The national grange of the United States, a body representing the farming interest of the entire country, at its recent annual session, adopted a resolution in favor of the payment by the national government of a bounty on all agricultural products sent out of the country.

After ample justice had been done to the shipping carrying these products. This is equivalent to a demand on the part of our farmers for a bounty from the dominion government on apples shipped to England, as well as for assistance in the shape of a subsidy or bounty to the steamers carrying them, so as to secure cheaper rates of freight.

Without stopping to discuss the wisdom of such a policy, or the justice of attempting by this means to level up the protection to the agricultural, as well as to the various other interests, it certainly would be interesting to note how such bounties would be regarded by the countries to which these bounty-helped products are exported.

ABUL HAMIL'S VERY EXISTENCE IS A REPROACH TO HIS COUNTRY. London, November 30.—Notwithstanding the protest of the powers having signed the Convention of Constantinople, the proclamation of paper reforms, will not quiet the rising public wrath directed against the Christians of Asia Minor.

The Sultan is personally responsible for the whole series of massacres. He explains that the late outrages commenced as soon as the sultan accepted the reform applying to six vilayets, giving Christians rights that depended on their numbers.
