PROCEEDINGS.

ORANGE HALL, ST. JOHN, N. B.,

Oct. 13th, A. D. 1893.

Grand Orange Lodge of New Brunswick called to order at 8 o'clock p. m., with the R. W. Grand Master Geo. W. Fowler in the chair.

Companion J. E. N. Holder and Companion John Mowbray were appointed inside and outside tylers by the Grand Master.

In the absence of the Grand Lecturer and Grand Director of Ceremonies, Companions P. E. Heine and Rosborough were appointed by the Grand Master to test the Lodge.

The test having been taken, the opening ceremonies of the Royal Scarlet Chapter were duly observed, and the Grand Lodge was declared opened in the Royal Scarlet Degree.

Resolved, That the Lodge be reduced to the Orange Degree.

The Lodge was then reduced to the Orange Degree.

A letter from R. W. Bro. W. H. Barton, Grand Secretary, regretting his inability to be present on account of ill health, was read.

SIR AND BRETHREN:—

I deeply regret the circumstances by which I am prevented from being present at the special meeting of Grand Lodge.

Highly as I prize the honorable position which I hold in our beloved society, I find that on account of failing health it will be impossible for me to attend during the session.

The Deputy Grand Secretary has kindly promised to be on hand and attend to the duties of the office.

I hope your session will be a harmonious and prosperous one and may the Giver of all good abundantly bless your deliberations to the advancement of the Order.

Resolved, That the letter be received and placed on the minutes.

Resolved, That the proceedings of this Grand Lodge meeting be not given to the public.

The Right Worshipful Grand Master explained the object of the meeting. He said: "Some little anxiety has no doubt been felt as to the object of this meeting. It has been insinuated in certain directions that there had been misappropriations of the funds for the Bathurst school inquiry. Now this present meeting has been called to deal with this matter. Since the R. W. Grand Master and the R. W. Grand Treasurer constitute the grand executive as to the matter of finances, such a rumor bears a palpable absurdity upon its face.

In consequence of the action of the last session of the Local Legislature in appointing a commission to inquire into the Bathurst School matter and in accordance with the action of the last Grand Lodge meeting, it was absolutely necessary to have the services of counsel in bringing action in behalf of oppressed Protestants of Bathurst before the Supreme Court of New Brunswick. W. Bro. Skinner had been engaged as senior counsel, and it was thought better that the R. W. Grand

Master should act as junior counsel. In these undertakings a great dearth of funds had been experienced. One hundred dollars was on hand at the time of last session of Grand Lodge for this purpose. Two hundred and ninety-one dollars had been received from the Lodges, making three hundred and ninety-one dollars in all. Of this sum two hundred and fifty had been paid to the senior counsel and one hundred and fifty to the junior counsel. The Grand Lodge of British America had only voted \$200 for our assistance in this matter, notwithstanding that they had given \$1,000 for the Jesuit bill fight and had sent \$500 to help the Ulster brethren. The disposition of the friends at Bathurst is to leave the matter in the hands of the R. W. Grand Lodge as to the course to be pursued. The R. W. Grand Master stated in answer to questions that it had been intimated that the Government and the Catholic majority of Bathurst had suggested that in the event that an agreeable settlement of the case could be reached the Government would be very glad and would pay all costs to date. The proposed basis of settlement is virtually as follows: To have parallel grading of the public school and Catholic convent school at Bathurst up to grade five; above that the children should attend a common school; for the management of these a Protestant trustee should be appointed who must be nominated by the Protestant minority and who shall have control of the Protestant grades up to No. 5, and to act in conjunction with the Catholic trustees in the management of the higher grades. The Protestant trustee must not interfere with the Catholic grades. Also, no catechism to be taught in school hours.

Our expenses thus far have been \$380 in connection with the Royal Commission, and the probable cost of carrying the case to completion will be \$2,000, in addition to the \$200 yet to be received from the Grand Lodge of British America.

W. Bro. C. N. Skinner spoke corroborating the information given by the Grand Master.

W. Bro. Rev. A. F. Thompson spoke at some length throwing considerable light on the attitude of the Protestants at Bathurst. His desire, as well as that of the brethren at Bathurst and Protestants, was that no compromise should be entertained, but that the whole matter should be tried out on its merits.

Resolved, That the R. W. Grand Treasurer be called on for his report.

