 to 1871, when unseated on petition; re-elected Jan. 1872, and continued to sit for that seat until g.e. 1875, when returned for present seat; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, and opposed to present Govt.—262 *Victoria street, Toronto; U. E. Club.*

LEES, WILLIAM. (*South Lanark.*)

Father, William Lees, and family, emigrated from Scotland in 1817, and settled in the Township of Bathurst, now in the Co. of Lanark, Ont. B. 1821, in the Township of Bathurst. Ed. there. M. 1st, 1844, Mary Playfair, dau. of Col. Playfair (she d.); 2nd, Annie Laurie, formerly school teacher in the Town of Perth. A farmer, and saw and grist mill owner. Has had a seat in the Township and Co. Councils since 1856. Held the office of Warden of the Co. in 1874-75-76. Has been a J.P. since 1852. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, and does not believe there can be good legislation where extensive partyism exists.—*Fallbrook, Ont.*

LIVINGSTON, JAMES. (*South Waterloo.*)

First returned to Parl. at last g.e.—A Liberal.—*Baden, Ont.*

LONG, THOMAS. (*North Simcoe.*)

B. at Mount David, Limerick, Ireland 1836. Ed. there. Came to Can. 1850. M. 1861, Ann, eldest dau. of Mr. Charles Patton, of Collingwood. A store-keeper. Was a Councilman of Collingwood from 1864, to 1870. First returned to Parl. for present seat at g.e. 1875; re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative, and opposed to the present Govt.—*Collingwood*

LYON, ROBERT ADAM. (*Algoma.*)

A brother of W. D. Lyon, Esq., M.P.P. for Halton. First returned to Parl. on resignation of sitting mem., Sept. 1878. Re-elected at last g.e. A Reformer.—*Michael's Bay, Ont.*

MACK, WILLIAM, J.P. (*Cornwall.*)

B. in Lanarkshire, Scot., in 1828. Ed. in Huntington, P.Q. M. at Cornwall, Ont., 3 March 1855, to Agnes Henderson, dau. of

the late Wm. Henderson, of Cornwall Township, a native of Scot. Was a mem. of Town Council of Cornwall from 1867 to 1878, with the exception of two years. Warden of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry for 1878. First returned to Parlt. by acclamation at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Cornwall, Ont.*

MACMASTER, DONALD, B.C.L. (Glengarry.)

Only s. of the late Donald Macmaster and Mary Cameron, of Williamstown, Co. Glengarry B. 3 Sept. 1846, in the Co. of Glengarry. Ed. at Williamstown Grammar School, and McGill University, Montreal. Graduated with highest honors, and was Torrance Gold Medallist in law. Unmarried. Senior mem. of the law firm of Macmaster, Hall & Greenshields, Montreal. Has been twice President of McGill University Literary Society. Is now a member of the Council of the Bar of Lower Canada. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Lancaster, Ont.; St. James' Club, Montreal.*

MCCRANEY, DANIEL. (East Kent.) 2ND MEM.

S. of the late Hiram McCraney, Esq., of the Township of Trafalgar, Co. of Halton. B. in Trafalgar, 1 July 1834. Ed. at the Oakville Grammar School. M. at Oakville, 1866, Janet, eld. dau. of the late George Ewan, Esq. Called to the Bar of Ontario, Michaelmas Term, 1871. Was Mayor of Bothwell from 1868 to 1873. First returned to Parlt. 16 Sept. 1875, to fill the vacancy caused by resignation of Hon. A. McKellar; again returned at g.e. 1879, defeating A. Service, Esq., his opponent, by 317 majority. A Liberal—"has implicit confidence in the integrity and ability of Hon. O. Mowat and his Government, and gives them his hearty support,"—*Bothwell, Ont.*

McKIM, ROBERT. (West Wellington.)

First returned to Parlt. for West Wellington at g.e. 1867; re-elected at g.e. 1871. An unsuccessful candidate at g.e. 1875. Returned for present seat at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Parker, Ont.*

McLAUGHLIN, JAMES WELLINGTON, M.D., F.R.C.P., F.R.C.S. (West Durham.)

Parents removed from the North of Ireland in 1829 and settled in the Township of Cavan, in East Durham, and in 1843 in the

Township of Darlington, West Durham. B. 24 Aug. 1840, in the Township of Cavan. Ed. at the University of Toronto, where he graduated in 1864, taking the gold medal. Graduated in Edinburgh in 1872. M. 17 July 1866, Ida Ella Gross, grand-dau. of the late Dr. Gross, of Brighton. Has occupied for several years the position of Examiner for the University of Toronto, also for the Medical Council of Ontario. Has been for 5 years (1875-79) the Representative of the Senate of the University of Toronto, in the Medical Council of Ontario. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Bowmanville, Ont.*

McMAHON, JAMES, M.D. (*North Wentworth.*) 2ND MEM.

Is President of the North Wentworth Reform Association. Obtained license from Medical Board, U.C., 1850. Called to the Bar, U.C., in Trinity Term, 1861. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society, Ont., 1871. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, Aug. 1872, on resignation of sitting member; re-elected at g.e. 1875, and again at last g.e. Created a Q.C., 1876. A Liberal Conservative, and opposed to the present Govt. Favors compulsory voting.—*Albert street, London, Ont.; U.E. Club.*

MERRICK, HENRY. (*North Leeds and Grenville.*)

S. of Mr. Stephen Merrick, and grandson of Wm. Merrick, who settled on site of present village of Merrickville, where he erected mills. B. there. A woollen manufacturer. Elected a Deputy G.M. of the Grand Orange Lodge of B.A. 1875. Has been a Deputy G.M. of the Grand Black Chapter of Orangemen of B.A. Has been Mayor of Merrickville. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, at g.e. 1871; re-elected at g.e. 1875 and at last g.e.

A Liberal Conservative and opposed to the present Govt — *Merrickville, Ont.*

METCALFE, JAMES HENRY. (*Kingston.*)

S. of John Metcalfe; grandfather, James Metcalfe, resided in the village of Bainbridge, Yorkshire, Eng. The family of Metcalfe is very largely represented in the West Riding of Yorkshire, Eng. Mother's family name is Matthews; her family came from Dorsetshire, Eng. B. in Kingston, Ont., 8 January 1848. Ed. at the Public School and Collegiate Institute. M. at Kingston, 5 August 1869, to Margaret Jane Clute, second dau. of Frazer Clute, Esq., of South Fredericksburgh. At present head-master of the Queen's Public School in Kingston. Was head-master of Wellington Street Public School for seven years. A member of the City Council for six years. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative — *Kingston, Ont.*

MILLER, JOHN CLASSON. (*Muskoka and Parry Sound*)

Grandfather served in the British Army in Am. under Burgoyne, was taken prisoner at the battle of Stillwater, and at the close of the war came to Can. and settled in Leeds, Ont., where his s. (the father of the sitting mem.) was born, 1796. B. in Yonge, Leeds, Ont., 16 Dec. 1836. Ed. at local schools. M. 2 Aug. 1859, Adelaide Augusta, only dau. of A. A. Chamberlain, Esq., M.D., of Farmersville. A lumber merchant and millowner. Was Sept. of Woods and Forests, in Crown Lands Dept. Ont., (and as such succeeded in largely increasing the public revenue), from March 1868, until 1871, when, owing to partial blindness, he was compelled to resign. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1875. Unseated and disqualified on petition, 17 Sept. 1875; decision reversed by Court of Error and Appeal, 22 Jan. 1876. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal. — *Carleton street, Toronto.*

MONK, GEORGE WILLIAM. (*Carleton*)

Youngest s. of the late Capt. John Benning Monk, H.M. 97th Regt. of Foot; grands. of the late Hon. G. H. Monk, who, originally a midshipman under Admiral Boscawen, entered the army and became major of the Royal Fusiliers, but retired, and was admitted to the Bar, and finally attained a seat on the Bench, in N.S.,

and great grand-son of Sir James Monk, Atty. Genl. of N.S., who claimed descent from George Monk, Duke of Albemarle. B. 10 Sept. 1838. Ed. at Bytown (now Ottawa), and Potsdam, N.Y. M. Jan. 1863. Emily Blanch, dau. of the late Lieut. -Col. Dyer, formerly of the 37th Regt. of Foot. Was a Deputy G. M. of the Grand Black Chapter of Orangemen of B. A. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, at g. e. 1871, but unseated on petition; re-elected Jan. 1872; returned by acclamation at g. e. 1875; re-elected at last g. e. by a majority of 1,547. A Liberal Conservative, and opposed to the present Govt.—*South March, Ont.; U.E. Club.*

MORGAN, WILLIAM. (*South Norfolk.*)

Only s. of the late John Dwyer Morgan, of Walsingham, Ont., a native of Glamorgan, Wales, who carried on a mercantile and lumbering business in Walsingham for many years and was also a mem. of the Co. Council of Norfolk. B. 8 D. c. 1848 at Stirling, Co. of Hastings. Self-ed. Unmarried. Has been Reeve of the Township of Walsingham for the last four years. Has taken an active part in military matters, having had command of No. 3 Co. 39th Batt. of Rifles for a period of 11 years. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. The election was since contested. The trial took place at Simcoe, 30 Oct. before C. J. Moss and V. C. Blake, when the petition was dismissed with costs. A Liberal Conservative.—*Walsingham Centre, Ont.*

MORRIS, Hon. ALEXANDER, D. C. L., P. C. (*Toronto East.*)

Eld. s. of the late Hon. Wm. Morris, who was a mem. of the Legislative Assembly and Council of U. C., and of the Legislative Council of Canada continuously from the year 1820 until 1859, a period of thirty-nine years. B. at Peith, Ont., 17 March 18-6. Ed. at the Universities of Glasgow, Scot., and McGill College, Montreal. M. Nov. 1851, Margaret, dau. of William Cline, Esq., of Cornwall, Ont. Called to the Bar of U. C., in Hilary Term, 1851, and afterwards in July, same year, to Lower Canadian Bar. Called to the Manitoba Bar, Oct. 1872. Has been Presdt. of the St. Andrew's Society, Montreal; a Governor of the University of McGill College, and is a Trustee of the University of Queen's College, Kingston. Author of *Canada and Her Resources*, an essay, to which was awarded, by Sir. E. W. Head, then Governor-General, on a reference from the Paris Exhibition Committee of Can., in

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consequence of a division of opinion in the Committee, the second prize; *Nova Britannia*, a lecture on the extent, resources and future of B.N.A., published 1858, at the request of the Mercantile Library Association of Montreal, in which he advocated the incorporation of the B.N.A. Provinces under one Confederation; and of *The Hudson's Bay and Pacific Territories*, a lecture, in which he also urged the incorporation of the North-West and British Columbia under one Confederation with the older Provinces of Canada and Acadia, and the construction of the Intercolonial and Pacific Railways. In 1864 was one of the active parties in the negotiations which resulted in the coalition of that year, and the adoption of the Confederation policy which he had long previously advocated. Sat for South Lanark in Can. Assembly from 1861 until the Union, and for same seat in House of Commons from the latter event until g.e. 1872. Was sworn one of the Queen's Privy Council of Can. 16 Nov. 1869, and held the office of Minister of Inland Revenue from that date until 2 July 1872, when appointed Chief Justice of Court of Queen's Bench of Manitoba, being the first Chief Justice and Judge of that Court Apptd. Lieut.-Gov. of Manitoba and the North-West Territories 2 Dec. same year, and held the former position until 1877. Apptd. a Commr. of Indian Affairs for Manitoba and the North-West Territories, 16 June 1873; and took part as Commr. in negotiating treaties with the Saulteaux and Cree tribes of Indians, at the north-west angle of the Lake of the Woods, and at the Lakes Qu'Appelle, in the years 1873 and 1874, whereby the title to a large area in the North-West Territories was settled. Also acted as Commr. for Treaties with the Indians of the Lake Winnipeg region in the year 1875, and with the Plain Crees at Forts Carlton and Pitt, in the year 1876; also acted, in the year 1875, in securing a revision of the terms of Treaties Nos. 1 and 2. Apptd. a Commr. under Statute 38 Vic., cap. 53, respecting conflicting claims to lands of occupants in Manitoba, Jan. 1876. Elected to present seat on resignation of sitting mem. (now the Hon. Mr Justice Cameron) Dec. 1878. Re-elected at last g.e., his opponent being the Hon. O. Mowat, Premier of Ont.—*Toronto, Ont.*

MOWAT. Hon. OLIVER, Q.C. LL.D. (*North Oxford.*)

Eld. s. of the late John Mowat, Esq., formerly of Cainsby, Caithness-shire, Scot, who, after serving in the British Army during the campaign in Portugal and Spain under Lord Wellington,

came to Can. 1816, and settled at Kingston, by Miss Levack; and bro. of the Rev. Prof. Mowat, of Queen's University, Kingston. B. in Kingston, 1820. Ed. there. M. 1846, Jane, second dau. of the late John Ewart, Esq. of Toronto. Studied law with the Hon. (now Sir) John A. Macdonald, and was called to the Bar, U.C. in Hilary Term, 1842. Created a Q.C. 1856. A mem. of the Senate of the Univ. of Toronto; a bencher *ex officio* of the Law Society of Ont. and head of the law firm of Mowat, Maclean and Downey. Sat in the City Council of Toronto for a short period. Has been Presdt. of the Canadian Institute, Toronto. Was a Commr. for consolidating Public General Statutes for Canada and Upper Canada, respectively, from 1856 to 1859. Sat in the Quebec Union Conference, 1864. Elected Presdt. of the Evangelical Alliance of Ont. Jan. 1875. Was Provl. Secy. (in the Brown-Dorion Administration) from 2 to 6 Aug. 1858; Postmaster-Genl. (in the Sandfield Macdonald-Dorion Administration) from May 1863, until March, 1864; held the same office (in the Taché-Macdonald Coalition Gov.) from June 1864, until Nov. 14, same year, when apptd. Vice-Chancellor of U.C., an office he resigned 25 Oct. 1872, on being called upon to form a new Administration in Ontario. Appt. a mem. of the Ex. Council, and Attorney-Gen. 31 Oct. 1872. (Salary, \$5,500.) As Vice-Chancellor was one of the Judicial Officers appt. under 34 Vic. Chap. 7 (Ont.) to enquire into and report upon Estate Bills in the Ont. Assembly. Sat for South Ontario in Can. Assembly from 1857 until he retired from public life, Nov. 1864. An unsuccessful candidate for Kingston, 1861. Returned for present seat, by acclamation, Nov. 1872, and again at g.e. 1875; re-elected at last g.e.—181-183, *Simcoe street, Toronto.*

-MURRAY, THOMAS. (*North-Renfrew.*)

Of Irish descent. S. of late James Murray, of King's County, Irel., who in early life followed commercial pursuits, and later became a farmer in the Township of Goulbourn, Co. of Carlton. His mother was Elizabeth Burrows, Canadian born, but of Irish descent. B. in Township of Goulbourn, 18 Jan. 1836. Ed. in Co. School and Grammar School, Smith's Falls. M. in Ottawa, 24 Jan. 1855. Miss Jane Copeland, of the Village of Richmond. Was Councillor and Reeve of the Town of Pembroke for several years. Sat for two last sessions in the first Local Parliament of Ontario, when he supported the late Sandfield Macdonald's Govt. Returned again at last g.e. A Liberal. "Disapproved of the protection agitation in 1878."—*Pembroke, Ont.*

NAIRN, THOMAS MACINTYRE. (*East Elgin.*)

S. of James Nairn, and Agnes Macintyre Nairn, of Bonhill, Dumbartonshire, Scotland. The former was a native of Benfrewshire, and the latter of Argyllshire, Scotland. B. 16 June 1830, at Balloch, in the Parish of Bonhill, Dumbartonshire, Scotland. Ed. at Public Schools in said Parish till nearly 14 years of age. Emigrated to St. John, New Brunswick, in 1850, and removed to Aylmer, Ont., in Nov. 1851. M. Sept. 1854, Delphine Van Patter, dau. of the late John Van Patter, one of the first settlers on Talbot Road, in the Township of Malahide. Has been a Municipal Councillor for 21 years, and 8 years a mem. of the Co. Council of the Co. of Elgin. Was Warden of the Co. of Elgin for 6 years in succession, and for the past 7 years has been Chairman of the Aylmer High School Board. Was prominently identified with the promotion of the railroad interests of the Co., and held seats on the Provisional Boards of Directors of the Canada Southern, and Canada Air Line Ry. Cos. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal. "A strong advocate of liberal aid to the non-sectarian educational system, to asylums and charitable institutions, and for developing the resources, and advancing the material interests of the Province."—*Aylmer, Ont.*

NEAR, DANIEL, J. P. (*Welland.*)

B. in Tp. of Humberstone, 1825. Ed at common schools. M. 1st 1851, Elizabeth Cronmiller (she d. 1854); 2nd 1855, Mary W. Harwisch. A Commr. B.R. Was Reeve of Humberstone five years and Councillor four. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Humberstone, Ont.*

NEELON, SYLVESTER. (*Lincoln.*)

First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal.—*St. Catharines, Ont.*

PARDEE, Hon. TIMOTHY BLAIR. (*West Lambton.*)

S. of A. B. Pardee, Esq., Co. Grenville, Ont. B. in Grenville, 11 Dec. 1830. Ed. there. M. the dau. of J. K. Forsyth, Esq., of Sombra, Lambton, Ont. Called to the Bar, Ont., Hilary Term, 1861. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society of Ont., 1871.

Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council, 25. Oct. 1872, and was Provl. Secy. from that date until 4 Dec. 1873, when apptd. Commr. of Crown Lands, in which office he still remains. (*Salary \$4,500*). Was County Attorney of Lambton for some years; resigned 1867. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1867. Re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1871; again returned at g.e. 1875 and at last g.e. Created a Q.C. 1876. A Liberal.—125 *Wellington street, West, Toronto; Sarnia.*

PARKHILL, WILLIAM J., J. P. (*South Simco.*)

B. in Co. Tyrone, Ire., 27 Nov. 1839. Ed. there. Came to Can. 25 June 1856. M. Miss Crossley, dau. of N P. Crossley, Esq., of King, Ont., 30 Oct. 1862. Is Grand Master of the Loyal Orange Lodge of Ontario West, and D. G. Master of the Grand Lodge of B. A., and D. G. Master of Royal Black of B. A. Was Deputy Reeve of Mulmur for the years 1874-5, and elected Reeve in 1876, each time by acclamation. Presdt. of the Mulmur branch of the Conservative Assn. First returned for present seat 29 Oct. 1878, on the resignation of Hon. Wm. Macdougall, C.B., now mem. for Halton in the House of Commons. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, and opposed to the present Government.—*Randwich P. O., Ont.*

PATTERSON, PETER. (*West York.*)

Ancestors came from Co. Antrim, Irel., to New Hampshire, in Am., 1736. There many members of the family subsequently distinguished themselves in the service of the country as judges, legislators and governors. S. of the late Col. Robert Patterson, of Perry, N.Y., a mem. of the Legislature of New Hampshire, and subsequently of that of New York. B. in Londonderry, N.H., 10 April 1845. Ed. at Huntington Academy, Perry. Came to York, Can., 1849. M. Sept. 1859, Miss K. E. Haffy, of Yonge street. An agricultural implement manufacturer. Was Reeve of Vaughan from 1868 to 1871, when elected Warden of the Co. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1871; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1875 and again returned at last g.e. A Liberal and supporter of Mr. Mowat.—*Patterson, Ont.*

PAXTON, THOMAS. (*North Ontario.*)

Eld. s. of Wm. Paxton, Esq., of Walsingham; Eng., who, with his wife, Elizabeth Dryden, came to Can. 1820, and settled in Whitby, Ont. B. there, 27 Nov. 1820. Ed. there. M. 7 Nov. 1847, Miss Eliza Huckins, of Whitby. Settled at Scugog, now Port Perry, 1846, and built a steam saw-mill, of which he is still the proprietor. Is a dir. of the Port Perry Railway Co. Has been Reeve of Reech and Scugog. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1867; re-elected at g.e. 1871 and at g.e. 1875. Unseated on petition, 2 June 1875; re-elected 21 Oct. 1875, and again at last g.e. A Reformer, and an admirer and supporter of Messrs. Mackenzie and Mowat. Carried through several bills, of which the settlement of tax titles were the most prominent.—*Port Perry, Ont.*

PECK, SAMUEL STANLEY. (*North Victoria.*)

S. of James Peck, who is a grandson of James Peck, one of the U.E. Loyalists who settled in the County of Prince Edward in the year 1800, having previously resided some time in Nova Scotia. B. Township of Amherstburgh, Co. Prince Edward, Nov. 20, 1829. Ed. at Common School there. M. 1st, Sarah Ann Harder, dau. of Richard Harder, Esq., of the Township of Sidney, Co. Hastings, 17 July 1857; (she d. 2 Nov. 1 75;) 2nd, Susan, dau. of William Vandervoort, of Sidney, Co. Hastings, 19-Dec. 1876. Was Reeve 15 years and Warden of Co. Peterboro 3 years. Stipendiary Magistrate and Judge of Division Courts of Provisional Co. of Haliburton, and Registrar of Deeds for same County from its organization in 1874 to May 1879. Is now Co. Clerk and Treasurer of same County, which position he has also held since 1874. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Minden, Ont.*

RICHARDSON, WILLIAM. (*South Leeds.*)

First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Seeley's Bay, Ont.*

ROBERTSON, ALEXANDER. (*West Hastings.*)

First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. Unseated on petition and re-elected 30 Jan. 1880. A Conservative.—*Belleville, Ont.*

ROBERTSON, DAVID, *M.D., C.M.* (*Halton.*)

S. of the late Alexander Robertson, a native of Perthshire, Scot B. in Township of Esquesny, Co Halton, 9 July 1841. Ed. at Common School and McGill College, where he graduated M.D. 1864. M. Jan. 1867, Miss Jennie S. Morse, dau. of the late Samuel Morse, of Milton. Was Mayor of Milton four years and Treasurer of the Board of Education eight years. A Liberal.—*Milton, Ont.*

ROBINSON, CHARLES, *M.D.* (*Cardwell.*)

Paternal side of his family came from Lincolnshire, England, and the maternal from Inverness, Scotland, in 1831, settling in the Township of Chinguacousy, where they endured the many hardships incident to the early settler. B. in Chinguacousy in 1835. Ed. at Toronto School of Medicine and Jefferson Medical College. M. in 1869 to Miss Helen Standing. Has held position of Coroner eight years. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Claude, Ont.*

ROBINSON, EDWARD, *B.A.* (*West Kent.*)

B. in the Co. Roscommon, Irel., in 1829. Ed. in Trinity College, Dublin. Came to Canada in 1857 to take charge of the mathematical department of the Toronto Grammar School. Entered the law office of Eccles, Carroll & Doyle in 1858. After a few months removed to the office of the present Mr. Justice Burton, and finished term of articles in 1861. In 1863 became partner of the Hon. Walter McCua, now Judge of Algoma. M. in 1864 to Miss Charlotte E. Miller, of Toronto. Has been Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Chatham High School for several years. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Chatham, Ont.*

ROSEVEAR, JOHN. (*East Durham.*)

Is Reeve of Hope; and Major of East Durham Reserve Militia. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1875, re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, and opposed to the present Government.—*Port Hope.*

ROSS, *Lieut.-Col.*, ALEXANDER MCLAGAN. (*West Huron.*)

B. in Dundee, Scot., 20 April 1828. Came to Can. and settled at Goderich, 1834. Ed. there. M: Nov. 1852, Agnes, dau. of Thos. Kydd, Esq., Postmaster of Goderich. Was clerk in Bank of U.C. from 1849 to 1856, and paymaster on Buffalo & Lake Huron Railway from latter date to 1858, when he was appointed Treasurer of the united counties of Huron and Bruce, which position he held until separation of the counties in 1866. Has been Treasurer of the Co. Huron since that time. Has been Manager of the Can. Bank of Commerce at Goderich, since 1870. At the time of the Trent affair he organized an Artillery Co. at Goderich, and was appointed its Captain. Was on service on the frontier during the Fenian raid in 1866. On the organization of the volunteer force into battalions in 1866, was appointed Lieut.-Col. of the 33rd, which position he still holds. First returned to Parlt. in Jan. 1875, beating Mr. Davison of Goderich by 94. Re-elected at g.e. June 1879 with a majority of 424 over his opponent, Mr. Kelly. A Liberal, and supporter of Mr. Mowat.—*Goderich, Ont.*

SCOTT, WILLIAM HEPBURNE, B.A., Q.C. (*West Peterborough.*) 2ND MEM.

Third surviving s. of the late John Scott, Esq., of Brampton, Ont., formerly of Aberdeenshire, Scot., who was one of the earliest settlers in Peel; and brother of A. F. Scott, Esq., Judge of the Co. Court of Peel. B. at Brampton, 5 Nov. 1837. Ed. at Toronto Univ., where he took degree of B.A., 1860. M. 1st 19 March 1863, Jane, dau. of the late George Wright, Esq., who represented West York in Can. Assembly from 1851 to 1854; (she d. 8 Oct. 1876); 2nd, 23 Oct. 1878, Margaret R., dau. of the late R. M. Boucher, Esq., Judge of the Co. Court of Peterborough. Is President of the Toronto & Ottawa Ry., and Presdt. of the Liberal Conservative Club of Peterborough. An unsuccessful candidate for West Peterborough in the House of Commons at g.e. 1874. First returned to Parlt. for present seat in Ont. Assembly, June 1874; defeated at g.e. 1875; again returned 26 Oct. 1875, on sitting mem. being unseated. Re-elected at last g.e. Created a Q.C. 1876. A Liberal Conservative, and opposed to the present Govt.—*Peterborough; U.E. Club.*

SINCLAIR, DONALD. (*North Bruce.*)

B. in Island of Islay, Scot. Ed. at Bowmore School. Came to Can. June 1851. M. 1871, Isabella, dau. of Thomas Adair, Esq.,

of Southampton, Ont. A merchant. First returned to Parl't. for present seat, by acclamation, at g. e. 1867; re-elected by acclamation at g. e. 1871, again returned at g. e. 1875, and re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal, and a supporter of Mr. Mowat.—*Paisley, Ont.*

SPRINGER, MOSES, J. P. (*North Waterloo.*)

Of Scotch descent. S. of Benjamin Springer, who came to Can. with his mother at the close of the first Am. revolution, and grand-s. of David Springer, who was shot by the rebels near Poughkeepsie, N. Y., at the commencement of the revolution, and had all his property confiscated. B. in Waterloo Township, Ont., 31 Aug. 1824. Self-educated. Formerly a surveyor, now a merchant, and one of the founders of the Waterloo Mutual Fire Insurance Co., and for many years Presdt. thereof. Also established the Economical Fire Insurance Co. of Berlin. Is at present a dir. of the Agricultural Mutual Fire Insurance Co. of London, Ont. Was the first Reeve of Waterloo village, which position he held for about twelve years, and upon the village being incorporated into a town, he was the first Mayor, which position he held for two years, and then resigned for younger men to take his place. First returned to Parl't. at g. e. 1867; re-elected by acclamation at g. e. 1871; re-elected g. e. 1875, and again returned at last g. e. A Liberal, and will not support any Govt. except they are liberal and progressive.—*Waterloo, Ont.*

STRIKER, Lieut.-Col. GIDEON. (*Prince Edward.*)

Descended from a U. E. Loyalist family that emigrated from Duchess Co., N. Y., to Can., and settled on the shores of the Bay of Quinte shortly after the Am. revolutionary war. B. in Co. of Prince Edward. Ed. at Picton Grammar School. A merchant. Is Lieut.-Col. Prince Edward Reserve Militia. Has been Reeve of Picton and Warden of Prince Edward. First returned to Parl't. for present seat at g. e. 1871, but unseated on petition; new election Jan. 1872, when his opponent, Mr. J. S. McCuaig, was returned, but was unseated, and Mr. Striker declared the sitting mem. in Aug. the same year. Re-elected at g. e. 1875, and again at last g. e. Of Eng. parentage. Third s. of the late Mr. William Watterworth, who came to Can. about 1819, and settled in Co. Elgin, Ont. B. in Elgin, 24 Nov. 1827. Ed. in Middlesex. M. 1854. Jane. dau. of John Walker, Esq., of Mosa. Has been Reeve of Mosa and Warden of Middlesex. First returned to Parl. for present seat, Sept. 1872, on resignation of sitting mem. Re-elected at g. e. 1875, and at last g. e. A Liberal, and a supporter of Mr. Mowat.—*Wardsville, Ont.*

WELLS, Hon. RUPERT MEARSE. (*South Bruce*.)

