## Explanation of the Articles in the Calendar.

These pages are calculated for Toronto and Quebec, and for ordinary purposes will serve with sufficient accuracy for every city in Canada.

**MOON'S PHASES.**—This Table gives the times for the two meridians when the moon passes the geocentric longitudes of 0°, 90°, 180° and 270° east of the sun. It gives also the times of her greatest and least distance from the earth.

**TWILIGHT.**—In this table are given the times at which twilight begins in the morning and ends in the evening, i. e., the times when the sun's centre is 18° below the horizon.

**GREATEST ELONGATION OF THE POLE STAR.**—This column gives the greatest azimuth of the Pole Star east or west from the meridian as observed at a place in latitude 45°. When the greatest elongation corresponding to any other latitude is required, the number given in the column should be corrected by means of the following table.

The 1st correction for the degrees of latitude is to be subtracted from the greatest elongation given in the calendar, or added to it, according as the degrees of latitude are less or greater than 45°.

The 2nd correction, which is always additive, is found by multiplying the number given in the third line of the table by the number of minutes in the latitude.

Thus for latitude 43° 20'...1st correction = -4 5"      2nd correction + 2.0 × 20 = + 40"

**THE PLANETS.**—The times of rising and setting of the five chief planets are calculated for Toronto, and are corrected for refraction. The times of culmination, although computed for the meridian of Toronto, will serve approximately for the whole of Canada. The meridian zenith distances, being designed merely to aid in finding the planets, have been given only to the nearest tenth of a degree, as seen from the latitude of Toronto.

When the planetary day is shorter than the mean solar day, and commences soon after the midnight of the preceding day, the planet will sometimes arrive a second time on the meridian before the expiration of the actual civil day. From analogous causes a planet will sometimes rise twice or set twice in the same civil day. When two culminations occur in the same day, or two risings or settings, the times of both are registered.

The times of the SUN'S RISING and SETTING are given for the upper limb, and are corrected for refraction both for Toronto and Quebec.

The MOON'S RISING is given from full to change, and her setting from change to full.

The MOON'S MERIDIAN ZENITH DISTANCES are given to the nearest tenth of a degree for Toronto. They are not corrected for parallax or refraction.

The column SUN ON MERIDIAN gives the time that a watch should shew when the shadow of a sun dial is on the noon mark.

**DECLINATION OF THE SUN AT APPARENT NOON.**—This column gives the sun's declination at the instant he passes the meridian of Toronto.

**MOON'S AGE.**—This column shews to the nearest tenth of a day the Moon's age at Toronto Noon.

The column, MOON ON THE MERIDIAN, gives the mean time at which the moon's centre passes the meridian of Toronto.

The column, UPPER TRANSIT OF POLE STAR shews for every day the mean time at which the Pole Star makes its upper transit across the meridian of Toronto. It passes in the morning from April 9th to October 8th, and in the evening for the rest of the year.

The five last columns, although computed for Toronto, will serve with sufficient accuracy for the whole of Canada.

The time at which the lower transit of the Pole Star occurs may be found by adding 11 h. 58 m. 2 s. to the time of its preceding upper transit.

From the time of the upper transit of the pole star may be found the time of its greatest western or eastern elongation, by adding or subtracting the constants given in the annexed Table.

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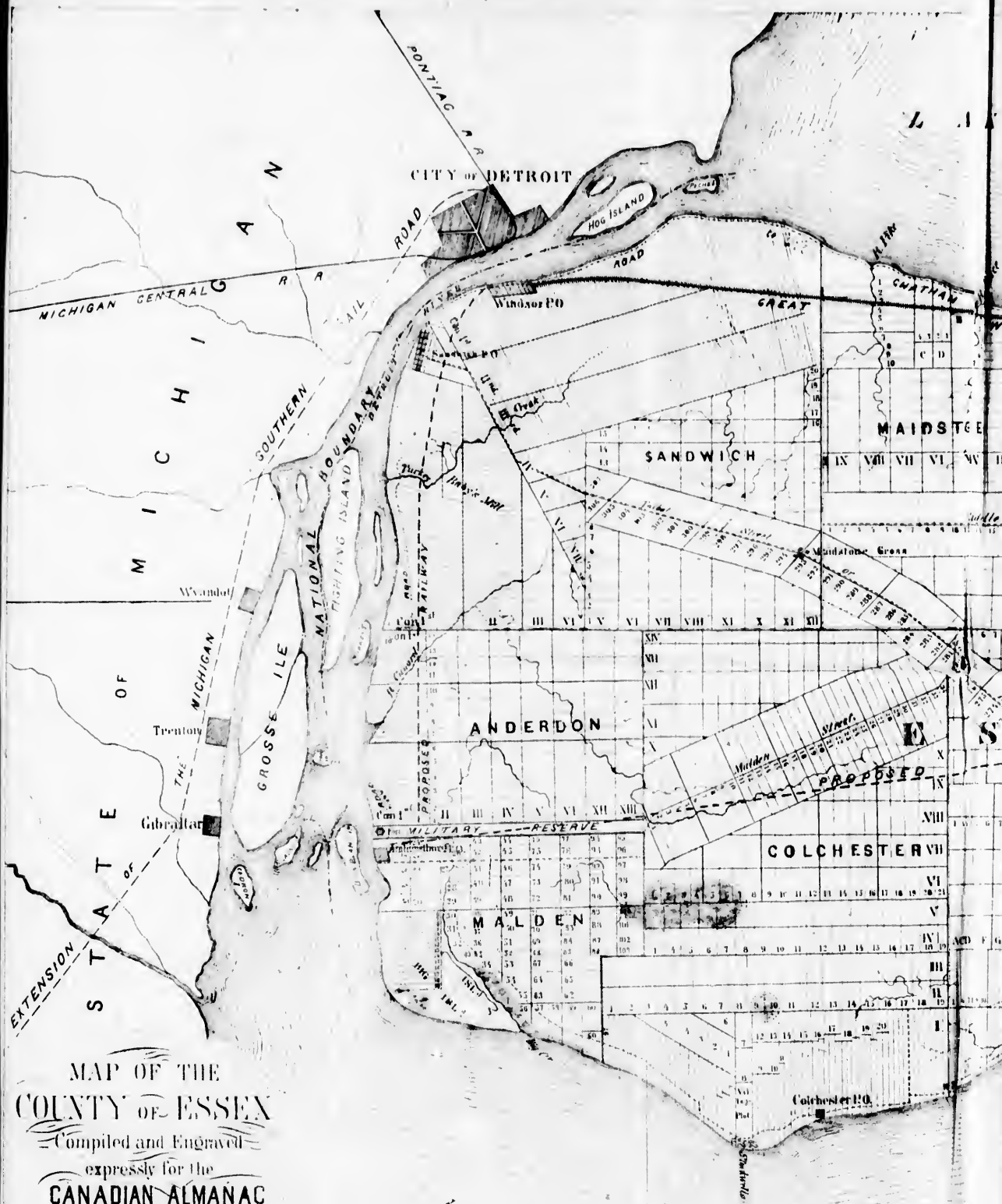

