Marshal Foch Presents Terms to Supreme Council -- Germany Restricted to Army of 200,000 Men -- Severe Restrictions on Manufacture of Munitions.

Paris, March 2.—Marshal Foch presented yesterday to the council of the great powers the military terms to be incorporated in the peace treaty. These will be considered on Monday with the naval terms already submitted to the council. The military terms provide for the disarmament of Germany down to twenty divisions of ten thousand men each, including fifteen divisions of infantry and five of cavalry. Severe restrictions are placed on the manufacture of all classes of war materials, and the military and commercial use of the airplane is limited to the minimum. Beyond Marshal Foch's presentation of the terms yesterday, they were not discussed.

DEMANDING FORTIFICATIONS

The provision for the dismantling of the fortifications of Holland and Kiel Canal has been made the subject of reservation by Admiral Beagon, representing the United States, whereby this shall not be a precedent applicable to American canal and harbor defenses such as Hell's Gate, Cape Cod Canal and others. The proposal for the destruction of the large German warships is approved in the report by the British and American naval authorities, but the French still make reservations against the destruction of these ships.

THE OFFICIAL STATEMENT

The official statement on yesterday's session of the supreme council says: "The representatives of the allied and associated governments met at the Quai d'Orsay today at three p.m. Marshal Foch submitted the report of the military representatives of the supreme war council regarding the military conditions to be imposed on the enemy. Signor Crespi, in the name of the financial drafting committee, submitted the list of questions requiring solution which were referred to the financial committee. M. Clementel, on behalf of the economic drafting committee, explained the economic questions requiring solution in the peace conference, which were referred to the economic committee. The next meeting will take place on Monday, March 3, at 3 p.m. Besides the military and naval terms now before the council of the great powers, they will also receive on Monday the report of the reparations commission on the huge sums the enemy countries will be required to pay for damages."

CLEMENCEAU WAS BUSY AT MINISTRY OF WAR

Paris, March 1.—Premier Clemenceau spent part of the forenoon today at the ministry of war. He had conferences with various officers, including Jules Fams, the minister of the interior. THE ONTARIO POLITICAL SITUATION From The London Advertiser, March 1. With startling quickness comes subordination of the report that the Conservative party in Ontario is sadly split. It comes from a rather unexpected source, from within the party. Thursday it was reported from Toronto that there were rebels within the government ranks; that the fate of Premier Hearst hung in the balance, and that there might be a cabinet reconstruction. Premier Hearst had ample opportunity to deny the report. He did not. Immediately along comes The London Free Press, the Conservative organ in western Ontario, proposing Sir Adam Beck as a successor for Sir William Hearst. The man on the street immediately concluded that Sir William's fate had already been decided. On the other hand there are those who believe that a large portion of the party eagerly grabbed the attack on Sir William as a means of ousting him. They point to the recent by-elections as an evidence of the fact that Sir William is too big a burden for the party to carry. The Free Press gives further credence to the report that the party is badly split. It publishes and reprints the report that 35 of the 72 Conservative members in the house are strong for Beck for the leadership. If such is the case then just half the Conservative members want to get rid of Hearst. Evidently North Perth, Southeast Toronto, Manitowish, North Huron, North Ontario, and the doubtful success of St. Catharines, have clearly revealed the handwriting on the wall.

# REAPPORTIONMENT OF ALLIED DEBTS

(Continued From Page 1).

American or Japanese members. The British do not wish to add to their present burden by taking part of the continental burden, while Japan believes that she should hold aloof from European indebtedness.

It was at this conference that this reapportionment of war debts be incorporated in the treaty of peace, but because of difference of opinion, this suggestion has been given up, and the present suggestion contemplates a reapportionment of the debts under the financial section of the league of nations, which was reported favorably on Friday.

Neither suggestion, however, has yet been passed upon by the supreme council of the league of nations, and the magnitude of the proposals lead to the belief that there will be a very full discussion before any such measure is passed.