Of Eng. descent. S. of James Pendleton Wells, Esq., Sheriff of the United Counties of Prescott and Russell. B. in Co. of Prescott 1835. Ed. at Toronto Univ., where he was Jameson medallist and silver medallist in ethics, and graduated B. A. 1854. Unmarried. Called to the Bar, U. C., Trinity Term 1857. Was associated in business with Hon. Edward Blake from 1860 to 1870, but is now a mem. of the firm of Morrison, Wells & Gordon. Held the Co. Attorneyship of York from 30 March to 14 Sept. 1872, when he resigned in order to become a candidate for South Bruce, and was returned. Re-elected at g. e. 1875, and again at last g. e. Elected Speaker of the Ont. Assembly on the resignation of the Hon. J. G. Currie, 7 Jan. 1873; re-elected 23 Nov. 1875, and held the office until Jan. 1880. A Reformer.—125 *Wellington street, West, Toronto; Toronto Club.*

WHITE, SOLOMON. (*North Essex.*)

Eld. s. of Joseph White, of the Tp. of Anderdon, in the Co. of Essex, and Angelique Fortier, dau. of the late Capt. Pierre Fortier, formerly of Quebec. Ed. in the Co. of Essex. Admitted an Atty. at Law in Hilary Term 1865, and called to the Bar of Ont. in Michaelmas Term of the same year, and practiced law until July 1869 in partnership with the Hon. John O'Connor, Q.C. M. Jan. 1867, Mary Q. Drew, of the city of Detroit. In Nov. 1868 purchased the Claire House Vineyards, at Cooksville, and carried on the business of vinegrowing and wine making under his personal management, under the corporate name of the Canada Vine Growers' Assn., and having brought that business to successful notice, made what may be considered a favorable sale of the vineyards. Takes a great interest in vine growing and agricultural interests, and the improvement of the breeding of horses, cattle and other stock. Has since his sale of the vineyards resumed his practice of the law. Contested the Co. of Peel for the Local House in Dec. 1873 unsuccessfully against Kenneth C. Chisholm, of Brampton, on a vacancy occurring through the death of the late John Coyne. Was first elected to the Legislature in Oct. 1878 for the North Riding of the Co. of Essex, by a majority of 616 over Mr. George Rankin. Was offered but declined nomination for the House of Commons for the Co. of Peel in Jan. 1874, and was also nominated for the same constituency for the Legislature in Jan. 1875, but declined, and was again nominated for the same county for the Local House in May 1878, for the g. e., but since his election for Essex. declined. Re-elected at last g. e. A Liberal-Conservative.—*Windsor, Ont.*

WIDDIFIELD, J. HENRY, M.D., M.R.C.S. (Eng.); L.R.C.P. (Edin.)
(*North York*)

Family came originally from Eng. S. of Charles Ellis Widdifield, Esq., of Maple Grove Farm, Whitchurch, Ont., and grand-s. of the late Henry Widdifield, a U. E. Loyalist, who came to Whitchurch, 1801, and was one of the earliest settlers in North York. B. at Maple Grove Farm 12 June 1845. Ed. at Newmarket High School and Victoria University. Unmarried. Studied for his profession at Victoria-Medical College, Toronto, and St. Thomàs' Hospital, Medical and Surgical College, London, England. England, the Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh, Victoria University, Can., and the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario. Has been a Coroner for York and is now a J.P. for the same Co. Holds first-class certificates from the Toronto School of Military Instruction and the Toronto School of Gunnery. Received the Reform nomination for the House of Commons in 1874. but declined it. First returned to Parl. for present seat at g.e. 1875; re-elected at last g.e. Moved the Address in reply to the Speech from the Throne at the session of 1875. A Liberal, and was elected as an independent supporter of the Mowat Administration.—*Prospect Cottage, Newmarket, Ont.*

WIGLE, LEWIS. (*South Essex.*) 2ND MEM.

Of German descent. Eld. s. of Solomon Wigle, Esq., who represented Essex in Ont. Assembly from 1867 until g.e. 1871, by Miss Iler. B. in Tp. of Gosfield, Essex, 10 March 1845. Ed. there. M. in Mersea, Rebecca, youngest dau. of Thos. Hairsine, Esq. A storekeeper. Was Reeve of Mersea for six years. First returned to Parl. for present seat at g.e. 1875. Unseated on petition 30 July 1875; re-elected 16 Sept. 1875, and at last g.e. A Liberal-Conservative. "Unbiassed by prejudice and untrammelled by party, he will ever endeavor to record his vote upon all questions to the best of his judgment and according to the dictates of his conscience.—*Leamington, Ont.*

WOOD, Hon. SAMUEL CASEY. (*South Victoria.*) 2ND MEM.

B. in the Village of Bath, Ont., 27 Dec. 1830. Ed. there. Was for some years a public school teacher, and subsequently followed mercantile pursuits. Was Official Assignee for Victoria and County Clerk and Treasurer from 1860 until his appt to office, when he resigned. Is Chairman of Board of High and Public Schools, Lindsay. Elected a mem. of the Council of Public Instruction (to represent the School Inspectors) 1874; resigned July 1875. Apptd a mem. of Ex. Council and Commr. of Agriculture, and Provl. Sec. and Registrar, 24 July 1875. (*Salary \$4,500.*) Apptd. 1877, Commr. of Agriculture and Provl. Treasurer. First returned to Parl. for present seat at g.e. 1871; re-elected at g.e. 1875, and on his appt. to office; again returned at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Toronto; Lindsay, Ont.*

YOUNG, JAMES. (*North Brant.*)

Eld. s. of the late John Young, Esq., of Galt, Ont., formerly of Roxburghshire, Scot., who came to Canada 1834. B. at Galt, 24 May 1835. Ed. there. M. February, 1858, Margaret, second dau. of John McNaught, Esq., of Brantford. A mem. of the Honorary Council, Ont. School of Agriculture; a mem. of the Agricultural and Arts Council; a dir. of the Confederation Life Assurance Co.; of the Canada Landed Credit Co.; and of the Gore District Mutual Fire Insurance Co.; and Presdt. of the Association of Mechanics' Institute, Ont. Has been Presdt. of the Provl. Sabbath School Convention of Ontario, and is now Vice-Presdt. of the Sabbath School Assn. of Can. Was for several years a mem. of Board of Public School Trustees and the Collegiate Institute; six years a mem. of Galt Council, and once Deputy Reeve. Owned and edited the *Dumfries Reformer* (Galt), from 1853 to 1863. Author of two prize essays: *The Agricultural Resources of Canada, and the inducements they offer to British Labourers to settle in Canada*, and *The Reciprocity Treaty*. First returned to represent South Waterloo in the Commons, at g.e. 1867; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1872, and at g.e. 1874. An unsuccessful candidate for same seat at g.e. 1878. Elected for present seat in Leg. Assem. at last g.e. (Ontario.) While in the Commons he proposed the abolition of the office of Queen's Printer, and letting all Departmental printing by tender, which has greatly reduced the annual expenses; in 1871 the House adopted his bill confirming the naturalization of all aliens who had taken the oaths of allegiance and residence prior to Confederation; in 1873 submitted a bill in favor of the ballot; in 1873, and again in 1875, carried addresses to Her Majesty, praying that the Imperial Govt. might take steps to confer on Germans and other aliens naturalized in Can., the same rights in all parts of the world as British born subjects; and in 1874 proposed a committee and report which resulted in the publication of the "Hansard," containing the House of Commons debates for 1875, 1876 and 1877. The Lieut.-Governor.—His Honor the Honorable THÉODORE ROBITAILLE, P.C.* Descended from one of the oldest French families in Can.; one of his grand-uncles Messire Robitaille, was chaplain to the Active Militia force of L.C., during the war of 1812, in which all the family took an active part on the loyal side; a second grand-uncle, the Rev. Louis Brodeur, after spending seven years as a missionary in N.B., was apptd. a curate to the parish of St. Roche des Aulnaix, where he died, bequeathing his wealth to the St. Anne College, of which he was one of the founders; another grand-uncle Jean Robitaille, Esq., was a mem. of the Can. Legislature for twenty years, viz.: from 1809 to 1829 S. of the late Louis Adolphe Robitaille, Esq., N.P. B. at Varennes, P.Q., 29 Jan. 1834. Ed. at the Model Sch. of that place, in the United States, at the Seminary of St. Therese, the Laval University, and at the University of McGill College, Montreal, at the latter of which he graduated M.D., May 1858. M. Nov. 1867, Marie Josephine Charlotte Emma, dau. of P. A. Quesnel, Esq., and grand-dau. of the late Hon. F. A. Quesnel for many years a M.L.C. of Can. Sworn of the Privy Council and was Receiver Genl. of Can. from 30 Jan. 1873, until 5 Nov. same year, when he resigned with his chief, Sir John Macdonald, on the Pacific Railway matter. Sat for Bonaventure in Can. Assembly from g.e. 1861, until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e. 1867; re-elected at g.e. 1872; returned, by acclamation, on his appt. to office; again returned at g.e. 1874, and again at g.e. 1878. Resigned July 1879, on appt. to present office. Represented Bonaventure, in Quebec Assembly, from g.e. 1871, until Jan. 1874, when he retired in order to confine himself to Commons. Was sworn in as Lt.-Gov. of the Province of Quebec, by and before His Excellency the Governor-General at the Citadel, Quebec, 26 July 1879. (*Salary \$10,000.*) *Spencer Wood, Quebec; Rideau Club.*

Was elected in 1867 for Hochelaga to the Local House, which seat he has held ever since; and in 1872 to the Commons, where he held his seat until 1874, and the abolition of dual representation; unanimously elected Speaker of the Assem. of Que. on the 11 Nov. 1876, which position he held until April 1878. Re-elected at last g. e. A member of the Agricultural Council, and formerly President of the Agricultural Society of Hochelaga. Owns and cultivates farms at Coteau, St. Louis, and Outremont. His family's founder in Canada was one Trottier de Beaubien, who came from St. Martin d'Ig e Perche in France in 1650. His father represented Montreal from 1841 to 1844, and Chambly from 1848 to 1851 in the Can. Assembly. M. 1864 Susanna Lauretta, dau. of Hon. Judge Andrew Stuart, of Quebec. A Conservative.—*16 St James' street, Montreal.*

BERGERIN, CELESTIN. (*Beauharnois.*)

BOUTIN, PIERRE. (*Bellechasse*.)

CHAMPAGNE, CHAS. A. (*Two Mountains*.)

B. at St. Eustache, 24 Sept. 1838. Ed. at Seminary of Ste. Therese. Engaged in agriculture for several years, and afterwards studied law with Messrs. Moreau, Ouimet and Chapleau, advocates, Montreal. Admitted to the Bar 1 Sept. 1865. Has practised his profession with much success in the districts of Terrebonne and Montreal. First returned to Parl. for present seat 1876, on resignation of Hon. Mr Ouimet. Re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative. — *St. Eustache*.

CHAPLEAU, Hon. JOSEPH ADOLPHE, Q.C. (*Terrebonne*.) 2ND MEM.

Ancestors came from France, and were early settlers in the Seigniory of Terrebonne. B. at Ste. Therese de Blainville, Terrebonne, P. Q., 9 Nov. 1840. Ed. at the College of Terrebonne. M. 25 Nov. 1874, Marie Louise, dau. of Lieut.-Col. King, Brigade Major, Sherbrooke. Called to the Bar, L. C., 1861. Created Q.C. 1873. A dir. of the Laurentides Railway Co., and of *Le Credit Foncier du Bas Canada*. Is a Professor of the Laval Univ. (criminal jurisprudence) in the section established in Montreal. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council and Solicitor General from 27 Feb. 1873 until 8 Sept. 1874, when he resigned with his chief, Mr. Ouimet. Apptd. Provl. Secy. and Registrar 27 Jan. 1876, which position he held until the dismissal of Govt. by Letellier de St. Just 1878. Became leader of the Conservative Opposition, and was called upon to form the present Local Govt. when Mr. Joly resigned, on the 30th Oct. 1879. Is Premier and Minister of Agriculture and Public Works. Unsuccessfully contested Vercheres for House of Commons at g.e. 1872. First returned to Parl. for present seat by acclamation at g.e. 1867; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1871; and again on his appt. to office. Again returned at g.e. 1875, and by acclamation on his second appt. to office in the DeBoucherville Govt. Re-elected at last g.e., and again on accepting present office. CHARLEBOIS, LÉON BENOIT ALFRED. (*Laprairie*.)

S. of M. B. Charlebois, merchant, of Laprairie, by Marie M. David. B. 18 Feb. 1842. Ed. at Laprairie. M. 24 Aug. 1868, Marie E., dau. of J. B. Varin, Esq., N.P., and Hermine Raymond:

A merchant. Is a Municipal Councillor and Presdt. of the Laprairie Turnpike Trust. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g. e. 1875, and again at last g. e. A Conservative — *Laprairie*.

CHURCH, Hon. LEVI RUGGLES, Q. C. (*Pontiac*.)

Descended from one of the oldest families in New England, his ancestors having emigrated from the old country to the then colony of Massachusetts in the early part of the 17th century. One of them, Col. Benjamin Church, distinguished himself in the French and Indian wars, in which the New England colonists were engaged, having commanded the volunteer army, which, in a protracted kind of guerilla warfare, defeated and afterwards killed the celebrated Indian King Philip, who had given so much trouble and alarm to the early settlers. At the breaking out of the Revolutionary war, the Church family, respectable both in numbers and position, being Whigs, espoused the Republican cause, except two, who took up arms to defend the Royal prerogative. One of these was killed in battle, and the other, Jonathan Mills Church, was taken prisoner in 1777 by the Am. army, from whose custody he escaped and came to Can., and ultimately settled in the neighborhood of Brockville. He took an active part in defending Can. during the war of 1812-13-14, and died at a very advanced age in 1846. Second s. of the late Dr. Peter Howard Church, of Aylmer, P. Q., and grand-s. of the above mentioned Jonathan Mills Church. B. at Aylmer, 26 May 1836. Ed. at Victoria Univ., Cobourg. M. 3 Sept. 1859, Jane Erskine, dau. of Wm. Bell, Esq., barrister, and niece of Genl. Sir George Bell, K. C. B. Graduated in medicine at the Albany Medical College, and at McGill Univ., where he took primary, final and thesis prizes. Studied law under the late Henry Stewart, Esq., Q. C., and subsequently under Edward Carter, Q. C., and was called to the Bar, L. C., 1859. Created a Q. C. 1874. Is a dir. of the Ottawa Agricultural Insurance Co. and of the Bank of Ottawa; and a Governor of the College of Physicians and Surgeons, L. C. A mem. of the law firm of Fleming, Church and Kenney, Aylmer, and was Prosecuting Attorney for the District of Ottawa from July, 1868, until his appt. to office. Apptd. a mem. of Ex. Council, 22 Sept. 1874, and was Attorney-Genl. from that date until transferred to the Treasurership, 27 Jan. 1876. Held latter position until dismissal of Govt. by Lieut.-Governor in 1878. Sat for Ottawa Co. from 1867 until g. e. 1871, when he retired. Returned for present seat by acclamation on his appt. to office, 26

Oct. 1874. Re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1875, and again returned at last g.e. Visited England upon financial business during the summer of 1876, and successfully negotiated a large Provincial Loan. A Liberal Conservative.—*Aylmer, Quebec.*

DÉCHESNE, GEORGE HONORÉ. (*Temiscouata*)

First returned to Parl. for present seat, 1875, and again at last g.e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Mr. De Boucherville.—*St. Epiphane.*

DESAULNIERS, FRANÇOIS SÉVÈRE LESIEUR. (*St. Maurice.*)

S. of Francois Lesieur Desaulniers, Esq. and of the late Marguerite Pothier. B. at Yamachiche, 19 Sept. 1850. Ed. at Nicolet College. An advocate. M. at St. Guillaume d'Upton, 24 July 1877, Marie Aglae Maher, dau. of Francis Maher, Esq., merchant, whose ancestors came from Stuggart, Germany. Has been a Justice of Peace for district of Three Rivers since 1878. Was editor of *Le Constitutionnel* of Three Rivers, one of the editors of *Le Canadien*, Quebec, and is now one of the editors of *Le Foyer Domestique*, Ottawa, and *Revue Canadienne*, Montreal. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A moderate Conservative, and strong supporter of the conciliation and moderation policy inaugurated by the Chaplcau Government.—*Yamachiche, P.Q.*

DUCKETT, WILLIAM. (*Soulanges.*)

Descended from William Duckett, a native of Ireland, Co. Waterford, and of Marie Chevrier, a native of Rigaud, Co. of Vaudreuil. B. in Montreal, 12 Feb. 1825. Ed. at the public school. M. at St. Polycarpe, 23 Aug. 1848, Miss Ephigenie Prieur, dau. of Francis Regis Prieur, and of Elizabeth Lemay of St. Polycarpe, Can. East. First returned to Parl. at g.e. 1863. Sat for four sessions in Quebec, and one in Ottawa, for the Co. of Soulanges. Returned for present seat at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Coteau Landing, P.Q.*

DUHAMEL, LOUIS, M.D. (*Ottawa.*)

Family, which resided at Contrecoeur, P.Q., for some time, removed to Ottawa some years since. A brother of the Right Rev.

J. T. Duhamel, D. D., R.C. Bishop of Ottawa. Graduated as M.D. at McGill University, 1860. M. Madame Bourgois, a dau. of M. Joseph LeBel, of Aymer, P.Q. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1875, and again at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Wright.*

DUPUIS, J. BTE. (*L'Islet.*)

First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal.—*St. Roch des Aulnets, Q.*

FLYNN, Hon. EDMUND JAMES, LL.D. (*Gaspé.*)

S. of James Flynn, trader and farmer, who was of Irish descent, but born in Gaspé. Mother's name Elizabeth Fortevin; family came from Guernsey. B. 16 Nov. 1847, in Percé, Shiretown of the Co. of Gaspé. Ed. in the Quebec Seminary. Held from 1867 to 1869 the positions of Deputy-Registrar, Deputy-Prothonotary, Deputy-Clerk of the Circuit Court, of the Crown and of the Peace for the County of Gaspé, conjointly with that of Secretary-Treasurer of Percé Municipality. M. 11 May 1875, Mathilde Augustine Coté, dau. of Augustin Coté, Esq., editor of *Le Journal de Quebec*. Graduated with distinction at Laval University, 30 June 1873. Called to the Bar, 15 Sept. 1873. Received title of LL.D. from Laval University, 15 May 1878. Has been Professor of Roman Law in the Laval University since 1874. Has been a practising attorney before the Quebec Bar since his admission to the Bar. Returned by acclamation for present seat, 29 April 1878. Had been a candidate for same county in 1874, 1875 and 1877. Supported the policy of the late Joly Government up to 28 Oct. 1879, when he seconded a motion for conciliation and coalition, by which the Joly Government was overthrown. Was sworn in as mem. of the Ex. Council and Commissioner of Crown Lands, in the Chapeau Government, 31 Oct. 1879. Re-elected by acclamation, 6 Dec. 1879. A Liberal Conservative.—*Quebec.*

FORTIN, LOUIS NAPOLEON, M.D. (*Montmagny.*)

B. 8 Aug. 1850. Ed. at St. Ann's College, and awarded diploma M.L. with Morrin prize at Laval University, June 1874. Unmarried. S. of the late Louis Fortin, Esq., and grands, of the late J. Bte. Fortin, Esq., who for thirty-two years represented the

Co. of Devon in the Legislative Assembly. First elected to Parlt. 30 Nov. 1876; re-elected at last g.e. A supporter of the Chapleau Administration.—*Cap Ste. Ignace, Montmagny, P.Q.*

GAGNON, CHARLES ANTOINE ERNEST. (*Kamouraska.*)

S. of Antoine Gagnon, merchant, Rivière Ouelle, and of the late Julie Adèle Pelletier, sister of the ex-Minister of Agriculture in the Mackenzie Government. The family originally came from Vendee, France, and is one of the oldest French-Canadian families; having settled in Canada in 1633. B. at Rivière Ouelle, 4 Dec. 1846. Ed. at St. Anne's College. M. at Rivière Ouelle, 14 June 1870, Marie Malvina, third dau. of François Gagnon, farmer. Was valuator on the Intercolonial Railway (St. Lawrence District) from Dec. 1873 to March 1878. Receiver of Wreck for District of Kamouraska, from June 1874 to March 1878. Apptd. Notary Public, 2 March 1869. Is Secy. of the Municipality; Secy. of the School Comms., and Treasurer of the Fabrique; Commr. to receive affidavits in the Supreme Court. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A National Liberal; in favor of a Revenue Tariff; opposed to Prohibitive Protection; moved, with Mr. Nelson, M.P.P. for Montreal Centre, the answer to the Speech from the Throne, at the memorable session of 4 Juné 1878.—*Rivière Ouelle, Que.*

GAUTHIER, GRÉSIME, J.P. (*Charlevoix.*)

Descended from an old French family that emigrated to this country during the *ancien regime*. S. of the late M. Michael Gauthier, dit Larouche, by Marie A. T. Tremblay. B. at St. Urbain, P.Q., 2 Dec. 1834. Ed. there. M. 17 Nov. 1871, Delle. Melanie Simard, of Baie St. Paul. A farmer, and agent of the "Canadian Titanic Iron Company, limited," at St. Urbain. Is Mayor of the Municipality. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1875, and again at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative, but perfectly independent of party.—*St. Urbain.*

HOUE, CHARLES EDWARD. (*Nicolet.*)

B. at Rivière du Loup, District of Three Rivers, 17 Dec. 1826., At the age of 22 years he entered into commerce. At the age of 23 M. Miss Marie M. Therien, of St. David, Co. Yamaska. He commenced business in St. Michel, Yamaska. After four years

residence there, he removed to St. Celestin, which was then a new parish, where he has ever since resided. Shortly after his arrival there he was apptd. a Justice of the Peace, and in 1854, became a Postmaster. When the Parish became a Municipality, he accepted the position of Secretary-Treasurer, which he held for ten years. He subsequently became a Councillor, then Mayor. In 1875 he opposed Mr. Methot in the election for the Local Legislature, but was defeated. The election was contested, and Mr. Methot was unseated and disqualified; upon issuance of new writ, was elected, July 1876; re-elected at last g.e.—*Celestin, P. Q.*

IRVINE, Hon. GEORGE, Q.C., D.C.L. (*Mégantic.*)

S. of the late Lieut.-Col. Irvine, principal A.D.C. to the Governor-General, and grandson of the Hon. James Irvine, for many years a mem. of the Ex. Council and Parl. of L.C., and of the Hon. Matthew Bell, of Three Rivers, at one time mem. for St. Maurice in the Legislature of L.C., and afterwards a mem. of the Legislative Council of that Province. B. at Quebec 16 Nov. 1826. Ed. at Dr. Lundy's School in that city. M. Aug. 1856, the third dau. of the late Henry Le Mesurier, Esq., a well-known merchant of Quebec, and formerly an officer in H.M. 48th Regt. Called to the Bar, 1848. Created Q.C. in 1867. A mem. of the law firm of Irvine & Pemberton. Formerly Professor of Commercial Law in Morrin College. Was Chancellor of the University of Lennoxville, from which he received the hon. degree of D.C.L., in 1875. Has been Batonnier of the Quebec Bar, and is Vice-Presdt. of the Union Bank of L.C. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council, July 1867, and was Solicitor-General from that date until 27 Feb. 1873, when he was apptd. Attorney-General, which position he held until July 1874, when he resigned. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from g.e. 1863 until Confederation, when he was returned to the Commons, where he continued to represent the County until g.e. 1872, when he declined re-election. Represented *Mégantic* in the present House from the Union until January 1876, when he resigned on being apptd. one of the Railway Commrs. for the Province, which office he resigned in 1878, in order to present himself for re-election, as a supporter of Mr. Joly's Administration, at the g.e., when he was again elected.—*Quebec; Stadacona Club; Rideau Club.*

JOLY, Hon. HENRY GUSTAVE. (*Lotbinière.*)

S. of the late Gaspard Pierre Gustave Joly, Esq., *Seigneur de Lotbinière*, by Julia Christin, dau. of the late Hon. M. E. G. A. Chartier de Lotbinière, Speaker of the Quebec Assembly from 1794 until May 1797, and afterwards a mem. of the L.C. of same Province. B. in France, 5 Dec. 1829. Ed. at Paris. M. the dau. of Hammond Gowan, Esq., of Quebec. Called to the Bar, L.C., March 1855. Is Presdt. of the Reform Assn. of the *Parti National* of Quebec; of the Lotbinière Agricultural Society, No. 2; of the Quebec and Gosford Railway Co.; and of the Society for the Promotion of Canadian Industry. and Vice-Presdt. of the Royal Humane Society of B.N.A.; and of the Society for the re-wooding of the Province of Quebec. Was Presdt. of the Agricultural Society of Quebec for some years. Declined a Senatorship, 1874. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from g.e. 1861, until the Union, when elected by acclamation to both the House of Commons and the Assembly. Continued to sit in both Houses until g.e. 1874, when he retired from the Commons in order to confine himself to the Assembly. Re-elected at g.e. 1871, and at last g.e. Offered a portfolio in the Dominion Cabinet as Minister of Agriculture, and elevation to the Senate, Jan. 1877, but declined. On the dismissal of the DeBoucherville Cabinet, by Lieut.-Gov. Letellier de St. Just, in March 1878, was called upon to form a new Ministry, which he succeeded in doing, assuming himself, as Premier, the portfolio of Public Works. Resigned with his Ministry, Oct. 1879. A Liberal and a Nationalist.—12 *St. Denis street, Cape, Quebec, Rideau Club.*

LABERGE, EDOUARD, M.D. (*Chateauguay.*)

S. of M. François Laberge, of Chateauguay, P.Q., and grands. of M. Charles Laberge, formerly of L'Ange Gardien, P.Q. Born in Chateauguay, 22 Aug. 1829. Ed. at Montreal College. Graduated as M.D. at McGill University, 1856. M. Oct. 1862, Mdle. Nathalie Poulin, sister of Rev. M. Poulin, curé of St. Philomène. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at g.e. 1867; re-elected at g.e. 1871, returned by acclamation at g.e. 1875, and again elected at last g.e. A Liberal, or Nationalist.—*St. Philomène.*

LAFONTAINE, JOSEPH L., *N.P.* (*Shefford.*)

S. of the late M. Abraham Lafontaine, farmer, and of Marie Thérèse Robillard. B. at St. Antoine de Lavalier, Co. Berthier, 19 March 1829. After having completed his course of studies at the College of L'Assomption, in the district of Montreal, he was admitted to practice as a Notary, 16 Oct. 1856. M. 21 Feb. 1871. Resided at St. Ours, Co. Richelieu, where he practised as Notary until April 1863; then removed to Roxton Falls, Shefford Co., where he now practices his profession. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. Has always given his support to the Liberal party.—*Roxton Falls, Q.*

LAFONTAINE, LAURENT DAVID, *M.D.* (*Napierville.*)

B. at St. Phillippe, P.Q., Aug. 1823. Ed. at the Chambly College. M. Sept. 1868, Delle. Marie C. Lemay. A physician. Has been Warden of Napierville. Is Secy.-Treas. of Schools, and Agent for the Seignior of St. George. First returned to Parl., for present seat, Oct. 1870, on death of sitting mem. Re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1871, at g.e. 1875, and at last g.e. A Liberal.—*St. Edouard,*

LALONDE, EMERY, *J.P.* (*Vaudreuil.*)

B. at Rigaud, P.Q., 29 May 1821. Ed. at Vaudreuil. M. Aug. 1849, Delle. Louise Prévost, sister of J. B. Prévost, Esq., formerly M.P.P. for Soulanges. Is Mayor of St. Marthe. First returned to Parl., for present seat, at g.e. 1871; re-elected at g.e. 1875, and again at last g.e. A Conservative.—*St. Marthe.*

LANGELIER, CHARLES. (*Montmorency.*)

S. of the late Sébastien Langelier and Julie Esther Casault, of the parish of Ste. Rosalie, Co. of Bagot. B. at St. Rosalie, 23 Aug. 1850. Ed. at the Seminary of Quebec, and studied law at the Laval University, where he graduated LL.L. in 1875, taking Lord Dufferin's silver medal at the Faculty of Law, Laval University. Member of the firm of Montambault, Langelier and Langelier. Unmarried. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Liberal, and strongly in favor of Free Trade.—*No. 3 Parloir street, Quebec; Garrison Club.*

LANGELIER, Hon. FRANÇOIS CHARLES STANISLAS. (*Portneuf*.)