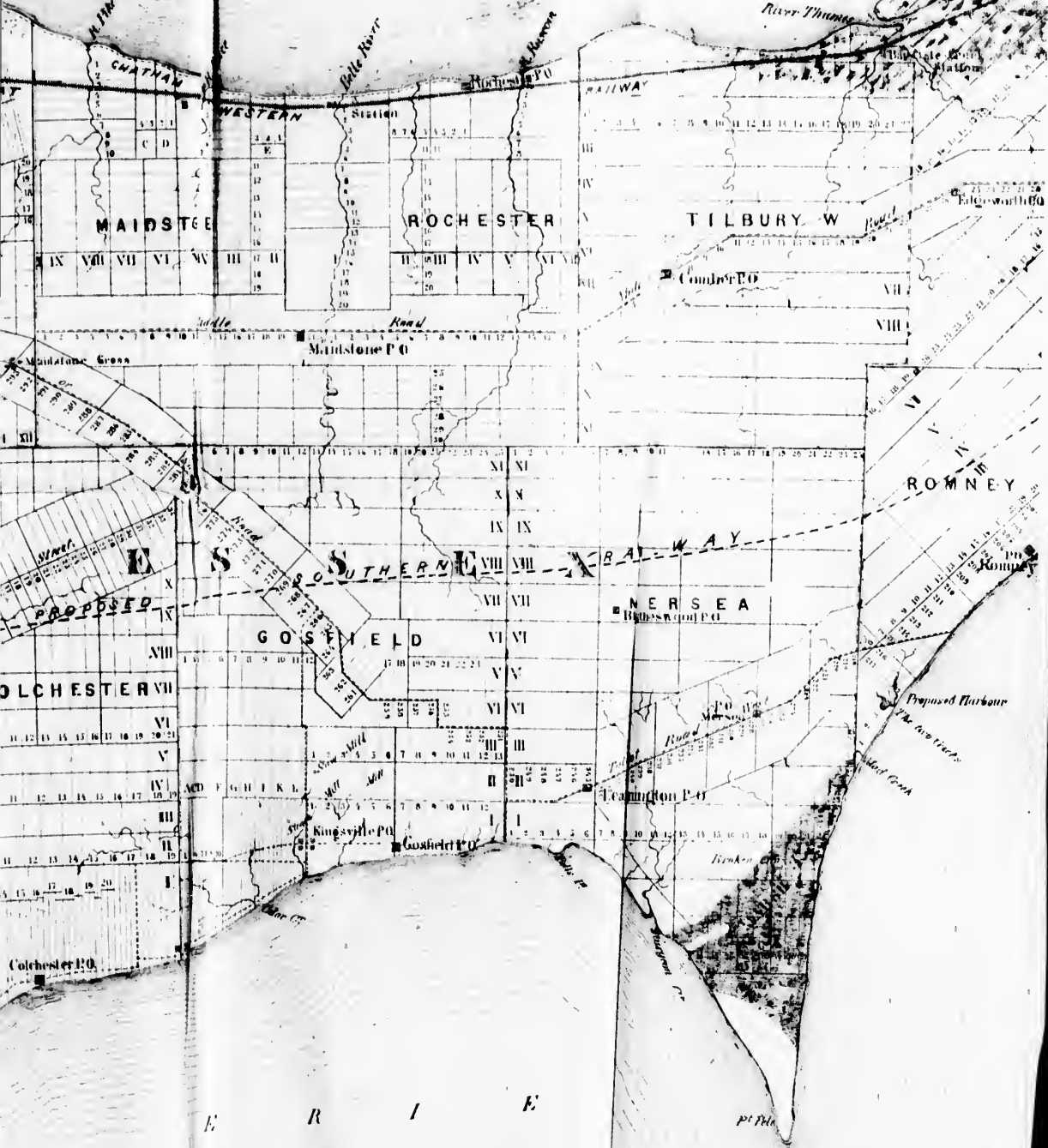
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From the times of the upper transit of the Pole Star may be derived, with the aid of the following table, the times of culmination, and of the rising and setting of the principal fixed stars that appear above the horizon of Toronto.

### Star Table.

To ascertain when any star found in the following table will be on the meridian, add the number in the left-hand column of figures to the preceding meridian transit of the pole star given in the calendar. To find the time of rising of a star, subtract the number opposite to it in the right-hand column of figures from the time of its meridian passage; for the setting of a star, add the same number to the time of its meridian passage. Those stars marked (.....) revolve in a circle of perpetual apparition, and do not rise or set at Toronto, or at places to the north of Toronto.

### Eclipses.

In the year 1859 there will be four Eclipses of the Sun, and two of the Moon.

I.—A partial Eclipse of the Sun, Feb. 2, invisible in Canada.

II.—A total Eclipse of the Moon, Feb. 16-17, visible in "

III.—A partial Eclipse of the Sun, Mar. 4, invisible in "

IV.—A partial Eclipse of the Sun, July 29, vis. in Canada.

V.—A total Eclipse of the Moon, Aug. 13, invisible in "

VI.—A partial Eclipse of the Sun, Aug. 27, invisible in "

#### I.—PARTIAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN, FEB. 2.

This Eclipse will be visible only in a small portion of the Southern Ocean, above the parallel of lat. 55° S. Magnitude of the greatest phase = 0.012, the diameter of the Sun being unity.

#### II.—TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE MOON, February 16-17.

The first contact with the shadow occurs at 121° from the northernmost point of the Moon's limb towards the East. Magnitude of the Eclipse (Moon's diameter = 1) = 1.693. Duration of total Phase, 1h. 37m. nearly.

Interval between first and last contact of Moon with shadow, 3h. 32m.

The following Table shows the hour and minute, civil local time, at which the different phases commence at certain stations on the morning of February 17th.

The termination of the different phases will not be visible at the Stations named above, as the Moon will at each of them set totally eclipsed.

### III.—PARTIAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN, March 4.

This Eclipse will be visible in parts of the North Pacific, North-West America, Siberia, and the Arctic Ocean. Magnitude of greatest phase = 0.249 (Sun's diameter = 1).

### IV.—PARTIAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN, July 20.

The Eclipse will be first seen at 8h. 27m. Greenwich mean time, from a point in Northern Asia—lat. 60° 26' N. and long. 6h. 17m. E.

The greatest phase will be seen at 9h. 56m. Greenwich mean time, from a point in lat. 63° 9' N. and long. 1h. 2m. W. Magnitude of the greatest phase = 0.523 (Sun's diameter = 1).

The Eclipse will be last seen at 11h. 26m. Greenwich mean time, from a point in lat. 33° 39' N. and long. 4h. 27m. W.

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# OUR CALENDAR.

Some months back, an anonymous letter, signed "OBSERVER," appeared in the columns of the *Montreal Gazette*, charging the Astronomical portion of our CANADIAN ALMANAC with gross blunders and absurdities. The ignorance displayed by this *ad-hoc* "Observer" is so ridiculous and childish as to render his remarks hardly worth our notice; and, indeed, we should have passed the matter over in silence had not our attention been more than called to the critique by letters from many friends both in Canada and the United States. It is also very possible that some persons may have heard that objections have been made to this department of the Almanac, without knowing what these objections were, and as they are moreover put forth by "Observer" with an air of self-assurance calculated to mislead those unacquainted with the subject, we have determined to publish his letter, and append a few explanatory remarks, which may prevent others from falling into similar errors.

To the Editor of the *Montreal Gazette*.

SIR,—I wish to draw, through you, the attention of Messrs Maclear & Co., of Toronto, to a series of errors of great magnitude which run throughout the whole of their astronomical calculations, as given in their "Canadian Almanac" for 1858. It is alleged that these calculations are made "expressly for this publication at the Provincial Observatory at Toronto." I can scarcely imagine this to be the case, else so gross a series of errors could scarcely have been committed; or, if the reality be such, there must have been some egregious oversight. My attention has been drawn to the fact, in attempting to establish a mean local time for the ending of the Solar Eclipse of this morning; and I thought, that as so much space was devoted in this Almanac to astronomical calculations and data of various kinds, that I would have experienced but little difficulty in coming to my conclusion. But I never was so miserably disappointed. Thus I find (according to this Almanac) that the sun rises and sets on this day in Quebec and Toronto at precisely the same moment of time, viz: 6° 13' for former, and 6° 13' for the latter; and that the moon rises in both places at precisely the same moment, viz: 6° 35'.