### Establish International Exchange

Another heading of the financial report concerns the method of establishing international exchange, which has been seriously damaged through the war by war conditions, the issuance of paper currency and other measures. Another heading is the possibility of inter-allied loans from neutral states, as it is understood that neutrals have large stocks of money which may assist in the readjustment of the world.

The articles concerning enemy financial interests in backward communities covers such countries as Morocco, but seeks to emphasize that should be done with the German Baghdad railway and German concessions in Shantung and other parts of China.

Most of the foregoing subjects are being considered with a view of permanent conditions after the war, although the requirements of the enemy may figure in the treaty of peace.

The economic report presented to the council is similarly comprehensive, covering the various economic readjustment following the war. It proposes an extensive inquiry with respect to raw materials, their surplus and shortage in various countries, with a view to stabilizing exports and imports, according to the world's needs.

The most important subject mentioned relates to equality of trade opportunities. This does not affect tariffs or customs among the various nations, but seeks to remove any discrimination, unjust trade monopolies, dumping methods and favored nation treatment.

Owing to the extent of the reports presented, discussion by the council is expected to take considerable time.

The peace conference commission on international labor legislation held its fifteenth and eighteenth meetings under the chairmanship of Samuel Gompers, according to an official announcement.

The commission is now in the process of considering the draft of the international labor convention, and then passed the convention subject to a further reading for final approval.

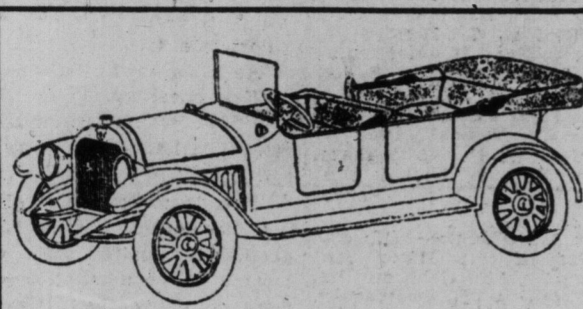

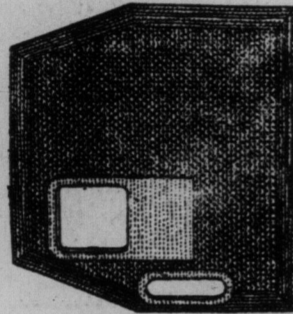

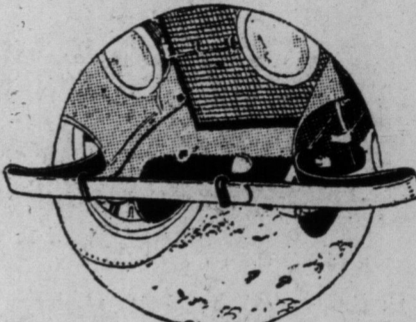

**PREMIER DECLARES HOSPITAL OPENED**

New Military Orthopedic Institution Presents Splendid Appearance. Red Cross Plans to Build Houses Adjacent to These HOMES FOR RELATIVES Buildings.

The new military orthopedic hospital for Canada, situated at the corner of Dupont and Christie streets, was formally opened Saturday afternoon, Sir William Hearst, the premier of Ontario, officiating. The hospital building is spacious and new in appearance. It was built by the Cash Register, but was given over for its present purposes, and with additions and reconstructions it now presents the appearance of a splendidly equipped hospital, such as one of the speakers declared was second to none on the continent.

The guests were received by Brigadier-General Gunn and Mrs. A. E. Gooderham, superintendent of the hospital. A short survey of the lower rooms, the guests moved into the gymnasium, which had been converted into an attractive hall capable of holding about 800 persons. The platform was generously decorated with flags and palms, and flags and bunting hung at intervals about the walls.

**Work in Surgery.** On behalf of the department of militia and defence, General Mewburn told something of the work that had been done by surgery and medicine during the war and among the men in Canada. A year ago, he said, provision had been made for hospitals in eleven divisions throughout Canada. He expected that the one opened today would have been opened in September. He would make no comment as to why this had not been done. The speaker expressed heartfelt gratitude for the work of the Army Medical Corps and for the wonderful work of the Canadian Nursing Sisters. The doctors, who would naturally wish to get back to civil life, had expressed themselves as ready to stay on the job until the last man had been cared for by them as much as possible.

