Few people would imagine that the province of Tripoli has an rea of 899,000 square miles, bigger than British Columbia, and over

three times as big as Italy, yet such seems to be the case. Tripoli is subdivided into four livas, or provinces, Tripoli, Benghazi, Mesurata and Gadanus. The governor-general has the title, rank and authority of a pasha of the Ottoman empire

The population is believed to be over 1,300,000, Lebyan Berbers, Moors, a few Arabs, with 3,000 Europeans, and some 24,000 Jews. Tripoli is rich in history. From the Phoenicians Tripoli passed

to the rulers of Cyrenaica, from whom it was wrested by the Carthaginians. It afterwards belonged to the Romans, the Arabs, Spain and

After 1551 it belonged to the Turks, and of late Italy has extend-The capital city, Tripoli, lies on the edge of the desert, on a

point of rocky land, jutting into the Mediterranean sea. It is a typical Moorish city with high walls, beautiful gardens, many mosques and several large churches. Several anti-Turkish rebellions have taken place, notably in 1842 and 1844, but they have always been suppressed The religious movement set on foot by the Prophet Senusi, in the middle of the 19th century, is the most remarkable feature in the recent history of Tripoli. The first Senusi died in 1860, and was succeeded by his son, 1849 to 1902. He was called the Mahdi, and commanded the devotion of a large following in Northern Africa, something similar to the better known Mahdi in the Soudan.

Bad Weather is Responsible for Holding Up Belivery of Grain-350 Cars Per Day Are Being Used to Ship Grain on C.N.R.

Winnipeg, Sept. 30-Bad weather has delayed marketing of the crop considerable during the past two weeks, so that although a good amount has been threshed still it is not coming to the elevators as fast as was expected.

The Canadian Northern Railway esimates elevators along their lines to contain between two and three million bushels of wheat. The dally movement for the past week has been 350,000 bushels. Just as soon as the weather improves, this amount will crease to at least half a million bushels and may go still higher.

This company's estimate compares ery favorably with last year's crop, but the year before it was much higher. There is no doubt that the wheat ron is in the country, but with connued bad weather, the delay will be in getting it out to the elevacrs and markets.

t is impossible to make the trip from he farm to the station without danger f being stuck in the mud, and on this ccount, the amount of wheat taken out this year as compared with the two previous years, although the crop this year will be very much larger than either of the past two seasons, is small.

Owing to so many cars being loaded t points where the companies have no agents it is hard to say the exact number of cars that are being handled day by day ,but the Canadian Northern estimates that the number of cars would be not less than 350. If eather clears this number will in all ikelihood be doubled. So far nearly seven million bushels have been nandled by the Canadian Northern and as they figure on taking care of over forty per cent of the crop this yea" there is a very great amount yet to be moved.





IN SEED CONTROL ACT

During the recent session of Pariament, important changes were made in the Seed Control Act respecting the sale of clover and timothy seed. Under the old Act the inspec tor sometimes found it difficult to prove violations though misrepresentations were being made. A dealer might offer red clover seed, containing as many as 92 noxious weed seeds per ounce and an unlimited number of other seeds such as Foxtail, represent it as his best grade and then charge nearly as much as his competitor asked for No 1. He would not mark it No. 1, but he might state verbally that it was No. 1 or just as good. This has often been done.
