Canada Thistles.

We clip the following from an American paper. An article on the same subject appeared in our columns some years back, but we never heard the result of rape growing upon thistles: perhaps some of our freaders will let us know at their experience. We believe that not allowing them to breathq is the only effectual way of destroying them. One year's working them keeps them down, but two years will utterly destroy them. "It a field is infested by thistles, give it a turn of rape seed, and this plant will altogether starve, suffocate, and chill the thistle out of existence. A trial has been in square plots, when it was found that the whole ground was full of thistles, and no body believed in the rape having a fair run.
