BOOK AND TRACT COMMITTEE.

The monthly meeting of this Committee was held on the 6th of April, 1868. Present—Rov. 1r. Beaven, The Provest and Rev. W. Bolt.

1. The Bov. J. Mockridge applied, with the Lord Bishop's sanction, for a set of service books for St. George's Church, Pickering, and for tracts and books for his Sunday School. Granted a Ito set of service books, and tracts and books to the amount of \$5.

2. The Rev. B. S. Hosken applied for service books for the Mission of Fencion Falls and Bobenygeon, and for tracts for general distribution. Granted a 4to set of service books, and (if required) an 8vo Bible and Prayer Book; with books and tracts to the amount of \$10.

The next meeting of the Book and Tract Committee will be held in the Church Society's Board Room on Monday, the 11th instant, at 4, p.m.

GORE AND WELLINGTON DISTRICT BRANCH OF THE CHURCH SOCIETY.

The Annual Meeting of the above named Branch of the Church Society, was held in St. James's Hall, Hamilton, on Tuesday evening 31st March last. The following was the report read by the Sccretary, the Rev. J. G. Geddes, which exhibits an encouraging advancement in the receipts of the Society, and in the general interest which the great mission and work of the Church of England are

eliciting among the people:-

"The Gore and Wellington District Branch Association of the Church Society in presenting their twenty-fifth annual report, are happy in being able to state that the results of the parochial collections, recently made, are of a very encouraging Deputations appointed by the Bishop of the Diocese have traversed their various fields of labor, attending missionary meetings and delivering addresses on behalf of the Society. They were invariably received with much kindness and hospitality; and it is believed that the information they were able to impart, and the stirring appeals they made to the Christian zeal and liberality of the members of the Church have been productive, under God's blessing, of much success. twenty-seven parochial associations, twenty-one have reported; six remain yet to report. When the whole amount shall have been paid in, there will be an excess in the present year's receipts over those of the previous year of about \$134. The latter reached the sum of \$2,510.22; the present year that of \$2,644. The number of missionaries participating in payments from this fund is seven, and the amount required for their payment is \$1,680, the people among whom they minister contribute the rest. The sum of \$270 is paid to the Parent Society for fiftyfour incorporated members. A further sum of \$593.66 is remitted for the general purposes of the Society, being one-fourth of the amount collected, leaving the sum of \$1,780.34 to meet the payment to missionaries of \$1,580, and a balance after payment made of \$100.34.

Several changes have taken place during the past year indicative of the growth and prosperity of the Church. The old mission of Elora and Fergus has been divided, the Rev. Mr. Cooper, formerly missionary at Reverly having been appointed to Fergus, the Rev. Mr. Thomson retaining Elora, the oldest part of the mission. Mr. Cooper has been succeeded at Beverly by the Rev. Mr. Harrison and Mr. Westney of Binbrook by the Rev. Mr. Gibson. The contributions in Binbrook and Fergus have been greatly enlarged, and a ffesh impetus apparently been given to the Church in those localities. There are yet important fields of labor which might be occupied were the men and means forthcoming; but alas, to the reproach of the Church, be it spoken, so inadequate are the means generally throughout this Diocese to meet the necessities of the Church, it has even been deemed a prudent precaution to propose a reduction in the salaries of the missionaries, none of whom receive more than \$600 per annum. Your committee trust such a disaster

may be averted, and that the Bishop's appeal to the lay members of the Church

may call forth a generous response.

Your committee cannot refrain from congratulating the Venerable the Archdeacon of Toronto upon the signal success of the Guelph Parochial Branch, standing as it does at the head, not only of all the parishes in these united Districts. but also in the whole Dioceze, the amount reported from Guelph being the handsome sum of \$516.40.

Your committee have heard with regret that some well-meaning but mistaken individuals have withheld their usual annual subscription to the Church Society, because of prejudices they entertain against the management of the Commutation Trust Committee. Were this management over so faulty and disastrous it would not furnish a reasonable excuse for crippling the missionary resources of the Society. But when we find on the contrary, that the funds of the Church of England have been so ably administered, their investments so judiciously made that the stipends of the clergy have been regularly paid, that the awards made by the late Chief Justice Macaulay, the Bishops of Toronto and Huron have been promptly carried out, a capital sum having been paid to the Diocese of Huron and the Diocese of Ontario sufficient to secure £400 per annum towards the Episcopal income in each Diocese reserving a similar capital sum for the Diocese of Toronto; When they further learn that at the end of the current year (if the interest be duly paid) there will be a surplus of \$1,500—thus enabling three or four more of the non-commuting clergy to participate in the benefits of the fund, and when they contrast with this state of things the fact that other religious bodies have lost the whole or the greater part of their funds by injudicious investment; the Methodists, for instance, by the failure of the Bank of Upper Canada, and the Scotch Church by the failure of the Commercial Bank—the committee are utterly at a loss to account for the strange perversity that will still maintain the idea of gross mismanagement, sufficient to shake the confidence of mercantile men.

