Tory is corruption of an Irish phrase, a spiteful allusion to the fact that many of the Jacobite kings were Irish fighting men, while Whig is supposed to be from the whey of sour milk, a sneer at the supposedly sour-faced Puritans who stood for what we now call the Liberal or Reform Party.
