ONE KILLED, ONE HURT AT A LEVEL CROSSING

MONTREAL, Nov. 23.—(Can. Press.)—Israel Cardin, a farmer, and his horse were killed and Alphonse Michaud, father-in-law of Cardin, was severely injured today when a carriage struck by a G. T. R. train at a crossing within two hundred yards of their home, two and a half miles east of Danby, Quebec.

Only New Officers Chosen Were John White and Frank Duffy.

SOCIALIST ROUTED

Test of Strength Came in Electing Delegate to British Congress.

SEATTLE, Nov. 22.—(Can. Press.)—The A. F. of L. adjourned tonight after electing officers and choosing Philadelphia as the place of the next convention, which will assemble on the second Monday of November, 1914. The officers chosen are:

President, Samuel Gompers; first vice-president, James Duncan; second vice-president, James O'Connell; third vice-president, Dennis A. Hayes; fourth vice-president, John R. Alpine; fifth vice-president, H. B. Farham; seventh vice-president, John F. White, president of the United Mine Workers of America; eighth vice-president, Frank Duffy, general secretary of the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners; treasurer, John B. Lennon; secretary, Frank Morrison.

In this list are only two new men, White and Duffy. Second Vice-president John Mitchell and Fifth Vice-president William D. Huber retired voluntarily.

Rebut to Socialism. For delegates to the British Trades Union Congress, W. D. Mahon, international president of the Brotherhood of Street and Electrical Railway Employees, was elected over Councilman Frederick L. Wheeler of Los Angeles by a vote of 14,000 to 3,874.

John Mitchell nominated Mahon and Wheeler's vote was looked on as a test of Socialist strength.

For second delegate to the British Trades Union Congress, Matthew Wolf of the Photo Engravers' Union was unanimously elected.

Mortimer Donohue of Butte, Mont., was chosen delegate to the Canadian Trades and Labor Congress.

A conference of delegates was held last night at which it was agreed, place John P. White on the executive board, as John Mitchell had desired. This removed the opposition to Samuel Gompers for the presidency. The election of Mr. Gompers today was unanimous.

President Gompers closed the convention with an address.

TWO THROWN FROM WAGON AND HORSE KILLED AT BOLTON AND GERRARD CROSSING.

Charles Pursell, 44 Bolton avenue, and E. A. Cowling, 1075 East Gerrard street, while driving a wagon along East Gerrard street Saturday evening, were hurled to pavement, the wagon turned over, and one of the horses so badly injured that it was shot when a west-bound Parliament car struck the side of the wagon. The accident happened about 8 o'clock, near the corner of Gerrard and Hastings avenue.

According to eye-witnesses of the accident, it was a direct result of the condition of the road at the bottom of the hill, where Cowling, who was driving, was turning on the track to avoid an impassable part of the street.

CHARGE EVASIONS OF BUILDING LAW

Interim Report of Civic Survey May Substantiate Ald. Wanless' Complaint.

WHAT COUNCIL WILL DO

Reorganization of Fire Department Will Be Most Important Question.

How the city council will line up today on the recommendation of the board of control that the fire department be reorganized is yet uncertain. The recommendation may be referred back upon some pretext or it may be adopted without debate.

The controllers and Ald. Burgess are assuredly committed to the reorganization of the department, but that has done no more than centralize the demand in ward three. So far there is no indication that the demand in other wards is as urgent as Ald. Burgess believes it to be in ward three, where the value of property is the greatest. On the theory that the council gives consent the recommendation may go unchallenged.

Ald. Wanless is to press his motion for a judicial investigation of the architect's department. Within the past few days the experts conducting the survey have submitted an interim report to the board of control that means serious charges of evasions of the building bylaw. This will likely influence the council to have the judicial investigation opened without further delay.

A twenty-one members of the council election for the payment of \$25,000 to the managers of the National Live Stock Show to provide for running expenses, there will probably be little objection to putting thru the necessary bylaw. As the show is over it may be that the amount of the deficit will be demanded and that the appropriation will conform to the deficit.

