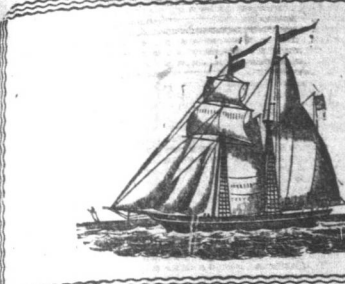

In the midst of this perplexed state of things, a tall figure pushed its way through the little crowd on the stairway, and Edmund Locksley was staring about him in haughty surprise.

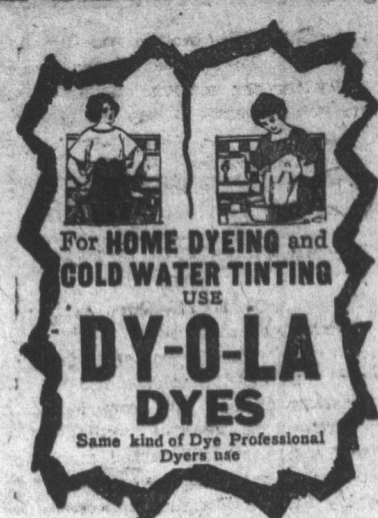
"Come, Dora," he said, coolly, and with an air of quiet authority, that completely awed the policeman. "I have a cab waiting at the door. Does your bill require settling?"



LONDON, April 9.

CHURCH UNION NOTE.
TORONTO, April 9.
The summary issued by the Church Union Bureau of Information for to-day, reports 1536 Presbyterian Churches for union and 581 against. The latest report of the Presbyterian Church Association shows 600 churches against union.

ARMSTRONG STILL HOPES FOR A SETTLEMENT.
HALIFAX, N.S., April 9.
While anticipating no important development over the Easter recess, Premier E. H. Armstrong, of Nova Scotia, stated to-night that he was not discouraged over the present outlook for an early settlement of the struggle between Beogo and its 12,000 miners, which is entering the sixth week to-morrow.

PRINCE AT GOLD COAST.
SECONDES, Gold Coast, West Africa, April 9.—Experiencing the intense heat of equatorial Africa for the first time, the Prince of Wales sailed southward on a tour of South Africa and South America, arrived here to-day. HERRIOT RESIGNS.
PARIS, April 10.
President Doumergue to-night accepted the resignation of the Herriot Cabinet, and requested the Premier to call a meeting to carry on until successors are appointed. The Government tendered its resignation to President Doumergue to-night after the Senate to-day. Former Premier Doumergue led the Opposition in the Senate, throwing the weight of his authority against the ministry and aiding the opponents of the Herriot Government to defeat on a vote of confidence 156 to 124.

TRAIN COLLISION.
BARCELONA, April 9.
About twenty persons were killed and some sixty injured in a collision to-day between two electric trains in the suburb of Las Dalanas. The accident was due to the failure of the brakes on one of the trains to work.

DEMONSTRATIONS AGAINST BALFOUR.
DAMASCUS, April 10.
Algerian cavalry galloping through the streets of Damascus with drawn swords and eight armoured cars manœuvring with troops, are credited with having saved the Lord Balfour from a hostile mob of six thousand people, which attempted to attack him yesterday. Two were killed and many injured before the disturbance was quelled. The mob at most succeeded in reaching the hotel where the veteran British statesman is staying. Efforts of the Syrian police having failed completely to check the demonstration, mounted troops and armoured cars scattered the crowd up side streets. The demonstrations against Lord Balfour are due to his work in the establishment of the National Jewish Home in Palestine.

THE ARABS AND BALFOUR.
LONDON, April 9.
The attitude of the Arabs in Palestine in connection with the visit of Lord Balfour was brought up in the House of Commons to-day, when a Conservative member asked if the government in Palestine had been specially reinforced because of the visit. Major Symonds-Gore parliamentary Under-Secretary to the Colonial Office, replied in the negative.

\$3,000,000 FIRE IN NEWARK, N. J.
NEWARK, N.J., April 9.
The plant of Igoe Brothers, Wire Mill Manufacturers, at Newark, was destroyed by fire to-night with estimated loss of \$3,000,000 in property and stock.

BRITAIN'S BURDEN.
NEW YORK, April 10.
The indebtedness of Allied Governments to Great Britain for war loans amounted to 2,962,000,000 pounds sterling on January 1, the Bankers Trust Company reported to-day. Of this

amount 1,236,000 pounds represent principal and 666,000,000 pounds interest. Russia was the principal debtor with \$50,000,000 pounds charged against it. France was second with 652,500,000 pounds and Italy; third with 577,200,000 pounds.

BREAD PRICES IN PARIS.
PARIS, April 10.
The reduction of one sou in the price of bread, effective April 21, was ordered by the Bread and Flour Commission to-day. This is the third reduction in a month, bringing the price to one franc, fifty centimes per kilogram (2.2) pounds. The drop is due to the recent fall in the Canadian and United States wheat markets.

