It is interesting to note that the 35,000 enumerated, 16,500 are printed in the English language. It is also interesting to note that there are 120 negro editors in the world.

That arbitration business between England and Russia is popularly understood. THE GAS CONTRACT. The Fire and Gas Committee met on Wednesday afternoon, Ad. Maughan presiding. There were present: Ad. Maughan, Johnston, Barton, Adamson, Taylor, Piper, and Mitchell. The following is a summary of the letter from the Consumers' Gas Company was laid before the Committee: Toronto, August 18, 1885. Sir: Your communication of the 30th ult., with copy of an order from the Committee on Fire and Gas, requesting the Company to alter the terms of their tender so as to comply with the modifications asked for by the Committee in a letter dated the 17th of June, 1885, was laid before the Board of Directors at their meeting held on the 14th inst.

The Directors would remind the Council that they have already made considerable alterations in the terms of their tender, and must say that it appears to them that no more concessions they make, the more the Council demands. On April 17th, 1884, the Council accepted the Company's tender, except that the term was to be for five years instead of ten years, from May 1st, 1884, which the Council accepted, and the contract was then entered into on that date. The Company acted upon in good faith, and on account of which have expended about \$25,000, and on the terms of which the Council have paid their bills for the past year.

ASKED TO MODIFY THEIR CONTRACT so as to omit the additional charge made on the lamps lighted in connection with the extinguishing of certain lamps superseded by electric light, and the placing of the lamps 200 instead of 150 feet apart in St. Matthew's Ward, the first of these requests being accepted by the Company.

On April 17, 1884, the Company was asked by the Committee on Fire and Gas to further modify their contract by laying 250 feet of pipe instead of 150 for new lamps ordered, and to cancel the contract with the late village of Brockton and Yorkville, now St. Mark's and St. Paul's wards, and to light the lamps on the same terms as the other lamps of the city. When the request was sent in writing to the Company's suggestion by the Committee on Fire and Gas, the conditions were altered, and the company were asked "to increase the distance between one lamp and another from 150 to 250 feet."

The Fire and Gas Committee were then informed that the Company could not consider the request as presented, but that if placed before them as made to the executive officers of the Company by the department, they might be prepared to consider the request to cancel their contract with YORKVILLE and BROCKTON, but not the one to erect lamps at a greater distance than 150 feet apart. The Committee having declined to present the request for modifications in any other form, further action was in writing, no further action was taken.