- S. of Capt. Louis Sébastien Langelier by Julie Esther Casault. Descended on father's side from Sébastien Langelier who came to Canada, from Fresquiennes, near Rouen, France, 1659, settled at Sillery near Quebec and thence removed to L'Islet, of which family the celebrated Bishop Langelier was a mem., and on mother's side from the Casaults of Granville, France, to which the late Rev. L. J. Casault, founder of Laval University, belonged. B. at Ste. Rosalie, Bagot, P.Q., 24 Dec. 1838. Ed. in classics at St. Hyacinthe College, and in law at Laval University, where he graduated with great distinction, 1861. M. 2 Feb. 1864, Virginie Marie Sarah Sophie dau. of the late I. Légaré, Esq., of Quebec. Called to the Quebec Bar, 1861. Made a Q.C. in 1878. Is a mem. of the Senate of Laval University, and has been Professor of Civil Law and of Political Economy in that institution; previously held the chair of Roman Law. Was Secy. of the first Colonization Society established in Canada, and has been Presdt. of the *Institut Canadien*. Apptd. a mem. of the Executive Council and Commissioner of Crown Lands 8 March 1878. Apptd. Treas. of the Prov. March 1879. Resigned with the Govt. Oct. 1879. An unsuccessful candidate for Bagot in present House, g.e. 1871. First returned for Montmagny 16 Dec. 1873 on resignation of sitting mem. Elected for Portneuf at last g.e. A Liberal.—3 *Parloir street, Quebec*.

LAROSE, ACHILLE. (*Verchères*.)

First returned to Parlt. on sitting mem. being unseated, 17 July 1879. A moderate Liberal.—*Verchères, P. Q.*

LAVALLÉE, VINCENT PAUL, M. D., J. P. (*Joliette*)

S. of M. Paul Lavallée, by Marie Laferrière. B. at Berthier, *en haut*, P.Q., 1839. Ed. there. M. 1st, Dlle. Henriette Chalut (she d.); 2nd, 1870, Marie Josephine Elia, dau. of M. Crépeau, N. P., of St. Felix. A physician. Is a Commr. of Small Causes. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1867; re-elected at g.e. 1871; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1875, and again returned at last g.e. A Conservative.—*St. Felix de Valois*.

LECAVELIER, NARCISSE M., N.P. (*Jacques Cartier.*)

S. of the late Guillaume LeCavelier and Marie Louise Groulx. B. at St. Laurent, P.Q., 27 July 1827. Ed. at the Seminary of Ste. Thérèse. M. Mrs. Emilie DeCelles, dau. of the late Augustin Crevier, 5 July 1856. Admitted as a Notary 15 Feb. 1853; has since practised at St. Laurent. Elected mem. of the Chamber of Notaries for the Prov. in June 1873, and re-elected in June 1879. Has been Secy.-Treas. of the Agricultural Society of the Co. of Jacques Cartier since July 1856; Secy.-Treas. of the County Council of Jacques Cartier since Sept. 1853; Secy.-Treas. of the Council of the Parish of St. Laurent since 1855, and of the School Commrs. of the said parish since 1860. Has been a Trustee of Dissident School of the same place. Has been Secy.-Treas. of the Municipal Council of Cote des Neiges, and of the School Commrs. of the same place since 1853; Secy.-Treas. of the Municipal Council of Notre Dame de Grace, West, since 1877, and of the School Commrs. of the same place since July 1876. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1867; re-elected at g.e. 1871, and again at g.e. 1875. His opponent in each of the above elections was Joseph M. Robillard, Esq. LORANGER, Hon. LOUIS ONÉSIME. (*Laval.*)

S. of the late M. Joseph Loranger, by Marie Louise Dugal, and bro. of Hon. Justice Loranger, of the Superior Court, and of J. M. Loranger, Q.C. B. at St. Anne d'Yamachiche, P.Q., 10 April 1837. Ed. in Montreal. M. 3 Oct. 1867, Marie Annie Rosalie, dau. of Hon. Justice Laframboise, of the Superior Court, by Marie Rosalie Dessaulles. Called to the Bar L.C. 1858. Has been a mem. of the Council and is now one of the Examiners of the Bar of Montreal. Has been an Alderman of Montreal since 1870. Is Vice-Presdt. of the Société de St. Jean Baptiste, and was elected Presdt. of the Special Committee apptd. to superintend the grand national demonstration, 1874. Apptd. Atty.-Gen. in the Cabinet of Hon. Mr. Chapleau 31 Oct. 1879. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1875, and again at g.e. 1878, by acclamation, and on accepting office of Atty.-Gen. A Conservative and a Protectionist.—344 Craig street, Montreal.

LOVELL, HY. (*Stansfeld.*)

First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Conservative, but supported the Joly Govt.—*Coaticook, P. Q.*

LYNCH, Hon. WILLIAM WARREN, B.C.L. (*Brome.*)

Of Irish parentage. B. in Bedford, P.Q., 30 Sept. 1845. MARCHAND, Lieut.-Col Hon. FÉLIX GABRIEL, N.P. (*St. Johns.*)

A Notary Public; Lieut.-Col. commanding 21st Batt. Richelieu Light Infantry. Editor and proprietor *Le Franco-Canadien* newspaper. Elected a mem. of the Executive of the Reform Assn. of the Parti National of Montreal, 1875. Is author of *L'Erreur n'est pas comte* (Quebec 1873), and of other dramatic pieces. Apptd. Provl. Secy. 8 March 1878. Resigned Oct. 1879. First returned to Parl for present seat at g.e. 1867; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1871; again returned at g.e. 1875, and again at last g.e. A Liberal.—*St. Johns.*

MATHIEU, MICHEL, N.P. (*Richelieu.*)

S. of M. Joseph Mathieu, J.P., of Ste. Victoire, Richelieu, P. Q., by Edwidge Vandalle. B. at Ste. Victoire, 20 Dec. 1838. Ed. at

St. Hyacinthe College. M. 1st, 22 June 1863, Marie Rose de Lima Thirza, dau. of Captain St. Louis, of Sorel, (she d. March 1870); 2nd, 30 Oct. 1871, Marie Antoinette Amelie, dau. of the late Hon. D. M. Armstrong, a member of L.C., Quebec. A Notary Public. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1865. Was Sheriff of Richelieu from June 1866 to August 1872, (when he resigned to become a candidate for Parl.); and the proprietor and co-editor of the *Revue Legale*. Sat for present seat in House of Commons from g.e. 1872, until g.e. 1874, when defeated. Returned to present House by acclamation at g.e. 1875, and re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative.—*King street, Sorel*.

MEIKLE, ROBERT GREENSHIELDS. (*Argenteuil*.)

S. of the late John Meikle, Esq., and Jean Greenshields. John Meikle, Esq., was formerly a manufacturer in Glasgow. Came to Canada and settled in Lachute in 1830. Was actively engaged in commercial and other pursuits till 1856, when he retired from business and died in 1877. B. at Lachute. Unmarried. Is and has been for many years Commissioner of the Commissioners' Court. A Justice of the Peace. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Lachute, P.Q.*

MERCER, Hon. H. (*St. Hyacinthe*.)

First returned to Leg. Ass., Quebec, as Solicitor General in the Joly Govt., to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. P. Bachand, 3 June 1879. A Liberal.—*St. Hyacinthe*.

MC SHANE, JAMES, J. P. (*Montreal West*.)

S. of James McShane and Ellen Quinn, who came from the Co. Armagh, Irel., but who have lived in Montreal for over 45 years. Father carried on business as cattle dealer, packer and exporter of meats to England and the U.S., but has retired from business for the last 10 years. B. in St. Josephs, city of Montreal. Ed. in Montreal by the late Daniel Mahoney, school teacher, and finished course of studies at St. Sulpician College, (College St.) Montreal. M. 1863, Elizabeth Jane Danaugh, of Montreal, who died 26 June 1867; again in Plattsburgh, N.Y., to Josephine Katheline Meron, 8 Jan. 1868. Merchant and exporter of live cattle to all parts of England. Was the first to buy and ship cattle from Canada to England in 1874,—a branch of trade which has grown to large

proportions. Was made a Justice of the Peace since 1864 by T. D. McGee. Elected Councillor and Alderman for St. Ann's Ward for 11 years, and is now an Alderman. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A liberal. Wishes to carry out the railway policy and reduce taxation. Is determined to vote for legislation tending to retrenchment and economy. Will encourage emigration, and endeavor to do all he can for bettering the condition of the poor and working classes.—*Sunny Bank Cottage; Lower Lachine Road, and 94 Foundling street, Montreal.*

MOLLEUR, LOUIS. (*Iberville.*)

Is President of St. John's Bank; and a dir. of the Canada Agricultural Insurance Co. First returned to Parlt for present seat, at g.e. 1867. Re-elected at g.e. 1871, and returned by acclamation at g.e. 1875. Re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—*St. John's Que.*

MURPHY, ARTHUR H. (*Quebec West.*)

Third s. of the late Daniel Murphy, who came to Canada with his brother, the late Col. John V. Murphy, of Trenton, Ont., in the year 1825, to join their friend and kinsman the late Hon. R. C. Wilkins, M. L. C., Upper Canada; and who after spending some years in Upper Canada came to Quebec, where he married Ellen, dau. of the late Mr. Thomas H. Murphy, of Edgehill. The latter emigrated with his family from the county of Wexford in 1810, when he settled in St. Foy, near Quebec, where the homestead still remains, being one of the first Irish families who made Quebec their home. Arthur H. Murphy, the subject of the present sketch, was B. in Quebec 24 August 1831. Ed. at the Academy of William Thom, Esq., and at the High School of Quebec. Was twice elected to represent Montcalm Ward in the Quebec Council, and is a Turnpike Trust Commissioner. M. Maria, dau. of the late Mr. M. Roche. First returned to Parlt. for Quebec West at last g.e. A Liberal, but a supporter of all good measures.—*Grande Allée, Quebec.*

NELSON, HORATIO ADMIRAL. (*Montreal Centre.*)

Ancestors on father's side Scotch, and on mother's side Irish. B. 22 Oct. 1816 at Richmond, Cheshire County, New Hampshire. Ed. at the same place. M. in June 1841, at Burlington, Vt., M. D.

DAVISON. Has been eleven years an Alderman of the city of Montreal; for ten years a member of the Finance Committee of the City Council, and Chairman of the same. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. Liberal in politics. The financial and the railway policies are, in Mr. Nelson's opinion, the principal questions before this Province at present. He is in favor of economy and the finishing or completing of the railways now commenced as soon as the finances will permit.—344 *Mountain street, Montreal.*

PAQUET, Hon. ETIENNE THÉODORE, N.P. (*Levis.*)

B. at St. Nicolas, Levis, P.Q., 8 Jan. 1850. Ed. at the Quebec Seminary, at Fordham College, N.Y., and at Laval Univ. Unmarried. Vice-Presdt. of the *Club 'Canadien*, Quebec. Apptd. Provl. Secy. 31 Oct. 1879. First returned to Parlt for present seat at g.e. 1875, again at last g.e., and on appt. to office. A Nationalist.—*St. Nicolas.*

PELLETIER, ONULPHE. (*L'Assomption.*)

First returned to Parlt for present seat by acclamation at g.e. 1871; re-elected at g.e. 1875, and again at last g.e. A Conservative.—*L'Epiphanie.*

PICARD, Lieut.-Col. JACQUES, N.P., J.P. (*Richmond and Wolfe.*)

S. of M. Jacques Picard, by Thérèse LeBeau, both of St. Thomas, District of Joliette, P.Q. B. there, 2 July. 1828. Ed. at Colleges of L'Assomption and Joliette. M. Jan. 1873, Orpha, dau. of the late E. A. Generaux, Esq., for some years in Crown Lands Dept., Can. A Notary Public. Apptd. Registrar of Wolfe, Dec. 1861. Elected Presdt. of Wolfe Agricultural Society 1861. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1867. Re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1871, and again at g.e. 1875. Re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Wotton.*

POISSIER, JOSEPH. (*Beauce.*)

First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A moderate Liberal.—*St. Joseph, Q.*

PRÉFONTAINE, JOSEPH RAYMOND FOURNIER, *dû*, B.C.L. (*Chambly*)

Family settled in Chambly towards 1700. B. in Longueuil, P.Q., 16 Sept. 1850. Ed. by private tuition, and at the Jesuits' College, Montreal. Received degree of B.C.L. from McGill Univ., and was called to the Bar, L.C. 1873. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1875. Was a candidate at last g.e., but his opponent, Dr. Martel, was declared elected. Subsequently Dr. Martel was unseated on petition, and Mr. Prefontaine was re-elected. A Liberal, and in hearty sympathy with the old Liberal party. In favor of compulsory voting and compulsory education.—8 and 9 St. Vincent street, Montreal.

PRICE, WILLIAM EVAN. (*Chicoutimi and Saguenay*.)

Family originally from Wales. Second s. of the late William Price, Esq., Wolfesfield, Quebec, and formerly of Elstree, Hertfordshire, Eng., by Jane, third dau. of the late Charles G. Stewart, Esq., Comptroller of the Imperial Customs at Quebec, and brother of the Hon. D. E. Price, Senator. B. at Wolfesfield, 17 Nov. 1827. Ed. at Dr. Lundy's Classical School, Quebec, and at Kingston. Unmarried. A mem. of the firm of Price Brothers, lumber merchants, &c., Saguenay. Sat for present seat in Commons from g.e. 1872 until dissolution 1874, when he retired. Returned to present House, during his absence in Europe, at g.e. 1875, and again at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Wolfesfield, Quebec; Chicoutimi, Saguenay; Stadacona Club; Rideau Club.*

RACICOT, ERNEST. (*Mississquoi*.)

Father was a Notary at Sault au Recollet, near Montreal. Has two brothers in Montreal—one a priest and the other a trader. B. at Sault au Recollet, 13 July 1835. Ed. at Seminary St. Sulpice, Montreal. Studied law with A. & W. Robertson, Montreal, and called to the Bar in 1859; since which time has practised his profession at Sweetsburg. First returned to Parlt. 1 May 1878. Will give allegiance to no political party. Supports what he thinks is right.—*Sweetsburg, Que.*

RINFRET, *dû* MALOUI, RÉMI FERDINAND; M.D. (*Quebec Centre*.)

B. at Quebec, 5 June 1819. Ed. at the Seminary of that city; pursued his medical studies at Quebec and at Harvard Univ., where

he graduated M. D. 1845. Has been an Alderman of Quebec since 1862. First returned to Parlt. for present seat April 1874, on resignation of sitting mem.; re-elected at g.e. 1875, and again at last g.e. A Liberal.—19 *D'Aiguillon street, Quebec.*

ROBERTSON, *Hon.* JOSEPH GIBB. (*Sherbrooke*)

S. of the late Rev. James Robertson, for 30 years pastor of the Congregational Church at Stuartsfield, Aberdeenshire, Scot., and subsequently of Sherbrooke, P.Q. B. at Stuartsfield and educated in Can. M. 1870, Mary J., eldest dau. of A. G. Woodward, Esq., of Sherbrooke. Is Presdt. of the Quebec Central Railway Co.; of the Sherbrooke Mutual Insurance Co., and of the Sherbrooke Agricultural Socy. Was Secy.—Treas. of the Co. of Sherbrooke from the establishment of County Councils till the present system of Township Councils came into operation. Was Mayor of Sherbrooke for nearly 20 years, and Presdt. of the Temperance League in 1870-71. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council 25 Oct. 1869, and was Provl.—Treas. of Quebec from that time until Sept. 1874, when he retired from the Govt. on the Land Swap case. Re-apptd. Treas. in Mr. DeBoucherville's Administration, 22 Sept. 1874, and continued as such until 20 July 1876, when he resigned. Was a delegate to Eng. on public business in 1874. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1867. Re-elected by acclamation on his appt. to office, again at the general election of 1876, and again in 1878. Apptd. Treas. of the Province in Mr. Chapleau's Administration, 31 Oct. 1879, and re-elected in Nov. of that year for his old constituency, by a majority of 636 over his opponent.—*Quebec.*

Queen's Counsel, and was Atty.-Gen. for the Prov. of Quebec in the Joly Cabinet, from March 1878 to Oct. 1879. Has filled the office of *Batonnier* of the Quebec Bar. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal in politics. In favor of reasonable economy and prudent encouragement of all measures tending to the enlightenment of the people and increase of their material prosperity. An advocate of free trade.—*Westfield, near Quebec, on the road leading to St. Foye.*

SAWYER, WILLIAM, J. P. (*Compton.*)

Ancestors early settlers in Massachusetts. Grandfather came to Can. 1796, and obtained grant of present Township of Eaton, Co. Compton. S. of late John Sawyer, Esq., of Eaton. B. there, 25 Nov. 1815. M. Sept. 1839, Julia, dau. of late J. B. Smith, Esq., of Eaton, and grand-dau. of Rev. N. Smith, of Gilmanton, New Hampshire. Is Mayor of Eaton, and Warden of Compton. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, at g.e. 1871; re-elected by acclamation at g.e. 1875, and again returned at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Sawyersville.*

SHEHYN, JOSEPH, J. P. (*Quebec East.*)

Of Irish and French-Canadian parentage. B. in the city of Quebec, 1829. Ed. at the Quebec Seminary. M. 16 Aug. 1858, Marie Zoe Virginie, eld. dau. of M. Ambroise Verret, of Quebec. A member of the firm of McCall, Shehyn & Co., wholesale dry goods merchants. Is a Dir. of the Stadacona Bank; and President of the Quebec Board of Trade; a member of the Quebec Harbor Commission. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g. e. 1875, and again at last g. e. A Liberal.—*Grand Allée, Que'bec.*

St. CYR, DOMINIQUE NAPOLÉON, N. P. (*Champlain.*)

Grandfather served under Montcalm; was present at Carillon, and subsequently at Saratoga. S. of M. Jean Baptiste Deshayes

St. Cyr, by Joseph Lefebvre Des Coteaux. B. at Nicolet, P.Q. 4 Aug. 1825. Ed. at Nicolet College. M. 15 Sept. 1854, Marie Rose Anne Deshayes St. Cyr. Admitted as a Notary Public, 1867. Had previously been admitted a model school and an academy teacher. Was Secy.-Treasurer of St. Anne de la Perade from 1856 to 1863. First returned to Parl. for present seat, at g.e. 1875, and again at last g.e. A Conservative.—*St. Anne de la Perade.*

TAILLON, LOUIS OLIVER. (*Montreal East.*)

B. at Terrebonne, P.Q., 26 Sept. 1840. Ed. at Masson College. M. July 1875, Marie Louise Georgina, dau. of the late Hon. P. U. Archambault, for several years a M.L.C. of Canada (she d. 24 Jan. 1876.) Called to the Bar, C. 1865. Was one of the originators of the great French-Canadian national demonstration which took place in Montreal on the festival of St. Jean Baptiste, 1874. First returned to Parl. for present seat at g.e. 1875, and again at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Dorchester, near St. Hubert street, Montreal.*

TARTÉ, J. ISRAËL. (*Bonaventure.*)

B. on 11 Jan. 1848. Has been connected with *L'Canadien*, Quebec, as chief editor, for some years. Was nominated to oppose Hon. J. E. Cauchon for Quebec Centre, when that hon. gentleman was apptd. Presdt. of the Council, 1876, but retired three days before votation. First elected to Quebec Assembly, for present seat, 23 Feb. 1877, upon unseating of former mem. Re-elected at last g.e.—*Quebec.*

TURCOTTE, Hon. ARTHUR. (*Three Rivers.*)

S. of the late Hon. J. E. Turcotte. B. 19 Jan. 1845. Ed. at Jesuits' College, Montreal, and Stonyhurst College (Jesuit), Lancashire, Eng. Returned to Canada, 1863. Admitted to the Bar in Montreal, June 1867. M. 16 Jan. 1873, Marie Elcnor Isabella Macdonald, only dau. of Angus Macdonald, Esq., of Becancour. Elected Town Councillor for Three Rivers, July 1873; Alderman, 1875, and Mayor, 1876. Elected Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, June 1878. Elected for present seat, 18 March 1876. Re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Three Rivers, P.Q.*

WATTS, WILLIAM JOHN, B.A., B.C.L. (*Drummond and Arthabaska.*)

S. of the late R. N. Watts, Esq., who represented Drummond in Can. Assembly, from 1841 to 1851. Ed. at McGill University, where he took degree of B.A., 1866, and that of B.C.L., 1869. Called to the Bar of Quebec, 1869. First returned to Parl., for present seat, Feb. 1874, on resignation of sitting mem. Re-elected at g.e. 1875, and again at last g.e. A Conservative. — *Drummond.*

WURTELE, JONATHAN SAXTON CAMPBELL, Q.C., B.C.L. (*Yamaska.*)

Family comes from Strumpfelbach, near Stuttgart, Wurtemberg, South Germany, and can be traced back to 1559 in the parish registers. S. of the late Jonathan Wurtele, Esq., Seigneur of River David. St. David; and Presdt. of Agricultural Society of Yamaska, and Solicitor for many years of the Trust and Loan Co. of Canada for Quebec. Lieutenant-Governor—His Honor Hon. ADAMS GEORGE ARCHIBALD, C. M. G., Q. C., P. C. S. of Samuel Archibald, Esq., and grands. of the late James Archibald, Esq. Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, N. S. B. at Truro, N. S., 18 May 1814. Ed. at Pictou Academy under the late Rev. Dr. McCulloch. M. 1 June 1843, Elizabeth A., only dau. of the late Rev. John Burnyeat. Called to the Bar of P. E. I., 1838; and to that of N. S., 1839. Is a Queen's Counsel; and Presdt. of the Acadia Provident Assn. Was a mem. of Ex. Council, N. S., 1st, as Solicitor-Genl., from 14 Aug. 1856, until the resignation of the Govt., 14 Feb. 1857; secondly, as Attorney Genl., from 10 Feb. 1860, until 11 June 1863. Was a delegate to Eng. with the late Hon. J. W. Johnstone, to arrange terms of settlement with British Govt. and General Mining Assn. in respect to N. S. BUTLER, WALTER SCOTT, J.P. (*Queens.*)

S. of late Mr. James Butler, of Halifax, N.S., by Mary Smith, dau. of a U.F. Loyalist. B. at Canning, Queen's Co., N.B., 22 July 1823. Ed. there. M. 1854, Janet Anne, dau. of Mr. Hanford Sowers. Sat for present seat from 1867 until g.e. 1870, when defeated upon the question of Free Schools. Again returned June 1872, on resignation of sitting mem. Re-elected at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. A Liberal, and in favor of free non-sectarian schools.—*Grand Lake.*

COTTER, GEO. J. (*York.*)

First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Mouth of the Keswick, N.B.*

COTTRELL, THOMAS, J.P. (*Charlotte.*)

Descended from a Loyalist family. B. at St. David, N.B., 10 Aug. 1815. Ed. there. M. 9 Oct. 1836, Miss Annie Wyman of Waterville, Maine, U.S. Holds a Captaincy in the Reserve Militia. Descended from a Loyalist family. B. at Mangerville, N.B. Ed. there. A shipbuilder. M. 1st, the dau. of Col. Mouatt, of St. Andrews, N.B., (dead); 2nd, the dau. of the late John Hains, Esq., of St. John. Was a member of the Ex. Council from 23 Feb.

1871, to Jan. 1872. First returned to Parl. 1868, for present seat. Re-elected at g.e. 1870, at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. A Liberal, and in favor of the non-sectarian school system.—*Maugerville*.

CRAWFORD, Hon. JOHN HERBERT. (*Kings.*)

Grand-parents were Loyalist who removed from Mass., 1873, and settled on the Kennebecasis, where they remained until their death. B. at Hampton, N.B., 2 Nov. 1843. Ed. at the St. John Grammar School. Unmarried. Called to the Bar, N.B., 1868. Lieut. in King's Volunteer Cavalry, and Secy. Co. Rifle Association. Apptd. a member of the Ex. Council, 17 Jan. 1872 and is now Solicitor Gen. First returned to Parliament, for present seat, at g.e. 1870; re-elected at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. DAVIDSON, ALLAN A., Q.C. (*Northumberland.*)

Called to the Bar, N.B., 1840. Created a Q.C. 1875. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g.e. 1870. First returned at g.e. 1874; re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative and in favor of the non-sectarian school system.—*Newcastle.*

ELDER, WILLIAM, A.M. (*St. John County.*) 2ND MEM.

