THE PLAGUE'S PROGRESS.

THOUSANDS OF NEW CASES AND DEATHS.

Marseilles More Heavily Affected Than Reported.—The Western Presses Who Suffer—People Reluctant to Madrid.

LONDON, Aug. 20.—The majority of the reports received here give the number of deaths from cholera at Marseilles almost double that officially announced. A despatch to Reuters' Telegraph company says the sanitary condition of the city is alarming and that the epidemic is extending northward.

The only wealthy persons in Spain who have been attacked by the cholera are public officials who are compelled to visit the hot-beds of infection. Many people are returning to Madrid which they consider safer than the province.

Seventeen hundred deaths have been reported to-day.

PROTECTION IN FRANCE.

As Result Is to Cement Germany and Austria-Hungary.

LONDON, Aug. 20.—A Paris despatch says: Count Kalnoky and Prince Bismarck have agreed upon the basis of future negotiations for the admission of Austria-Hungary to the customs union of the three major powers.

The Prussian minister of commerce, who was visiting the Pest exhibition, has received the customs union as long as France admitted cereals free.

THE BRANCH IN CHINA.

The Native Delegation Submits to the Invader.

PARIS, Aug. 20.—Letters from Tonquin say that the treaty of Tientsin is a dead letter so far as the evacuation of the country by the Chinese is concerned. The Austrians would never have entered the country unless they were forming a strong army of irregulars and preparing to attack the French.

Phuc, chief of the Black Flag, has offered his services to the French to suppress piracy and robbery in the Gulf of Tonquin.

THE PRISONER SENT TO SIX MONTHS.

BOMBAY, Aug. 20.—A supposed prisoner, "Father Knott," by name, who was arrested at Kochi on the Malabar coast, on suspicion of being a spy, has been sentenced to six months' imprisonment.

During the examination the prisoner had been in Egypt and acquainted with other spies, but refused to answer further questions.

THE PAYMENT OF GERMAN DEBITES.

PARIS, Aug. 20.—M. Rottine, who was expelled from Alsace-Lorraine, declared that his name was erased from the list of names in May.

The German government prosecuted the socialist members of the Reichstag, who accepted gratuitous support during the election campaign.

ENGLAND DEMONSTRATES.

PARIS, Aug. 20.—The Intransigent Henri Rochefort's paper, states that England has instructed Lord Lyons, the British ambassador to France, to inform M. De Freycinet, the minister for foreign affairs, of Rochefort's attempt to incite the Parisians against Lord Lyons in regard to the Caroline Islands, which the British in Egypt of Olivier Pain.

THE FRENCH PARTY'S CAMPAIGN.

DUBLIN, Aug. 20.—Mr. Farnell has summoned the members of the Irish Parliamentary party to meet in the city on the 25th inst., to consider what plan shall be adopted to rally the party in the approaching electoral campaign.

SPAIN'S FEET RESEMBLED.

PARIS, Aug. 20.—It is stated that the King of Spain, in order to show his displeasure at the assumption by Germany of the control of the Canary Islands, has resigned the honorary colonelcy of the regiment of German Uhlanes, which was some time ago bestowed upon him.

IRISH TENANTS ON THE RICK.

LIMERICK, Aug. 20.—The Earl of Devon has finally made an offer to ten of his tenants to grant their demand for a reduction of 30 per cent. in rent. The tenants will decide to-day whether to pay or resist. A defense fund is being raised, and much excitement prevails.

THE RIGHT KIND OF IMMIGRANTS.

A Scheme for Bringing British Agriculturalists into the World.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.—Prof. Tanner, of London, government examiner of agricultural classes in England, is in the city on business with the department of agriculture, and also on his way to the Northwest.

MONMOUTH PARK, N.J., Aug. 20.—Interest was so entirely centered on the match to-day between the Dwyer Bros' famous mare Miss Woodford and Ed. Corrigan's equally famous horse and the other races were almost entirely disregarded. It will be remembered that on the occasion of the triangular contest last Tuesday between Miss Woodford, Freeland and Pierre Lorillard's imported black colt, Freeland won after an exciting struggle by the shortest of heads. To-day the contest was if anything more keen and the interest even greater.

CHOLERA IN ST. BRITAIN

SIXTH YEAR

A SEVERE CASE OCCURS ON THE MESS.

Seven deaths at Gibraltar - A threat to stop the supplies of the Garrison and the People - A Case of Cholera Increasing in Spain.

LONDON, Aug. 21. - A girl 7 years of age died at Widnes, on the Mersey, to-day, of English cholera of the worst type.

TORONTO, Aug. 21. - Two new cases of cholera have been reported here yesterday.

GIBRALTAR, Aug. 21. - Quarantine on vessels arriving from Portuguese ports has been abolished.

The seven deaths from cholera at Gibraltar up to date are all within the Spanish lines.

Madrid, Aug. 21. - Throughout Spain yesterday there were 5104 new cases of cholera and 1044 deaths.

The Canaries islands caused by a fear of cholera to a panic.

Rotterdam, Aug. 21. - There were 259 deaths here from cholera during last night.

SPAIN FEEL WEATH

Over Germany's Annexation of the Canaries.

Madrid, Aug. 21. - The reply of Germany to Spain's protest in reference to the former's annexation of the Canaries islands has been received by the government here.

It is couched in friendly terms and is the German government offers to submit the claims of Spain to the arbitration of a third power.

It is reported here that two Spanish war ships have sailed for the Gulf of Mexico.

The feeling in Madrid is very bitter because of her assumption of the possession of these islands is as bitter as a cause alarm.

A meeting of the geographical society last night discussed the question of a hostile demonstration to be made against the German embassy, and in consequence a body of policemen were detailed to guard the building.

A patriotic demonstration against Germany because of her action in connection with the Canaries islands will, it is expected, be held on Saturday.

The irritation against Germany increases hourly. The official press is more indignant than the popular press.

The newspapers generally advocate reprisals. Count von Solms-Sonnenbuhl, the German minister in Spain, has just returned from visiting the theatres and avoiding the public promenades and places of amusement.

It is generally expected that the commercial and diplomatic relations existing between Spain and Germany unless Germany abandons her claims will be severed.

ALMOST AN ENGAGEMENT.

Narrow Avoidance of a Conflict Between Russia and the Afghan.

LONDON, Aug. 21. - A despatch from Meshed states that a collision between Russian and Afghan troops recently occurred on the 19th inst. at Karatope, eighteen miles from Chaman Baid.

Some Russian troops were ordered to Karatope and the Afghan troops there stood to their arms.