GRAND TREASURER'S REPORT.

(See Appendix D.)

On motion, *Resolved*, That the Report of the Grand Treasurer be accepted, together with the supplementary report of the Grand Master to the effect that \$100 had been received from Bro. Wm. Rodgers and \$75 from York County for stenographic copy of evidence given before the Royal Commission.

Moved by R. W. Bro. James Kelly and seconded by R. W. Bro. Wm. Roxborough, that an extra assessment of twenty-five cents per capita be made upon the Primary Lodges of the Province to defray the expenses of the Bathurst School matter.

Moved as an amendment by W. Bro. H. A. McKecwn and seconded by W. Bro. Alex. McLean, That a committee of five be appointed who, with the counsel en-

gaged in the case (Bro. R. W. Grand Master George W. Fowler and W. Bro. C. N. Skinner), be a committee from this Grand Lodge to take under advisement the present condition of the Bathurst School question and see what arrangements (if any) can be made with reference to the same, and, if satisfied with the validity of the concessions made by the trustees, that this committee have full power to act in the whole matter.

Moved as an amendment to the amendment by W. Bro. H. H. Pitts and seconded by W. Bro. P. E. Heine, That a committee of six be appointed, with the W. Grand Master, to raise by subscription the money necessary to carry on the legal contest for the public school law in its entirety, and said committee have full power to act until the next session of Grand Lodge and to report to same.

Original motion carried.

Moved by W. Bro. H. H. Pitts and seconded by W. Bro. H. H. Staples, That a committee of six be appointed to act in conjunction with the R. W. Grand Master in connection with the further prosecution of the Bathurst School matter.

Moved as an amendment by W. Bro. J. B. Morgan and seconded by W. Bro. E. C. Stevens, That a committee of one from each county be appointed to aid in securing the desired funds from the Lodges in their respective counties, using whatever methods they may deem advisable to supplement the assessment.

Amendment carried.

Moved by R. W. Bro. Jas. Kelly and seconded by W. Bro. Wm. Rodgers and *Resolved*, That the County Masters of the different counties be that committee.

Resolved, That the Grand Treasurer be directed to write to the Grand Treasurer of British America, asking for the forwarding of the \$200 to the Provincial Grand Treasurer.

Resolved, That any funds sent in by any Lodge for the purposes of the Bathurst School fund in excess of the assessment be credited to them as against any further assessment.

Resolved, That the two tylers each receive \$2 for their services this evening.

Moved by R. W. Bro. N. J. Morrison and seconded by W. Bro. H. A. McKeown, That this R. W. Grand Lodge do now close.





RIGHT WORSHIPFUL GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

To the Right Worshipful Grand Lodge of the Province of New Brunswick.

BRETHREN :

Following the usual practice I have great pleasure in presenting my third annual report as Grand Master of the Grand Orange Lodge of New Brunswick.

When I learned that the large and comfortable hotel in this place had been destroyed by fire I at first thought that I would find it necessary to change the place of meeting in order that the brethren might be properly accommodated, but upon making inquiries I felt that there would be no difficulty in that respect and knowing how anxious our St. John West friends were to have us meet here I was glad that no change was required.

The past year has been one of great activity in Orange circles throughout this Province and warrants have been issued for the institution of ten new lodges as follows:—Three in York Co., three in Carleton Co., two in Sunbury Co., one in Westmoreland Co. and one in Albert Co. Nor is the good

 the last the news came with a sudden shock. Although not a
 Committee. native of the Province, Bro. Barton had, during his residence
 here, made many warm friends both in and out of the Society
 who have heard of his early death with deep regret.

During the last illness of the Grand Secretary, Bro. P. G.
 M. Armstrong attended to his duties and after his death
 kindly consented to fill the vacancy until after a successor has
 been elected by this Right Worshipful body.

During the year I consulted by letter with many of the
 brethren throughout the jurisdiction relative to the advisability
 of employing an organizer, but owing to the great variety
 of opinions expressed and the difficulty of arranging for a
 satisfactory mode of payment I was unable to see my way
 clear to make arrangements for the purpose. I would, how-
 ever, suggest to the Grand Lodge that the employment of a
 competent person to organize new lodges and instruct the
 brethren of isolated lodges would be an excellent thing for the
 institution and would advise the appointment of a committee
 to consider the matter.