B. at Malin, Co. Donegal, Irel., 22 July 1822. Ed. at Belfast College, at the Universities of Glasgow and Edinburgh, and at New College, of latter city, at all of which he greatly distinguished himself. Studied theology, and was for some years a clergyman in the Presbyterian Church. Well known as a public writer and speaker. Edited the *Colonial Presbyterian* and the *Morning Journal* newspapers, St. John, for a considerable period, and is now chief editor and proprietor of the *St. John Daily Telegraph*. B., 1 Aug. 1829. Ed. at the Newcastle Grammar School. M. Sept. 1867, Martha, eld. dau. of Alexander Cumming, Esq., of Fredericton, (she d. March 1871.) Called to the Bar, N. B., 1852; created a Q. C., 1873; is one of the examiners for the Bar of N. B.; sat for York, in present House, from 1865 until g. e. 1866, when defeated; apptd. to L. Chatham Battery Garrison Artillery. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat in House Commons at g. e. 1867; for Local, same year, and again 1869. First returned at g. e. 1870. Defeated on School Question in 1874. Again returned at last g. e. Conservative.—*Chatham, N. B.*

HANINGTON, *Hon.* DANIEL L. (*Westmoreland.*)

Of English and royalist descent. S. of Hon. Daniel Hanington, M. L. C., and grands. of Wm. Hanington, Esq., of London, Eng., who settled at Shediac in 1784, and was the first English resident there, and of Wm. Peters, Esq., M. P. P., of Queen's County, gentleman. B. at Shediac, 27 June 1835. M. Oct. 1861. Emily Myers, dau. of T. R. Westmore, Esq., barrister-at-law, of Gagetown, N. B. Called to the Bar of N. B. 1861. Was Clerk of Circuits and of the County Court for Westmoreland from 1867 to

1870, when he resigned to contest the election of that year. Was first returned to Parlt. Dec. 1870 for the Co. of Westmoreland. Sat therein until the summer of 1874. Was then defeated on the "Bible and religious instruction in common schools" question, which he advocated. Was again elected at last g. e., and is now a member of the Executive Council. Is a Liberal of the old N. B. school and supports the Liberal Conservative Government of Can. Is a member of the Liberal Conservative Association of Westmoreland and took an active part in support of the candidates of the present Canadian Ministry.—*Dorchester, Westmoreland Co., N. B.*

HILL, GEORGE FREDERICK. (*Charlotte.*)

S. of the late Hon. George S. Hill, barrister, who was for twenty-eight years a member of the Assembly or Legislative Council of N. B. B. at St. Stephen, Charlotte Co. Feb. 1832. Ed. there and in U.S. Studied law and was admitted as an Attorney in 1854. Went into the mercantile business same year and has continued ever since. Official Assignee in bankruptcy for Charlotte Co. from 1869 until June 1878. Returned from Charlotte Co. to N. B. Assembly in 1865, at the head of the poll on anti-confederate ticket. Sat two sessions and was defeated at the election in 1866 when Confederation was carried. A Liberal and opposed to an increase of indebtedness, Provincial or Dominion.—*St. Stephen, N. B.*

HUTCHISON, DAVID ALEXANDER ERNEST. (*Northumberland.*)

Second s. of Hon. Richard Hutchison, Ex-M. P. B. 1 Jan. 1847 at Douglastown, N. B. Ed. at Chatham, N. B. M. 13 June 1871 at Chatham, N. B. Jenny, youngest dau. of R. Johnston, Esq., of Chatham. On the incorporation of the municipality of Northumberland was elected to represent the parish of Newcastle at the Council Board and was elected Warden of the municipality at the first session of the Municipal Council. Held a captaincy in militia under the old militia regulations prior to the Confederation of the Provinces. Has filled various minor offices from time to time. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. Independent in local politics.—*Douglastown, N. B.*

JOHNSON, URBAIN, J. P. (*Kent.*)

Family came from Scotland about a century ago, and settled amongst the Acadians in the *Baie des Chaleurs*, whence descendants

removed to Kouchibouguac. B. at St. Louis, N.B. 1824; ed. there. M. 1855, Mdle. Nathalie Leblanc. Has been connected with the Reserve Militia since 1866 and now holds rank of Lt.-Col. Sat for present seat from 1869 to g.e. 1870, when defeated; re-elected at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. A Liberal and in favor of separate schools.—*St. Louis.*

KENNY, THOS. F. (*Restigouche.*)

S. of Michael Kenny, of County Wexford, Irel., who emigrated to Bathurst, Co. Gloucester, 1845. A tailor by trade. B. in Bathurst, Gloucester Co., 1847. M. 1873 to Helen Pritchard, of New Richmond, dau. of Ralph Pritchard, Co. Bonaventure, P.Q. Descended from an English family; grandf. one of the English Loyalists; a captain in the English army, settled in New Richmond, Bonaventure, P.Q. Is High School Trustee for Parish of Dalhousie, and has held office for six years; is also Overseer of the Poor. A tanner and currier; engaged in the manufacture of leather for last ten years. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Dalhousie, Restigouche, N.B.*

KILLAM, AMASA EMERSON, J. P. (*Westmoreland.*)

Great-grandf. on father's side was an officer in the British army; served during the Am revolution, and upon the United States having secured their independence, came to this Province and settled in Sackville. Grandparents on mother's side were also Loyalists, and settled at Sackville after the close of the war. B. 25 Aug. 1834. Ed. at the Common School. M. 25 July 1857, at Sackville, N.B., Melicent Wheaton. Held the office of Postmaster for several years, and is now Presdt. and Manager of the Albert Railway. First elected at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative. Believes in Protection, particularly for goods that can be manufactured in this country. Fully believes in the National Policy, and that it is the only policy that will secure the reciprocity of trade with the United States, which has been so much sought after for some years.—*Moncton, N.B.*

LANDRY, Hon. PIERRE A. (*Westmoreland.*)

Of Acadian descent. S. of A. Landry, Esq., who sat for Westmoreland in N.B. Assembly from 1846, almost uninterruptedly, up

LEWIS, WILLIAM JAMES, *M.D.* (*Albert.*)

Of Welsh descent. S. of Hon. John Lewis, *M.L.C.*, N.B. B. at Hillsborough, N.B. 1830. Ed. there and at Sackville, N.B. M. 1877, Melissa Steaves, dau. of Richard E. Steaves, Esq., of Hillsborough, N.B. A Doctor of Medicine of the University of Glasgow and mem. of the Royal College of Surgeons, Edinburgh, Scot., at which institutions he graduated, 1855. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Hillsborough, N.B.*

LYNOTT, JAMES E., *J.P.* (*Charlotte.*)

S. of Edward Lynott, a native of the Co. of Leitrim, Irel., and Mary Leddy, a native of the Co. of Cavan, Irel. In religion, a Roman Catholic. B. at St. George, Charlotte Co., N.B., 26 June 1839. Ed. there. M. at St. Stephen, Charlotte Co., N.B., 4 May 1863, to Kathleen A. Sullivan, third dau. of Daniel Sullivan, Esq., of St. Stephen. Has been a Magistrate since 1855. Was Presdt. of the St. George and Penfield Agricultural Society for ten years; of the St. George Catholic Total Abstinence Society for two years; Secy. of the Grand Southern Railway Co. for three years; Secy. of the Board of School Trustees, St. George, since 1872; County Councillor for Charlotte, from organization of the municipality until elected to the Local House. Has held various parish offices before becoming County Councillor and *M.P.P.* Was a candidate for Charlötte Co. for the Local Legislature at g.e. 1870, when he was defeated. Elected at last g.e. A Liberal and free-trader, as far as practicable.—*St. George, Charlotte Co., N.B.*

LEIGHTON, JOHN STEWART. (*Carleton.*)

First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e. 1874; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal, and in favor of the free non-sectarian school system.—*Woodstock.*

MARSHALL, Hon. ROBERT. (St. John City.)

B. in Pictou Co., Province of Nova Scotia, 27 April 1832. S. of Mr. Alexander McNaughton Marshall, and great grand-s. of Robert Marshall, Esq., generally known as Deacon Marshall, who emigrated from Dumfries, Scot., to N. S., in 1773 and on 26 August 1783 received a grant of 350 acres of land on Middle River, Pictou Co. Also great grand-s. of John Crockett, Esq., who emigrated from Dumfries at the same time, and who also received a grant of 500 acres of land at Middle River, which is now the family homestead. The Johnson branch of the family emigrated in 1756 from the North of Irel. to New Hampshire; his great grandfather, James Johnson went to Truro, N.S., from New Eng. in 1761. A Govt. deed, granting 80,000 acres of land to about 70 settlers (including the whole township of Truro) is on record, signed by Gov. Willmot. The names of both James and John Johnson appear in the grant. Present mem. for St. John City, removed to Chatham, N.B. in 1837, where he was educated at the Grammar School, and afterwards accountant and confidential clerk in the well-known mercantile, lumbering and shipbuilding firm of Johnson & Mackie, at Miramichi. Removed from there to St. John 1859, being apptd. accountant of Intercolonial Railway; organized system of returns and accounts prepared from personal inspection of systems prevailing on railways in United States and Western Can. Established his general agency for fire and marine insurance, at the city of St. John, N.B. in 1866, and now represents, as general agent for the Province, the following companies:—Imperial Fire Ins. Co., of London, established 1803; the *Ætna* Ins. Co., incorporated 1819; Hartford Fire Ins. Co., organized 1810; the Merchants' Marine Ins. Co. of Canada; the British America Assurance Co., established 1833. Since commencing business has paid losses incurred by companies represented at the agency, amounting to \$2,000,000 and upwards. He now occupies the commodious premises known as "Insurance Block," erected in the *new* St. John, since the great fire of 1877. Is Presdt. of the N.B. Board of Fire Underwriters. Is a Notary Public for the Province, and a magistrate for the city and Co. of St. John, and for King's Co. Author of a paper on the subject of the *Canadian System of Classification and Inspection of Shipping* (1868): several suggestions therein being carried out by the Dominion Govt. In this paper Mr. Marshall strongly advocated the establishment of a Can. Lloyds for the classification of the shipping of Can. Also a paper on the subject of *Deck Loads*, which was sent in 1873 by

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Earl Kimberley to the Dominion Ministry, with a recommendation for early consideration; several of these suggestions have since been made statutory. Also author of a paper on *Fire and Life Insurance*. Submitted as Chairman of a Committee of the Dominion Board of Trade at Ottawa 1875; elected Vice-Presdt. of Dominion Board of Trade 1875, for Province of N.B.; is a mem. of the Council of the St. John Board of Trade; a dir. of the St. John Agricultural Society. Wrote (1874) a paper on the subject of *Canadian Tonnage and Plimsoll's Bill*, in which he claimed for the Dominion the fourth, if not third, place in gross amount of tonnage, and more tonnage, measured by population, than any other country in the world. M. 1st, 27 Sept. 1855, Anna M., dau. of the late George Henderson, Esq., of Newcastle, Miramichi, merchant, (she d. at Chatham in 1856); 2nd, 16 June 1863, Charlotte Neill, dau. of the late Capt. Thomas Rees, of St. John, N.B., and grand-dau. of the late James Shand, Esq., of the Co. of Aberdeen, Scot. Is a Commr. of the General Public Hospital of St. John; a dir. and life mem. of the Highland Society of N.B., at Miramichi; trustee of St. Andrew's Church, St. John; Treasurer and dir. of the Protestant Orphan's Asylum of St. John; dir. of the Home for the Aged, St. John; a lieutenant 2nd Batt. St. John's Light Infantry; life mem. of Young Men's Christian Assn. of St. John. Is ex-Presdt. of St. Andrew's Society of St. John; was created (1870) a Sovereign Grand Inspector General, the thirty-third or last degree of Freemasonry in England. Is a dir. of the N.B. Masonic Hall Co., and aided in founding the higher grades of Masonic orders throughout the Province; is Provincial Prior of the Great Priory of Knights Templars of Canada, and has been re-elected Lieutenant Grand Commander of the Supreme Council of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry of Canada; also special deputy for New Brunswick; and has also been re-elected M. W. Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Freemasons of the Province of New Brunswick; is Treas. and Dir. of N.B. Oddfellows' Hall Co. of St. John; a mem. of Enniskillen Loyal Orange Lodge, St. John. In 1874 Mr. Marshall offered as an Independent candidate for the city of St. John, on the platform that the N.B. School Law was too expensive, and that, without destroying the principle of non-sectarian free schools, modifications might be made, which, while doing no wrong to Protestants, would lead the Catholics to accept it without further trouble. At that time he was defeated, and now many of these modifications have been made, and harmony on the education question has, in a measure, been secured. First elected in

1876; contested the seat rendered vacant by the death of the late William H. A. Keans, with Charles A. Everett, Esq., J.P., who polled 1,162 votes, Mr. Marshall having 1,350 votes—majority for Marshall 188. This election was most determinedly contested, and, to avoid complications, Mr. Marshall resigned; and on 19 Jan. 1877 he was re-elected by acclamation. At the g.e. in June 1878, Mr. Marshall was again elected to represent the city of St. John in the Provincial Parl., and on the 20th Dec. 1879, was sworn in a mem. of the Govt of the Province of N.B.—without a Dept.—to fill the vacancy in the Ex. Council created by the election of the Hon. Benj. R. Stevenson Speaker of the Assembly. Mr. Marshall is a Liberal Conservative in politics, and advocates a more frugal administration of our Municipal, Provincial and Dominion affairs.—*St. John, N.B.*

McMANUS, FRANCIS JAMES. (*Gloucester.*)

Third s. of Terence McManus, Esq., J.P., who has resided for upwards of forty years at Memramcook, Co. Westmoreland. B. at Memramcook on 11 Jan. 1844. Ed. at the Common School, St. Joseph's College, Memramcook, N.B., St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown, P.E.I., St. Michael's College, Chatham, N.B., and at the Grand Seminaire de la Montagne, Montreal. M. 18 Nov. 1876. Marie, second dau. of Hilarion Hachey, Esq., J.P., merchant, of Bathurst, N.B. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A moderate Liberal. A believer in the principles of Free Trade and an advocate for the reduction of public salaries generally, but especially those of Cabinet Ministers and the higher State officers.—*Bathurst Village, N.B.*

McLELLAN, DAVID. (*St. John County.*)

First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Portland, N.B.*

MORTON, FINNEMORE E. (*Kings.*)

First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Sussex, N.B.*

PERLEY, Hon. WILLIAM E. (*Sunbury.*)

Was a mem. of Ex. Council, without office, from 1862 to 1865. Again apptd. to same position, 28 Oct. 1874. Sat for present seat

from 1854 until 1870, when defeated; again returned at last g. e. An unsuccessful candidate for Sunbury in House of Commons at g. e. 1867, and again elected at g. e. 1874. Re-elected at last g. e. Apptd. member of Ex. Council, June 1878. A Liberal and supports the free non-sectarian school system. In favor of an elective L. C.—*Blissville*.

RITCHIE, ROBERT J. (*St. John County*.)

First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal—*St. John, N. B.*

RYAN, PATRICK J. (*Gloucester*.) 2ND MEM.

A tanner. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, 31 Jan. 1876, on resignation of sitting mem. Re-elected at last g. e. A Conservative, and opposed to the present school system.—*Upper Caracquette*.

SATRE, CHARLES J. (*Kent*.)

First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. An Independent.—*Richibucto, N. B.*

STEVENSON, Hon. BENJAMIN BOBERT. (*Charlotte*.)

Grandfather came from Benfrewshire, Scot., to St. Andrew's, N. B. 1819. S. of Robert Stevenson, Esq., by Miss Miliken. B. at St. Andrew's, 10 April 1835. Ed. at Grammar School there, and at the University of N. B. where he graduated B. A. 1854. M. 1866, Kate, sister of the late John Bolton, Esq., who represented Charlotte in House of Commons from 1867 to 1872; Called to the Bar N. B., 1866; was Registrar of Probatés for Charlotte, which he resigned, 1867; apptd. a member of Ex. Council and Surveyor Genl. 23 Feb. 1871; has been a delegate to Ottawa on several occasions on behalf of the N. B. Govt. Resigned the office of Surveyor-General in July 1878, retaining however his position as a mem. of the Ex. Council. which he held until 23 Jan. 1879. Elected Speaker of the House of Assembly, 27 Feb. 1879. First returned to Parlt. Oct. 1867, for present seat; re-elected at g. e. 1870, at g. e. 1874, and again at last g. e. A Liberal. and pledged to uphold the non-sectarian school law.—*St. Andrew's; Fredericton, N. B.*

THÉRIAULT, Lieut.-Col. Hon. LEVITE. J.P. (*Madawaska.*)

Of Acadian origin. B. at St. Basil, N.B., 1837. Ed. at St. Anne's Coll. P.Q. M. 1st, 13 Jan. 1875, Eugénie, dau. of Edouard Le Bel, Esq., of Kamouraska, P.Q. (she d. 31 Jan. 1877); 2nd, Luce Eugénie Paty, widow of the late Octave Marchand, Esq., of Fraserville. Is Lieut.-Col. of Victoria Reserve Militia; a mem. of the Provl. Board of Agriculture, and Secy. of the Victoria Central Agricultural Society; was a mem. of Ex. Council from July 1871 to Feb. 1872, when he resigned. Represented Victoria from 1867 to g.e. 1874, when returned for the new county of Madawaska. Re-elected at last g.e. Apptd. Dec. 1879, a delegate to confer with the Quebec Government to secure the transfer of the seat of jurisdiction from the village of Kamouraska to the town of Fraserville, Temiscouata Co. A Conservative and in favor of separate schools.—*Fraserville, Temiscouata Co., P.Q.*

THOMPSON, FRED. PEMBERTON. (*York.*)

S. of Alexander Thompson, mill owner, Douglas, York Co. N.B. B. 1846 at Douglas. Ed. there and Mount Allison Wesleyan Academy, Sackville. M. 19 Sept. 1876, at Sackville, Eliza, youngest dau. of the late Rev. John Snowball, Wesleyan Minister. Is a member of the firm of McFarlane, Thompson & Anderson, manufacturers of agricultural implements. Was a member of the County Council for six years, and Warden for three. First returned at last g.e. Resigned seat in August in consequence of a petition filed against the member returned, by Dr. Dow, one of the defeated candidates, and was re-elected 14 Nov. 1878. A Liberal and opposed to the National Policy.—*Fredericton, N.B.*

TURNER, GAINES SAMUEL, J.P. (*Albert.*)

S. of Isaac Turner and Elizabeth Colpitts. B. in Albert Co., 12 Aug. 1838. Ed. in Albert Co. M. 16 Aug. 1876, in Albert Co. to Lucy E. Stiles. A Justice of the Peace, and director of the Albert Railway. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Harvey, Albert Co., N.B.*

VAIL, EDWIN A., M.D. (*Kings.*)

S. of the late John C. Vail, Esq., Registrar of Deeds and Probates for Kings Co., who represented that county in the N.B.

Assembly for over 20 years, by Charlotte H., dau. of the Rev. O. Arnold, Rector of Sussex, N.B. A doctor of medicine. Was Speaker of the N.B. Assembly for some years. Returned at g.e. 1870, and again at last g.e.—*Sussex*.

WEDDERBURN, Hon. WILLIAM, Q.C. (*St. John City*)

S. of the late Alexander Wedderburn, Esq., a native of Aberdeen, Scot., who was H. M.'s Emigration Officer for N.B. for many years, and wrote several works on that Prov., by Jane Heaviside, of London, Eng. B. in St. John, N.B. 12 Oct. 1834. Ed. at St. John Grammar School. M. 29 April 1858, Jennie, dau. of C. C. Vaughan, Esq., of St. John. Studied law with the present Judge Gray, of B. C., and was called to the Bar 1858. Created a Q.C. 1873. A dir. of the N.B. Deaf and Dumb Institution. Has been intimately connected with the newspaper press as editor and contributor for many years. Apptd. Commr. (with Messrs. Morrison and Skinner) to consolidate the Provl. Statutes of N.B. 1873. Held the office of Presdt. of St. John Mechanics' Institute for many years. Was G. W. P. of the Sons of Temperance of N.B. during two terms, and has also been successively Deputy Grand Master and Grand Master (being elected to both offices) of the Freemasons of that Prov. Elected Speaker of N.B. Assembly 18 Feb. 1876, which position he held until June 1878, when he accepted portfolio of Provl. Secy. in the new Government. Has always been identified with the Liberal party, and was one of the earliest advocates of Confederation, having lectured on "The Union of the Colonies" during the Portland course of lectures 1857. Promoted the "Better Terms" agitation, and moved the resolutions in the present House shortly after his election, and has been on three occasions a Govt. delegate to Ottawa on this subject: 1stly, with the late Hon. G. L. Hatheway and Hon. B. R. Stevenson; 2ndly, with the late Hon. G. L. Hatheway and Hon. J. J. Fraser; 3rdly, with the Hon. Messrs. Fraser, Young and King. Has also advocated a political union of the Maritime Provs. First returned to Parliament for present seat at g.e. 1870; re-elected at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. Stands pledged to uphold the non-sectarian school law of N.B.—*St. John; Hampton, King's Co.*

WHITE, GEORGE W. (*Carleton*.)

Grandfather emigrated to St. John, N. B., from U. S., after the American revolution. B. 12 May 1827, in Queen's Co., N. B. Ed.

at the Common School. M. 17 Nov. 1849, in the same Co., Mary Wiggins, grand-dau. of the late Jacob Wiggins. Held a seat in the Ex. Council from April 1872 until Aug. 1873. Holds the office of Parish Court Commr. and Coroner for the Parish of Wilmot at the present time. Held a seat at the Council Board of the same parish for four years. First returned to Local Legislature Nov. 1868 for Carleton Co., upon the death of James Hartley, Esq. Sat two years, and at the g.e. in 1871 was returned at the head of the poll. Resigned in 1873 and ran for the Dominion Parl. Was defeated by Mr. Appleby; again elected to the Local Legislature in 1878 at the head of the poll. A Conservative, and a strong supporter of Sir John Macdonald. In reference to tariff and trade, holds the opinion that we need reciprocity of trade or increased tariff on all that we can produce, giving us not only revenue but protection as well. In favor of retrenchment and the abolition of the Legislative Council.—*Centreville, Carleton Co., N.B.*

WILL'S, Hon. EDWARD. (*St. John.*)

Of Irish and English parentage. S. of the late John Willis. Esq., a native of Cavan, Irel. B. in Halifax, N.S., 5 Nov. 1835. Ed. there. M. Sarah, eld. dau. of Zechariah Adams, of St. John. A dir. for many years of the St. John Building Society and Investment Fund, and is Past Grand Master of the Loyal Orange Assn. of N.B.; has been connected with the N.B. press for many years. Established *Western Borderer* (Carleton) 1857, and about the same time the *Freemasons' Monthly Monitor*; was chief editor of the *Courier* (St. John) for some two years; and since 1863 has been editor and principal proprietor of the *Daily Morning News*, same city. Has held various offices in the Grand Lodge of A.F. and A.M. of N.B., and was elected Deputy Grand Master 1872. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council of N.B. 20 Feb. 1873, which position he resigned in the fall of 1876. Was an unsuccessful candidate for present seat in 1867; first returned at g.e. 1870; re-elected at g.e. 1874, and again at last g.e. A Liberal of the old school, and a supporter of the non-sectarian school law. In favor of a Legislative Union of the Maritime Provinces, respecting which he moved a resolution in the N.B. House of Assembly in 1875.—*Princess street, St. John.*

WOODS, FRANCIS, J.P. (*Queens.*)

MANITOBA.

(Entered Confederation, 15 July 1870.)

Lieut.-Governor of Manitoba:—*His Honor the Honorable* JOSEPH EDWARD CAUCHON, *P.C.* Descended from a mem. of the *Conseil Supérieur*, who came to Can. in 1636; a son of this gentleman, Cauchon de Laverdière, was a Judge of the *Cour Royale*, at the Island of Orleans. S. of the late M. Joseph Ange Cauchon, by Marguerite Vallié, both of Quebec. B. at St. Rochs, Quebec, 31 Dec. 1816. Ed. at the Seminary of that city. M. 1st, 1843, Julie, eldest dau. of M. Charles Lemieux, of Quebec, (she d. 1864); 2nd, 1866, Maria, dau. of Martin Nolan, Esq., of the same city, (she d. Dec. 1877). 3rd, 1 Feb. 1880, Emma, dau. of Robert Lemoine, Esq., Clerk of the Senate. Studied law with the late Mr. James G. Baird, and was called to the Bar, L.C., 1843. Edited *Le Canadien* newspaper from 1841 to 1842, and in the latter year founded *Le Journal de Quebec*. Is Presdt. of the St. Jean Baptiste Société of Quebec. Was Lieut.-Col. of the 9th Batt. of Volunteer Militia or Chasseurs-de Quebec, and Mayor of Quebec for some years. One of the chief promoters of the North Shore Railway and St. Maurice Navigation Co., and its Presdt. from its organization up to 1872. Is author of *Notions Élémentaires de Physique*, (Que., 1841); *Études sur l'Union Projetée des Provinces Britannique de l'Amérique du Nord* (do. 1858); and *L'Union des Provinces de l'Amérique Britannique du Nord* (do. 1865). Declined the Asst. Provl. Secretaryship for L.C. (with seat in Parl.), 1851. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council and Commr of Crown Lands, Can., from Jan. 1855 to April 1857 (in the McNab-Taché Administration) and Commr. of Public Works from June 1861 to May 1862 (in the Cartier-Macdonald Administration.) Called upon, in 1867, to form a Government for the Province of Quebec, a duty he failed to accomplish, owing to causes beyond his control. Sworn of the Privy Council, and was Presdt. of that body from 7 Dec. 1875 to 8 June 1877. when apptd. Minister of Inland Revenue, which office he held until

*The Executive Council, apptd. in Oct. 1878, remained in office until May 1879, when a difference of opinion occurred between Messrs. Norquay and Royal, and the latter, with Mr. Delorme, Minister of Agriculture, resigned. Overtures to other French members to enter the Cabinet, being unsuccessful, the Premier asked the Lieut.-Governor to allow the business of the session to be completed with but three members in the Govt. This, M. Cauchon refused to accede to, and Mr. S. C. Biggs was then taken into the Govt. as Minister of Public Works, Mr. John Taylor taking the Ministership of Agriculture. A round robin was signed by all the English members of the House promising to support a new line of policy announced by the Govt.,

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the former Opposition became Govt. supporters, and all the French members went into opposition under the leadership of Mr. Royal. Bills were passed to abolish all the French printing but the Statutes, and to redistribute the electoral divisions. The Lieut.-Governor reserved the former. In Oct. the House was dissolved, and a g.e. was held 16 Dec. 1879. Messrs. Norquay, Brown and Walker were re-elected—the two former by acclamation. Senator Girard, who had been sworn in as Provincial Secretary, Mr. Brown having succeeded Mr. Biggs,—who resigned,—in the Public Works Department, was also elected by acclamation. Mr. Taylor was defeated, and was succeeded as Minister of Agriculture by Mr. Goulet, who was re-elected by acclamation after taking office. Mr. Royal was not a candidate, having decided to contest Provencher for the Commons, in which he was successful.

BROWN, Hon. CORYDON PARTLOW, D. L. S. (*Gladstone*.)

Grandfather, an officer in the British army, settled in N. B. at close of Am. revolutionary war. S. of W. Brown, Esq. B. at Southampton, N. B., 15 Nov. 1848. Ed. there and in Fredericton. M. 21 Feb. 1874, Emma, eld. dau. of J. Davidson, Esq., of Palestine, Man. A civil engineer and land surveyor, and has been employed as such by the Dominion Govt. in the North-West. Was Principal of St. Mary's (N. B.) School, 1872. Occupied a seat at the Board of Education, Man., for two years. Apptd. Provl. Secretary 1878; and Minister of Public Works, June 1879. First returned to Parl., for Westbourne, at g. e. 1874, re-elected at g. e. 1878, and returned for present seat at last g. e. by acclamation. GIRARD, Hon. MARC AMABLE. *N P.* (*Buc St. Paul.*)

(See Senate.) Sworn in as Provincial Secretary Dec. 1879. Elected by acclamation at last g.e.—*St. Boniface, Man.*

GREENWAY, THOMAS. (*Mountain.*)

Eldest s. of the late Thos. Greenway, Esq., formerly of Cornwall, Eng., and latterly of Stephen, Co. Huron. B. in Cornwall, Eng., 1838. Came to Can. 1844, where he was ed. M. 25 Jan. 1860, Miss Annie Hicks, (she d. May 1875.) Was Reeve of the Tp. of Stephen, Ont., for ten years. An unsuccessful candidate for South Huron, in the House of Commons, at g.e. 1872, and at g.e. 1874. S. of Norman Wilfred Kittson, Esq., of St. Paul, Minnesota, U.S., a native of Sorel, P. Q., who was Mayor of St. Paul, and General Manager of Kittson's Line or Red River Transportation Co., by the late Elise Marion, dau. of the late Narcisse Marion, Esq., J. P., a native of St. Jacques de l'Âchigan, P. Q., by the late Marie Bouchard, a native of York Factory, N. W. T. B. 26 Feb. 1853, at North Pembina, (now West Lynne), Man. Ed. at St Boniface College. M. 8 July 1875, to Elise Gingras, dau. of the late Antoine Gingras, a native of Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., an extensive trader of St. Joseph, Dakota Territory, by Scholastique Trottier, a native of St. Francois Xavier, Man. Was employed as Extra Clerk of the Legislative Assembly during the Session of 1879. A member of the Board of Education for the Province of Manitoba. A Vice-President of *L'Association St. Jean Baptiste de Manitoba*. Unsuccessful in contesting the seat for St. Vital at g. e. 1878, and elected at last g. e. for Ste. Agathe.—*Provencher Avenue, St. Boniface.*

LA RIVIÈRE, ALPHONSE ALFRED CLÉMENT. (*St. Boniface.*)

Third s. of the late Abraham C. LaRivière of Montreal, P. Q., by the late Adélaïde Marcil, of Longueuil, P. Q. B. in the City of Montreal, P. Q., 24 July 1842. Ed. at Jacques Cartier Normal School, and St. Mary's College, of Montreal, P. Q. M. 4 Feb. 1867, to Marie Melvina Bourdeau, dau. of the late Gédéon Bourdeau, of Laprairie, P. Q. A real estate and insurance agent. Graduated at the Montreal School of Military Instruction, 2nd class, under Col. Lord Alexander Russell, 1865, and 1st class under Col. T. H. Pakenham, 1866; apptd. Ensign in the Reserve Militia, Military District of Hochelaga, P. Q., 1869, and Captain for the Military District of Manitoba, 1871. Apptd. jointly with the Hon. H. G. Joly, President of the Joint Committee of the Board of Agriculture and the Board of Arts and Manufactures, to organize a General Exhibition in Quebec, 1871. Received an appointment in the Dominion Lands Office, Winnipeg, when coming to Manitoba, Oct. 1871, which he held till 1875. Founded the Association *St. Jean Baptiste de Manitoba* (national) 1872, and elected Presdt.