General Mewburn gave figures showing that Canada had 65 military hospitals at home and 53 overseas. Between 1914 and 1917 Canada had in her hospitals 195,711 patients and 42,960 overseas, a total of 438,677 cases. The speaker also gave figures showing the progress of medical and surgical skill in preventing disease. In the South African war disease had caused the death of 14,653 men, while the number killed was 732. In the late war things were reversed. There are still 32,000 in the hospitals in England and 10,000 in France and the relatives of these were advised to be patient about getting them back, because the welfare of the men was the first thing that had to be considered. The problems of demobilization are even greater than the problems of mobilization were, said the speaker, and these must be done by all the nations working together.

**Military Surgery Ahead.** That civil surgery has much to learn from military surgery, was a statement made by Col. Potheringham, the next speaker. This was because of the opportunities that had been given the military surgeons during the war. One fourth of the military patients of Canada are now in the four hospitals of which the one opened, together with that at St. Andrew's at Long Branch and Brant House, near Hamilton, are the others.

On behalf of the hospital, Col. McVicar, who has charge, thanked many organizations which had helped to bring comfort to the institution. The Toronto Red Cross, Soldiers' Comforts, College of Light Patriotic League and Daughters of the Empire

**TORONTO UNDERTAKER ASSISTS AT SIR WILFRID'S FUNERAL**

Unique and Impressive Ceremony When Canada's Great Statesman Is Laid to Rest.

When it became known that the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier had breathed his last, Mr. Robert U. Stone, the well-known Toronto undertaker, placed his services unreservedly at the disposal of Messrs. Gauthier & Company, who had been entrusted with the funeral arrangements by the Laurier family.

The remains of the great statesman were lying in state in the assembly chamber when Mr. Stone arrived. His duties were to marshal the thousands of people who came to view the body the evening before the casket was forever sealed. "For many hours," says Mr. Stone, "the mourning people passed the catafalque at the rate of about 40 per minute. It was certainly one of the most impressive sights it has ever been my privilege to see, and as you may imagine, my acquaintance with funerals is somewhat extensive."

"I suppose with such enormous crowds," said the scribe, "there would be more or less confusion." "For instance," replied Mr. Stone, "of course, the avoidance of undue confusion at a large funeral is wholly due to proper forethought and arrangement of detail on the part of those in charge. In this particular instance the arrangements were most admirable. For example, on Saturday, when the funeral cortege left the assembly chamber it became my duty to take charge of the honorary pall bearers, of whom there were fourteen, headed by Sir Thomas White. Fortunately, I had taken care to become acquainted with each of these gentlemen so that I could address each by name without referring to the list given me by the sergeant-at-arms."

"Thus, at the proper moment, I was enabled to assign each bearer to his position entirely without loss of time or even the semblance of confusion. As a result, the cortege was able to leave the building promptly at the time appointed."

"How did they arrange about admission to the church building?" "By ticket," replied Mr. Stone. "It was the only method possible. Hundreds of persons, of course, could not obtain admission for the church, though very large, would not begin to hold a tenth part of those applying for admission."

"The ceremonial," continued Mr. Stone, "was of the most imposing solemnity throughout, as befits the eminence of the great Canadian, whose mortal remains were the subject of the occasion. Ever since I had the honor to officiate at the funeral of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, I have had an enduring lustre upon the Dominion." Referring to the funeral oration delivered by the Rev. Father Burke of Toronto, Mr. Stone says: "Father Burke's address was most beautiful and inspiring and, I am sure, will long remain a most cherished memory with those who were privileged to hear it."

**E. C. DRURY WOULD HAVE EXPERT DUTY REDUCED**

Mr. Drury pointed out that the farmer has not been a profiteer. He has not set the price on his goods, but has taken what was offered.

Before the farmer can do anything to help in the reconstruction period, Mr. Drury states, the tariff must come down, as his trade is mostly export trade. The farmer has to live on an income from the competition of the world.