I regretted very much that professional engagements pre-
 vented my being present at the dedication of the New Orange
 Hall at Bathurst, but I sent a substitute in the person of Bro.
 Jas. M. McIntyre, D. G. C., whose presence on that occasion,
 I had the pleasure of learning, gave great satisfaction to the
 brethren and friends at Bathurst. The Orangemen at Bath-
 urst are to be congratulated on the pluck and enterprise they
 have exhibited in building and equipping their beautiful and
 commodious hall, and by so doing have set an example that
 might well be followed by other populous places in which
 Orangeism had a strong foothold long before it was ever
 dreamed of at Bathurst. I am also proud to announce that
 Steeves Lodge, at Lutz Mountain, Westmoreland Co., have
 erected and are now occupying a hall, clear of debt.

The anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne was duly ob-

served in various parts of the Province, the largest gatherings being at Fredericton and Sussex. These annual celebrations do much for the Order by bringing the brethren of different localities together and enabling them to know and appreciate each other better.

The usual celebration of the 5th of November was also duly observed throughout the jurisdiction, in some places by a lecture followed by a supper and dance, and in others by a church parade and sermon, according as the majority of the brethren of the different lodges inclined to be grave or gay, but in each case whatever form the outward manifestation took the hearts of the brethren were in the right place and they celebrated according to their different pleasures the event dear to the heart of every true Orangeman and lover of liberty.

The correspondence this year has been unusually heavy and will be handed to the Committee on Correspondence.

I have not been called upon to decide any important appeals during the year, but have granted a number of dispensations.

At the last annual session of the Grand Lodge the Grand Master was instructed to take such proceedings as were deemed necessary to endeavor to secure their civil rights for our brethren of Bathurst, which rights, it was claimed, were denied them by the Catholic majority of that place, aided and abetted by the Board of Education.

The first step taken was to circulate petitions throughout the Province directed to the Legislature and praying that the matter be investigated by the House of Assembly and proper redress of the grievance granted.

These petitions were prepared in consultation with a number of the brethren, printed by Bro. Pitts at his printing office, duly circulated for signatures and were signed by, I believe, something about ten thousand persons.

After a somewhat stormy debate in the Legislature a Royal Commission was issued to the Hon. Judge Fraser (our present Governor) directing him to proceed to Bathurst and there examine into all the many complaints which are commonly known as the Bathurst School Question.

After consultation with some of the brethren I employed brother the Hon. C. N. Skinner, Q. C., as senior counsel and myself acted as junior counsel at the inquiry, and having received from brother the Rev. A. F. Thompson a detailed statement of the various matters of complaint, we put it in a

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proper legal form, and, having filed and served the various copies required, proceeded to Bathurst on the opening of the Commission at that place.

His Honor Judge Fraser presided at the hearing, the Board of Education being represented by the Hon. Solicitor General White, the Trustees of Bathurst Town and Village by R. A. Lawlor, Esq., and N. Landry, Esq., and the complainant by Hon. Mr. Skinner and myself.

Briefly we charged in our complaint that the Roman Catholic Bishop of Chatham entered into an agreement and understanding with certain Catholic members of said school districts of Bathurst Town and Village to bring the schools of said districts under the control of the religious teaching orders of his church, and under and by virtue of such agreement and understanding conventional schools were established contrary to law.

That the Board of Education had granted undue privileges to the said religious teaching orders of the Catholic Church in allowing them to be licensed as teachers without attendance at Normal School.

That Roman Catholic priests interfered with the schools in said districts in their capacity as priests of the church.

That Roman Catholic holy days not school holidays were observed in the schools.

That a certain report dealing with the schools of these districts had been suppressed by the Board of Education.

That the Board of Education had unduly favored the Roman Catholics in not acting upon complaints submitted by Protestants.

That the grading of said schools was so conducted as to make it necessary for Protestant children to attend the conventual schools.

That in consequence of the foregoing the efficiency of the schools had been greatly impaired.

That the cost of running the schools had by these means been greatly increased.

That the conventual schools had been established for the benefit of the Roman Catholic church and to injure the Protestant churches.

That a regulation of the Board of Education (No. 10) had been materially altered in order to enable the trustees to interfere with Protestant rights.

That teachers had been rejected in Gloucester Co. because they were Protestants and would not teach the Roman Catholic catechism in the schools.