1875; founded La Société de Colonization de Manitoba (philanthropic) 1874, and elected first Presdt. Apptd. a J.P. for Co. of Selkirk, 1874. A Commr. B.R. Contested Ste. Anne unsuccessfully at g.e. 1874. Elected by acclamation at g.e. 1878 for St. Boniface, the seat held up to that time by Hon. Senator Girard since the entry of the Prov. into the Confederation. Re-elected at last g.e., his opponent, Col. Provencher, only receiving 4 votes. A Liberal-Conservative in Dominion politics, and in favor of party lines on the same principle in local politics. LOUGHLIN, ANDREW. (*North Dufferin.*)

B. in Co. York, Ont., 8 Oct. 1844. Went to Manitoba in June 1878. A farmer. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. Conservative.—*Belmont, Man.*

McMICKEN, GILBERT. (*Cartier.*)

S. of Gilbert McMicken, Wigtonshire, Scot B. 1813. Came to Canada 1832. M. Ann Theresa, dau. of Alexander Duff, Esq., and grand-dau. of Commodore Grant. Was District Councillor for District of Niagara, Warden of the United Counties of Lincoln and Welland; Mayor of Clifton; represented Co. of Welland in Assembly of Can. from 1857 to 1861. Was Collector of Customs and Postmaster at Clifton; Chairman of Erie and Ontario Railroad; patentee of two improvements in telegraphy 1847—the “transfer instrument” and “notifier;” was the first to span the Niagara river with a wire for any purpose. During the American civil war was specially appointed Stipendiary Magistrate for Canada West. Received special thanks from Lord Monck for efficient and discreet discharge of duty. As Commr. of Police for the Dominion, was

specially charged with the oversight and detection of Fenian designs. Successfully mastered a complete knowledge of all their headquarters, plans, condition and finance, etc. Supplied the Govt. with minute and full information of all the arranged details of the Raid of 1870, so that the discomfiture of the invaders was assured. Informed Gen. Napier of the Raid of June 1866 in ample time to have crushed it; followed up all their machinations in connection with W. B. O'Donohoe for an attack on Fort Garry: came through there on the march and gave information to Lieut.-Governor Archibald, so that, by timely action, the intended rising was frustrated. In 1869 was honored with the special charge of the protection of H. R. H. Prince Arthur during his visit to Ont. and entrance to Montreal. Received thanks from Lord Lisgar and Col. Elphinstone for eminent services on this occasion, as also a handsome testimonial from H. R. H. Opened the Dominion Lands Office in Manitoba, and was, until retiring on superannuation in 1877, Assistant Receiver-General, Dominion Auditor and Manager of the Dominion Govt. Savings Bank; is now General Agent for the Commercial Union Assurance Co. of London, Eng. Elected Speaker of the Legislative Assembly Jan. 1880. First returned for present seat at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Winnipeg, Man.*

MURRAY, ALEXANDER, J.P. (*Assiniboia*.)

Only s. of the late Mr. James Murray, who came to Red River from Sutherlandsbire, Scot., with Lord Selkirk. B. in Kildonan, Red River, 18 April 1839. Ed. at St. John's College (under Bishop Anderson), where he took a scholarship 1857. M. 1861, Letitia, dau. of Rev. Geo. Flett, of Okanese Mission, N. W. Ter. First returned to Parlt. for St. Charles at g. e. Dec. 1878. Elected for present seat at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative in Federal politics, and was a supporter of the Norquay-Royal Administration. Insists on the maintenance of the French language in the Legislature and Courts of Law.—*St. Charles P. O., Man.*

NASH, WILLIAM HILL. (*Emerson.*)

B. in London, Ont., 19 March 1846. Went to Manitoba with the first Red River Expedition as Ensign in No. 1 Co., Ontario Batt. Was Lieut. 7th Batt., London, Ont., and is now Captain in the Volunteer Militia of Manitoba. A Barrister-at-Law. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Conservative.—*Emerson, Man.*

NORQUAY, Hon. JOHN. (*St. Andrew's.*)

Second s. of the late Mr. John Norquay, a native of Red River. B. 8 May 1841. Ed. at St. John's Academy under Bishop Anderson, where he took a scholarship 1854. M. June 1862, Elizabeth, second dau. of George Setter, jr., Esq. Is a mem. of the Board of Health and of the Board of Education for Manitoba. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council and Minister of Public Works and Agriculture for Manitoba from 14 Dec. 1871 until 8 July 1874, when he resigned with his colleagues. Re-apptd. to new Govt. March 1875. Sworn a mem. of the Executive as Minister of Public Works May 1876. In Oct. 1878 formed a new Govt. in conjunction with Hon. Mr. Royal, in which he held office of Premier and Provl. Treasurer. In May 1879 a difference of opinion having arisen between Messrs. Norquay and Royal the latter resigned with Mr. Delorme, Min. of Agriculture. Mr. Norquay subsequently called Messrs. Biggs and Taylor into the Govt., and having carried a bill for a redistribution of seats, dissolved the House in Oct. 1879. B. 25 March 1846, in the township of East Williams. Ed. at Nairn Village School, Toronto Normal School, and graduated in Toronto University. M. 30 July 1873, at Laggan, Glengarry Co., Jessie Flora, dau. of Donald Cattanach, Esq. Was Inspector of Public Schools for county Glengarry from Sept. 1871, until Nov. 1874. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1878, re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal; in favor of economy in the Civil Service and Free Trade in reference to the Province of Manitoba, especially at the present time, with due regard to the Public Revenue of the Dominion.—*Winnipeg, Man.*

SCOTT, Lt.-Col. THOMAS. (*Winnipeg.*)

Parents emigrated to Can. from Armagh, Irel., in 1836. B. in the County of Lanark, Ont., 1841. Ed. at Perth High School. M. in 1863, at Perth, second dau. of Robt. Kellock, Esq. Commenced the publication of the *Perth Expositor* newspaper, in the Conservative interest, in the year 1861, and conducted it until 1873, when he removed to Manitoba. Was capt. of a volunteer corps at Perth, and was on frontier duty at Brockville and Prescott for three months, in 1866; gazetted Major of the 42nd Batt., same year, and Bt. Lt.-Col. in '71; received command of a company in the Ontario Rifles in '70, forming part of the Red River Expeditionary Force, under Col. Wolsley; returned to Ontario, winter of '70-71, and when the Fenians invaded Manitoba in the fall of '71, again offered his services to the Govt., and was appointed to the command of the second expedition, which, after undergoing severe hardships, arrived safely at Fort Garry on 18 Nov. '71. Elected Mayor of the City of Winnipeg in '77 by a majority of votes, and in '78 by acclamation. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1878; re-elected at last g.e. Conservative.—*Winnipeg, Man.*

SMITH, JOHN. (*Burnside.*)

A native of England. B. 29 Jan. 1817. Has resided in Canada 37 years. Settled in Co. Wellington, Ont., and remained there until 1873, when he came to Manitoba. Has been Reeve of the township of Pilkington and Warden of the Co. Wellington. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A supporter of the present Govt.—*Oakland, Burnside, Man.*

SUTHERLAND, ALEXANDER MACBETH (*Kildonan*)

Third s. of Hon. John Sutherland, Senator, by Jeannette Macbeth, second dau. of the late John Macbeth, Esq., one of the early Selkirk colonists, who came to this country from Scotland in 1813. B. 31 Dec. 1849 at Point Douglass, now the city of Winnipeg. Ed. at Kildonan Public School, St. John's College, Manitoba College and Toronto University, where he graduated as Bachelor of Arts in June 1876, and entered as student-at-law at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, in August of the same year. First returned at g.e. 1878; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—*Winnipeg, Man.*

TAILLEFER, JOSEPH. (*Morris.*)

Accepted a Lieutenantcy in the first Red River Expedition and accompanied it to Winnipeg, under command of Sir Garnet Wolsley. At the end of one year took discharge and settled in Manitoba. Entered on the practice of law. Was called to the Bar of Ontario in 1861 and to the Bar of Manitoba in 1871. City Solicitor for Winnipeg from 1875. Sworn in as Attorney-General of Manitoba, Oct. 1878. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1878 for St. James. Re-elected at last g.e. for Westbourne by a majority of 122 over W. J. M. Pratt, Esq. A Liberal Conservative.—*Winnipeg, Man.*

WINRAM, WM. (*South Dufferin.*)

Boomer, LL D., Dean of Huron. B. at Newry, Co. Armagh, Irel., Nov. 1834. Ed. in Preston, Lancashire, and at the High School and McGill University, Montreal. Studied law with Hon. (now Sir) John Rose, Q.C. Called to the Bar of Lower Canada 1858, and to the Bar of Upper Canada in 1859, and to that of B.C. in 1864. Created a Q.C. in 1873. Settled in B.C. in 1862. M. 29 Dec. 1879, Sophie Edith, fifth dau. of the late Hon. Henry Rhodes, of Victoria, B.C. Was apptd. a member of the Legislative Council of British Columbia in 1864, and resigned the position in 1871, when he was returned to the Legislative Assembly, and became a member of the first Local Cabinet after the Union, holding the position of Chief Commr. of Lands and Works from 12 Jan. 1872 until 23 Dec. same year, when he was appointed Attorney-General on Mr. McCreight's resignation. This position he occupied until 11 Feb. 1874, when, on the resignation of Mr. DeCosmos, he formed a new Government in which he continued to hold the position of Attorney-General and Premier until 27 Jan. 1876, when he resigned. Was unanimously elected leader of the Opposition, and in the spring of 1878 succeeded in defeating the Government. A general election following, Mr. Walkem's party were overwhelmingly successful and, in July 1878, he formed a new Ministry, in which he assumed the double duties of Attorney-General and Chief Commr. of Lands and Works, and was also appointed Presdt. of the Council. Was apptd. a delegate to the Imperial Government in 1874 to present the case of B.C. on the subject of the difference between the Province and the Dominion, respecting the construction of the Can. Pac. Railway. At the end of the negotiations, was entertained at a large banquet in London, presided over by the Hon. Sir John Rose, Bart., and largely attended by noblemen, bankers, merchants and others interested in the success of the Canadian Confederation. Received a similar compliment on his return to B.C. During his stay in Eng. was elected a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society, and was made a mem. of the British Association for the Advancement of Science,

and placed on the Select Committee on Fine Arts. First returned to the present House at g.e. 1871. Re-elected by acclamation on his appointment to office. Again returned at g.e. 1875, and at g.e. 1878, and once more by acclamation in the same year on assuming the reins of Government. A Conservative.—*Victoria, B.C.*

Thomas Heath Haviland, of Charlottetown, P.E.I. He for many years represented and managed several of the largest "Proprietary Estates" in P.E.I., as also mercantile and other agencies. Has been a dir. of the Charlottetown Gas Light Company since its establishment in 1853. A magistrate since 1859. For several years Lieut.-Col. in command of the 6th Regt. of Queen's Co. Militia. PROWSE, Hon. SAMUEL. (*Kings, 4th Dist.*)

S. of the late Mr. Wm. Prowse, of Charlottetown Royalty, who came to P.E.I. in 1823, from Devonshire, Eng. B. in the Royalty of Charlottetown, 28 Aug. 1835. Ed. there. A J.P. and Commr. for taking affidavits in Supreme Court. A mem. of the Ex. Council. First returned to Legislative Assembly at g.e. 1867, for Kings, 4th Dist. Contested the same district in 1873, and was defeated on the question of Confederation. Returned for present seat in 1876, and accepted a seat in a Coalition Government on the school question. Resigned the seat in Government in Aug. 1878. Again returned at last g.e., and accepted a seat in a Liberal Conservative Government. A Liberal Conservative, and a supporter of the present Dominion Government.—*Murray Harbor, P.E.I.*

R.CHARD, JAMES WILLIAM. (*Prince, 2nd Dist.*)

B. at Swansea, in Wales, 31 May 1850. Ed. at Prince of Wales' and St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown. Unmarried. First returned to Parl. for present seat Oct. 1873, on resignation of sitting member. Again re-elected by acclamation 1876: re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Bideford.*

SHAW, ROBERT, B.A. (*Queens, 3rd Dist.*)

B. at New Perth, 2 Sept. 1845. Ed. at Central Academy and Prince of Wales' College, Charlottetown, P.E.I.; afterwards at Dalhousie College, Halifax, N.S., where he was B.A. in 1866 with first class honors, taking first prizes in classics, mathematics, history and ethics. M. Dec. 1873, Miss Florence Yuill, of Truro N.S. First returned to Parl. at last g.e. A Conservative.—*Charlottetown, P.E.I.*

SULLIVAN, Hon. WILLIAM WILFRED, Q.C. (*Kings, 2nd Dist.*)

Descended from an Irish family. B. at New London, P.E.I. 6 Dec. 1843. Ed. at Central Academy and at St. Dunstan's

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College. Has been a writer for the press. Was one of the editors of the *Charlottetown Herald* when it was founded in 1864, and for some time subsequently. Studied law with the Hon. (now Judge) Hensley. Called to the Bar, of P. E. I., Trinity Term 1867, when he became a law partner of Mr. Hensley, and continued as such until the appt. of the latter to the Bench of the Supreme Court in 1869. M. at Charlottetown, 13 Aug. 1872, Alice Maud Mary, third dau. of John Fenton Newbury, Esq. (B.A., of Oxford Univ.), formerly of London, Eng., and of Siena, Italy. Created a Q.C. by the Govt. of P. E. I., June 1876, and by His Excellency the Governor General, under Letters Patent, 19 May 1879. Was one of the counsel for the Provincial Govt., in the interest of the tenants, before the Land Commissioners' Court, under "The Land Purchase Act, 1875." Is head of the extensive law firm of Sullivan & Morson. A Surrogate in the Admiralty Court, and a N.P. Presdt. of the Board of Education, and a Trustee of the P. E. I. Hospital for the Insane. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council from 22 April to June 1872, when he resigned. Re-apptd. to the Ex. Council, with the office of Solicitor General, on the formation of the Pope Administration, 18 April 1873. Resigned his seat in the Ex. Council upon the resignation of the Conservative Govt., 4 Sept. 1876. Was unanimously elected leader of the Opposition at the meeting of the Legislature, 14 March 1877. On 1 March 1879, moved, in the House of Assembly, a resolution of non-confidence in the Govt., which, after a long debate, was carried by a vote of 19 to 10, on 6 of March, and the Administration resigned on the following day. Was immediately invited by His Honor the Lieut.-Governor, Sir Robert Hodgson, to form a new Govt. Succeeded in forming an Administration, and the Govt. were sworn in on 11 March 1879. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal, and believes the N.P. unsuited to the best interests of P.E.I.—*Bay Fortune, P.E.I.*

B. at Porthill, P.E.I., 29 June 1837. Ed. at Uxbridge, Eng. Unmarried. A merchant and shipowner. Elected M.W. Grand Master of the Freemasons of P.E.I., June 1875. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council 1870, and Speaker of the Assembly 1871. Again apptd. to Ex. Council 27 Sept. 1873. Returned at last g.e. and apptd. to Ex. Council 1876. Resigned March 1879. Re-elected to Legislative Assembly at last g.e. Has sat for present seat since 1858. A Conservative.—*Porthill.*

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THE NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES.

Lieut.-Governor.—*His Honor the Honorable* DAVID LAIRD, P. C. S. of the late Hon. Alexander Laird, who came to P. E. I. from Renfrewshire, Scot. 1819, and was for some years a member of the Ex. Council of the colony. B. at New Glasgow, P. E. I. 1833. Ed. at the Presbyterian Seminary, Truro, N. S. M. 1864, Mary Louisa, dau. of the late Thos. Owen, Esq, Postmaster General of P. E. I. By profession, a journalist; was editor of the Charlottetown *Patriot* newspaper. A governor of Prince of Wales' College and a director of the Ottawa Agricultural Insurance Co. Has sat in the Charlottetown City Council. Was a member of the Ex. Council, P. E. I., from Nov. 1872, until April 1873, and while holding that position formed a delegation to Ottawa, with Hon. R. P. Haythorne, to negotiate terms of Union with the Dominion Govt.; the basis agreed upon by the delegation was submitted to the people, and being rejected, on account of the side issues brought up, the Govt. resigned; but a short time afterwards, the same terms, with a slight modification in two clauses, were adopted by the Legislature, and the Island entered the Dominion. Has also been a member of the Board of Works and of the Board of Education. Sworn of the Privy Council and appointed Minister of the Interior, 7 Nov. 1873. Was apptd. in the summer of 1874 a Commissioner to treat with certain Indian tribes in the North-West for the extinguishment of their title to the soil, a mission which resulted in the conclusion of a Treaty at Qu'Appelle Lakes, by which they surrendered a tract of country containing about 75,500 square miles, through the northern part of which the Telegraph and Canada Pacific Railway lines will pass. Sat for Belfast in P. E. I. Assembly from 1871 until the Island entered the Union, 1873, when returned to the House of Commons. Re-elected by acclamation on his appointment to office, and again at last g. e. 1874. Was Minister of Interior from 1873 until the latter part of 1876, when he was appointed Lieut.-Governor of the North-West Territories.—*Battleford, N. W. T.*

I. MINISTERS OF THE CROWN.

1 *Change of Office.*

Defendant, while a member of Parliament, was appointed to the office of Postmaster-General, and again re-elected for the same constituency. On the 29th July he resigned that office, and within a month was appointed President of the Council, which office he resigned on the same day, and on the next day was re-appointed

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to his old office of Postmaster General—Held, that this was authorized by the 20 Vict. c. 22. The penalties imposed by that Act apply to members of the Assembly retaining their seats without re-election after acceptance of office, and not only to persons absolutely ineligible. The exemption contained in the seventh clause is not confined to one resignation and acceptance of office, but allows the change to be repeated, and the person must thus go back to the same office which he first resigned. It was stated in the pleadings that the Ministry, of which defendant or Postmaster-General, was a member, all resigned office on the 28th July, and on the 2nd August were succeeded by the opposition, who resigned on the following day; that on the 6th, the old Ministry were re-appointed, but took different offices from those which they before held, and on the 7th resigned again and were re-appointed to their old places; and it was alleged that the appointment to a different office in the first instance was colorable, and made only to enable defendant to resume his original appointment without going back for re-election:—Held, that although such a proceeding was probably not contemplated by the Act, it was allowed by it; that the court could not look at defendant's motives, or strain the construction of the statute so as to impose a penalty; and that whether the course taken was or was not consistent with the system of political government established in this Province, was a question which they could not take into consideration. *McDowell v. Smith*, 17 Q. B. 310. See also *Macdonell v. Macdonald*, 7 C. P., 479.

See 31 Vict. c. 25, secs. 5, 6, D.

II. PRIVILEGES OF PARLIAMENT.

1. *In Actions Against Members.*

A member of Parliament had formerly the privilege of being sued by bill and summons, not by the ordinary process. This was abolished by 12 Vict. c. 66, now contained in the C.L.P. Acts, s. 2. For decisions under the old practice, See *McKoane v. Fothergill*, 1 Q. B. 350; *Phelps v. McKenzie*, 5 O.S. 80; *Mahon v. Ermatinger*; 1 Q. B. 334; *Hincks v. Crooks et al.*, E.T. 2 Vict., R. & H. Dig. 333, *Lyster v. Boulton*, 5 Q.B. 632.

In an action against a member the declaration would not be set aside for a variance between it and the original bill.—*Hill v. McNab*, 1 Q.B. 413.

2. *From Arrest and Attachment.*

An attachment was granted against a sheriff, who was a member of Parliament, for not returning a writ pursuant to a rule of court. *Bell v. Buchannan*, M.T. 1 Vic.

Members of Parliament in Upper Canada have the same privilege from arrest as in England. One of the defendants, being a member, was arrested on the 29th November, 1851, under an attachment issued against him as an attorney for non-payment of a debt. The last preceding session during which he had been a member expired on 30th August, 1851, and that Parliament was dissolved on the 6th November following. On the 10th December he was again ejected, and in February applied to be discharged on the ground of privilege; Held, that he was not privileged under the first election, as at the time of arrest he was not a member, and more than forty days had elapsed from the close of the last session; but that he was entitled to his discharge as a member of the new Parliament, having been arrested within forty days next before the return of the writ of election. The return at the new election was held sufficiently proved by the affidavit of the applicant. *Regina v. Gamble, et al.*, 9 Q.B. 546.

An attachment against a member of Parliament is illegal, and may be set aside, though no proceedings have been taken upon it. *S. C.*, 1 P.R. 222.—P.C.—Burns.

An order to commit to close custody for not attending to be examined pursuant to a judge's order is a commitment for contempt, not a commitment in execution. A member of Parliament is therefore not privileged from arrest under such order, and a party committed under it is not entitled to his discharge on payment of the debt and costs. Semble, that if the order be so framed as to entitle defendant to his discharge on payment of the claim, the privilege of Parliament would avail against it. *Henderson v. Dickson*, 19 Q.B. 592.

An order will not be made for the examination of a judgment debtor whose home is in the Province of Quebec, though temporarily residing in Ontario, attending to his duties as a member of Parliament. *Regan v. McGreevy*, 5 P.R. 94.—C.L. Chamb.—Hagarty.

A member of the Provincial Parliament is privileged from arrest for forty days after the prorogation or dissolution of Parliament, and for the same period before the next appointed meeting. *Wadsworth et al v. Boulton*, 2 C.L., Chamb. 76.—McLean.

Defendant applied to set aside an arrest for irregularity; his application was defeated, not on merits, but owing to plaintiff's applying for and obtaining an order to amend: Held, therefore, that the plaintiff was still at liberty to move after the amend against the arrest on the ground of illegality.—*Id.*

Where a party having privilege had been in contempt for non-compliance with an order of the court, and the order *nisi* for a sequestration had been duly served; but between that and the application for the writ to issue the party had ceased to be a member, the court refused the writ, and directed the party moving to commence proceedings for the contempt *de novo*. *Myers v. Harrison*, 4 Chy. 148.

An application to commit the sitting member for contempt in not attending the investigation before the County Judge as a witness for his adversary, refused. *In re Essex Election*, 4 L.J. 212.—C.C.—Chewett.

3. Other Cases.

The House of Assembly has the power of imprisoning persons guilty of contempt in answering or refusing to answer questions before a select committee.—*McNab v. Bidwell et al*, Dra. 144.

To an action on a bond, alleging a departure, defendants pleaded that the debtor, by virtue of a warrant of the Speaker of the House of Assembly, then in session, was required to attend as a witness before said House, and that to obey the warrant he left the limits and remained away ten days: Held, no defence, as it was not shewn that the Speaker knew the debtor to be on the limits, or

what occasion there was for requiring his attendance, or that any process had issued by which he was placed in custody of an officer while absent. *Brown et al. v. Paxton et al.*, 19 Q.B. 238..

The engagements of a witness, who was a Senator of the Dominion and a member of the Executive Council, at his duties at Ottawa, where the Senate was in session, were deemed sufficient excuse for not procuring his attendance, and good grounds for putting off the hearing. *Rees v. Attorney-General*, 2 Chy. Chamb. 386.—Taylor, *Secretary*.

III. ELECTION OF MEMBERS.

1. *Property Qualification of Candidates.*

Held, 1. As in the North Victoria case, that the Dominion Election Act of 1874 not being retrospective, the question of property qualifications of candidates, at elections for members of the House of Commons held before the passing of the Dominion Election Act of last session, can still be raised in pending cases. 2. That it is not necessary for an elector, demanding the property qualification of a candidate, to tender the necessary declaration for the candidate to make, the intention of the statutes being that the candidate must himself prepare the declaration. 3. That if the property qualification of a candidate be properly demanded at the right time, the demand must be complied with; and it is not sufficient after the return of a candidate is contested, for him to shew that at the time of his election or return he was duly qualified. *Cardwell Election Petition—Hewitt et al. v. Cameron*, 10 L.J.N.S. 230.—E.C.—Richards.

[By the Dominion Election Act of 1874, property qualification for a candidate for the Dominion Parliament is annulled. For the Senate the qualification is property representing \$4,000, above all liabilities.]

2. *Nomination.*

A nomination paper for the House of Commons was signed by twenty-five persons. Twenty-four of the names were on the voters' lists, but through some omission one was not. This person had sufficient property to be on the list, and had been on the roll for

the previous year :—Held, under 37 Vict. c. 9, D., that the nomination paper was nevertheless sufficient. Semble, that a returning officer is both a ministerial and judicial officer. *South Renfrew Election Case—Bannerman v. McDougall*, 11 L.J.N.S. 47.—E. C.—A. Wilson.

Held, following the decision of the Chancellor in the Dundas case (not reported), that the meeting of the electors at the nomination of candidate is a meeting "for the purpose of promoting the election of a candidate," within the meaning of the 36 Vict. c. 2, s. 2, O. *North Middlesex Election Petition—Cameron v. McDougall*, 12 L.J.N.S. 14.—E. C.—Spragge.

3. Voters.

(a) *Naturalized Subjects and Aliens.*

Held, that naturalized subjects are not required to procure certificates of naturalization in order to entitle them to vote. *West Elgin Election*, 9 L.J. 330.—Parliamentary Committee.

Where the voter was born in the United States, both his parents being British born subjects, his father and grandfather being U. E. Loyalists, and the voter residing nearly all his life in Canada :—Held, entitled to vote. *Stormont Election Petition*, 7 L.J.N.S. 213.—E. C.—Richards.

(b) *Voters' List and Assessment Roll.*

Where the voter had been originally, before 1865 or 1866, put upon the assessment roll merely to give him a vote, but by a subsequent arrangement with his father, made in 1865 or 1866, he was to support his father, and apply the rest of the proceeds to his own support :—Held, that if he had been put on originally merely for the purpose of giving a vote, and that was the vote questioned, it would have been bad, but being continued several years after he really became the occupant for his own benefit, he was entitled to vote, though originally the assessment began in his name merely to qualify him. *Stormont Election Petition*, 7 L.J.N.S. 213.—E. C.—Richards.

The name of a voter being on the poll book is *prima facie* evidence of his right to vote *Ib.*

The only question as to the qualification of a voter settled by the Court of Revision under the Assessment Act is the one of value. *Ib.*

Where the voter and his son leased certain property, and the lease was drawn in the son's name alone, and when the crops were reaped the son claimed they belonged to him solely, the voter owning other property, but being assessed for this only, and voting on it: Held, that although he was on the roll and had the necessary qualification, but not assessed for it, he was not entitled to vote. *Ib.*

If a man be duly assessed for a named property on the roll, even though there was a clerical error in describing such property in the voters' list, or erroneously setting down another property on the voters' list, if no question or difficulty arose at the poll as to the taking the oath, the vote will not be struck off on a scrutiny. *Brockville Election Petition*, 7 L.J.N.S. 221.—E.C.—Hagarty.

When a voter, properly assessed, who was accidentally omitted from the voters' list for polling sub-division No. 1, where his property lay, and entered in the voters' list for sub-division No. 2, voted without question in No. 1, though not on the list—vote held good. *Ib.*

Quære, even if accidentally omitted from the voters' list should the vote be received? Of course, if questioned at the poll, it could not have been received, not being on the voters' list. *Ib.*

A voter duly qualified is not to be disfranchised if his name is entered as tenant, instead of owner or occupant, or vice versa. *Stormont Election Petition*, 7 L.J.N.S. 213.—E.C.—Richards; *Brockville Election Petition*, *Ib.* 221.—E.C.—Hagarty.