MADRID, April 11. The King pardoned four men awaiting execution. A real Easter sun greeted the Spanish capital yesterday morning. The streets were thronged with people in their holiday clothes, peasants in their quaint apparel and señoritas in their colourful mantillas.

DISAPPEARANCE OF WIFE LEADS TO MURDER CHARGE.

HALIFAX, April 11. Duncan Gammon of Pictou will be charged in the police court here tomorrow with murder in connection with the disappearance of his wife, an English war bride, whose whereabouts since last September has been a mystery. Gammon stated she had sailed from Quebec at that time to visit her people in England.

PRINCE MEETS ASHANTI CHIEFS.

KUMASSI, Ashanti, April 11. The Prince of Wales to-day met the chiefs of Ashanti at a grand palaver following his arrival here this morning from Secondee. The chiefs presented the Prince with an address of welcome and a gold duplicate of the Ashanti Sword of State made by local goldsmiths. A noted figure among the chiefs who greeted the Prince was former King Premfeh, who was exiled by the British in 1900 to Seychelles Islands, in the Indian Ocean. He was released last year and to-day was a member of the reception committee.

LEWIS GOES TO CAPE BRETON.

TRURO, N.S., April 11. President John Lewis, of the United Mine Workers of America, passed through here last night en route to Cape Breton to make a thorough investigation of conditions in the strike areas of Cape Breton coal fields.

RECORD SHIPMENT OF FLOUR.

PORT COLBOURNE, Ont., April 11. Two special trains of 99 cars, of flour for the big Russian order were shipped yesterday. One of one hundred was forwarded to-day, making a record shipment for the past two days.

DEATH OF GERMAN STATESMAN IN DETROIT.

DETROIT, April 11. Dr. Sherman Pasche, Privy Councillor and former Vice-President of the German Reichstag, died in hospital here early this morning, of pneumonia.

ALBERTA LEGISLATURE PRO-ROGUE.

EDMONTON, Alta., April 11. The fifth session of the fifth Legislature of the Province of Alberta was adjourned yesterday afternoon by Lt-Governor R. C. Brett. It will be re-assembled June 15th, or at such earlier or later date as the Lieut. Governor-in-Council may declare. Prior to the adjournment the Lieutenant-Governor presented to no fewer than 65 Bills which had passed since the opening of the House.

AMUNDSEN OFF FOR THE NORTH.

OSLO, Norway, April 10. Ronald Amundsen the explorer who is shortly to make an attempt to fly to the North Pole left Tromsø yesterday for Spitzbergen, which is to be the base from which the flight will start. Amundsen with his 21 followers and the airplanes and various instruments to be used in the air voyage sailed on board the freight steamer Hobby and the navy transport Farm. It is expected the party will reach Spitzbergen in four or five days. The expedition was given a heavy send-off. Amundsen will be extensively aided in his flight by the Norwegian Government which has established a meteorological station at Spitzbergen in order to keep him in touch with the weather forecast. His equipment is in excellent condition, and the Farm will always be at his command. The planes are of the flying boat type.

The Budget Speech.

(Continued from Thursday's Evening Telegram.)

Before closing my Speech, there is one last indication of the dawn of prosperity for which the Colony has been looking for some years now. I refer to the money in the National Savings Bank. And in this connection I would ask the attention of Honourable Members to the five-year comparative statement to December 31st, last. The Savings' deposits, or, in other words, the money put aside for a rainy day in Newfoundland, has increased by the sum of \$1,756,005.51 during 1924, being now at the sum of \$22,135,229.92. And I do not think I could conclude my Budget without reference to such an auspicious fact. An analysis of the comparative statement referred to shows that this is the first appreciable increase for years.

I now beg leave to propose to the Committee the following resolutions, viz:

RESOLUTIONS OF WAYS AND MEANS SUBMITTED BY THE MINISTER OF FINANCE AND CUSTOMS TO A COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE HOUSE.

RESOLVED that the Act passed in the fifth year of His Late Majesty, King Edward VII., entitled the Revenue Act 1905, and the various Acts in amendment thereof, granting to His Majesty certain duties on goods, wares and merchandise, imported into or manufactured in this Colony and its Dependencies, be repealed;

and the domestic value of goods for the purposes of special duty.

(2) That the expression "export price" or "selling price" in this section shall be held to mean and include the exporters price for the goods, exclusive of all charges thereon after their shipment from the place whence exported directly to Newfoundland.

(3) That if at any time it appears to the satisfaction of the Governor-in-Council, on a report from the Minister of Finance and Customs, that the payment of the special duty by this section provided for is being evaded by the shipment of goods on consignment without sale prior to such shipment, the Governor-in-Council may in any case of class or classes authorize such action as is deemed necessary to collect on such goods, or any of them, the same special duty as if the goods had been sold to an importer in Newfoundland prior to their shipment to Newfoundland.

