He is reminded that although he came from a good home he must be ready, when a member of the Order, at a moment's notice, to start for the frozen plains of the Northwest and sleep on the ground with his congregation of Indians if he be fortunate. Instead of a warm bed, the sketches from the life of Mgr. de Mazenod, printed in the Sun, illustrated the sense of duty of a young Oblate who had left a cultured home and gentle surroundings to take up the work of a missionary in the Northwest, in the dead of winter, without a companion, cooking his own meals on his own camp-fire, all the while thanking God that he had a chance to prove his devotion to Him. Mgr. de Mazenod is not the case of this kind in the Oblate Order.
One year must be spent at the novitiate. This means that the novice must pass twelve months in the novitiate and then live up to all the duties that are laid down by the superiors. Every night in the twelve months must be passed at the novitiate, for should it happen that the novice be away over night he must start at the beginning again.

Making an Oblate.
From the Novitiate (M. de S.)
A person driving over the main road that runs through the town of Twickbury may see through the tree tops a small bell-shaped structure surmounted by a golden cross. That is the bell-shaped of the Oblate novitiate, a place of quiet where religious young men dwell together in the strongest bonds of love.
The novitiate property at Twickbury is what was formerly the Kiltree estate. It was acquired a few years ago, and with the addition of later purchases, there are now about thirty-three acres of land, with buildings which will suit the needs of the community and protect the house of the old-fashioned sort, light and airy.
On the lawn, which glides down to the river, stand the letters "O. I." (Oblate of Mary Immaculate), which took form in nature's care, the body of the initials being animals green. In the orchard a few trees are planted in rows, under the apple trees, and further off a small lake shines brightly in the sun that gives a golden coloring to the whole place. There are rare flowers, but by the river, and other places, but flowers where fruit and flowers were grown, and a long avenue of arching vines where the vines may take their exercise on the side of the community and protect the house of the old-fashioned sort, light and airy.

In the house there are no luxuries appointments. The chapel and the library are the only places where there are any expensive ornaments. The library case was purchased with the estate, and is of black walnut carved and massive. All the rest of the novitiate interior is plain and simple, each being the rule. No carpets, easy chairs, sofas, or anything else that would invite ease, can be found. The best description that may be given of the interior of the novitiate is to say that there is nothing to describe. The only thing of interest to the visitor from the outside world after he has seen the chapel and the library, and noted the simplicity and air of devotion, is a small frame which hangs over a doorway. The daily life of the novice is nearly the same all the year round. They are taught to be accustomed to the abstinence of their own will in everything, which is chiefly effected through a loving and cheerful observance of the following daily rules:
Morning.
5.00—Rising.
5.12—Vocal prayer and meditation in community.
6.00—Make beds and put dormitory in order.
6.15—Review of meditation in writing.
6.30—Mass.
7.00—Free time.
7.15—Reading of the first portion of the divine office, viz.: prime and terce.
7.35—Breakfast. Manual labor, on Tuesday and Thursday, recreation in community.
8.00—Free study, during which the novices take notes, write letters, occupy themselves in various other ways.
9.30—Class of singing.
10.00—Scriptural reading.
10.30—Visti to the chapel.
10.50—Free study.
11.30—Reading of second portion of the divine office, viz.: Sext and None.
11.45—Examination of conscience.
12.00—Dinner and recreation.
1.30—Saying of the beads; that is, saying one-third part of the Rosary.
1.45—Vegetable and compline.
2.00—Free time.
2.15—Study of the Society, followed by an explanation by the Rev. Master.
3.15—Reading of the life of some saint.
3.45—Visti to the chapel.
4.00—Recreation.
4.30—Reading of the divine office (Matsins and Lauds).
5.15—Free study.
6.00—Instructions on the rules.
6.30—Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament.
7.00—Supper and recreation.
8.30—Examination of conscience.
8.37—Evening prayers. Confession of novices to satisfy the rules of the society during the day. This is followed by the preparation of the next morning's meditation.
9.00—Review of the day, in writing.
9.15—Bedtime.
All of these exercises are made in common, and varies more or less every day of the week.
And, then, beside this machine-like system which they go through daily, they are made to feel that ground them in generosity and self-sacrifice. They are taught to love correction, to seek humility, and to have a constant mortification; but they may not go further in that direction.
Neither have the novices any hard studies to make. They are supposed to have enough to do to be contented with the deep religious spirit of the world. Their home life is quiet and full of attraction. Nothing but abundant peace is there among the novices, and they are encouraged to act as sons of the same mother—the society.
This life can there be any in this world more beautiful than this, for twelve months, and what a change from the boys of one year before! Much of their individuality has been dropped and they have become full of the methods of the Order, and are ready to take the step to the scholasticate.