Since the beginning of the war many people who were farmers left their land, and came to the city, as they could not make a living, said Mr. Drury, who concluded by saying that the two great things the farmer must have "carry on" are economic freedom and economic justice.

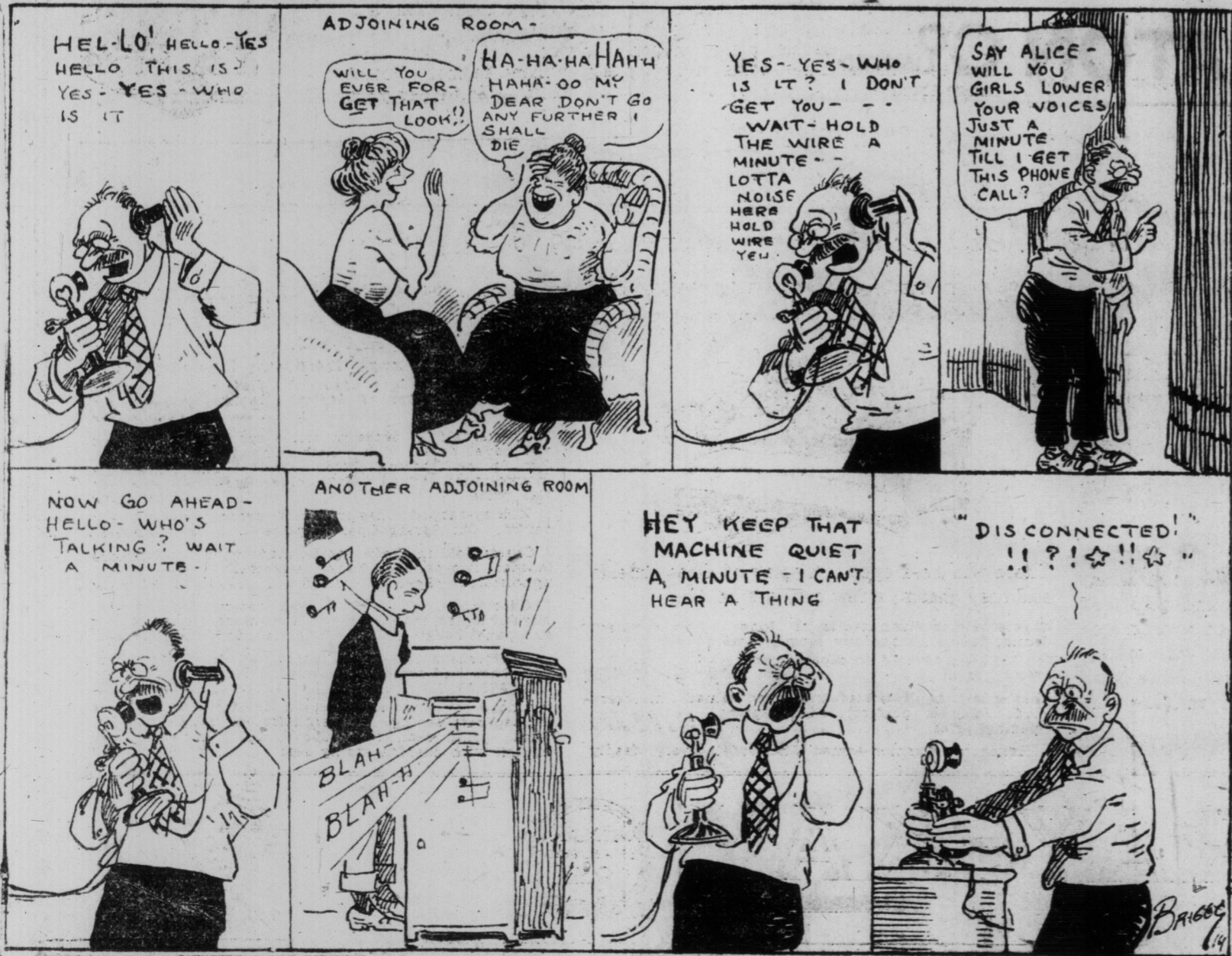

**VETERANS**

Items of Interest to Returned Soldiers Will Be Printed in This Column if Phoned or Sent In.