(4) If the full amount of any special duty of Customs is not paid on goods imported, the Customs entry thereof shall be amended and the deficiency upon the demand of the Collector of Customs.

(5) The Minister of Finance and Customs may take such regulations as are deemed necessary for carrying out the provisions of this section and for the enforcement thereof.

(6) Such regulations may also provide for the temporary exemption from special duty of any article or class of articles, when it is established to the satisfaction of the Minister of Finance and Customs that such articles are not made or sold in Newfoundland in substantial quantities, and offered for sale to all purchasers on equal terms.

(7) Such regulations may also provide for the exemption from special duty of any article when the difference between the current domestic value and the selling price thereof to the importer as aforesaid amounts only to a small percentage of its current domestic value.

RESOLVED—All sums of money payable under this Act as duties, penalties, or forfeitures, shall be deemed, and are hereby declared to be in dollars and cents Newfoundland currency and shall be received, taken and paid in such currency, save and except where it is otherwise provided by the provisions of Chapter 22 of the Consolidated Statutes (3rd series); and all duties shall be paid and received according to Imperial weights and measures by law established in this Colony, save and except where it is otherwise provided in this Act; and in all cases where such duties are imposed according to any specific quantity or value, the same shall apply in like proportion to any greater or less quantity or value.

RESOLVED—The several duties imposed in Schedule A. of this Act, shall

be paid by the Importer of such articles, respectively, and shall be collected and secured by means of, and under the regulations and penalties, and in the manner provided by any Act or Acts of the General Assembly of this Colony for collecting the Revenue of this Colony and its Dependencies.

RESOLVED—With respect to goods imported for manufacturing purposes that are admissible for any specific purpose at a lower rate of duty than would otherwise be chargeable, or exempt from duty, the importer claiming such exemption from duty, shall make and subscribe to the following affidavit or affidavits before the Collector of Customs at the port of entry, or before a Notary Public or a Commissioner for taking affidavits.

I (name of importer), the undersigned, importer of the (names of the goods or articles) mentioned in this entry, do solemnly (swear or affirm) that such (names of the goods or articles) are imported by me for the manufacture of (names of the goods to be manufactured in my own factory, situated at (name of place), and that no portion of the same will be used for any purpose or disposed of until so manufactured.

RESOLVED—Whenever the Governor in Council has reason to believe that with regard to any article or commerce there exists any trust, combination, association, or agreement of any kind among manufacturers of such articles or dealers therein, to unduly enhance the price of such article, or in any way to unduly promote the advantage of the manufacturers or dealers at the expense of the consumers, the Governor in Council may commission or empower any Judge of the Supreme Court to enquire in a summary way into and report to the Governor in Council whether such trust, combination, association or agreement exists.

(2) The Judge may compel the attendance of witnesses and examine them under oath and require the production of books and papers, and shall have such other necessary powers as are conferred upon him by the Governor in Council for the purpose of such inquiry.

(3) If the Judge reports that such trust, combination, association or agreement exists, and if it appears to the Governor in Council that such disadvantage to the consumer is facilitated by the duties of Customs imposed on a like article, when imported, then the Governor in Council shall place such article on the free list, or so reduce the duty on it as to give the public the benefit of reasonable competition in such article.

RESOLVED—In the case of all wines, spirits, or alcoholic liquors subject to duty according to their relative strength of proof, such strength shall be ascertained either by means of Sike's Hydrometer or of the specific gravity bottle, as the Minister of Finance and Customs directs; and in case such relative strength cannot be correctly ascertained by the direct use of the hydrometer or gravity bottle, it shall be ascertained by the distillation of a sample, and the subsequent test in like manner of the distillate.

RESOLVED—All medicinal preparations whether chemical or other, usually imported with the name of the manufacturer, shall have the true name of such manufacturer and the place where they are prepared, and the word "alcoholic" or "non-alcoholic" permanently and legibly affixed to each parcel by stamp, label or otherwise; and all medicinal preparations imported without such names and words so affixed may be forfeited.

RESOLVED—Any person who without lawful excuse, the proof of which shall be on the person accused, sends or brings into this Colony, or who, being in the Colony, has in his possession any bill-heading or other paper appearing to be a heading or blank, capable of being filled up and used as an invoice and bearing any certificate purporting to show or which may be used to show that the invoice which may be made from such bill-heading or blank is correct or authentic, is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to a penalty of Five Hundred Dollars, and to imprisonment for a term not exceeding twelve months, in the discretion of the Court, and the goods entered under any invoice made from any such bill-heading or blank shall be forfeited.

RESOLVED—Coverings, inside and outside, used in covering or holding goods imported therewith, shall be subject to the following provisions, viz:—
(a) Usual coverings, containing free goods only: usual coverings, except receptacles capable of holding liquids, containing goods subject to a specific duty only, N.O.P. free.
(b) Usual coverings, containing goods subject to any ad valorem duty, when not included in the invoice value of the goods they contain, shall be charged with a duty of 40 per cent.

