S.S. Viking, Capt. William Bartlett, ishery in the Galf this spring), arrivd in port at 5 a.m. yesterday, hailing or a catch of 18,300 prime young whitecoats, practically a full load. The Viking is the second of the fleet to arrive, and Capt. Barbour reports the rew in excellent health. The weathwas mild all through with S.E. and W. winds, and the only frosty days xperienced were the 10th of March,

nd the 5th of April. The Viking left St. John's on March 4th, and made a good run in open water until the 6th, when the first was struck 30 miles off Channel. ere the ship became jammed for two lays, and upon getting clear she truck the whitecoats 34 miles N.N.E. f the Bird Rocks. This was on the 0th. The young seals were found ery small, and scattered over a seven le radius, and for the next few days se on board watched the young cw, until killing time commenced, the 14th. By the time the work of aughtering came round the conditwere very favorable, and from he 14th of March until the 4th of April the crew were kept busy killing, panning and stowing on board. The ice was found in large sheets which made it difficult for the ship to get around to pick up the pans. On sevcral occasions she became jammed and a considerable quantity of powder had to be used to blast the ship ori. On Saturday last a kill of 18,300 young harps had been accounted for. After the patch had been cleaned up Capt. Bartlett made an effort to get north to work the hoods, but not a crack was visible in the ice. On Saturday evening Capt. Bartlett decided to bear up for home, and cut a course r Cape St. George to get clear of the ice. On Monday she got into open water off Cape Ray and made a good run down the coast until the folowing night when she was obliged to anchor at St. Lawrence on account of a heavy sea. The Viking continued the






