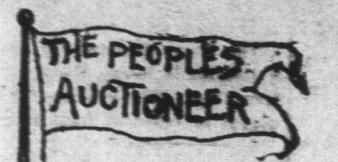

Beattie Found Guilty of Murder.

Chesterfield Court House, Va., Sept. 8.—Henry Clay Beattie, Jr., to-night was found guilty of murder in the first degree. The jury had been out 55 minutes when it came into court with a verdict of guilty. No degree of guilt was specified, however, and Judge Watson directed that the jury return again to consider that matter. It seemed but a minute or two that the jury was gone.

When they reentered the foreman announced that the jury held Beattie to be guilty of first degree murder in putting his wife to death on the night of July 18 last. The penalty is electrocution.

Under the Virginia law, every murder is presumed to be murder in the second degree unless otherwise specified, and it is incumbent upon the defence to reduce it to manslaughter. The prisoner stood rigidly at the bar as he heard the verdict, his face flushed and his cheeks twitching nervously. When he heard the conviction he sank into his chair and held his head into his hands. For several minutes he did not speak and his father beside him also covered his face with his hands. The foreman's announcement rang out in the quiet court room, the other eleven jurors simultaneously fairly shouting "guilty."

Counsel for the defence moved to set aside the verdict on the grounds of being contrary to the law and evidence, and of misdirection by the court, and because of various rulings on the evidence objected to by the defence. The court overruled the motion for a new trial. Judge Watson stated that the trial consisted almost entirely of questions of law entered materially into the decision of the jury.

The defence asked for ninety days to file a petition for a writ of error to the Supreme Court of Appeals of Virginia. Attorney Wendenburg, for the State asked that the defence be restricted to within a few days of the meeting of the Supreme Court in November. Judge Watson decided that in view of the fact that there had been little delay in the actual trial of the case the request of counsel for the accused was reasonable, and granted a stay of execution for ninety days.

Judge Watson sentenced Beattie to be electrocuted at Richmond on November 24. Asked if he had anything to say why he should not be sentenced, the prisoner replied: "I have nothing to say."

To friends Beattie said: "I have not just yet."

Cab Fares.

The City Council seems to us to have decided wisely in agreeing to the publication of the schedule of cab fares, which will come up for discussion at the next meeting of the City Council. The two parties concerned are the cabmen who provide the horses, vehicles and labour, and the general public who hire them. The object of the Legislature in giving the City Council power to fix a tariff was to protect the general public without injuring the cabmen. As the power was conferred in the public interest, it would have been most unwise to agree upon any schedule without giving the public a chance of seeing it in advance and expressing, if any members of the public wished to do so, their opinion on it.

But these remarks have particular force in connection with this schedule which is somewhat complicated. It would be interesting to hear from any of those who had to do with making up the scale, the reasons on which it is based, and why a simple time or distance scale has not been suggested for adoption.

An Ancient City Discovered.

Long Lost Umma Found Accidentally by Arabs in Mesopotamia.

London Sept. 8.—Arabs in Mesopotamia have accidentally discovered one of the ancient Chaldean cities, Umma, of the old times at the site known to-day as Youkha. For twelve months past clay tablets have been offered for sale from mounds at Youkha and recently four hundred specimens have arrived in London, but proof that they belong to the long lost city of Umma, rival of the famous old Babylonian city of Lagash, has not been derived from them, because they have not yet been read, except from a marble tablet bearing fifteen lines of arrow-head writing, now in Paris.

Italy's Queen Won Pardon for Convict.

Milan, Sept. 9.—A pathetic wedding was celebrated recently in a wretched garret in the Trastevere quarter of Rome between a hand-cuffed convict and a young woman in the last stages of consumption.

The convict was sentenced eight years ago to twelve years' imprisonment in a Sardinian penitentiary for killing a man in a street fight. On learning of his sweetheart's serious state of health he presented a petition to the Minister of Justice to be allowed to marry her. The petition was granted, and after the wedding the convict husband took a passionate farewell of his bride and was driven off to prison.

Great interest has since been taken in the case by the public and several newspapers started subscriptions to enable the wife to spend her last days in a sanatorium. The Queen of Italy also interested herself in the case and induced the King to sign a pardon. The announcement of her husband's release created such a marked improvement in the woman's condition that the doctors believe she will be able to see her husband before she dies.