The 32 Vic. c. 21, s. 7, and sub-s. 1, O., enacts that the clerk of each municipality shall, in each year, make from the assessment rolls a list of the persons entitled to vote therein, and deliver it to the clerk of the peace on or before the 15th August. By sub-s. 3, this period shall be directory only to the clerk, "and the said lists shall be valid and effectual for the purposes of this Act, even though not so completed and delivered by the said period of time;"

and by sub-s. 10, no person shall be admitted to vote unless his name appear on the last list of voters, delivered to the clerk of the peace, "at least one month before the date of the writ to hold such election." The writ to hold the election was tested on the 25th of February, 1871. The list of voters for one of the townships in the electoral division was made up from the assessment roll of 1870, and sworn to on the 13th August; but it was not delivered to the clerk of the peace until the 17th March, 1871. The list for 1869 had been delivered on the 19th August in that year. Per Richards, C. J., and Morrison, J., the list of 1869 was the one which should have been used. Per A. Wilson, J., that of 1870 was properly used; for that the month should be construed to mean a month from the 15th of August, when the roll should have been, or an earlier day when it may in fact have been, delivered; that the roll, though delivered too late, would not otherwise be "valid and effectual for the purposes of this Act," and the neglect of the clerk should not be allowed to disfranchise voters. There were 41 voters on the list of 1869 who were not on that of 1870, but it was not shewn that the vote of any one entitled to vote by either list had been rejected; nor was it shewn or suggested that the use of one roll instead of the other could in any way have affected the result of the election: Held, that the election was not voided. *The Election for the Electoral Division of the County of Monck*, 32 Q. B. 147.

Under the Dominion Election Act, 1874, the assessment roll is conclusive as to the amount of the assessment; but the mere fact of the name of a person being on the roll is not conclusive as to his right to vote. The returning officer is bound to record the vote if the person take the oath, but that is not conclusive. *North Victoria Election Petition—Cameron v. MacLennan*, 10 L. J. N. S. 217. —E. C.—Richards, Spragge, Hagarty.

Mistakes in copying the voters' lists should not deprive a legally qualified voter of his vote (though the returning officer might properly refuse to receive it), any more than the name of an unqualified voter being on the list would give him a right to vote. But the mere fact that the lists were not correct alphabetical lists, or had not the correct number of the lot, or were not properly certified, or the omitting to do some act as to which the statute is directory, is no ground for setting aside an election, unless some injury resulted from the omission. *Ib.*

The names of certain voters who were entitled to vote at the election appeared on the last revised assessment roll, and should have appeared on the copies of the voters' lists as furnished to deputy returning officers, but were omitted from such lists. They tendered their votes to the deputy returning officer, and many of them stated they desired to vote for the petitioner. Semble, that these votes must be counted for the petitioner, if it were clear that they tendered their votes and intended to vote for him. *North Victoria Election. Petition—Cameron v. Maclellan*, 11 L.J.N.S. 163. —Q. B.—A. Wilson.

The above decision affirmed on appeal. The petitioner, upon a scrutiny of the ballots, having a majority in his favor, it appeared that the names of eighteen persons upon the last revised assessment roll, and entitled to vote, were omitted from the copies of voters' list made for the purposes of the election, and their votes were rejected by the returning officer. Eight of them tendered their votes for the petitioner at the poll, and four others made affidavits that they wished to vote for him, which they left with the returning officer. The other six tendered their votes, but did not say for whom, but there was evidence that they declared at the poll, though not to the returning officer, that they would have voted for the petitioner:—Held, no ground for setting aside the election; for that it was competent to receive evidence showing how they intended to vote, and it was clear therefore that their rejection had not affected the result. *S.G.*, 37 Q. B. 234.

Under 37 Vict. c. 4, s. 5 O., the county judge has the right to examine and decide whether the person objecting to any votes in the lists of voters is a voter or person entitled to be a voter, although such complainant may appear on the roll as duly qualified. The judge having found as facts, on the evidence before him, that one of the two complainants did not give the notice of his complaint required by section 6, and that the other was not entitled to be a voter:—Held, that this decision could not be reviewed. *In re Parsons and Toms—Re Voters' List of Goderich*, 36 Q. B. 88.

The list of voters required to be posted to various persons under Vict. c. 4, O., was prepared and certified by the clerk of the municipality, ready for transmission on a certain day, but he died before that day came, and they were in fact transmitted by his successor or without any alteration in the certificate. They were

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regular in every respect, with this exception:—Held, that as sec. of 37 Vict. c. 4, was only directory, and as the object of the statute was fulfilled to all intents and purposes, the list was sufficient to give jurisdiction to the county judge to revise it. *In re Revision of Voters' Lists of the Township of Goderich*, 6 P. R. 213.—C. L. Chamb.—Morrison.

(c) *Property Qualification.*

Where father and son live together on the father's farm, and the father is in fact the principal to whom money is paid, and who distributes it, and the son has no agreement binding on the father to compel him to give the son a share of the proceeds of the farm, or to cultivate a share of the land, and the son merely receives what the father's sense of justice dictates:—Held, the son has no vote. *Stormont Election Petition*, 7 L. J. N. S. 213.—E. C.—Richardson.

In a milling business, where the agreement between the father and the son was, that if the son would take charge of the mill and manage the business he should have a share of the profits, and the son, in fact, solely managed the business, keeping possession of the mill, and applying a portion of the proceeds to his own use:—Held, that the son had such an interest in the business, and, while the business lasted, such an interest in the land as entitled him to vote. *Ib.*

Where a certain occupancy was proved on the part of the son distinct from that of the father, but no agreement to entitle the son to a share of the profits, and the son merely worked with the rest of the family for their common benefit:—Held, that although the son was not merely assessed for the real, but the personal property on the place (his title to the latter being on the same footing as the former) he was not entitled to vote. *Ib.*

Where the father had made a will in his son's favor, and told the son if he would work the place and support the family he would give it to him, and the entire management remained in the son's hands from that time, the property being assessed in both names—the profits to be applied to pay the debt due on the place:—Held, that as the understanding was that the son worked the place for the support of the family, and beyond that for the benefit of the estate, which he expected to possess under his father's will, and he did

not hold immediately to his own use and benefit, he was not entitled to vote. *Ib.*

Where the objection taken was that the voter was not at the time of the final revision of the assessment roll the bona fide owner, occupant or tenant of the property in respect of which he voted, and the evidence showed a joint occupancy on the part of the voter and his father on land rated at \$240:—Held, that the notice given did not point to the objection that if the parties were joint occupants they were insufficiently rated. The learned chief justice intimated that if the objection had been properly taken, or if the counsel for petitioner (whose interest it was to sustain the vote) had stated that he was not prejudiced by the form of the objection, he would have held the vote bad. *Ib.*

Where a voter had only received a deed of the property on which he voted on the 16th of Aug. 1870, but previous to that date had been assessed for and paid taxes on the place, but not owning it:—Held, that not possessing the qualification at the time he was assessed, or at the final revision of the roll, he was not entitled to vote. *Ib.*

Where the voter was the equitable owner, the deed being taken in the father's name, but the son furnishing the money, the father in occupation with the assent of the son, and the proceeds not divided:—Held, that being the equitable owner, notwithstanding the deed to the father, he had the right to vote. *Ib.*

Where the voter was tenant of certain property belonging to his father-in-law, and before the expiration of his tenancy, the father-in-law, with the consent of the voter (the latter being a witness to the lease), leased the property to another, the voter's lease not expiring until November, and the new lease being made on the 28th of March 1870:—Held, that after the surrender by the lease, to which he was a subscribing witness, he ceased to be a tenant on the 28th of March 1870, and that to entitle him to vote he must have the qualification at the time of the final revision of the assessment roll, though not necessarily at the time he voted, so long as he was still a resident of the electoral division. *Ib.*

Where a verbal agreement was made between the voter and his father in January 1870, and on this agreement the voter from

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that time had exercised control, and took the proceeds to his own use, although the deed was not executed until September following:—Held, entitled to vote. *Ib.*

Where it was proved that an agreement existed (verbal or otherwise), that the son should have one-third or one-half of the crops as his own, and such agreement was bona fide acted on, the son being duly assessed—vote held good; the ordinary test being, had the voter an actual existing interest in the crop growing and grown? *Brockville Election Petition*, 7 L.J.N.S. 221—E.C.—Hagarty.

Where it is proved that for some time past the owner has given up the whole management of the farm to his son, retaining his right to be supported from the product of the place, the son dealing with the crops as his own, and disposing of them to his own use—the son's vote is good. *Ib.*

A clearly established course of dealing or conduct for years as to management and disposition of crops, and acts done by the son in the management of the farm:—Held, sufficient to establish an interest in the crops in the son, though the evidence of any original agreement or bargain was not clear. *Ib.*

If the evidence would warrant a jury finding the crops (say in the year preceding the last assessment) to be the property of the voter—the vote is good. *Ib.*

No question of actual title is to be entertained, occupancy to the use and benefit of the occupant being sufficient. *Ib.*

Where the owner dies intestate, and the estate descends to several children, only the interest of the actual occupants is generally to be considered. Quare, unless the occupant has shewn to be receiving the rents and profits, and on account of a party interested, though not in actual possession; a mere liability to account is not to be considered. *Ib.*

Held, that by the Dominion Election Act of 1873, the qualification of voters to the House of Commons was regulated by the Ontario Act. *North Victoria Election Petition—Cameron v. MacLennan*, 10 L.J.N.S. 217.—E.C.—Richards, Spragge, Hagarty.

(d) *Disqualification.*

Held, that a postmaster of a city is not liable to a penalty for voting at an election for a member of the House of Commons of the Dominion. But, *semble*, per Hagarty, C. J., he is not entitled to vote, and should he do so his vote might be struck off on a scrutiny. *Savage v. Deacon, Smythe v. Deacon*, 22 C.P. 441.

The words "illegal and prohibited acts in reference to elections," used in 34 Vict. c. 3, s. 3, O., mean such acts done in connection with, or to affect, or in reference to elections; not all acts which are illegal and prohibited under the election law. The right to vote is not to be taken away or the vote forfeited by the act of the voter unless under a plain and express enactment, for it is a matter in which others besides the voter are interested. *In re The Election of the Town of Brockville and the Township of Elizabethtown*, 32 Q.B. 132.

See *Cornwall Election Petition—Bergin v. Macdonald.*

4. *Agents and Canvassers.*

When a candidate puts money into the hands of his agent, and exercises no supervision over the way in which the agent is spending that money, although he may have given directions that none of the money should be improperly spent, there is such an agency established that the candidate is liable to the fullest extent, not only for what that agent may do, but also for what all the people whom that agent employs may do. *Grey (South Riding) Election Petition—Hunter v. Lauder*, 8 L.J.N.S. 17.—E.C.—Mowat.

Where bribery by an agent is proved, costs follow the event, even though personal charges brought against the respondent have not been proved, there having been no additional expense occasioned to the respondent by such personal charges. *Ib.*

Friends of the candidate formed themselves into committees, and some of them voluntarily distributed cards and canvassed different localities with books containing lists of voters, noting certain particulars as to promises, &c. These canvassers often came across voters in public houses, and, when there, according to custom, treated those whom they found there, and thus spent their

money as well as their time. On this being represented to those who had charge of the money for election expenses, the latter, in several cases, reimbursed the canvassers:—Held, that these general payments, if not exceeding what would be paid to a person for working the same time in other employments, would not be such evidence of bribery as to set aside an election. *East Toronto Election Petition—Rennick v. Cameron*, 8 L.J.N.S. 113.—E.C.—Richards.

Held, that a candidate is responsible for the corrupt acts of sub-agents, and persons acting under them. Semble, that no limit can be placed to the number of parties through whom the sub-agency may extend, even though the chain is not purposely lengthened. *Niagara Election Petition—Black v. Plumb*, 10 L.J.N.S. 317.—E.C.—Hagarty.

Responsibility for acts of sub-agents. *Kingston Election Petition—Stewart v. Macdonald*, 11 L.J.N.S. 19.—E.C.—Richards.

What acts constitute a person an agent in a parliamentary election, considered: Canvassing combined with other acts; an accumulation of trifling acts; attendance at meetings; entrusting a person with money for election purposes; canvassing in company with candidate. *Cornwall Election Petition—Bergin v. Macdonald*, 10 L.J.N.S. 313.—E.C.—Spragge.

When a large and general authority is given to an agent, the candidate will be held responsible for the acts of sub-agents of such person. *Ib.*

Evidence of what acts constitute agency considered. *London Election Petition—Pritchard v. Walker*, 10 L.J.N.S. 281.—E.C.—Hagarty.

Held, following the judgments in the London election case, and the Kingston election case, that a candidate is not disqualified by the corrupt acts of his agents, under 36 Vict. c. 27, s. 18, D., without his knowledge or consent. *Cornwall Election Petition—Bergin v. Macdonald*, 11 L.J.N.S. 81.—E.C.—Spragge.

Held, that the evidence set out in the report did not constitute Peters an agent for the petitioner, so as to make the latter respon-

sible for his acts. *North Victoria Election Petition—Cameron v. MacLennan*, 11 L.J.N.S. 163; 37 Q.B. 234.

Quære, whether the giving by an agent of a free dinner to a number of voters who have come a long distance in severe winter weather, the evidence not showing a corrupt intent on the part of the agent, is a "corrupt act." *Ib.*

About a dozen of the electors met some time before the nomination to consult as to the candidate who should run in the interests of the political party to which they belonged. By them and others the respondent was nominated, and accepted the nomination. They met occasionally to report progress and consult as to the canvass. One of them, named Sullivan, on the election day, during the hours of polling, treated some of the electors at a tavern. The respondent was present, and gave a silent consent to the act, and drank with the rest.—Held, that Sullivan was an agent, and that the respondent was a party to, and personally responsible for, a corrupt practice under the above statute. *North Wentworth Election Petition—Christie v. Stock*, 11, L.J.N.S. 196.—E.C.—Draper. Affirmed on appeal.—*Ib.*, 296.

The mere fact of a political association putting forward and supporting a particular candidate does not make every member of the association his agent, though the candidate may so avail himself of their services as to make them his agents. One M., the reeve of a township, exerted himself strongly in favor of the respondent, to whom he was politically opposed, and against the other candidate, and attended meetings where the respondent was, and spoke in his favor. The reason for supporting the respondent and opposing the ministerial candidate, with whom he was politically in accord, was, that the ministry of the day had separated the township of which he was reeve from the riding. He was much annoyed and indignant at this separation, and announced his intention of using all his influence against the ministerial candidate.—Held, that the question of agency being one of intent, the respondent never conferred, and M. never assumed the authority of an agent for the respondent. *North Gray Election Petition—Boardman v. Scott*, 11 L.J.N.S. 242. This was reversed on appeal.

Held, that if an agent partakes of a treat during the hours of polling, the election is thereby avoided. *South Essex Election Petition—McGee v. Wigle*, 11 L.J.N.S. 217.—E.C.—Spragge.

By the constitution of the Reform Association for the east riding of Northumberland, each delegate to the convention was actively to promote the election of the candidate appointed by the convention. The candidate had himself been for six years a member of this organization, and was familiar with its objects and constitution. He had also as a delegate acted for other candidates in the promotion of their election, and expected the like assistance from the present members of the association. No committees were formed, and it was the recognized business of the association to see to the necessary canvass and organization for polling day:—Held, that delegates to the association, and acting as such in promoting the election of the candidate, were his agents, for whose acts he was responsible. *East Northumberland Election Petition—Casey v. Ferris*, 11 L.J.N.S. 328.—E.C.—Gwynne.

In this case the respondent forwarded some books containing names of voters to one J. H., to be put "into good hands to be selected by him for canvassing." Among others, J. H. gave one of the books to B., who was found guilty of corrupt practices, under 32 Vict. c. 21, s. 66, O. Gwynne, J., held, that J. H. was an agent of the respondent, specially authorized to appoint sub-agents, and that under such authority he appointed B. a sub-agent, and that the respondent was responsible for the corrupt practices of B., under the provisions of 36 Vict. c. 2, s. 3, O. *Welland Election Petition—Buchner v. Currie*, 11 L.J.N.S. 273.—E.C.

IV. BRIBERY AND CORRUPT PRACTICES.

1. Treating.

Declaration, for hire of horses and carriages, and provisions furnished. Plea, that the alleged debt was contracted for and on account of spirituous liquors and other refreshments furnished by the plaintiff to defendant and his friends and supporters during a parliamentary election, at which election defendant was a candidate, and for work and services performed, and for provisions and materials provided by plaintiff for defendant as a candidate at and during said parliamentary election, contrary to law and statutes in such case made and provided:—Held, a good plea, under 22 Vict. c. 17, s. 6.—*Mottashed v. Read*, 23 Q.B. 432.

The distribution of liquor on the polling day, with the object of promoting the election of a candidate, will make his election void, under 34 Vict. c. 3. *Grey (South Riding) Election Petition—Hunter v. Lauder*, 8 L.J.N.S. 17.—E.C.—Mowat.

Held, that the furnishing of refreshment to a voter by an agent of a candidate, without the knowledge or consent of the candidate, and against his will, will not be a sufficient ground to set aside an election, if not done corruptly or with intent to influence votes. *East Toronto Election Petition—Rennick v. Cameron*, 8 L.J.N.S. 113.—E.C.—Richards.

Upon questions reserved by the rota Judge under the Controverted Elections Act of 1871, it appeared that H. and B. voted for respondent. H. kept a saloon, which was closed on polling day, but upstairs, in his private residence, he gave beer and whiskey without charge to several of his friends, among whom were friends of both candidates. B., who had no license to sell liquor, sold it at a place near one of the polls to all persons indifferently. This was not done by H. or B. in the interest of either candidate, or to influence the election, B. acting simply for the purpose of gain; and the candidate did not know of or sanction their proceedings:—Held, though with some doubts as to D., that neither H. or B. had committed any corrupt practice within sec. 47 of 34 Vict. c. 3, O., and therefore had not forfeited their votes; for they had not been guilty of bribery or undue influence, and their acts, if illegal and prohibited, were not done "in reference to" the election, which, under sec. 47 of 34 Vict. c. 3, is requisite in order to avoid a vote. *In re Election for the Town of Brockville and the Township of Elizabethtown*, 32 Q.B. 132.

Effect of treating as a corrupt practice considered. *Kingston Election Petition—Stewart v. Macdonald*, 11 L.J.N.S. 19.—E.C.—Richards.

Held, that the receiving of a treat by the respondent during the hours of polling, does not, under sec. 66 of 32 Vict., c. 21, O., which must be construed strictly, either avoid the election or render him liable to any penalty. *North Grey Election Petition—Boardman v. Scott*, 11 L.J.N.S. 242.—E.C.—Gwynne.

Semble, that as to the seller or giver of the treat, the only person liable to the penalty would be the tavern-keeper, as the statute does not authorize two penalties for the same act.—*Id.*

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Held, that if an agent partakes of a treat during the hours of polling, the election is therefore avoided. *South Essex Election Petition—McGee v. Wigle*, 11 L.J.N.S. 247—E.C.—Spragge.

Held, 1. That 32 Vict. c. 21, s. 66, O., is limited in its effect to tavern-keepers, etc., who alone can sell or give liquor so as to avoid the election. Draper, C.J., dissented, holding that s. 66 extends to all persons who sell or give liquor in a tavern. 2. That the words of the section "Municipalities in which the polls are held," and "within the limits of such municipality," are not confined to the municipality in which are held the polls at which the voters, who are treated, are entitled to vote. The prohibition extends to the selling or giving liquor within the limits of any municipality of the riding in which a poll is being held, irrespective of the person to whom the liquor is sold or given. *South Ontario Election Petition—Farwell v. Brown*, 12 L.J.N.S. 216. In appeal.

Held, upon the evidence, that one Peters was properly held not to have been an agent of the petitioner; and that the dinner given by him to forty electors at a distant polling place in the winter, where there was no inn, was not shown to have been corruptly given or accepted, nor was there sufficient evidence that these persons all voted at the election. *North Victoria Election Petition—Cameron v. MacLennan*, 11 L.J.N.S. 163; 37 Q.B. 234.

See *North Middlesex Election Petition—Cameron v. McDougall*.

2. Hiring Rooms.

The candidate is not restricted to his purely personal expenses, but may (if there is no intent thereby to influence voters or to induce others to procure his return) hire rooms for committees and meetings, and employ men to distribute cards and placards, and similar services. *East Toronto Election Petition—Rennick v. Cameron*, 8 L.J.N.S. 113.—E.C.—Richards.

Alleged expenditure of money intended to influence a certain class of voters, viz.: keepers of public houses; hiring of rooms at public houses to hold meetings—effect of, and how far a violation of the law as to bribery. *Kingston Election—Stewart v. Macdonald*, 11 L.J.N.S. 19.—E.C.—Richards.

3. *Hiring Teams.*

Held, 1. That the hiring of teams, etc., is not a "corrupt practice" within the meaning of sec. 3 of the Controverted Election Act, 1873, unless the hiring amounts to bribery. 2. That the words "Act of Parliament of Canada" in that section refer to an Act of the Dominion of Canada. *East Toronto Election Petition—Woodhouse v. O'Donohoe*, 10 L.J.N.S. 19.—E.C.—Richards.

See *Cornwall Election Petition—Bergin v. Macdonald.*

4. *Fraudulent Devices.*

Shortly before the polling day the respondent's agent issued a circular, signed by the President of the Reform Association, the substance of which was that they had ascertained upon undoubted authority that Webb, despairing of election himself, was procuring his friends to vote for Mr. Cochrane. This statement Webb declared to be false. Held, that this was not a "Fraudulent Device" within the meaning of s. 72 of 32 Vic. c. 21, O., to interfere with the free exercise of the franchise of voters. *East Northumberland Election Petition—Casey v. Ferris*, 11 L.J.N.S. 328.—E.C.—Gwynne.

5. *Other Cases of Bribery.*

Semble, per Draper, C.J., contrary to the opinion expressed by Mr. Justice Gwynne, at the trial, that sec. 66 of 32 Vic. c. 21, O., must be construed distributively, and that under it the penalty may be inflicted (1) on a tavern-keeper, etc., who does not keep his tavern closed during the hours of polling, and (2) on any person, whether a tavern-keeper, etc., or not, who sells or gives drink to another within the time and place specified. *Lincoln Election Petition—Rykert v. Neelon*, 2 L.J.N.S. 161.—E. & A.

The payment of a voter's expenses in going to the poll is illegal, as such, even though the payment may not have been intended as a bribe. *Ib.*

A candidate in good faith intended that his election should be conducted in accordance both with the letter and spirit of the law; and he subscribed and paid no money, except for printing. Money, however, was given by friends of the candidate, to different persons

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for election purposes, who kept no accounts or vouchers of what they paid: Held, that bribery would not be inferred against the candidate, who neither knew nor desired such a state of things, from the omission of these subordinate agents to keep an account of their expenditure, especially as the law is new, and contains no provision similar to the Imperial statute, which required a detailed statement of expenditure to be furnished to the returning officer. But it is always more satisfactory to have the expenditure shewn by proper vouchers; and if money is paid to voters for distributing cards, or for teams, or for refreshments, this will be open to attack, and judges will be less inclined, as the law becomes known, to take a favorable view of conduct that they may bear two constructions, one favorable to the candidate and the other unfavorable. *East Toronto Election Petition—Rennick v. Cameron*, 8 L.J.N.S. 113—E.C.—Richards.

Rule when there appears to have been general corruption, or isolated cases of bribery.—Money given to sub-agents to expend without accompanying directions.—Colorable purchases.—Colorable charity and liberality.—Loans of money.—Hiring conveyances to take voters to poll. *Cornwall Election Petition—Bergin v. Macdonald*, 10 L.J.N.S. 313.—E.C.—Spragge.

Remarks as to subscriptions to churches and charities given a short time before the election. *Re South Huron Election Case—Ritchie v. Cameron*, 24 C.P. 488.

The Court decided, in the present state of the law, the election having taken place in January, 1874, to exclude enquiry as to the payment of travelling expenses of persons going to and returning from the poll, inasmuch as the same might amount to bribery. *North Victoria Election Petition—Cameron (v. Maclellan)*, 10 L.J.N.S. 217.—Richards, Spragge, Hagarty.

On a petitioner claiming the seat on a scrutiny, the Court declined on a preliminary objection to strike out a clause in the petition, which claimed that the votes of persons guilty of bribery, treating and undue influence, should be struck off the poll. The giver of a bribe, as well as the receiver, may be indicted for bribery; but quære, as to the effect on their votes respectively under the present state of the law. *Ib.*

Acts legitimate in themselves done with mixed legitimate and illegitimate motives ; expenditure reasonable or otherwise, according to attendant circumstances. *Kingston Election Petition—Stewart v. Macdonald*, 11 L.J.N.S.—E.C.—Richards.

The English and Dominion Election Acts as to corrupt practices and their consequences compared and considered. *Ib.*

The respondent said to the wife of a voter that if she would do what she could to prevent her husband from voting, he would give her a "nice present"—Held, that this was a promise of a valuable consideration, within the meaning of 32 Vict. c. 21, s. 67. O. *Halton Election Petition—Harris v. Barber*, 11 L.J.N.S. 273.—E.C.—Gwynne.

One M. a carter, who voted for respondent at the request of P. the respondent's agent, carried a voter five or six miles to the polling place, saying that he would do so without charge. Some days after the election P. gave M. \$2, intending it as compensation for such carriage, but M. thought it was in payment for work which he had done for P. as a carter. The candidate knew nothing of the matter :—Held, that there was properly no payment by P. to M. for any purpose, the money being given for one purpose and received for another ; but if there had it had been made after P.'s agency had ceased, and there was no previous hiring or promise to pay, to which it could relate back. If such payment had been established as a corrupt practice, it would have avoided P.'s vote, but not M.'s ; and it would not have defeated the election, for it was not found to have been committed with the knowledge or consent of the candidate, but the contrary. *In re the Election for the Town of Brockville and the Township of Elizabethtown*, 32 Q. B. 132.

6. Undue Influence.

Appeal from a decision of Mr. Justice Wilson avoiding the election and disqualifying the respondent. Both the respondent and his opponent claimed to be supporters of the ministry of the day ; but the respondent was the recognized ministerial candidate, and claimed that his opponent, having originally pledged himself to support him, and then came out in opposition, could not expect to retain the confidence of the Government, and that, as the minis-

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terial candidate, whether elected or not, according to his ideas of constitutional practice, the patronage in the constituency would be in his hands. There was a grievance in the riding that strangers were sent up to superintend the work on the roads, and the respondent was reported to have stated at a public meeting that he would endeavor to get the evil remedied, and that "he would have the patronage, as he was the choice of the Government—he would have it whether elected or not elected;" adding by way of explanation, "It was the laying out of money on the roads and appointment of overseers." The judge who tried the case held (1) that such language did not amount to an offer or promise of any place or employment, or a promise to procure or to endeavor to procure, any place or employment to or for any voter or other person, within the 1st sec. of 36 Vict. c. 2, O.; but he held (2) that it amounted to undue influence within the 72 sec. of 32 Vict. c. 21, O., or according to the common law:—Held, that the first finding of the learned judge was correct, but that the second was incorrect. *Muskoka Election Petition—Miller v. Starratt*, 12 L.J.N.S. 109.—C.A.

V. RIOTS AND ASSAULTS.

Under the statute for repressing riots at elections no power is given to magistrates to convict summarily. The offenders must be tried by a jury.—*Ferguson v. Adams, et al*, 5 Q. B. 194.