**RETURNED MEN FORM NEW BODY**

**Naval Ratings Have Organized to Better Their Condition.**

Twelve naval ratings and a chairman on Saturday evening concreted an ideal which may fructify in a few years into one of the strongest navy associations in the Dominion, and this evening will again meet to further the aims and objects of this association, which will likely be known as the Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve Association. The objects of this society will first and foremost be direct representation between the returned sailor and the government, thru organized representation, than has been possible hitherto, and after this a generally improved system of bettering the lot of the returned naval rating in every respect, not forgetting the many channels thru which such conditions may be said to operate. There is a chance that the association may co-operate with one or the other of the larger bodies of returned men, the G. W. V. A., the G. A. C., or the Army and Navy Veterans' Association. The twelve men with their chairman comprised W. Hill, Sen., chief engineer; W. S. Hill, mate; Ed. Round, stoker; C. Allan, petty officer; W. A. Watts, stoker; P. Castle, stoker; T. N. Torrance, A.B. seaman; C. Toy, A. B. seaman; H. Stuart, chief yeoman; signals; W. Robinson, engine room artificer; H. W. Cavell, wireless telegraph operator; L. S. Millett, engine room artificer; C. Instance, A. B. seaman; and G. Baird, engine room artificer.

It was pointed out that at Saturday night's meeting, there were already many sailors among the G.W.V.A. and the G.A.C., but they did not get speedy redress from their grievances thru these organizations. The returned soldiers were able to gain their objects thru the large representative bodies, but the men on the navy or merchant marine, as matters stood, had no such body to back them up, since the G.

W. V. A. and other kindred associations were operative only on behalf of the soldiers.

**Independent Body.**

While no decision was reached on Saturday evening, the general feeling of those present was in favor of an independent body, organized to operate purely on behalf of the sailor. Any action with other bodies was to be considered rather on the basis of co-operation, and decidedly not on that of affiliation. There was apparently only one drawback to these aspirations, and that was the lack of sufficient funds. It was pointed out, however, that this lack had not deterred the veterans of other branches of the service from banding together for a good cause, and that after all, the waters could be bridged in this case providing initiative was strong enough to survive obstacles.

Comrade Carmichael, secretary of the G. A. C., addressed the meeting, and presented the aims and objects of his association. Commodore Aemilius Jarvis himself gave assurance that his society, the Navy League, would be in full sympathy with the aims of the new association, and it was stated also that the senior chaplain of the British and Foreign Sailors' Institute in Canada would also lend his influence, and will be specially solicitous in respect to all distress cases which the association brings to his notice.

Tonight's session will be held to complete organization and to elect officers for the year, and will meet at 34 West King street.

Interviewed later, one of those present stated that the G.W.V.A. had done everything possible to obtain redress for the naval ratings, but that the naval officers at Ottawa had refused to consider returned soldiers' organizations on the ground that they represented only the army men.

J. V. Conroy, organizing secretary, G.W.V.A., himself an Ottawa man, was nonplussed last night when he heard of the alleged reasons for the formation of the new returned sailors' association. "I have last night with a single legitimate case among naval men which has not been adjudicated," said Comrade Conroy. 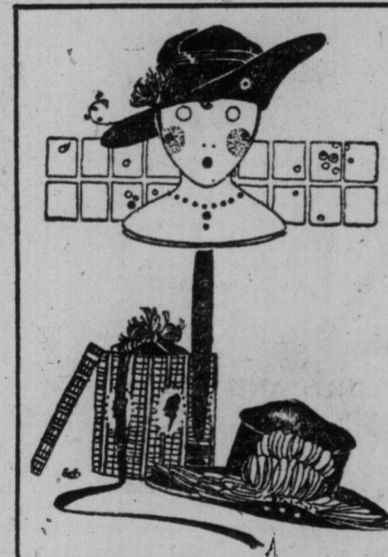

