The effect of the seasons, and of dampness and temperature, upon workers in mills and factories comes home to us very closely as an industrial nation as well as a "nation of shopkeepers"; for it has been shown that the output of manual laour varies with the seasons, and that herefore it is a mistake to be "speedng up" all the time.

Regulating Energy by Machinery.

It is a fact that in many factories the same amout of work is expected each month. Hence at certain seasons many operatives work harder than they ought, while at others they do not work so hard as they could without special effort.

If factories were run in accordance with a well established seasona curve of energy, we should find the machinery running slowly in winter, faster in the spring, and in May per haps ten or fifteen per cent, faster than in January. Then in the summer it would run more slowly than in May, but no so slowly as in winter. Finally, in the autumn it would run at Playing Tricks greater speed than at any other time of the year. 

Caverly, the retiring Chief Justice of the Criminal Court of Cook County, sentenced the two young intellectuals to life imprisonment on the murder charge and to terms of ninety-nine years imprisonment for kidnapping. Under the latter was stated they cannot be released n parole until they have served more than 37 years in Joilet Penitentiary. life term alone would have permitted such release after about twenty years. The boys listened to the pronouncement of sentence intently. Leopold's poker face lacked its customary high colouring, but his facial muscles were under perfect control. Loeb's lower jaw hung a bit loosely as he sat with parted lips.

### GREAT BRITAIN MEANS WHAT SHE SAYS.

GENEVA, Sept. 10. Great Britain stands by the League covenant which provides for military and naval assistance by all signatories to preserve peace. This declaration was made to-night by Lord Parmoor, representing the British Government after the Disarmament Commission debate on arbitration, security and disarmament. In a statement to the representatives of the Press of the world Lord Parmoor affirmed that Great Britain meant what she said when through the lips of her Prime Minister, Ramsay Macdonald, she declared her redainess to submit all disputes to arbitration. He added that the words "all disputes" included those usually criticized as questions affecting vital interests and national
