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TORONTO'S IMPURE WATER.

WHAT THE PROVINCIAL BOARD OF HEALTH HAS TO SAY.

The City Fathers Are Trifling With A Grave Danger—The People Drink Boiled Sewage—Filtration Recommended—Presentations In View of a Cholera Outbreak—The Board Seeks Fresh Powers.

The quarterly meeting of the Provincial Board of Health was held yesterday. Dr. Cassidy, the president, was in the chair. The other members present were Mrs. McDonald, Vaux, and Secretary Bryce.

A good deal of routine business was transacted. The report of the Ontario Sanitary Medical Association on vital statistics was reviewed. Ample correspondence was suggested as to the amendments of the acts on sanitation and the public health.

The chairman's Annual Address. It stated that the most striking fact in the sanitary world is the deepened and universal dread of cholera, both in Europe and America.

Dr. Cassidy then gave the report of the Ottawa conference, the proceedings at which have already been reported in this paper.

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ABRAMS RELEASED.

The New York Jew Liberated—He Went Into Business In Toronto.

Harry Abrams, the Polish Jew, hailing from New York, was arrested in this city on the 24th ult., was released yesterday morning. His captors, Neville, McWhilney & Bidley accomplished this by laying before Justice Marsh at Osgoode Hall the affidavits of Abrams and J. Nathan, his brother-in-law, to the effect that the defendant Abrams had no intention of leaving Canada.

Warehouses All Busy With Spring Trade.
The lumber interest will boom. Grain dealers anxiously waiting for the 10th of March. Millinery houses invaded - Drygoods in Active Demand - Grocers and Shoes, Hardware and Boots Trades - Wheat Values Decline - Provisions Steady - Trade Good.

WAITING FOR STATISTICS

The wheat situation has got into such a pass that more statistics are urgently wanted. Operators have been fed with statistics more liberally than their capacity for more is evinced by the hungry looks cast towards the crop report to be issued about March 10. They know what the total crop estimate is, what the deliveries have been, but what everyone wants to know is how much do the farmers in America have, and about 60,000,000 bushels more than that of 1937. Bears note to this mountain as a barrier to high prices. The bulls hope, however, that these large deliveries will be a relief to their fears. They look forward to a statement which will show that the annual deliveries have depleted stocks in farmers' hands. Some authorities place stocks in farmers' hands as low as 70,000,000 bushels. If stocks are under 100,000,000 the statement will be better than 188,000,000, and it is usual to see prices much higher than at present when stocks stand at that amount at this season of the year. The quantity in farmers' hands on March 1 last year was 170,000,000 bushels. The quantities in farmers' hands on March 1 for the last three years were: 1937... 171,000,000 bushels; 1936... 170,000,000 bushels; 1935... 169,000,000 bushels. There are liberal stocks of corn, oats and rye in sight, but those of barley are only of an average of 100,000,000 bushels in the United States and Canada, against 193,000,000 in 1937 and 193,000,000 in 1936. Oats stand at 450,000,000 against 3,800,000,000 in 1937 and 3,800,000,000 in 1936. Wheat stands at 1,300,000,000 against 1,300,000,000 in 1937 and 1,300,000,000 in 1936. Figures on wheat.