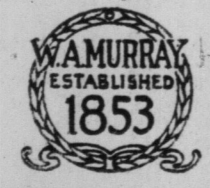

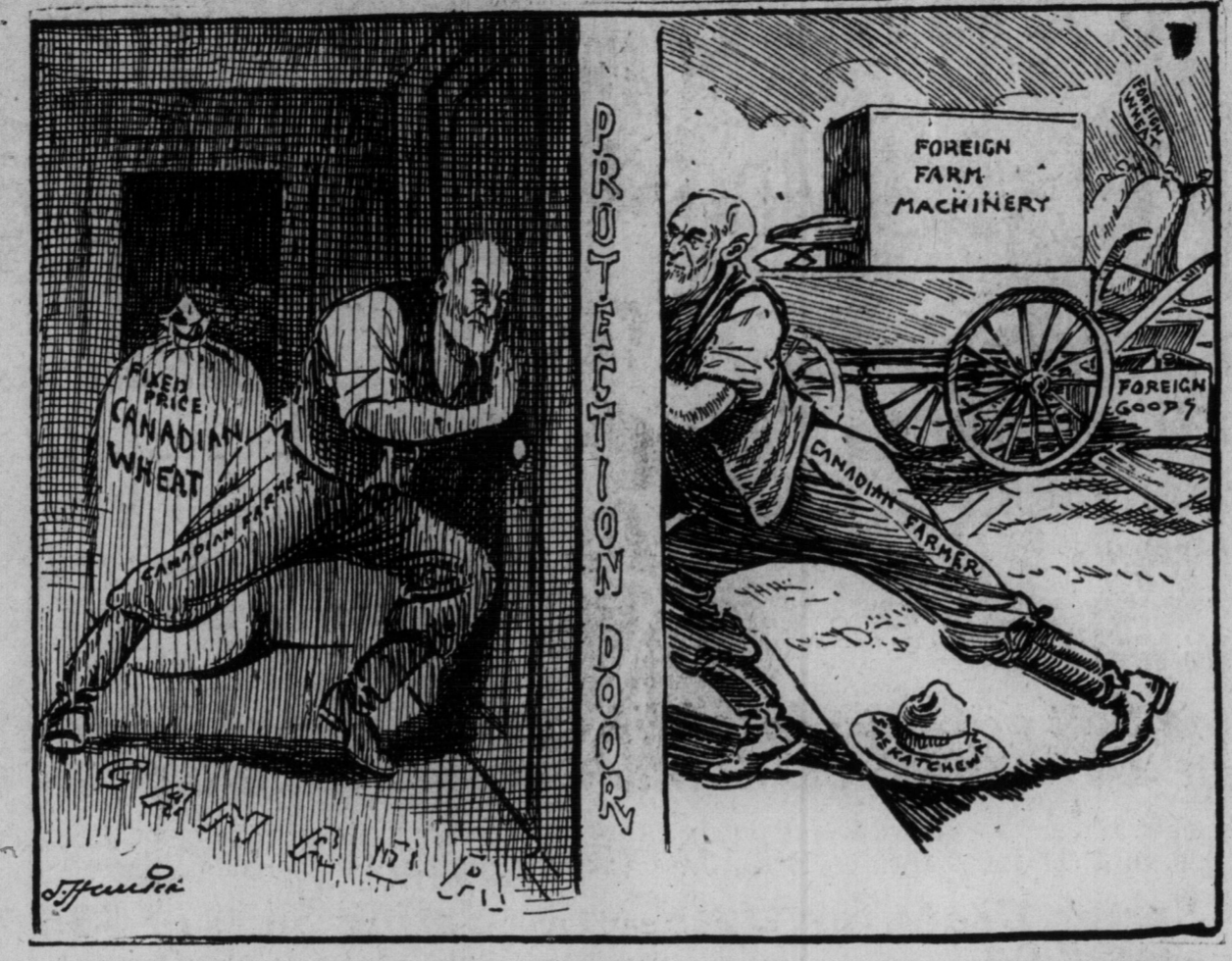
