ALMANACK.

Explanation of the Calendar Pages.

At the head of the respective pages for each month are given the ordinary tables of the Changes and Quadratures of the Moon. These Tables—together with the first three vertical columns of each page—it is presumed, require no explanation. The fourth and fifth columns shew the mean times of the Rising and Setting of the Sun. The quantities are only set down to the nearest minute, the uncertainty of the observed times of the rising or setting of heavenly bodies on land, caused by the varying amount of horizontal refrac-tion, and the general liability to the intervention of terrestrial objects in such observations, renders a closer aproximation unnecessary for ordinary practical purposes. In the sixth column, marked "souths," are given the times which should be shewn by a well-regulated clock or watch when the Sun is on the meridian. The seventh column contains the mean times of the Rising or Setting of the Moon. The quantities are only set down to the nearest minute, for the reasons mentioned above in respect to the Sun.

ECLIPSES.

In the year 1846 there will be only two Eclipses, both of the Sun.

I. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, April 25th, partly visible at Montreal, as follows:-

Begins,.....1h. 1m.)
Greatest Phase,..1h. 28m. Mean time in the Evening.

Ends, \dots 1h. 54m.

Duration of visibility fifty-three minutes. Magnitude of the Eclipse (Sun's diameter) 0.23 on the Southern Limb. The path of the Central and Annular Eclipse will first touch the Earth in Longitude 135° 51' West, and Latitude 2° 11' South, taking a north-easterly course will traverse Guatimala, the West Indian Islands, and the Atlantic Ocean, and reaching Africa will terminate near the southern part of Morocco.

II. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, October 20th, invisible at Montreal. Conjunction in Right Ascension at fifty-seven minutes after two in the Morning. This Eclipse will be visible in Africa, Australia, the Indian

and Great Southern Oceans.

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

The boundaries of these Wards may be seen by reference to the Plan of the City given at the beginning of this Almanack. The same law provides that the elections shall hereafter take place on the first Monday of March in every year and the several Wards are to be represented in the Council as follows:—East, Centre, and West Wards, by three Councilors each, and the St. Anne's, St. Antoine, St. Lawrence, St. Louis, and St. James Wards, by two Councillors each. The Tariff of Rates which Licenced Sweeps within the City of Montreal are allowed to charge is as follows:

Each chimney in use is required to be swept by licenced sweeps at least three times in the year, -once between 1st May and 1st November, and twice at intervals of at least two months apart, between 1st November and 1st May,—under a penalty of 25s. to 50s. In every case of a chimney taking fire, the occupant of the house is subject to a penalty of 25s. to 50s. provided the chimney has not been swept as above required.

In these months, on the 4th only.—The mails in Montreal are usually made up three days before the time of the packets leaving Boston; but the variable state of the roads and of the facilities for conveyance often render it necessary to leave Montreal earlier. Public notice of the precise time of departure is given in some of the Newspapers, and may always be seen at the Post Office.

And so on, adding two rates for every additional ounce. After the first ounce, fractional parts are not noticed; thus, if a letter exceed one ounce it becomes liable to four rates; and if it exceed two ounces, to six rates.

Letters to and from the United Kingdom by the Royal Mail steamers are subject to a uniform charge of 1s. 4d. currency, per half ounce. Pre-payment optional.—If sent via the United States for conveyance by private ship, the Provincial charge is a uniform rate of $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. per half ounce from any part of Canada to the frontier line. To be pre-paid, as also the American postage to the Atlantic port, New-York or Boston.

On letters to the United States, the Provincial postage to the frontier line must be pre-paid. Pre-payment of

the American postage is optional.

NEWSPAPERS.

Colonial Newspapers, not exceeding two ounces, sent by post to any other place within the British North American Provinces, pay one halfpenny; to be pre-paid or not, at the option of the sender. rcular,

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, sent North -paid If sent to any British Colony beyond sea, (not intended to pass through the United Kingdom,) or to any foreign country, except the United States—one half-penny—to be PRE-PAID.

Colonial Newspapers sent to the United Kingdom, or to any British Colony by way of England, and British Newspapers from the United Kingdom to any part of Canada,—one halfpenny,—charged on delivery.

If sent to any part of the United States, one penny.—

To be pre-paid.

Newspapers sent from the United States, are liable, on delivery, to a Provincial rate of one penny, in addition to the United States postage.

British and Colonial Newspapers may be sent by Packet between any of Her Majesty's Colonies, without passing through the United Kingdom—free of postage for sea conveyance, and by private Ship at a Sea-rate of one penny each, to be pre-paid.

British Newspapers may be posted in Canada for any place in B. N. America, at a charge of one halfpenny each, to be pre-paid or not, at the option of the sender.

United States papers, if re-posted in this Province,

are liable to full letter postage.

Newspapers may be sent from Canada by Mail Packet, and through England to any Foreign Port in China, the East Indies or East Africa, on the pre-payment of $2\frac{1}{2}d$. Sterling, (or 3d. Currency,) each.

Newspapers, (with exception of British, which are not limited as to weight,) to pass under the foregoing regulations, must not exceed two ounces, otherwise they become liable to pamphlet postage, viz., one penny per ounce.