Sec. 60 of the 32 Vict. c. 21, O., enacts that "every person convicted" of a battery committed during any part of the days whereon "any election is to be held, within two miles of the place where such election is to be held, &c., shall incur a penalty of \$50." By s. 77, all penalties imposed by the Act shall be recoverable by any person who will sue for the same by action of debt or information in any court having competent jurisdiction. And it shall be sufficient for the plaintiff in any such action or suit to state in the declaration that the defendant is indebted to him in the sum of money thereby demanded, and to allege the particular offence for which the action is brought, and that the defendant has acted contrary to the Act. It was held, in the County Court, that the words, "every person convicted," &c., did not mean who had been convicted in some criminal proceedings, but that the offence might be proved, and the person "convicted," in this action. On appeal,

Wilson, J., was of opinion that the judgment below was right, Morrison, J., that it was wrong. The appeal therefore was dismissed. *Wild v. Brown*, 37, Q. 504.

VI. PERSONAL DISQUALIFICATION OF MEMBERS.

1. For Acts of Agents.

The respondent entrusted about \$700 to an agent for election purposes without having supervised the expenditure:—Held, that this did not make him personally a party within 34 Vict. c. 3, s. 46, O., to every illegal application of the money by the agent, or by those who received money from him. But, if a very excessive sum had been so entrusted to the agent, the argument of a corrupt purpose might have been reasonable. *South Grey Election Petition—Hunter v. Lauder*, 8 L.J.N.S. 17.—E.C.—Mowat.

The evidence showed that very extensive bribery and corruption was practised by a very large number of persons, and that immense sums of money were expended by the agents of the successful candidate, but not personal acts of corruption were proved against him, and he denied all knowledge of these acts, though he made a very diligent personal canvass. Quare, whether it must not be presumed that he was cognizant of the acts of his agents and consenting thereto. *London Election Petition—Pritchard v. Walker*, 10 L.J.N.S. 281.—E.C.—Hagarty.

Quare, also, as to whether under sec. 18 of 36 Vict. c. 27, D., nothing but such personal bribery as would disqualify the candidate would avoid his election, or whether his disqualification was not a necessary consequence of the loss of his seat by corrupt acts on the part of his agents. *Ib.*

In the last case, on appeal from the judgment of the presiding judge at the trial:—Held, that the circumstantial evidence, as set out in the report of this case, was sufficient to show that corrupt practices were committed by the agents of the respondent, and with his knowledge and consent, notwithstanding his disclaimer on oath. *Re London Election Case—Pritchard v. Walker and Walker v. Pritchard*, 24 C.P. 424.

It is sufficient to show the candidate's knowledge of and assent to the fact that his agents were using bribery to procure his election, without connecting him with any particular act of bribery; and his assent must be assumed from his non-interference or objection when he has the opportunity. Semble, that wilful intentional ignorance is the same as actual knowledge. *Ib.*

Appeal from the judgment of Mr. Justice Gwynne, avoiding the election and disqualifying the respondent. His decision sustained as to the complicity of the respondent in the "Stewart case," the particulars of which are set out in the report, but otherwise as to the "Sunday raid," his knowledge and consent to the corrupt acts of his agents:—Held, not proven, the circumstances not being inconsistent with his innocence. *Lincoln Election Petition—Rykert v. Neelon*, 12 L.J.N.S. 161.—C.A.

The question discussed as to how far or when a candidate is to be assumed to be aware of and impliedly consenting to corrupt acts done by his agents, of which in the natural course of things he can scarcely be ignorant, or of which he wilfully avoids any knowledge. *Ib.*

A petition was filed by one Bergin, the unsuccessful candidate, against the return of the respondent in January 1874, on the usual grounds. This election was avoided on the ground of the corrupt acts of respondent's agents. But the chancellor reported to the Speaker of the House of Commons that these acts had been committed without the knowledge and consent of respondent. A new writ was issued, and the same persons were again candidates when respondent was again elected. The present petition was filed by electors claiming the seat for B., charging corruption against respondent and his agents at the second election, and also that persons guilty of corrupt practices at the first election could not vote at second election, because the two elections were one in law. The petitioners also claimed that respondent was ineligible by reason of the acts of his agents at the first election, and that public notice had been given of such disqualification, and that Bergin should be seated, although respondent had the majority of votes: Held, 1. That the two elections were one in law. 2. That the evidence may be given by petitioners in a petition attacking the election, of corrupt practices by agents of respondents at the previous election, and if these corrupt acts are proved on the second

trial, the votes of persons guilty of corrupt practices at the first election are void if polled at second election, and must be struck out. This also applies to the unsuccessful candidate. 3. But the mere fact of persons being "reported" to the speaker as guilty of corrupt practices at the first election does not require the disallowance of their votes at the second election. 4. The respondent is not ineligible at a second election because his first election was set aside on account of corrupt practices by his agents without his knowledge or consent. 5. Held, following the judgment of the Court of Common Pleas in the London case, and that of the Chief Justice of Ontario in the Kingston case, that a candidate is not disqualified by the corrupt acts of his agents under sec. 18 of the Act of 1873, without his knowledge or consent. 6. It is not material that the two elections were held under different Acts of Parliament. 7. The difference between the "adjudication" of the judge and his "report" to the Speaker discussed and explained. *Cornwall Election Petition—Bergin v. Macdonald*, 11 L.J.N.S. 81.—E.C.—Spragge.

2. Evidence.

Held, that the writ of election and return need not be produced or proved before any evidence of the election is given. *Stormont Election Petition*, 7 L.J.N.S. 213.—E.C.—Richards.

On a scrutiny the practice in the English cases is for the person in the minority to first place himself in a majority, and then the person thus placed in a minority to strike off his opponent's votes; and the same practice followed in this case. *Ib.*

The name of a voter being on the poll-book, if prima facie evidence of his right to vote. The party attacking the vote may either call the voter or offer any other evidence he has on the subject. *Ib.*

When all the accounts and records of an election are intentionally destroyed by the respondent's agent, even if the case be stripped of all other circumstances, the strongest conclusions will be drawn against the respondent, and every presumption will be made against the legality of the acts concealed by such conduct. *South Grey Election Petition—Hunter v. Lauder*, 8 L.J.N.S. 17.—E.C.—Mowat.

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Where a charge of bribery is only the unaccepted offer of a bribe, the evidence must be more exact than that required to prove a bribe actually given or accepted. *Ib.*

The total expenditure proved was \$610, and the number of votes on the roll was 4,669:—Held, that the expenditure was not excessive. Various acts of alleged bribery discussed; and—Held, that the evidence was not sufficient. The language of Martin B., in the Wingham case (1 O.M. & H. 192), adopted as a general rule applicable to this case. *East Toronto Election Petition—Rennick v. Cameron*, 8 L.J.N.S. 113.—E.C.—Richards.

The respondent was charged with several acts of corrupt practice. As to four of them, the judge took time to consider, and subsequently found three proved. Each separate charge was supported by only one witness, and each was separately denied or explained away by the respondent. There was no corroborative testimony on either side. The judge below thought that if each case stood by itself, oath against oath, each person equally credible, there being collateral or accompanying circumstances either way, he should hold the charge not to be proved; but as the charges were severally sworn to by a credible witness, the united weight of their testimony overcame the effect of the respondent's oath; and he felt compelled to attach such a degree of importance to the combined testimony of these witnesses as to hold that the charges to which they severally spoke were sufficiently proved in law as against the opposing testimony of the respondent:—Held, that this view could not be sustained, and the appeal was allowed. *Muskoka Election Petition—Miller v. Starrett*, 15 L.J.N.S. 193—C.A.

Re London Election Petition—Pritchard v. Walker.

3. Other Cases.

How far disqualification in the nature of a penalty, considered. The penalty imposed by the Act of 1873 is not merely that which attaches to locality, but to the person of the candidate, it is to be construed with the strictness of a penal statute. Meaning of the words "directly and indirectly," and "by himself or by any other person on his behalf." *Kingston Election Petition—Stewart v. Macdonald*, 11 L.J.N.S. 19—E.C.—Richards.

After the nomination of the candidates in a rural constituency, and on another occasion after a meeting assembled "for the purpose of promoting the election of a candidate," the electors dispersed to various taverns, mostly to where their vehicles were put up, and then, according to their usual custom, treated each other before starting. The respondent himself partook of a treat:—Held, that this was not a contravention of 36 Vict. c. 2, s. 2, O., and that the respondent was not disqualified under sec. 3, sub-sec. 2 of the same Act. *North Middlesex Election Petition—Cameron v. McDougall*, 12 L.J.N.S. 14—E.C.—Spragge.

Treating per se is not, except when made so by statute, a corrupt act, but the intent of the party treating may make it so, and this intent must be gathered from the circumstances attending it. Where, therefore, it was sought to disqualify a candidate who had treated during his canvass, though to a much less extent than was his habit previously, and who did not seem to have treated for the purpose of ingratiating himself with the public:—Held, that such treating was not a corrupt act. *Ib.*

See *Muskoka Election Petition—Miller v. Starrett*

VII. BALLOT PAPERS.

Mode of marking ballot papers, and as to where the mark or cross may be placed, and various irregular modes of making the marks considered. *North Victoria Election Petition—Cameron v. MacLennan*, 11 L.J.N.S. 163—E.C.—Wilson.

The neglect or irregularities of a returning officer in his duties under the Act will not invalidate an election, unless they have or might have caused some substantial injustice in the way of effecting the election:—Held, therefore, that the neglect of a returning officer to initial the ballot papers, and to provide pen and ink instead of pencil to mark them, would not void the election. *Monck Election Petition—Grant v. McCallum*, 12 L.J.N.S. 113—E.C.—Blake.

The following irregularities in the mode of marking ballot papers—Held to be fatal: 1. Making a stroke instead of a cross:

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2. any mark which contains in itself a means of identifying the voter, such as his initials or some mark known as being one used by him; 3. crosses made at left of name, or not to right of the name; 4. two single strokes not crossing. *Ib.*

The following irregularities—Held not to be fatal: 1. An irregular mark in the nature of a cross, so long as it does not lose the form of a cross; 2. a cross not in the proper compartment of the ballot paper, but still to the right of the candidate's name; 3. a cross with a line before it; 4. a cross rightly placed with two additional crosses, one across the other candidate's name, and the other to the left; 5. a cross in the right place on the back of the ballot paper; 6. a double cross or two crosses; 7. ballot papers inadvertently torn; 8. inadvertent mark in addition to the cross; 9. cross made with pen and ink instead of pencil. *Ib.*

VIII. PRACTICE ON TRIAL OF CONTROVERTED ELECTIONS.

1. *Before the Acts of 1871 and 1873.*

[*The 20 Vic., c. 23*; "*An Act to improve the mode of obtaining evidence in case of controverted elections*" was repealed by *22 Vic., c. 11.*]

Semble, a returning officer, whose conduct has been impeached, is not entitled to his expenses as a witness before a committee of the House of Commons, although he was summoned to attend by the Speaker's warrant, in the same manner as other witnesses. *Blacklock v McMartin, Tay, 320.*

As to the form of declaration under 4 Geo. IV. c. 4, sec. 35, to recover the costs incurred by a member of parliament in opposing a petition against his return. *Smith v. Rourke, 6 O. S. 307.*

Held, on appeal, reversing the judgment of the Queen's Bench, that commissioner for taking evidence in a contested election, under 20 Vict. c. 23, s. 6, might maintain an action for his fees, and was not restricted to the remedy given under the recognizance:—Held, also, that all those who had petitioned against the return and took an active part in the case before him, were liable, not the person only on whose written request the evidence was taken. *Burritt v. Hamilton, 18 Q. B. 461; 17 Q. B. 443.*

The 20 Vict. c. 23, did not extend to elections for the legislative council. Where county court judge, assuming that it did so extend, acted at defendant's request as commissioner for taking evidence in a contested election for that body:—Held, that he could recover nothing for his services. *Burritt v. Jones*, 19 Q B. 194.

A judge of a county court in a legislative council electoral division, had authority where the election for the division is contested, to take evidence under 20 Vict. c. 23. *In re the Contested Election of the Electoral Division of Tecumseh*, 4 L. J. 283; *S.U.*, 1b. 284.—C.C.—Cooper, Burritt.

It is not essential to the due notice of the service made necessary by sec. 1 of the statute 20 Vict. c. 23, that it should be made in the manner prescribed by that Act. Where, therefore, the sitting member removed himself and his family so as to avoid a personal service, and continued absent or concealed for fourteen days allowed by the statute for a personal service or services at his residence upon a grown-up person of his family, service by nailing a copy of the notice on the door of his residence, and by leaving a copy with his brother, who was also his agent, was held sufficient. *In re Essex Election*—4 L. J. 70.—C.C.—Chewett. See *S.C.*, 4 L. J., 161.

2. Petitioners.

Held, that a candidate may be a petitioner, although his property qualification be defective, if it was not demanded of him at the time of his election. If he claim the seat, his want of qualification may be urged against his being seated, but he may still show that the respondent was not duly elected, if he so charge in his petition. *North Victoria Election Petition. Cameron v. MacLennan*, 10 L.J.N.S. 217.—E.C.—Richards, Spragge, Hagarty.

A duly qualified voter is not debarred from being a petitioner on the ground that he has been guilty of bribery, treating, or undue influence during the election. Disqualification from such acts on the part of a voter or candidate arise after he has been found guilty, and there is no relation back. *North Simcoe Election Petition—Edwards v. Cook*, 10 L.J.N.S. 232.—E.C.—Richards.

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3. Particulars.

Where particulars of alleged corrupt practices, &c., have been delivered under an order for that purpose, better particulars will not be ordered if those delivered substantially comply with the spirit of the order by giving all reasonable information. Nor will better particulars be ordered even when the order is not complied with in furnishing certain details, provided the judge to whom the application is made thinks these details unnecessary or unreasonable, nor unless the respondent can show on affidavit that the want of such information will prejudice him in his defence. *West Toronto Election Petition—Armstrong v. Crooks*, 5 P.R. 436.—*Richards, Hagarty, Morrison, Mowat.*

Semble, that the powers of the judge at the trial, as to amendment of the petition and particulars and postponement of the trial, should be liberally exercised, so as to prevent a failure of justice to either party.

The petition in this case stated that M. was returned by a majority of ten votes; that persons not qualified to vote had voted for him; that good votes for his opponent (H.) were tendered and rejected; that ballots improperly marked were received and counted for M.; and that M. and his agents were guilty of corrupt practices:—Held, on a summons asking for particulars (1) of the persons not qualified to vote, and the grounds of disqualification; (2) of the votes tendered for H.; (3) of the counterfoils and ballots for H. improperly rejected; (4) of the counterfoils and ballots for M. improperly received, and the names of the voters so rejected or received; (5) of the corrupt practices by respondent and his agents that particulars should not be ordered as asked in the first, third and fourth clauses of the summons. As to the fifth clause, the order followed that in *Beal v. Smith*, 4 L.R.C.P. 145. *West Elgin Election Petition—Cascaden v. Munroe*, 11 L.J.N.S. 160.—*E. & A.—Draper.*

4. Security.

Held, 1. That upon a petition against two members, under the 36 Vict. c. 28, D., only the same security in amount need be given as upon a petition against one; 2. That the place where it was taken need not be shewn on the face of the recognizance; 3. That

a practising attorney may be a surety; 4. That a county magistrate can take the recognizance in a city which has a police magistrate, if within his county. *Re Hamilton Election Petition*, 10 L.J.N.S. 170—C.L. Chamb.—Dalton, C. C. & P.

The recognizance filed in this case was in the usual form, but was not signed as directed by rule 24 of the general rule of the election court:—Held, that the recognizance was nevertheless valid. *Niagara Election Petition—Black et al v. Plumb*, 10 L.J.N.S. 249.—E. C. Dalton, C. C. & P.—Richards.

One thousand dollars, the deposit required to be paid in on filing Dominion election petitions, was handed to the clerk of the election court, that clerk being also clerk of the Queen's Bench. The latter court, no petition having been filed in it, refused an order to pay the money out. *Re Kingston Petition*, Q. B. E. T. 1877. not yet reported.

5. *Costs.*

Where bribery by an agent is proved, costs follow the event, even though personal charges made against the respondent have not been proved, there having been no additional expense occasioned to the respondent by such personal charges.—*South Guy Election Petition—Hunter v. Lauder*, 8 L.J.N.S. 17.—Mowat.

Costs should follow the event, although the personal charges against the respondent fail, unless put in wantonly, or unless the expense of the trial has been thereby increased. *Cornwall Election Petition—Bergin v. Macdonald*, 10 L.J.N.S. 313.—E. C.—Sprague.

It is not a champertuous transaction that an association of persons with whom the petitioner was politically allied, agreed to pay the costs of the petition. Even if the agreement were champertuous, that would not be a sufficient reason to stay the proceedings on the petition. *North Simcoe Election Petition—Edwards v. Cook*, 10 L.J.N.S.—E. C.—Richards.

The respondent sought to establish, on an enquiry under a preliminary objection, that the petitioner (the opposing candidate) had been guilty of bribery, and was therefore disqualified as such. The enquiry was not concluded, as, during its pendency the court

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held that bribery would not disqualify a petitioner, but so far as the evidence went, it did not show bribery by the petitioner:—Held, that the general rule as to costs should prevail, and that the respondent should pay the costs of the enquiry as well as the general costs of the cause. *South Kenfree Petition—Bannerman v. McDougall*. 10 L.J.N.S. 286.—E.C.—Spragge.

The learned judge at the trial declined to decide what witness fees should be paid by the respondent, thinking it to be the province of the taxing master on taxation, after hearing both parties, to decide what witnesses to allow or to disallow, as in ordinary cases. *Niagara Election Petition—Black v. Plumb*, 10 L.J.N.S. 317.—E.C.—Hagarty.

In trials under the Controverted Elections Act of 1871, the costs and witness fees, and the materiality of evidence, are in the discretion of the master, subject to the court, as in other trials. The master will generally be the sole judge as to how many witnesses should be allowed for as to one issue. So, where the master allowed fees to seventy witnesses subpoenaed, but not called, on charges of bribery by the petitioner, the election having been avoided on the evidence of other witnesses:—Held, that the master exercised a proper discretion, even though respondent's attorney swore he believed the witnesses would have disproved the charges they were called to prove; the facts, that each witness was subpoenaed to prove, appearing on the petitioner's brief put in before the master, and it appearing also by affidavit that the witnesses were subpoenaed bona fide, and were material. *Prescott Election Petition—McKenzie et al v. Hamilton*, 32 Q. B. 303.

There is no presumption in a trial under the Controverted Elections Act of 1871, arising from the number of witnesses subpoenaed, that they are unnecessarily called. The presumption is to the contrary. *Ib.*

At the trial of an election petition, and on appeal from the judgment, the petitioner, a barrister, appeared in person, but was assisted by a junior counsel. On taxation, the petition having been dismissed, counsel fees were charged, to the first counsel at the trial \$300, and to second counsel \$150; and on argument of the appeal, the first counsel \$150; second counsel \$100. The master disallowed fees to the first counsel, but allowed \$200 to the second

counsel at the trial, and the \$100 on appeal; there being no affidavit of payment or receipts for such fees, though it was called for and insisted upon for the respondent. On an application for revision:—Held, 1. That the fees should not, under the circumstances, have been allowed without proof of payment; 2. That no more than \$150 should have been taxed for the second counsel at the trial. A revision was therefore ordered, with an intimation that the \$150 and \$100 might be allowed on satisfactory proof of payment. *Re North Victoria Election Petition—Cameron v. MacLennan*, 39, Q.B. 147.

On the trial of an election petition against the return of a member of the Local Legislature, which resulted in favor of the petitioner, to whom the costs were awarded, the defendant was retained by an association for prosecuting the petition, and acted as petitioner's attorney, and M., one of the plaintiffs, a firm of attorneys as well as barristers, acted as petitioner's senior counsel, under an agreement to that effect with defendant, neither he nor his firm being retained by petitioner. The petitioner's costs were settled by defendant and respondent's attorney, and defendant received \$1,600, including \$365 counsel fees to M., which M. proved became the property of his firm. The plaintiffs having brought an action against the defendant to recover these counsel fees as money had and received to their use:—Held, that they could not recover, for that the costs, including these fees, belonged to the petitioner, and not to defendant as attorney. *Miller et al v. McCarthy*, 27 C.P. 147.

The learned judge who tried an election case, having set aside the election for bribery by agents, but found that the candidate was not himself guilty of corrupt practices, the court, on appeal, declined, under the evidence set out in the case to interfere; but the appeal was dismissed with costs, as there were strong grounds for presenting it, and had the finding been otherwise, it would not have been disturbed. *South Huron Election Case, Ritchie v. Cameron*, 24 C.P. 488.

6. Judges' Report.

The effect of section 20 of the Controverted Elections Act of 1873, as to the report of election judges to the Speaker considered. *North Victoria Election—Cameron v. MacLennan*, 10 L.J.N.S. 217—E.C.—Richards, Sprague, Hagarty.

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The judges' report to the Speaker as to those persons "other than the candidate," who have been proved guilty of corrupt practices, is not conclusive, so as to bring them within 34 Vict. c. 3, s. 49, and so liable to penal consequences. *South Oxford Election Petition—Hopkins v. Oliver*. 11 L.J.N.S. 161.—E. & A.—Draper.

See *Cornwall Election Petition—Bergin v. Macdonald*.

7. Other Cases.

A question being raised in this case as to the sufficiency of the notice of objection, that the voter was not actually and bona fide the owner, tenant or occupant of real property within the meaning of section 5 of the Election Law of 1868, the learned chief justice remarked, "The respondent's counsel does not say that he is prejudiced by the way in which the objection is taken. If he had, I would postpone the consideration of the case. It is objected that the case of O.B. should be subject to the same rule, and if the question had been presented to me in that view, I think I should have felt at liberty to go into the case, giving time to the petitioner to make further enquiries if he thought proper."—*Stormont Election Petition*, 2 L.J.N.S. 213.—E.C.—Richards.

Held, that the writ of election and return need not be produced or proved before any evidence of the election is given. On a scrutiny, the practice in English cases is for the person in a minority to first place himself in a majority, and then the person thus placed in a minority to strike off his opponent's votes; and the same practice was followed in this case. The name of a voter being on the poll-book is prima facie evidence of his right to vote. The party attacking the vote may either call the voter, or offer any other evidence he has on the subject. *Stormont Election Petition*, 7 L.J.N.S. 213.—E.C.—Richards.

When a rule of court has been granted in pursuance of 34 Vic. c. 3 s. 14, O., appointing a place for the trial, not within the division, the election for which is in question, the judge by whom the petition is being tried has no power to adjourn for the further hearing of the cause, from the place named in the rule of court to a place within such division. *South Grey Election Petition—Hunter v. Lauder*, 8 L.J.N.S. 17.—E.C.—Mowat.

Held, that the twenty-one days limited for the filing an election petition after the return of the writ, are to be reckoned from the time of receipt of the return of the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery and not from the time of mailing by the returning officer. Good Friday and Easter Monday are holidays within the meaning of the Act, and they are not to be reckoned in computing the twenty-one days. The joint effect of the 32 Vic. c. 21, O., and the Ontario Interpretation Act, 31 Vic. c. 1, s. 7, sub-sec. 13, is, that when the word "holidays" is used, it includes the above days as "set apart by Act of the Legislature." *West Toronto Election Petition—Armstrong v. Crooks*, 5 P.R. 394.—C. L. Chamb.—Hagarty.

The Interpretation Act of Ontario, 31 Vic. c. 1, s. 6, and sub-sec. 13, enacts that in constructing it, or any Act of Ontario, certain days specified, including Good Friday and Easter Monday, shall be included in the word holiday; and the Controverted Elections Act of 1871, sec. 52, enacts that in reckoning time for the purpose of that Act any day set apart by any Act of Ontario for a public holiday shall be excluded:—Held, that the effect of the Interpretation Act alone, was to make the days mentioned in it holidays; and if it were not so, that when the other statute used the word holiday, such days would by virtue of the Interpretation Act be included in it:—Held, therefore, that in reckoning the twenty-one days after the return allowed for presentation of a petition, Good Friday and Easter Monday must be excluded. The decision in chambers in this matter, 5 P.R. 394 affirmed as regards the computation of time. *Re Election for the West Riding of Toronto*, 31 Q.B. 409.

The word "treating" refused to be struck out of the petition though not specifically prohibited by the Act. *West Toronto Election Petition—Armstrong v. Crooks*, 5 P.R. 394.—C. L. Chamb.—Hagarty.

The trial of an election petition should not be postponed without the applicant showing very cogent and almost unanswerable grounds. In this case the reason given was that the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario was a necessary and material witness, and that he could not properly leave Toronto during the sittings of the House of Assembly:—Held, not a sufficient reason. *Glengarry Election Petition—McDonald v. McNab*, 12 L.J.N.S. 117.—E.C.—A. Wilson.

Held, that application to postpone a trial allowed by 38 Vict. c. 10, s. 2, is confined to that part of the enactment relating to the proceeding of the trial *de die in diem* after it has commenced. *Id.*

The 38 Vict. c. 10, s. 2, D., enacts, "The trial of every election petition shall be commenced within six months from the time when such petition has been presented, and shall be proceeded with *de die in diem*, until the trial is over, unless on application supported by affidavit it be shewn that the requirements of justice render it necessary that a postponement of the case should take place." The petition here was filed on the 12th Dec. 1874, Hijary and Easter terms, and the session of parliament took up three months and eleven days, so that under the Act the six months would not expire until the 21st Sept. 1875. The trial having been fixed for 10th of Aug., the respondent's attorney consented without prejudice, to adjournment, and on the 30th July an order was made postponing the trial until a judge should be able to attend. On the 22nd Dec. 1875, the trial was fixed for the 18th Jan. 1876, and afterwards by consent postponed till 2nd Feb.:—Held, that the trial need not be commenced within six months in order to authorize a postponement, but that the commencement may be postponed beyond that time. The Glengarry election, 12 L.J.N.S. 717, not followed. But, under the facts more fully stated in the report, it was held that the long delay was not warranted, and all further proceedings stayed. *In re the Election for the Electoral Division of Addington—Waggoner v. Shibley*, 39 Q. B. 131.

Quære, where, under 37 Vict. c. 3. s. 20. O., the judge has power, before the close of the case, to reserve questions for the court. *In re the Election for the Town of Brockville and the Township of Elizabethtown*, 32 Q. B. 132.

Held, that the judge had power to amend the petition by allowing the insertion of an objection to the roll used. *In re the Election for the Electoral Division of the County of Monck*, 32 Q. B. 147.

Held, that the Dominion Election Act of 1874 does not affect the rights of parties in pending proceedings, which must be decided according to the law as it existed before the passing of that Act: sec. 20 of that Act referring to candidates at some future election. *North Victoria Election Petition—Cameron v. MacLennan*, 10 L.J.N.S. 217.—E.C.—Richards, Spragge, Hagarty.

A petitioner claiming the seat on a scrutiny may shew, as to votes polled for his opponent: 1. That the voter was not twenty-one years of age; 2. that he was not a subject of Her Majesty by birth or naturalization; 3. that he was otherwise by law prevented from voting; and, 4. that he was not actually and bona fide the owner, tenant or occupant of the real property in respect of which he is assessed. *Ib.*

The petition, besides charging the respondent with various corrupt acts, charged an agent of his with similar acts, and claimed that the agent was subject to the same disqualifications and penalties as a candidate. The prayer of the petition asked that this agent might be made a party to the petition, and that he might be subjected to such disqualification and penalties:—Heid, 1. that there is no authority in the Election Acts or elsewhere for making an agent of a candidate a defendant in a petition on a charge of personal misconduct on his part; 2. there is no authority given to the Election Court or the judges, to subject a person "other than a candidate" to such disqualifications.—*South Oxford Election Petition—Hopkins v. Oliver*, 11 L.J.N.S. 161.—Chamb.—Draper.

Appellate Courts will not, except under special circumstances, interfere with the finding as to questions of fact depending on the veracity and credit of witnesses. *Halton Election Petition—Harris v. Barber*, 11 L.J.N.S. 273.—E. & A.