Now the longitudes of Quebec, Montreal, and Toronto, are respectively 288° 41', 286° 41' 28" 23", and 280° 39' each; or, as usually set down, 71° 10' for the first, 73° 35' for the second, and 79° 21' for the third. West, exhibiting a longitudinal difference between the first and last cities, or Quebec and Toronto, of 8° 5 degrees; and as every 15 degrees of longitude are approximately equivalent to one hour of time, the sun ought to rise in Quebec thirty-two minutes and thirty-three seconds (or approximately so) earlier than what it should in Toronto.

On referring back to the time of the sun rising at the commencement of the year, January 1st, I observe that a difference of only 11 minutes is made between the occurrence of the same event in the two places. From that period to the present, however (March 15), the time has gradually diminished, until it has amounted to nothing. But not only this: it is actually made to rise by that previous amount of time earlier in Toronto than it does in Quebec. Joshua was a fool in comparison with such astronomical achievements as this. He only made the sun stand still for a limited time, but here we have throughout a whole year the sun made to rise (on paper) more early on a westerly place than on an easterly one.

Would it not be wise, Mr. Editor, for the Messrs. Maclear to examine a little more minutely into their astronomical data before issuing them, as sanctioned by, or the work of the "Provincial Observatory of Toronto." If it be true, as stated on the cover, that "the astronomical calculations have been made expressly for this publication at the Provincial Observatory of Toronto," one of two contingencies follows: that the parties concerned are incompetent to their duties or that they have committed a series of the grossest blunders which I have ever witnessed.

The misapprehension of "Observer" consists in his confounding *absolute* with *local* time. Absolute time is independent of the station of the spectator, but local time is measured from the noon of the place: thus MEAN LOCAL TIME is expressed by the number of *mean* hours, &c., that have elapsed since *mean* noon, or, what is the same thing, by the angle at the pole between a declination circle through the *mean* sun and the meridian of the place, reckoned from the meridian towards the west, at the rate of 1h. for 15°. Similarly, APPARENT LOCAL TIME is expressed by the angle between a declination circle through the *true* sun and the meridian of the place, and measured in the same manner.

If two places, A and B, be on the same parallel, with a difference of long. of 15°, the sun will set at the more westerly place, A, one hour later than at B, reckoned in *absolute* time, but approximately at the same instant in *local* time; because the noon from which the local time of A is reckoned occurs one hour later in *absolute* time than the noon from which the time of B is reckoned.

Again, if two places, C and D, be on the same meridian, and, for example, be both in north latitude, the sun when in *north* declination will rise *earlier* in *absolute* time at the *northern* station C, than it will at D. When the sun is in *south* declination he will rise *later* at C than at D, and when the sun is at the equinoxes he will rise at the *same* instant at both C and D. Moreover, this will be true also in *local* time, because the times of both places are reckoned from the same meridian.

If "Observer" would understand that the local time of sunrise depends on the *latitude* of the place, and only *indirectly* and that to a *very small extent* on the *longitude*, the mystery would be cleared up of the sun rising in January 11 minutes earlier at Toronto than at Quebec; of this difference diminishing and finally vanishing as the sun approaches the equator, and (we may add, if he had examined the Almanac a little further,) of the sun after the equinox rising earlier at Quebec than at Toronto.

Before concluding, we must express our acknowledgments to an anonymous writer, "W." who a few days after in the same journal, the *Montreal Gazette*, published an able letter in reply to "Observer," entitled "A Corrector corrected," in which he very clearly and happily demolishes our friend's attack upon the Almanac, and we regret that our space is too limited to give his letter here. We must, however, explain to "W." the cause of a discrepancy he notices in his letter, as follows: "From it (Table of Semi-diurnal Arcs) 'Observer' would have learned that to get the time of the sun's rising for the latitude of Montreal, he had to deduct 5h. 51m. 7sec. from the time it reached the meridian, and 'that, therefore, the sun would rise on the 15th inst. (March, 1858), at 6h 17 min. 56 sec. This time is 4 min. 56 sec. later than that given in the Almanac, &c.'" The difference (4 min. 46 sec.) between the result obtained by "W." and that given in our Almanac is explained on page 2, where it is stated that the time of sunrise is given for the *upper limb* corrected for refraction. It is, in fact, the time at which the sun first actually appears.

The mean temperature of the year 1857 was 42.73, being 1.34 below the average of 18 years, but 0.57 above that of the preceding year. The mean temperatures of the several months were in seven instances below and in five above the averages for the respective months, the average depression to the average elevation being moreover in the ratio of 4 to 2.5. January was the coldest January and February was the warmest February on record, and the thermometer from their respective averages, but in contrary direction, was so great as to occasion an inversion in the difference between their temperature; for whereas February is on the average 0.24 colder than January, it was in this instance by 5.78 the warmer of the two.

Another example somewhat similar, but not amounting to an inversion occurred at the close of the year. November, which on the average is more than 0.9 warmer than December, was but 1.97 warmer in 1857. January was further remarkable for exhibiting the lowest absolute temperature—20.1 that ever occurred in January, and February was also remarkable for the highest temperature 52.4 that ever occurred in February. The minimum of November—39.5 was more than 1.0 lower than any temperature that occurred before in that month. Jan. was moreover not only the coldest Jan. on record and the coldest month of 1857, but it was absolutely the coldest month ever recorded.

The highest absolute temperature was 88.2 in August, and the lowest—20.1 in January.

There were 71 instances in which the temperature at the hour of observation was depressed 20° below the normal for that hour. 17 instances only when there was an equal deviation in excess.

Barometer.—The highest reading of the barometer was 30.361 inches, and occurred at 9 p. m. on 1<sup>st</sup> February, and the lowest 28.452 inches, which was the lowest ever recorded, occurred at 10 a. m. on 10<sup>th</sup> November. There were 43 instances in which the reading of the barometer exceeded the average, and 54 when it fell short of the average to the extent of half an inch. The greatest deviation in excess was 0.745 at midnight on 10<sup>th</sup> February, and the greatest deviation in defect was 1.110 at 8 a. m. 19<sup>th</sup> Nov.

The greatest barometric range within 24 hours was with a rising column was .918 on 8<sup>th</sup> February, and the greatest with a falling column was .715 on 26<sup>th</sup> February.

Humidity.—The mean humidity of the year was 79. The greatest monthly humidity being in Jan., and the least in April and May. There were 15 instances of complete saturation, of which 7 occurred in Jan., 4 in Feb., 2 in March, and 2 in Dec. The days of the greatest humidity were 22<sup>nd</sup> Jan and 5<sup>th</sup> Feb. on both of which the mean humidity of the day amounted to .98. The least humidity at the time

of observation was .31 on the 4<sup>th</sup> March, and the two driest days were 30<sup>th</sup> March with a mean humidity .54, and 21<sup>st</sup> May with a mean humidity .55.

Clouds.—The extent of sky clouded was on the average of the year three-fifths of the whole, and for nine months the sky was on the average more than half overcast. December was the most cloudy month, and September the month most free from clouds. The most cloudy hours on the average were from 2 to 4 p. m., and the hour most free from clouds was 10 p. m.

Wind.—The resultant direction of the wind it will be seen from the table was rather more from the north than usual, and both the resultant velocity and the mean velocity were less than in the preceding year. The most windy day was 24<sup>th</sup> October when the velocity was 27.08 miles per hour. The most windy hour absolutely was 6 a. m. to 7 a. m. on 10<sup>th</sup> Feb. morn., when the velocity was 44.6 miles per hour. The most windy hour on the average of the year was from noon to 1 p. m. with an average velocity of 10.63 miles per hour, and the least windy hour from 5 to 6 a. m. with an av. vel. of 6.36 miles per hour.