At the close of the meeting, the following resolution was moved by the Rev.

Mr. Geddes, seconded by the Rev. Mr. Drinkwater, and

Resolved, that the thanks of the Association are due and are hereby tendered to the officers of the Society during the past year; and also to the collectors of the several parochial associations, upon whose efficiency and energy the success of the society so much depends; and that the following gentlemen be appointed for the ensuing year: The Rev. J. G. Geddes, Secretary; James Bancroft, Esq., Treasurer; that the members of the managing committee be the same as last year, with the following exceptions: W. J. Simcoe Kerr to be added to Wellington Square; Thomas French substituted for Mr. Farmer, in Glanford; D. Gallagher for Mr. Stewart, in Waterdown; W. McGivern added to St. Thomas; and Hamilton: Thomas Davis and John T. Carscallen, for Stoney Creek; that the Rev. Dr. Greene be the clerical and William Farmer the lay delegates to the mission board."

METHOD OF EXCITING AN INTEREST IN CHURCH MISSIONS.

The following remarks on this subject, by a Bishop of the American Church

carnestly engaged in the work are worthy of consideration :-

"I have over held it to be essential to excite and cherish the heart interest of the Church, that the work of missions, should be kept before the Church by the publication of reports. Acting on this principle down to the time of my consecration, I kept a journal, and regularly transmitted it to the board of missions. Other missionaries did the same and then it was that the most lively interest was taken in our foreign missions. So well am I convinced of this, that though my present position might probably excuse me from doing so, I shall, while God enables me, continue as formerly, to send you a monthly record."

Upon this, the Editor of the Spirit of Missions observes, "now here we have the testimony of one who has been thirty years engaged in missionary labor. And the view of the Bishop that "it is essential to excite and cherish the heart interest of the Church," that the missionaries should regularly report, was held quite as strongly as by others. Those who feel a real interest in their work need not be reminded of the standing rule of the committee that employs them: viz, that each missionary should report quarterly. They saw the benefit to their mission, to say nothing of the benefit to the Church at home, by their frequently reporting. Would that all our missionaries would imitate them and then there would be a greater interest felt in our missions than there is now. And certainly before any missionary complains of the want of interest at home, he should ask himself, Am I faithfully doing what is essential to excite and cherish a warm interest in my field of labor."—Com.

SUDDEN DEATH OF THE REV DR. LUNDY.

(From the Newburgh (N. Y.) Daily Journal.)

Rev. Dr. F. J. Lundy, of St. Paul's Church, of this city, who was stricken down by paralysis on Sunday, while officiating in that Church, died at one o'clock this morning, at his residence in Chambers Street, near First. As was his often expressed wish, he literally "died in the harness," for from the time he was taken from the Church he gave no token of consciousness until the time when his soul returned to the bosom of its God. When first stricken down, and his son ran to support him, he was able only by a faint pressure of the hand to indicate that he still recognized that son; for a moment there was a semi-consciousness, and then all was blank until the dread realities of eternity burst upon the dying saint's vision.

Dr. J. F. Lundy, was born in Lund, Yorkshire, England, September 22, 1814, and was therefore in the fifty-fourth year of his age at the time of his sudden removal from among us. He was graduated from the University of Oxford, from which institution he received the designation of D. C. L. He came to Canada in 1836, and was at once engaged as Head Master of the Quebec Classical College. He married in 1837, the second daughter of Hon. Jonathan Soule, Chief Justice of the Province of Canada. Their union was blessed by seven children, five of whom are still living. When McGill College was founded at Montreal, he was appointed Principal of that institution. From thence he removed to Niagara, where he became Assistant Rector of St. Mark's Church. In 1849, he was appointed Rector of St. Andrew's Church, Grimsby, Upper Canada, (now the Province of Ontario) where he remained until 1865-sixteen years. He then came to New York where he was for some time engaged in literary laborstranslating several works from the French, and contributing to the columns of the New York Times, and other journals. Subsequently he became Classical Master of the Mount Washington Collegiate Institute, and he also had charge temporarily of Christ Church, Elizabeth, N. J. In the latter part of the summer or early part of the fall of 1867, he was called to officiate as pastor of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in this City, during the absence of Rav. Hobart Chetwood, who was compolled to seek relief from his labors by reason of ill health. Here on Sunday last, while discharging his duty as a minister of God, at the very altar of God's Church, and before a congregation of the worshippers of God, Dr. Lundy

was stricken down by the cold hand of death.

The limited time at our command as well as our limited acquaintance with the deceased will preclude us from making here an adequate estimate of the character and abilities of Dr. Luady; this will no doubt be done by a hand better qualified than ours for the task. We may however be permitted to say that the Doctor, though hampered and afflicted with a hereditary disease which finally caused the death, was an indefatigable worker in behalf of whatever he considered the right. He was, we are assured, a preacher of unquestioned ability and eloquence. He was a man of fine literary tastes, and an enthusiast in sacred music, being himself a vocalist of no ordinary powers.