Controllers Church and Foster are expected to renew their efforts to have a plebiscite on Jan. 1 on the clean-up of the franchise. It is so evident, however, that they want to becloud the issue that they will get no support. At the last meeting of the council they drew others into "looking a gift horse in the mouth" and those who have a little stomach for the act that they jumped the job. As this meeting is the last one of this year at which the business will be done, it is likely that there will be little debate over the street railway purchase. That debate may well be held over to the meeting at which the purchase bylaw will be introduced.



HORSE AND CAMEL INHABITED YUKON

Fossil Remains of Extinct American Animals Have Been Found.

HITHERTO UNHEARD OF Indians of Columbia Time Had Never Seen an Equine.

At the time of the discovery of America horses and camels were entirely unknown in the western hemisphere. The Indians had never seen a horse, and the nearest living American representative of the camel was the llama. It has long been known to zoologists, however, that both horses and camels existed in North America, in a geological age, not very remote from the present.

It is a matter of especial interest, in the light of the fact that the bones of a camel, Amory Jr. obtained a small collection of fossil bones of the Pleistocene age, which he immediately presented to the U. S. National Museum.

It is understood that the horses which lived in North America during the Pleistocene were probably derived from the stock which crossed over from Alaska, and then made their way over the whole of both North and South America.

ARGENTINA HAVING BLACK RUST SCARE

Heavy Export Sales Another Potent Factor in Advancing Wheat Prices.

CHICAGO, Nov. 23.—Liberal export sales at New York and fear of black rust in Argentina had a bullish effect today on buyers of wheat. The market, after showing weakness early, closed firm at a range varying from last night's figures to 1/2 cent advance. Corn finished 1/4 to 1/2 cent up, oats unchanged to a shade higher and provisions irregular, strong out from the decline to rise of 2 1/2 to 3c.

Many wheat traders who were uncertain at the outset changed later to the opinion that for the next six months no exporting nations would require increasing large shipments from producers able to make prompt delivery. The market was locked in by local and other winter conditions for at least six months, shifting the burden of supply demand heavily on the United States, Argentina and Australia.

Big shrinkage in supply. Rosebush despatches telling of a jump in wheat prices here and referring to chances of serious damage from black rust acted as more than an offset for early reports that the amount of wheat held by farmers in the Dakotas and Minnesota was about 30,000,000 bushels, as against 140,000,000 bushels a year ago.

Corn prices hardened on account of receipts being limited and because of firmness at Liverpool, due to bullish reports from Russia and the Danube. For a while, however, mild weather and doubtful advances regarding feed demands kept the trade in a bearish position. Corn, much of the time demand was scattered.

Provisions—shorts covered, but the balance for lower prices for hogs put a handicap on prices. Offerings of lard by a leading packer were so plentiful as to be somewhat oppressive.

ST. LAWRENCE MARKET. Receipts of farm products were 200 bushels of grain, 3 heads of hay, the north building full of mixed products, with heavy supply of poultry and butter, and a few eggs on the market.

It was a large market, both of buyers and sellers, and good prices prevailed. Barley—two hundred bushels sold at 65c to 84c. Hay—Eight hundred bushels sold at \$17 to \$18 per ton.

NEW YORK STOCKS MERELY DRIFTING

Week Closed With Market in a Semi-Comatose Condition.

BAD NEWS IGNORED

Traders Decline to Enter Field Until Mexican Situation Clears.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—The stock market today brought to a close a week of dulness, which for the season of the year is almost unparalleled. Today's trading was as colorless as the preceding days and price changes among the business were of a trivial nature.

The market appeared to be impervious to the influence of adverse factors. As yet without a significant change, less attention is being paid to the Mexican situation when the settlement of the course of prices. Ultimately it must be reckoned with an important condition when the settlement of the course of prices.