Rain and Snow.—The depth of rain, 33.205 inches, was considerably in excess of that of late years, but the total depth of rain and melted snow, though amounting to 40.585 inches, fell short by about one inch of that of 1855, when the quantity of snow was extraordinarily great. August was the most rainy month, considered with reference to the quantity of rain, and June with reference to the number of rainy days. January & March regarded the quantity of rain and the number of rainy days was the least rainy month, but if snow be reckoned as well as rain January will rank next to August with respect to the amount, and next to June with respect to the number of days of precipitation. The most rainy day was 15<sup>th</sup> February, when the depth amounted to 1.620 inches, and the heaviest fall of snow was on 10<sup>th</sup> January with a depth of 5.5 inches.

Thunderstorms.—Of the 2<sup>d</sup> thunderstorms enumerated in the table there were but few remarkable for violence. There were besides 9 days when lightning occurred without thunder or hail, 3 days of thunder without lightning or hail, and 6 days when hail fell unaccompanied by either.

Auroras.—The nights favorable for observing Auroras and the number of auroras observed were both considerably less than in the preceding three years, but the aurora that were observed on the nights of 15<sup>th</sup> May and 17<sup>th</sup> of November were far more brilliant than any recorded during the same period.

From the 10<sup>th</sup> to the 13<sup>th</sup> August the periodic meteors were numerous, and some of considerable brilliancy; in November there was a remarkable absence of these bodies.

7. Steam boiler of the *Belair Mills*, St. Millaire, O E., exploded, 4 lives lost and 7 dangerously scalded.

8. Great fire in New Orleans.

9. Dr. Cronyn elected Bishop of the New Diocese of London, C. W., by a clerical majority of two and a lay majority of thirteen.—Trial of Miss Madeline Smith for poisoning her lover, Emile L'Angelier, concluded by verdict of acquittal.—Battle before Delhi, English loss 240, mutineers about 500.

10. Mutiny at Sealcote, India.—H. M. S. *Transit* lost on the rocks off Cape Oclar, Banca Island.

11. Sir Collin Campbell appointed Commander-in-Chief of the army in India.—Freedom of the city of London presented to Prince Frederick William of Prussia.

12. Gen. Nicholson defeats mutineers at Sealcote.—Sir Collin Campbell left London for Calcutta.—Some rioting in Montreal in consequence of the display of an Orange flag.

13. Orange riots in Montreal.

16. Pierre Jean de Béranger, the French poet, died in Paris, aged 77.—Gen. Havelock defeats insurgents under Nena Sahib.

17. Gen. Havelock enters Cawnpore.

18. A waterspout burst, after doing much damage, near the village of St. Elzear, L.C.—Rising at Hyderabad, India, promptly suppressed.—English ship *Frances* lost in a typhoon between Ningpo and Shanghai, 25 only saved.

19. Gen. Havelock attacks Nena Sahib at Bithoor and defeats him.—A fire broke out in Taleia, Portugal, which spread over an immense tract of agricultural country, involving great destruction of property.

21. The barque *Monasco* lost near Buren, Newfoundland, together with 50 Swedish passengers.—Telegraphic communication opened between Umballah and Bombay.

22. Disastrous gale on coast of New Brunswick, loss of upwards of 60 fishing vessels and a great number of lives.—Shah Nul, a famous Jak leader, attacked by a force from Meerut and put to route.—Great fire in St. Louis, U.S., loss \$200,000.

24. Mutiny of three native regiments at Dinapore.

27. W. F. A. Delane, editor of the *Times* died, aged 64.

28. Lieut. James Holmes, blind traveller and author, died, aged 70.

29. Charles Lucien Bonaparte, Prince di Canino died, aged 55.—Battle of Buserut Gunge; defeat of rebels by Gen. Havelock.

#### August, 1857.

7. Battle before Delhi, in which the mutineers are again defeated: up to this date the English had been engaged in 25 conflicts and were invariably victorious.

8. The Emperor and Empress of the French visit Queen Victoria at Osborne.—A great fire occurred at Dantzic.—Two slight shocks of earthquake felt at Corin.

10. The 55th native infantry disarmed at Ghazepore.—Explosion of a powder magazine at Joudpore, destroying over 500 houses and all the people living therein.

11. Attempt to blow up the new Providence House, Toronto, with gunpowder.—Spellen acquitted of the murder of Mr. Little after a trial which lasted three days.—The Atlantic telegraph cable parted after being laid 26½ miles.—The British minister at Lima assassinated by four Peruvians who escaped.

12. The American Association for the advancement of science opened their 11th annual meeting in Montreal.—Extraordinary coloured meteors seen at Ostend, many

hundred fell during the night.—Melbourne, Australia, first lighted by gas.

N. Harris*, total loss of the latter and nearly all on board.—A fire broke out at Point Levi, 18 houses burnt.

9. Carpet bag discovered on one of the buttresses of  
Waterloo bridge, London, containing the mangled remains  
of body of a man evidently murdered.

10. Thomas Crawford, American Sculptor, died, aged 43.

14. Several extensive failures of commercial houses in  
England, lately announced, commencement of the mon-  
etary crisis in that country.

17. Close of the Manchester Art Treasures Exhibition.

19. Extensive fire in Chicago, several lives lost.—The  
steamer *Reindeer*, from Chicago to Montreal lost off Great  
Point au Sauble, only two of the crew reached land.

23. Piacenza, Italy, inundated by recent floods and  
storms accumulated by great destruction of property and  
total cessation of all kinds of traffic.

24. Ship *Catherine Adamson* wrecked inside North Head  
Sydney, 25 lives lost.

29. Gen. Cavaignac died, aged 55.

### November, 1857.

3 Failure in effecting launch of *Leviathan*, the attempt  
deferred until December.—Ship *Honolulu* from Boston to  
Liverpool struck by lightning and destroyed, crew saved.

7. Three water-pumps seen by the ship *Princess Charlotte*  
while standing down the straits of Malacca.

8. Melhiptore attacked by the rebels.

9. An extensive conflagration occurred at Port Adelaide  
Australia, loss \$1,000,000.

10. Duchess of Nemours died at Claremont, aged 35.

11. Gen. Walker, the filibuster arrested at New Orleans  
but admitted to bail.—A fire broke out in *Sarah Sands*, iron  
screw steamer, on voyage to India with troops, after the  
after part of the vessel was reduced to a mere shell the  
flames were extinguished, she arrived after a lapse of sev-  
eral days at the Mauritius without the loss of a single life.

12. Suspension of the Bank Charter Act of 1844 in Eng-  
land, in order to relieve the monetary pressure.

13. The Russians defeated a body of 3000 Tscherkesses in  
the Caucasus.

15. Attempt to assassinate Gen. Moreno at Tampico, Mex.

17. Lucknow relieved by Sir Colin Campbell after being  
closely beset since 29th September.

18. A detachment of the 34th native infantry mutilated  
at Chittagong.—Terrible explosion of gunpowder at May-  
ence, 500 persons injured.

19. Royal presents from the Kings of Siam for the Queen.  
presented by the Siamese ambassadors at Windsor Castle.  
—A shock of an earthquake which endured for several  
seconds felt at Lisbon and at various places throughout  
the whole of Portugal.—The schooner *Flying Cloud* from  
Chicago with 10,300 bushels of wheat lost on lake Michi-  
gan within twenty rods of shore, 7 of the crew perished in  
the cold, 2 only survived.

