

## ST. JOHN'S MUNICIPAL GOUNGIL

THE following Sections of the amended Municipal Act, passed March 22nd, 1910, are published for the information of those interested and the Genera

From and after the passing of this Act the construction of houses or buildings of any sort shall not be commenced within the city limits without the permission of the Council, who shall have power to make and prescribe terms and conditions to be observed and performed by the owner of the land or the lessee in respect of the payment by the said owner or lessee of the whole or a portion of the cost of the laying or introduction of the water or water pipes, the opening or construction of sewers or sewerage, or the making, opening, widening or improvement of the road or street along or near to which the said house or building is to be constructed.

## An Astrologer **Predicts**

nuch of her power. "Egypt will give King George decided trouble, but will not be able to free herself from English rule during his reign. She will accomplish this however, during the reign of his success-

"George's reign will see the rise of new political power within the British Empire and sweeping constitution al changes. The privileged classes will be obliged to give up many of their prerogatives forever. New political parties will be formed.

"In the third year he will have seri ous trouble in his own family, in the form of dangerous illness; it will not, however, result in death. During that year the British royal family will be put in mourning; I do not see that the death is within the immediate family of the king.

The second year of his reign will uso see great need among the British people, resulting in actual famine. "England will lose the support her allies and will be obliged to alter her foreign policy. A decided hostility to her will arise among the duropean powers.

"The horoscope does not show that any of these occurrences will be due to King George himself. rather the result of circumstances without his grasp. The King, as is flown throughout, is the victim of destiny. He will, however, show himself very domineering, and will display an He will, however, show himself inflexibility that will give his advisers much trouble. He will act throughout from the best motives but will man-te to offend unconsciously, many owerful persons."





#### TRADE STATISTICS.

We thank Mr. Ray, Canadian Trade Commissioner, for a copy of the Monthly Report of the Department of Trade and Commerce of Canada for February, 1910.

We notice that the United Kingdom in February last took from us 13.752 otls, of fish, cured or salted, as against 11,786 in February, 1909. For the year ending February, 1910, the total purchase is 252,457, as against 231,802 for the year previous. Canada supplied almost as much; the United States somewhat more. The total purchase in this food line was 1,235,-

On page 1,453 the statistics of the Trade of Newfoundland are given. Both the exports, imports and shipping for 1909 are slightly less than that for 1908, the total trade for 1909 being \$22,251,250, as against \$23,331,- this case is set down for Saturday 880. The total shipping was 1,858,165, June the 4th. as against 1,935,083 tons. The imports from the United Kingdom and Canada decreased, but those from the United States show a material increase. Strangely the exports to the United States was much lower than any since 1904. The year 1905 shows \$1,418,624 of exports, while 1909 shows 848,176. Decreases are shown also in exports to Canada, Brazil and Portugal, while increases ouccrred in those to the United Kingdom and the British

The effect of fluctuation of prices of our staple on our purchasing may be gathered from a perusal of the quantities and their values of dried cod exported to Brazil in the years 1907, 1908, and 1909,

In 1907, 334,416 quintals of fish realized in Brazil \$2,063,326. In 1908, 7,213 more quintals were exported there than in 1907, and yet the total export realized \$45,521 less. In 1909, 47.764 more quintals were

sold in Brazil than in 1907, and yet the total realized \$344,244 less. In other words, each quintal of fish exported to Brazil in 1907 fetched on an average \$6.16; whilst in 1909 it

quintal of \$1.67. While shipments increased and

prices fell in regard to Brazil, it was not the same in regard to Portugal. ped to Portugal. This realized \$1,- 60 above. 832,071. In 1909, 256,080 quintals fetched \$1,588,798.

The fish shipped to Portugal averaged \$5.94 per quintal in 1907, and

While there was a decrease of \$1.67 in Brazil fish, there was a slight increase in the price of Portuguese fish. This is curious.

He gripped one the men who was lifting him into the boat so fiercely that his hold could not be broken and they had to cut away the clothing to part them. His oil pants were tied at the legs and were filled with water, and he vomited a lot of water when the Frenchmen took him into the cabin of their ves sel. To all appearances he was dead. The men worked on him trying to induce artificial respiration for over an hour, but as there were not results they gave him up as lost, when suddenly one put a small mirror before his mouth. The moisture which gathered on the surface showed that there was still breath left in the body. They resumed their task and in less than sciousness. He was unstripped and put in a berth, but when he was able after a few hours to get up he decided to again try for his vessel. 





#### **Montreal Girl's Painful** Plight in Chicago City.

Distressing Story of Unsuccessful Attempt to Force Young Lady Into

Chicago, May 25.—How a beautiful girl, fresh from nineteen years of the sequestered life of a Canadian Convent school was lured to Chicago by false promises, and her heroic and successful struggle against the most subtle efforts to induce her to lead a life of shame, have been told to Municipal Judge Walter, and Mrs. Sophionia Lebeau, of 2,202 Wabash avenue, has been arrested in consequence.

When promises of luxury failed in their purposes, the girl was forced to do menial tasks in an effort to break her determination, but this slavery was as futile as the other methods. Finally escaping from the woman who held her prisoner, she found a refuge in the residence of sympathetic people, who aided her finally in causing the arrest of the Lebeau woman. This was not done, however, until the girl, friendless here, had pawned all of her good clothing, and then penniless, had become ill from starvation. She had until then kept from her

andlady all knowledge of the straits she was in.

A South Side physician who was called to attend her found she was ill solely from lack of food, and got from her the story of what she had undergone. He notified the authorities and the arrest of Mrs. Lebeau followed. In the case is said to be involved Chicago man. This man's name has not been disclosed, but it is said to be known to those prosecuting the

According to the story which the girl told Attorney Clifford G. Roe. the Convent of Notre Dame in Monreal last year to live with her uncle Odina Gingras in Montreal. The gir was then scarcely 18 years old and an orphan.

In September the girl met a "wealthy woman from Chicago," who "was lonely" and "wished to have a daughter." Mrs. Lebeau, the wealthy Chicagoan, would give the girl a home in Chicago, where her companionship would pay for her living. The girl at length, in opposition to her uncle's wishes, accepted the offer of Mrs. Lebeau, who preceded her to Chicago leaving with her money for her travelling expenses.

On September 22, when she came to Chicago, two of her cousins accompanied her, because she did not understand English. When she arriv ed in Chicago she went to the resi dence of Mrs. Lebeau, 2128 Michigan avenue. For the week that her cousins remained in Chicago with her the promises of Mrs. Lebeau seemed genu ne. Immediately after her cousing had returned to Montreal, however Mrs. Lebeau, it is alleged, moved her o one of her resorts at 2220 Wabash avenue. Once there, the attempts to break her courage were begun.