Declines to Grant Hell Incorporation

Albany, N. Y., September 9.—The Secretary of State has refused to incorporate "hell." A New York city law firm recently forwarded a certificate of incorporation with that name for a proposed concern to conduct cafes and restaurants.

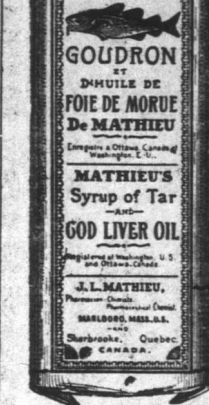

How We Waste the World.

(Chlozza Money, M.P. in the 'Daily News', London.)

I think I have before pointed out to a careless public that there has so far simply played ducks and drakes with his world. Now, our world is a very small world. In the scale of worlds, as any student of astronomy will tell you the earth is really not worth mentioning; it is a mote in the illimitable sea of ether. But there is no need to share in the little which astronomers know to be able to decide that our world is small. The industry of man has already been smitten with practical knowledge of the fact.

From iron ore to cables and from tin to bacon the majority of foods and materials have come to be dearer than they were in those years not remote, when the commercial mind, after first having done its best to starve and discourage inventors and scientists, found that there was money in the things which it despised, and used machinery and scientific appliances to play havoc with the world's resources. The recipe of the commercial man for the development of a world is charmingly simple. You scrape together all you can lay hands on, and leave waste for posterity.

Is it cotton soil? Then plough and sow and reap until crops refuse to rise, and then pass on to fields and pastures new. Is it timber? Then cut it down, regardless of the fact that the passing of two generations of men will not give back to the world the magnificent trees of which you have robbed it. Is it rubber? Then sap it and stain it red with homicidal hands, and taste the joys of a rubber boom, piling waste on waste and robbery on robbery. Is it coal? Then mine it hastily, guiltily, at whatever cost of life and limb, so that miners rot in the earth, and the coal which is not one bed enough for three men seeing that each works only eight hours a day? even while there is fuel even in a land which knows seven months of winter, who can afford to heat their bedrooms?

Is it cotton soil? Then grow it with dirt-cheap labor, and manipulate it and hold it up, while the cotton masters of the world meet in solemn conclave and decide that it is necessary for mills to go on short time in order to checkmate the cotton speculators.

Such and such are the ways in which the world is now being robbed. Things in the other inhabited world which almost certainly exist, armed with the instruments of observation which doubtless their creatures have fashioned, are probably grinning to see what an awful mess we make of it. It is not the world which is now being robbed; it is the world which is being destroyed.

Special Hints on Gas Cooking.

Sometimes all the gridiron shelves are required; then put the browning shelf over all, but now and then it will be found necessary to move up the cakes, etc., from the second shelf to the first one nearer the browning shelf, in order to acquire a better colour.

Another point often forgotten is that the oven will remain hot for some time after it has had the gas turned off. This heat can be utilised for baking custards, finishing the cooking of large cakes, milk puddings, etc., or if there is no cooking to be done, put in a large vessel containing water to heat, to use for washing up after the meal is concluded.

Another way to reduce the waste of gas is, when grilling or toasting, to be done, utilise the heat over the burner by boiling the kettle or some saucepan over it. It is extravagant to light another burner for boiling purposes when the grill is alight.

Injured in Fight.

Two men who were working on the Solway yesterday afternoon, after liquoring up began to fight and one of them in the melee received some nasty cuts on his head and face. 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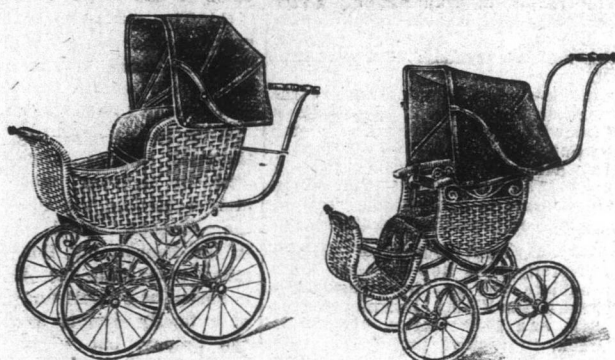

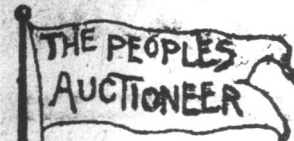