21. A powder magazine at Warsaw, exploded 14 Russian  
soldiers lost their lives.—The steamer *Rainbow* burnt on  
the Mississippi, 70 lives lost.

23. Col. Durand advanced on Mundesoor, attacking and  
defeating the rebels with heavy loss.

25. Gen. Sir Henry Havelock worn out by fatigue and  
anxiety died at Alumbagh.

26. Gen. Windham attacked and routed the first division of  
the Gwalior Contingent, 3000 in number.

27. The main body of the Gwalior Contingent entered  
the civil station at Cawnpore and burnt the tents of three  
of our regiments.

28. Sir Colin Campbell reached Cawnpore.—Brigadier  
Wilson killed.—The Queen of Spain delivered of a son.

29. The interior of the Tower at entrance of the citadel  
of Vincennes, France, fell burying a whole military post  
in its ruins.

30. Renewed attempts to launch the *Leviathan*, and con-  
tinued throughout the week but with slight success.

### December, 1857.

3. The Imperial Parliament met in consequence of the  
pressure of financial difficulties and the state of India.

6. Sir Colin Campbell completely routed the Gwalior  
Contingent.—Outbreak in Kollapore county.

7. The American Congress met at Washington.—The  
ship *Witlake* from Quebec to Greenock capsized and after-  
wards righted 800 miles from Cape Clear from this day  
till the 17th, the crew experienced dreadful sufferings from  
the loss of all provisions and water by the accident.

8. Filibuster Walker taken prisoner by Com. Paulding.

12. The Imperial Parliament adjourned.

15. Thirty-one shocks of an earthquake felt at Sillian in  
Hungary between this day, and 24th.

16. A terrible earthquake in Naples, the towns of Salerno,  
Potenza, and Nola, and half the villages in the Province  
of Basilicata are destroyed, the loss in life is estimated at  
THIRTY THOUSAND and upwards, by the official Journal,  
and 250,000 houseless!

17. Barnum's house, Iranistan, at Bridgeport, Conn.,  
burnt, loss estimated at \$100,000.

18. A fearful tempest raging in Constantinople, all com-  
munication in the streets or Bosphorus interrupted.—The  
Marriage treaty between the Princess Royal and Prince  
Frederick William of Prussia signed.

19. A dense fog enveloped Paris, the drivers of carriages  
&c., had to walk leading their horses to avoid accident.—  
Steamer *Edwards*, burnt on Red River, U.S., 15 lives  
lost.—Shock of an earthquake experienced in Algiers, the  
oscillation lasted 15 seconds.

22. A fever which had been raging in Lisbon since 9th  
September ceased, out of 13,482 cases 4759 died.

23. The American Congress adjourned till 4th January.

24. Election riot at Fergus, C.W., one man lost his life.

28. Canton bombarded at daylight and continued  
throughout the day and night.—City of Myhere, India  
taken by storm.

29. Canton assaulted and taken in three divisions, two  
English 4600 men, and one French 900 men.—Severe  
shocks of earthquake again felt in Naples, fortunately  
unattended with any serious accident; vibrations of the  
earth are being felt daily.

by M. Dieu, at the Imperial Observatory at Paris, 25th  
July, visible about four weeks; (this comet was discovered  
also by Dr. O. H. F. Peters, at Dudley U. S., on the 25th,  
and by Professor Hahlich, at Göttingen, on 30th July). Planet  
(46) by Mr. N. Pogson, at Oxford, 10th August, named  
Hestia. Comet V., by Dr. Klinkerfues, at Göttingen, 20th  
August, visible for about six weeks. Planet (47) by Dr.  
Luther at Bilk, 15th September. Planet (48) by M. Gold-  
schmidt, at Paris, 19th September, named Pales; also  
another planet (49) by the same person on the same even-  
ing, named Doris. Planet (50) by Mr. Ferguson, at Wash-  
ington U. S., 5th October, named Virginia. (this planet was  
also detected by Dr. Luther, at Bilk, on the 19th October).  
Comet VI., by Dr. Donati, at Florence, 10th November,  
visible for about six weeks.

## THE FINANCIAL CRISIS OF 1857-8.

The autumn and winter of 1857-8 will long be remembered by the occurrence of one of the most severe and sudden commercial crises that has been experienced during the present century. The recurrence of such panics at almost regular intervals of eight or ten years for the last hundred years, has afforded matter for much speculation; and political economists have favoured us with many different theories to account for their occurrence. It is not our purpose however to trace the causes of these periodical disasters, but rather to glance at the history of the late "crisis," its effects on the trade and commerce of the world, and particularly its bearings on the agricultural, commercial, and manufacturing interests of Canada.

In tracing the effects of the crisis, its causes will be incidentally discussed. The causes were doubtless different in different countries; yet so intimate are the relations which bind commercial nations together, that any interruption to the general business of the one is speedily and injuriously felt by all.

Within the last forty years, the commercial world has experienced five distinct "crises," each varying in its apparent causes. The crisis of 1818 is remembered for its severity both in England and the United States. At this period Sir Robert Peel carried his measure restricting the issues of the Bank of England, a law which has been condemned by many monetary writers. In 1825-6 another crisis occurred, induced through famine in England, and a fall in the price of Cotton in the United States. In 1833 another financial revolution took place in the United States consequent upon the establishment of the Treasury by General Jackson, and the removal of Government deposits from the United States Bank. In 1837 occurred the greatest commercial and financial crisis of which we have any account, exceeding in its effects and endurance, though not in intensity, that of 1857.

The crisis of 1857 felt like a "thunderbolt" on the commercial world. The mania for speedy riches had so blinded the public mind, that the dangers which were accumulating on every side were unperceived or uncared for, till our whole commercial and monetary systems were involved in one common chaos, from which they are only yet slowly emerging.

Scarcely had the abundant harvest of the South and West been secured, when the failure of a large banking establishment in Ohio with its principal agency in New York alarmed the public mind. On the 24th of August, 1857, the Ohio Life and Trust Company closed its doors. The connection of this large institution with other minor concerns soon brought these to a stand, and the alarm, aided and increased by the Electric Telegraph, soon became general. A feeling of universal insecurity created a desire to realize and the best securities depreciated in value. Those *stop children* called bank notes, which are never welcome to the paternal roof, flocked home in thousands, like unwelcome visitors at the most inopportune moment. Discounts were contracted, and merchants, manufacturers and business men generally who had large payments to make, yielded to the pressure. Stocks fell to an unprecedented low figure, and exchange became unsaleable. The loss of confidence so essential to commercial activity became after all the great cause of nine-tenths of the evils resulting from the crisis. Houses of undoubted standing were looked upon with distrust. Ample means was no security against failure. The banker looked upon the merchant's paper with suspicion, and the merchant looked upon the Bank notes with equal distrust. The poorer classes surrounded the Banks, and in their eagerness to save themselves from loss, withdrew their precious metals, an act which was speedily to deprive them of their daily bread. Deprived of the basis of their circulation the Banks curtailed their discounts, workshops and factories were closed, and thousands of industrious workmen in the principal cities of the United States were thrown out of employment. Mean time the United States country Banks (of which there are over 1000) suspended in dozens, the Banks in Philadelphia followed suit, and on the thirteenth October several New York Banks gave way. On the next day, by general agreement, the whole New York City Banks (except the Chemical) suspended specie payment. The turning point was now reached and men began to breathe freely. The notes of the great majority of the United States Banks being secured by stocks passed freely, and for nearly two months scarcely a Bank in the United States paid specie at its counter.