Provided always that the Governor in Council may, at any time when it shall be made to appear to him to be for the interest of the Colony, by Proclamation to be published in the Royal Gazette, suspend the operation of this clause for a limited period, the duration of the said period to be stated in the said proclamation, in respect of all or any of the above-mentioned articles.

RESOLVED—In case of any country now imposing, or which may hereafter impose, an import duty on herrings exported from this Colony and imported into such country in vessels belonging to that country, when such herring may be imported into such country in vessels belonging to the same free of duty, the Governor in Council may by Proclamation impose an export duty equal to the amount of duty so imposed by such country abroad on herring exported from this Colony in Vessels belonging to such country where such import duty is imposed.

A Factory for the manufacture of (names of the goods or articles) mentioned in this entry, do solemnly (swear or affirm) that such (names of the goods or articles) are imported by me for the manufacture of (names of the goods to be manufactured in my own factory, situated at (name of place), and that no portion of the same will be used for any purpose or disposed of until so manufactured.

RESOLVED—Whenever it shall be made to appear to the Governor in Council that it is desirable for the purpose of promoting the importation of potatoes for seed, to abrogate or reduce the duty upon potatoes for such purposes, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council by Order published in the Newfoundland Gazette to abrogate or reduce such duty.

RESOLVED—Whenever it shall be made to appear to the Governor in Council that it is desirable in the interests of Stock raisers to abrogate or reduce the duty on Hay, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, or Order published in the Royal Gazette, to abrogate or reduce such duty.

RESOLVED—Upon the Survey, by an authorized surveyor, of lumber imported into this Colony, for ascertaining the quantity thereof, upon which duty is to be collected, the Surveyor shall furnish to the Customs House a certificate setting forth that he has surveyed a cargo of lumber imported in a certain ship, stating name and master, and where from, and giving particulars of such survey, the number of feet, and the kind and description of the wood, plank (dressed or undressed), timber, laths, or shingles as may constitute such cargo; such certificate of survey must be delivered to the proper officer of Customs twenty-four hours after the landing of the cargo under a penalty of twenty dollars to be collected in a summary manner upon complaint before a Justice of the Peace.

For every certificate of survey furnished by an authorized surveyor, he shall be entitled to receive the sum of fifty cents.

oleomargarine, butterine or a similar substitute for butter, tobacco, cigars or cigarettes shall not be considered as such unless at least ten operators are employed therein. The Manager of such a factory may not obtain a licence therefor or operate it unless upon payment of a fee in proportion to the number of operators employed in his factory, such fee shall be paid annually in advance, as follows, viz: Every factory employing ten operators or up to twenty, \$200 per annum. Every factory employing twenty operators or up to fifty, \$500 per annum. Every factory employing fifty operators or up to one hundred, \$800 per annum. Every factory employing one hundred or more operators, \$1,000.00 per annum.

RESOLVED—Each factory of oleomargarine, butterine and similar substitutes for butter, or of tobacco, cigars or cigarettes, shall be for the purposes hereafter stated, a bonded warehouse; the products manufactured therein being, for the purposes hereinafter set forth, under the control of the Minister of Finance and Customs and such officers as he may appoint from the time of its production in the factory until the packages containing it have been duly stamped or marked, and the excise duty paid thereon.

RESOLVED—It shall be unlawful for any person to take from such factory, or from the part or parts under the control of the officer aforesaid, any product of the factory not contained in packages marked or stamped by the Excise Officer with the name of the article or with some other stamp or mark whereby the product of the factory may be distinguished, except by permission of the Minister of Finance and Customs.

RESOLVED—The excise duty levied and collected upon oleomargarine, butterine or similar compounds, and upon tobacco, cigars and cigarettes, shall be paid in cash in advance from time to time to the Minister of Finance and Customs, or such persons as he may appoint, before a permit shall be granted for the entry of such products into consumption; and the Excise Duty so collected being from time to time paid into the consolidated revenue.

RESOLVED—For any violation of the foregoing provisions relating to Excise, complaint may be made before a Stipendiary Magistrate or two Justices of the Peace, and the offender, upon conviction, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Hundred Dollars, or in default of the payment thereof, to imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months. If the person convicted be the holder of a licence, or if it be proven that he was a party to the offence, his licence shall be forfeited, and he shall therefore be incapable of procuring a licence.

