A FATAL ACCIDENT IN BRIDGETOWN

**Mr. Fred R. Beckwith Fell From an Electric
Light Pole and Died of Injuries Received**

A fatal accident occurred here at about 1.30 Saturday morning when Fred R. Beckwith, son of J. W. Beckwith fell from an electric light pole on Queen St., striking his head on the curbstone. He was found by Harry Egan, who heard the fall, and crash of the street light bracket which was struck by the ladder on which Mr. Beckwith was standing. Two physicians were immediately summoned, and he was removed to his father's residence nearby. He never regained consciousness, passing away at nine o'clock the same morning.

Mr. Beckwith was business manager of Bridgetown's electric light and clerk in his father's dry goods store. He had evidently noticed that there was something wrong with a transformer, or a short circuit, which caused him to get a ladder to look after the trouble. It is not thought that he received any shock as he was protected with rubber gloves, etc.

The affair has cast a gloom over the entire town, for the deceased was popular with a large circle of acquaintances.

Mr. Beckwith was a member of the Bridgetown Board of Trade, a public spirited citizen and took a deep interest in the welfare of his native town.

He was for many years a member of the Methodist Choir and several years its leader. He had a splendid voice and had rendered valuable assistance in many local entertainments. He was a Past Master of Rothsay Lodge, A. F. and A. M., and a member of Court Valley C. O. F.

Mr. Beckwith, who was in his 38th year, leaves a widow and two children. He is also survived by his father, his mother having died last July, one brother Doctor W. H. Beckwith, of Halifax, and one sister, Mrs. R. W. Elliott, of Dartmouth.

Funeral took place from the Methodist Church yesterday afternoon and, notwithstanding the very disagreeable weather, was largely attended. The services were conducted by Rev. W. J. W. Swetnam, pastor of the church, assisted by Rev. E. Underwood, rector of St. James parish. A beautiful and impressive Masonic service at the grave was conducted by the officers and members of Rothsay Lodge, several visiting brethren being present. The floral tributes were beautiful, including some very expensive ones from various societies, relatives and friends.

The pall bearers were Dr. F. S. Anderson, Ronald Whiteway, W. A. Warren, C. B. Longmire, Dr. M. E. Armstrong and Harry L. Bustin.

VALLEY FRUIT GROWERS MEET

Discussed Apple Shipments and Cause of So Many Barrels Being Reported Slack.

KENTVILLE, Dec. 12—There was a good attendance of representatives of the different fruit companies of the Valley at the quarterly meeting held here this afternoon. President Bishop, of Lawrencetown, was in the chair.

The principal business of the morning session was the consideration of the report of progress submitted by the Board of Management. This was the first quarterly report of the eighth year of operation of the United Fruit Companies of Nova Scotia, Limited.

The fruit report on apple shipment brought out considerable dis-

ussion as to the cause of so many barrels being reported slack this year. This seemed to be accounted for by the quick ripening of all fall fruit and its early decay. The barrel question also brought out much criticism as to the present large barrel, its shape preventing storage in tiers in warehouses and cars over four tiers without toppling over. The discussion also showed that the barrels manufactured this year varied very much in size, there being a difference as great as eleven shillings when sold by weight. Fruit growers were anxious to have the legal barrel so that manufacturers of staves and coopers would be compelled to make a barrel of the proper capacity.

The report on potato shipment showed that the company had marketed 47,752 barrels to date, with prices net realizing as high as \$5.90 and one shipment, which had just been reported, proved disastrous.

The report on flour feed and fertilizers was also adopted. The company hopes to get its fertilizer the coming year at a lower price than last season, though present quotations are the same.

The meeting adjourned to meet after dinner, before the mass meeting of farmers to be addressed by Hon. T. A. Crerar, ex-minister of Agriculture, and Mr. George Chipman, of Winnipeg, editor of the Grain Growers' Guide.

In order that the department of immigration and colonization may have at its command authentic accounts of the experiences of successful settlers in various parts of Canada it has decided to offer cash prizes for letters or articles not exceeding two thousand words written by settlers in each of the nine Canadian provinces. The articles will be judged by a committee to be appointed by Hon. J. A. Calder, minister of immigration and colonization, and should be mailed not later than February 14th, 1920, to the director of publicity for the department. Three cash prizes will be given, one of seventy five dollars, one of fifty dollars and one of twenty five dollars, in each of the nine provinces.

"It is explained that the competition is not a literary contest, the official announcement stating that: "Literary style, correct spelling, etc., will not be considered essential. Tell your story in your own words." It is believed that the procuring of a number of graphic and truthful stories of how success has been won from the soil in all parts of the Dominion will do much to contribute to a future

MARINE NEWS

Schr. Cora Gertie arrived at Digby last Monday from Freeport with 10,000 lbs fresh haddock and 21,000 lbs salt pollock for the Maritime Fish Corporation.

There was a decrease of over \$800,000 in the value of sea fish caught during the month of October as compared with the same month of last year, according to the Department of the Naval Service notes on sea fishing results for the month.

