MISS ETHEL COCKING GAVE FINE RECITAL

Forester's Hall contained a decidedly delighted audience last night when Miss Ethel Cocking, a pupil of Owen A. Smily, and daughter of the Rev. C. E. Cocking, gave her second annual recital. If Miss Cocking is exceptionally strong anywhere, it is in her dialect pieces. While her faculty for pathos is apparent, her appreciation of humor and of the peculiarities of speech was even more pronounced. Her opening number was the beautiful dramatic poem, "The Test," by Joaquin Miller, poet of the Sierra. Miss Cocking elicited enthusiastic applause for this piece, but in her next, "Bridget McGinnis on Sunday Morn'g," she fairly brought down the house, and was compelled to respond again and again to the merriest that accompanied the hand-clapping. In the second part of the program Miss Cocking was particularly happy, especially in her trio of readings with musical accompaniment. "The Eve King," by Sir Walter Scott; "Out at Old Aunt Mary's," by James Whitcomb Riley; and "Our Bit of the Thin Red Line," by W. H. Campbell, not only of brilliant interest in themselves, but well calculated to bring out the charmingly varied ability of the artist, elicited applause which increased in volume with each rendering. The talented young lady sent her audience home happy with a selection of quip-proposals, the best of which was Shakespeare's love-making in Henry V, wherein the English king quaintly acknowledges his difficulty with the French language. Mr. Donald C. MacGregor, who was in exceptionally fine voice, sang the Godard's "Angels Guard Thee," Robert Louis Stevenson's "Gladly I Loved and Die," and "On the Road to Mandalay," with excellent effect, but probably his dramatic song, "The Trumpeter," best pleased the audience. 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Canada Will Give \$35,000,000 for Three of Most Powerful Battleships

Small Cruisers Will Be Built in Canada For the Purpose of Stimulating the Industry—Canada Will Have a Voice in Control of the Foreign Policy of the Empire, and a Canadian Minister Has Been Invited To Live in London—Ships Can Be Recalled if a Canadian Unit of the British Navy Is Decided Upon.

Mr. Borden said the present government had assumed office on October 10, 1914, and met parliament on November 17, following. After the session he visited Great Britain to consult the admiralty respecting the whole question of naval defence and especially the conditions which confronted the empire at present and in the early future. The port of the negotiations was necessarily of a confidential character and could not be made public. He submitted to the house information received from His Majesty's government in the form of memorandum as follows:
