The ships will be at the disposal of the King for the common defence of the empire, maintained and controlled as part of the royal navy. 



FORCED OUT BY TOBACCO TRUST

Brooklyn Jobber Gives Evidence as to Methods Used in Stifling Competition.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5 .- (Can. Press.) -Rudolph Epstein, one of several Brooklyn tobacco jobbers, who claim to have been forced out of business by the American Tobacco Co., testified today to the drastic tactics employed by the trust, it is alleged, to crush competition. He is a witness in the suit for \$500,000 brought by John A. Locker against the American Company under the Sherman law.

He declared that A. T. Benheim, representing the trust, called a meeting of jobbers in 1904, and told them the American Tobacco Co. intended to form a combine of all the jobbers in New York, each member to receive 1000 shares of preferred stock in a company to be known as the Metropo-

company to be known as the Metropolitan Tobacco Co.

Epstein declared that when he refused to join Benheim warned him he would be driven out of business. He said the American Company refused to sell goods to him, and after a time he was forced to close up entirely. "My wife," he said, "cried many a night over our troubles with the American Tobacco Co. It was a matter of bread with us."

AMERICA AS THE AVIATORS'

Jules Vedrines, the French aviator, in a recent issue of Flying, expresses the opinion that "America is the logical country for aviation on an extensive scale." He realized this, he explains, soon after his arrival and saw that things were done "ofi a tremendous, extensive scale, in quantities undreamed of elsewhere." Mischa Elman and the Symphony Orchestra

Mischa Elman was in magnificent form last night at the Toronto Symphony Orchestra concert. Massey Hall was filled to the last seat. Frank Welsman's orchestra excelled itself, and the result was a red letter musical

Mr. Elman absorbed most of the

glory of the occasion. He quickly seized the sympathies of his audience, and the conclusion of the E minor violin concerto of Mendelssohn, which he played, was greeted with an ovation. Five times was he recalled, when he finalfy responded by playing "Chanson et Pavane," by Kreisler. After each movement in the concerto he was greeted with tremendous enthusiasm. Mendelssohn's music so unites the musicianly and the popular that in such hands as Elman's it is certain of cordial acceptance. The allegro molto appassionato contains beautiful writ-

cordial acceptance. The allegro molto appassionato contains beautiful writing, and the thin melodious thread of sound from Elman's string thrilled with an inner delight. There follows another passage of passionate enraptured plending, and after this an exquisite theme blended with the wood wind and given with intense lyrical tenderness. The lovely melody of the aidante was given with the same heart-centred pathos, and in the closing movement the dainty fairy-like measures were performed with a bright delicacy of touch that swept the sudience with enthusiasm. The support of the orchestra here was particularly fine, and rose to the delicate perfection of the score and in keeping with the skill of the soloist. It is officially announced that Greek plenipotentiaries will participate in the peace negotiations.

A semi-official statement, issued tonight, protests against interpreting the fact that Greece did not sign the armistice as proof that dissensions exist among the allies, and declares that it was by agreement of the allies that Greece had an attitude different from that of the other states. The explanation is given that Greece's course was due to her anxiouy that her naval action should not be interrupted in the Ionian Sea, in order to prevent the revietualling of the Turkish army in Epirus and in the Aegean Sea, in order to prevent the revietualling of the transport of Turkish troops to Thrace, in respect to which Greece considered the interest of her allies rather than her own. The chances for the conclusion of peace would have suffered from the relinforcement of the Dardanelles and Tothatlaja garisons.

The statement refers to the Turcottalian treaty recently signed as proof that it is not necessary that peace negotiations shall be preceded by an armistice.

It is well known that the amount of stock of some of the market leaders that is traded in within a year is much larger than their total capitalization, so that on the face of the returns the ownership of all their shares changes hands several times during that period. Crifics of the exchange maintain that the greater part of this traffic is purely speculative. Last year, for instance, 31,266,208 shares of United States Steel common were sold, altho the entire number outstanding was only 5,084,952.

EXPECT A BOOM IF PEACE IS SIGNED

New Securities and It Will

Be Short-lived. A special Paris cable yesterday reported that the international monetary situation is giving considerable concern. Money is very tight in Berlin and more so in Vienna; several runs on savings banks and important failures are reported in Austria and Eastern Germany. Bankers and capitalists are unwilling to make fresh commitments, but are accumulating generous balances figuring that speculative outburst may take place on the eve of the European Balkan conference. Boom is expected to be short lived, because Paris market will at once become flooded with huge government loans for Italy, Spain, China, Turkey, Bulgaria and Servia, at very attractive prices.