Supplements charged as distinct newspapers.

Prices Current and Commercial Lists.

British or Colonial Prices Current and Commercial Lists may be sent by Mail Packet between Canada and any other of Her Majesty's Colonies,—if passing through the United Kingdom, at a postage of $3\frac{1}{2}d$. Currency,—and if not passing via England, at a Postage of $2\frac{1}{2}d$. Currency each: the pre-payment of these postages will be optional.

Prices Current and Commercial Lists, whether British, Colonial or Foreign, may be sent by Mail Packet* from Canada to any Foreign Port at a Postage of 3½d. Cur-

rency each, to be prepaid.

The Prices Current and Commercial Lists above described must contain simply the names and prices of articles, excluding the names and addresses of the parties interested or dealing in the same—and no Newspaper, Price Current or Commercial List can be conveyed under these regulations unless the same shall be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at both sides, and unless there be no writing or mark upon it or upon the cover of it except the name and address of the person to whom sent,—nor any paper or thing enclosed in or with the same.

Votes and Proceedings in Parliament.

If sent to the United Kingdom by packet, or to any part of British North America or British West Indies, one penny for every four ounces.

If intended to be sent to the United Kingdom by

private ship, double the above rates.

No packet or cover containing votes or Legislative proceedings permitted to be sent through the Post, if exceeding six pounds weight.

Pamphlets and other Publications.

If printed in the United Kingdom, British North America, or British West Indies, may be sent to any place in British North America, the United States, or British West Indies, at the reduced inland rate of one penny per ounce in addition to sea postage; provided they do not exceed sixteen ounces.

If printed and mailed in the United States, they are liable on delivery in this Province to the same rate of one penny per ounce; but if re-posted in Canada, they

are charged with full letter postage.

Newspapers, Pamphlets, Publications, and Parliamentary Proceedings, must be sent without covers, or with covers open at the ends. If this is not done, or if there be any marks or writing on them besides the address, full letter postage will be charged.

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ment of the fine arts, or for the use or by the order of any University, College, Academy, School or Seminary of learning within this Province.

IV.—Arms or clothing which any contractor or contractors, commissary or commissaries, shall import or bring into the Province, for the use of Her Majesty's Army or Navy, or for the use of the Indian nations in this Province: Provided the duty otherwise payable would be defrayed or borne by the Treasury of the United Kingdom or of this Province.

V.—Specimens in Nat. History, Mineralogy, & Botany. VI.—Seeds of all kinds, farming utensils and implements of husbandry, animals for the improvement of stock,—when specially imported in good faith by any Society incorporated or established for the encouragement of agriculture.

REMARKS.

I.—The specific Duties are levied according to the Imperial Weights and Measures, and in Sterling money.—20s. stg.—24s 4d. cy. or \$4 87. The Imperial Quarter of Grain is equal to 8½ of our Winchester Bushel.

II.—In calculating the ad valorem Duties under the Imperial Act, one-tenth is first added to the amount of

the invoice.

III.—When the Tares cannot be ascertained from the Invoice, the following are allowed:—On Coffee, in bags, 3 per cent.; Coffee in Casks, 12 per cent.; Raw Sugar and Molasses, 12 per cent.; Loaf Sugar in Casks or boxes, 15 per cent.; Leaf Tobacco in casks 12 per cent.

IV.—Bonds, satisfactory to the Collector, will be taken for the Provincial Duties (except the Provincial Duties on Live Stock, Grain, Meal, Provisions, and other agricultural produce,) when the same shall exceed £50 currency, at 6 months; but, all dated from 1st September till 1st April, are due on the 1st April. All other duties are payable in cash.

V.—Goods imported, whether by sea or inland, may be entered for warehousing, and exported from the warehouse without payment of duty. American products may descend the St. Lawrence in Bond, and be exported into the United States by way of Laprairie and St. Johns.

EXPLANATORY REMARKS ON THE CURRENCY OF CANADA.

From Appendix to "The Provincial Laws of the Customs," &c.

The values assigned to the several coins by the Currency Act are not arbitrary, but are proportioned (except in the case of British silver) to the quantity of pure gold or silver in each. The £ currency was and is equal to 4 dollars of account; and a note for \$100 either in Upper or Lower Canada, is now, as it has always been, payable

By the Currency Act the Provincial dollar of account is made equal in value to that of the United States; and the Eagle coined after 1834 and before 1841 and passing there for \$10, is therefore made to pass for £2 10s. cy., and the Par is £1 cy. = \$4 of account of the United States, the value of any sum being always that of the least valuable coins by which it can be legally paid. The weight of pure gold in an Eagle and in a Sovereign are such, that if the former be worth £2 10s. the latter will be worth £1 4s. 4d. cy. which is the value the act assigns to it and to the \mathcal{L} sterling, and agrees with the value (\$4.86\%) assigned to it by law in the United States.—The Par of cy. and stg., is therefore £1 stg. =£1 4s. 4d. cy., or £100 stg. = £121 13s. 4d., (or £121%) currency. But 10 silver dollars of proper weight and fineness are worth more than an Eagle or \$10 of account, -so that the silver dollar is really worth nearly 5s. 1d. cy., for which sum it is directed to pass. In the same manner the values of certain other foreign coins are ascertained and assigned. But as subsequent coins of the same nations might vary in weight or fineness,—such coins are not to be a legal tender unless under a proclamation issued after assay. British silver forms the exception to the rule above stated; it is only worth, as silver, 10-11 of the nominal value for which it passes on the faith of the British Government. This nominal value is maintained by the Currency Act, and such coins while lawfully current in Great Britain pass for sums proportionate to their nominal value there, at the rate of £1 4s. 4d. cy. for £1 stg.; but for the reasons above stated, it is provided that they shall not be a legal tender for more than £2 10s. cy. in any one payment.—At the foregoing rates:-