"The Dominion Controverted Elections Act, 1874," 37 Vict. c. 10, repealed "The Controverted Elections Acts, 1873," 36 Vict. c. 28, under which the Election Court existed, except as respected elections held before the passing of the Act, and directed all elections in future to be tried in this court. The petitioner, on the 6th of February, 1875, filed his petition under the last Act, but intitled "In the Election Court," the notice of filing and of the deposit and other papers being intitled in the same court, and delivered it to the clerk of the Crown, who was the clerk both of the Election Court and of this court. Afterwards, on the 28th August, an order was made setting aside the notice of trial given, intitled in this court, on the ground that no petition was filed in this court; and by a rule of the Election Court the petition was taken off the files of that court on the ground that the court had no jurisdiction to try a petition under the Act of 1874. The petitioner then, on the 20th November, 1876, applied to this court to fix a day for the trial,

which was refused; for 1. There was no petition in this court: and 2. if it had been at first well filed, the trial was not commenced within six months from its presentation, and no application made within the time to postpone. *Kingston Election—Stewart v. Macdonald*, 39 Q.B. 139.

IX. RESIGNATION OF MEMBERS.

Secs. 10 & 12 of 32 Vict., c. 4, O., provide that a member may resign, 1. By giving notice in his place of his intention; 2. by delivering to the Speaker a declaration of such intention, either during a session or in the interval between two sessions; or 3. by delivering it to any two members, in case there is no Speaker. and the resignation is made in the interval between two sessions:—Held, to mean only an interval between two sessions of the same assembly, and not to apply to the interval between the last general election and the election of a Speaker. Sec. 13 provides for a new election in case of a vacancy happening by the death of any member, or by his accepting any office, or by his becoming a party to any contract, as mentioned in the third section. And s. 14, for the case of a vacancy arising subsequently to a general election, and before the first meeting of assembly thereafter, "by reason of the death or other of the cause aforesaid":—Held, that the "other of the causes aforesaid," were the two other causes besides death mentioned in s. 13; and that a voluntary resignation, therefore, did not create a vacancy within s. 14. *In re the Election for the West Riding of Durham*, 31 Q.B. 404.

X. MISCELLANEOUS CASES.

Held, that the printing of hand-bills by which a person announced himself a candidate for election to the Legislative Council was a contract relating to a parliamentary election within the 23 Vic. c. 17, and that such printing was a lawful debt and might lawfully be paid without incurring the penalty of that statute; but such payment could not be enforced at law, the 6th section of the Act rendering it a void contract at law. *Luke et al v. Perry*, 12 C.P. 424.

[This Act is repealed as to Ontario by 32 Vic. c. 21, s. 1, O.]

The Common Law of England relating to Parliamentary Elections is in force in this Province. *Cornwall Election Petition—Bergin v. Macdonald*, 10 L. J. N. S. 313.—E. C.—Spragge.

Seemle, that a returning officer is both a ministerial and judicial officer. *Bannerman v. McDougall*, 11 L. J. N. S. 47.—E. C.—A. Wilson.

Quere, as to whether an action for parliamentary and departmental printing would lie against the Postmaster-General, and the propriety of asking the courts to pass an opinion. *Taylor v. Campbell*, 33 R. B. 264.

CONTROVERTED ELECTIONS ON APPEAL BEFORE THE SUPREME COURT OF CANADA.

Valin v. Langlois. (Controverted Election of the County of Montmorency.)

In this case it was held that "the Dominion Controverted Elections Act 1874" is not *ultra vires* of the Dominion Parliament, and that the Judges of the Provincial Courts were bound to discharge the duties assigned to them by that Act. Mr. Valin petitioned for leave to appeal to the Privy Council; the petition was rejected and the decision of the Supreme Court affirmed. The case was remitted to the Superior Court to be tried on the merits, and Mr. Valin having consented to vacate the seat on the charge of bribery and corruption by agents, the election was declared void on the 14th January, 1880, by Meredith, C. J.

In a second appeal arising out of a cross petition filed by Mr. Valin against Mr. Langlois, who was the unsuccessful candidate, it was held that Mr. Valin's cross petition, which was not filed within thirty days after the publication in the *Canada Gazette* of the return to the writ of election by the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, but within fifteen days after the service of the petition upon Mr. Valin, was too late, on the ground that the delay mentioned in the last part of sub-sec. 2 of sec. 8 of the Dominion Controverted Elections Act, 1874, is not given to file a cross petition against a person who was a candidate and is a petitioner against the return of the sitting member.

Wheeler v. Gibbs. (Controverted Election of the County of North Ontario.)

In this case Mr. Justice Armour, who tried the merits of the petition, declared the election void, finding that corrupt practices had been committed by Mr. Wheeler and by his agents. Mr. Wheeler appealed from this judgment, but limited his appeal to the finding of the Judge with respect to the charge of personal bribery. The notice in writing, required by sec. 48 of the Supreme and Exchequer Court, that the appeal had been set down for hearing was not given within three days after the Registrar of the Court had set down the appeal for hearing, and it was held that this provision in the statute was imperative and that the giving of such notice was a condition precedent to the exercise of any jurisdiction by the Supreme Court to hear the appeal. The appeal was, in consequence, ordered to be struck off the list of appeals. Subsequently an order was obtained from Mr. Justice Armour giving further time to give the required notice, and the Registrar thereupon set down the appeal for hearing for the session of February, 1880. Mr. Gibbs' counsel then moved to have the appeal quashed on the ground that the Judge had no power to grant a further delay, and because Mr. Wheeler had failed to prosecute his appeal at the next following session of the Court after the judgment of Mr. Justice Armour; and it was held: That the power of the Judge who tried the petition was a general and exclusive power, and the appeal should be heard.

The seat, therefore, is now vacant by the judgment of Mr. Justice Armour on the charge of corrupt practices by agents, which has not been appealed, but no election can take place until the decision of the Supreme Court is given on the appeal from the finding of Mr. Justice Armour with respect to the personal charges against Mr. Wheeler.

There are also pending (Jan. 1880) before the Supreme Court two other controverted election appeals from judgments which are in favor of the sitting members.

1. *Young v. Smith.* (Selkirk Election Appeal.)
2. *Deslauriers v. Larue.* (Bellechasse County.)

ABBOTT, *Lieut.-Col. Hon. JOHN JOSEPH CALDWELL, D.C.L., Q.C. (Argenteuil.)*

Eldest s. of the late Rev. Joseph Abbott, first Anglican Incumbent of St. Andrew's, Argenteuil, well known as the author of *Philip Musgrave, or the Adventures of a Missionary in Canada*; by Harriet, dau. of the Rev. Richard Bradford, first Rector of Chatham, same county. B. at St. Andrew's, 12 March, 1821. Ed. there, and at the University of McGill College, Montreal. M., 1849, Mary, dau. of the Very Rev. J. Bethune, D.D., Dean of Montreal. Called

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to the Bar, L.C., Oct. 1847. Created Q.C., 1862. Is Dean of the Faculty of Law in Univ. of McGill College; Lieut.-Col. of the 11th Batt. or "Argenteuil Rangers," raised by him during the "Trent" difficulty; President of the Fraser Institute, or Free Public Library of Montreal; author of *The Insolvent Act of 1864; with notes, &c.* (Que., 1864); a measure which he introduced and carried through the Can. Parlt. Was a member of Ex. Council and Solicitor-General, L.C., from 24 May 1862 to 14 May 1863. Was elected for present seat in Can. Assembly at g.e. 1857, but not returned, and only seated after an arduous contest; continued to represent the county in that House until the Union. First returned to Commons at g.e. 1867, and re-elected at g.e. of 1872 and 1874. Unseated Oct. 1874. Was a candidate at g.e. in 1878 and was defeated, but re-elected Feb. 1880 on sitting mem., Dr. Christie, being unseated. Was associated with Hon. Mr. Langevin on the Letellier mission to England, in April 1879. His legislation includes, in addition to the Insolvent Act, the Jury Law Consolidation Act for Lower Can., and the measure for collecting judicial and registration fees by stamps and many less important measures. A Liberal Conservative; supports the present Administration.—916 *Sherbrooke street, Montreal; Boisbriant, Ste. Anne's, Que.; St. James' Club.*

ANGERS, Hon. AUGUSTE REAL, Q.C. (*Montmorenci.*)

B. in Quebec, 1833. Ed. at Nicolet. M. the dau. of Hon. Eugene Chinic, Senator. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1860. Created a Q.C., 1874. A mem. of the extensive law firm of Langlois, Angers & Colston. Apptd. a mem. of Ex. Council, 22 Sept. 1874, and was Solicitor-Genl. from that date until 27 Jan. 1876, when apptd. Attorney-Genl., which position he held until March 1878, when the Govt. was put out of office by the arbitrary and unconstitutional action of Lt.-Governor Letellier. Has been Govt. leader in the Assembly since the session of 1875. First returned to Legislative Assembly, Quebec, for present seat, Feb. 1874, on the resignation of the sitting mem; re-elected by acclamation on his appt. to office, and again at g.e. 1875. Returned to Commons to fill vacancy caused by unseating of Mr. Valin, Feb. 1880. A Conservative.—7 *Charlevoix street, U.T., Quebec; Stadacona Club.*

Election returns: Angers 943, *St. Georges* 586.

In Missisquoi election trial, petition against return of Hon. G. B. Baker was dismissed.

A. P. Cockburn, M.P., for Muskoka, has changed his residence from Toronto to *Gravenhurst and Beaverton, Ont.*

QUEBEC LEGISLATURE.

In Rimouski M. Parent, Independent, was elected 3 March 1880, to fill vacancy caused by Hon. Mr. Chauveau being appointed Judge.

W. E. Price, mem. for Chicoutimi, resigned 26 Feb. 1880, on account of ill health. A new writ was issued, and M. Elize Baudet, Conservative, elected by acclamation 27 March.

OBITUARY.

Hon. L. H. Holton, M.P. for Chateauguay, died suddenly on the morning of Sunday, 7 March, 1880. The House of Commons adjourned on the Monday following out of respect to the memory of the deceased. In moving the resolution, the Right Hon. Sir John Macdonald said it had been arranged across the floor that there should be no adjournment of the House on the death of any one of its body, except in very exceptional cases. He thought this was an exceptional case.

After a number of members on both sides had eulogised the memory of the deceased, the House adjourned.

Senator Seymour died at his residence, in Port Hope, 23 March, 1880, after a severe illness. The honorable gentleman was in Ottawa, attending to his sessional duties, up to within a short time of his death.

IMMIGRATION.

Free Grants of 160 acres of PRAIRIE LAND are offered to Actual Settlers in the Province of Manitoba.

Free Grants of 100 to 200 acres of WOOD LAND are offered to Actual Settlers in other parts of Canada.

Partially cleared Farms and Buildings may be bought at Reasonable Prices.

ASSISTED PASSAGES.

(During the season of St. Lawrence Navigation.)

The Dominion Government issues, through its Agents, Passengr Warrants, whereby approved Emigrants in the United Kingdom may obtain passages to Canada at the following rates:—

Adults, £5; Children under eight years, £2 stg.; Infants under 1 year, 10s.; and Female Domestic Servants, £4 stg.

The above are available for the powerful steamships of the Allan, the Dominion, the Temperley and the Anchor lines.

CARE OF EMIGRANTS.

Emigrants, on arrival in Canada, will find Agents of the Government at the following places:—

Quebec, L. Stafford; Montreal, John J. Daley; Ottawa, Ont., W. J. Wills; Kingston, Ont., B. Macpherson; Toronto, Ont., John A. Donaldson; Hamilton, Ont., John Smith; London, Ont., A. G. Smit.

In the Maritime Provinces there are the following Government Officers:—

Halifax, N.S., E. Clay; St. John, N. B., S. Gardner.

And in Manitoba:—Winnipeg, W. Hespeler; Dufferin, J. E. Tetu; Duluth, W. C. B. Grahame.

These Officers of the Government will meet every steamship, sailing vessel and train bringing Immigrants. They will afford to all who apply to them the fullest advice and protection, and all complaints should be immediately addressed to them on arriving. They will also furnish information as to lands open for settlement in the respective Provinces and Districts, farms for sale, demand for employment, rates of wages, routes of travel, distances, expense of conveyance, and will receive and forward letters and remittances for Immigrants, &c.

All information which Immigrants obtain from the Agents of the Dominion they may accept as reliable.

GOVERNMENT OF CANADA.

Post Office Savings Bank.

1. The following Post Office Savings Banks in Ontario and Quebec are open daily for the receipt and repayment of deposits, during the ordinary hours of Post Office business.
2. The direct security of the Dominion is given by the Statute for all deposits made.
3. Any person may have a deposit account, and may deposit yearly any number of dollars, from \$1 up to \$300, or more with the permission of the Postmaster-General.
4. Deposits may be made by married women, and deposits so made, or made by women who shall afterwards marry, will be repaid to any such woman.

5. As respects children under ten years of age, money may be deposited :—

FIRSTLY—By a parent or friend as Trustee for the child, in which case the deposits can be withdrawn by the Trustee until the child shall attain the age of ten years, after which time repayment will be made only on the joint receipts of both Trustee and child.

SECONDLY—In the child's own name—and, if so deposited, repayment will not be made until the child shall attain the age of ten years.

6. A depositor in any of the Savings Bank Post Offices may continue his deposits at any other of such offices, without notice or change of Pass Book, and can withdraw money at that Savings Bank Office which is most convenient to him. For instance, if he makes his first deposit at the Savings Bank at Cobourg, he may make further deposits at, or withdraw his money through, the Post Office Bank at Collingwood or Quebec, Sarnia, Brockville, or any place which may be convenient to him, whether he continue to reside at Cobourg or remove to some other place.

7. Each depositor is supplied with a Pass Book, which is to be produced to the Postmaster every time the depositor pays in or withdraws money, and the sums paid in or withdrawn are entered therein by the Postmaster receiving or paying the same.

8. Each depositor's account is kept in the Postmaster General's Office, in Ottawa, and in addition to the Postmaster's receipt in the Pass Book, a direct acknowledgment from the Postmaster-General for each sum paid in is sent to the depositor. If this acknowledgment does not reach the depositor within ten days from the date of his deposit, he must apply immediately to the Postmaster-General, by letter, being careful to give his address, and, if necessary, write again, because the Postmaster's receipt or entry in the Pass Book is not sufficient without the further receipt for the money, from Ottawa.

9. Every depositor must send his book, once a year, viz., on the anniversary of his first deposit, for comparison with the Books of the Department, and for insertion of interest. The Book will be returned to him by first mail. At no other time should a depositor suffer his book to be out of his own possession.

10. When a depositor wishes to withdraw money, he can do so by applying to the Postmaster-General, who will send him by return mail a cheque for the amount, payable at whatever Savings Bank Post Office the depositor may have named in his application.

11. Interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum is allowed on deposits, and the interest is added to the principal on the 30th June in each year.

12. Postmasters are forbidden by law to disclose the name of any depositor, or the amount of any sum deposited or withdrawn.

13. No charge is made to depositors on paying in or drawing out money, nor for Pass Books, nor for postage on communications with the Postmaster-General in relation to their deposits.

14. The Postmaster-General is always ready to receive and attend to all applications, complaints, or other communications addressed to him by depositors or others, relative to Post Office Savings Bank business.

ON the recommendation of the Honorable the Minister of Customs, and under the provisions of the 11th sub-séc. of the 125th section of the Act passed in the Session of the Parliament of Canada held in the 40th year of Her Majesty's Reign, chap. 10, and intituled "An Act to amend and consolidate the Acts respecting the Customs,"—

His Excellency, by and with the advice of the Queen's Privy Council for Canada, has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that a Drawback of duty paid on all canvas, paints and oils, chains, spikes, iron and iron knees, actually used in the construction of any ship or vessel built and registered in Canada, or built in and exported from Canada under Governor's pass, for sale and registry in any other country since the 15th March last, may be granted and paid by the Minister of Customs, under such regulations as to him may appear to be necessary, provided that such drawback shall not exceed an amount equal to 40 cents per registered ton of such ship or vessel, when constructed without iron knees, and 50 cents per registered ton when constructed with iron knees.

(Extract from Rules relative to Private Bills.)

All applications for Private Bills, properly the subjects of legislation by the Parliament of Canada, within the purview of "The British North America Act, 1867," whether for the erection of a Bridge, the making of a Railroad, Turnpike Road, or Telegraph Line; the construction or improvement of a Harbour, Canal, Lock, Dam, or Slide, or other like work; the granting of a right of Ferry; the incorporation of any particular trade or calling, or of any Banking or other Joint Stock Company; or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or relate to any particular class of the community; or for making any

amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require a notice clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, and (except in the case of existing corporations) signed on behalf of the applicant, to be published as follows, viz. :—

In the Provinces of Quebec and Manitoba.—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, in both languages, if there be but one paper ; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

In any other Province.—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of the time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the petition.

QUEBEC GOVERNMENT SCHOOL OF NAVIGATION.

This School is now open in the buildings of the Legislative Assembly, under the tuition of William C. Seaton, esquire, professor of navigation, and late nautical master to the Society of Merchant Venturers, Bristol, England.

The terms of time are as follows :

The School will be opened daily throughout the year, (except from the 1st July till the end of August,) from nine in the forenoon till four in the afternoon.

On Saturdays, it will close at noon.

The course of studies followed at this school are :

FIRST COURSE.

For the preparation of candidates for the masters' and mates' certificates of competency, granted, after successful examination, by the Board of Examiners of the Dominion of Canada. This embraces the use of logarithms; the sailings; day's work; finding the latitude by meridian altitude of the sun, of a star, by an ex-

meridian altitude of the sun; finding the longitude by chronometer, the variation and deviation of the compass by an amplitude and by an azymuth, to find the times of high water; the correction of soundings; to make observations for the formation of the table of deviations, its application, also the laying off and use of Napier's diagram; the use of the chart of instruments; the rule of the road and all other subjects comprised in the *viva voce* examination before the Dominion Board of Examiners.

SECOND COURSE.

An extended study of practical navigation and nautical astronomy. To find the latitude by a meridian altitude of the moon, of circum-polar stars, by an ex-meridian altitude of the pole star, by double altitudes of a celestial body (Summer's and Ivory's methods); to find the longitude by double altitudes, by lunar observations; to rate a chronometer by equal altitudes; the use of the artificial horizon, the laws of storms, &c, &c.

THIRD COURSE.

Theory.

Mathematical investigation of the different rules and formulæ used in nautical science.

The Matriculation fee is \$15, for those studying to pass for a mate's certificate before the Dominion Board of Examiners,

and \$20 for those studying to pass as masters; and students, after having matriculated, have the right to attend the school, free, for any length of time, until they have obtained their certificates from the Dominion Board of Examiners.

Should extra-examinations be established before the Dominion Board of Examiners, the preparation for those extra-examinations of such candidates, as will have made their studies at this school, will be free of any charge.

The tutor of the School makes a monthly report to the Provincial Secretary, stating the number and proficiency of students, and the number of candidates from the school who have successfully passed the Dominion Board of Examiners, for certificates of masters and mates.

FISHERIES DEPARTMENT,

OTTAWA, 20TH FEBRUARY, 1880.

PUBLIC NOTICE is directed to the following provisions of the **FISHERY LAWS** :—

Fishing by means of nets or other apparatus (*except in the tidal deep-sea fisheries*), without Leases or Licenses from the Department of Marine and Fisheries, is prohibited.

Nets to be raised from Saturday night until Monday morning of each week.

Fishing apparatus not to be so used as to bar channels, or to wholly obstruct the passage of fish to and from their feeding and breeding places.

Catching or killing fish on their spawning beds is unlawful.

Destroying the fry of fish is forbidden.

Using explosive or poisonous substances for catching or killing fish is illegal.

Placing saw-dust or other mill-refuse in waters frequented by fish is prohibited.

Mill-dams to be provided with fish-passes.

Fishing materials illegally used are subject to forfeiture, and persons using them are liable to fines or imprisonment.

All applications for Leases or Licenses, or any other communications relating to Fisheries, should be addressed to the Hon. the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa.

INSPECTION
OF
WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

The Act amending and consolidating the laws relating to Weights and Measures, assented to 15th May, 1879, came into operation 1st July, 1879, and among other things provides that :—

“The unit or standard measure of capacity, from which all other measures of capacity, as well for liquids as for dry goods shall be derived, shall be the gallon containing ten Dominion Standard pounds weight of distilled water weighed in air against brass weights, with the water and the air at a temperature of 62° of Fahrenheit's thermometer and with the barometer at thirty inches.”

“Provided always, that until the 1st day of May, 1880, the wine gallon of 231 cubic inches may be used in any case by special understanding between the parties to any contract or agreement for the measurement of *liquids*, and the ratio or proportion which such measure shall bear to the standard shall be as follows:—Six wine gallons shall be equal to five standard gallons.”

From the above it will be seen that the use of the Winchester bushel and its sub-divisions becomes illegal from the 1st of July, 1879, and that the use of the wine measure is permitted for liquids only until the 1st of May, 1880, from which date its use becomes illegal.

The manufacturers of and dealers in weights, measures and weighing machines are, by regulations made by Orders in Council permitted to remove unstamped weights, measures, etc., from their premises to the premises of any other manufacturer of, or dealer in, such articles, upon the condition that they shall notify the nearest inspector of their intention to make such removals, and that the parties to whom they are removed shall submit them for inspection before they are sold for use in Canada.

Instead of annual inspection as heretofore provided for, this Act provides for a bi-ennial inspection of weights and measures. But this provision is not intended to prevent Inspectors of weights and measures from testing the accuracy of weights, measures and weighing machines at any intervening period.

REGULATIONS

RESPECTING THE DISPOSAL OF CERTAIN PUBLIC LANDS FOR
THE PURPOSES OF THE CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY.DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR,
OTTAWA, Oct. 14, 1879.

Public notice is hereby given that the following provisions, which shall be held to apply to the lands in the Province of Manitoba, and in the Territories to the west and north-west thereof, are substituted for the Regulations, dated the 9th July last, governing the mode of disposing of the Public Lands situate within 110 (one hundred and ten) miles on each side of the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which said Regulations are hereby superseded:—

1 " Until further and final survey of the said railway has been made west of the Red River, and for the purposes of these provisions, the line of the said railway shall be assumed to be on the fourth base westerly to the intersection of the said base by the line between ranges 21 and 22 west of the first principal meridian, and thence in a direct line to the confluence of the Shell River with the River Assiniboine.

2 " The county lying on each side of the line of railway shall be respectively divided into belts, as follows:—

" (1) A belt of five miles on either side of the railway, and immediately adjoining the same, to be called belt A;

" (2) A belt of fifteen miles on either side of the railway, adjoining Belt A, to be called Belt B;

" (3) A belt of twenty miles on either side of the railway, adjoining Belt B, to be called Belt C;

" (4) A belt of twenty miles on either side of the railway, adjoining Belt C, to be called Belt D; and

" (5) A belt of fifty miles on either side of the railway, adjoining Belt D, to be called Belt E;

3 " The even-numbered sections in each township throughout the several belts above described shall be open for entry as homesteads and pre-emptions of 160 acres each respectively.

4 " The odd-numbered sections in each of such townships shall not be open to homestead or pre-emption, but shall be specially reserved and designated as Railway Lands.

5 " The Railway Lands within the several belts shall be sold at the following rates, viz:—In Belt A, \$5 (five dollars) per acre; in Belt B, \$4 (four dollars) per

acre; in Belt C, \$3 (three dollars) per acre; in Belt D, \$2, (two dollars) per acre; in Belt E, \$1 (one dollar) per acre; and the terms of sale of such lands shall be as follows, viz:—One-tenth in cash at the time of purchase; the balance in nine equal annual instalments, with interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum on the balance of purchase money from time to time remaining unpaid, to be paid with each instalment.

6 "The Pre-emption Lands within the several belts shall be sold for the prices and on the terms respectively as follows:—In the Belts A, B and C, at \$2.50 (two dollars and fifty cents) per acre; in Belt D, at \$2 (two dollars) per acre; and in belt E, at \$1 (one dollar) per acre. The terms of payment to be four-tenths of the purchase money, together with interest on the latter at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum, to be paid at the end of three years from the date of entry; the remainder to be paid in six equal instalments annually from and after the said date, with interest at the rate above mentioned on such portions of the purchase money as may remain unpaid, to be paid with each instalment.

7 "All payments for Railway Lands, and also for Pre-emption Lands, within the several Belts, shall be in cash, and not in scrip or military or police bounty warrants.

8 "All moneys received in payment of Pre-emption Lands shall inure to and form part of the fund for railway purposes, in a similar manner to the moneys received in payment of Railway Lands.

9 "These provisions shall be retroactive so far as relates to any and all entries of Homestead and Pre-emption Lands, or sales of Railway Lands obtained or made under the Regulations of the 9th of July, hereby superseded; any payments made in excess of the rate hereby fixed shall be credited on account of sales of such lands.

10 "The Order in Council of the 9th November, 1877, relating to the settlement of the lands in Manitoba which had been previously withdrawn for Railway purposes, having been cancelled, all claims of persons who settled in good faith on lands under the said Order in Council shall be dealt with under these provisions, as to price of Pre-emptions, according to the belt in which such lands may be situate. Where a person may have taken up two quarter-sections under the said Order in Council, he may retain the quarter section upon which he has settled, as a Homestead, and the other quarter section as a Pre-emption, under these provisions, irrespective of whether such Homestead and Pre-emption may be found to be upon an even-numbered section or otherwise. Any moneys paid by such person on account of the lands entered by him under the said Order in Council, will be credited to him on account of his Pre-emption purchase, under these provisions. A person who may have taken up one quarter section under the Order in Council mentioned will be allowed to retain the same as a Homestead, and will be permitted to enter a second quarter section as a Pre-emption, the money paid on account of the land previously entered to be credited to him on account of such Pre-emption.

11 "All entries of lands shall be subject to the following provisions respecting the right of way of the Canadian Pacific Railway, or of any Government colonization railway connected therewith, viz:

a "In the case of the railway crossing land entered as a Homestead, the right of way thereon, and also any land which may be required for station purposes, shall be free to the Government.

b "Where the railway crosses Pre-emptions or Railway Lands, entered subsequent to the date hereof, the Government may take possession of such portion thereof as may be required for right of way or for station grounds or ballast pits,

and the owner shall only be entitled to claim payment for the land so taken, at the same rate per acre as he may have paid the Government for the same.

c "In case, on the final location of the railway through lands unsurveyed, or surveyed, but not entered for at the time, a person is found in occupation of land which it may be desirable in the public interest to retain, the Government reserves the right to take possession of such land, paying the squatter the value of any improvements he may have made thereon.

12 "Claims to Public Lands arising from settlement after the date hereof, in territory unsurveyed at the time of such settlement, and which may be embraced within the limits affected by the above policy, or by the extension thereof in the future over additional territory, will be ultimately dealt with in accordance with the terms prescribed above for the lands in the particular belt in which such settlement may be found to be situate, subject to the operation of sub-section c of section 11 of these provisions.

13 "All entries after the date hereof of unoccupied lands in the Saskatchewan Agency, will be considered as provisional until the railway line through that part of the territories has been located, after which the same will be finally disposed of in accordance with these provisions, as the same may apply to the particular belt in which such lands may be found to be situated, subject, as above, to the operation of sub-section c of section 11 of these provisions.

14 "With a view to encouraging settlement by cheapening the cost of building material, the Government reserves the right to grant licenses, renewable yearly, under Section 52 of the 'Dominion Lands Act, 1879,' to cut merchantable timber on any lands situate within the several belts above described, and any settlement upon, or sale of lands within the territory covered by such licenses, shall for the time being be subject to the operation of such licenses.

15 "The above provisions, it will, of course, be understood will not affect sections 11 and 29, which are public school lands, or sections 8 and 26, Hudson's Bay Company's lands.

"Any further information necessary may be obtained on application at the Dominion Lands Office, Ottawa, or from the agent of Dominion Lands, Winnipeg, or from any of the local agents in Manitoba or the Territories.
