THE EXHIBITION REVIEWED.

At the time of our last issue the interesting event was in active progress, and we then gave our readers some notes of what had transpired from the start until the formal opening by the speaker, His Honor Judge McDonald.

Passing from bread to butter is easy and natural, and that is what we find in the next class, consisting of Dairy products, and twenty-five packages or samples are offered for competition.

Going through the exhibits in detail class one, that of horses, first claims our attention. In this class forty-four entries have been made. Among them are some very fine specimens.

We next come upon the cattle, in which class the entries number one hundred and eleven. There are some really fine specimens, notably the pure bred Durham shown by R. Sanford.

Our attention is next called to the swine, and we ascertain that the only eight farmers in the two counties possess the requisite stock of patience and perseverance required to transport these proverbially contrary brutes from their homes to this exhibition.

We now enter the building and look over the roots and vegetables, in which are two hundred and eighty-seven samples and varieties. Taking the potatoes as the most important, we find a remarkably good collection, in which Early Rose, Silver Dollars and Erolina figure conspicuously.

With poultry close the outdoor exhibits, thirty-nine entries comprising the lot. Some fine coops are shown by H. Keeler, of Dartmouth, by which the fancy variety are well represented.

Grain and flax seeds come next on the list, and here are one hundred and forty-two samples, of which fall and spring wheats are in largest number, and the berries of which look plump, bright and heavy.

JUDGE McDONALD'S OPENING SPEECH.

J. B. Mills, Esq., introducing the speaker of the day, said that in response to the request of the committee of management the Hon. James McDonald had kindly consented to inaugurate the proceedings.

Mr. McDonald, coming forward, said: "I am much honored to appear before you today, and to preside over the opening of this exhibition. It is not without some apprehensions that I have accepted of this honor, but I have no doubt that I shall be able to do justice to the occasion."
