



Winnipeg, Man., April 6.-A decision was rendered today in the litigation known technically as the case of the Prairie City Oil Company vs Standard elates to technical defence, and places olicy. The plaintiffs took out a olicy on the defendant company, on heir premises in St. Boniface, for \$3,-

The defence raised was that gasoline was kept on the premises, contrary to the provision of statutory provision, contained in the policy. It was strongly contended that gasoline was an illuminating oil, and that the policy was wide enough to cover the plaintiff's general stock. There was a further point argued, that the plaintiffs had not given any notice of the loss as required by the policy.

Mr. Justice Metcalfe gave judgment in favor of the defendants holding that the defence was most technical, but the parties had made their contract. The condition was a condition preced-

The condition was a condition precedent to the right of recovery, the insured, having made the contract, must surictly comply with its provisions. Neither the want of knowledge, of the effect of the contract, nor the care-lessness of the insured to inform himself of its contents in any way helps him in his difficulty. The result may be startling to the community and individuals may anxiously scan their policies to try, if possible, to find out what they mean, perhaps they may succeed, perhaps they may not. A written contract must be interpreted as it is found. It is understood there will be no appeal.

WOUNDED AND CAPTURED

Had Secured Two Thousan Dollars in Goal City New York, April 7. Five masked ndits, escaping with \$2,000, stolen from the Bank of Coal City, at Coal

from the Bank of Coal City, at Coal City, Ill., exchanged shots with a posse today, three of the robbers being wounded and captured.

Coal City is 63 miles southwest of Chicago. The entire population was aroused by the explosion in the bank and the ensuing pursuit.

The marauders entered the town on a passing freight train and began operations by tieing Barney Ghett, the night watchman, and Washington Frye, the night engineer of the electric plant. Then they blew up the bank building and shattered the safe with a great charge of nitro giverine and after seizing the contents of the safe, leaped on a Santa Fe freight train with their plunder, which was partly in stamps.

As the train pulled out, Ghett succeeded in cutting his bonds and tele-phoned Eugene Miller, the night watch man at Mazeon, seven miles south of Coal City, who, with Dr. E. D. Watts, laid in wait for the robbers.

When the train reached Mazeon and


When the train reached Mazeon and stopped to switch cars, the bandits leaped from the car and hid in a clump of shrubbery near the track. Miller and the physician opened fire, which was promptly returned, about 25 shots being exchanged. When the train had started, the bandits leaped aboard and

Immediately the sheriff of Moreys was notified. Several automobiles were pressed into service and the pursuit began, the machines following a road along the Santa Fe right of way. When the train came to a stop at Verona, near Moreys, the cars were searched by the sheriff and his men.