RESOLVED—All articles and ingredients except butter imported into Bond for the use and to be used in the manufacture of tobacco, cigars, cigarettes, butterine, oleomargarine, or similar compounds, shall be admitted free of duty under regulations to be made by the Governor-in-Council, which Regulations shall set forth and

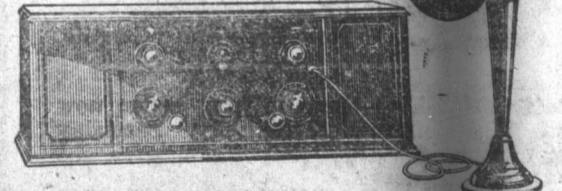

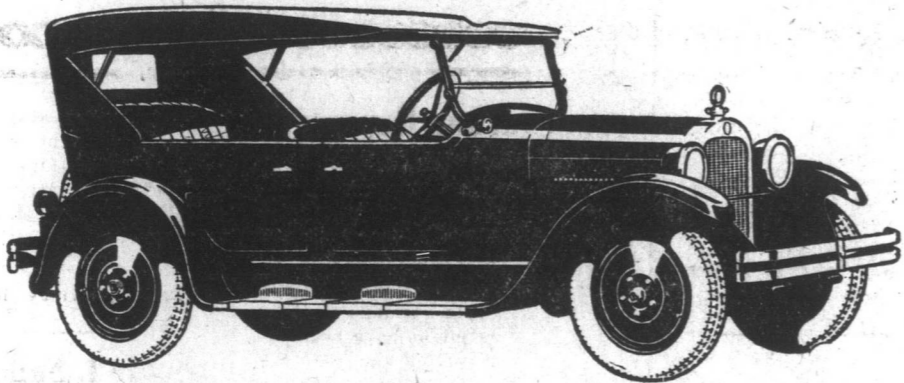

Our Dumb Animals

REPORT CHIEF AGENT S. P. A. WEEK ENDING APRIL 10.

Asked by Edwin Murray to examine a horse belonging to him. The horse was old. I advised Mr. Murray to have the animal humanely put to death, and he consented to this. I took the horse to Dr. Campbell's farm and shot it. Another very valuable animal belonging to Thomson, Capt. Cove Road, broke its leg in the stable. Mr. Caul phoned for me early in the morning. I went in and put it to death. I was asked by Peter Casey, Butcher Water Street West, to put to death with the "Humane Killer" a large bull. He has now ordered a "Humane Killer" to be used in his business. Attended to the handling of 24 head cattle for the St. John's Abattoir Co. from S.S. Sable 1; also 2 carloads of cattle from the Railway Station for the "St. John's Abattoir Co." All these cattle were carefully landed, inspected by Veterinary Surgeon Bishop and pronounced in excellent condition. A horse reported for lameness by a gentleman of the East End has been attended to. A horse suffering from a sore shoulder is in for a rest, also two others suffering from lameness due to natural causes. Several complaints about dogs have been attended to as far as lies in my power. A dog was reported to me as being hit by a motor car. The owner stopped his car to examine the animal, but it got away. He immediately reported it to me.

Municipal Council

WEEKLY MEETING.

The regular meeting of the Municipal Council was held Thursday afternoon. Mayor Cook presided and Councillors Martin, Outerbridge, Collier, Ryan and Dowden were present. After the confirmation of Minutes of previous meetings, the following business was disposed of:—

Attention to the dangerous condition of retaining wall and sidewalk, Duckworth Street East, and to the need of having same immediately attended to. The Engineer was instructed accordingly. The matter of drains, etc., referred to in Mr. MacFarlane's communication, will be dealt with by the Sanitary Supervisor.

The application of Messrs. Ayre & Sons, Ltd., for necessary connections for sprinkler system which they are installing at their premises, was

granted, conditional upon their agreeing to pay costs which would be incurred for outside connections.

The application of T. G. Cooper for light, Freshwater Road, near the Old Railway Track, was referred to the Lighting Committee.

Mr. Arthur Mews, on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the Cochrane Street Church, requested that a light be placed on Bannerman Street in the vicinity of the Church. He pointed out that the place in question is largely frequented by church-goers, and that the light on Military Road is obscured by houses projecting on the street line. The erection of such a light would be of benefit to many citizens passing that way as well as to the residents. This matter was also referred to the Lighting Committee.

The Cabmen of the East End Stand petitioned against the inconvenience caused them through the overcrowding of this stand by motor cars, and asked that they, who have occupied this particular section for many years past, be not deprived of their means of livelihood. At present the overcrowding was seriously interfering with their business. It was decided that records be looked up and all particulars possible obtained with regard to conditions when the land was purchased and as to the purpose for which it was to be used.

The application of the Central Taxi men to make alterations to signs at their stand, Duckworth Street, was granted.

The following offered to supply horses for the Sanitary Department: B. Guzewell, W. Gulliver and R. Hughes. It was ordered that tenders be called for same.

Applications were read from Mr. V. Groves for position of City Inspector; and Mr. C. Meyers for position as driver of one of Council's Trucks; all of which were ordered placed on file. Permit was refused H. A. McClean to use the Eastern portion of building formerly known as Callahan Glass, Theatre Hill, for the repairing of motor cars, etc.