That illegal arrangements had been sanctioned by the Board of Education which enabled the children of one district to be taught in another district so as to receive religious instruction during school hours.

That in certain schools Roman Catholic catechism had been taught within school hours; Roman Catholic prayers had been used; Protestant children had been forced to kneel and cross themselves; a Protestant pupil had been expelled for refusing to kneel.

That generally the school law had been violated and disregarded in said school districts.

The hearing occupied sixteen days of arduous labor on the part of judge and counsel, some sixty witnesses being examined and an immense mass of evidence adduced filling some seven volumes and containing in the whole over twelve hundred pages of closely type-written matter, and as a result, in our opinion, the various charges were amply proved.

The argument took place at Fredericton and lasted four days, being taken part in by Hon. Mr. White for the Board of Education, R. A. Lawlor, Esq., for trustees and Hon. Mr. Skinner and myself for complainant. The commissioner took time to consider and stated that he would report to the Board of Education. Since that time Judge Fraser has been appointed Governor of the Province and it is not yet known to counsel whether he has or has not reported upon the matter, though I am of opinion that the Board has received some intimation of what his report is likely to be as they have since the argument made two very important changes in the regulations along the lines for which we contended, namely: The prohibition of the use of any but the Lo. 's prayer" in the schools and the fixing of the school hours and prohibition of any use of religious catechism between those hours, which, if no other gain were made by this enquiry, must be regarded as a distinct victory for us.

After the close of the enquiry, counsel, upon consultation, decided to bring the matter before the courts as well, and the case of ex-parte Johnson attacking the assessment in school district No. 2 was taken up on certiorari and now stands with leave to re-enter next term.

Since the agitation in this matter first began there has been from time to time talk of a basis of settlement of difficulty being arrived at, and at the conclusion of the hearing Mr. Skinner asked the friends at Bathurst if they cared to have a settlement of the matter provided terms satisfactory to them could be arranged for, and they told him that such was their desire. The matter was further and at length discussed at the special meeting of the Grand Lodge called to consider the whole matter, but the proposed settlement was rejected.

During the month of October last, with a view to obtaining a settlement, the Protestant people of Bathurst appointed a committee of five persons composed of Revs. A. F. Thompson and J. Sellars and Messrs. Dr. W. P. Bishop, W. R. Johnson and V. William Rogers.

These gentlemen drew up a basis of settlement consisting of eight propositions and handed the same to Hon. Mr. Skinner who submitted them to the other side through their counsel, Mr. Lawlor, but no agreement was reached. Afterward a meeting of representatives of both parties met at Bathurst with the counsel on both sides but no agreement was had. Then the counsel met and formulated another basis of settlement taking the first proposition as a ground work and interviewed certain members of the Board of Education to know if the terms would be agreed to by the Board provided they were accepted by both parties, and the members so consulted agreed that no objection would be offered by the Board provided both parties would agree to accept the same.

The following is an outline of the proposed basis of settlement:—

The agreement to be in writing and to be signed by the counsel representing both interests.

One Protestant Trustee to be elected to the Board. Such trustee to be approved of by a majority of the Protestant rate-payers present at the school meeting at which such trustee is elected.

That out of the general school fund fixed charges, such as interest, principal accruing due, insurance and sinking fund (if any) be first paid and a sum equal to the balance of the rates paid in by the Protestant rate-payers added to the proportion of the county school fund earned by the proportionate attendance of the Protestant pupils in the primary and intermediate departments of the public school building, together

with the allowance out of the county school fund to teachers, shall be expended in the maintenance of the schools in the public school building.

No charge to be made for the use of the convent school buildings.

The schools in the two rooms of the primary and intermediate departments of the public school building to be under the control of the Protestant Trustee and all grades or departments above the intermediate to be managed by the whole Board.

The basis of this agreement is that the Protestants and Catholic Trustees shall severally control in their respective departments as above outlined, and in case of a difference of opinion occurring the Chief Superintendent of Education is hereby accepted as an arbitrator between them.

It will easily be perceived that by this plan no part of the money paid by Protestants will go to the support of the conventual schools and the majority will be called upon to give up their inherent right to elect the whole Board of Trustees, and the majority of the Board will concede their right to control all the schools in the district. These are the salient features of the plan which would commend themselves to the Protestant people, but this is also true that it is in a certain sense a departure from the act. In defense of that, however, it might be urged that the existing arrangement in other parts of the Province, such as St. John, Fredericton, Chatham and other places are also still greater departures from the act.