From the United States the panic passed to England and the continent of Europe. At first it was thought that England could stand the shock without serious difficulty.

but the intimate relations which bind commercial nations together had not been accorded their due importance. Houses in the American trade began to give way, and in their fall involved others in ruin. Banking houses of long standing toppled down side by side with the wild speculation or reckless adventurer. The fair fame of Scottish banking was stained by the failure of one of the principal banking institutions under circumstances so discreditable as to throw even the *wild cat* banking of our western neighbors in the shade. An institution with seven and a half millions of dollars of paid up capital, and thirty millions of deposits became hopelessly insolvent, and caused it is said an amount of suffering in Scotland greater than that entailed upon the country by the Russian War.

From these scenes of mortification and suffering let us turn to our own country. There was a pressure upon us from England, France, Germany, and the United States, for we were indebted to them all. The price of our principal article of export had fallen nearly one half of per cent. in value within four months. The cry of bank failure was heard on every hand. Exchange in England had gone down to 98, and the Bank of England had raised the rate of interest to ten per cent. The American Bankers were collecting our bank notes over a frontier of a thousand miles, and demanding specie at every bank counter. The United States Banks had suspended specie payment. The Bank of England had been permitted by Government to exceed its legal issues. The Bank of France and the Bank of Hamburg had received assistance from their respective Governments. In the midst of this general embarrassment and alarm it is a matter not only of congratulation but of pride, that not one Canadian Bank suspended specie payment. Intimately connected with the neighbouring Union in our business relations, having the same legal tender, and being exposed to the same risks from the withdrawal of public confidence, it speaks well for our bank management that not one banking institution in Canada dishonoured its paper for a single day. Not one we believe ever failed, and from the following table it will be seen that public confidence was never for a moment withdrawn.

It is true that many parties advised the suspension of specie payment, and a Member of the Provincial Parliament compared the conduct of the Banks to the charge of *Italaclava*, "as mad as it was glorious." The above returns however clearly indicate that no sudden contraction of the currency took place. It cannot be denied that the determination of the Banks to continue specie payments at all hazards, was attended with serious inconvenience to the mercantile community; but on the other hand, the pressure to which these were subjected was the best test of their solvency, and cannot fail ultimately to give confidence in their stability. We must not however attribute the prostration of business in 1858 to the panic of 1857. Canada lost comparatively little by the crisis. She was a debtor, not a creditor both as regards England and the United States. Her great difficulty arose from being pressed for payment at an inconvenient time. Her surplus productions on which she relied to meet her engagements had not only depreciated in value, but owing to the loss of banking facilities could not be brought to market. Under these circumstances it need not be wondered at the general business of the country was seriously interrupted. Three-fourths of the people of Upper Canada are engaged in agricultural pursuits, and the others are mainly dependent upon these. The fall in the price of wheat was clearly the great cause of our embarrassment. This article is the main element of the prosperity of Upper Canada. Its fall was not caused by the crisis, but was rather the cause of the crisis itself. England, through the full development of her manufacturing industry, is not so entirely dependent upon agriculture. The U. States in their mines and manufactures have also sources of wealth apart from the products of the soil. Hence we see these countries speedily recover from the effects of the

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crisis. In Canada it is otherwise. The causes of our difficulties remain. Debts contracted in June, 1857, required double the quantity of produce to discharge them in June 1858. The evil is incurred by our purchases being principally from abroad. The large importations send the gold out of the country and contracts the Bank circulation. The scarcity of money prostrates internal trade, and the farmer's home market is destroyed. His returns are diminished on every side, while his liabilities remain the same. The purchase of an extra hundred acres of land which under ordinary circumstances he could have easily met, becomes a source of embarrassment, and he is regarded as a speculator in real estate. The mechanic who in the bright day of prosperity had purchased a village lot, is thrown out of employment; he cannot meet his instalments and the savings of years fall into the hands of the sheriff. The suspension of home industry necessitates large importations of foreign goods and the evil is increased. To show the disastrous results to Canada arising from the fall in the price of wheat and other causes; we have only to state the total exports from Canada for the last three years:—

It thus appears that the value of our exports of agricultural products fell nearly one-half between 1855 and 1857. Since 1850 the variations in the price of wheat in the Toronto Market have been as follows:—

From the above it will be seen that within four months the price of wheat fell from 9s. to 4s. 6d., thus diminishing by one-half the ability of Upper Canada to pay her debts; nor was this all. The crisis compelled the banks to diminish their discounts while the Lower Canadian banks, which in time of prosperity had made largely by their Upper Canada business, withdrew their capital to the parent institutions. Our produce merchants whose standing had never been questioned, could not obtain their ordinary banking facilities, and to the fall in price was added for a time the impossibility of sending the produce to market. This is best shown by the following table compiled from the Trade Returns of the wheat and flour exported within the last three years:—

Here then we have the true causes of the difficulties of Upper Canada. Having purchased goods in England, the United States and Lower Canada, commensurate with her wants and in anticipation of a continuance of high prices and her usual banking accommodation, she found herself suddenly deprived of all these elements of prosperity. What wonder that she felt the crisis more than Lower Canada whose chief article of export (lumber) had increased in value four millions of dollars between 1855 and 1857? Had the picture been reversed, had lumber fallen and wheat remained the same, and had the bank capital been withdrawn from Montreal and centred in Toronto, what would have been the respective condition of the two sections at this moment. The charge of extravagant living and wild speculation is as a drop in the bucket compared to the effect of the causes here pointed out.

A severe but salutary lesson is read to the whole people of Canada in the above statements. The impolicy of

depending so entirely upon the products of agriculture is clearly demonstrated, and never till there is a greater diversity of employments creating a steady and profitable home market to the farmer, will the prosperity of this fine country be placed on a permanent basis. Canada and particularly Western Canada is essentially an agricultural country. As we have said three-fourths of her people are engaged in agriculture, and the other fourth is mainly dependent upon these. Whatever therefore contributes to the prosperity of the farmer tends to advance the interests of all classes in the community. The facilities afforded to the agriculturist by the introduction of railways into Canada have added to the value of real estate in the country an amount almost incredible. In many parts of the Province land has risen from six to forty dollars per acre. The total number of miles of railway in the country is now over 1000, and the increased value of real estate from this cause alone is estimated at over one hundred and fifty millions of dollars. This increase in value however, can only be rendered profitable by a fuller development of the various products of the soil. The experience of the past eight years shows the risks to which the wheat crop is exposed. The risks of the crop itself, and the fluctuations in the price are greater than those of any other commodity. The labours of the mechanic yields a certain return, but the return of the farmer is dependent on many contingencies.—Every wind that blows and every shower that falls in this or in other countries, affects his condition. The avarice of capitalists and the ambition of Kings alike disturb the certainty of his reward. Within three years wheat sold at 11s. 9d. and 4s. 3d. in the Toronto market, and in October, 1851, it fell to 8s. 1d. To the ordinary risks of the crop and the fluctuations in the market must be added the undeniable fact, that continuous cropping must speedily so deteriorate the soil that the wheat culture will be abandoned in Upper Canada. Like the once fertile valley of the Richelieu in Lower Canada, which in 1790 yielded forty bushels per acre, the wheat fields of Western Canada under the present system will become exhausted, and their owners dependent upon the western prairies for their daily bread. In most other productions of the soil there is a steady market and fair prices. While our farmers have been raising wheat to be destroyed by the fly or sold at 80 cents per bushel, our American neighbours have been doing a profitable business in supplying our cities with the common necessities of life. According to the Trade Returns, '57, Canada imported from the U. States the following amount of the undermentioned products of the farm, and chiefly for consumption in Canada West:—

We commend the above to the consideration of the intelligent farmers of those sections of Upper Canada where the insect has destroyed their crop of wheat. The total imports of free goods in 1857 was £2,160,510, the greater part of which was for agricultural or animal products. Why will not our farmers turn their attention more to the raising of live stock, particularly in those sections of the country where the risk of the wheat crop is the greatest? We have seen on the bleak hills of Scotland ten thousand sheep in a single flock, and while the long winters of Canada may present a great obstacle to the successful raising of stock, there can be no doubt from the success of some of our most intelligent agriculturists, that the raising of this description of stock could be largely and profitably engaged in. Why should the people of Toronto and Hamilton be to a large extent supplied with American butter and cheese, eggs and vegetables? With a soil and climate adapted for raising the best fruit in the world, why should we import a large quantity of apples from the United States. In some orchards on the Hudson as



well as in Ohio the annual returns from fifty acres of orchard is over ten thousand dollars, and employment given to a large class unfitted for the heavier labours of the field. Why again do not our farmers engage in the cultivation of hops, grass seeds and tobacco? The latter might be extensively and profitably grown in the Western Peninsula. The Ottawa district is well adapted for the growth of flax. It is universally admitted that a better system of agriculture and a proper rotation of crops would tend to enrich both the farmer and the soil.