CONFEDERATION BETWEEN CANADA AND WEST INDIES

Newfoundland, Too, Should Be Brought Into Closer Relations with the Dominion, Says Harry J. Crowe

In connection with the suggested confederation of Newfoundland and the West Indies with the Dominion of Canada, the following has been handed to the Canadian Press by one of the promoters thereof: Harry J. Crowe, formerly of Bridgetown, recognized as the foremost champion of full confederation for Canada, the British West Indies and Newfoundland, has just left on a special mission to the ancient colony the exact scope and purpose of which is not yet disclosed. His well considered views, as to the pressing desirability of a closer union between the Dominion and the British West Indies, are of peculiar interest at the present juncture high prices of tropical fruits in Canada being a cause of much perturbation among housewives of the Dominion, who do not see why fruits from the West Indies, cannot be sold to them cheaper than at ten times the prices paid the producers as is now the case. The explanation is simple. Canadians are at the mercy of the American Fruit Trust, largely through Canada's neglected opportunities of getting closer to British sources of fruit production in this hemisphere. Speaking on this text Mr. Crowe, prior to his departure for Newfoundland said:

"The importance of these tropical islands is not properly appreciated in Canada. We Canadians at present import \$198,500,000 worth of tropical products yearly, the greater part from or rather through the United States, thus piling up exchange against us. Our imports from the West Indies directly total but \$22,000,000 annually. A large part of the 300,000 tons of shipping of the new Canadian government mercantile marine could not be better employed than in direct trade with the British West Indies, and would have the coincident advantage of supplying a new line of trade between the West Indies and Britain via Canada, even without political union the tariff preference can be made a potent force for commercial union between Canada and the Indies, although, of course we would not get maximum benefits until political union was consummated. There must be political union to make commercial ties binding and permanent. Experience has proven the fact. But as England can consume all the tropical products Canada does not absorb, the tariff preference would provide return cargoes for the steamers carrying fruit, etc., from the island, thus producing true empire interchange."

SEEKING TRADE

"Under present conditions the Canadian national marine ships are taking large cargoes to Jamaica and bringing sugar to Canada but this trade is in its infancy. Canadians are active in seeking trade in Europe, where they must face the keenest competition, while in the British West Indies, at their very doors, they have a market of two million British consumers now importing from the United States much that we produce and exporting much that we require and which we now buy through United States middlemen. The longer we neglect our West Indies opportunities, the longer we will necessarily pay tribute to the American Fruit Trust, now exercising a virtual monopoly of the trade. We wish the Canadian National marine every success in its West Indian trade and hope it may prove but the precursor of much larger business, when a federation of the Dominion and the British gems of the Antilles is accomplished. In political union is commercial strength."

This state of affairs was brought on through an accident in June, 1913, and had turned to what the doctors called "Only a trinket, perhaps. But it is the Victoria Cross of Canadian Womanhood."

MEMORIAL CROSSES

Canada is to distribute memorial crosses to the wives and mothers of the men who lost their lives in the great war. The token is to be a simple—silver cross an inch and a quarter square, designed to include as its features the Crown and the Royal Cipher, the Maple Leaf and the Laurel. On it will be engraved the name, number and rank of the soldier or sailor commemorated.



Why it was Organized and Its Objects

We have been requested by the Bridgetown Branch of the G. W. V. A. to publish the following letters:

Veterans & Comrades—
The Great War Veterans' Association was organized to forward your interests and the interests of the relatives and dependents of these comrades, ever present with us in spirit, but who sleep now in Flanders awaiting the grand reunion when we shall all have gone "West."

The same forces and influences with which the soldier survivor of earlier wars had to contend are now apparently about to confront us.

Indifference as to the fate or prosperity of the man who was ready to lay down his life for his Country was after other wars only too early apparent—the same thing is likely to happen in respect to the survivor of the greatest of all wars.

Our association, if united, — if strong — if it includes in its membership all returned soldiers, will make a repetition of history in this regard absolutely impossible.

For this reason I ask all returned soldiers to become members of the Great War Veterans' Association.

It is your duty. If you refrain you weaken us and our great cause — if you join with us you strengthen us and weaken the forces of those who selfishly oppose your interests.

We will attain our goal the more quickly if we all unite and work together.

The country needs your young blood, your vitality and your broad outlook and tolerant mind, in its development.

It is the duty of every returned man in Nova Scotia and in all Canada, who has not yet associated himself with us, to do so at once, because the two great reasons alone which I have mentioned demand and require the assistance and co-operation of ALL those sincere and courageous men, who as citizens respond to their Country's call, and who now as citizens of vision wide and far and of earnest purpose must continue to strive for the good of that same Country.

Comrades, these things can be accomplished only by the union of all of you who have this common cause at heart.

There cannot be one of you who would stand outside and believe that his great task, so bravely undertaken five years ago and so gloriously supported through the red years of war, is completed.

The event of a few weeks ago at Ottawa must convince you of the necessity of union and strength; if you desire to assist your comrades or dependents who need the same, the events of the days and weeks and months now passing by must convince you that your influence is required in your Country's behalf in the trying days of the present and those to come.

You cannot do these things individually.

The Great War Veterans' Association will carry on and with your help can and will be the bulwark of our nation.

The Prince of Wales was given a great reception on his arrival in England. Canadians will be glad to learn that he has reached home safely.






