GLORIOUS VICTORY! THE N. P. AGAIN TRIUMPHANT. SIR JOHN MACDONALD'S GOVERNMENT SUSTAINED BY AN IMMENSE MAJORITY.

Ontario Gives a Handsome Majority.

QUEBEC GOES SOLID. NOVA SCOTIA AND NEW BRUNSWICK COME OUT STRONG.

British Columbia and Manitoba to be heard from.

The returns which we publish to-day show that another great victory has been gained by the Conservative party. Sir John Macdonald's Government has been sustained by a majority of upwards of 70, with British Columbia and Manitoba to hear from and in these provinces is sure to return all or nearly all Conservatives, the total majority in the new House will be about as large as it was in the last Parliament. This result must afford Sir John Macdonald and the friends of the National Policy the utmost gratification. All the provinces have stood manfully by the party of progress. Ontario, by a vote of 100 to 50, has given Sir John a good majority; Quebec has gone about solid, the Reformers securing less than a dozen seats in the whole province, the whole of the Conservative camp supporting the policy of preserving Canada for the Canadians. Victoria has also voted all along the line. In British Columbia and Manitoba all the members of the Cabinet have been returned, four of them by acclamation, and the remainder by their constituencies. All the principal cities—Toronto, Montreal, Hamilton, London, Ottawa, Quebec, Halifax and St. John—have elected the Conservative standard-bearer. Excepting Mr. Blair, whose defeat was a very small majority in North Wellington is much to be regretted, the Ministerialists have come out of the battle with scarcely a loss to lament, and in many cases have secured by such large majorities that in 1878. On the other hand the slaughter of the opposition innocents includes Sir Richard Cartwright, Huntington, Anglin, Sir Albert Smith and many others. The verdict of the people of the Dominion has been rendered so emphatically and decisively as to leave no room for doubt. The Conservative party have been proclaimed the popular vote the true friends of Canada, and their fiscal policy that which is for the best interests of the Dominion. The strong endorsement which the National Policy has received at the hands of the electors will inspire confidence in its stability, and the result of this will undoubtedly be that foreign capital will be attracted to our shores and become an important factor in the development of the trade and commerce of the Dominion. May the veteran Premier and Statesman who once more finds himself placed in the highest position to bestow the power of a grateful people to his country.