In connection with the foregoing, a communication was also read from the Secretary of the Newfoundland Board of Fire Underwriters, asking a definition of the Act re the use of such buildings. The desired information will be forwarded.

PLANS

The following were passed, subject to the approval of the City Engineer, at whose office the necessary permits may be obtained:—

George Hampton to make alterations to building, Mundy Pond Road. Judge Kent, erection of a garage, Bonaventure Avenue, provided in both cases ventilators are installed.

Joseph Judge, for the erection of a Moving Picture Theatre, New Gower Street, provided the Inspector General and Engineer are thoroughly satisfied as to the construction of same and that the building is to conform to the Act recently passed by Legislature with regard to exits, etc. Further, the erection of such a building is not in any way to interfere with contemplated improvements to Casey Street in the near future.

James Pigeon, erection of office and store, Gower Street.

T. Tucker, dwelling, Duckworth Street.

Decided that the usual order be placed for the season's supply of Turvia.

Mr. C. F. Lester is to be permitted to occupy a certain portion of the new made ground west of the Gas Works, for rock crushing purposes, at a yearly rental to be decided upon.

The weekly reports of the City Engineer and Sanitary Supervisor were read.

The Medical Officer of Health reported two new cases of Scarlet Fever in the city during the past week. At present there are in Hospital 9 cases of Scarlet Fever and 2 Diphtheria. Under treatment at home, 3 Scarlet Fever.

With the disposal of routine matters, passing of accounts, etc., the meeting adjourned.

Nfld. Federation of Labour Formed

Union Men Of Grand Falls Start "United Front" Movement Of All Trade Unions.

What is declared to be the most important move ever attempted in the trade union history of Newfoundland was formally launched in Grand Falls on the night of the 5th, when, in the Town Hall, a large number of leading unionists and co-operators met and formed the Newfoundland Federation of Labor. Brotherhood of Paper Makers, Brotherhood of Electricians, Amalgamated Tradesmen's Union, and Brotherhood of Pulp, Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers, of Grand Falls; the Grand Falls Co-operative Society; and the Brotherhood of Railway Telegraphers. The meeting was the most enthusiastic gathering ever held for a long time in Grand Falls, and the Federation was born amidst a unanimity of spirit that gave great promise of marked success in the objective for which it is working. President William Bradbury, of the Paper Makers' Union was elected as chairman, and Malcolm Starks of the Co-operative Society, secretary of the meeting.

Organizer Smallwood then, for very nearly two hours outlined the project, reasons for starting the Federation, ways and means, the future work of the organization, etc., and his speech was followed by speeches from John Houlihan, Bank Scott, Frank Shapleigh, H. Powell, William Earle, E. Moore, S. Cobb, A. Hiccock, William Downs, Andrew Lynch, Garret Wall, S. Lyndahl, William Nicholls and Chairman Bradbury, every one of whom spoke enthusiastically in favor of the idea.

