





PON the Declaration of Independence his name may be read without spectacles. His signature was the first subscribed to the world's most famous State document. In the most realistic sense John Hancock pledged his life and his fortune to the cause of the Revolution. He was one of the richest men in the colonies, holding investments in his fortune to the cause of the Revolution. He was one of the richest men in the colonies, holding investments in banks, breweries, stores, hotels, and also owning a fleet of vessels. The seizure of one of these precipitated the Boston massacre. In Revolutionary days and until his death he was a popular idol. When it was proposed to bombard Boston, though it would have resulted in greater personal loss to him than to any other property owner, he begged that no regard be paid to him because of his financial interests. While Hancock did not sign the Constitution of the United States, he used his great influence in its behalf, which awakened the gratitude of Washington. "He was prepossessing in manner, and passionately fond of the elegant pleasures of life, of dancing, music, concerts, routs, assemblies, card parties, rich wines, social dinners and festivities." Until the end of his life the people of Massachusetts delighted to honor him. In the stirring events preceding the Revolution he was one of the most active and influential members of the Sons of Liberty. 

What I said then applies now, and in the end the United States will have to recognize that fact. What I said at that time covers the case. I said it then and I say it now." The statement Mr. Roosevelt made



Aerial Torpedo

LATEST GERMAN DEATH DEALER 6

London, July 12.—The German military authorities have succeeded in developing an aerial torpedo which can be directed by Hertzian waves from the navigation platform of a distant Zeppelin. Until now the Zeppelins have had no means of discharging bombs other than to drop them from high in the air over the object which it has been sought to destroy. The result has been that many bombs have wide of their mark deflected during the fall by currents of air or miscal-

Refractory errors due to light and atmospheric conditions have contributed to the wild dropping of the German bomb, until it seemed that so long as the Zeppelins remained they must do in order to avoid de struction from anti-aircraft guns, n accurate work could be assured. The experimental stations of the Germans have demonstrated the abthrough the air by Hertzian waves after the same manner in which un-dersea torpedoes have been directed

The new German aerial torpedo is shorter than the standard 18-foot Whithead, the length of the new German weapon being stated at seven feet. It is believed that this size is for the present limited merely to the practical question of affording to a Zeppelin a maximum number of weapons for firing rather than a very imited number of extra large size.
According to the information of ainable, the new aerial weapon ains its buoyancy through the med The weapon is kept at any desired height by means of two under-body screws actuated by a common shaft. The propelling power is af-forded by two stern screws, and both the underbody and the stern screws are under control of the Hertzian vaves sent out from the Zeppelin. The tornedo is composed of two

bodies, the outer of chrome nickel steel and the inner of a substance milar to that which enters into the onstruction of Zeppelins.

The torpedo carries an electric accumulator and also an electric motor generator, the latter being actuated by the Hertzian waves. Regular System of Marine Patrol Likely to be Established-Nature of Coast Favors Raiders-Auxiliary Barque Held at St. John with Much Oil on Board.

Ottawa, July 9 .- While the authorities of the naval service department are not disposed to place too much re liance upon German threats of a submarine base on the Canadian Atlantic coast it is not intended to take

any chances. Shipping is being warned to be or the lookout for such hostile craft, and it is very probable that a regular system of patrols will be instituted. The new type of German submarines can quite easily cross the Atlantic and this fact in itself is regarded as justification of special pre-