It is true a proper rotation of crops can never be profitably adopted in the absence of those manufacturing cities which consume on the spot those bulky and perishable articles which cannot be carried to a distant market. It is therefore the interest of the agriculturists to encourage the introduction of manufactures into the Province. If ten millions of pounds invested in railways have added twice that sum to the value of the real estate in the country, an equal amount invested in manufactures would be still of more advantage to the farmer. Looking at the immense water powers of Canada, the waste labour in all our cities, towns and villages, the easy means of communication by our lakes, rivers and railroads, the facilities for attaining the raw material and the duty of twenty per cent. in favour of the Canadian manufacturer, all point to Canada as the future seat of extensive manufactures.

Among the branches of Canadian industry which might be extensively and profitably engaged in, is the manufacture of pot and pearl ashes. This is an article for which there is a steady demand at remunerative prices. It is largely manufactured in Lower Canada, some of the wealthiest "habitans" being largely engaged in it. It requires but a very small capital and the time occupied in the process is very short. There are millions of bushels of wood ashes wasted in Upper Canada which might and ought to be turned to good account. At present large quantities of ashes are collected in Canada by the Americans and carried to Ogdensburgh and elsewhere, to be there manufactured into a valuable article of export; certainly our neighbours have no advantage over us in the manufacture of this article. The export of pot and pearl ashes is very considerable, and ought to be double what it is now. Many persons coming to this country with scarcely sufficient means to purchase an ordinary farm, might engage in the manufacture of ashes to great advantage. The ordinary risks of agriculture are avoided, the yield is certain while the price is steady and remunerative.

To show the importance of this branch of business we give below the exports for the last three years:—

There is no doubt that the productiveness of the soil of Western Canada and the high price of wheat during the last few years has tended unduly to encourage the growth of this cereal to the neglect of other products of the soil, as well as the development of manufacturing industry. The time has however arrived when we must take the next step in the march of civilization. The immense surplus productions of the virgin prairies of the west, and the facilities now afforded them of reaching the eastern markets, cannot fail to produce a low range of prices for years to come. The interest of the agriculturist is not promoted by increasing *producers*, but by increasing *consumers*. It is not a full but a bare market that increases the demand for his labour.—It should therefore be the great object of our people to turn to good account all the advantages they enjoy. To develop the manufacturing as well as the agricultural resources of the country. Commencing with the manufacture of those articles requiring the smallest capital and the nearest allied to agricultural pursuits and advancing by degrees to those branches requiring a greater amount of capital and skill. In most northern countries where there is a long season in which out-door labour is suspended, the combination of agricultural and mechanical pursuits becomes a necessity. Articles, the manufacture of which can be carried on in the rural home and around the winter fire, are far more suited to the circumstances of a new country than such as can only be produced by large factories and expensive machinery. At present we are large importers of articles made in the quiet homes of the New England farmers, and so far as Upper Canada is concerned large importers from Lower Canada of articles produced in the French villages of that part of the Province. It is a pleasing feature to note the progress of domestic

manufactures in any part of the country, but it is not very creditable to the enterprise of the Western section that a large portion of the straw goods consumed here is made in Lower Canada, finished in New York, and imported from thence into Upper Canada.

Among the branches of home industry in which the agricultural population might be profitably engaged at certain seasons of the year, and in which they are largely engaged in some parts of the country are the following: the amount of goods of the classes mentioned still imported shows how much might be done towards rendering Canada a self-sustaining country.

There are many other articles besides the above in which the female and junior members of the agricultural families of Canada might be profitably employed during the winter season. In the Eastern States and in Lower Canada they are so engaged to a large extent increasing the business of the cities and the wealth of the country. Advancing another step in the scale of manufacturing industry we come to those branches of trade requiring a large outlay in buildings, machinery and material, and concentrating population and production. Among these might be enumerated cotton, woollen and iron manufactures. Of these articles the imports in 1857 were as follows:—

It is not for us to say whether the manufacture of the above could be profitably engaged in, but we would call the attention of Canadian importers and foreign capitalists to the subject. Cotton can be laid down from the place of growth in ten days and much cheaper than it can be taken to Liverpool or Boston. Wool is now largely exported from the country, and is generally from twenty to thirty per cent. cheaper here than in the New England States. Iron is admitted free or at a low duty. There is a large amount of waste labour in the country which could be cheaply secured if constant employment was given.

In conclusion let us recapitulate the views we have advanced on the crisis of 1857. That it was one of those periodical revolutions consequent upon a withdrawal of confidence in a state of society in which unshaken confidence is the basis of all mercantile transactions and activity. That Canada lost little by the crisis being a *debtor* not a *creditor* abroad. That her difficulties arose from the loss of her banking facilities and a fall in the price of her exportable products. That a return of prosperity will be gradual and slow, and will greatly depend upon the enterprise of the people themselves. That the dependence of Western Canada upon a single product of the soil, uncertain alike in the yield and in the price places her in a false position. That permanent prosperity can only be attained by securing a greater diversity of employments and employing to advantage the waste labour now in the country. That in a northern country agriculture cannot be engaged in at all seasons of the year, and that such seasons should be spent by the younger members of the family in those indoor employments which contribute alike to the prosperity of the country and to the proper training to habits of thrift and industry of the rising generation. That manufacturing pursuits in a new country must be developed first in those branches which are most closely allied with agricultural employments. Then in the manufacture of articles in which the home becomes the workshop and the family circle the miniature factory, and lastly in rearing those stately buildings in which inventive genius and mechanical skill multiply and cheapen the productions of labour, and bring within the reach of all, many articles which otherwise must have been confined to the few.

Looking at the immense resources of Canada and the enterprise of her people, we have no fear for the future. Economy in public and private expenditure, confidence in ourselves, and a better appreciation of the advantages we enjoy, will in due time raise our country to the position which she ought to occupy among the nations of the earth.

Her Majesty, the only daughter and heir of the late Prince Edward, Duke of Kent, fourth son of King George III., and of Victoria-Maria Louisa (Princess Dowager of Leiningen), Duchess of Kent, and sister of the King of the Belgians. Her Majesty was born at Kensington Palace, on the 24th of May, 1819; baptised on the 24th of June, 1819; ascended the throne on the demise of her uncle, King William IV., 20th June, 1837; and was crowned at Westminster, on the 28th June, 1838. Her Majesty was married at St. James's Palace, on the 10th of February, 1840, to Francis Albert-Augustus-Charles-Emmanuel, Duke of Saxe, Prince of Coburg and Gotha, who was born August 26th, 1819.