Now as there appears to be a misapprehension in some quarters respecting the conduct of the Protestant counsel in this matter, and as some of the good brethren have expressed themselves as opposed to our course I may be pardoned for introducing a few words of explanation.

When we came to consider the whole question after the evidence was all in and the argument concluded we asked ourselves what were the results.

If the commissioner reports adversely nothing will be immediately gained by the enquiry except the production of the evidence to the country and the preparation of a ground work for a religious war such as agitated the country at the passing of the act in 1871. If, on the other hand, the report is in our favor it means the disruption of the existing state of things in these places where now everything is going on harmoniously,

a condition which we were assured would be deprecated by many who were strong sympathisers with the brethren and friends in Bathurst. We therefore felt that we would be doing no more and no less than our duty if we were to endeavor to formulate some basis of settlement which would be mutually satisfactory to both parties, and that is the sole reason why we entered upon that course. We have never urged our friends in Bathurst to make any settlement because we felt that was outside our province, but simply asked them to meet representatives from the other side to talk over the matters in dispute and see if a *via media* might not be found. The question has not in any way been prejudiced by any attempts which have been made at a settlement but remains precisely as if such steps had not been taken, so that to put it mildly I do not think the occasion calls for the strictures which have in some quarters been passed upon the conduct of counsel. In any great question like this there is bound to be a difference of opinion among those who are honestly working for the same end, and it is infinitely better to recognise that and try to bring a brother around to your way of thinking rather than to violently denounce him because he cannot see eye to eye with yourself, or because the course which seems to him the proper one to pursue does not commend itself to your judgment. I have no doubt that we all feel alike over this question, and I feel assured that if we stand together and fight shoulder to shoulder and do not allow ourselves and our energies to be divided by bickerings and divisions that a satisfactory conclusion will eventually be reached.

At the last session of the Grand Lodge of British America in answer to an appeal forwarded by me and supported by Bros. P. G. M. Armstrong and D. G. M. Kelly, the sum of two hundred dollars was voted toward the Bathurst school fund, but though there has been a considerable amount of correspondence in the matter, for some hitherto unexplained reason, the treasurer has not yet secured the amount.

I have had the pleasure of visiting a number of the Lodges during the year, though not so many as I could wish.

I wish to call especial attention to the very excellent work performed by Graham L. O. L., of Fredericton, of which Lodge Bro. H. G. C. Wetmore is the beloved Master. As a token of the high esteem in which Bro. Wetmore is held by his Lodge, they presented him with an address and a beautiful

ring. Graham Lodge has, during the year, added thirty-seven to its membership.

And now, brethren, in conclusion, and in retiring from this high office which I have held for the past three years, I wish to thank you all for the trust and confidence you have reposed in me, and to say to you how highly I appreciate the uniform courtesy and kindness I have ever experienced at your hands and to bespeak a continuance of the same for my successor.

We do not all see alike, and I have no doubt but that I have, in the course of the past three years often made mistakes, but I claim this one thing, that the best interests of the Order have always been my aim, and no matter what position I may hereafter occupy I shall continue to do what I can toward increasing the prosperity and extending the usefulness of our beloved Institution.

Whereas, in the opinion of this Grand Lodge it is desirable that the Grand Lodge in session should demand and be satisfied with nothing less than the entire wiping away of all concessions to the Roman Catholic Church, both at Fredericton, Moncton, St. John and elsewhere, as well as in the special instance brought before the commission, which we believe the

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courts will accord us, for which reason the legal proceedings should be completed for the accomplishment of this purpose; therefore

Resolved, That the Orange Association in this province, as voiced by this Grand Lodge, will not be satisfied with anything but the impartial enforcement of the school laws, and the doing away with all concessions; and to emphasize our position, we again record ourselves as being opposed to any settlement other than the non-sectarian school law of 1871. And further

Resolved, That we, as individual members, press it upon the representatives of our various counties in the Local Legislature that they shall agitate from their places in the Assembly and elsewhere, whether they be Government or Opposition supporters, to have all concessions made to any church or creed eliminated from the regulations of the Board of Education, and also that suitable resolutions be presented in the Local Legislature, calling upon the Government, in view of the facts elicited in the investigation, to further amend the regulations as above requested.