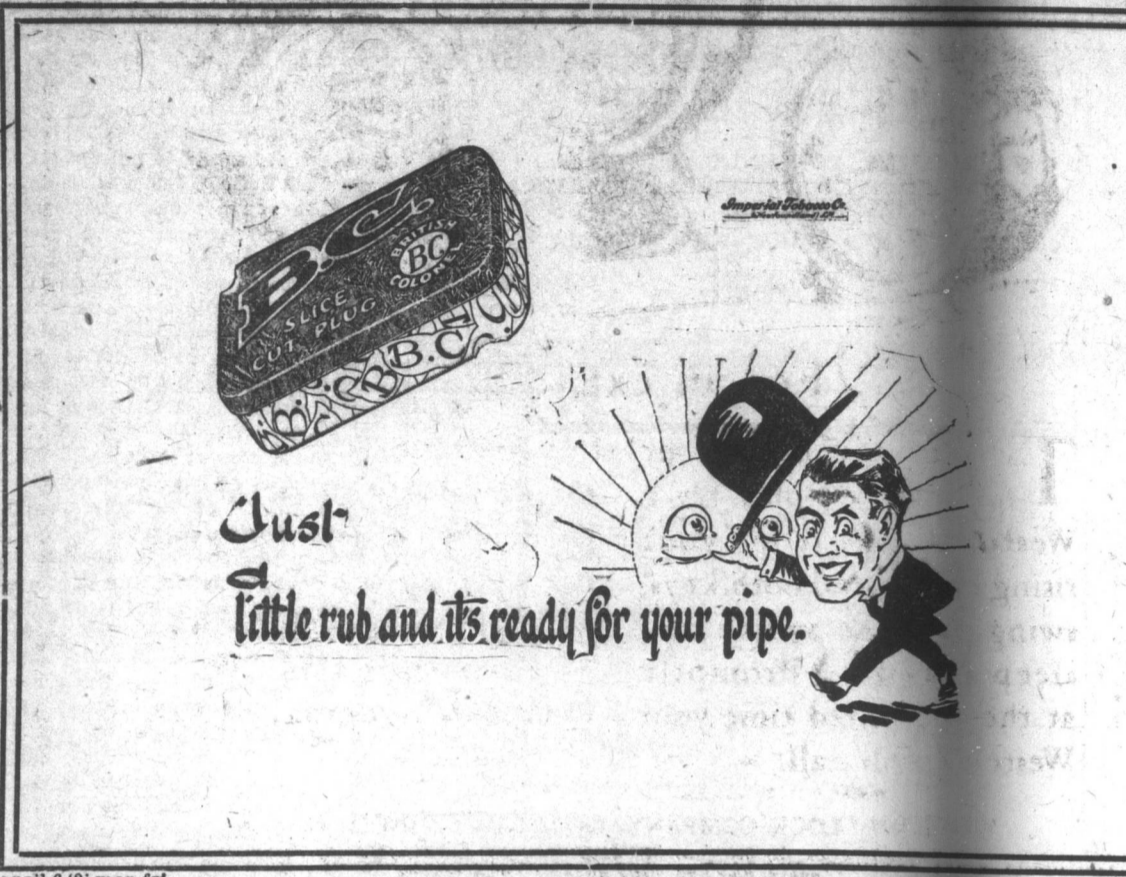

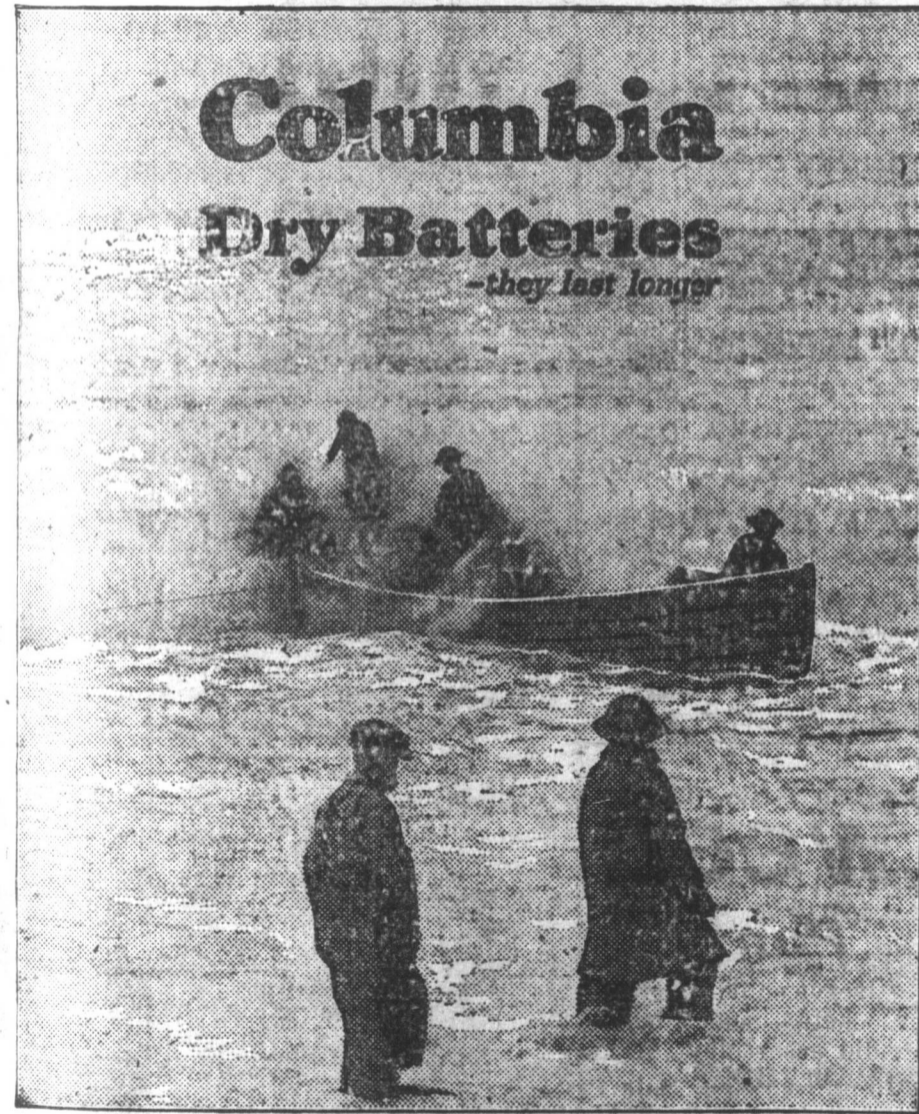

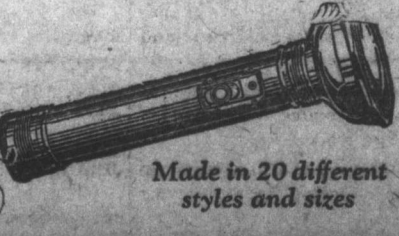

S.S. Viking

Second Arrival

GULF STEAMER REPORTS FOR 18,300 YOUNG HARPS.