1d. stg, is =1,216666, &c. of 1d. cy. =2,027777, &c. cts.
1d. cur. is = 821917, &c. of 1d. stg. =1,666666, &c. cts.
1 cent = 493150, &c. of 1d. stg. = 6 of 1d. cy.

The coins current by the Act are:—

British gold coins at the rate of £1 4s. 4d. cy. to £1. stg. American Eagles coined before 1st July 1834, at £2 13s. 4d. cy.—Do. coined between 1st July, 1834, and

1st January, 1841, at £2 10s.—and at the same rates for half Eagles, &c.

The above are a legal tender by tale if within 2 grains of full weight, deducting ½d. cy. for each ¼ of a grain wanting.

British gold and American gold coined before 1834, at

American gold coined between 1834 and 1841, at 93s, cy. per oz. troy,—

British silver as above stated.

The dollars of Spain, United States, Peru, Chili, Central America, States of South America and of Mexico, coined before 1841, at 5s. 1d. cy., and half dollars at 2s. 6½d. cy. Quarters at 1s. 3d. Eighths at 7½d., and sixteenths at 3½d., if legal weight. The parts less than halves being a tender at the said rates by tale to the amount of £2 10s. in one payment, until they have lost one twenty-fifth of their weight, and not afterwards.

French 5 franc silver pieces, coined before 26th April

1842, at 4s. 8d. each.

Gold and silver coins of the same nations of later dates, may be made current by proclamation to be issued as aforesaid.

Copper coins of the United Kingdom, (or any to be coined by Her Majesty of not less than five-sixths the

weight of such coin) at their nominal rates.

The least legal weight of a Sovereign is, 5 dwts. $2\frac{1}{2}$ grs.—of an Eagle coined before 1834, 11 dwts. 6 grs.—after 1834, 10 dwts. 18 grs.—of a Dollar, 17 dwts. 4

grs.—of a 5 franc piece 16 dwts.

The £ sterling, in any act or contract made after the passing of the Currency Act, [proclaimed 26th April, 1842] is to be understood as equivalent to £14s. 4d. cy., but in any act or contract made before that time, the word sterling is to be construed according to the intention of the Legislature—of the parties.

# CHRONICLE OF EVENTS IN CANADA for 1845.

Jan. 16.—His Excellency Sir Charles T. Metcalfe

created a peer, under the title of Baron Metcalfe.

March 29.—Provincial Legislature prorogued, after a sitting of more than four months. During the session 170 Bills passed both Houses,—163 of which were assented to by the Governor General, and 7 reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure.

April 13.—Fire at London, (U.C.) destroying about

one-half of the town.

May 9.—Extensive conflagration at Toronto.

28.—Great fire at Quebec, destoying nearly the whole of the St. Roch Suburbs. The number of sufferers computed at 12,000, being about one-third of the entire population of that city.

June 11.—Lieut. General Sir R. D. Jackson, K.C.B. Commander of the Forces in Canada, died at Montreal,

of apoplexy.

28.—Second great fire at Quebec, consuming upwards of 1,200 houses and 1,500 hangards, being nearly the whole of the St. John Suburbs and a large portion of the St. Lewis Suburbs. The number of sufferers believed to have been nearly as great as that by the fire on the 28th May.

10.—Corner stone of the new Market Hall, Montreal,

laid by His Worship the Mayor.

Sept. 14.—O'Rourke, the well-known pugilist, residing near L'Orignal, on the Ottawa, barbarously murdered. An individual, named Brady, subsequently charged with the murder, and committed to the Montreal Gaol for trial.

28.—Hon. L. J. Papineau, formerly Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Lower Canada, returned, after

an absence abroad of eight years.

Oct. 4.—Fire in Griffintown, Montreal, destroying about fifty houses.

12.—The Beauharnois Canal opened.

Nov. 3.—Severe gale of wind below Quebec. Several vessels wrecked, and considerable damage sustained by others.

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26.—His Excellency Lord Metcalfe having relinquished the Government of Canada, left Montreal for England, via Boston.

27.—Lieut. General The Earl Cathcart, K.C.B. Commander of the Forces, sworn in, at Montreal, as Admin-

istrator of the Government.

Dec. 1.—Several homeward-bound vsssels stranded or otherwise injured, below Quebec, by ice, which had rapidly formed in the river, in consequence of the winter having suddenly set in with great severity.
