The following is cited as a typical illustration : Of three children exposed to a case of smallpox at the same time, one had been vaccinated and the others not. The former escaped entirely, but on the fourteenth day after exposure both the latter were attacked with the usual febrile symptoms. One of them was at once vaccinated, but the other resisted the operation. On the third day after vaccination it was evident that the sfter vaccination it was evident that the operation had been successful, and both diseases ran their course together until the eighth day, when the smallpox pustules began to dry up and the child rapidly recovered. The unvaccinated child died on the twelfth day. 



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

Evidence as to Obscene Language Regard ing Nunneries-The Case About to

At the Central prison investigation yesterday John Hague testified that he had visited the prison as a grand juror last year and had found everything in a atisfactory condition. The food was good

and the prisoners seemed to be contented, William Bradt, foreman for Brandon & Company in the paint shop at the rison, denied using the obscene language about nunneries that he had been charged with using by prisoners Kelly and Haselin. He had merely said there was "a number of fine-looking young women in convents who ought to be outside." Prisener Alexander Macdonald corrobor-

License inspector Awde swore that he could not remember who had given him the information about the bad meat which he had seized in Park's warehouse in July 1883. The meat had been spoiled in the

Warden Massie recalled, said that the instructions given the guards are never to report a man unless it is absolutely neces-The guards first report the prisoner and on the second offence the warden looks into the man's previous recordat the prison. He thus very soon got a knowledge of the He thus very soon got a knowledge of the man's character. The warden is not always informed as to the time of the inspector's visit. Sometimes when the inspector has not finished his work he says, "I will be back to morrow." The punishments were all entered in the punishment book at first, but they soon became so numerous that he adopted the system of filing printed punishment cards. The warden gave his version of the alleged excessive pundahment of certain prisoners, in most cases directly contradicting their evidence, and characterizing them as incorrigibly bad men. In regard to the Fay case, he said that on investigation it was understood that on investigation it was understood that the theft of the extra ration of bread by Fay was premeditated, for the purpose of raising a disturbance. The surgeon testified to Fay's fitness to undergo the festified to Fay's fitness to undergo the punishment, and was present during the administration of the lashes. Five of the twenty strokes were remitted by the warden on Fay's promising to behave himself properly in future. After the lashes were given Fay's back was not cut, and he immediately went to work of his own accord. He is now in the Central on another charge and under a different name, and is a well-behaved prisoner. In regard to the removal of plotures from the cells, Mr. Massie said that obscene pictures had been discovered on the backs of the frames and shat consequently he had ordered them to that consequently he had ordered them to be taken away. GIBRALTAR, Aug. 21.—Quarantine on vessels arriving from Portuguese ports has been abolished. The troops are in excellent health. No cases of cholera have been reported for several days. There have been altogether seven deaths from cholera have

here.
The seven deaths from cholera at Gibraltar up to date are all within the Spanish lines. The government of Gibraltar is about to impose two days quarantine against all arrivals from the country. It is reported that if this is done, the Spaniards in spite of the opposition of their government will retaliate by cutting Gibraltar off from all supplies from the towns.

MADRID, Aug. 21.—Throughout Spain yesterday there were 5104 new cases of cholera and 1644 deaths. oholera and 1644 deaths.

The excitement among the people of the Canary islands caused by a fear of cholera amounts to a panic. They now refuse to permit any persons from Spain to land. They made an exception in favor of the new governor and allowed him to come whore, but received him with rictous demonstrations and threw stones at him. The local authorities have resigned, and many people have fled to the interior in fear of the approach of the scourge. To day to soldiers occupy the streets and all the public buildings.

ROTTERDAM, Aug. 21.—There were 25 deaths here from cholera during last night.

SPAIN VERY WRATH Over Germany's Annexation of the Car

MADRID, Aug. 21,-The reply of Ger many to Spain's protest in reference to the former's annexation of the Caroline islands has been received by the government here. former's annexation of the Caroline islands has been received by the government here. It is couched in friendly terms' and in it the German government offers to submit the claims of Spain to the Carolines to a fair examination. It is reported here that two Spanish war ships have occupied Yap, the chief island of the Caroline group. The feeling in Madrid against Germany because of her assumption of the possession of these islands is so bitter as to cause alarm. At a meeting of the geographical society last night various members made speeches violently denouncing the action of Germany. Their remarks were received with applause. Fears are entertained that a hostile demonstration will be made against the German embassy, and in consequence a body of policemen has been detailed to guard that building. A patriotic demonstration against Germany because of her action in connection with the Caroline islands will, it is expected, be made here next Sunday.

The irritation against Germany increases hourly. The official press is more indignant over the seizure of the Caroline islands than the opposition press. The newspapers generally advocate reprisals. Count Von Solms Sonnewalde, the German ambassador to Spain, now abstains from visiting the theatres and avoids the public promenades and places of amusement. It is semi-

theatres and avoids the public promenades and places of amusement. It is semi-officially stated that the government intends to repudiate the commercial and diplomatic relations existing between Spain and Germany unless Germany abandons her claim to the Carolines.

Senor Carvajal, in an address before the Spanish African society to-day denounced Germany for trespassing upon Spanish rights. The society has decided to reassemble and pass resolutions demanding that Spain take energetic action against German occupation of the Caroline islands.

Bismarck's reply to the Spanish protest is considered evasive and unsatisfactory, although he professes to be willing to submit Spain's claims to the examination of arbitrators.

ALMOST AN ENGAGEMENT.

Narrow Aveidance of a Conflict Between Russians and Afghans. London, Aug. 21.—A despatch from Meshed states that a collision between Russian and Afghan posts nearly occurred Russias and Afghan posts nearly occurred on the 13th inst. at Karatepe, eighteen miles from Chamani Baid. Some Russian troops, the despatch says, approached Karatepe and the Afghan troops there stood to their arms. The Russian officer when he saw this ordered the troopers to unsling their carbines and he was shot and severely wounded by the accidental discharge of one of these weapons. Before the nature of the accident was ascertained there was considerable excitement and confusion, which, however, subsided as soon as the truth was known. The Afghans detained the Russians until they received an order which, however, subsided as soon as the truth was known. The Afghans detained the Russians until they received an order from Herat to let them go. During the detention the Afghans treated the wounded Russian officer with great kindness. As hurried investigation of the occurrence was made on both sides. The Russian commander exonerated the Afghans and promised that the troopers should not again advance beyond Chamani Baid.

THE PROTECTION OF GIRLS.

Meeting of the National Conference in LONDON, Aug. 21.-A meeting of this National conference for the protection of young girls was held in St. James hall to-day. George William Erskine Russell, son of Lord Charles James Fox Russell, presided. The conference resolved to form vigilance societies everywhere throughout the country to enforce existing laws against immorality and to labor for the improvement of all legislation designed to repress or minal vice.

The Tariff on Telegrams. Berlin, Aug. 21.—The international telegraph conference has approved of a telegraph conference has approved of a peoposal embodying a modification of the German proposal which was rejected the other day. The latter called for a uniform rate of four or five cents per word for telegraph messages sent to and from places within Europe. The proposition now approved is for a uniform tariff on telegrams between terminal points which are in Europe and telegrams in transit in Europe to and from points outside, but at rates considerably higher than those advocated by the German chancellor. Germany's efforts, however, to have cable tariffs to and from countries beyond Europe, especially to India, China and Australia, materially reduced from the present high rates are likely to prove successful.
