COMMITTEE OF FIVE TO DEFINE FRONTIERS OF ENEMY COUNTRIES

Supreme War Council Decides to Appoint One From Great Powers to Expedite Work of Conference.

Paris, March 2 .- To expedite the work of the peace conference in defining the approximate future frontiers of the enemy countries, the supreme council has decided to appoint a committee comprising one member each from Great Britain, France, the United States, Italy and Japan. The committee will outline the frontiers on the basis of the recommendation of the territorial commissions already appointed or yet to be created and submit the delimitations to the conference.

The committee also will make recommendations regarding parts of frontiers of enemy states which are not included in the scope of any commission, with the exception of such frontier questions as any of the powers concerned may reserve for discussion in the first instance in the

Paris, March 2 .- Marshal Foch presented yesterday to the council of the great powers the military terms to be incorporated in the peace treaty. These will be considered on Monday with the naval terms already sub-

mitted to the council. The military terms provide for the disarmament of Germany down to twenty divisions of ten thousand men each, including fi-teen divisions of infantry and five of cavairy. 

FORMS TO BE FILLED IN AND FILED.

FORM T1. By individuals, other than farmers and ranchers.

FORM T3. By trustees, executors, administrators of estates and assignees.

TAKEN ON CHARGE KILLING OWN SON

James A. Hartwick Held at Kingston on Accusation of Parham Murder.

Special to The Toronto World. Kingston, March 1 .-- A sensational arrest was made this morning, when Provincial Detective A. B. Boyd, took into custody James A. Hartwick on a charge of murder, in connection with the death of his son. Frederick Hartwick, who was found dead within one handred yards of his father's barn, in the village of Parham, on Feb. 12. Father and son went out into a bush a short distance from Parham, on the afternoon of Feb. 12, shooting rabbits. The father came home that night, but the son did not and, the next day a searching party found the dead body of the young man. First reports of the fatality stated that young Hartwick had accidentally shot himself, but the case took a sensational turn when the coroner's jury presided over by Dr. Geddes of Verona, returned a verdict to the effect that the son had mot death "by some unknown hand." It was stated that two bullet wounds were found in the young man's body, and that the fact had been established that the bullets could not have been fired from young Hartwick's rifle.

Claims is Innocent.

Following the verdict of the coroners' jury, the attorney-general's department at Toronto was notified and Detective Boyd was placed on the case, and the arrest of the father comes as a result of his investigation. The accused was brought to Kingston at one o'clock this morning and lodged in a cell at the police station, and will come before Magistrate Farrell on a charge of murder. The prisoner claims that he is innocent. He admits he was out shooting rabbits with his son on the afternoon in question, but states that his son stated that he would remain a while longer in the bush to continue his hunt. He says this was the last time he saw his son alive, and that he knows nothing whatever about the