S.S. Viking, Capt. William Bartlett, (the only ship to prosecute the seal fishery in the Gulf this spring), arrived in port at 5 a.m. yesterday, hauling for a catch of 18,300 prime young whitecoats, practically a full load. The Viking is the second of the fleet to arrive, and Capt. Barbour reports the crew in excellent health. The weather was mild all through with S.E. and S.W. winds, and the only frosty days experienced were the 10th of March, and the 5th of April.

The Viking left St. John's on March 4th, and made a good run in open water until the 6th, when the first ice was struck 30 miles off Channel. Here the ship became jammed for two days, and upon getting clear she struck the whitecoats 34 miles N.E. of the Bird Rocks. This was on the 10th. The young seals were found very small, and scattered over a seven mile radius, and for the next few days they were heard watched the young grow, until killing time commenced, on the 14th. By the time the work of slaughtering came round the conditions were very favorable, and from the 14th of March until the 4th of April the crew were kept busy killing, packing and stowing on board.

The ice was found in large sheets which made it difficult for the ship to get ground, to pick up the pans. On several occasions she became jammed and a considerable quantity of powder had to be used to blast the ship out. On Saturday last a kill of 18,300 young harps had been accounted for. After the patch had been cleaned up Capt. Bartlett made an effort to get north to work the hoods, but not a crack was visible in the ice. On Saturday evening Capt. Bartlett decided to bear up for home, and cut a course for Cape St. George to get clear of the ice. On Monday she got into open water off Cape Ray and made a good run down the coast until the following night when she was obliged to anchor at St. Lawrence on account of a heavy sea. The Viking continued the run on Thursday morning and reached port at the time already stated.

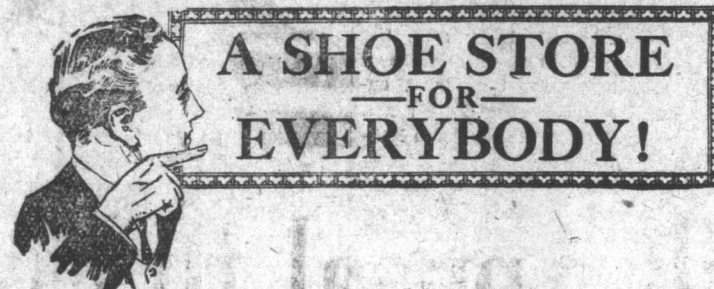

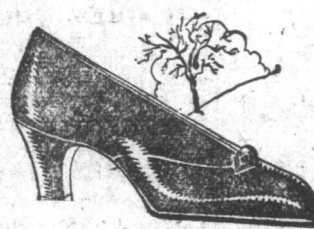

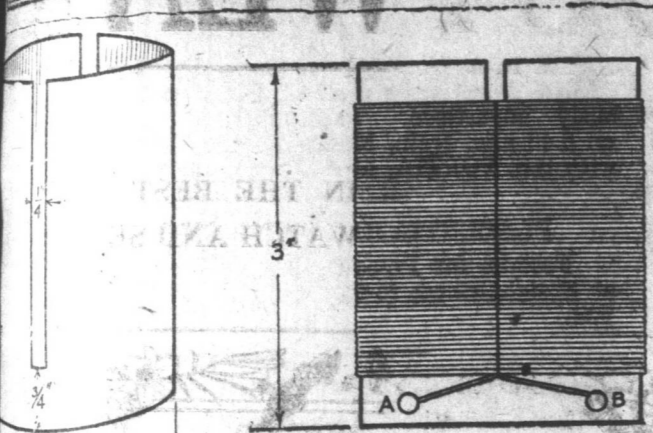

A Neutroformer That's Different

PART ONE. EDITED BY JOHN M. CLAYTON.

rows by some sort of force. The force that holds these bits of iron is due to the magnetism in the magnet going out in space from pole to pole. These lines the filings arrange themselves in are called lines of force. Any radio coil is full of these lines of force when current is passed through the coil. This magnet field extends quite a distance from the coil and will affect other coils which are in the magnetic field just as the field of the horseshoe magnet affects the iron filings in its field, but will not affect those too far away from the pole pieces, and out of the magnetic field.

It is to minimize the effect of one field of a neutroformer upon the field of the next neutroformer that these coils are mounted at an angle. But to say that this angle has to be exactly such and such is senseless. The optimum angle varies with each set.

Tomorrow we will describe a vivid form of winding coils which can be used most effectively in neutroformer sets as the coils wound in this manner have a very small "external magnetic field," hence do not react very greatly on each other and can be mounted in any position. We will give a hookup of a single-stage radio-frequency set which, due to the form of coil used, is almost as efficient as a two-stage radio-frequency amplifier.