## JUDICIARY—UPPER CANADA.

*Deputy Clerks of the Crown.*—The Clerks of the County Courts will be ex-officio Deputy Clerks of the Crown and Pleas of their several counties as the present incumbents vacate by death or otherwise.

*Deputy Masters and Registrars in Chancery.*—These officers are appointed by the Court, for each County, as occasion requires.

*Law Terms.*—Hilary begins first Monday in February, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week; Easter begins 3rd Monday in May, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week; Trinity begins Monday next after 21st August, and ends on the Saturday of the ensuing week; Michaelmas begins 3rd Monday in November and ends Saturday of the ensuing week. Long vacation from 1st July to 21st August.

*Chancery Terms.*—Examination Terms.—From 1st Tuesday of February to the Saturday after 2nd Tuesday of March; and from 1st Tuesday of September to the Saturday after 2nd Tuesday of October. Hearing Terms.—From 1st Monday in April until Saturday of the following week; and from 1st Monday in November until Saturday of the following week. The Court also sits every Tuesday (except during the regular vacations) throughout the year, for hearing motions for Decrees, motions for or to dissolve special injunctions, and appeals from the reports of the Master or Deputy Masters.

*Law Circuits.*—The Circuits are held twice a year in each County, between Hilary and Easter Terms, and between Trinity and Michaelmas Terms, except in the County of York, where there are three in each year, commencing on the first Thursday in January, the first Monday in May, and the second Monday in October, in each year. *Heir and Devise Court.*—Commissioners, the Judges of the Superior Courts, and such other persons as may be appointed by commission under the Great Seal. Their duties are to receive claims to lands in Upper Canada, for which no patent has issued from the Crown in favour of the proper claimants, whether as heirs, devisees or assignees. Sittings at Toronto, first Monday in January and July in each year. Clerk of Commissioners, W. B. Howard.

*Surrogate Courts.*—These Courts are now regulated by 22 Vic. c. 93. C. Fitzgibbon, Surrogate Clerk, Toronto.

*County Courts.*—Presided over by a resident Judge in each county. Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed £50; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties or signature of the defendant, to £100; and cases of Torts to personal chattels, to £30; but not to cases involving the title to lands, validity of wills, or actions for libel, slander, crim. con., or seduction. An appeal lies to either of the Superior Courts of Law. These Courts also possess equity powers under 16 Vic. c. 119, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery.

*County Court Terms* commence on the first Monday in January, April, July and October, and end the following Saturday. Sittings for the trial of causes are the same as the Quarter Sessions.

*Quarter Sessions.*—Chairman, the County Judge in each county, who, with one or more Justices of the Peace, holds a Court of Quarter Sessions in his county four times a year for trials by Jury in cases of larceny, misdemeanor and other offences. Sittings, second Tuesday in March, June, September and November, with power of adjournment.

*Recorder's Courts.*—In the Cities of Toronto, Hamilton, London, Kingston, and Ottawa, the Recorder's Court takes the place of the County Sessions, the Justices for Counties having no jurisdiction in the Cities—the care of which is confided to the Recorder, Mayor, Aldermen and Police Magistrate of each. The City Sessions are held on the first Monday in January, April, July and November.

*Insolvent Debtor's Court.*—The County Judge in each county presides.

*Division Courts.*—For the summary disposal of cases by the County Judges. Their jurisdiction extends to actions of debt or contract amounting to £25; injuries or torts to personal chattels amounting to £10. Courts are held once in two months in each division, or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge. The Divisions are established by the Courts of Quarter Sessions. The Jurisdiction of these Courts has been determined by the Act 18 Vic. c. 125. Judges under the Division Courts Extension Act for framing Rules for Division Courts:—S. B. Harrison, Toronto; G. *Provincial Lunatic Asylum, Toronto.—2½ miles west from*

the City Hall, on Queen St. Property vested in the Crown. Government appoint Medical Superintendent, and Bursar, and Inspectors who frame by-laws for its government, thoroughly examine the Asylum, and report to the Governor General. The present building was designed to accommodate 264 patients; there are at present 400 in it. The Institution is open to the public between the hours of 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. every day, Saturdays and Sundays excepted, by application to the Medical Superintendent at the Asylum. The admission of patients is regulated by the Act 16 Vic., chap. 188, which requires that the patient be examined by three licensed medical practitioners, verified by Reeve or Mayor collectively, who certify to the insanity. From the over-crowded state of the house, admissions are at present made as vacancies occur, according to priority of applicants, or urgency of cases. Idiots, and persons afflicted with paralysis are inadmissible. Officers of the Institution: Medical Superintendent, Joseph Workman, M.D.; Asst. Physician, B. Workman, M.D.; Bursar, J. McKirdy; Steward, Conlin S. Eastwood; Matron, Marn Ann Parkes.

In the eight Forms into which the College is divided, the pupils, besides being thoroughly grounded in Classics and Mathematics, receive progressive instruction in French, Natural Philosophy, Physical Geography, English Literature, English Composition, Elocution and Reading, Arithmetic, Geography, Book-keeping, Writing, &c. The lowest of these eight Forms is the *Preparatory*, into which boys generally enter at the age of eight or nine years. The instruction in this Form is only so far classical as the rudiments of Latin are concerned. More than two-thirds of the time being devoted to the elements of an English education. In the *First*, or next higher Form, a little more time is given to Latin; and in the *Second* the elements of Greek and of Algebra are commenced. In the *Third*, and the Forms above it, Classics and Mathematics are gradually brought into more and more prominence, while the branches constituting an English education are advanced with equally careful precision. In the *Fifth*, *Sixth*, and *Seventh* forms German forms a part of the regular course. Although provision is made for the attainment of a sound English education in what are called the *Classical* Forms, there is in addition an English Department, from which Classics only are excluded, the whole time being bestowed on the other subjects taught in the College, German forming also a part of the regular course of the higher Divisions. For the better cultivation of English Literature, Composition, and Elocution. In this Department and in the College Forms, a *new mastership* (the English Classical) has been created and recently filled up by the appointment of a gentleman whose reputation as an able master has been well established in public schools in England. Upper Canada College combines, therefore, all the advantages of a Commercial School, with facilities for obtaining a sound Classical training possessed by no other institution in the country. The College year commences with the Autumn Term. The Autumn Term begins Sept. 6; Winter do, Nov. 20; Spring do, Feb. 15; Summer do, May 1. Reports of the progress and conduct of the pupils are sent to parents at the end of each Term. Deducting the Vacations, the Terms are ten weeks each. The Tuition Fee is \$5, and the Boarding House Fee, \$40 per Term. The many improvements made in the arrangement of the College Boarding House have been found to add very materially to the comfort of the boarders. A large paved Ball Court Gymnasium, fitted up with the most approved modern appliances, and a spacious playground and cricket ground afford ample facilities for out-door exercise and amusement within the College bounds. The Boarding House is conducted strictly as an integral part of the Institution, its disbursements paid out of, and its returns paid into, the general funds. Prizes of books and certificates of honor are given every year to those who distinguish themselves in any of the subjects taught in the College. His Excellency the Governor General offers annually a valuable Prize of Books for the best examination in the higher departments of Classics and Mathematics. At the Annual Public Examination in July Exhibitions are competed for, varying in value from \$100 to \$20 per annum.

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Competition for them all is open to the Grammar Schools of the whole Province. More than two thousand of the youth of the Province have received their education, in whole or in part, in Upper Canada College. It numbers now about 300 pupils. The Principal, the First, Second, and Third Classical Masters, and the Mathematical Master, were all of them pupils of the Institution; as were likewise the greater portion of the Medal-men, Scholars, and Honor men of our Universities.
